Council Asks to Clarify Sales Tax Revenue

GALT, CA (MPG) - During a first look at the proposed city budget, Galt City Council requested greater detail on the allocation of Measure Q sales tax funds.

The presentation at the June 4 regular meeting was intended to get feedback from City Council and the proposal will return for final consideration at the June 18 meeting.

Finance director Matthew Boring said that the budget proposal includes a regular General Fund contribution to the Parks and Recreation Fund, which City Council requested at its May 21 meeting.

The policy sets aside 6% of General Fund spending, based on the previous fiscal year's expenditures less one-time expenses and especially volatile costs.

Boring said this leads to a contribution of about \$928,000, based on adjusted spending of \$15.5 million.

Staff had identified possible parks and rec needs above the proposed contribution, Boring added, so staff recommended allocating an additional \$613,000 in fiscal year 2024-25 and an additional \$648,000 in 2025-26.

Regarding the Measure Q sales tax, which has been assigned its own fund separate from the General Fund, Boring projected increased revenue. The tax brought in \$4.58 million in the current fiscal year. For the fund intended to supplement parks and rec spending, the proposed budget predicted revenue of \$4.62 million in 2024-25 and \$4.74 million in 2025-26.

About 64% of the Measure Q income in the current fiscal year has been spent, creating a balance of close to \$2.8 million. The budget proposed spending 100% of the revenue projected in the next two fiscal years.

The Measure R fund supporting law enforcement is also expected to see some income growth but, Boring said, the city plans to spend more to lower the fund's balance. If the city reaches its target balance in 2025-26, Boring said, it will switch to "a more balanced approach."

Rancheria to Expand Casino

ELK GROVE, CA (MPG) - Wilton Rancheria announced on June 7 that it is expanding its Sky River Casino, with planned additions over the next three years including a hotel, an expanded gaming floor, and a pool and spa.

The expansion is divided into two phases. Phase 1 will bring a multistory, 1,600-space parking garage to the south Elk Grove site, along with a revamped valet service area and entryway. Phase 2 will include a 300-room hotel, 400 additional slot machines, an outdoor pool and a day spa, as well as event space and an additional high-limit and VIP gaming area.

The first phase is planned to complete construction by summer 2025 and the second phase by early 2027.

The rancheria and the casino operator, Boyd Gaming, made the announcement at an event that recalled efforts to gain federal recognition and framed Sky River within the tribe's work to maintain its culture. The announcement took place

less than a week before the 15th anniversary of Wilton Rancheria's restoration of federal recognition on June

During the event, tribal officials placed rancheria flags in planters of earth, which Tribal Chair Jesus Tarango said "signifies our presence, our commitment and resiliency to ourselves and our community."

"This expansion is not just about growing our facilities; it's about expanding our horizons. We are laying the foundation for a future filled with new possibilities for Wilton Rancheria and the entire region," Tarango

He later added, "Today represents our commitment

to reestablishing our cultural heritage and leaving a legacy of opportunity and prosperity for future generations."

In a speech, Sky River President Michael Facenda said the new slot machines would give Sky River a total of 1,500 slots. He said the hotel, planned for the north side of the existing building, would feature a restaurant, retail and a lobby bar. He said construction would not disrupt the experience of guests inside the casino building.

Sacramento County Sheriff Jim Cooper praised the rancheria's dedication to helping tribe members,

and Sacramento County Supervisor Pat Hume highlighted the "magnanimity" of the tribe as it sought recognition. Elk Grove Mayor Bobbie

Singh-Allen acknowledged the importance of federal recognition for Wilton Rancheria's sovereignty.

"My friends, you have always been sovereign; this is your land. You need no special piece of paper to recognize your self-worth," Singh-Allen said.

She cited the land acknowledgment adopted last year by the city of Elk Grove, which recognizes the Plains Miwok, and Wilton Rancheria caretakers of this land and these waterways since time immemorial.' As the event drew to

a close, Tarango came onstage with an eagle perched on his arm, a reference to the eagle on the rancheria's seal.

