In recognition of Girl Scouts' highest awards, quite



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# Milford 'Yellow Dot' program alerts first responders to medical or behavioral conditions



The Town of Milford participates in the Yellow Dot program.

According to www.milfordpolice.org, "The Yellow Dot is a program that provides first responders with quick access to critical medical information about the occupants of a motor vehicle in the event of an accident or health emergency. This program is perfect for anyone [who] has a loved one with a medical or behavioral condition." The program is free.

#### How it works

Yellow Dot stickers, and additional information, are available at the Milford Police Station and the senior center. Police will also deliver a sticker to your home (call the station to make arrangements). Place the sticker on the driver's side rear window of the car. "In the event of an emergency, the Yellow Dot Decal alerts responders that critical medical information is in the glove compartment of the vehicle."

#### Why it works

Milford Police Chief Robert Tusino said the Yellow Dot initiative has been an effective tool for the town. "What this does is it gives a 'heads up' to the officers. It really helps the officer gain a perspective on the people that he or she is interacting with."

# MHS Boys' Volleyball earns 3rd straight final four bid

New division? No problem for the Milford High boys' volleyball team. After earning spots in the state semifinal game in Division II in each of the past two seasons, the Scarlet Hawks marched to the final four again this spring after being bumped up to Division I.

"I thought we played pretty well in the tournament," said head coach Andrew Mainini after MHS bowed out against Needham in the semifinal.

Milford knocked off Newton South, Lincoln-Sudbury, and

Methuen enroute to the final four. The Scarlet Hawks staged a comeback during the first set of the LS match, and earned sweeps against Newton South and against Methuen in the round of eight.

"We ran into Needham and there is no other way to put it, we didn't play well as a team and they didn't really make too many mistakes," Mainini said. "It was kind of a disappointing end to the season, but it was a great road getting there."

Alex Guerra continued to lead the MHS attack through the postseason and picked up his 1,000th career kill in the Methuen match.

"One thousand kills is even more rare than scoring 1,000 points in basketball," Mainini said. "That was a really cool accomplishment for him."

Arthur Gomes served well for MHS during the playoffs. The Hawks also received a boost from freshman Mayck Moreira.

"He served really well for us in our last two wins and helped us get both of those victories," his coach said.

Milford is graduating nine se-

niors, most of whom were in the starting lineup at some point this season. Mainini is still optimistic for next year.

"It's a big loss, but we were able to see some of our younger talent get on the court this year and we are excited about that," he said. "People might not be expecting us to be good next year, but we expect to be good."

In addition to Moreira, Milford figures to be led by Gus Da Silva next season after he emerged as the second leading attacker on the floor at the end of this spring. Mainini said the program also has young talent and depth at the setter position. The impact made by the class of 2024 will also reverberate, Mainini said, pointing out that this group was the first to play together since 7th grade in the newly-established middle school program. Mainini said their dedication to improving rubbed off on the rest of the team.

"These guys were great leaders, because they modeled high expectations for themselves and for the younger guys," he said. "They set us up for success for the next couple of years."







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# Milford Dana-Farber patient with breast cancer hosts 'Chemo Coffee Talk' podcast from infusion chair

BOSTON - Carly Fauth of Milford has relied on the joyful and inspiring qualities of her closest friends and family for comfort throughout her cancer journey. Now she is providing wider insight into their most admirable traits while normalizing cancer for all in her new Spotify podcast, "Chemo Coffee Talk."

Fauth, a fitness instructor and mom of two sons who was diagnosed with breast cancer in January 2024, said she got the idea after being invited on a similar podcast to discuss her FitFun-Carly community embracing 15-minute daily workouts.

"I knew I wanted to have chemo buddies to take my mind off my anxiety. I was petrified not knowing what the treatments would feel like, when my hair would start falling out, how much strength I'd lose, and just the whole process from a physical standpoint," Fauth said.

"I also wanted to raise awareness that while nobody wants cancer, there are a lot of silver linings," she added. "We all go through things in life that are extremely unpleasant and hard to take. These times can often break you down to depths you never even knew existed and leave you questioning if you can handle it. It's in these moments, though, that you can sometimes find your biggest strength."

