**RIO LINDA, CA (MPG)** - With the massive 17-day California State Fair coming up July 12 through July 28, Californians from throughout the state will visit Sacramento to enjoy the festivities and participate in the fair. Several Rio Linda residents are set to represent in the livestock department.

The Green Acres 4-H Club will showcase livestock, and one member will present jams and cookies at both weekends of the California State Fair. The club is comprised of youths from ages 5 to 18 and adult volunteers, and all the members are from the Rio Linda/Elverta area.

Californians Affected by Wildfire Smoke Should Take Steps to Protect Their Health

California Department of Public Health News Release

SACRAMENTO REGION, CA (MPG) - With wildfire smoke and reduced air quality affecting many California communities, the California Department of Public Health (CDPH) is urging Californians to take steps to protect themselves from air pollutants. Wildfire smoke can affect anyone's health, but some people are at higher risk, including pregnant people, children, older adults, first responders, and people with chronic conditions like asthma, COPD, diabetes, kidney disease or heart disease

"All Californians should be aware of the risks of wildfire smoke and ash inhalation and take steps to avoid breathing in pollutants, including reducing outdoor activity and staying indoors when possible," said Dr. Tomás J. Aragón, California Department of Public Health Director and State Public Health Officer. "Wildfire smoke can make anyone sick, but it's particularly unhealthy for vulnerable individuals, including children, people who are pregnant, and those with chronic health conditions."

**SACRAMENTO REGION, CA (MPG)** -Much of interior California entered its fourth day of temperatures reaching 110 degrees or higher on July 5 and most areas weren't expected to see relief until early next week. Governor Gavin Newsom urged Californians on July 5 to take precautions and directed an all-hands response to the heatwave by state government.

About two weeks ago, the governor directed the Office of Emergency Services (OES) to activate its State Operations Center and move into Phase II of its Extreme Temperature Response Plan. This action ensures a 24/7, coordinated, whole-of-government response to the heatwave.

Excessive heat warnings and watches were in effect for much of California through the week. The National Weather Service forecasted an Extreme Heat Risk for many parts of the state, with hot conditions between 105 and 118 degrees, and little overnight relief.

Extreme heat kills more Americans every year than all other extreme weather, including wildfires and flooding.

"California is in the middle of a record heatwave and now is not the time to let our guard down. We must remain vigilant: stay cool, stay hydrated and check in on loved ones and neighbors," Newsom said.

#### What California is Doing to Protect Communities

Emergency coordination and response. California Office of Emergency Services is coordinating with local governments and emergency managers on regional needs.

Through Listos California, the Office of Emergency Services deployed in-language preparedness messaging to California's most impacted communities and those who might be most at risk during extreme temperatures, including those 65 years of age or older; individuals with chronic illness, disabilities or who are pregnant.

The Office of Community Partnerships and Strategic Communications deployed in-language messaging to higher risk communities through Heat Ready CA, which includes a network of community organizations and outreach to ethnic media.

Through the state's Priority Populations Task Force, the Office of Emergency Services convenes more than 20 agencies to coordinate state and local resources and share information with the public, identify and address unmet needs, and ensure comprehensive preparedness and response in support of Californians at greatest risk and coordinate with local jurisdictions.

#### How Californians Can Protect Their Health

To avoid possible health problems due to wildfire smoke and poor air quality, California Department of Public Health recommends taking the following steps:

Stay informed. Check the air quality and sign up for updates. Californians can check their local air quality index (AQI) at AirNow.

Stay indoors. If the air quality is bad, stay inside as much as possible and close all windows, doors and vents.

Adjust your A/C. Change the settings on your A/C unit to re-circulate or close outdoor air intakes to avoid drawing in smoky outdoor air. Running an air purifier can also help.

Wear a mask. If you must go outside, wear a well-fitting N95 mask. This is especially important for those who must work outdoors for long periods, in areas with heavy smoke.

Wildfire smoke contains fine particles which are respiratory irritants, and when inhaled deeply, can *Continued on page 8*

# A Humble Armenian American Bakes at Elite Bakery Cafe

**CARMICHAEL, CA (MPG)** - A trip down Fair Oaks Boulevard in Carmichael can take you around the world with small businesses serving Chinese, Mexican and Afghan cuisine, for example. Close to the intersection with Walnut Avenue there is a bakery and café with Armenian roots that offers a variety of treats with a focus on American tastes.