"The eagle takes everything that we do down here and takes it directly up to the creator," tribal Vice-Chair Raquel Williams said, asking the audience to give the eagle messages to carry. "So with the eagle, it signifies strength. With the eagle, it signifies beauty. And for the eagle here at Wilton Rancheria, it signifies our resilience and our resistance."

Speaking to the Herald after the event, Tarango said he felt a mixture of sadness and happiness:

"the sadness obviously because you're celebrating without people that are no longer with you. The happiness comes from those that are coming to us and we just don't know but we're doing something good for them.'

Tarango said Sky River is the tribe's "economic driver" that will allow the tribe to educate members about their culture.

Asked what message he would have the eagle carry, Tarango emphasized that the tribe is listening to its forebears.

"I would want the eagle to carry to our ancestors, letting them know that we remember where we come from. We hear you. We see you. We'll never forget you," Tarango said. "Because we need them."

Boring said that some deficit spending is planned in 2025-56, with spending exceeding revenue by \$112,000 or about 0.5%. He said that this was due to onetime expenses from the city's recently approved partnership with Galt District Chamber of Commerce.

"All of our recurring expenditures in General Fund are met with our recurring revenue, so we're not building in a structural deficit," Boring said.

The city is expected to see overall revenue of \$87.2 million and total spending of \$81.7 million in fiscal year 2024-25. In 2025-26, projected income is \$85.1 million while expenditures are \$91 million, a deficit that Boring attributed to capital

Vice-Mayor Rich Lozano questioned why the extra contributions to the Parks

and Recreation Fund would be necessary, and why all of the Measure Q revenue had been allocated.

Boring said the additional contributions wouldn't always be needed, adding that the Parks and Recreation Department has one-time expenses associated with the expansion to restore past service levels. Interim City Manager Chris Erias said he understood the 6% contribution to Parks and Rec to be a "minimum" that can be raised as needed.

Councilmembers Shawn Farmer and Kevin Papineau agreed with Lozano's concerns and asked for more information on the Measure Q spending, which they said was higher than they expected. Boring said staff would create a more detailed breakdown of the spending.

The budget proposal included \$1,000 in discretionary funds for each

councilmember. The money, which councilmembers had in the past donated to various nonprofit causes, was dropped several years ago in budget cuts. Lozano asked to have it removed, saying the funds are "inappropriate."

"I understand the intent of it and it's a very good intention. I just would not like to have it," Lozano said.

Farmer said the \$5,000 total is "peanuts" compared to the overall budget and supported discretionary funds as long as spending is "within our means."

Parks and Rec recommended creating an assistant special events manager position, which would concentrate on special events. Parks and Recreation director Armando Solis said this would allow Special Events manager Jackie Garcia to focus on boosting business at the Galt Market.

"Jackie's done an incredible job with our events throughout the city, including Saturday Market and Concerts in the Park, but those take a lot of time and the time it's taking away is from the Galt Market," Solis said. "There's been a couple comments made wanting to focus on the revenue at the market."

Maria Robles, Sacramento Mosquito and Vector Control District's public information officer, raised awareness about limiting sources of standing water, saying that the district last year had many times more West Nile virus cases in humans than in previous years. Robles said that the high numbers were driven partly by the wet winter. She said the district offers free mosquito repellent wipes and makes presentations for local organizations. Something Sweet Is June Business of Month

GALT, CA (MPG) - Something Sweet Bakery in Old Town Galt was named on June 6 as Galt District Chamber of Commerce's honorary business for the month of June.

Owner Desta Stenson said she started her bakery 14 years ago, offering cakes, cupcakes and other sweets, to accommodate growing demand for her cake-decorating skills.

Presenting a certificate to the business, the chamber's community relations director Kat Seabolt thanked Stenson for more than a decade of chamber membership. Chamber members toured the storefront and bakery on C Street and bought some cupcakes for later.

Sitting down with the Herald in Something Sweet's work area, Stenson said the bakery was prepping for six weddings that weekend. The scent of baking brownies filled the air.

"While I am going to start decorating wedding cakes here, my pastry chef is starting to make brownies and French macarons, and she already made lemon cheesecakes this morning," Stenson said.

