Council **Terminates Emergency Declaration After Sinkhole** Repaired on **Archer Ave**

LIVE OAK, CA (MPG) - At the June 5 Live Oak City Council meeting, Mayor Ashley Hernandez and Vice-Mayor Nancy Santana were absent, so Councilmember Jeramy Chapdelaine was selected to chair the meeting.

City Council considered a resolution to terminate an emergency declaration enacted in February when a water line underneath Archer Avenue collapsed, causing a sinkhole in the roadway.

"We determined it was in the public interest to spend public funds to repair that as quickly as possible," City engineer Scott Rolls said.

Under normal circumstances, city projects undergo a competitive public bidding process, but with a declared emergency situation, City Council waived that requirement and authorized a general contractor already working on another project in the city to perform the necessary repairs.

City engineer Rolls reported that the work is now complete and the total cost was \$45,639, "which is pretty reasonable for the amount of work that was done there." The Butte Water District has been running water through the replaced line for a month now with no issues.

However, this was just "a temporary fix," explained Rolls, as the crews discovered the water line was sitting right on top of a PG&E gas line, which means they had to install a much smaller pipe than planned.

Rolls said the smaller pipe should hold as long as necessary while the city finds funding to undertake the permanent replacement project, which will require shifting the locations of both the water line and the gas line for appropriate access to each. "The full replacement

is now going to be a little more complicated than I had hoped," said Rolls. "So it's nice that we're not having to do that on a very tight timeline." City Council voted unan-

imously to terminate the emergency declaration and the waiver of the competitive bidding process. Next, a resolution approv-

ing the purchase agreement for a new Pierce Enforcer

It is Government budget season. The New Pi-Line Seinfeld Cast Member to Perform in Yuba City on Sunday

YUBA CITY, CA (MPG) -Seinfeld fans are sure to be excited for the next Sunday Night Speakeasy at the Sutter Buttes Brewing in Yuba City. This special monthly event has been growing in popularity since its launch last fall. Comic headliners have included Paul Convers, Jeff Applebaum, Ellis Rodriguez, Myles Weber, Mike Bentancourt and even Kabir "Kabezzy" Singh who was a top 15 finisher on season 16 of America's Got Talent. But one of the biggest names slated to come through town as of late is Steve Hytner, the man who turned Kenny Bania into

comedic gold. "When I went into those Seinfeld auditions, all they had for Bania's character was 'the most annoying person in the world,' but nobody really perceives themselves as annoying right? So, I decided to go in the complete opposite direction and make him nice," said Hytner.

While only appearing in a total of six Seinfeld episodes, Hytner's work left a lasting impression on audiences and casting directors alike. Although this certainly heightened his visibility in the industry, Hytner found that fame was not without its pros and cons.

"The show was so successful, and the character became so known that when I was doing dramatic auditions you could feel the room be like 'can we really cast Bania in this part?" said Hytner. "As soon as my face hit the screen people would start laughing, but that's necessarily a good thing for a drama. But I'm not the type that's going to complain about being recognized."

Growing up just 20 minutes outside Manhattan, Hytner started training and performing fresh out of high school. He reportedly caught the acting bug while watching another

classmate perform and decided he could "do it better."

"I was very into sports when I was a kid and it was very much a competitive sports mentality that got me into this," explained Hytner. "My best friend, who was a year older than me, did a play and everybody thought that he was hilarious. In my mind I was like 'I'm funnier than he is, I'm going to do a play and show everybody I'm funnier,' and I did. And really as I pursued my career, I really did pursue it in that light of wanting to prove I could monetize what I was doing, that's the success level I always put on myself."

And succeeded he did, after flourishing in the 1980's New York comedy scene, Hytner was off to Los Angeles where he would work consistently as an actor for 20 years. Some of his most notable film projects include The Prophecy, EuroTrip, and Charlie's Angels: Full Throttle, although Hytner admits to favoring television.

