Senior Commission Plan on Track

YUBA CITY, CA (MPG) - The Senior Commission continues to closely follow its 2024 plan, keeping track of transportation, facilities and local awareness.

The five-member commission met on April 1 for its monthly meeting to review this year's progress. Recently reappointed Commissioner and Chairperson Tanna Thomas said the

commission's mission is advocating for seniors regarding transportation, nutrition, housing, health and safety.

"The annual plan reflects this effort and is ongoing, flexible, and open-ended, allowing the commission to respond as needed and as issues emerge," Thomas said.

One of those issues is transportation, according to Commissioner John Boyer.

"The commission is asked to serve

on a Yuba-Sutter Transit Ad Hoc Committee and provide input representing the senior perspective on transportation services in our area," Boyer said.

"Commissioners also participate in other ad hoc committees and attend various monthly meetings to keep up with what is going on in the community that may affect seniors and report back at the monthly

Live Oak Council Addresses Utility Rates

LIVE OAK, CA (MPG) - Live Oak Interim City Manager Mark Scott continued to set priorities to address utility rates.

Water rates have not kept up with the economics of the time and have not been raised for 18 years, Scott said. While the sewer rates received a slight bump about eight years ago, according to Scott, neither are in balance with the city's economic needs.

Scott said a comprehensive study and financing plan was now needed to prevent the city from falling further behind in availing itself of various grant monies that would help it meet costs. He also requested a sewer enterprise rate study.

"There are grants out there we are not eligible for unless we have a current water study," Scott said. "They are very substantial and a lot of work. Our water fund is in a very bad situation and our General Fund speaks to that."

Scott explained the rate changing process: "(If) you get out of whack in relation to different rate categories, it exposes you to litigation that can be very problematic." Scott said he would bring quotes to City Council and emphasized "waiting is not a good thing."

Councilmember Bob Woten said, "I think we did a study but didn't do an increase. I'm all in favor."

Councilmember Jeramy Chapdelaine added, "I think the studies were done in 2015-16. I think the sewer rate was changed slightly; water did not go through." Chapdelaine added that "so much has changed relative to capital outlays so I think we should get both sewer and water rate quotes."

Councilmember Lakhvir Ghag said, "It cost us about \$100K for the earlier rate study but council kept asking questions and we failed to raise the rates. Every time you ask a question, the price goes higher."

Mayor Ashley Hernandez commented about pricing.

"We are not doing a service to the city and residents if we do not raise the rates," Hernandez said. "It is hurting us that we can't get grants."

City Council directed the city manager to look

State Route 70 Reopening Canceled


BUTTE COUNTY (MPG) - Caltrans (California Department of Transportation) alerted motorists on Monday that the reopening of one-way traffic control on State Route 70 (SR-70) was canceled, due to a rockslide within the Cresta Project area, caused by last weekend's rainy weather.

The State Road-70 closure has been in place since late February from Jarbo Gap to the Greenville Wye in Plumas County. There is no estimate on when the highway will reopen.

Crews originally planned to reopen the highway at night with one-way traffic control starting Monday. But that plan was placed on hold as crews cleaned up the new rockslide and address any new damages caused by the storm.

Caltrans encourage motorists to check Caltrans' QuickMap at quickmap.dot.ca.gov/before traveling for current road conditions and chain requirements. Road information is also available on Caltrans' website at roads.dot.ca.gov by calling the California Highway Information Network automated phone service at 1-800-427-ROAD (7623).

Caltrans District 3 is responsible for maintaining and operating 4,385 lane miles in 11 Sacramento Valley and Northern Sierra counties. The department will issue updates on X @CaltransDist3 and on Facebook at CaltransDistrict3.

Leaders Want a Strong Yuba City Economy

YUBA CITY, CA (MPG) - Yuba City's biggest business backers have the same thing in mind: a strong economy.

The Yuba City Downtown Improvement District (Downtown Business Association) and the Yuba-Sutter Chamber of Commerce work together to keep business booming here. Downtown Business Association President Ryan Henshaw, who owns a local State Farm agency, said the group is critical in enhancing the vitality, attractiveness and overall economic health of a city's downtown area.

"As a city's economic development component, improving the appearance and functionality of the downtown district, a Downtown Business Association can attract more businesses, residents and visitors," Henshaw said. "This can lead to increased economic activity, job creation, and property values, benefiting both local businesses and the city

as a whole."