Stenson voiced appreciation for the recognition from the chamber, saying that she enjoys Galt's "small town feel," which

reminded her and her husband of their childhoods in Lodi and Elk Grove. The couple bought a house in Galt when their daughter was young.

"We wanted to move to a small town and raise her in the same kind of environment we grew up in," Stenson said, adding that atmosphere was why she chose to locate in Old Town.

Something Sweet specializes in custom cake design, Stenson said, and sells 16 flavors of gourmet cupcakes each day, half of them permanent offerings and the other half seasonal. Other confections include cannoli and eclairs. Stenson emphasized that she is "picky" about the ingredients she uses, including local eggs and fresh

goods or goods that feel like your grandma made them," Stenson said. "Everything anymore is so overly processed and you just can't get that anywhere. Our ingredients don't come out of a bucket; they come off a tree."

Stenson's baking career started as a hobby, when she made and decorated her brother's wedding cake according to a recipe from their grandmother.

"I did that cake and so many people at that event liked it — it actually turned out pretty well — and next thing I know, friends of friends, then complete strangers, are asking me to do things," Stenson said.

The interest grew to the point that Stenson needed a storefront, which she

opened in 2010. Stenson retired in 2018 from her healthcare career at Kaiser Permanente in order to concentrate on the

"It is something that I love," Stenson said. "At Kaiser, I saw a lot of people when they were very sick and kind of on the worst day of their lives, and in this industry, I see people on their wedding day or their birthday. It's usually a celebration, and for me, it's amazing."

Something Sweet Bakery, at 440 C St., is open from 11 a.m. to 4 p.m. Wednesdays to Fridays and from 10 a.m. to 3 p.m.

Unsheltered Homelessness Decreases 41% in County, According to Point-In-Time Count

SACRAMENTO, CA (MPG) - The number of people living outdoors in the City and County of Sacramento plunged 41% between 2022 and 2024 — one of the largest decreases in homelessness statewide.

The biennial Point-in-Time Count released June 5 by the nonprofit Sacramento Steps Forward found that overall homelessness, including those living in emergency shelters, fell by 29% compared to the count two years ago.

Sacramento Steps Forward coordinates community-level efforts to end homelessness. Every two years, it recruits hundreds of volunteers to go out and count people who are unhoused throughout Sacramento County. This year's count, on Jan. 24 and 25, found 3,944 people living unsheltered, down from 6,664 people identified in the 2022 count.

The total number of unhoused people counted, including those in shelter and temporary housing, dropped by 29% from 9,278 to 6,615.

"These results are truly outstanding and, undeniably, reflect Sacramento City and County's 'all in' approach to addressing

this crisis," said Lisa Bates, CEO of Sacramento Steps Forward.

Leaders from Sacramento City and County said the decrease in unsheltered homelessness reflected the tens of millions of dollars invested by both local governments in standing up new emergency shelter beds and permanent supportive housing units, and an increasingly coordinated response to sharing resources and responsibilities.

There are still too many people who are homeless for us to declare victory, but maybe homelessness is not so intractable after all," said Sacramento Mayor Darrell Steinberg. "The 41% reduction in unsheltered homelessness is dramatic and affirms that the steady course we set seven years

ago to address this state and national crisis is working."

District 2 County Supervisor Patrick Kennedy also cited the work the county has been doing, including opening two Safe Stay sleeping cabin communities in his district.

A Safe Stay community now under construction on Stockton Boulevard in the city of Sacramento will include tiny homes provided to the city by the State of California. It will be run by the County through its partnership agreement with the

"It is encouraging to see positive results from the hard work we've been doing for years," Kennedy said. "The County has invested significant resources into new programs, services and shelter beds. I am proud to have many of these shelter beds in my district and more coming this year. Together, we're making a difference!"

Sacramento Steps Forward CEO Bates noted several significant factors that have helped ease the crisis of unsheltered homelessness in Sacramento, including:

Direct assistance from the state to cities, counties and Continuums of Care through the Homeless Housing, Assistance and Prevention Grant (HHAP) program. The city, county and Sacramento Steps Forward have received \$120 million in HHAP funding since 2019. HHAP currently pays for 97% of the city's emergency shelter beds.