The owner is Donara Matsoyan, who immigrated to the U.S. from Armenia in 1993, taking residence in a Carmichael apartment. She was born in Yerevan, the capital city, and she arrived here with her family that included her son, Tigran, who was just 30 days old.

The family car was stolen in Armenia and they took it as a sign to leave what was a chaotic nation after the Soviet Union, which Armenia was a part of, broke up.

She now lives in Rio Linda.

So why Carmichael for her business's whereabouts?

"My daughters chose the location, the business; everything was their idea," Matsoyan said.

She has five daughters, all of whom have worked at the bakery and café at some point; the business opened in 2017.

If you visit, you will most likely see Genie Pokitko, Matsoyan's most actively-involved daughter.

Matsoyan said of the baking process,

and they keep coming and saying encouraging things.

Some customers ask for special orders. "Some of the things I made for the first time. But I like challenges; I like when they come say, 'Can you make this?"" Matsoyan said.

Elite Bakery Cafe makes culinary delights for Italian and Jewish holidays, for example.

When asked what the bakery and café's busiest day is, Matsoyan mentioned Christmas and Thanksgiving. She said they baked "all the pies, like pumpkin pie and cherry pie" for Thanksgiving.

Even on normal days, baking and cutting start at 5 a.m. and the doors open at 8 a.m. They serve Temple Coffee to get customers started: the Dharma Espresso Blend for their espresso, which is somewhat dark-roasted, at just \$3, and the Three Pillars Blend for their drip coffee, which is sold for \$3.50 and \$4, depending on the size.

# Grand Jury Addresses Missile Site Contamination

**NORTHERN CALIFORNIA, CA** (**MPG**) - One of the 2023-2024 Placer County Grand Jury Final Consolidated Report's 13 individual reports addressed the trichloroethylene (TCE) contamination spreading today from a Lincoln Titan 1-A Missile Site that closed in 1965.

The 58 county grand juries, made up of interested community members, investigate operations of the various officers, departments and agencies of local government, according to California Courts, Judicial Council of California.

The grand jury is part of the county judicial system authorized by the California State Constitution.

What's striking about this year's report is that the grand jury took on the missile site's contamination that falls under the responsibility of a federal agency, the U.S. Army Corps of Engineers and the state's Central Valley Regional Water Quality Control Board. The Water Board oversees what corrective actions the Army Corps will finally take to eliminate the TCE. The areas which are not within Placer County Grand Jury jurisdiction include federal agencies and state agencies. Yet the Placer County Grand Jury addressed today's contamination spreading into a Lincoln active-adult community from the missile site because "it is important to educate the citizens of Placer County about this issue. Cleanup of former

military sites contaminated with toxic chemicals such as TCE is a lengthy process. The process typically involves assessments, cleanup plans and implementation, with involvement from multiple stakeholders. It is crucial to prioritize safety and effectiveness in these cleanup efforts."

The grand jury's 18-page report, "From Missiles to Meadows: Restoring Nature's Balance," stressed that the former Lincoln missile site "poses environmental health risks due to past activities, including chemical use, chemical spills and unexploded ordnance (military supplies such as weapons, rockets, or armor). The source of contamination is trichloroethylene (TCE), a solvent which was used to clean the liquid oxygen Rocket Propellant-1 piping and was discharged into the ground..."

The grand jury found that "Cleanup efforts will require soil remediation and groundwater monitoring to mitigate environmental impacts. public safety and environmental preservation."

A little history is in order. The 54 former intercontinental ballistic missile (ICBM) silo sites in California, Colorado, Wyoming and Washington built during the Cold War in the early 1960s were designed to destroy enemy targets anywhere around the world within an hour of launch.

The two-stage missiles were stored in underground silos and raised to ground level for launch, according to the Library of Congress. Furthermore, each complex consisted of three missile silos supported by a network of underground fuel storage tanks, equipment terminal, antennas and connecting tunnels.

Beale Air Force Base 851st Strategic Missile Squadron oversaw Northern California's triangle of Titan I missile silo complexes in Lincoln, Chico and Live Oaks.

Co-founder Anne

"Some of the recipes I had, like old-time recipes. Genie just perfected them, like making them and changing them. She's a recipe changer all the time. She plays with the cookies."

The oatmeal raisin cookies are shareable at \$4 a piece.

As for Matsoyan's start in baking, it was a family affair.

"I had a big family. We were always baking. My mother-in-law was a baker." Pokitko added. "So we have baking on both sides of the family."

Matsoyan still has family in Armenia, which she visits every five years. She has two sisters and a brother there.