While the Downtown Business Association brings in business, the Yuba-Sutter Chamber of Commerce advocates for them, according to Janell Willis, executive director.

"Along with nine other chambers, we are part of the United Chamber Advocacy Group, which brings businesses' needs and concerns to government bodies and policymakers," Willis said.

According to Willis, the chamber plays a crucial role in community connection through events and business-related training.

"We are a resource hub for everything in the area, from visitation to business needs," Willis said. "We promote local events and bring educational awareness to issues that affect those living in the Yuba and Sutter communities."

While each business brings something different to the local commerce table, they all share one common theme: success.

"One might have employee retention issues or food cost changes, but overall, all of them are just trying to make their business a success in our community," Willis said. "Having those relationships with others is huge when we know a business owner that might have gone through the same thing in the past."

Willis said a vital downtown community brings a better draw, making marketing dollars go farther. One way is through communication, which the Chamber of Commerce offers classes, including the May 16 Search Engine Optimization class.

"It's for businesses to ensure they are getting all the internet traffic possible by ensuring we have the correct keywords for searches," Willis said.

The chamber offers four core events monthly, beginning with a ribbon cutting for new business. Wine Down Wednesday is every third Wednesday of the month from 5:30 to 7:30 p.m., where night eateries rotate to promote

their menu. Next is Rise and Shine, held the second Tuesday of the month from 8 to 9 a.m., where morning restaurants promote their menu.

Lastly, Willis said a monthly professional networking event also gathers business owners to collaborate. Both groups will meet for the Summer Stroll, hosted by the Downtown Business Association, from 3 to 9 p.m. June 15.

"By participating in local events, supporting community initiatives and investing in community projects, businesses can strengthen their ties to the community and build goodwill among residents, leading to a more vibrant and inclusive local economy," Henshaw said.

Other upcoming Downtown Business Association events include Downtown Socials from 5:30 to 7 p.m. May 30 at Sutter Buttes Brewing and from 5:30 to 7 p.m. Aug. 29 at the Sutter Theater. While business owners work hard to stay connected and make money, Willis said, there is

no time "to lobby on behalf of all the issues that affect their business directly."

"It could be laws on health-care, childcare, medical coverage or labor," Willis said. "All of these are so important to either support or fight against four our region."

According to Willis, the chamber also helps businesses befriend government officials.

"We love bringing someone who has a food truck to an administrator for one of our jurisdictions and getting a catering gig out of it," Willis said. "The relationships created are invaluable."

Henshaw said a Downtown Business Association can foster a sense of community ownership and engagement by involving local stakeholders, residents and business owners in the planning and decision-making processes.

"This can lead to a more collaborative approach to addressing issues and implementing initiatives that benefit the entire community," Henshaw said. ★

Yuba-Sutter Narcotic and Gang Enforcement Task Force Fight Drug Crimes

YUBA CITY, CA (MPG) - The Yuba-Sutter Narcotic and Gang Enforcement Task Force (NET-5) is comprised of specialized agents from various public safety agencies within the Yuba-Sutter area. The task force is funded collaboratively by the Yuba City Police Department, the Sutter County Sheriff's Office and the Yuba County Sheriff's Office.

In 2023, the Yuba-Sutter Narcotic and Gang Enforcement Task Force arrested a total of 145 individuals, with 75 of those being charged with drug-related offenses including charges such as possession, distribution and manufacturing of controlled substances. Through a variety of searches and pro-active contacts, the task force seized about 52,747 grams of methamphetamine, 846 pounds of marijuana, 8,818 marijuana plants, 64 grams of heroin, 394 grams of cocaine, 504 grams of fentanyl powder and 4,585 fentanyl pills.

The Yuba-Sutter Narcotic and Gang

Enforcement Task Force also focused on gang-related activities, making arrests, seizing illegal firearms and working to curtail criminal gang activities.

Throughout the past year, the task force has given presentations, training and information at various schools, citizen academies, as well as city and county departments. The Yuba-Sutter Narcotic and Gang Enforcement Task Force provides ongoing information to local community groups, parents, teachers and students about the danger of drug abuse and gang activity.

"Given the challenges law enforcement faces in dealing with narcotic-related crimes, compounded with the issues we see at our southern border, Sutter County remains committed to a collaborative approach to addressing these issues in the Yuba - Sutter area," Sheriff Brandon Barnes said.

