Memorial Day Observance is for Everyone

CITRUS HEIGHTS, CA (MPG) - The annual Memorial Day observance, presented by the American Legion District 6 in conjunction with and at Sylvan Cemetery in Citrus Heights from 11 a.m. to noon May 27, is open to the public.

American Legion Post 637 Commander Paul Reyes invites residents of all ages to attend the one-hour observance that includes speakers, patriotic songs by the Harmony Express, Presentation of Colors by the Citrus Heights Police Department and taps by the Citrus Heights Marching Band.

The Memorial Day federal holiday is observed on the last Monday in May and honors the men and women who sacrificed their lives while serving in the U.S. military.

Reyes hopes that parents bring their children to the Memorial Day observance so the youth "can understand what sacrifices were made by military personnel so they could be safe at home."

"Memorial Day is a time to honor all those who have paid the ultimate sacrifice in defense of our country," Reyes said.

The American Legion commander suggests arriving early May 27 to get a good parking spot. Sylvan Cemetery is at 7401 Auburn Blvd. in Citrus Heights.

American Legion meetings are held from 6:30 to 8 p.m. the third Tuesday of every month at the Citrus Heights City Hall at 6360 Fountain Square Drive. The veterans' organization currently has 184 members, who served in Korea, the Gulf War, Vietnam, Afghanistan and the Middle East. New members are always welcome.

2024 DAR **Community Service Awards Honors Three**

- Three community leaders were honored for their community service by members of the Daughters of the American Revolution (DAR) General John A. Sutter Citrus Heights Chapter on May 11 for their many volunteer contributions to the local community.

Lorie Rheams, a resident of Orangevale and an active member of the Orangevale Rotary Club with her husband, Russ, were recognized for two volunteer activities in which they both made a difference in their community.

For the past 17 years, the Rheams have volunteered to distribute Christmas baskets to local families in need at Divine Savior Catholic Church in Orangevale. Some 43 such baskets were distributed at Divine Savior in December 2023.

"There's such an incredible need and so many ways in which all of us can help our community," she said modestly. Rheams acknowledged the support of her husband who is "always by my side," fellow church members at Divine Savior and her fellow Orangevale Rotarians in being able to "model and live a full life of service to others."

Rheams was also cited for leading a clothing collection program for the nonprofit Underground Clothing Connection store in the Citrus Heights Sunrise Mall for young adults and children in need.

"What the Underground needs now, besides clothing donations, is consistent volunteer support hours helping out in the store to better help it thrive," she said. "It's an important resource for so many people it serves," she said.

The free clothing store, exclusively for students and their families of San Juan Unified School District, by school referral only, is the product of a community partnership between the Citrus Heights Homeless Assistance Resource Team (HART), Sunrise Mall, San Juan Unified School District (SJUSD) and Sunrise MarketPlace (SMP).

Honoring the Sacrifices of Fallen Heroes

SACRAMENTO, CA (MPG) - As Memorial Day draws near, communities prepare to honor and commemorate the sacrifices of fallen heroes. Several events will be held throughout the Sacramento area, providing community members with ample opportunities to participate in the celebrations.

Memorial Day, observed on the last Monday in May, honors service members who have died in military service to the nation, according to the Department of Defense. The holiday has roots dating back to the post-Civil War era, when citizens would informally place spring flower memorials on the graves of fallen soldiers.

All Sacramento-area residents are invited to join in the upcoming observances at any of the following locations.

The Cordova Community Council proudly presents its Memorial Day event at the Cordova High School Performing Arts Center, 2239 Chase Drive, Rancho Cordova at 10 a.m. May 27.

The theme of this year's event is "Their Sacrifice, Our Gratitude," encapsulating the essence of remembrance and appreciation for those who have given their lives in service to their country. At the heart of the ceremony lies a musical tribute, featuring patriotic music performed by the Rancho Cordova River City Concert Band.

This year holds a special significance as community members together honor the 21st-century heroes who witnessed the tragic events of 9/11 and selflessly rushed to aid those in need, many of whom did not

"Missing Man Table." This symbolic gesture, led by retired Air Force veteran Jim Sullivan, features a dinner table set with an empty chair, representing those who are missing or fallen.