Of her customers, Matsoyan said, "They're very happy with us: like a family. They know everything about my daughters."

They have many customers who started coming in when the business was founded more than six years ago, Matsoyan said, You might detect a cherry tasting note in the espresso if you reflect on its flavor. In addition to baked goods and drinks, Elite serves salads, breakfast dishes with eggs, sandwiches, savory and sweet crepes, and borscht soup with an Armenian spin: a type of beef stew for \$12.50 a bowl.

And what of the Armenian-born son who was just a baby when he arrived in the U.S.?

Matsoyan said of Tigran, her now-adult son, "He is our biggest critic. He always comes.

Now Matsoyan has some 10 grandchildren. Say hi to Pokitko's 11-year-old son, Roman, if you see him hanging out and lending a helping hand. They'll consider you part of the family.

To date, no remediation efforts have been completed, resulting in health and environmental concerns from the community. Without cleanup efforts, the contamination poses a risk to the surrounding environment and public health. It is essential for proper authorities to prioritize and initiate cleanup efforts to address these potentially serious hazards. This remediation project underscores the importance of monitoring and managing environmental contamination at former military sites to ensure

Constantin Birge of the grassroots Titan 1-A Missile Site Environmental Contamination and Remediation Committee, trying to speed up the cleanup process, appreciated the grand jury report.

The report accurately stated that no remediation efforts have been completed, according to Birge.

"Many thanks to the members of the Placer County Grand Jury for succinctly and clearly putting the issues on the table for all to see," Birge said. "And, for the Water Board and United States Army Corps of Engineers to know, there are others watching them."

time, but to clarify, Clark said that the animals are only for sale at the county fair. Each animal is owned and taken care of by a 4-H Club member.

Clark, involved with the Green Acres 4-H Club for 17 years, is "very rewarded" by seeing the young members of the club learn, find their passions and excel.

"It's really impressive what these kids are doing," she said. "There are 9-yearolds breeding livestock, milking them and showing them. They work so hard and put so much time into raising their animals."

Showing and owning livestock is no easy feat, Clark pointed out. There is a tremendous financial responsibility that comes with it, as well as a large time commitment. She emphasized that the youth who will represent the Green Acres 4-H Club at the State Fair "have worked very

When asked why the community should visit the fair and see the animals, Clark said, "Everybody loves livestock and this gives people a hands-on experience. ### Take Precautions as Dangerous Heatwave Continues, Governor Newsom Urges

OSHA) reminded employers to protect workers from heat illness during high temperatures by providing water, rest, shade and training.

Field inspectors are conducting targeted inspections at worksites where workers are most vulnerable to heat illness, including in agriculture and construction.

Details on heat illness prevention requirements and training materials are available online at 99calor.org. Cal/ OSHA's heat illness prevention standard applies to all outdoor worksites.

The Government Operations Agency has coordinated messaging to all state employees on increased temperature preparedness and worked with building managers to reiterate state efficiencies during warmer days.

### **Protecting Public Health and Safety**

The California Department of Public Health created a Heat and Summer Safety toolkit to provide resources and communication tools that can be shared, including the difference between heat exhaustion and heat stroke.

California Department of Public Health also develops heat guidance for schools, local health jurisdictions and other community service providers to protect Californians, particularly heat-vulnerable populations such as children, students, older adults, the unhoused, outdoor workers and those with existing health conditions.

### Increasing Climate Resiliency

The California Natural Resources Agency and state climate partners are addressing longer-term impacts of climate change and extreme heat events through the Extreme Heat Action Plan to Build Community Resilience.

Efforts include resources for vulnerable and underserved communities, investments in shading communities through green schoolyards and urban forestry initiatives and putting nature-based solutions to work to cool buildings and infrastructure.

#### How You Can Stay Safer from Extreme Heat

Go to ready.ca.gov to find resources and tips to stay safe from extreme heat and other natural disasters.

Stay cool (during the hottest times of the day). Those without air conditioning should consider going to a cooling center.



Check out this list of cooling centers across the state or visit a public location such as a library or shopping mall. To find free transportation to cooling centers in certain areas, use this finder tool.

Avoid physical exertion or exercising outdoors.

Wear lightweight, light colored, loose clothing, hats, sunglasses and sunscreen.

Stay hydrated. Drink plenty of fluids, especially water, even when not thirsty; drink sports drinks (in moderation with water) to help replace electrolytes lost during exercise.

Avoid sugary, alcoholic, and very cold drinks.

Eat plenty of fruits and vegetables.

