Dogs Take the Lead and Support SPCA

SACRAMENTO, CA (MPG) -On April 20, Sacramento let the dogs out to participate in the 31st Annual SPCA Doggy Dash. Over 2,000 people and their canine companions went to William Land Park to enjoy the sunny Saturday. Dogs and their people registered for either a 5k or 2k run in the tree-filled park. Some pooches ran alongside their owners, while less athletic and senior dogs enjoyed the view from a wagon or stroller.

The pet festival was vibrant hub of activity, with over 100 vendors offering a diverse range of services. From pet daycare

and veterinary care to dog training, there was something for every pet owner. Posh services included pup boutiques, "barkcuterie boards" and pet portraits.

Professionals of the four-legged variety were also represented. Officers from Sacramento's Police Canine Association brought their working dogs for photos, and provided information about the program. Several rescue organizations were also present, advocating for specific breeds such as corgis, basset hounds, German Shepards, malemutes and golden retrievers. Mixed breed rescues like Resilient Dog Rescue brought in adoptable dogs, adding an opportunity to find a

Neighbors Sow Native Plant Garden

SACRAMENTO, CA (MPG) - In early 2023, as Jane Kiser walked by Plaza Cervantes Park at Freeport and 11th Avenue, she became annoyed with the dead garden and overgrown weeds. The area looked more like an empty lot than a welcoming neighborhood spot to enjoy on a beautiful day.

"I hadn't been much of an advocate up to that point," Kiser said, but she was frustrated with the blighted space. She contacted Joe Flores, the Parks commissioner, and last July neighbors came and ripped out weeds, black sheeting, dead bushes, and trash. After it was cleaned, the next step was to plant something, but what?

"I decided to post on Facebook in the College Plaza Neighbors Group for ideas," Kiser said. "It didn't



off. Humans had a chance to grab lunch at a food truck and enjoy some downtime at The Watering Bowl, a VIP beer, wine, and cocktail garden.

Dawn Foster, SPCA director for marketing and communications, expressed the significance of the Doggy Dash event, stating, "This is not just a fun event, it's a community effort. All the money raised today stays right here in the Sacramento community, directly benefiting over 40,000 animals every year."

The funds raised help to offset costs for spay/neuter, vaccines, surrender intake and adoptions. There are also educational programs and affordable options for senior pet owners and low-income families. This includes a pet food pantry, a lifeline for owners and their pets during difficult financial times.


While the event was focused on dogs, the organization also offers services for cats, such as funding a feral/community cat program that helps to maintain healthy feline colonies in specific areas.

Neighbors Meet Challenges for New Native Plant Garden

Continued from Page 1 take long for the gardening enthusiasts to respond. They suggest a native plant

garden.'

Someone connected Kiser to the Sacramento Valley Chapter for California Native Plants.

Along the way, Dave Roberts joined in. Roberts used his landscaping and plant expertise to design the space. He created a list of 28 California native plants with names like Summer Snow, Calistoga, Pink Island Foam, Valley Violet, Blond Ambition, and Bee's Bliss.

and Bee's Bliss.

The project was taking shape, and volunteers were ready to help. The next hurdle was how to secure funds for the plants and supplies.

Kiser explained, "City Parks could help but didn't have the money for this project. Then, a neighbor suggested we apply for a Sacramento Perennial Plant Club grant." The timing was perfect, as grant applications were being accepted.

Then, another tiny snag: Kiser needed a 501(c)(3) organization to help apply for the grant with her. She contacted the Land Park Community Association, which responded swiftly, eager to join the effort.

The application went through, and the LPCA distributed the funds for the supplies.

Things were moving along again until another roadblock appeared: heavy

rain was expected on the scheduled planting date. Kiser and Roberts scrambled to change plans.

Volunteers hustled and worked from 8 a.m. to 5 p.m., two days before the storm arrived. Commissioner Flores and City Parks staff brought the mulch and spread it throughout the space.

Now, it's Mother Nature's turn to do her part. Roberts said, "We expect the yarrows and grasses to come up first; flowers take a bit longer."

He noted, "Grasses are considered 'pioneer plants' that build a soil web for plants to flourish. By spring, we should see some color. Normally, a native landscape takes around five years to mature."

He also shared how the soil food web is critical to building a healthy natural environment for plants and animals. It helps protect against pests, diseases and weed growth. It can also reduce the need for using pesticides.

Finally, regenerating soil to a healthy, natural state can support climate change efforts by creating a carbon-reducing environment. Roberts recommends visiting the website www. soilfoodweb.com to learn more about the soil food

Kiser and Roberts are not finished yet; they also plan to install an 18-by-24-inch plaque. It will describe the plants and the benefits of native foliage.