"This is a dignified and beautiful service," said Cordova Community Council executive director Shelly Blanchard. "All gave some and some gave all, and we are honoring that here in Rancho Cordova."

On that same date, May 27, community members will also gather at the East Lawn ceremony at 10 a.m., where attendees can gather to honor the fallen heroes of the Unites States Armed Forces. The event is being hosted at

multiple locations including East Lawn Sierra Hills at 5757 Greenback Lane, Sacramento; 4300 Folsom Blvd., East Sacramento; and 9189 East Stockton Blvd., Elk Grove.

The Memorial Day ceremony promises to be a moving trib-

speakers such as Bob Hilton and Gilbert Morales will take the stage, along with musician and bagpiper Liz Tubbs. Part of the program will also include the Armed Forces Medley and the POW/MIA (Prisoner of War/ Missing in Action) ceremony. Complimentary refreshments will be provided.

Other events include the Memorial Day tribute at Mount Vernon Memorial Park at 11 a.m. May 27 at 8201 Greenback Lane.

Starting at 5:30 a.m. May 27, Boy and Girl Scout troops will raise donated American flags around the park, followed by the fire department hoisting a 50-foot flag at the entrance at 10 a.m.

"On Memorial Day, it is important to stop and reflect on the American patriots who have paid the ultimate sacrifice to keep us free," said Mount Vernon Memorial Park's general manager Carol Rybolt. "I am grateful for the brave men and women who serve in the military, standing guard to protect our country and our rights. Let us honor and remember them on this Memorial Day and every day."

The event will feature a military band, a keynote speech by a Colonel from the California National Guard, and a Color Guard from the UC Davis ROTC program. A possible flyover, a popular attraction in previous years, is pending confirmation, adding to the day's magic.

The tribute concludes at noon. with the symbolic raising of the American Flag honoring the sacrifices and expressing gratitude to those who have given their lives.

The 25th annual Memorial Day Ceremony at the Fair Oaks Cemetery District will take place from 10 a.m. to noon on May 25 giving special recognition to the women in time of war between the American Revolutionary War and World War II. The cemetery is at 7780 Olive St., Fair Oaks.

The couple also own and operate Orangevale Copy Center at 9267 Greenback Lane, Suite C5, Orangevale since February 1990.

Kaye Lynn and David Peterson of Sacramento were recognized for volunteering their time leading a non-partisan U.S. Constitution Discussion Group (CDG), which meets at Epic Bible College at 4330 Auburn Boulevard in Sacramento. Both received an award for their outstanding service to the community.

The couple lead a free eight-week course on the U.S. Constitution through Aug. 29 from 6 to 8 p.m. hosted at Epic Bible College with discussion topics including state sovereignty, nullification and taxation, unconstitutional powers, the Electoral College, and the Fourth Amendment to the Constitution prohibiting unreasonable search and seizures.

"We the people, no longer understand our relationship to, and our responsibilities under the Constitution," Kaye Lynn Peterson told the Daughters of the American Revolution members. "Our purpose is to help adults review, re-learn and discuss what a Constitutional Republic is, and review the documents left to us by the Founding Fathers of our nation."

The Sacramento U.S. Constitution Discussion Group, running for the past three years, is conducted in a seminar-style presentation, with instruction followed by open discussion and questions. Kaye Lynn is the moderator and searches for material to cover, while David runs the video equipment used to present audio-visual materials.

The couple said a "thorough understanding and refresh of the rights and responsibilities of citizenship under the U.S. Constitution are an important part of an active civics education."

The public is also invited to bring a dish to share and attend a Memorial Day patriotic potluck from 6 to 8 p.m. May 30 hosted by the group on the main floor at Epic Bible College, 4330 Auburn Blvd.

The General John A. Sutter Chapter, National Society Daughters of the American Revolution (NSDAR or DAR), a nonprofit, non-political organization, meets at the Sylvan Community Center, 7521 Community Drive in Citrus Heights.