Recorded from her infusion chair during bimonthly treatment sessions at the Dana-Farber Brigham Cancer Center at Milford Regional Medical Center, each episode is approximately 20 minutes long – or roughly the time it takes to savor a good cup of coffee. After giving a quick health update, Fauth discusses lessons learned from the quality she most admires in the person who is supporting her during treatment that day.

Past conversations have delved into the inherent kindness of her husband, Tim Fauth, assistant principal of Fuller Middle School in Framingham; the problem-solving skills of her former business partner, Lisa Campopiano; the humor of her younger brother, Chris Nyland; and the effortless style of her client, interior designer Brenda Chiaradonna.

Fauth has also involved some of her caregivers at Dana-Farber Brigham at Milford, including Associate Medical Director Natalie Sinclair, MD. Featured guests on the June 26 episode will include infusion nurse Lauren McCarthy, RN, who is a former Jimmy Fund Clinic patient.

Born with sacrococcygeal teratoma, McCarthy underwent surgeries at 1 day old and when the tumor grew back 16 months later. This August, she will celebrate being cancer-free for 28 years.

In her two years working at Dana-Farber Brigham at Milford, McCarthy said Fauth is her first patient to ask to do a podcast during treatment – or host one at all.

"I think it's a great way for Carly to come in feeling excited because treatment can be very anxiety-provoking and daunting," said McCarthy, whose four grandparents – and more

recently, an aunt – were also treated at Dana-Farber. "When I was a kid, I remember all the nurses and staff were so nice, and the atmosphere was so inviting, which made it easier when I had to come in for check-ups. It was always my goal to work at Dana-Farber and give back, and it's been everything I hoped for – and more, honestly."

Fauth said she feels "privileged" that McCarthy and other clinicians at Dana-Farber Brigham at Milford have joined her most trusted circle. She wants others diagnosed with cancer to know they, too, can "live with it and through it" – especially when similarly surrounding themselves with "really great people whose support has the power to lift you up and change your experience."

"Cancer treatment is not fun at all, and I can't wait until it's over, but I feel accomplished," Fauth said. "The response [to the podcast] has been over-thetop, with people enjoying it and even submitting additional questions they want me to answer. I hope it's helping others as much as it's helping me."



# What to know before 'reversing' your retirement

If you've retired, you may have thought you closed the book on one chapter of your life. But what happens if you need to "reverse" your retirement?

Due to higher inflation and rising interest rates, many retirees are taking out more money from their retirement accounts than they had originally anticipated. As a result, some are headed back to the workforce. If you're thinking of joining them, you'll need to consider some factors that may affect your finances.

First, if you've been taking Social Security, be aware that you could lose some of your benefits if you earn over a certain level, at least until you reach your full retirement age, which is likely between 66 and 67. Specifically, if you are under your full retirement age for the entire year, Social Security will deduct \$1 from your benefit payments for every \$2 you earn above the annual limit, which, in 2024, is \$22,320. In the year you reach your full retirement age, Social Security will deduct \$1 in benefits for every \$3 you earn above a different limit, which, in 2024, is \$59,520.

Social Security will only count your earnings up to the month before you reach your

full retirement age, at which point your earnings will no longer reduce your benefits, regardless of how much you earn. Also, Social Security will recalculate your benefit amounts to credit you for the months your payments were reduced due to your excess earnings. Social Security also allows you to pay back early benefits received if you withdraw your application within 12 months of starting benefits. This move could help you receive substantially higher benefits at full retirement age.

Your Social Security isn't the only benefit that could be affected by your earnings. Your Medicare Part B and Part D premiums are based on your income, so they could rise if you start earning more money. Also, your extra income could push you into a higher tax bracket.

Nonetheless, you can certainly gain some benefits by returning to the working world. Obviously, you'll be making money that can help you boost your daily cash flow and possibly reduce some debts. But depending on where you work, you might also be able to contribute to a 401(k) or other employer-sponsored retirement plan. And regardless of where you work, you'll be eligible to contribute to an IRA. By putting more money into these accounts, you may well be able to strengthen your financial position during your retirement years. You might also be able to receive some employee benefits, such as group health insurance — which could be particularly valuable if you haven't yet started receiving Medicare.

