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# Summer Internship Teaches, Pays

**WEST SACRAMENTO, CA (MPG) -** Some summer fun is unexpected.

Take a working internship, for example, where you get paid to gain experience in local government. The relaunch of the West Sacramento Summer STEPS Internship makes this possible.

Last utilized in 2019, the program started in 2015 and has helped many young adults find their calling. Public information officer Paul Hosley said nearly 20 young minds are soaking up everything in West Sacramento this season.

"Eighteen college interns have been divided among the different departments to learn about the city through guided tours, workshops and information sessions," Hosley said.

For the eight-week commitment position, interns must be enrolled in an accredited college or university.

Additionally, applicants must have a relevant academic major or interest in public service and demonstrate strong written and verbal communication skills.

Meeting all mandates offers entrance into the eight-week intensive program from June to August. According to the program description, it requires up to 30 hours a week of "unparalleled exposure to the inner workings of city administration."

Additionally, if accepted, interns can become "actively involved in meaningful projects that align with their academic majors, making tangible contributions to our community."

The internship offers successful applicants a salary ranging from \$18 to \$21 an hour, making the opportunity financially and educationally prosperous.

As an information officer, Hosley said, he sees first-hand how "the Continued on page 3

#### California Expands Access to Naloxone

#### SACRAMENTO, CA, (MPG)

- On June 21, Governor Gavin Newsom announced that CalRx-branded overthe-counter naloxone HCL nasal spray, 4 mg, will be available for free to eligible organizations through the Naloxone Distribution Project.

This follows the state's contract with Amneal Pharmaceuticals to purchase an over-the-counter naloxone nasal spray product through CalRx's Naloxone Access Initiative at a significantly lower price.

"The CalRx brand is more than a logo; it's a way to show that the state cares. CalRx is proof positive of California's innovation, business acumen, and most importantly, our heart. California is spending smarter by making life-saving drugs more affordable so that we stretch our dollars further – and make that same low price accessible to more people," Newsom said.

Eligible entities can obtain CalRx over-thecounter naloxone HCL nasal spray, for free through the California Department of Health Care Services Naloxone Distribution Project. CalRx is also working on an option for individuals to buy CalRx over-thecounter naloxone nasal spray directly. Additional details will be shared on the Naloxone Distribution Project website as they

become available.

In May alone, the state purchased approximately 24,000 units, leading to \$415,000 in savings. Since the Naloxone Distribution Project was created, more than 4,433,700 units have been distributed, and more than 277,000 lives have been saved.

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## Trail Extension Fights Compounding Carbon

**WEST SACRAMENTO, CA (MPG)** - Key stakeholders have one big goal: reducing carbon reduction.

Congresswoman Doris Matsui, Senator Bill Dodd, D-Napa, Yolo County and West Sacramento officials announced that the city will receive a \$1.9-million grant through the Sacramento Area Council of Governments (SACOG) Carbon Reduction Program.

"West Sacramento is

proud to be the gateway to the Great California Delta Trail network," Mayor Martha Guerrero said.

The City of West Sacramento has owned the trails' right-of-way from the Barge Canal locks to Pumphouse Road since 2005, when the city acquired it under the National Trails Act's "rails to trails" provisions.

## Aguiar-Curry Pregnancy Leave for Educators Act Passes

Office of Assembly Majority Leader Cecilia Aguiar-Curry News Release

SACRAMENTO, CA (MPG) - Assembly Majority Leader Cecilia Aguiar-Curry (D-Winters) announced that her Assembly Bill 2901 passed the Assembly Floor with resounding bipartisan support. This important legislation will grant public school employees, including community college faculty, up to 14 weeks of leave with full pay for

pregnancies and pregnan-

cy-related health issues.