Women who are 18 years of age and older and descended from a parent who aided in achieving American independence between April 19, 1775, and Nov. 26, 1783, can apply for Daughters of the American Revolution membership. ★

Carmichael Kiwanis raised \$12,500. Its bottom line also benefited from a \$500 booster prize for most donations between 5 and 6 a.m. A random prize from Big Day of Giving organizers brought in another \$100.

"I'm always impressed by the generosity of our club members and our community," said Kiwanian Mike Koerner. "We're all about helping kids. These donations go a long way toward that aim."

Carmichael Parks Foundation gained almost \$20,000 to boost park beautification and youth programs. This total includes gifts from the Borman family, community benefactor Susan Marszal and former Supervisor Susan Peters.

Current Supervisor Rich Desmond included the Parks Foundation among 24 Big Day of Giving donations. His choices included Carmichael Kiwanis, Sacramento Fine Arts Center, Fair Oaks Rotary, Carmichael HART and the San Juan Education Foundation. "I dedicate District 3 discretionary funds, as well as my personal funds," he said. "I chose organizations that help our most vulnerable residents, care for animals, promote arts and culture, and generally improve quality of life."

Boosted by Desmond's donation and a further \$20,000 in gifts, Sacramento Fine Arts Center exceeded Big Day of Giving hopes.

"These donations are vital to keeping the center and our programs going," said Sacramento Fine Arts Center executive Angelia Gordon. "We're grateful

for so much generosity."

Nature protecters opened wallets wide across the region. Placer Land Trust's appeal yielded nearly \$194,000. The American River Conservancy was enriched by more than \$34,000. The American River Parkway Foundation and Save the American River Association gained \$21,048 and \$18,395 respectively. Soil Born Farms, a Rancho Cordova enterprise that promotes sustainable food production, harvested almost \$21,000.

May 7 also restocked food closets. Donors fed Sacramento Food Bank and Family Services more than \$255,000; Sacramento Loaves and Fishes more than \$165,000; Yolo Food Bank almost \$146,000. Locally, Fair Oaks/Orangevale Food Bank gained more than \$33,000. Carmichael's Homeless Assistance Resources Team was boosted by almost \$5,000.

Top regional beneficiaries included Sacramento Philharmonic and Opera with more than \$327,000 to sing about. The Salvation Army drummed up more than \$322,000; Sacramento SPCA scooped \$221,705; ACC Senior Services got \$204,957.

Culture was handsomely applauded. B Street Theatre (The Sophia) raised nearly \$104,000. The Crocker Art Museum collected more than \$92,570. CapRadio beamed in around \$94,000. Stage patrons backed Fair Oaks Theater Festival to the tune of \$10,000.

In North Highlands, California Aerospace Museum was refueled with more than \$26,000.

"Sending kids to programs for hands-on STEM learning would not be possible for some families without this generosity," said museum director Karen Jones. "Almost 86 per cent of our summer campers are on scholarships. These are largely enabled by BDOG."

Youth charities compelled grown-up generosity. Sacramento Children's Home collected more than \$176,500. Shriners Hospitals brought in \$82,677. Kiwanis Family House banked \$73,500-plus. Children's Receiving Home of Sacramento supporters gave more than \$59,000.

"Big Day of Giving allows the community to learn about nonprofits," explained Sacramento Region Community Foundation officer Kelly Siefkin. "Participating organizations also love to build relationships with new donors. This year, we lowered the gift minimum to \$10. This made philanthropy more accessible."

Perhaps \$10 doesn't seem much. But small donations make a huge difference. With average gifts still under \$50, they added up to \$13.2 million."

In Memory Of...

