LIVE OAK, CA (MPG) - Friday night, 8 p.m., and the town of Live Oak is quiet... except for the roar of noise coming from Arostegui Stadium and Live Oak High School's Class of 2024 Graduation.

Butte County's Quality of Life In Jeopardy

BUTTE COUNTY, CA (MPG) - The Butte County Board of Supervisors are exploring a one-cent sales tax measure on the Nov. 5, 2024 ballot and are asking for feedback.

The Herald attended one of the hosted meetings on May 15 to learn about the county's budget challenges and impacts. In attendance were Butte County Chief Administrative Officer Andy Pickett, Butte County Library Director Misty Wright, and CAL FIRE and Sheriff's Office representatives.

With Pickett's experience preparing Butte County's budgets, he expressed concern that the costs of administering services such as staffing the Sheriff's Office and correctional officers in Butte County are increasing faster than incoming

Year after year, the Governor's Office creates unfunded mandates causing the budget to be stretched thin. The Governor's Office also transfers revenue from counties back to the state

to cover the state's deficit.

When Proposition 13 was passed in 1978, it limited county government's ability to increase property taxes. The increases were capped at two percent each year. Because of Proposition 13, the growth of revenues hasn't kept up with the cost of services, which caused a gap in the yearly budget.

When creating Butte County's yearly budget, the gap in revenue requires cuts in services for the budget to be balanced. The county previously balanced the budget by combining similar programs, cutting non-mandated services, and cutting or reducing support services. Public safety was also reduced but still maintained core services.

After implementing all these measures throughout the years, Pickett said, the county has nothing left to eliminate to balance the budget without serious cuts to public safety. The possible cuts are closing fire stations; decreasing deputy sheriffs, probation officers and prosecutors; and eliminating the whole library system. This is

If you're looking for a fun summer getaway road trip, go to the monastery in Vina. The Abbey of New Clairvaux is a rural Trappist monastery located just over the county line on HWY 99. The vineyards and orchards were once owned by Leland Stanford. They have wines that are beating the wines from Napa at wine contests. As I am not one to imbibe (drink booze), I go for the

religious experience and their other farm wares, like honey. The most interesting thing is their stone Spanish church building from the 1200s (1235 is the year it was dedicated). Long story short - The Spanish government stole their church in 1835 and sold it. Stones from the Abbey of Santa María de Óvila (Chapter House and other parts) were sold to William Randolph Hearst for \$96,500. The church made up 11 cargo ship shiploads and arrived in San Francisco in 1931. An odd series of events, including WWII and an earthquake, left the stones sitting in piles in Golden Gate Park. In 1995, the Monks got them back and started figuring out how to put them together; it was not until 2013 that they opened the completed building. It is the only place in California to visit a historic European church. Starting with Vigils at 3:30 a.m., the monks pray in their old church seven times a day.

GRIDLEY, CA (MPG) - On Thursday, May 30, McKinely Elementary School students, Gridley Unified School District staff, the community and family of Stephanie Gualandi paid tribute to the special education teacher who recently lost her battle with cancer.

Gualandi taught at McKinley Elementary School for nine years and was described as a devoted teacher with a passion for serving her special needs students. Fellow McKinley School teacher Stephanie Olson said that Gualandi constantly advocated for her students and strived to connect with both mainstream and special needs children.

Gridley Unified School District Superintendent Justin Kern said in an email that everyone thought that Gualandi was winning the battle with cancer when she suddenly lost the battle. Gualandi was just 31 years old when she passed.

Olson organized a walk in remembrance

of Gualandi's legacy and to acknowledge the impact that she had on all their lives.

"I think we needed closure," said Olson. "She was a very special person to our community and the kids that she served."

At 4:30 p.m., a large group gathered in front of McKinley Elementary School, some wearing light green and green ribbons to represent the cancer that took Gualandi too early. Superintendent Kern and McKinley Elementary School Principal Rhiannon Treat took a moment to speak about the teacher before setting

The walk took a route around both Sycamore and McKinley campuses, ending on the playground at McKinley. There, students enjoyed cool treats and a variety of games. Gualandi's husband and family were present, thanking everyone for coming out to honor the life of Gualandi.

For some, emotions ran high but it was clear that the woman had touched many lives both in the schools and within the community.

Analysis: Escalating China Trade **Tensions Could Impact** California Agriculture

A trade war with China could have significant impacts on California agriculture, according to an analysis by economists at University of California, Davis, and North Dakota State University. The Biden administration recently increased tariffs on Chinese electric vehicles, solar cells and other products. If tensions result in the U.S. revoking China's Permanent Normal Trade Relations status, the analysis said that could lead to a 9.5% increase in China's agricultural import tariffsresulting in \$1 billion in trade losses for California farmers and ranchers.

Newsom Administration Stands by Proposed Delta Tunnel Despite Surging Costs

The projected cost for a long-planned water tunnel system for the Sacramento-San Joaquin River Delta has increased from an estimated \$16 billion in 2020 to \$20.1 billion, according to a new estimate this month. Yet the Newsom administration argues the controversial Delta Conveyance Project would provide significant cost benefits by modernizing the State Water Project with new conveyance infrastructure. The Department of Water Resources said the project, if operational, would have captured an additional

909,000 acre-feet of water since Jan. 1.

Inspectors Test Dairy Cattle at Facilities Impacted by Avian Bird Flu

Federal authorities have conducted tests on beef tissue from 96 cull dairy cows, which were condemned at facilities inspected by the U.S. Department of Agriculture Food Safety and Inspection Services. In a news release, the USDA said samples from 95 cows tested negative for H5N1 Avian influenza, the bird flu that has spread to dairy cows. The USDA said viral tissues were found in one cow and that no meat from the inspected cattle entered the food supply. The Centers for Disease Control and Prevention said two U.S. dairy workers were reported infected as of May 24.


California Organic Fertilizer Project to Benefit From USDA Investment

The U.S. Department of Agriculture this month announced it is investing \$83 million in domestic fertilizer production in hopes of spurring economic growth in rural communities and increasing competition in agricultural markets. The new funding from the Fertilizer Production Expansion Program includes a \$25 million grant to build and equip a food waste upcycling facility in Riverside County's Jurupa Valley that will use insects to recycle food waste into organic nutrient fertilizer. Projects in 12 states are

intended to increase independent fertilizer

production.







around by one single move. Implementing that move, the tides turned and he was suddenly winning.