For instance, native plants are drought-tolerant, but once folks are trained to care for them, they're easy to maintain and cost-effective.

And Roberts noted,

"They create an environment where good bugs thrive," meaning pollinators like bees, butterflies and ladybugs. Birds and lizards will enjoy the garden, too.


Funds are being secured for the plaque. When it's ready, a community event will celebrate the installation.

Kiser has been bitten by the "advocate bug" and continues to support native plant gardening. She's in the early stages of contacting neighborhood schools to get youth more involved. She has spoken to Sacramento City College and is also interested in connecting to McClatchy High School (Principal Egan: Is there a native plant club there?).

Roberts explained, "You always want your garden to be a catalyst for other projects." And possible projects could involve our city, too. For instance, the Old City Cemetery on Broadway and Riverside Boulevard could be an excellent opportunity to create a robust native plant garden. Plus, other neighborhood spots around Sacramento should be considered.

More trees will be added to Plaza Cervantes Park as well. Joe Flores plans to

schedule a time to plant around nine trees in the small park later this year.

Roberts said he is pleased that the Parks Department has been more engaged and hopes to work with them on future projects. These climate-friendly efforts help meet Sacramento City's goals to improve climate change for all

May is Mental Health **Awareness Month**

Since 1949, Mental Health America and its affiliates across the country have led the observance of May as Mental Health Awareness Month by reaching millions through the media, local events and screenings. It raises awareness of trauma and the impact it can have on the physical, emotional, and mental well-being of children, families, and communities. Cities and businesses across the country hold events to support mental health and open the lines of communication. Many websites provide ideas for businesses to support employees during May and beyond.

According to the Centers for Disease Control and Prevention (CDC), suicide rates in our country increased by 36% between 2000 and 2021. Suicide was responsible for 48,183 deaths in 2021 alone, which is about one death every 11 minutes. We know that many mental health disorders, including depression, bipolar disorder, borderline personality disorder and PTSD, come with heightened risk of suicidal thoughts or attempts. While seeking help for suicidal thoughts or behaviors is critical regardless of the cause, securing a specific diagnosis might help the individual receive treatment, especially ongoing treatment, that is best suited to their mental health needs.

Mental Health America says that up to 60% of people who die by suicide have major depression and research suggests that the majority of suicides are related to a psychiatric condition. If you or someone you know is depressed, there are effective treatments available. Talking to your doctor is a fantastic first step and you can visit the National Alliance on Mental Health Illness to learn about support groups that you might find helpful.

The Jason Foundation is another valuable resource. JFI is dedicated to the prevention of the "Silent Epidemic" of suicide through educational and awareness programs. On its website, you will learn about warning signs and risk factors associated with people who may be struggling with mental health issues and suicidal ideation. JFI's website also has more information about finding a Jason Foundation location near

We know that four out of five individuals considering suicide give some sign of their intentions, either verbally or behaviorally. In 80% of those considering suicide, we have an opportunity to recognize the warning signs and intervene. Take the time to educate yourselves on the warning signs and risk factors associated with suicide.

This knowledge might help you save the life of a friend or loved one.

Salmon Poisoning Disease Warning Given to Dog Owners

Salmon Poisoning Disease is a potentially fatal condition seen only in dogs after they eat certain types of raw or cold smoked fish such as trout and salmon that are infected with a bacteria-like organism, Neorickettsia helminthoeca, which is transmitted by the parasitic flatworm (or "fluke") Nanophyetes salmincola.

Nanophyetes salmincola occurs naturally in waters of Northern California and most of the north state can be considered the fluke's native range. But dogs throughout the state are susceptible. Dog owners are advised to be cautious and to keep their dogs away from salmon, steelhead, trout and other freshwater fish carcasses. The parasite cannot survive in cooked fish, is not harmful to humans and does not affect pets other

than dogs.

If your dog has eaten or is suspected of eating raw fish, watch for signs of the disease. Symptoms are similar to distemper and might include some or all of the following: a rise in body temperature, loss of appetite, vomiting, diarrhea, listlessness and/or rapid weight loss. If signs of the disease appear, promptly take your dog to a veterinarian. Salmon Poisoning Disease is treatable if caught in time. If untreated, death usually occurs within two weeks of eating the infected fish. Without treatment, 90 percent of dogs showing symptoms die.

While all fish caught or originating from California streams could potentially be infected, the California Department of Fish and Wildlife cautions that trout stocked in some waters in the department's North Central Region are more likely to be infected with the flukes that cause Salmon Poisoning Disease.





I saw a young man with trousers riding low enough to qualify him for entrance into the Plumbers Union. I saw old men wearing pants high enough to double as a face mask. And of course, more than enough middle-aged men wearing sweatpants to accommodate their growing bellies.