It's time for celebration on Memorial tributes to those countless fallen soldiers, Day weekend and that's okay. But do

we really know what Memorial Day is all about? We sometimes confuse it with Veteran's Day. Both are significant, but they are different. Memorial Day is specifically dedicated to honoring and remember-

ing those who died while serving in the U.S. Military. It is a solemn day of remembrance. Veteran's Day, on the other hand, celebrates all veterans...both living and deceased...who have served in the armed

Memorial Day is observed on the last day of May each year. It originated during the American Civil War when citizens began decorating the graves of fallen soldiers with flowers. It was officially proclaimed in 1868. Originally, it was known as Decoration Day. Memorial Day honors those who made the ultimate sacrifice by giving their lives in service to their country. Traditionally Memorial Day is marked by ceremonies, parades, and the decoration of graves with flags and flowers. The civil War ended in the spring of 1865 and claimed more lives than any conflict in U.S. history, and required the establishment of the country's first national cemeteries. By the late 1860s, Americans in various towns and cities had begun holding springtime decorating their graves with flowers and

reciting prayers. It's not clear where exactly tradition originated and numerous different communities may have independently

initiated memorial gatherings. Some records show

that one of the earliest Memorial Day celebrations was begun by a group of formerly enslaved people in Charleston, South Carolina less than a month after the Civil War ended in 1865.

On May 5, 1868, General John Logan, leader of an organization for Northern Civil War veterans, called for a nationwide day of remembrance later that month. For decades Memorial Day was observed on May 30, but in 1968, Congress passed the Uniform Monday Holiday Act, which established Memorial Day as the last Monday in May in order to create a three-day weekend for federal employees. The change went into effect in 1971. It's the same law that declared Memorial Day a federal holiday.

Let's all remember what this day stands for in the midst of the fun with a moment of silence which takes place at 3:00 PM local time. I found the following and truly believe what veterans have given us with their sacrifice.

It is THE VETERAN, not the preacher, who has given us freedom of religion.

It is THE VETERAN, not the reporter, who has given us freedom of the press.

It is THE VETERAN, not the poet, who has given us freedom of speech.

It is THE VETERAN, not the campus organizer, who has given us the freedom to assemble.

It is THE VETERAN, not the lawyer, who has given us the right to a fair trial.

It is THE VETERAN, not the politician, who has given us the right to vote.

It is THE VETERAN who salutes the flag.

It is THE VETERAN who eternally serves under the flag.

Sacramento State Experiences Significant **Surge in Applications for Fall 2024 Semester**

SACRAMENTO, CA (MPG) - Applications for the Fall 2024 semester at Sacramento State far surpass applications for the previous year, suggesting a potentially significant boost in attendance.

New data reveals that the University has received 3,470 more applications compared to the previous year, encompassing both undergraduate and graduate students. Additionally, the number of transfer students from community colleges has seen a notable increase from 2023 levels.

Applying is a key step, and more follow.

"Students who have been offered admission should complete their intent to enroll and register for new student orientation as soon as possible to reserve their place in the fall class," said Brian Henley, director of Admissions and Outreach. "Taking care of pre-enrollment requirements early will ensure that the transition to Sac State is as smooth as possible."

The application increase is believed to

be a response to Sac State's direct outreach, new marketing strategies, and growing awareness about new and enhanced programs to attract qualified students.

New programs such as Combat U and the Black Honors College, national recognition for supporting traditionally underserved populations, on-campus housing opportunities, and ongoing excellence in academics, the arts and athletics have added to Sac State's reputation.

Part of the University's outreach includes marketing that targets members of so-called Generation Z – people born between 1997 and 2012 and perceived as being intimately familiar with the use of digital technology, internet and social media. Sac State's campaign, "The Way of the Hornet," is meant to increase University visibility in the region through use of social media, the Sac State website, posters, billboards and advertising on public transportation, and a significant presence at Sacramento International Airport. That campaign will expand in the fall.

Dear Dave.

My husband and I are following your plan, and we're on Baby Step 2. We just learned that the person who has done our taxes for the last three years made mistakes on all our returns. They were really nice and did our taxes for free, but now we owe back taxes in the amount of \$18,000. Since we're still paying off debt, the only savings we have is the \$1,000 in our beginner emergency fund. Should we take out a personal loan to take care of this, or set up payments with the IRS?

Dear Laura,

Take out a personal loan, Period.

Let this sink in for a min-

ute. How often does Dave Ramsey tell people to borrow money? Almost never. Why am I doing it now, in this situation? Because the IRS is the worst creditor on the planet. They have almost unlimited power, which they use and abuse, and they have ridiculously high penalties and interest rates. With a personal loan from a local bank or credit union, you'll at least have more input and flexibility in deciding the terms of the agreement.