Under current state law, if an educator who experiences pregnancy or pregnancy-related complications needs more time than the standard six weeks of leave, they must begin to use up their accrued sick leave. The lack of paid disability leave contributes to problems with attracting and retaining educators in the workforce, as many educators are

forced to leave the profession when they become pregnant and often do not return. In an environment where California schools and community colleges are having widespread difficulty hiring and retaining educators due in part to low pay, high housing costs, and other rising costs of living, penalizing women educators with a "gender penalty" in their retirement "throws gasoline on the fire.'

Educators who have exhausted their sick leave due to pregnancy, miscarriage, childbirth, termination of pregnancy, or recovery from those conditions are at a huge disadvantage — on average, women educators earn almost \$100,000 less in retirement than their male colleagues.

"A system that forces educators to use all their sick leave and pay for their own substitute in order to start a family is shocking. It is time we put an

end to this discriminatory practice that puts women at a massive financial disadvantage," said Cecilia Aguiar-Curry (D-Winters). "AB 2901 will create more equity in the education workforce and give educators and community college faculty the necessary time off to care for themselves and their children as we ask them to give so much to care for ours. It's time to stop asking them to sacrifice their financial security, the health of their families, and

the health of their school communities in order to do their critical jobs."

"I am very proud that California will be the first state in the nation to issue SUN Bucks benefits to our youth. As someone who depended on government assistance in order to combat childhood hunger, I know how critical it is to ensure that our children have access to food that supports their healthy growth and development," said Tony Thurmond, State Superintendent of Public

Instruction. "We know that the nutritional needs of our students do not take a break when school lets out. The combination of SUN Bucks and the California Universal School Meal Program shows our children that we are committed to showing up for them year-round."

"This historic legislation will fix a broken system for public school educators who go without any paid leave related to pregnancy. This disproportionately harms women as they are required to deplete their sick leave balances and creates a massive gap for women educators in retirement, "said Erika Jones, California Teachers Association Secretary-Treasurer. "We are excited to hear that this legislation is headed to the Assembly floor. The 310,000 educators in the California Teachers Union fully support this legislation and urge the Assemblymembers to do the same. The Time is Now. We must correct this discriminatory practice."

AB 2901 will end the discriminatory practice of giving pregnant employees across schools and community colleges no choice but to deplete their sick leave. This bill gives educators the time they deserve for pregnancy and matches the International Labor Organization's recommendation of 14 weeks for maternity leave. Further, the bill aligns with the goals of the Paid Family Leave Task Force convened by Gov. Newsom in 2019 by increasing leave access, providing better job protections, and expanding the length of coverage for a critical segment of California's workers.

# Still Need Your Landline? California Regulators Just Stopped AT&T From Pulling The Plug

**CALMATTERS.ORG** - California's Public Utilities Commission on June 20 rejected AT&T's application to stop providing landlines and other services in areas where there is no other option.

Its 4-0 vote came after a judge determined the application by AT&T California was "fatally flawed."

AT&T is the "carrier of last resort" for California, an official designation that means it covers most major cities, rural communities, and the land of more than 100 tribal governments. The commission first labeled AT&T a carrier of last resort nearly three decades ago.

More than a dozen speakers during the public comment period at the June 20 meeting supported keeping AT&T's carrier-of-last resort designation and landlines. Previously, more than 5,000 public comments were written in response to AT&T's application and nearly 6,000 people attended eight public forums held earlier this year

Numerous commenters said that, due to inconsistent cell coverage in their area, their landline is their primary means of communication with family, medical providers, and the outside world in the event of an emergency. Those concerns are particularly important for senior citizens, people with disabilities, and people who say they are sensitive to electromagnetic activity.

AT&T has argued that the people its landlines are now serving in the areas in question can turn to voice over internet service offered by cable providers or to mobile phone service offered by wireless providers like Verizon.

Steve Hogle lives in rural Sonoma County and told the commission on June 20 that spotty cell phone coverage was a danger to his family during the 2019 Kincade wildfire.

Kincade wildfire.

