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City Plans to Purchase 1.74-Acre Property on Old Auburn Rd.

CITRUS HEIGHTS, CA (MPG) - During Public Comment at the July 10th Citrus Heights City Council meeting, resident Linda Maxsom spoke about safety concerns at the Arcade-Cripple Creek Trail: "The City spent a lot of money to build this beautiful trail and ... we now see people using the path for crime and graffiti." Maxsom said she saw a young woman at the end of the trail who was frightened by the presence of two men nearby who were "up to no good."

"As women, we should be able to use that path any time of the day to walk by ourselves, to run or anything," Maxsom said.

She suggested that the police department come up with a plan for officers to conduct routine patrols of the pathway.

Resident David Shelton spoke about the high number of incidents of illegal fireworks that he witnessed on the Fourth of July. He lives near a greenbelt and was concerned about the fireworks starting a fire there that could then spread to his house or neighboring residences.

Resident David Warren also expressed concern about the number of illegal fireworks and the long response time for officers trying to address the problem. He said that the city needs to establish a reserve of officers to increase patrols over holidays to ensure a higher level of enforcement.

"We've grown and we have to expand to meet the needs," Warren said.

Two written comments were submitted in support of homeless rights, urging the city to practice compassion when considering policies to address homelessness.

City Council then held a public hearing on amendments to the Draft Citizen Participation Plan, which guides the city's strategies for public engagement with the Community Development Block Grant Program. Citrus Heights receives approximately \$600,000 each year in federal funding from the Housing and Urban Development (HUD) Department to be allocated to various Community Development Block Grant-eligible programs, such as public services, neighborhood improvements,

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Starbucks Proposed for Stock Ranch

CITRUS HEIGHTS, CA (MPG) - The Citrus Heights Planning Department has taken under review a Design Review Permit and Use Permit to build a new Starbucks coffee shop at 6970 Auburn Blvd. in Stock Ranch.

The project proposal describes a 2,305-square-foot drive-through coffee shop on a 15,024-square-foot tract facing Auburn Boulevard, according to city planning documents.

Public notice of the proposed location was listed on May 28 on the city's current projects list at <https://www.citrusheights.net/292/Current-Projects> which lists projects under review, recently approved, and under construction, said Marisa Brown, the city's communications officer.

Brown responded on behalf of Alison Bermudez,

chief city planner, as to the permit's status.

"The application for the proposed Starbucks is currently being evaluated to ensure it is consistent with both the Guide for Development and the traffic assumptions in the Environmental Impact Report (EIR)," Brown said.

"Once a determination is made, the project will be presented to the Planning Commission. No date for that meeting has been set but it is anticipated to be in the fall of this year," she said.

The proposed Starbucks would be located on a strip of undeveloped vacant land

in the Stock Ranch planning area facing Auburn Boulevard. A nearby commercial parcel also facing Auburn Boulevard is home to West Coast Sourdough, currently under construction and slated to open this fall, a Sport Clips hair salon, an AT&T phone

Answer: They're all part of the 170th California State Fair, which is open 10 more days this month.

The California State Fair opened July 12 and runs through July 28.

Special days include Tuesdays at the Fair with free admission for children 12 and under. Plus all ages pay \$2 per carnival ride on Tuesdays. Fridays are Senior Savings Day with anyone 62 and older pay \$10 admission.

On July 19 and July 20, professional chefs will use a mystery ingredient to prepare a three-course, restaurant-quality meal at the Save Mart California's Kitchen. The prelims are from 11 a.m. to 1 p.m., 2 to 4 p.m. and 6 to 8 p.m. July 19. Finals are from 6 to 8 p.m. July 20.

Fairgoers can enter an old-fashioned pie eating contest at 2 p.m. July 23 featuring cream pies from Save Mart Supermarkets at the Promenade Stage. Contestants can expect to have their faces covered in cream and crumbs by the end of the contest.

There are also different prices for the carnival rides, starting at \$1 per ticket and carnival fast passes from \$10 to \$15. An Unlimited Ride Wristband bought at the Carnival is \$39 Mondays, Wednesdays and Thursdays, and \$44 Fridays, Saturdays and Sundays.