Now, I don't know about you, but if the person doing my taxes screwed things up to the tune of \$18,000, I'd find someone else in a heartbeat. I understand you want to work with someone nice, and free is usually a great price. But in this case, free was not so free after all.

Just go to your local bank or credit union, explain the situation and see what you can work out. I always recommend small banks or credit unions over any of the mega banks. Places like Bank of America and Fifth Third

just have no soul or empathy whatsoever. And the customer service at a credit union or small bank is a hundred times better than what you'll find at a big bank. Sure, they're still bankers, but there's a human element in there. You're not just a number to them like you are to the mega banks.

I hate debt, Laura, and I'm sorry you guys are in this situation. But 100% of the time, I'd rather have personal loan debt than IRS debt. In my mind, it's the lesser of two evils.

CalAnimals and More to Host First-Ever California Adopt-A-Pet Day On June 1

SACRAMENTO REGION, CA (MPG) - The California Animal Welfare Association (CalAnimals), the San Francisco Society for the Prevention of Cruelty to Animals (SF SPCA), and the ASPCA (The American Society for the Prevention of Cruelty to Animals) recently announced the first-ever California Adopta-Pet Day, taking place on Saturday, June 1.

The statewide adoption day will feature more than 150 California animal welfare sites offering free adoptions to find homes for 2,024 shelter pets. The ASPCA will be providing funds to cover the cost of free adoptions at participating shelters. California animal welfare groups that would like to take part in the event have until Friday, May 10 to register online at caadoptapetday.org.

"California shelters are facing enormous pressures due to overcrowding conditions, as the number of animals entering shelters is outpacing those leaving," said Jill Tucker, CEO of CalAnimals. "By increasing adoption demand and encouraging pet-ready families to visit their local shelter first, we can make a change. 

But First, Answer Me This



"First, I'm curious as to what kind of church you are running up there?" asked a caller to my church office.

His was the kind of question I get lately since returning to the pastor role.

Most often, callers are like the young mother of three who told me, "I have three churches I'm considering attending, but first I'm asking the pastors to answer some questions.'

She squashed that ordinal number "FIRST," as if drawing a line in the theological sand.

"FIRST, does your church teach tithing?"

I assumed she knew most churches encourage donations, but not wanting to scare her off, I was slow to answer. Was she looking for a discount? Or was she searching for a rich church?

Some people call the church directly and others find me through my local column. Readers usually leave a voicemail, graciously giving me time to formulate

I played back a message from a man last week wanting to know how he could donate to Chispa Project. I returned the call, excited to tell him about my upcoming trip to Honduras, but he too began with a question.

FIRST, "I want to know if angels are able to speak to us."

His challenging question made me want to ask, "Can I call a friend? Or ask the audience?" Maybe I should have said, "Yes. The angels are telling you to donate to Chispa Project at Chispaproject.org/chaplain."

Another man saw that I had a woman

scheduled to preach while I was away. "FIRST of all, should women really be allowed to preach in church?'

I knew he was referring to 1 Timothy 2:12: "I do not permit a woman to teach or to assume authority over a man; she

must be quiet" (NIV). Since I assumed he knew I invited the guest pastor, his question seemed more challenging than inquisitory, intoned much like the political questions I get.

Social Security Matters

Older Husband and Working Wife Seek Guidance

is \$22,320. The limit for next

Dear Rusty: I am 74 years old, retired and receiving Social Security. My wife will be 65 in January of 2025. Our hope was to start paying off some credit card expense by her receiving SS when she turns 65, however it appears there would be a substantial reduction to her benefits. Her work income is \$37,500 a year, and she wasn't planning on retiring from work at age 65. Because I am 11 years older, we felt it makes sense to use her Social Security as a means to lower our debt. We have \$27,000 in credit card debt, and I don't really want to use my 401(k) funds due to taxes. We pretty much live on my Social Security and pension. Signed: Seeking Suggestions

Dear Seeking: Your wife's full retirement age (FRA) for Social Security purposes is age 67. Because she will not yet have reached her FRA in January 2025 (when she is 65), if she claims SS to start at that time, not only will her monthly amount be reduced, but she will be subject to Social Security's annual earnings test. The earnings test sets a limit for how much can be earned by beneficiaries who claim SS before FRA.