The partnership agreement signed by the County and City in 2022 increased street outreach to homeless encampments with teams that include county behavioral health workers.

A sizable increase in emergency shelter and homeless housing capacity. The number of shelter and transitional housing beds in the city and county has increased by 84 percent from 2020 — to a total of 3,527 beds. The number of permanent supportive housing units has risen 30 percent, an increase of 1,001 units.

An easing of rents and the availability of apartments. Bates noted that the average apartment vacancy rate rose by 58% since 2022, with rents dipping by 3%.

The new Coordinated Access System funded by the City and County and run by Sacramento Steps Forward provides a centralized access point for shelter, housing and homelessness prevention services.

Birds, Mosquito Test **Positive for West Nile**

SACRAMENTO, CA (MPG) - On June 10, the Sacramento-

Yolo Mosquito and Vector Control District confirmed that the first mosquito sample of the season has tested positive for West Nile virus (WNV).

The mosquito sample was collected from the city of Sacramento, in the area of south Land Park in close proximity to the first positive bird reported last week.

"As we expected, the very warm weather we've had recently increased the number of mosquitoes and accelerated virus activity," said Gary Goodman, district manager. "It's important for residents to take these findings seriously and do everything they can to protect themselves," added Goodman.

As part of the laboratory results received June 10, two dead birds also tested positive for the disease.

Other counties throughout the state have also

started to report West Nile virus activity. Last year in California, there were 433 confirmed

human cases of the disease,

including 19 fatalities.

The detection of this recent WNV activity is evidence that the disease is present, and the public should take proper precautions to stay protected. "Summer is around the

corner and as more people

enjoy outdoor activities, it's important to remember that the best protection against mosquito bites is an effective insect repellent," said Goodman. Residents are also encouraged to report dead birds, neglected pools and other mosquito problems. As a response to the

finding of WNV, the district will increase its mosquito trapping and monitoring in the area to find sources where mosquitoes may be breeding. Targeted ground spraying may also be conducted to rapidly decrease the numbers of adult mosquitoes. For current infor-

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
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

A celebration of life will be held on June 28 at 11:00 at the Herald Baptist Church.

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

The Most Popular Veterans Benefits Don't Expire

While some people may think that the veterans benefits they have earned from military service could evaporate or disappear, this is inaccurate. The most popular veteran benefits have no expiration date. You can apply at any point and are not time-bound.

The three most popular veterans' benefits are disability compensation, home loan guaranty and education/G.I. Bill.

For these benefits, there are important dates to remember. If you miss those dates, you may be inconvenienced but these benefits are still available, providing you qualify.

Disability compensation

is a tax-free monthly payment based on an injury or disability that occurred during service. A veteran completes an application,

referred to as a claim. Accompanying this claim is information about their service and medical conditions. The Department of Veterans Affairs (VA) evaluates the claim and grants or denies benefits.

A disability compensation claim can be filed as early as 180 days prior to completion of active duty and throughout the remainder of a veteran's life. In short, there is no expiration date for disability compensation.

Many veterans file multiple claims throughout their lives as new conditions are identified or previously identified conditions worsen.

This is called a claim for an increase. There is no limit on how often this can be done.

There are two important dates to keep in mind relative to disability compensation. The first concerns the Intent to File. In advance of actually applying for disability compensation, you can complete an Intent to File form. This tells the VA that you will file in the next year and preserves the effective day (i.e., the date on which benefits will

begin).

For example, a veteran completes an Intent to File form establishing Feb. 1, 2024, as his/her effective date. After collecting all the needed information and forms, benefits are granted on Dec. 1, 2024. The first payment would include a retroactive payment reflecting the intent to file date of Feb. 1.

You can get assistance with your VA claim for no cost from an accredited representative such as your county veterans service officer or an accredited veteran's service organization, such as the American Legion, Disabled American Veterans or the VFW.

Home Loan Guaranty allows veterans to purchase a home with no money down.