"It's not always the success of a project, sometimes you just like playing a particular character," said Hytner in reference to an NBC sitcom series called Working. "The acting biz has decided they want me to do more of the comedic roles so whenever I can land a dramatic role,

I get a kick out of playing it. But to me the comedic stuff is so much harder. With editing you can make anybody into a decent dramatic actor, but you can't edit your way into funny. It's either there on the film or it's not."

Currently, Hytner and his wife reside in the Reno-Tahoe area, but this prominent performer once called Grass Valley home. It was there that Hytner re-fired his stand-up career while staying close to family. His upcoming performance at Sutter Buttes Brewing will mark his first appearance in Yuba City and he looks forward to meeting the locals, especially "Chicago" Steve Barkley, another established comedian who serves as the brewery's res-

ident talent booker. "Who doesn't want to see Bania?" said Barkley excitedly. "I've heard nothing but good things about him and people always say he's great with the crowd and very engaged with his

Barkley will open for Hytner on Sunday, June 16, during the two scheduled performances. Fatal Airplane Crash Occurs in Richvale



RICHVALE, CA (MPG) - On May 28, at approximately 1:48 p.m., the Butte County Sheriff's Office dispatch center began receiving calls about an airplane crash at the Richvale Airport. Dispatchers determined a crop duster aircraft crashed at the end of the runway and the pilot was trapped inside the aircraft.

Butte County Sheriff's Office deputies, CAL FIRE and medical personnel immediately responded. The pilot was removed from the aircraft and personnel immediately began providing lifesaving efforts. Despite the lifesaving efforts provided, the pilot did not survive.

The pilot was identified as Hugh Mattingly, 63, of Chico.

Deputies contacted the National Transportation Safety Board and the Federal Aviation Administration (FAA). National Transportation Safety Board staff arrived at the Richvale Airport on May 29 and will oversee the investigation.★

As the first student to cross the graduation stage, Luevano handed Burresch a large glass mason jar. As each student made their way to shake their principal's hand, they handed her a key.



Homebuyer Assistance Program Available to Help Households Impacted by Wildfires

SACRAMENTO, CA (MPG) - On June 10, Golden State Finance Authority (GSFA) launched the ReCoverCA Homebuyer Assistance (DR-HBA) Program to support individuals and families in California impacted by the devastating wildfires and other declared disasters in 2018 and 2020.

The Program, managed by GSFA and funded by a \$28 million grant from the California Department of Housing and Community Development (HCD) is designed to help low- and

moderate-income residents (homeowners or renters) of the Most Impacted and Distressed (MID) California counties to relocate outside of high fire hazard severity zones. The homeownership assistance given to qualifying households is provided in the form of a forgivable loan, up to \$350,000, to cover the funding gap between the First Mortgage Loan amount and the purchase price of a home.

"This financial assistance could really make a difference in people's lives," said Lake County Supervisor EJ Crandell. "When one family gains some stability,

they are better able to show up in their employment, in their education, in their relationships with friends and family and in their community. When one family succeeds in taking a step forward in recovery, we all benefit."

Low-to-moderate income homeowners and renters whose primary residence, at the time of the qualifying disasters in 2018 or 2020, was located in high or very high fire severity zones in an MID county will be eligible to apply for the DR-HBA Program. Eligible MID counties are: 2018 - Butte, Lake, Los Angeles and Shasta Counties; 2020 – Butte, Fresno, Los Angeles, Napa, Santa Cruz, Shasta, Siskiyou, Solano and Sonoma Counties.

"It is difficult for many families that lost their homes to wildfire to simply rebuild in the same location due to construction costs, fire insurance requirements and other factors. In fact, many families had to relocate temporarily, even obtaining new jobs in a different location," said Craig Ferguson, Deputy Director of GSFA. "ReCoverCA homebuyer assistance will be a big boost to help them start again with longterm housing and less fire risk going forward. We are excited to be a part of such a positive recov-

ery effort." TThe grant provided by HCD is part of the State's Disaster Recovery Action Plan for the 2018 and 2020 disasters and made possible through a Community Development Block Grant - Disaster Recovery grant from the United States Department of Housing and Urban Development

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Solis Sentencing Continued

GRIDLEY, CA (MPG) - Former Gridley Unified School District teacher Michelle Solis appeared in a packed courtroom at 1:30 p.m. June 6 for sentencing.