Plenty of Fair Food for All Tastes

The Sacramento County

Environmental Management Department (EMD) inspectors ensure that the operators of the 160 food stands at the California State Fair are preparing those traditional fair delicacies such as corn dogs and snow cones to bacon cinnamon rolls and funnel cakes using safe food practices.

"Food vendors at the California State Fair face the same level of inspection as all other restaurants in Sacramento County," said Rolando Villareal, Environmental Health Division chief. "We want to ensure that they are all following safe food handling practices and adhering to state health codes to keep their customers from getting sick."

Health inspectors will work throughout the duration of the fair doing unannounced inspections, investigating food-related complaints, and providing education to vendors. Some of what inspectors will look for are preparation of fresh food every day and keeping hot food hot and cold food cold. No cooling of food for the next day use is allowed. Also looked for are proper handwashing procedures, and ensuring there are safe water supplies and proper sewage disposal. ★

Project plans show a landscaped horse-shoe-shaped drive-through with a primary entrance from an existing road running perpendicular to Auburn Boulevard. The coffee shop would seat an estimated 38 customers according to project plans, with some 33 allocated individual parking spaces, according to plan drawings.

A detailed landscape shading plan was prepared by the BGB Design Group in Costa Mesa, which includes the placement of 14 trees surrounding the Starbucks drive-through.

Stock Ranch is situated in the central portion of the city and is bounded by Auburn Boulevard to the north, Sylvan Road to the east, Greenback Lane to the south and Van Maren Lane to the west.

The city's Stock Ranch development guide was adopted in February 2001 and provided a comprehensive plan for the development of the two main areas: a 43-acre residential area on the south side of Arcade Creek adjacent to Stock Ranch Road and a 41-acre commercial area on

the north side of the creek, adjacent to Auburn Boulevard.

The plan called for the development of 570,000 square feet of commercial areas and allowed for the construction of a maximum of two big-box retailers, Costco and Walmart, which have already been built.

"The commercial portion of the Stock Ranch development was planned to include over 400,000 square feet of commercial uses, which would be developed in phases," Brown said.

"About 380,000 square feet of commercial use currently exist in Stock Ranch which allows room for a drive-through Starbucks (to be built)," she said.

Brown said an Environmental Impact Report (EIR) has been prepared for the city to examine potential environmental impacts, including traffic, in the proposed development area.

"The EIR considered the project at total build-out and anticipated one user to be a drive-through," Brown said. The complete EIR and project proposal documents can be viewed on the city's website at <https://www.citrusheights.net/292/Current-Projects> ★

are the most mesmerizing and elegant performance I have ever seen in my life," Brewer said. The team's 10 Italian-built aircraft dazzled spectators with synchronized maneuvers and vibrant red, green and white smoke trails.

The U.S. Air Force Thunderbirds also took center stage, with its F-16 Fighting Falcon jets performing daring aerial stunts. "It's incredible; they are so loud I hear my bones shake during their performance," said spectator Patrick Martin.

Another major draw was the F-35 Lightning II Demo and the FA-18 E/F Super Hornet, both showcasing the cutting-edge technology of modern military aviation. The U.S. Air Force C-17 Globemaster III also made a grand appearance, offering a glimpse into the operations of this 250,000 plus pound aircraft.

"The F-35 jet is one of my favorites, especially when it slows down in the air. It almost looks like it comes to a complete stop" said Emma Davis when asked what she was most looking forward to seeing at the event.

The Patriot Parachute Team demonstrated their precision jumping skills, featuring former members of elite military units such as Navy SEAL Team, Air Force Wings of Blue and Navy Leap Frogs.

On the ground, visitors had the rare opportunity to tour large military transport aircraft such as the C-5 Super Galaxy and the KC-135 Stratotanker. Interactive exhibits provided insights into various missions, including aerial refueling and humanitarian aid. Public safety and first

responder displays highlighted the crucial roles that airplanes and helicopters play in law enforcement, medical evacuation and firefighting.

One of the airshow's unique aspects is its commitment to community engagement and education. As a nonprofit organization, the California Capital Airshow uses the event's proceeds to fund scholarships, internships and free educational programs throughout the year.