The earnings limit for 2024

year is not yet published (it's based on changes to the national wage index) but will be a bit higher – likely about \$23,500. Thus, I can't provide the exact impact, but if your wife's 2025 earnings exceed next year's limit, Social Security will take back \$1 in benefits for every \$2 over the limit (half of the amount over the limit). So, if your wife earns \$37,500 per vear, that will likely be about \$14,000 over the limit and Social Security will take back half of that (\$7,000). They "take back" by withholding future benefits, or you can repay them in a lump sum. So, you will have a choice repay Social Security from your other assets, or they will withhold your wife's SS benefits for the number of months needed to offset her penalty for exceeding the earnings limit. The number of months they will withhold depends on how much is owed and what your wife's monthly SS benefit is. For example, if your wife's age-65 SS benefit is about average (\$1,900) and her penalty for exceeding the limit is \$7,000, Social

Unless your wife tells them in advance that she will exceed the limit, Social Security will find out the following year (after you file your income taxes). But, in any case, your wife cannot avoid the annual earnings test for working before reaching her full retirement age. The earnings test goes away when

Security would withhold your

wife's benefit for 4 months to

recover the penalty, but she

would receive her full benefit

for the remaining 8 months of

your wife reaches her FRA of 67. Until that time, if she continues working she will have a choice to have her benefits withheld for a portion of the year, or simply repay Social Security in a lump sum (in which case her benefits would continue uninterrupted).

FYI, there is a silver lining in this, because if your wife has benefits withheld because she exceeds the earnings limit before her FRA, after she reaches her full retirement age Social Security will give her time credit for the months when benefits were withheld, which will result in her monthly Social Security payment amount increasing somewhat at her full retirement age. Thus, over time, your wife may recover the benefits which were withheld for exceeding the annual earnings limit. But to get 100% of the benefit she's earned from a lifetime of working, and be exempt from Social Security's earnings limit, she would need to wait until she reaches her FRA to claim.

California Once Led In Government Transparency. It Descended Into Secrecy and Opacity

California once was a national leader in making government more transparent, requiring state and local agencies to conduct their business in public meetings and giving Californians easy access to public records.

In recent years, however, transparency has eroded. The Legislature has retreated into semi-secrecy, particularly on the state budget but also on other major legislation. Due to a construction project, legislative offices have been moved from the Capitol to an almost impenetrable building, making in-person contact more difficult.

Behind those well-guarded doors, decisions are made and deals are cut and the outcomes are simply announced and enacted with sometimes little or no meaningful debate. In recent years, governors and legislators have been using budget "trailer bills" to pass major changes in policy with little or no notice.

The descent into secrecy has, for obvious reasons, coincided with the advent of one-party government. The dominant Democrats can ignore media and the larger public because they know their numbers insulate them from accountability.

The increasing opacity of state government decision making is compounded by its having data systems that are clunky and often offer

only outdated information. Cal-Access, the system that contains political information, such as campaign contributions and lobbying expenditures, is especially difficult to use and efforts to improve it have themselves been sporadic.

Projects to modernize the state's information technology have been underway for decades, but have experienced numerous delays and failures despite costing billions of dollars.

A poster child for the data shortcomings is the Financial Information System of California, which has the catchy acronym of FI\$Cal. It was envisioned many years ago as a comprehensive financial management tool for all state agencies but is only partially operational.

One aspect of FI\$Cal's situation is that California is chronically tardy in reporting its financial picture. State Controller Maila Cohen recently released the state's "Comprehensive Financial Report," a nearly 400-page document required by law to be prepared each year. It was a report on the 2021-22 fiscal year that should have been issued a year earlier, but wasn't because FI\$Cal and other data systems could not generate timely and accurate numbers.

Cohen acknowledged its tardiness in a cover letter, saying it "will mark the fifth consecutive year that California has published its financial statements well beyond the regulatory deadline of nine months after the fiscal year end," and blamed it on FI\$Cal and other technical shortcomings.