The middle school teacher was found guilty of unlawful sex with a minor 261.5 (d) PC after pleading "no contest" to the charge

on April 23. Attorney Matthew Clinton Smith, who rep-

resents Solis, requested a

continuance to complete a

psychiatric evaluation on

the defendant before she is sentenced. The prosecution's J.

Bennett with the Butte County District Attorney's Office requested that Solis be remanded to jail and that the conditions surrounding the restraining order in place between her and the victim be

amended. Judge Michael Deems amended the original stay-away orders requiring Solis to stay 150 feet from the victim to include

keep away from locations where minors congregate, including public parks and sporting games.

The victim's family was present during the hearing and his mother penned a powerful letter, which was read aloud to the courtroom.

Deems agreed to a continuance and denied the prosecution's request to remand Solis to jail.

Sentencing has been continued to 1:30 p.m. June 27at the Butte County Superior Court in Oroville.

1500 GPM Type 1 Fire Engine was considered. City Council voted in April to approve the purchase but a resolution was required to finalize the purchase agreement.

The vehicle will be purchased through Golden State Fire Apparatus (representing Pierce Manufacturing) and financed through Community Leasing Partners of Community First National Bank. The purchase price is \$846,575.44, which will be paid over 10 years in annual payments of \$119,723.34 beginning in May 2026. The funds will be budgeted annually from Fire Impact Fees, Fire Property Assessments or other discretionary fund sources.

After City Council approval of the purchase agreement, manufacturing of the new engine will begin, with delivery expected in approximately 48 to 50 months. By the time of delivery, Live Oaks' current fire engine will have been in service for 12 years, and initially the old engine will be kept for backup use.

The council voted unanimously to approve the purchase agreement for the

Parks and Recreation director Luis Cibrian presented a discussion item to City Council regarding the Live Oak Festival, which is scheduled for Sept. 7. He said that the local Lions Club had been putting on the festival, but for the last few years has been scaling back its involvement with the goal of eventually passing full responsibility for the festival to the city. Cibrian said that this year, "it's going to fall on our shoulders...but I think we're ready to tackle

Cibrian said the city will now handle all aspects of the festival, from the car show and parade to food vendors and entertainment. He asked for council guidance on whether the planning should be done internally or coordinate a committee of citizens to assist with the process.

Councilmember Bob Woten said the festival is "a long-standing tradition" in the community, so it is important to keep it going and take up whatever responsibilities are needed to make it a success.

Councilmember Lakhvir Ghag suggested getting the local farmers to bring out their old tractors to give the festival a sense of identity unique to Live Oak. He supported the idea of enlisting volunteers from the community to help support the Parks and Recreation team in planning the festival and he offered to help personally.

Councilmember Jeramy Chapdelaine also offered to help and encouraged the formation of a volunteer committee: "I know there's a lot of folks in the community that would be happy and are really even looking for things like that to participate in."

Interim City Manager Mark Scott then introduced the Preliminary Fiscal Year 2024-25 Operating Budget, but suggested postponing the discussion until the full City Council was present. Scott said that as they consider the budget, the focus should be "on the long-term needs of the community." He cautioned that Live Oak does not receive a large amount of revenue from sales tax because many residents do much of their shopping in Yuba City, so their sales tax dollars are instead supporting that

Scott said, "When budgets are tight, there's a tendency to want to tighten them.' But he said that "saving and cutting" does not lead to a great future. "It just doesn't work that way. You have to invest in your future." He suggested the city must look for grants and development opportunities "to create an economy here that will allow us to retain those resources into the future."

City Council agreed to continue the budget item until all members are present.

The next meeting of the Live Oak City Council is scheduled for 6 p.m. June 19 at City Hall, 9955 Live Oak Blvd.

BUTTE COUNTY, CA (MPG) - Before you go out on the water, check the forecast at your local National Weather Service coastal office. You should also check for the latest National Weather Service buoy observations from the National Data Buoy Center.