This is a tremendous advantage over our civilian counterparts, who must

save for a down payment prior to purchasing a home. Subject to restrictions, this can even be used to purchase a mobile home or farm residence.

There is no time restriction on this benefit. It can be used repeatedly by veterans as they move and purchase new homes.

Education/G.I. Bill benefits are significant for veterans. Serve for three years and you can earn four years of free college. It can also be used for high-tech apprenticeships, advanced Science, Technology, Engineering, and Math training, and credentials and certificates.

In 2017, a new law, often known as the Forever G.I. Bill, was introduced. If your service ended on or after Jan. 1, 2013, this benefit will never expire.

If your service ended prior to Jan. 1, 2013, you

still could qualify for the Post 9/11 G.I. Bill or the Montgomery G.I. Bill for active duty or reservists. Each of these has an expiration date, so check those dates carefully at VA.gov.

Veterans' benefits are an important part of the rewards for military service and you can apply at VA.gov. The best time to learn about your benefits is well before applying for them. But remember, it's never too late to start and some of the most popular veterans benefits never expire.

A. Recita

WHEREAS, the City Council (the "City Council") of the City of Galt (the "City") has established the City of Galt Community Facilities District No. 2020-1 (Public Services), County of Sacramento, State of California (the "District") for the purpose of levying special taxes on parcels of taxable property therein for the purpose of providing certain services which are necessary to meet increased demands placed upon the City as a result of the development of said real property; and

WHEREAS, the rate and method of apportionment of special tax for the District is set forth in Exhibit "B" to the City Council Resolution No. 2024-24, which was adopted on April 16, 2024; and

WHEREAS the City has conducted proceedings to annex territory into the District and, with respect to the proceedings, following an election of the qualified electors in the territory proposed for annexation (the "Annexation Territory"), the City Council, on May 21, 2024, adopted a Resolution which declared the results of the special election and determined that the territory proposed to be annexed is added to and part of the District.

B. Ordinance

NOW, THEREFORE, THE CITY COUNCIL OF THE CITY OF GALT, CALIFORNIA, ACTING IN ITS CAPACITY AS THE LEGISLATIVE BODY OF THE CITY OF GALT COMMUNITY FACILITIES DISTRICT NO. 2020-1 (PUBLIC SERVICES), COUNTY OF SACRAMENTO, STATE OF CALIFORNIA, DOES ORDAIN AS FOLLOWS:

Section 1. The foregoing recitals are true and correct.

Section 2. By the passage of this Ordinance, the City Council hereby authorizes and levies the special tax within the District, including the Annexation Territory, pursuant to the Community Facilities District Law, at the rate and in accordance with the rate and method of apportionment of special tax set forth in Resolution No. 2024-24, which rate and method is by this reference incorporated herein. The special tax has previously been levied in the original territory of the District beginning in Fiscal Year 2020-21 pursuant to Ordinance No. 2020-03 passed and adopted by the City Council on June 16, 2020, and the special tax is hereby levied commencing in Fiscal Year 2024-25 in the District, including the Annexation Territory identified as Annexation No. 7, and in each fiscal year thereafter to pay for the services for the District and the costs of administering the District.

Section 3. The City Manager of the City or designee or employee or consultant of the City is hereby authorized and directed each fiscal year to determine the specific special tax to be levied for the next ensuing fiscal year for each parcel of real property within the District, including the Annexation Territory, in the manner and as provided in Resolution No. 2024-24.

Section 4. Exemptions from the levy of the special tax shall be as provided in Resolution No. 2024-24 and the applicable provisions of the Community Facilities District Law. In no event shall the special tax be levied on any parcel within the District in excess of the maximum special tax specified in Resolution No. 2024-24.

Section 5. All of the collections of the special tax shall be used as provided in the Community Facilities District Law and in Resolution No. 2024-24, including, but not limited to, the payment of the costs of the services, the payment of the costs of the City in administering the District, and the costs of collecting and administering the special tax.