Participating agencies remain dedicated to working collaboratively to address narcotic and gang related activities in the Yuba-Sutter area, according to the Sutter County Sheriff's Office. ★

meetings,” Boyer added. At this month’s meeting, members discussed raising awareness for the Senior Center, located at 777 Ainsley Ave. Commissioner Pam Epley said many residents are unaware of the recreation programs and services available to seniors. Some of those services include Friday Night Bingo, which recently received an upgrade.

The weekly get-together serves more than just Yuba City seniors, drawing in crowds from throughout the region.

Although the commission and the Senior Center represent the city of Yuba City, Commissioner Michael McFarlane said, “we really serve the entire region, as we are the only Senior Center currently in this region.”

Other services for residents and non-residents include keeping fit with yoga and line dancing twice a week or Tai Chi once a week. If not fitness, weekly pottery, knitting, quilting and watercolor are available weekly. The Senior Commission also provides aid with technology, offering a free Smartphone Help class.

Commissioners attempt to increase visibility and advocacy by participating in local community health fairs and volunteering at events held at the Senior Center, such as Waffle Wednesdays, according to Epley. Speaking of the mid-week feast, Commissioner Tony Kurlan touts Waffle Wednesdays as a free and open community.

“The Senior Commission, staff and volunteers prepare and serve

it on the last Wednesday of every month at the Senior Center,” Kurlan said. “The event is a great opportunity for the commission to interact directly with our senior community.”

One upcoming interaction is a spaghetti fundraiser dinner for Alzheimer’s and dementia research hosted by Prestige Senior Living and its staff from 5 to 7 p.m. May 23. Chairperson Thomas encourages everyone to support the cause and meet attending commissioners at the fundraiser dinner.

The Senior Commission meets at 9 a.m. the first Wednesday of the month at the Yuba City Senior Center. Residents of all ages are welcome to attend the meeting. For more information on the Senior Center and programs available, call 530-822-4608. ★

into water and sewer rate options and related matters.

Councilmembers agreed that setting up Food Truck Friday for the last Friday of each month, especially through August, might be a popular attraction.

“They bring people out, walking around and relaxed; it uses the old downtown area, and brings additional revenue to the city,” Ghag said.

The Archer Avenue Emergency Repair was reported essentially done.

“Most people have gone to microsystem and hardly anyone uses ditch water anymore,” Ghag said. “People just want the work done, so the pump operation is ready as a standby lift pump in case we need it.”

Lindsey Alvarez, a resident, forwarded a letter, made available to read on the City Council’s screen, containing critical comments on dogs and other animals running loose in the streets causing danger and a nuisance, as well as a need for more maintenance in the city parks to make them safe and clean for children playing.

This opened the door for discussion on Sutter Animal Control Authority (SASA).

Councilmember Bob Woten reported the city was over budget now as to animal

control, saying licensing revenue has dropped because people are only buying licenses if they are taking animals for grooming, where it is required.”

Ghag added, “Dogs don’t come out until after Animal Control is done” for the day, so they rarely catch them. He added “it’s all about money,” referring to Sutter Animal Control Authority.

Sutter Animal Control Authority is comprised of Sutter County, Yuba City and Live Oak as a Joint Powers Authority and is responsible for animal control throughout Sutter County. The agency is located at 200 Garden Highway, Yuba City. Woten reported there were two vacancies on the vet side.

Scott reported he would “explore a bit about the animal program and the financials” and will bring them up in the budget context.

In other news, Hernandez nominated Michelle Serpa to the one seat available on the Planning Commission and the nomination unanimously passed. The meeting ended by retiring to Closed Session to consider the Public Employee Appointment: City Manager, Pursuant to California Government Code Section 54957(b). ★

Yuba Water Approves \$912,000 in Grant Funding

Yuba Water Agency’s board of directors approved \$912,000 in community impact grants on May 7 to support water infrastructure improvements, water safety and continued flood risk-reduction work in South Yuba County.

Water infrastructure and water safety

Yuba Water Agency granted the Olivehurst Public Utility District \$605,000 to support a sewer consolidation project that will help protect groundwater quality in South Yuba County by converting nearly 150 homes from septic to sewer. The funding is expected to help the utility district save more than \$5 million in implementation and construction costs by combining water and sewer upgrades into a simultaneous effort rather than separate construction projects.