You should also make sure your boat has essential, and in cases, required, safety equipment and communications tools.

Life Jackets

Before you and your family get out on the water this year, grab a life jacket and "Wear It!" Nearly 85 percent of those who drown while boating were not wearing a life jacket. Wearing a life jacket is one of the most effective and simple life-saving strategies for safe recreational boating. Boaters are required to have a U.S. Coast Guard-approved life jacket on board for every passenger on their vessel.

Today's life jackets are available in a wide variety of shapes, colors, and sizes. They are comfortable, lightweight, and perfect for any boating activity. The most important thing is this: remember to grab a life jacket and "Wear It!" To learn more, visit the National Safe Boating Council online at www.safeboatingcouncil.org.

Fire Extinguishers

U. S. Coast Guard approved, marinetype fire extinguishers are required on boats where a fire hazard could be expected from the engines or fuel system.

When required, boats less than 26 feet must carry at least one B-I, Coast Guard approved fire extinguisher. Boats 26-40 feet must carry two B-I or one B-II Coast Guard approved fire extinguisher(s). Boats 40-65 feet must carry three B-I or one B-II and one B-I Coast Guard approved extinguishers.

Fire extinguishers are classified by a letter and a number symbol. The letter indicates the type of fire the unit is designed to extinguish, and the number indicates the size of the extinguisher. A type B extinguisher for example is intended to extinguish burning liquids such as gasoline, oil or grease, all of which are common on a boat.

You shouldn't have to travel more than half the length of their boat to get to the fire extinguisher. Check your fire extinguishers at least once a year to ensure they are properly charged, stored and are undamaged. Start your boating season with this vital safety check.

Communications: Cell Phones, Weather Radios and Other Options

If you have a smart phone, get weather news at mobile.weather.gov.

The National Oceanic and Atmospheric Administration (NOAA) Weather Radio All Hazards will sound an alert when the National Weather Service issues a weather advisory. Weather radio is a vital tool for a mariner.

There are many other communications options available to mariners on the U.S. National Weather Service marine site.

Bus Shooter Sentenced For 2022 Murder

Butte County District Attorney's Office News Release

OROVILLE, CA (MPG) - A Sacramento gang member was sentenced on May 31 in Butte County Superior Court for shooting multiple victims in February 2022 on a Greyhound bus that stopped in Oroville.

Asaahdi Coleman, 23, was sentenced today for murder and attempted murder with gun enhancements.

At the time of the shooting, the murder victim, Karen Dalton, 43, was traveling with her two children, a girl, 11, and a boy, 14, from Washington to New Mexico.

On May 31, the daughter, who was shot in the face and buttocks by Coleman, addressed the judge in the courtroom by remote video saying that she still has recurring nightmares.

Victim Rose Whitley, 27, had her statement read by a victim advocate in the courtroom, telling of her constant pain from shrapnel that lodged in her tailbone from the shooting. Whitley was pregnant at the time of the shooting and delivered her child prematurely.

Victim Bobby Farber, 34, spoke from his wheelchair in the courtroom. He noted he was now permanently paralyzed because of the shooting and in constant

During the May 31 sentencing, Butte County Chief Deputy District Attorney Mark Murphy, said Faber, demonstrated "considerable courage" both during and after the shooting in attempting to protect Dalton's children from the cascade of shots fired by Coleman. Murphy emphasized the difference between Farber's "courage" and Coleman's "cowardice."

Murphy also noted a forensic psychologist examined Coleman

and determined he had an "Anti-Social Personality Disorder" along with a "Narcissistic Personality Disorder," findings which Murphy said showed Coleman was "deeply defective and dangerous" and deserved the maximum prison sentence to protect the public.

After hearing from the victims and Murphy, Butte County Superior Judge Corie Caraway sentenced Coleman to the maximum sentence of 74 years and eight months to life, noting his previous crimes involving violence and guns both as a juvenile and adult in the Bay Area and Sacramento.