"We decided this is a massive career day in a way," Brewer explained. "The whole event is designed to share our nation's rich aviation history, honor veterans and inspire the next generation."

Volunteers play a huge role in the success of the event.

"We have at any time around 1,000 volunteers," emphasized media spokesperson Lindsey Nelson.

Volunteer and team leader Michael Funes has been involved with the event for six years and emphasized the joy of seeing excited young faces at the show.

"After nearly three decades in Rancho, I found myself drawn into

volunteering. It's my way of getting closer to the planes I love," Funes said. "Over the past six years, I've met countless genuine people willing to take time out of their day to volunteer. This event is part of the community and is one of the biggest events Rancho has to offer."

Pilot Mike Kelly, 99th Commander, highlighted his love for flying.

"I think any pilot would say it's kind of visceral a sense of freedom and adventure. Growing up, I always wanted to be a pilot. It's a very cool opportunity to be able to fly for the community because this is home," said Kelly when asked about performing in the show a couple of years ago. "It's pretty cool that every year we get the big names here. Getting those names out here puts this airshow on the map."

For those who stayed until the finale, a memorable night awaited with a unique pyrotechnic display. The performance features 500 synchronized drones, fireworks, explosive effects, parachutist and acrobatic planes launching fireworks.

"It's theatrics, it's noise, it's color, it's just so exciting," Brewer said. ★

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Everything is Different Now

California Lawmakers' Safety Gets New Attention After Trump Shooting

Former President Donald Trump evaded serious injury, or death, by mere centimeters after a bullet struck his upper right ear during a campaign rally July 13 in Pennsylvania. The Republican presidential candidate pumped his fist, his face bloodied, as Secret Service agents hustled him off the stage following the shooting. But one spectator was killed, two were critically injured and the Secret Service killed the suspected shooter, identified by the FBI as a 20-year-old Pennsylvania man.

Saturday's mayhem is the most recent known assassination attempt of a president or presidential candidate since the 1981 shooting of President Ronald Reagan, and renewed conversations about the country's deep partisan divide, gun safety and dangerous political rhetoric — especially violent threats toward officials and candidates.

So it's no wonder that beefing up personal security has been a priority for some lawmakers. As explained earlier by CalMatters Capitol reporter Sameea Kamal, the Secretary of the Senate and chief administrative officer of the Assembly said that there has been heightened concern about political violence in recent years, and a bill is underway to protect California lawmakers and candidates from rampant threats.

The measure, Assembly Bill 2041, would allow candidates and elected officials to use more campaign funds for personal security for themselves, family members and staff. Democratic Assemblymember Mia Bonta of Oakland is carrying the bill and said she hopes to "see it across the finish line for the safety of candidates across the state." If passed, Bonta's measure could be enacted in time for the November election.

Bonta, in a statement: "(Saturday's) events show that political violence continues to plague our democracy. ... This bill has had bipartisan support because people on both sides of the aisle recognize the safety needs in this charged political climate."

Gov. Gavin Newsom, whose office did not immediately reply to a request for comment, vetoed similar legislation last year, saying that the bill did not clearly define "security

expenses." Bonta's newest bill, however, has been amended to specify what's considered a security expense, as well as clarifies disclosure requirements for transparency.

The bill sailed through the Assembly this year and is expected to be up for a floor vote in the Senate shortly after the Legislature returns from summer recess in August, according to Bonta's office. It has received no vote in opposition so far, though three Republican senators voted against last year's bill. During a March hearing in the Assembly's elections committee, Republican Assemblymember Tom Lackey of Palmdale raised concerns about the "broad potential interpretation of security expenses."

California is no stranger to shootings tied to the Oval Office. In 1975, a member of the Manson family cult attempted to shoot President Gerald Ford near the state Capitol in Sacramento while Ford was en route to meet then-Gov. Jerry Brown. And in 1968, U.S. Sen. Robert F. Kennedy died shortly after being shot at the Ambassador Hotel in Los Angeles while running for the Democratic presidential nomination.