"If we didn't have a copper landline we would've not known about the evacuation

and the extremely serious fire that went

through here and most of our property," he said. "I don't want (voice over internet service) because if there's no power, there's no internet, and all these things are of extreme importance to the safety of this community."

The company has attempted to end carrier-of-last-resort designation obligations in roughly half of U.S. states, but those efforts don't always stay within the confines of the law, according to federal prosecutors. In 2022, AT&T Illinois agreed to pay a \$23 million fine to resolve charges it attempted to influence former Illinois House Speaker Mike Madigan.

The commission's decision does not bring an end to the carrier-of-last-resort debates in California. AT&T and roughly a dozen members of the California Legislature have publicly expressed support for Assembly Bill 2797, which would effectively bring an end to some carrier-of-last-resort obligations. The California State Association of Counties, Rural County Representatives of California, and Urban Counties of California said two weeks ago that they oppose the bill, adding in a letter to the bill's author that it would "leave large swaths of the most vulnerable Californians without reliable and affordable access to basic telephone service."

The Public Utilities Commission also voted on June 20 to begin proceedings to change rules for companies that are designated a carrier of last resort. It's time to modernize those rules, said commission president Alice Reynolds, because a lot has changed in the past 30 years, including a shift toward cell phones and away from landlines, and it's now part of the commission's mandate to make high-speed internet access universally available.

"I'm hopeful that through this new rulemaking, we can really modernize these programs and move toward the future to meet our broadband for all objectives," she said ahead of the vote.

# Equity Grading: Grade Inflation Dressed Up in Woke Clothing

As standardized student test scores plunge, some school districts are responding by masking student knowledge deficiencies through equity grading, which is little more than grade inflation dressed up in woke clothing.

There is little doubt that student learning across the country is at a dire level. On the 2022 National Assessment of Educational Progress, 69% of students taking the eighth-grade reading test failed to achieve at the proficient level, while 73% of eighth graders failed to score at the proficient mark on the math exam.

As their students are failing, school districts in California, New York, and other states are implementing equity grading, which eliminates penalties for late assignments, allows students to retake exams, and removes misbehavior as a grading factor.

Further, "zeroes" for failing to turn in homework and not taking tests are banned and, instead, students are given 50% scores.

Proponents of these changes justify them in the name of equity, which emphasizes the same outcomes for all students, regardless of merit-based factors such as punctuality and effort.

Education consultant and former teacher Joe Feldman, a top equity-grading advocate,

claims, "Many traditional grading policies that seem innocuous on the surface can reinforce existing disparities, rewarding students who already have more resources and punishing students who come to the classroom with fewer resources."

Feldman points to a California school district that implemented equity grading and saw the number of D and F grades fall by almost a third.

However, that result is

student achievement. The reason that fewer low grades are given under equity-grading practices is because of simple grade inflation, not because students are learning more and performing better.

Even more troubling than equity grading's mechanical inflation of grades is its misreading of student psychology.

When Janessa Tamayo, a New York City high school math teacher, switched to equity grading practices, fewer students did their homework. Also, fewer students participated in class, and many stopped taking tests seriously.

She said: "Grading for equity works fine for the small percentage of kids who are highly motivated. For the rest, it encouraged them to do the minimum."

Students themselves are often frustrated by equity-grading practices.

One California student said that teachers in his high school "offer retakes on tests, to the point where you could just flunk a first test and you don't have to study and then you could keep retaking it, and it's all in the name of equity."

Ill-prepared students who are not pushed to pursue perfection and avoid mistakes are being set up for failure in the job market.

According to a college math instructor in California, "When you're a software engineer you really have to drive towards perfection because every mistake that you make will show at some point and cost the company, so you're under a lot of stress to be perfect."

Unfortunately, "if you have an education system that is not encouraging that," and instead the system easily forgives mistakes, students will collide with reality in high tech because "that is not the way Silicon Valley works."