“It’s great to see OPUD leveraging funds from Yuba Water to improve efficiencies and help save millions down the line. That’s exactly how our grant program is designed to work,” said Gary

Bradford, Yuba Water Agency’s vice-chairman.

The board also committed \$15,000 to help open the Olivehurst Public Utility District swimming pool in Olivehurst this summer and encourage residents to swim safely in the community pool instead of the local rivers.

Flood risk reduction for areas south of the Yuba River

Two additional grants totaling \$292,000 will support continued flood risk-reduction work in Reclamation District 784, which primarily manages levees and pumps around Linda, Olivehurst and Plumas Lake. A \$150,000 grant will help the district rebuild two drainage pumps in West Linda to accommodate drainage ahead of the next rainy season. A \$142,000 grant will fund an erosion and risk analysis for a site along the south bank of the lower Yuba River near Marysville.

Agency’s dam safety engineer outlines plans to further enhance dam safety

The board also heard an update from Yuba Water Agency chief dam safety engineer Tim Truong,

who outlined several maintenance and dam-safety projects planned in the years ahead. Yuba Water Agency owns and operates New Bullards Bar, Log Cabin and Our House dams as part of the Yuba River Development Project, a multipurpose flood risk-reduction, water supply, hydroelectric power generation, fish habitat and recreation project on the Yuba River. The agency also maintains Lake Francis Dam, which used to serve Colgate Powerhouse but is now only a recreational reservoir.

In addition to weekly internal inspections, Yuba Water Agency’s dams undergo comprehensive external reviews by the Federal Energy Regulatory Commission and the Department of Water Resources’ Division of Safety of Dams. In its most recent comprehensive listing of California’s major dams, the state rated all of Yuba Water dams as “satisfactory,” which is the highest rating issued by the state.

CalAnimals and More to Host First-Ever California Adopt-A-Pet Day On June 1

SACRAMENTO REGION, CA (MPG) - The California Animal Welfare Association (CalAnimals), the San Francisco Society for the Prevention of Cruelty to Animals (SF SPCA), and the ASPCA (The American Society for the Prevention of Cruelty to Animals) recently announced the first-ever California Adopt-a-Pet Day, taking place on Saturday, June 1.

The statewide adoption day will feature more than 150 California animal welfare sites offering free adoptions to find homes for 2,024 shelter pets. The ASPCA will be providing funds to cover the cost of free adoptions at participating shelters. California animal welfare groups that would like to take part in the event have until Friday, May 10 to register online at caadoptapetday.org.

“California shelters are facing enormous pressures due to overcrowding conditions, as the number of animals entering shelters is outpacing those leaving,” said Jill Tucker, CEO of CalAnimals. “By increasing adoption demand and encouraging pet-ready families to visit their local shelter first, we can make a change. This unprecedented and collaborative statewide effort can help reduce the number of animals in our shelters while also providing loving, caring families for our most vulnerable pets. There has never been a better time or better selection of incredible animals ready for new homes, and we know the people of California will rise to this challenge.”

The large influx of animals being brought into shelters in recent years is due to a severe nationwide shortage of veterinary professionals as well as a confluence of other factors, such as inflation and pet-friendly housing restrictions. Many communities in California do not have access to affordable veterinary care,

including spay and neuter services.

“Shelters are such integral parts of our communities—we are where families find their next cat or dog or get treatment for their beloved pets—and now we are asking for the community’s help,” said Dr. Jennifer Scarlett, CEO of the SF SPCA. “By working together, we can find homes for thousands of animals throughout the state. Californians are famous for their compassion, empathy, and care. California Adopt-a-Pet Day is a perfect time to put those emotions into action.”

“Shelters in California and around the country are facing an overcrowding crisis that requires the support and collaboration of national and local organizations working together with communities to help our most vulnerable animals,” said Matt Bershadker, President & CEO, ASPCA. “The lifesaving impact of our collective efforts will be felt by the animals, the participating organizations, and communities across the state.”

California Adopt-a-Pet Day is being managed by CalAnimals, an organization that focuses on the success of California animal welfare and sheltering organizations in meeting the needs of animals and people in their communities.