On July 14, Newsom said he has deployed 61 Highway Patrol and police officers to assist local, state and federal law enforcement during the Republican National Convention in Milwaukee, which kicks off July 15. "Public safety transcends party lines," said Newsom in a statement. The plan to send these officers has been in the works since May. ★

CA Leaders Condemn Attempt on Trump's Life

California's elected leaders — Republicans and Democrats alike — quickly condemned the attempted assassination of Trump, the latest violent turn in current politics and a grim reminder of America's history of political killings.

Gov. Newsom promptly posted on social media that "violence has NO place in our democracy," a reaction echoed by Assembly Speaker Robert Rivas.

Assembly GOP leader James Gallagher said in an initial statement that "we must completely shut down those who would use violence to snuff out their political opponents." July 14, he followed up with a post asserting that "calling Trump a modern-day Hitler and making crazed assertions about the end of democracy has not been helpful to the chaos that we now find ourselves in."

In a statement, Senate Republican leader Brian Jones urged "Americans to take a

step back and acknowledge the need for common ground, rather than seeing politics as a polarizing exercise."

And former House Speaker Nancy Pelosi, whose husband Paul was struck in the head with a hammer by an assailant in their San Francisco home, posted on social media: "I know firsthand that political violence of any kind has no place in our society. I thank God that former President Trump is safe."

Saturday's chilling incident comes at a key point in the 2024 presidential race.

Democrats have been divided over whether to rally behind Biden — or to find a way to push him off the 2024 ticket. Republicans, on the other hand, were already in lockstep behind Trump as they gather in Milwaukee to officially nominate him — and see him reveal his running mate.

California is sending the biggest delegation to the convention — and thanks to the state GOP changing its rules for a winner-take-all primary in March, all 169 are pledged to Trump. It's only one sign of how firmly Trump controls the California party.

And while Biden — or any Democrat — is the odds-on favorite to secure California's 54 electoral votes in November (of the 270 needed to win), Republicans hope Trump's coattails and Biden's troubles, fueled by his weak performance in the June 27 debate, will help them add to the dozen congressional seats they now hold (compared to 40 for Democrats).

"We resolve political differences at the ballot box, through activism and by participating in political discourse," said California Secretary of State Shirley Weber in a statement. "There is absolutely no room for political violence." ★

CA Secretary of State Issues Statement on Trump Shooting Incident

SACRAMENTO, CA (MPG) - California Secretary of State Shirley N. Weber, Ph.D., issued the following statement in response to the July 13 shooting incident in Pennsylvania at Former President Trump's event:

"Over my lifetime, I have witnessed too many acts of political violence in America. Going back decades, too many people have been harmed or killed for what they believe. We resolve political differences at the ballot box, through activism and by participating in political discourse." There is absolutely no room for political violence.

"My heart goes out to the victims and their

families of this terrible tragedy. We are praying for the former president and those who were injured for a rapid recovery. We will keep those who have lost their lives and their families in our prayers."

"As your Secretary of State, I am committed to making sure everyone feels safe in participating in every aspect of the political process. Everyone has a right to express their political views, have their voices heard, attend rallies, hold signs, participate as election workers, and vote. We must work together to protect the integrity of our democratic system and the safety of our communities."

"My office continues to work closely with local, state, and federal officials to ensure our elections are safe." ★

FBI Investigation Encourages Tips from the Public

WASHINGTON, D.C. (MPG) - The FBI continues to investigate the shooting incident at the July 13 rally in Butler, Pennsylvania, which resulted in one victim's death and injuries to former President Trump and other spectators, as an assassination attempt on former President Donald Trump and as potential domestic terrorism.

The investigation is still in the early stages, and the FBI is providing the following updates, as of 12:05 p.m. July 15:

FBI technical specialists successfully gained access to alleged shooter Thomas Matthew Crooks' phone and they continue to analyze his electronic devices.

The searches of the subject's residence and vehicle are complete.

The FBI has conducted nearly 100 interviews with law enforcement personnel, event attendees and other witnesses. That work continues.

While the investigative work continues, FBI victim services personnel have offered assistance to the victims of Saturday's incident.