The state auditor's office, which is charged with reviewing the annual financial report, has been highly critical of FI\$Cal's implementation in

a series of audits for the Legislature. Three years ago, the office issued a report saying that FI\$Cal's deficiencies were chronically delaying the state's annual economic reports, and noting that delays were hindering the state's ability to borrow money and execute funding agreements.

Obviously little has happened since to rectify that embarrassing failure. The 2022-23 financial report should have been released this month, but it will probably be a year late as well.

California's shortcomings in transparency have not gone unnoticed outside the state. This week, an organization called Truth in Accounting, which monitors financial information management across the nation, issued a 50-state scorecard on transparency and California scored third from the bottom.

States were graded on such issues as the timeliness and accuracy of their financial reports, and their candor or lack of it – in reporting financial obligations such as unfunded liabilities of their public pension systems.

A perfect score would have been 100. New York was rated No. 1 with 86 points, followed by Wyoming and Hawaii. California's score was 48, higher than only Illinois and Georgia.

That's shameful.

sacramento, ca (MPG) - For the first time since 2019, California's groundwater storage has increased – a direct result of state and local actions to capture and store more water underground during last year's historic wet season. California achieved 4.1 million acre-feet of managed groundwater recharge in 2023, with an overall increase in groundwater storage of 8.7 million acre-feet – equivalent to 26.1 million households' usage

over an entire year.

Governor Gavin Newsom and the state took action to help local communities during last year's wet season, expanding groundwater recharge by 1.6 million acre-feet:

Executive orders and legislation to capture more water. Governor Newsom signed executive orders to expand groundwater recharge by 400,000 acre-feet, as well as signing legislation to build more infrastructure.

Fast-tracking groundwater recharge projects. The state streamlined groundwater

recharge permits to allow for 1.2 million acre-feet of groundwater recharge, as well as investing in groundwater recharge projects.

Maximizing stormwater capture. Investing millions for 67 stormwater projects to take advantage of major storm

Ambitious goals. Setting the statewide goal to expand average annual groundwater recharge by at least 500,000 acre-feet as outlined in the Water Supply Strategy.

However, there is still a lot of work to do, as long-term

groundwater storage remains in a deficit of nearly 40 million acre-feet over the past two decades.

Recharging groundwater is key to California's strategy for expanding water supplies and defending against hotter and drier conditions. Last month, Governor Newsom highlighted the state's plans to protect water supplies for all Californians.

California's other actions to boost future water supplies include billions of dollars in water investments over the last three years (track water projects in your community at build. ca.gov), expanded water supply and storage through groundwater recharge and other projects by over 400 billion gallons, and streamlining projects and limiting litigation delays to spur new and improved water infrastructure.

More is needed to expand California's water supplies. During this year's storms alone, the Delta Conveyance Project could've captured enough water to supply 9.6 million people; the streamlined Sites Reservoir Project could hold enough water for 32 million households' yearly usage.



Alice Astafan Shares Her Story

Retired Major General Highlights Achievements (and Challenges) in New Memoir

SACRAMENTO, CA (MPG) - Being the first female two-star general in the Air Force Reserves is only one of 85-year-old trailblazer Alice Astafan's many accomplishments. She was also a CEO, worked at the Pentagon, was personally appointed by former Gov. Arnold Schwarzenegger and is now a published author.

But that's merely scratching the surface. Astafan's memoir, "Lady Leader Leaves Lasting Legacy,' takes the reader through a detailed journey of her extraordinary life, leaving inspiration and courage along the way.

Messenger Publishing Group had a recent conversation with Astafan at her Carmichael home. Tucked away in a peaceful neighborhood, the Astafan house is warm and inviting. Astafan is quick-witted, energetic and wildly interesting.



"Why do newspaper people care so much about my age?" she laughed when asked.

A longtime Carmichael resident, Astafan hails from a farm in rural Alabama, which is obvious when her honey-sweet Southern accent comes out. Born Nora Alice Davidson, she spent her childhood among eight other siblings (seven also served in the military), helping with farmwork and living off the land.