Stay connected. Monitor those at higher risk of heat-related illness including infants and young children; people 65 years of age or older; individuals with chronic illness, disabilities or who are pregnant. Determine risk at heatreadyca. com.

Californians are also encouraged to check on their neighbors – call or visit higher risk people and offer to pick up groceries, medication and other necessities. Older adults, young children and babies, people with chronic medical conditions and those who are pregnant are most at risk.

Use a buddy system when working in the heat.

As a precaution, keep all communication and medical devices charged.

Stay informed. Check for weather forecasts, extreme heat alerts and cooling centers at https://news.caloes.ca.gov/ coolingcenters/.

Stay safe outdoors. Warm summer weather is causing continued snow melt from winter's record snowpack, resulting in colder and faster water that continues today. Remember to always be safe around the water.

Make sure you and your loved ones wear properly fitting, U.S. Coast Guardapproved life jackets. Several public and private entities make life jackets available to the public on a loan basis.

Always supervise children by appointing a designated "water watcher." Know your limits. Swimming in a lake, ocean or river is different than swimming in a pool. If someone is in distress, seek help from a lifeguard or call 9-1-1 if one is not available.



### "Forced Worship Stinks in God's Nostrils"



Under a new Louisiana law, every public school from elementary to college will be required to post the Ten Commandments by the end of this year.

If Jesus were around today, and I believe he is, I think he'd find the new law reeking with hypocrisy.

He'd likely question the irony of enforcing Commandment No. 2 in a state that still carries the stench of 130 graven images of confederate "heroes."

He'd likely call "foul," as the LSU Tigers, the eighth-best team nationally, dishonor the Sabbath with Saturday games.

But worst of all, he'd ask if the state legislature planned to include the fine print of Mosaic law with 248 do-this commandments, and 365 definitely-do-notdo-this commandments.

For instance, will the posted commandments include Exodus 21:29, that says if an ox gores someone to death, both the owner and the ox must be executed?

I'm not trying to villainize the Pelican State, but I am trying to prove a point during this season of patriotism about the principle of separation of church and state.

The principle has taken some hits in recent years.

Opponents make two points. First, the separation idea is not in the constitution. Second, they say our founding fathers would have never favored such a

split because they sought to make the USA into a Christian nation.

The first argument is true. Separation of church and state is only an interpretation of the First Amendment which clearly forbids our government from establishing a religion. Additionally, it's interpreted to mean the government can't favor any single religion.

The second point is decidedly untrue.

Thomas Jefferson, the primary author of the Declaration of Independence was "not a God-fearing humanitarian but rather a slaveholding epicurean deist," says Tim Alberta in his latest book, "The Kingdom, the Power, and the Glory: American Evangelicals in an Age of Extremism."

"Jefferson was not an earnest follower of Christ but was known to mock revivalists and rarely attend church," Alberta writes.

I gained some understanding of Jefferson's view during my visit to Roger Williams National Memorial last summer. It's possible that Jefferson's understanding of the church and state issue was forged from Williams's.

Living 100 years prior to Jefferson, Williams was excommunicated from the Anglican Church for blasphemy. Banished from his home in 1636, he was forced on a most horrendous walkabout through a blizzard to present-day Rhode Island. It was there he established a Baptist community free from puritanism.

According to a National Park Service article, Roger Williams believed government-established religions were "...responsible for the death of millions of innocent souls whose only crime was having their own,

unique conscience."

Williams added with succinct clarity, "Forced worship stinks in God's nostrils."

Alberta notes that Jesus himself "physically ran and hid from the people who desired to make Him king. Jesus dismissed his critics by telling them, 'Give back to Caesar the things that are Caesar's, and to God the things that are God's."

Alberta concludes this thought with an interpretation from a modern-day preacher who gained fame in 1965.

"In other words, pay your taxes, forget politics, and serve God with all your heart."

That man was the late Jerry Falwell - before he successfully revived his failing college through a political arm called, "The Moral Majority."

Imagine what might happen if a different religion wanted to post their treatise.

Visualize a Baptist mom in New Orleans whose job transfer takes her family to Dearborn Michigan. Once there, she will likely enroll her Baptist son in a school belonging to the largest Muslim-populated school district in the US.

Once in class, Mom will need some assurances that her son can enjoy his religious freedom without being required to memorize the Five Pillars of Islam.

As you approach the voting booth this fall, let's keep church and state separate. But most of all, beyond November, I encourage people of faith to, "Serve God with all your heart."