While the investigation to date indicates the shooter acted alone, the FBI continues to conduct logical

investigative activity to determine if there were any co-conspirators associated with this attack. At this time, there are no current public safety concerns.

The FBI has not identified a motive for the shooter's actions but is working to determine the sequence of events and the shooter's movements prior to the shooting, collecting and reviewing evidence, conducting interviews and following up on all leads. The shooter's telephone was obtained for examination.

Suspicious devices found at both locations have been rendered safe by bomb technicians and are being evaluated at the FBI Laboratory.

The firearm used in the shooting was purchased legally.

The shooter was not known to the FBI prior to this incident.

The FBI has received hundreds of digital media tips, which include photos and videos taken at the scene, and continues to review incoming tips. Anyone with information that might assist with the ongoing investigation is encouraged to submit it online at tips.fbi.gov or call 1-800-CALL-FBI.

That same media has spent hours casting this attempted assassination as anything but what it was, and that's sickening, even laying it off as "loud noises" disrupt the rally. It's difficult to even believe that given the level of threats towards him, that a shooter was able to scale a building within 150 meters of his speech and fire multiple rounds. A full and serious investigation needs to be launched into how this failure in security happened. Every single detail about the shooter needs to be public, now." ★

From the Desk of City Manager Ash Feeney: A Message on Homelessness in Citrus Heights

Greetings Citrus Heights Community,

As your City Manager, I want to acknowledge the tremendous efforts and ongoing work dedicated to homelessness prevention in Citrus Heights. Community feedback has been instrumental in shaping our strategies and programs, ensuring they evolve to meet the needs of both housed and unhoused residents. Recent policy developments, including the significant Supreme Court ruling on the City of Grants Pass case, have reinforced our proactive approach to managing and preventing issues related to homelessness. In this message, I offer an update on our local efforts.

Sacramento County is the agency for our area that provides Health and Human Services, Homeless Services and Housing, and Human Assistance. Unhoused individuals are encouraged

to take county services intended to help address the cycle of homelessness. In collaboration, Citrus Heights city staff, police officers, and program representatives encourage unhoused individuals to utilize these essential services to break the cycle of homelessness, and we are always ready to assist in connecting to resources that are available throughout the county.

In addition to connecting to services, the city is responsible for ensuring accountability for unlawful actions. Our approach is comprehensive: we offer supportive programming while enforcing laws to maintain public safety. This includes addressing illegal activities such as camping, unlawful storage of personal property in public spaces, dumping, and chronic nuisance offenses. By balancing compassion with accountability, we uphold our commitment to helping individuals experiencing homelessness while preserving public order and safety.

Recent Developments: Grants Pass Supreme Court Ruling

In a landmark decision, the United States Supreme Court has ruled that the City of Grants Pass did not violate the Constitution's prohibition against cruel and unusual punishment when enforcing

anti-camping ordinances against homeless individuals. This decision overturned the 2018 Ninth Circuit Court of Appeals ruling in *Martin v. Boise*, which had barred cities from enforcing public-camping ordinances if the number of homeless individuals exceeded the available shelter beds. The Supreme Court's ruling clarifies that the Eighth Amendment's Cruel and Unusual Punishments Clause is not applicable in challenging local ordinances regulating public camping, thereby granting cities greater authority in managing public spaces.

For the City of Citrus Heights, the Supreme Court's decision is a significant endorsement of local control over homelessness prevention and blight abatement initiatives. Homelessness is a multifaceted issue, and the appropriate policy responses are diverse and evolving. The Supreme Court's decision reaffirms that local governments have the primary responsibility and authority to devise and implement solutions tailored to their unique circumstances.

Citrus Heights is committed to using this restored authority to balance compassion for individuals experiencing homelessness with the need to maintain public order and safety. The city

will continue to prioritize implementing innovative and effective strategies to support housed and unhoused residents, striving for a community where everyone can thrive.

Increased Enforcement and Policy Initiatives

Over the last two years, our team has developed innovative programming (like the Beautification Crew) to help address blight and community image issues. Given the recent Supreme Court ruling affirming local control to address these issues, there will be increased accountability for violations of the law.