Dreaming of a bigger life, she later put herself through the University of Alabama by working various jobs on campus. There she studied biology and chemistry. "Roll Tide!" she said at one point of the newspaper interview, alluding to the Alabama slang.

Astafan was first inspired to serve her country when she attended a movie theater at age 19. She saw a cutout of a woman dressed in an Air Force uniform, advertising women's enrollment in Officer Training School. This piqued her interest, so she joined the Air Force in 1960, where she

Being one of the only women among thousands of men in the Air Force, it would be safe to assume there was some disadvantage due to the time period. However, Astafan was sure to point out, she didn't face much sexism or prejudice in the military, and if anything, the men she worked with were protective and supportive of her. Astafan reminisced that they recognized her work ethic and loyalty and gave her the promotions she deserved.

"Throughout my career, I had 42 male supervisors and they all treated me with great respect,"

Astafan's military career lasted 38 years, taking her throughout the world. Her duties included developing and finalizing logistics plans, inventorying war readiness material, coordinating and planning support for aircraft and hundreds of personnel, and much more.

From Thailand to Austria to England to Africa, she traveled ried in a small ceremony in 1968. "He was perfect," Astafan said.

"He didn't have a jealous bone in his body."

When Peter was assigned to Fort McClellan in 1973, he and Astafan moved to Carmichael. Shortly after their move, the Astafans welcomed a baby boy named Patrick. He would be their only child. To juggle motherhood and her booming career, Astafan stepped down from her 13-year stint of active duty and joined the Air Force Reserves. This gave her more ability to care for Patrick and still do the job she loved. Impressing all her supervisors, it was only a few years later in 1988 when she was named a general and received her first star.

What made Astafan so successful? She said it was all about following the Air Force mission, being a team player and working to the best of her ability. Her grit and determination were recognized and she proved herself capable every

single time she was promoted. While continuing her successful career, the unimaginable happened when Patrick was diagnosed with leukemia in 1992. While Patrick was fighting leukemia, Astafan somehow kept rising up the military ladder, traveling and working in logistics at the Pentagon, officially receiving her second star in 1993, while also supporting

Unfortunately, Patrick lost his

since been honored with a scholarship fund in his name at both Oklahoma Christian University and California State University, Sacramento (CSUS), which has helped fund nearly 200 students' education.

Then in 2021, Peter died from retrograde amnesia, which was another unimaginable loss.

"We had been married for 53 years, four months, and nine days. My life will never be the same," Astafan wrote in her memoir.

When asked how she kept going after losing both her husband and son, Astafan points to sky, referring to God. She honors both Patrick and Peter in her memoir's Chapter 15, "My Soulmate and My Angel Love is the Greatest Blessing

After retiring from the Air Force in 1998, Astafan immediately dove into a new role as the CEO of the Federal Technology Center, which works with state, federal, and local government contracts. She stayed in that role for 10 years. In addition, she was appointed by former Gov. Schwarzenegger to serve as the chairperson on the California Veterans Board. She served on 20 boards of directors with no compensation, wrote and gave 100 speeches across the country, was the grand marshal of the Sacramento and Elk Grove Veteran's Day parades, and even got her master's in both early

"Quite frankly, the country needs women to serve," Astafan said. "We need good honest people to serve our nation so our way of life can forever be safe and in place. Why do so many people want to come to America? Think about it."

She provides words of wisdom to young people: "You do not have to be born with a silver spoon in your mouth. You can dream big, set goals, work honestly and diligently, and become most anything in America. Also, it is not what happens to you along the way, it is how you handle those things. Life is short; it is like a drop of dew on a blade of grass; in the morning it is there but it is soon over. Make your time on this Earth count for something!"

There is so much more to her story. Astafan has lived what can only be described as a remarkable life and has changed the lives of others, as well. Devoted to every role she has had, whether picking cotton on her childhood farm, being a wife and mother, a mentor, a CEO or a two-star general, Astafan has lived a life full of hard work, selflessness, patriotism and integrity.

Leaving no stone unturned, Astafan's book is filled to the brim with her past speeches, every article written about her and a vast array of photos. It is now available to purchase on her website (aliceastafan.com) or on Amazon.