Rather than lowering grading standards, schools should implement higher grading practices that push students to try harder, which will lead to more learning. Despite its social-justice pretensions, equity grading is just another example of the soft bigotry of low expectations.



Congresswoman Matsui praised the partnership between the federal government, Sacramento Area Council of Governments, West Sacramento and the entire Yolo-Delta Trail Coalition.

"This investment underscores the importance of federal support for our local mission to address mobility barriers in underserved communities and reduce carbon emissions," Matsui said.

Senator Dodd said the project will provide multiple benefits, including reduced carbon emissions and recreational opportunities.

"I am pleased to support its funding and applaud Yolo County and West Sacramento for advancing it, along with the Yolo Transportation District and Delta Protection Commission," Dodd said of the grant that will promote, design and acquire the last-mile right-of-way for the Great California Delta Trail – Clarksburg Branch Line Trail Extension project, bringing the trail from the city limits

to Clarksburg. Yolo County Supervisor Oscar Villegas said he is excited that the long-term project has come to fruition, bringing amenities to the West Sacramento and Clarksburg recreation corridor.

"The next steps in our rails-to-trails project, that is 20 years in the making, will allow for the Great Delta Trail expansion to serve as a recreational corridor for generations to come," Villegas said. "The project encourages our community to get out and get active along the trail and supports our climate efforts in the region to reduce carbon emissions by utilizing alternate forms of transportation."

Some project highlights include facilitating safe, active recreation, promoting connectivity between neighborhoods and communities, and catering to equestrians.

The trail also proposes integrating high-speed fiber optic connectivity at the utility corridor, which can offer interpretive signs and design elements reflecting the city's history.

Three executive directors could not say enough about the project and funding.

Delta Protection Commission Executive Director Bruce Blodgett said his group is "eager to work with our partners to study the proposed extension of the Clarksburg Branch Line and to ensure Delta residents' needs and concerns are addressed as the Great California Delta Trail grows."

Yolo Transportation District Executive Director Autumn Bernstein said that Yolo Transportation District is excited to partner on the Clarksburg Branch Line Extension.

"This project is a great opportunity to jumpstart our Yolo Active Transportation Corridors plan, establishing a roadmap for a safe and inviting network of off-street paths connecting Yolo County communities," Bernstein said.

This 6.4-mile bike/ pedestrian trail extension is identified in the Sacramento Area Council of Governments Regional Trail network, the Great California Delta Trail Master Plan, the Yolo Transportation District Active Transportation Plan, and West Sacramento's Bicycle, Pedestrian, and Trails Master Plan.

Sacramento Area Bicycle Advocates (SABA) Executive Director Deb Banks said that the Clarksburg Branch Line trail is an excellent amenity for West Sacramento and Sacramento cyclists and pedestrians.

"It links the cities to Delta communities with a low-stress bikeable, walkable trail in a beautiful setting," Banks said, adding it benefits tourism and completes the regional trail network. "Sacramento Area Bicvcle Advocates is thrilled and looks forward to riding it in the near future."

Both the congresswoman and senator tout the overall opportunities that the new project

The Economic Development Department still has a listing for the summer program, noting the role allows hands-on learning "in various department projects and initiatives that contribute to the economic growth and prosperity of our city."

Speaking of prosperity, the Home Run Internship mer plan, kicked off June 10 at the West Sacramento Community Center with a half-day training event and an intern-supervisor luncheon. "This City of West

Sacramento program, which began in 2017, provides paid internships to local high school students and recent graduates," Hosley said.

Hosley said city officials work with the West Sacramento Chamber of Commerce and the Washington Unified

School District to place interns with local businesses, nonprofit organizations, city government and the school district. The interns gain real-world work experience and mentoring.





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


teen writer herself.