The initiative is being generously supported by the SF SPCA, a nonprofit that works in San Francisco, the Central Valley, and across California to ensure that every companion animal has access to quality medical care, compassionate shelter, and a loving home, and the ASPCA, the longest-standing animal welfare organization in North America that works on the frontlines to save, transform, and protect the lives of millions of dogs, cats, equines, and farm animals in the fight against animal cruelty and homelessness.

As the first round of playoffs concluded, I couldn’t help but notice the New Orleans Pelicans will be watching the second round from home on their TVs. California is Starting to Grow Again - Is that a Good Thing?

After Jerry Brown became governor of California for the first time nearly a half-century ago, he declared that the state had entered “an era of limits.”

Citing “sluggish economic growth, increasing social instability, widespread unemployment and unprecedented environmental challenges,” Brown told state legislators in his 1976 state of the state speech, “In place of a manifest economic destiny, we face a sober reassessment of new economic realities, and we all have to get used to it.”

At the time, his rather gloomy observation seemed to be in line with current events. California had seen startling population growth and economic expansion in the decades after World War II, becoming the most populous state in 1962 during the governorship of Brown’s father, Pat Brown.

However, population growth slowed in the 1970s after the postwar baby boom had waned. By then the state’s economy was undergoing a dramatic, dislocating transformation from industrialism to post-industrial domination by trade, services and technology.

As it turned out, however, the conditions Brown cited, which he translated into fiscal austerity for state government, were merely a pause, not a permanent new reality.

California boomed in the 1980s, with Ronald Reagan’s administration pumping many billions of dollars into the state’s aerospace sector for a military buildup and a population surge driven by waves of migration, mostly from Latin America and Asia, and a new baby boom.

Between 1980 and 1990, California’s population increased by more than 6 million people to nearly 30 million. The 26% gain meant California gained a whopping seven new congressional seats after the 1990 census.

However, things began to slow down shortly thereafter. In the 1990s, the end of the Cold War with the Soviet Union manifested itself in sharp cutbacks in military spending, leading to a recession and an exodus of aerospace workers and their families.

Population grew slowly over the next two decades and declined during the COVID-19 pandemic as stay-at-home workers fled to states with less expensive housing, foreign immigration slowed, the death rate rose and the birth rate declined.

However, a new report from the state Department of Finance’s demographics unit says that after four years of population loss, California gained a tiny bit in 2023, “driven by decreased mortality and a rebound in legal foreign immigration.”

The gain was 67,000 residents, bringing California’s population to 39,128,162, the department’s demographers found as they calculated the various factors that influence population changes. What they call “natural growth” – births minus deaths – increased from 106,700 in 2022 to 118,400 in 2023,

largely because the death rate dropped after spiking upward during the pandemic.

California’s 1980s baby boom is just a faint memory, however. At one point Californians were producing more than 600,000 babies each year, the equivalent of more than one birth every minute, but the state’s birth-rate has dropped to a record low and it now has one of the nation’s lowest fertility rates, according to a new study released this week.

The Birth Industry Lawyers Group, which specializes in maternity legal issues, used federal data to report that California’s fertility rate over the past several years, 55 per 1,000 women, is below the national rate of 58.8 and ninth lowest among the states. South Dakota is the most fecund state with a 71.2 fertility rate, followed closely by North Dakota.

The new Department of Finance report projects that with the effects of pandemic worn off, California’s population will continue to grow, albeit slowly.

The new data raise an old question: Is California better off with an increasing population or do the demands of more people just make things more complicated by increasing competition for jobs, housing and other necessities of life?



Shipwrecks and Bridge Decks

A few weeks ago in the state of Maryland, a huge cargo ship lost power and plowed into a key connecting bridge which subsequently collapsed and blocked the port of Baltimore and killing at least half a dozen people.

Reminding readers of last week's article discussing how the lack of attentiveness continually costs us both money, time and, unfortunately at times, precious lives, the tragic accident of a ship containing 4700 cargo containers is a stark example of a costly mistake.

Considering the ship was capable of carrying 10,000 containers, I suppose we are fortunate it was not filled to capacity.

It didn't matter. This mid-sized sea monster, and yes there are larger ships, lost complete power and hit one of the bridges support structures and the entire bridge collapsed in a heap of twisted metal. A source of mine said the cause was bad fuel taken on overseas which had killed the engine multiple times in port but this is unsubstantiated at this point in time.