Section 6. The special tax shall be collected in the same manner and at the same time as ordinary *ad valorem* taxes are collected and shall have the same lien priority, and be subject to the same penalties and the same procedure and sale in cases of delinquency as provided for *ad valorem* taxes; provided, however, that the District may collect Special Taxes at a different time or in a different manner if necessary to meet its financial obligations. The City Manager of the City, or his designee, is hereby authorized and directed to provide all necessary information to the auditor/tax collector of the County of Sacramento in order to effect proper billing and collection of the special tax, so that the special tax shall be included on the secured property tax roll of the County of Sacramento for Fiscal Year 2024-25 and for each fiscal year thereafter until no longer required to pay for the Services or until otherwise terminated by the City.

Section 7. If for any reason any portion of this Ordinance is found to be invalid, or if the special tax is found inapplicable to any particular parcel within the District, including the Annexation Territory, by a court of competent jurisdiction, the balance of this Ordinance and the application of the special tax to the remaining parcels within the District, including the Annexation Territory, shall not be affected.

Section 8. This ordinance shall take effect thirty (30) days after its final adoption as provided by Government Code Section 36937. Within 15 days after its final passage, the City Clerk shall cause this ordinance to be published in a newspaper of general circulation published and circulated in the City of Galt in accordance with Section 36933(c)(1) of the California Government Code.

The foregoing ordinance was introduced and the title thereof read at the regular meeting of the City Council the 21st day of May, 2024 and by unanimous vote of the Council members present, further reading was waived.

On a motion by Council Member Farmer, seconded by Council Member Lozano, the foregoing ordinance was duly passed and adopted by the City Council of the City of Galt at a regular meeting thereof, this 4th day of June 2024, by the following vote, to wit:

Notice of Regulatory Fee – Water Code Section 10730

The 2014 Sustainable Groundwater Management Act (SGMA) requires that each groundwater basin in the State be managed sustainably within its statutory timelines. Galt Irrigation District overlies the San Joaquin Valley Cosumnes River Subbasin and is one of the groundwater sustainability agencies (GSAs) responsible for SGMA compliance in that groundwater basin. GID carries out this effort as a member of the Cosumnes Groundwater Authority (CGA). If GID and its partner agencies in the CGA fail to act, or if the State determines that those actions are insufficient, the Subbasin would be subject to intervention and fees levied by the California State Water Resources Control Board.

SGMA authorizes a GSA to impose a fee on the extraction of groundwater or other regulated activity to fund the costs of a groundwater sustainability program. (Water Code, § 10730.) As a California Irrigation District and GSA, GID is separately authorized to levy fees to fund the costs of its groundwater management programs. Here, GID has partnered with CGA to develop a basinwide model for cost sharing and fee development to support the ongoing sustainable management of the basin.

Previously, these costs were funded by a \$10/acre charge on irrigated lands within GID. If the new fee structure is adopted, this prior charge will be updated to reflect the broader spread of beneficiaries and services provided in GID's current phase of SGMA implementation. Information supporting the fee and its calculation may be found at www.GID.specialdistrict.org.

Because the amount to be charged is attributable to the costs assigned to GID part of its participation in CGA (and the attendant groundwater management services that CGA coordinates on GID's behalf), the proposed fee does not outweigh the cost of providing this service to GID irrigators and groundwater users. By participating in this effort, GID will continue to ensure that its interests are represented in the basin, and that the required GSP is implemented in a timely fashion (thus avoiding potential state intervention).

GID will hold a public meeting to consider the proposed SGMA Management Fee on July 9, 2024 at 9:30 am at 12746 Ivie Road, Herald, CA 95638. 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Flag Day: A Salute to the Red, White and Blue

According to the Time and Date website, on July 14, 1777, the Continental Congress replaced the British symbols of the Grand union flag with a new design featuring 13 white stars on a field of blue and 13 red and white stripes: one for each

Although the Philadelphia seamstress Betsy Ross is popularly attributed with designing this early version of the flag, historians generally point to Francis Hopkinson as the creator. Hopkinson was a delegate from New Jersey and one of the signers of the Declaration of Independence.

In June 1886, Bernard Cidgrand made the first public proposal for the annual observance of the birth of the flag when he wrote an article titled "the Fourteenth of June" in the old Chicago Argus newspaper.