The fashion didn't improve much on the plane, where I sat across from a girl with fingernails painted traffic-cone orange. She was prewired to her phone and didn't notice me.

With

fashion-challenged children of God, airport crowds do make a good segue. Cue Bible study.

That's because the airport crowd reminded me of the one Jesus likely encountered as he walked into a city looking to recruit a Band of Brothers who would change the world.

Like me, he was a people-watcher, just not as smug as me. Go figure.

Baa-aad News for Fire Fuels

SACRAMENTO COUNTY, CA (MPG) - We've goat some exciting news for ewe (ok, no more puns)!

The Sacramento County Department of Regional Parks is gearing up for its multi-pronged efforts to reduce fire risk, defend wildlife habitats and protect our natural resources and the neighborhoods adjacent to the parks.

For its 2024 Fire Fuel Reduction Action Plan, the Department of Regional Parks has lined up sheep and goat grazing contracts, is utilizing park maintenance crews (and other manned crews through contracts with the California Conservation Corps and Sacramento Regional Conservation Corps) to maintain fire breaks, and is issuing fuel break maintenance permits to properties bordering Regional Park properties.

"We had another wet winter and a surprisingly wet spring, so we anticipate a similar vegetation situation that we found ourselves with last year," said Liz Bellas, director of Regional Parks. "As all this vegetation dries out, the fire risk increases, so the work we are doing, and the work our contractors are doing is going to be critical this year."

To decrease the number and size potential of wildfires in our parks system, the techniques used will be applicable for each area and will include:

Firebreaks - A combination of mowing, soil discing and targeted herbicides will be used where appropriate to create perimeters around open fields, along fence lines and behind neighborhoods. This work is scheduled to be completed by the end of

Ladder Fuel Hand-Crews

- In limited, hard-to-reach areas, hand-crews will remove vegetation that allows the potential for a fire to climb up or move into urban areas.

Grazing - There are hundreds of acres of undeveloped or protected land in our Regional Parks. Goats and sheep are ideal for vegetation management and are great at eating down weeds, bushes and grass that manned crews cannot get to. Grazing is expected to occur through the end of June.

Annual Encroachment Permits - Residents who live adjacent to Regional Parks' properties are able


to apply for free annual encroachment permits to maintain a fire break behind their property line. These allow residents to string-trim grass and weeds for up to 50 feet beyond their private property line. To request a permit, provide your name, address and contact information to Regional Parks at parksinfo@SacCounty.gov.

Additionally, the Ranger Division will continue its increased education and enforcement efforts related to illegal fires and cooking along the parkway in an effort to reduce the number of new fire outbreaks.

"These efforts have been paying dividends over the last two years," said Leonard Orman, chief ranger. "In 2023, there were a total of 65 fires in our parks, down from 85 in 2022, and 170 in 2021."

Visitors to Sacramento County Regional Parks should be aware of the following regulations: Open flame fires are NOT allowed, and barbecuing is only permitted in designated picnic areas. Smoking is only allowed in developed picnic areas, asphalt surfaces, golf courses and levee tops along the American River Parkway.

WASHINGTON, D.C. (MPG) - On April 8, Congresswoman Doris Matsui (D-CA), co-author of the Creating Helpful Incentives for the Production of Semiconductors (CHIPS) for America Act, issued the following statement after the Department of Commerce announced a preliminary memorandum of terms to provide up to \$6.6 billion in direct funding for Taiwan Semiconductor Manufacturing Company (TSMC) under the CHIPS and Science Act. This proposed funding would support TSMC's investment of more than \$65 billion to construct three leading-edge fabs in Arizona. These fabs will produce some of the world's most advanced semiconductors critical to national security and consumer products like smartphones, AI datacenter servers, and more.

"Today's announcement is another milestone on our road to reassert America's global innovation leadership," Matsui

"These investments will ensure a secure pipeline of some of the most advanced semiconductors in the world - mission critical components our national security

apparatus needs to succeed. As co-author of the original CHIPS Act, I am pleased to see this legislation working as intended - bringing innovative economic anchors to communities across the country, protecting our national secu-

rity, and creating good-paying jobs for American workers. I will continue to work hard to ensure we maximize these investments moving forward."

Congresswoman Matsui introduced the original CHIPS Act in June 2020 alongside Congressman Michael McCaul (R-TX) and Senators John Cornyn (R-TX) and Mark Warner (D-VA).

She successfully included an amendment based on the CHIPS Act as part of the FY21 National Defense Authorization Act (NDAA) to enable the building and modernization of semiconductor manufacturing facilities in America. She also led efforts to secure this funding through the CHIPS and Science Act.