In addition to the potential financial advantages of going back to work, you might get some social benefits, too. Many people enjoy the interactions with fellow workers and miss these exchanges when they retire, so a return to the workforce, even if it's on a part-time basis, may give you an emotional boost.

In the final analysis, you'll want to weigh the potential costs of going back to work against the possible benefits. There's no one right answer for everyone, but by looking at all the variables, you should be able to reach a decision that works for you.

# Summer eye safety

We all use sunscreen to protect our skin, but don't forget to protect your eyes as well. Summertime means more time spent outdoors, and studies show that exposure to bright sunlight may increase the risk of developing cataracts and growths on the eye, including cancer. The same risk applies when using tanning beds, so be sure to protect your eyes from indoor UV light as well. Sunlight reflected off sand and water can cause photokeratitis, the condition responsible for snow blindness, so beachand pool-goers: Take note.

Independence Day is just around the corner. Your 4th of July holiday usually ends with enjoying professional fireworks and maybe even lighting a few of your own in the backyard. Before you light your first bottle rocket or sparkler, let's talk about the dangers of fireworks and how to keep you and your loved ones safe.

Most firework injuries happen in a one-month span from late June to late July. Each year approximately 16000 people visit an emergency room because of a fireworks-related injury, and there are 18 deaths. The number of people sustaining minor injuries not requiring an ER visit is thought to be much higher. The most common injuries are to the hands and fingers, legs, head, face, ears and arms. Sometimes people pick up packs of fireworks at the grocery store thinking they're safe because they're small and don't produce large displays. Often, these are the fireworks we give or use close to children. Consider the number of ER trips these common, "safer" fireworks cause each year. Many of us think the people most at risk of getting injured are those lighting the fuse, but bystanders are the most at risk. Those on the sidelines account for 65% of all ER visits for firework-related

Eye injuries caused by fireworks are very common and

can have devastating effects. Your eyes are delicate, and any fireworks injury could potentially cause permanent damage. Sparks, flames, smoke, and flying pieces of debris are all hazards inherent in any display. The four most common eye injuries are: detached retina, scratches on the cornea, ruptured eyeball and burns. Any eye injury can lead to long-term vision problems or even blindness. If your eve has been hurt, seek medical attention right away. Please leave fireworks to the professionals and let's all enjoy a safe 4th.

UV radiation, whether from natural sunlight or indoor artificial rays, can damage the eye's surface tissues as well as the cornea and lens. Unfortunately, many people are unaware of the dangers UV light can pose. By wearing UV-blocking sunglasses, you can enjoy the summer safely while lowering your risk for potentially blinding eye diseases



and tumors. It is important to start wearing proper eye protection at an early age to protect your eyes from years of ultraviolet exposure.

Everyone of any age and any degree of skin pigmentation is susceptible to UV damage. Children are particularly susceptible to UV damage. People with light colored eyes may have an increased risk of certain eye diseases tied to UV exposure, including eye cancer. Some studies show that people with certain eye diseases such as retinal dystrophy may be at greater risk for UV-related sun damage.


Cataract is a clouding of the eye's lens. The lens must

be clear in order to focus light properly onto the retina. Extensive exposure to the sun is one of the major reasons why we develop cataracts. Cataract surgery is by far the most common surgery performed in the United States.

According to a national Sun Safety Survey conducted by the American Academy of Ophthalmology, only about half of people who wear sunglasses say they check the UV rating before buying. The good news is that you can easily protect yourself.

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# Milford's first Free Little Art Gallery at town library

The Milford Cultural Council has introduced the town's first Free Little Art Gallery ("FLAG") which can be found on the grounds of the Milford Town Library.

A FLAG is like a Little Free Library, but for small works of art rather than books.

The artwork inside is made by anyone of any age who chooses to participate. Visitors who see something they like in the gallery can take it home for free or create something that they want to add to the gallery for others to enjoy.