Cigrand's effort to ensure national observance of Flag Day finally came when President Woodrow Wilson issued a proclamation calling for a nationwide observance of the event on June14, 1916. However, Flag Day did not become



official until August 1949, when President Harry Truman signed the legislation and proclaimed June 14 as Flag Day.

In 1966, Congress also requested that the president issue annually a proclamation designating the week in which June 14 as Flag Day occurred as National Flag Week.

The president is requested to issue each year a proclamation to call on government officials in the United States to display the flag of the United States on all government buildings on Flag Day; and to urge United States residents to observe Flag Day as the anniversary of the adoption on June 14, 1777, by the Continental Congress of the Stars and Stripes as the official flag of the United States.

The flag started with 13 alternating red and white stripes with a blue rectangle in the upper corner and 13 stars in a circle. But with the addition of more states, the stars got smaller, and 50 stars now represent the 50 states, and the 13 stripes represent the original 13 states.

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
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

In my teens, I grew up in the Methodist church. I sang in choir, played handbells, joined the youth group and sat on the finance committee. I was a "Christian."

In my 20s, I moved to Denver and started traveling the world. Experiencing other cultures, I began to question my faith. I learned to embrace my authentic self and rewrite my beliefs according to my lived experience. I called myself a "former Christian."

In my 30s, I began a spiritual journey learning to acknowledge my inner light.

Recovering Christian Finds Church of the Inner Light

Organized religion seemed to emphasize the external God. Through my spiritual studies, I began to also see our inner divinity. Christians believe God is Love.

Though not necessarily aligned with any one faith, I believe Love is God. Given my upbringing, I began to use the term "recovering Christian."

Now in my 40s (all of two months), I took a trip last month to Honduras with Chispa Project, and I am now calling myself a "catholic." Not Catholic like the religion, but rather catholic in the true meaning of the word: the universal, undivided church.

The mission of Chispa Project is to partner with schools throughout Honduras to install libraries and bring books into classrooms.

Books empower kids with words. Children learn to tell stories. They read about different subjects. They learn critical thinking and engage their imaginations. Mostly run by Hondurans, the project is occasionally assisted by groups of volunteers who help local staff inaugurate a new

In April, I joined the Chispa Project along with almost 20 other volunteers for one week. I met up with the group at the newly modernized Comayagua International Airport. We were an odd-looking bunch, but I was curious to hear everyone's story.

After two hours of driving through lush green hills, we arrived at our destination close to Lago Yojoa. Honduras is a beautiful country where plants thrive, and life cannot help but burst forth everywhere. It felt symbolic of the abounding presence of life I hoped to experience that week in

Gathered in a circle, we introduced ourselves. Within minutes, it became clear that we were a diverse group ... diverse in terms of hometowns, ages, jobs, faith, sexualities, political ideologies and our lived experiences.

Back home, it would have been easy to draw lines and self-segregate. Instead, in Honduras, we spent a week volunteering together, and what a beautiful week it was.

I painted walls with Robert from Colorado, stickered books with Melissa from Florida, assembled bookshelves with Bob from South Carolina and organized classroom activities with Marianne from Tennessee. Throughout the week, I was afforded glimpses into the lives of more than 20 unique individuals.

Yes, we were incredibly different. Yet as volunteers, we became united in our actions as one collective family. There were many moments of levity and laughter and moments of sincere depth. Spending a week with these people, I came to see how we are all more alike than we are different. We all had an inner light: the Christ

In the rural countryside of Honduras, I was reminded of a line from the Apostle's

"I believe in the Holy Spirit, the holy catholic church ..." Truly, that week kindness and generosity united us all; we were each connected by the spirit of love. Though a stranger in foreign lands, I found a family; though a "recovering Christian" among diverse beliefs, I found a new home in the "catholic church."

Readers: I've returned from my cruise but I'm leaving for Honduras Sunday to help establish the 86th library for Chispa Project. Honestly, we still need some big last-minute donations to fully fund this library. Thank you - Norris

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