Butte County District Attorney Mike Ramsey noted that despite being sentenced to over 74 years to life, California's Youthful Offender Parole law allows Coleman to be eligible for parole after serving 25

Chico Man Arraigned on Murder **Charge in Golf Club Killing**

CHICO, CA (MPG) - A Chico man was in Butte County Superior Court on May 30 to face a murder charge for the killing of another man with a golf club.

Hunter Edward Hamlin Harris, 28, of Chico, appeared before a judge and was read the charge of murder with the use of a weapon, a golf putter.

Butte County District Attorney Mike Ramsey said his office filed the charge on Harris for the killing of Austin Robert Olson-Wanick, 29, of Chico, on the morning of May 26.

Ramsey said a n investigation by Chico Police detectives revealed Harris and Olson-Wanick were staying in an apartment in the 2500 block of the Esplanade in Chico with other people and got into a physical fight outside the apartment that morning. The fight was broken up by persons in the apartment and the two men returned back inside the apartment, according to the District's Attorney

However, according to the District's Attorney Office, a second physical altercation erupted inside the apartment where Harris allegedly struck Olson-Wanick multiple times in the head and neck area with a golf putter. Ramsey

said it is unclear, at this time, the exact cause of death as Olson-Wanick also suffered severe blood loss from a puncture wound to his neck by the broken shaft of the putter. A forensic autopsy is currently pending.

Ramsey said that Harris fled the scene of the crime and was found by Chico Police and arrested two hours later for Olsen-Wanick's murder.

On May 30, the judge continued Harris' arraignment to June 5, after press time, for entry of plea and setting of a preliminary hearing. The judge remanded Harris back to the Butte County Jail to be held in lieu of \$1,125,000

Legislative Republican Leaders Announce **Opposition to Poison Pills in Retail Theft Bills**

SACRAMENTO, CA (MPG) - On June 7, Assembly Republican Leader James Gallagher (R-Yuba City) and Senate Minority Leader Brian Jones (R-San Diego) sent a letter to Assembly Speaker Robert Rivas and Senate pro Tempore Mike McGuire announcing their opposition to a Democrat-led attempt to interfere in California's initiative process by adding language automatically repealing several bills addressing retail theft if voters

Oroville Vehicle Pursuit Results in Arrest

OROVILLE, CA (MPG) - On June 9, at approximately 12:36 a.m., a Butte County Sheriff's Office (BCSO) deputy conducted a traffic enforcement stop on a Chevy truck in the area of Highway 70 and Ophir Road, Oroville. The deputy reportedly had information that George Wright, 25, of Oroville, who had several felony arrest warrants for evading law enforcement and being a prohibited person in possession of firearms and ammunition, was possibly associated with the truck.

When the truck was coming to a stop, according to the Sheriff's Office, Wright opened the passenger door of the truck and fled on foot. Deputies pursued Wright on foot but lost sight of Wright after he entered an area with dense vegetation, according to the Sheriff's Office. Deputies conducted an extensive search for Wright with the assistance of Butte County Sheriff's Office K9 Enzo and a Chico Police Department drone. Deputies were not able to locate Wright.

The driver of the truck was identified as Justin Beall, 49, of Oroville. Deputies said they located evidence that Beall knew Wright was wanted for multiple felony charges and Beall was helping transport Wright from Chico to Oroville. Beall was placed under arrest for harboring a fugitive.

At approximately 7:17 a.m. June 9, Butte County Sheriff's Office reportedly received a call from a business owner in the area of Stuart Court, Oroville. The business owner reported his Dodge truck had been stolen.

At approximately 11:49 a.m. June 9, Butte County Sheriff's Office received information from the business owner that he had located his stolen truck and an individual later identified as Wright, near Oregon Gulch Road and Potters Ravine Road, Oroville. Deputies responded, located Wright, and placed him under arrest. Wright was booked into the Butte County Sheriff's Office Jail. The stolen truck was returned to the business owner. *



Final Defendant in 2020 Double Homicide Pleads to the Murders

OROVILLE, CA (MPG) - On May 30, an Oroville man became the last of three defendants to plead no contest to an October 2020 double homicide involving the sale of marijuana.