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## **Social Security Matters**

#### Why is there a Social Security **Earnings Limit?**

Dear Rusty: I try to read your article in the Carmichael Times each week and appreciate the information you provide. I am 62 and considering my retirement options and when I should do that to get the most benefit. I understand my full retirement age is 67, but what I don't understand, and I hope you can answer, is why there is such a thing as the Social Security earnings limit? I know that if I was to retire before 67, my benefits would be reduced. But since I have been paying into SS for 45+ years, and that money is technically money I have earned, why does SS care if I make more than the earnings limit? It doesn't affect them or my benefits. Can you tell me about the reasoning behind the earnings limit? I will, for many years after "retiring," continue working in my field. Signed: Working American

Dear Working American: This is a great question and, as a point of interest, our parent company, the Association of Mature American Citizens (AMAC), advocates doing away with Social Security's earnings test which affects those collecting benefits before reaching their SS full retirement age (FRA). In AMAC's view, it discourages people from working and, thus, paying Social Security taxes on their earnings. It is, after all, SS taxes from the earnings of working Americans which largely pays for the benefits provided to Social Security beneficiaries. Eliminating the restriction would tend to improve Social Security revenue and help ease Social Security's current financial stress.

The reasoning behind the earnings test? Well, when Social Security was first enacted in the 1930s, the intent was that Social Security was for retired workers, meant to keep them from poverty in old age. The logic back then was that if a person worked they didn't need Social Security to sustain them, so those who worked could not collect Social Security at all. The current rule, after many adjustments over the years, says that annual earnings for those who collect early SS benefits are limited. If each year's earnings limit (\$22,320 for 2024) is exceeded, Social Security will take away \$1 in benefits for every \$2 over the limit (FYI, the penalty is less severe in the year FRA is attained).

gest that the reasoning behind the wording in the original Social Security Act - that "No person shall receive such oldage annuity unless . . . he is not employed by another in a gainful occupation" - was quite controversial, except for the fundamental thought that if someone worked they didn't need Social Security. Over the ensuing decades the rule has been softened to provide that only those who collect benefits before their full retirement age (FRA) would have a portion of

their SS benefits offset by their work earnings. In any case, the earnings test, in its mitigated form, still persists today. FYI, H.R. 5193 - The Senior Citizens Freedom to Work Act was recently introduced in Congress proposing to repeal the SS earnings test but has not advanced in the legislative process since introduced in August 2023.

In any case, under current rules, if you continue working after your FRA, the earnings test will not apply to you. And, if you lose any benefits before your FRA due to the earnings test, when you reach your FRA you'll get time credit for any months that benefits were withheld, resulting in a somewhat higher monthly payment after your full retirement age.

One final point: if you continue to work after starting your Social Security benefits and your recent earnings are higher than any of those in the inflation-adjusted 35 years used to originally calculate your benefit, your entitlement will be recalculated to give you credit for those higher recent earnings.

#### In Rain, Snow and Drought, California's Fights Over Water Rights, Supplies Persist

Legal rights to use water — particularly those obtained prior to 1914 — lie at the heart of California's perpetual wrangling over the allocation of increasingly limited water supplies.

For years state officials have been trying, with limited success, to reduce farmers' diversions, increase river flows and restore declining numbers of fish, particularly salmon, and other wildlife.

The conflict occurs even during periods when the state receives abundant rain and snow and its reservoirs are full. But it becomes more intense during the state's periodic droughts, as illustrated by what happened in 2014 when then-Gov. Jerry Brown, citing "one of the driest years in recorded state history," proclaimed a state of emergency.

The state Water Resources Control Board began notifying agricultural water agencies that they must curtail diversions from the Sacramento and San Joaquin river watersheds — essentially the entire Central Valley — having "determined that the existing water supply ... is insufficient to meet the needs of all water rights holders."

The state clearly had the authority to curtail diversions by agencies, with rights granted after the state assumed managerial control of California water in 1914—ironically exactly one century

earlier. However, those with pre-1914 rights balked, contending that under state law the board could not order them to decrease diversions.

Political and legal squabbling ensued and the issue wound up in the courts, and in 2022 an appellate court ruled that the water board did not have legal authority to order pre-1914 rights holders to reduce diversions.