This is yet another example of how somebody, or many somebodies, failed to do something the way it was supposed to be done and now we have a big mess to clean up, a host of heart broken families and likely another reason to believe inflation may get a big boost as a result.

And yes, although most of the cargo should be able to be salvaged, the delay to shipping by the blockage of this major east coast port will no doubt add to the cost of something to somebody.

Onboard was 41,000 tons of fertilizer bound for other ports of call, and being spring, it couldn't have come at a worse time. Some of the fertilizer made it into the waterways of the Patapsco River where the accident occurred and an ecological disaster may be in the making

If you view photos of the aftermath, it's obvious it will be weeks before the ship is offloaded and cleared from the scene. The Port of Baltimore is no small potatoes when it comes to ports. It ranks among the top 20 U.S. ports in terms of tonnage and container handling, is the 10th largest for dry bulk, and is a major hub for the import and export of motorized vehicles. The accident blocked all of its ports except one.

Washington has released 60 million in funds to help with the recovery

and cleanup efforts with likely more to follow. Gigantic cranes, able to lift hundreds of tons at a clip, are hurriedly moving into the area.

The disassembly of both the ship and the wreck is a slow, tedious and dangerous process. The bridge is in pieces, twisted metal everywhere, and workers have to be extra careful, both for their own safety and the safety of the waters of the Patapsco.

Much like a Jenga set, any wrong move could cause more pieces to plunge uncontrollably into the turbulent waters, causing even more damage, making the cleanup even harder.

Although there are ships that were waiting to get into the Port of Baltimore and now have to be rerouted, more ships are trapped up river and now can't get out until the waterway is cleared. According to the Department of Transportation, there are 3 bulk carriers, 2 general cargo ships, 1 vehicle carrier, 1 tanker, 4 Ready Reserve Force vessels, and the offending cargo ship, the Dali, now trapped behind the fallen bridge

No doubt product, whatever it is all those ships are carrying, or were going to carry, will be delayed, and some product may spoil depending on what is where.

The rerouting of incoming ships will also be costly and time consuming, and expected to last for literally months. Rebuilding of the bridge so cars may once again cross will likely be a very long time from now, adding even more costs as a result of the wreck.

It's difficult to ascertain just exactly what the costs will be to us living here on the West Coast, or indeed, to all Americans when all is said and done.

One thing is clear, it certainly won't help prices to come down any.

Testing Mandate for Dairy Cows Aims to Curtail Bird Flu Spread

To limit the spread of highly pathogenic H5N1 avian influenza in livestock, all lactating dairy cows must test negative for the virus before they can cross state lines under new requirements by the U.S. Department of Agriculture. The federal order, which took effect Monday, excludes heifers, dry cows and bull calves. Culled cows going to slaughter that do not show signs of illness also are not required to be tested. But they will still need a certificate of veterinary inspection or approval by animal health officials from the state sending the cattle and the state receiving them.

Local Agencies Race to Fix Groundwater Sustainability Plans

Seeking to prevent the California State Water Resources Control Board from stepping in to regulate groundwater in critically overdrafted subbasins, local agencies are working to correct deficiencies in their plans to protect groundwater. Last month, the Tulare Lake Subbasin became the first subbasin in the state to be placed under probation. Other critically overdrafted subbasins with inadequate plans include the Tule, Kaweah, Kern County, Delta-Mendota and Chowchilla subbasins. The state water board is set to consider probation for the Tule Subbasin on Sept. 17.

Federal, State Agencies Pledge a Modest Increase in Water Deliveries

State and federal water agencies last week announced additional allocations for farmers and other users, citing improving reservoir levels amid spring snowmelt. The U.S. Bureau of Reclamation said it is increasing promised water deliveries from the Central Valley Project for agricultural contractors south of the Sacramento-San Joaquin River Delta to 40% of requested supplies, up from 35% pledged last month. The California Department of Water Resources said it will increase water deliveries to 40% of requested supplies from the State Water Project, up from a pledge of 30%.