Kyle Mathew Smith, 27, entered his plea in Butte County Superior Court on May 30 to two counts of second-degree murder for the October 20, 2020, slayings of brothers Jerry and Randy Bonds, 39 and 33. The Bonds brothers, who had traveled from Florida to California to purchase marijuana from Smith and his two codefendants, were killed in a remote area near Forbestown in Butte County.

Butte County District Attorney Mike Ramsey said the investigation into the murder of the Bonds brothers began a day after the killing when family members from Florida called the Butte County Sheriff's Office to report them missing. An investigation showed the brothers had flown into a Los Angeles airport on October 19, 2020, rented an Audi, and then drove to Oroville and checked into a local motel, then went missing.

On October 21, 2020, the Reno, Nevada police department received a 911 call from a man who said he had just talked with three visitors who told him they killed two black men in the Oroville area. Reno police reported this to the Butte County Sheriff's Office, who found two of the named visitors lived in Oroville.

On October 22, 2020,

during a stakeout of the Oroville residence of Michael Griff, 25, one of the suspects, a traffic stop was conducted on a vehicle leaving the residence. Austin Hogan, 25, of Oroville, and Smith, who had recently returned from Texas, were located in the vehicle and arrested. When the sheriff's detectives searched the vehicle, property belonging to the Bonds brothers was found in the trunk. Griff was found in

his residence with more property of the Bonds brothers, thousands of dollars in cash, and a significant amount of marijuana bud.

When interviewed, Smith provided the location of the Bonds by Griff and Hogan but claimed he was unaware of their murderous intent. However, Griff's girlfriend later informed detectives that just one day before the murder, she had overheard the men discussing the possi-



brothers' bodies to detectives. When detectives arrived at the described location, they found the bodies riddled with multiple gunshot wounds. Smith initially told detectives the shootings were carried out

bility of having to kill the Bonds.

The investigation also revealed that on the day after the murders, Smith drove the Bonds brothers' Audi to a Reno casino and left it in the casino parking lot. Smith, Griff, and Hogan then traveled in another vehicle they brought and visited a male friend in an attempt to set up an alibi. But instead of providing the three with an alibi, their friend reported them to the Reno police. The man later testified at a preliminary hearing for Griff.

Ramsey said the evidence did establish both Griff and Hogan to be the shooters. They had led the Bonds brothers to the remote Forbestown location to sell the brothers marijuana out of the trunk of the car that Grift and Hogan drove to that location. Smith had also driven to the location in a separate vehicle and was waiting for everyone. As the Bonds brothers approached the Grift/ Hogan vehicle, Hogan pulled a shotgun from its trunk and opened fire. Grift then pulled a pistol from his belt and also fired upon the Bonds brothers. Although Smith did not fire upon the brothers, the evidence established his role to be an aider and abettor and a conspirator in the murders. All three of the

defendants then covered the Bonds brothers' bodies under logs and debris.

On June 13, 2023, Griff pled guilty to two counts of first-degree murder and was sentenced to 50 years to life in state prison.

On that same day, Hogan pled guilty to two counts of second-degree murder. His sentencing date has been postponed in anticipation of testifying against Kyle Smith. With the resolution of Kyle Smith's case, a date for his sentencing will be set on June 12, 2024.

Ramsey said, "Today's plea ensures all those responsible for the murders of Jerry and Randy Bonds will receive justice. This case has been a sobering reminder of the violence that can arise from our local illegal marijuana industry. We hope the resolution of this case provides some measure of peace and closure to the Bonds family."

Kyle Smith's sentencing is set for June 26, when he will be sentenced to 30 years to life in state prison.



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
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Former Correctional Deputy Sentenced to Misdemeanor Probation

CHICO, CA (MPG) - A 43-year-old former correctional deputy with the Butte County Sheriff's Office was sentenced May 17 after pleading on March 27 to felony driving under the influence causing injury for an incident occurring on April 24, 2023.

Andrew Karl Gertz had also admitted an enhancement for injuring more than one victim, as well as an enhancement for inflicting great bodily injury upon one of the people he collided with.