Currently, the Louisiana law is being legally challenged. In the end, I suspect Louisianans will find, as did a dozen other states, that their law won't pass the "the sniff test."

But even though your case is a little different than mine, you have every right to not accept credit cards-especially if you have a moral or values-related issue with the product.

As time goes by, you'll probably have a few other people turn up their noses at the idea of not being able to pay with a credit card, but if vou consistently offer great services or products at great prices, those experiences will only be a bump in the road. You don't want to be argumentative when things like this happen, so maybe you can just smile, and let them know you always appreciate input from your clients.

I'm sure you and your husband work hard to make your business the best it can be. The fact that you're still around over a decade after opening up shop is proof of that. You've probably realized, too, that being in business for yourself isn't all sunshine and rainbows every day. Regardless, no one has the right to get in your face over how your business is structured or try to push you into doing things differently. Listening to, and evaluating, suggestions from clients only makes sense. It's a smart thing for any business owner to do. But this one client is saying you should change a long-standing operating principle based on a whim-their whim.

# **Social Security Matters** Will IRA Withdrawals Affect **My Medicare Premiums?**

Dear Rusty: I am a member of AMAC and learn so much from the Ask Rusty column. I hope you can give me some information about a question that has come up in my family. My husband is retired and has reached full retirement age. He is considering withdrawing money from an IRA to pay off our mortgage. We are wondering what, if any, penalties may be incurred on Social Security, Medicare, and income tax. Thank you for your help in this matter. Signed: **Concerned Taxpaver** 

Dear Concerned: Thank you for contacting the AMAC Foundation Social Security Advisory Service. Regarding your question on the impact of withdrawing IRA funds, there is no impact to your husband's gross Social Security benefit. The amount withdrawn, of course, is considered ordinary income for federal income tax purposes, and will need to be included as such on your federal income tax return and will therefore affect vour federal income tax liability when you file the return.

Depending on the amount withdrawn, there could be an impact to the Medicare premium due to the Income-Related Monthly Adjustment Amount (IRMAA) provision. Assuming you file jointly, you will pay a higher Medicare Part B premium if your modified adjusted gross income is above certain thresholds (i.e., more than \$103,000 for an individual and \$206,000 for a married couple). Please note that Medicare's procedures will not note this income change for two years, so if vou make the withdrawal in 2024 it will not trigger the increases until your 2026 Medicare premiums. A change to your Medicare premium might also result in a change to your net Social Security payment at that time (since Medicare is automatically deducted from your Social Security payment).

Also depending on the amount withdrawn, you may have to pay an additional amount on top of your Medicare Part D premium. The Part D adjustment amount is calculated based on a

percentage of the Part D national base beneficiary premium, not on a percentage of the plan premium.

The Social Security Administration mails letters to beneficiaries who currently pay a Part B Income-Related Monthly Adjustment Amount (IRMAA) and, according to the Centers for Medicare & Medicaid Services (CMS), are in a Part D plan. The letter explains the additional Part D amount, and how exactly Social Security will collect it. You can contact SSA at 1-800-772-1213 or your local SSA agency if you have any further questions about your Part D IRMAA premium.

Some things are just so ridiculous that they demand critical attention. One of them is the opposition from environmental groups to widening the Interstate 80 freeway between Sacramento and Davis.

For years, motorists have complained about what has been dubbed the "Davis bottleneck" that often backs up traffic for miles. What should be no more than a 10- or 15-minute drive can often take 45 minutes or more.

The state Department of Transportation wants to convert median strips into new traffic lanes that would require a toll payment to traverse. Environmentalists, who are trying to block the project in court, contend that it would merely encourage more drivers to use the stretch of freeway and therefore relief from congestion would be only temporary.

Opponents also complain that Caltrans and local officials are using the subterfuge of improving pavement to widen the freeway, and that the project runs counter to official state policy of reducing vehicular traffic as a way to reduce greenhouse gasses.

"These projects are being oversold to the public as a way to reduce congestion; they are not," Susan Handy, director of the National Center for Sustainable Transportation, told the Los Angeles Times. "A court decision is going to be very important."

**Environmental Opposition to Vital Sacramento** 

Ironically, Handy's organization is housed in the UC Davis campus, where the chronic congestion spills over.

The complaints might have some validity if this stretch was merely another local commuter route, but it isn't. Interstate 80 is one of the nation's most important transcontinental arteries, running 2,901 from San Francisco to the New York City metropolitan area with much of its route in western states following 19th-century immigrant trails.