Although the case centered on the board's drought-induced curtailment orders, everyone involved knew that the outcome could affect the larger issue of water rights and the overall allocation of water supplies.

Environmental groups that had been pressing the board to become more assertive on water rights were disappointed.

"A recent decision by California's Sixth District Court of Appeal highlights everything that's wrong with California water law," two officials of CalTrout, one of the environmental groups, wrote in a guest commentary for CalMatters two years ago, adding, "the decision shields a class of property owners whose rights were enshrined in law at a time when the rights of citizenship, land ownership and common decency were only afforded to a privileged few."

Farm interests were, of course, pleased with the decision as they sparred with the water board over the larger issue of how much water must remain in rivers to support wildlife.

Environmental groups have urged the board to issue new water quality standards for the Sacramento-San Joaquin Delta that would indirectly reduce agricultural diversions. Jerry Brown and his successor, Gavin Newsom, have urged

the adoption of "voluntary agreements" on diversions without a legal showdown over water rights, but that effort has not yet succeeded.

Last year, legislation was introduced to bolster the water board's curtailment authority, implementing a report by UC Berkeley's Center for Law, Energy and the Environment, underwritten by the water board, recommending that "the state needs to implement curtailments on a regular basis, not only in times of extreme crisis."

The most important, Assembly Bill 1337, would have given the water board direct authority to order curtailments of pre-1914 rights holders. However, it sat in limbo for more than a year until its author, Assemblywoman Buffy Wicks, an Oakland Democrat, finally dropped it this month.

The only survivor is AB 460, by Assemblywoman Rebecca Bauer-Kahan, a San Ramon Democrat, which would increase fines for illegal water diversions and is blessed by a multi-party agreement.

The drought orders, the appellate court decision and the non-action by the Legislature this year indicate that California's water rights remain a major bone of legal and political contention as the larger struggle over water allocation continues.

## Committee Clears Senator Dodd's Wheelchair Users Legislation

SACRAMENTO, CA (MPG) - On June 21, Sen. Bill Dodd, D-Napa, announced the advancement of the legislation aimed at granting power wheelchair users the right to repair their own equipment. This initiative aims to eliminate delays that could otherwise immobilize users, while also reducing costs for one of California's most vulnerable populations.

"The focus of this bill is enhancing quality of life for people with mobility issues," Sen. Dodd said. "The proposal allows power wheelchair users to get their wheelchairs fixed in an efficient and timely manner when things go wrong. Because it is essential that those who rely on wheelchairs can be operating as soon as possible."

Under existing law, manufacturers of power wheelchairs are not required to provide information or replacement parts directly to consumers or independent repair shops. Colorado became the first state in the nation to address the issue, adopting a right-to-repair laws that granted wheelchair owners and independent shops access to parts, manufacturer software, specialized tools and other items needed to ensure timely and affordable wheelchair repair.

In California, Sen. Bill Dodd's Senate Bill 1384 ensures the same right to repair for California wheelchair users and streamline the process for getting complex rehabilitation technology repaired. Among other things, it requires independent repair shops to require written notice to consumers before conducting repairs and establishes guidelines on what parts can be replaced.

The bill is supported by advocates including Sacramento disability rights activist and wheelchair user Russell Rawlings. Senate Bill 1384 was approved

by the Assembly Privacy committee after previously clearing the Senate.

"If you have a power chair and are using it daily, it needs regular maintenance," Rawlings said. "But the industry as it stands has very little interest in making repairs. There can be months if not longer of waiting time. This bill seeks to change that by making it easier for owners and smaller shops to fill the repair need. Also, power chairs are increasingly controlled by software that is currently restricted to a small number of vendors. Owners having access to these tools would enable more freedom and ability to control their driving experiences."