Seed Companies Report Steady Demand after Pandemic Boom in Home Gardening

With plant nurseries germinating seeds for springtime garden transplants, producers and seed companies report steady supply and demand after recovering from a pandemic-time gardening boom that depleted seed inventory for some varieties. Steve Wiley, general manager and chief operating officer at American Takii seed company in Monterey County, said the popularity of gardening during the pandemic helped the company compensate for a dip in sales to commercial growers. As commercial business returns, he said, "the home garden market does remain quite strong." ★

Proactive Patrol Efforts Lead to Double Arrest in Wire Thefts

Hernandez and Martinez were booked into the Yuba County Jail for several charges, including grand theft of copper materials, vandalism, conspiracy and possession of burglary tools. A search warrant was executed at the campsite where the two were living and additional evidence pertaining to the thefts was located, according to law enforcement.

Homicide Suspect in Custody Less Than an Hour After Deadly Shooting

MARYSVILLE, CA (MPG) - At approximately 3:15 p.m. on May 2, the Yuba County Sheriff's Dispatch Center received a "shots fired" call near the area of Remington Way and Silvergate Court in Marysville.

The reporting party reported a loud bang and a neighbor's voice yelling for help. Deputies arrived on scene and located a victim with injuries from a gunshot wound. The victim was transported to Rideout Hospital in Marysville, where he later succumbed to his injuries.

Witnesses provided a description of the

alleged suspect and his vehicle, which was quickly located by deputies searching the area. A pursuit ensued for approximately 10 minutes with speeds up to 95 miles per hour. The suspect then crashed the vehicle and attempted to run away but was taken into custody by law enforcement.

The suspect, 45-year-old Sunny Bavra, was booked at the Yuba County Jail for homicide, felony evading and a number of weapon offenses. It is unknown whether the suspect knew the victim prior to this incident.

New Emerald Cove Marina Gate 10 Feet Wider

MARYSVILLE, CA (MPG) - New Bullards Bar Reservoir recreators will enjoy easier access in and out of Emerald Cove Marina, thanks to a new gate placed by Yuba Water Agency on April 30 that is 10 feet wider than the previous gate. The upgrade will also secure the floating barrier that runs across the water to keep recreators at a safe distance from the dam.

New Bullards Bar Reservoir is on the North Yuba River at 12571 Marysville Road, Dobbins. It is located about 45 minutes from the Marysville on Marysville Road, has 55 miles of shoreline with more than 20 miles of trails, most of which are located in the Plumas and Tahoe national forests. A rather shallow lake, New Bullards Bar is known for warmer water and for its great fishing. The gate was designed by a former

mechanical intern who was supervised by Yuba Water Senior Hydro Engineer Aaron Esselman. One of the design challenges was ensuring the 7,000-pound gate would float at just the right elevation.

"This project really underscores the valuable, hands-on experience that interns can expect when coming to work for Yuba Water," Esselman said. "It's awesome seeing their work move from paper to design and now, out there in the world improving the recreation experience at Bullards."

Yuba Water Agency placed the new gate via helicopter with the help of Siller Brothers and plans to swap out the old gate during the upcoming recreation season once it's outfitted with safety lights and signage. The total cost of the recreation upgrade is approximately \$40,000.

SUTTER, CA (MPG) - The Sutter Huskies were named the No. 3 seed in the CIF Sac-Joaquin Section Division V baseball bracket.

Sutter, who won the Pioneer Valley League and is the defending SJS D-V champion, were scheduled to host Bret Harte (Angels Camp) this past Wednesday, May 8.

If the Huskies were successful in getting the win, they would have moved onto the second round of the Division V playoffs where they would play the winner of

Hughson/Ben Holt College Prep Academy in a best-of-three series that would begin on Monday, May 13 with the higher seed hosting first.

Six of the eight teams in the Division V Bracket (Sutter, Bradshaw Christian, Hughson, BHCPA, Escalon and West Campus) competed in the Division V bracket last season as Summerville and Bret Harte are the newcomers.

The Huskies defeated Hughson in the D-V semifinals last year before they won the section title in a 13-inning thriller against Bradshaw Christian at Sacramento City College in Sacramento. ★



SUTTER, CA (MPG) - The Sutter Union girls' softball team won their 23rd consecutive game to open the season as they beat the Ponderosa Bruins in a 7-0 shutout on Friday, May 3.

Sutter Head Coach Stefanie Danna expressed to the Dispatch the game was also an awareness game for epilepsy.

Danna told the Dispatch that Sutter 2022 alumna Kaylee Duncan, who now plays for Northwest Nazarene University, had a teammate that was diagnosed this season with epilepsy and asked Danna if she and the softball program would be able to help spread the awareness.