Butte County District

Attorney Mike Ramsey

said that although Gertz

pled to a felony in March, his attorney requested the sentencing judge to reduce the charge from a felony to a misdemeanor and strike the injury enhancements, thereby sentencing Gertz to a lesser grant of misdemeanor probation. Gertz's attorney made the request citing Gertz's lack of criminal history, Gertz's remorse for the pain he caused, and Gertz's service to the community during his 18 years as a correctional deputy.

Ramsey said his office opposed this request for a reduction, pointing out the crippling consequences of Gertz's actions. Victim impact statements were provided to the judge, the most significant of which highlighted the great bodily

injuries suffered by one of the drivers struck by Gertz. The victim had to have extensive back surgery as a result of Gertz's actions and now requires a

cane to move. The 72-yearold victim told the judge about his inability to throw darts anymore, help around the house, or go riding his Harley with his wife.

Butte County Superior Court Judge Corie Caraway ultimately granted Gertz's request, reducing the case to a misdemeanor and sentencing Gertz to misdemeanor probation for his crimes. The judge mentioned the unusual circumstances of this case, particularly the facts that Gertz had recently been prescribed Ambien as a result of a work-related injury and that the Ambien caused Gertz to be in an 'unconscious state" due to the adverse reaction to the drug. When contacted by the Chico Police Department, Gertz was found to be holding a pet snake in his lap while driving, and it was later

his home garage door and front door wide open.

The judge acknowledged Gertz's remorse before sentencing him to three years formal probation with conditions of 30 days home incarceration, search and testing for alcohol and drugs, loss of his driving privilege for one year, a requirement to take a DUI school, and a requirement to have an ignition interlock device on his car to prevent it from starting

The judge also fined Gertz over \$1980 in fines and ordered another hearing to determine the amount of restitution Gertz will have to pay the victims for their medical expenses and car damage.

Harvest Time Arrives for Shrinking California Apricot Sector

After years of removing trees, California's remaining apricot growers say they have found a balance between supply and demand, allowing the crop to be profitable. But the downward trend in production has reduced the sector to a fraction of what it once was, even though the Golden State remains the nation's top producer of apricots. So many apricot orchards have vanished that even a slight increase in acreage could "bump you back up into an oversupply situation," said Stanislaus County grower Daniel Bays, who serves as president of Apricot Producers of California.

Grasshopper Season is Anxiety Season For Farmers In North State

Grasshoppers and Mormon crickets, which travel great distances and destroy crops, are expected to make another unwelcome appearance in North State farm fields this year. University of California Cooperative Extension farm advisors say the grasshoppers, which lay eggs in the fall and begin hatching by summer, are usually more isolated to rangeland and irrigated pasture than irrigated row crops. Amid dry conditions in recent years, farmers in Siskiyou and Modoc counties have reported tens of millions of dollars in crop losses due to

feeding grasshoppers and crickets.

Concerns by Wildlife Agencies Delay Farmers' Plans to Conserve Colorado River Water

Imperial Valley farmers preparing to participate this summer in programs to conserve Colorado River water have had to put their plans on hold due to concerns from wildlife agencies that reduced farm water use could result in habitat loss for three endangered species that live in the region. The short-term conservation effort would be the largest ever on the Colorado River. But earlier this year, during the environmental review process, wildlife agencies requested a biological consultation to ensure the programs would not violate laws that prohibit killing or harming endangered species.

Study: Reduced flows for farming stir up dust from Salton Sea

by dust.

The Salton Sea, formed in 1905 after the Colorado River overflowed its banks, has been fed since primarily by water runoff from agricultural operations for almost a century. Now a new research paper in the American Journal of Agricultural Economics finds that, as farmers have reduced water consumption to help increase water deliveries to San Diego County communities, flows to the lake have decreased and dust pollution has increased. The report's co-author said disadvantaged neighborhoods located near the Salton Sea have been most affected


having 24 hits this season. His range in the outfield gives Gridlev the ability to have stability for a couple more seasons.