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
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
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#### **Public Health Confirms Measles Case in Yolo County**

WOODLAND, CA (MPG) - Yolo County Health and Human Services Agency's Public Health Branch has confirmed that two residents who recently returned from international travel are infected with measles. These are the 10th and 11th persons diagnosed with measles in California during 2024. The last measles case in Yolo County occurred in 2015.

The children, who were not vaccinated against measles, have mild illnesses and are recovering at home, according to the Yolo County agency.

Measles is highly infectious, spreading through the air over long distances and through contact with contaminated surfaces. Contact tracing done by Public Health indicates that the individuals visited healthcare facilities in Sacramento County while they were infectious and might have exposed patients, visitors and healthcare providers at the following venues:

Kaiser Permanente South Sacramento Emergency Department, 6600 Bruceville Road, Sacramento; June 12 between 3:30 a.m. and 5 a.m.

Kaiser Permanente Downtown Commons Pediatric Clinic, 501 J St., Sacramento; June 12 between 10:23 a.m. and 11:45 a.m.

Kaiser Permanente South

Sacramento Emergency Department, 6600 Bruceville Road, Sacramento; June 14 to 15 between 10:20 p.m. and 2:10 a.m. Kaiser Permanente Downtown

Kaiser Permanente Downtown Commons Pediatric Clinic, 501 J St., Sacramento; June 17 between 10:48 a.m. and 1 p.m.

Kaiser Permanente has identified and contacted patients and employees who might have been exposed by being in close proximity to the persons with measles. However, there might be visitors also exposed who have yet to be identified. Individuals who were at the above locations during the dates and times listed could be at risk of developing measles and are advised to contact Kaiser Permanente or Sacramento County Public Health's Communicable Disease Program at 916-875-5881, or Yolo County Public Health's Communicable Disease Program at 530-490-3953. A specialized team is available to determine whether residents are at risk and whether preventive measures, such as vaccination with MMR, are recommended.

"If you weren't at the Kaiser Permanente South Sacramento **Emergency Department or Kaiser** Permanente Downtown Commons Pediatric Clinic during the dates and times listed, there is no risk of getting measles from these individuals," said Dr. Aimee Sisson, Yolo County public health officer. "However, this case highlights the risk of getting infected with measles during international travel, especially if you aren't vaccinated. If you are planning a trip overseas, please make sure you and the people traveling with you are up to date with measles vaccinations."

Measles can be prevented with a measles, mumps, and rubella vaccine (MMR) or a measles, mumps, rubella, and varicella vaccine (MMRV). They are administered in two doses (typically given at 1 year old and 4 to 6 years old) and are highly effective: two doses are

97% effective in preventing measles and one dose is 93% effective.

Globally, vaccinations against measles fell during the COVID-19 pandemic and cases of measles have surged in many countries. Public Health encourages all residents, especially those planning international travel, to confirm their measles vaccination status. If they have not had measles in the past (every person born in the U.S. before 1957 is assumed to have had measles) and are not up to date with MMR vaccination, they are at risk of contracting measles if they are exposed and should contact their healthcare provider for vaccination. Children between 6 months and 1 year old can get an early MMR dose before travel, as can children between 1 and 4 years old.

People typically develop symptoms eight to 12 days after exposure to measles. Measles symptoms begin with fever, cough, red and watery eyes and a runny nose, followed by a rash three to five days later that starts on the head and spreads downward. Measles can result in serious complications and even death for young children and vulnerable adults. Exposed people with symptoms should stay home and away from others and immediately contact Public Health. Persons needing care for their measles symptoms should call their healthcare provider's office in advance, rather than visit an office directly, so that the facility can take measures to prevent exposure to others.

Nearly all health insurance plans are required to cover the cost of MMR and MMRV vaccines. Insured persons should check with their healthcare provider or local pharmacy to see what vaccines are offered. Uninsured or underinsured children and adults can access free or low-cost vaccines at clinics enrolled in the Vaccines for Children (VFC) and Vaccines for Adults (VFA) programs.