"When a softball player calls, you answer and help them anyway you can," Danna said.

The Huskies' supported by donning purple ribbon in their hair accents and purple-eye-black.

Sutter got on the scoreboard in the first inning when senior third baseman/Sacramento State signee Alexa Carino hit a runs-batted-in (RBI) single for an early 1-0 lead.

Carino had two hits in the game and added another RBI single in the fourth inning.

Huskies senior pitcher/Boise State signee Olivia Bauer picked up her 10th shutout from the circle this season and 49th career win. Bauer struck out six hitters and gave up six hits.

Ponderosa had their best chance at scoring in the first two innings as they had runners on second and third, but the Sutter defense and Bauer consistently pounding the strike zone kept the Bruins scoreless.

Sutter was able to stretch their lead in the third and fourth innings as the Huskies' hitting attack reached double-digits (14) for the 20th time of the season and added five runs in the two frames with eight hits.

Sutter senior shortstop Grace Diaz led the way with four hits on the day and was one of four hitters that had a multi-hit game.

Carino and Diaz told the Dispatch that they have continuously worked on situational hitting through the season. In previous conversations with the Dispatch, Sutter players have expressed certain goals they want to accomplish this season, and

the first goal was winning the Pioneer Valley League title

The Huskies' victory over Ponderosa had a playoff feel as the Bruins are the defending CIF Sac-Joaquin Section Division III champions and finished last season as the runner-up in the Division III NorCal finals.

Danna told the Dispatch that she was impressed with the energy in the dugout and the way Sutter was able to turn the page in the first couple innings as Ponderosa challenged with base runners.

"Instead of letting that consume them and take over, they shook it off and focused on the next pitch, next at-bat," Danna said.

She added that things are not always going to be perfect and go the way they want it to in playoffs, but the teams that are successful in the playoffs are able to bounce back quickly.

Sutter completed the regular season on Monday, May 6, as they hosted River Valley and celebrated their nine seniors on the roster.

The CIF SJS softball playoffs begin next week, and the brackets were scheduled to be released on MaxPreps today, Friday, May 10, after 2 p.m. ★

YUBA CITY, CA (MPG) - The Yuba City Honkers baseball team swept the River Valley Falcons in the final three-game series of the season from Tuesday, April 30, through Friday, May 3.

Yuba City needed to sweep River Valley if it wanted any chance at potentially getting into the CIF Sac-Joaquin Section playoffs. The Capital Valley Conference was allotted three teams from the league to be available for the postseason.

The Honkers' came into the week needing help from Antelope and Woodcreek to beat Inderkum and Roseville a couple of times to give Yuba City a glimpse of hope, but Inderkum and Roseville both finished a game ahead of the Honkers at the conclusion of games on May 3.

Inderkum ultimately got the third and final playoff spot from the CVC as they won the season series against Roseville. This was the last time the

Honkers and Falcons would compete in the CVC as they both move onto the Foothill Valley League in the fall 2024 sports season due to realignment.

Yuba City Head Coach Maury Castaneda told the Dispatch about a discussion he had postgame with his team during the April 16 loss versus Bella Vista.

"I told them it was them who controlled our destiny and they rose to the occasion, and I couldn't be more proud of them," Castaneda said. Following that post-game chat, the Honkers won their final six games of the season.

Castaneda added that the class of 2024 high school graduates for all schools are a special class as they began their high school experience with online learning and being able to finish their senior season on the ball field together is a special moment.

Yuba City senior outfielder Kaedin Bullock told the Dispatch that the relationships and brotherhood was one of the biggest takeaways from

being a part of the Honkers' baseball program.

Yuba City senior infielder Carson Geweke said the Honker program was a way of life that taught multiple life lessons like working hard and persevering through adversity.

For River Valley, the program grew a lot as they added seven more wins this season than they did last year. Falcons Head Coach Rob McMains told the Dispatch that he is proud of his seniors and the way they showed their dedication throughout the program.

McMains also has had the pleasure of coaching his son, senior utility Maddox, who has grown up and been involved with the program for a lot of years as Rob has coached.

Maddox told the Dispatch postgame on May 3 that he wouldn't trade his experience through the program for anything.

Maddox added that the improvement of adding wins throughout the year made it fun, and special memories were made with one another. ★