While it is not necessary for people to make art in order to take art, the MCC does hope that visitors will consider making something for the gallery throughout the year. MCC has provided art supplies that can be picked up at the library via the reference desk.

Artwork that is no more than four inches in height is generally sought for the gallery. Work can



# Going, Going, Gone! BVT to comply with records regulations

#### Class of 2017: Destruction of student records is August 1

UPTON – Attention Blackstone Valley Regional Vocational Technical High School Class of 2017. Per state and federal regulations, temporary student records, including special education files (IEP), 504 plans, and student health records, shall be destroyed seven years after the student leaves the school. For the Class of 2017, this date is August 1, 2024.

Members of the Class of

2017 may request their temporary student record (any information not contained in their transcript) before the August 1 shred date by written request. If you want to obtain your record, please send a written request indicating the year of graduation and your name while in school to Blackstone Valley Regional Vocational Technical High School, Student Services Record Dept., 65 Pleasant Street, Upton, MA 01568.

Student transcripts (a record of grades) shall be destroyed 60 years after the student leaves the school. For the Class of 2017, that date is August 1, 2077. An alum from that class may request a transcript from their graduation date: May 2017 through August 1, 2077.

"To have the experience of playing on a stage like that was great," he said. "They played hard, they competed, they got everything out of it."


After a pair of single-digit victory totals coming out of the pandemic, Milford won 13 games last year and earned 17 wins this spring. The last time a Milford team went this far in the tournament was 1997, when the Scarlet Hawks advanced to the state title game.

Keith Lee capped off his high school career by catching every game and hitting in the three spot in the order. Dion called Lee "our leader on and off the field."

Nick Koch was Milford's top player through the tournament, Dion said, and the Carter brothers — Damien and Ian — carried the burden on the mound. Damien Carter won the firstround game, Ian earned the win in the second game after closing out the first, and the two games back to start the last two games of the year. The pair, along with Anthony Lapierre, threw the vast majority of the innings for the Hawks.

Starting second baseman Lou Consigli was another key cog, hitting in the two-spot and finishing second on the team in hits. "He is another guy who provided a lot of leadership on the field," Dion said.

Dion said a season like this

has the chance to have a longlasting effect.



# **Strong start for Milford Legion**

Post 59 eyes top of Zone 4 standings

The Milford Legion baseball team is out to a solid start to the 2024 summer despite a couple of significant injuries, and manager Steve DiVitto said his team should be good enough to compete with the best teams in a very talented zone.

"This is the best zone in the state, we know that it is a highly, highly competitive zone," DiVitto said. "We are going to compete for it though. We have six teams that make the playoffs this year and there are just as many teams that could win it."

Milford picked up wins in five of its first eight games despite losing Nick Koch and Louis Consigli to season-ending injuries.

"Those are two outstanding players at the top of our lineup," DiVitto said. "We are just going to keep batting. The guys have done a great job continuing to play and play hard. We are starting to gel a little bit, which is great."

Driving the Milford offense has been catcher Keith Lee, a Milford High product. Four of his first seven hits of the season went for extra bases, including three doubles and a home run.

"The kid just hits," DiVitto said. "I am not sure the last time I saw someone hit a ball as hard as he does every single time he is up."

Damien Carter is a player who has caught fire at the plate though the early part of the season and DiVitto praised his contributions on the mound as well. Ian Carter put together a strong pitching outing against Northbridge early in the year and went toe-to-toe with a Hudson starter considered one of the best in the area.

Nipmuc's Josh Giancola is another strong two-way threat, hitting north of .300 and not surrendering an earned run through his first six innings. "He has done a great job at the plate, and on the mound," his skipper said.

Sean McGee delivered three extra base hits and a .346 average through the first eight games of the year. DiVitto said McGee is "just rock solid."

Milford is hoping to drum up significant interest in the

team this summer through a number of theme nights at home games, including Alumni Night on July 7. That game will feature a pregame ceremony honoring the 2013 and 2014 Post 59 teams, the last two to win state championships. The evening may provide some inspiration for this year's team.

"We have been competitive in every game we have been in," DiVitto said. "We expect to continue to be competitive and compete for a playoff spot and hopefully a chance to win the zone."







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