The only other east-west interstates are either hundreds of miles to the north or hundreds to the south. That makes I-80 an extremely important route for interstate cargo, a fact evident to anyone who shares the freeway with an endless stream of large trucks.

Moreover, there are no alternative routes because the eastern portion of the freeway is a causeway over a marshy area that's home to wildlife and is often flooded during winter and spring months. Water is diverted into the "Yolo Bypass" from the Sacramento River as an important element of the Sacramento region's flood protection system.

Simply put, trucks and cars must either use I-80 between Sacramento and the Bay Area or not move at all. The notion that widening will increase traffic is ludicrous: The traffic will be there regardless because it has nowhere else to go.

"We experience some of

the most severe congestion in California seven days a week," Autumn Bernstein, executive director of the Yolo Transportation District, told the LA Times. "We have more than five hours of congested traffic in the eastbound direction and (in) Davis every afternoon."

The ultimate fate of the project is not certain. The California Transportation Commission gave its approval in May and allocated money to begin work, but the environmental groups are suing, characterizing it as a showdown over the state's official policy of avoiding projects that increase carrying capacity and lead to more traffic.

It's unfortunate that Caltrans officials decided they needed to hide expansion of the freeway as a pavement improvement project and make it a joint project with local officials — with some token fund-

ing for mass transit — to sidestep a direct confrontation over environmental impacts.

In a more rational world. the need would be obvious, and officialdom would be criticized for waiting so long to do something about a bottleneck.

Through the generosity of the **The Rio Linda News**, this column serves to provide an update about matters affecting the unincorporated community of Orangevale.

This summer, as Californians prepare for road trips and vacations, I wanted to share my thoughts on the Road Charge Collection Pilot, a mileage-based tax program designed to help fund road maintenance. This pilot program offers drivers the chance to voluntarily sign up and test a new funding approach, where they pay a set fee for each mile driven or a fee based on their vehicle's fuel efficiency. The program is set to run from August 2024 to January 2025.

In 2014, the California legislature passed SB 1077 to research a road charge system, which involved over 5,000 vehicles and documented 37 million miles of travel. The study proposed a shift to a permile charge to distribute road maintenance costs among all drivers, regardless of their vehicle's fuel efficiency.

### **Rio Linda Community Update**

### *Concerns Over California's New Road Charge Plan*

Historically, road maintenance has been funded through the gas tax. When you buy fuel, a portion of that expense helps maintain our roads. However, as electric vehicles (EVs), which bypass traditional fuel consumption, become more popular, revenue from this tax has been declining. The proposed state solution is to charge drivers based on the miles they drive.

Although this may seem fair on paper, it's important to consider the potential negative impacts. Firstly, charging by the mile could potentially increase your costs, especially when you're planning vacations or visiting relatives. This might discourage some from traveling, potentially affecting our state's tourism industry.

Another concern is privacy. If this pilot program were adopted nationwide, how would mileage be tracked and reported without infringing on individual privacy? How much would it cost to administer the tax?

Also, this mileage-based tax could impact lower and middle-income families. Those who rely on their vehicles for daily commutes, especially in less fuel-efficient vehicles or from remote areas, might find this system feels like a double tax, disproportionately affecting them. How is that fair?

Lastly, California's push to move to electric vehicles by 2045 presents some infrastructure challenges. For instance, last summer's heatwaves led to blackouts that disrupted EV charging, showing that our current infrastructure may not yet be equipped to support a fully electric future.

While the Road Charge Collection Pilot has good intentions, its unintended consequences could place an extra burden on hardworking residents. Instead of creating more tax burdens, we should focus on managing our money better and prioritizing the use of funding.

affect the lungs and the heart. Exposure to high concentrations of fine particles can cause persistent cough, runny nose, phlegm, wheezing, and difficulty breathing. Smoke from wildfires can also cause eye irritation, reduced lung function, and bronchitis. Those with asthma or another lung disease should keep at least a seven-day supply of medication on hand and call a health care provider if nearby wildfires worsen breathing issues.

#### In Case of Evacuation

Wildfires can also lead to emergency evacuations and it's important to follow the direction of local officials when evacuations are ordered. Current evacuation information can often be found through monitoring local news outlets as well as official social media channels of emergency responders such as a sheriff's office, police department, and fire department.

Knowing the "Ps of Preparedness" can help you react quickly if a wildfire threatens your area:

People (help children, older adults and people with disabilities)

Papers (important documents)

Phones

Prescriptions (and glasses)

Pictures

Pets

PCs (computers) (for the information stored)