The Citrus Heights Police Department strives to connect individuals experiencing homelessness with services but is also charged with bringing accountability through law enforcement, including enforcement of the following:

Illegal Camping Ordinance: Strict enforcement of regulations against illegal camping to maintain public safety and order.

Illegal Dumping Ordinance: Regular enforcement helps keep our community clean and free from health hazards.

Shopping Cart Ordinance: We actively retrieve abandoned shopping carts to prevent blight and ensure a tidy community.

Collaboration to Provide Resources

The City of Citrus Heights is dedicated to compassionately supporting unsheltered individuals and families while upholding our steadfast commitment to the health and safety of the entire community. Since October 2023, our partnership with the Sacramento County Department of Homeless Services and Housing (DHS) has enhanced our Street Outreach Program. The Street Outreach Program, operated by Community HealthWorks, provides a full-time Community Health Worker (CHW) to connect unhoused individuals with various supportive services, including emergency shelter, housing, supplies, and other resources. In the first seven months of operation, the program has enrolled 95 individuals in services and housed 24 individuals. We are grateful to Community HealthWorks for its mission-oriented approach and strategic partnership, which is truly making a difference in our community.

How You Can Help

We encourage residents and businesses to be proactive in reporting homelessness-related issues.

To help connect an unhoused individual to resources, call 2-1-1 and

press 8 for information on services and to connect with a Community Health Worker.

An individual can also visit either of the below locations for access to services, assessment and to begin the intake process:

Monday onsite at Living Water Church (7605 Lauppe Ln) from 1 to 3 p.m.

Most Tuesdays near the Stock Ranch Nature Preserve (7000 Auburn Blvd) from 3 to 4 p.m.

To report illegal camping, nuisances, or illegal dumping: Call the Citrus Heights Police Department non-emergency number at (916) 727-5500. To report an in-progress emergency: Call 9-1-1.

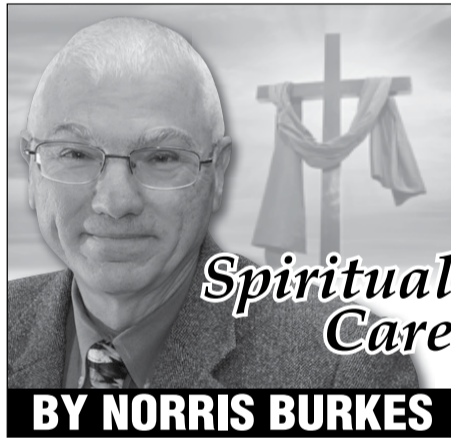

Some Prayers Come in A Different Language

Not too far away or long ago, I was working as a hospital chaplain at Sutter Medical Center in Sacramento when a nurse suggested I visit one of her patients. The only reason she offered for her referral was that our patient might need "some counseling or something."

Before entering the room, I sought more explanation from the patient's chart. Turning to the patient history page, I read aloud, "Patient is consuming multiple six-packs each day."

"Something indeed," I muttered, repeating the nurse's euphemism.

A few steps away in the room, I met a man who was writhing in the pain of detoxification. I knew little about the process, but I once heard a doctor say that "Detox makes waterboarding look tame."

Fixing me with a crazed look, the patient ordered me to "Get some &%@'n drugs, Doc!" He was, no doubt, assuming that the male entering his room wearing a necktie was his doctor.

I took a deep breath and assured him I was his chaplain, not his doctor.

Arming himself again with a limited vocabulary, he fired another volley aimed at convincing me he didn't care whether I was the pope; he wanted his drugs.

I nodded and left the room to relay his message to the nurse.

A bit shocked, the old-school nurse asked me, "Did you tell him that he shouldn't talk to a chaplain that way?" she asked.

My forthcoming answer seemed to surprise her nearly as much as the patient's vocabulary.

"No. I think his language represents a

kind of prayer."

"Prayer?" she asked, as if now questioning my sobriety.

I took her stance as invitation to say more. In the next few minutes, I shared my belief that God hears our expressions of agony, loss or pain as a prayer.

These prayers can be expressed in a wordless whimper, and God hears them. They can be voiced with bloodcurdling screams, and God hears them. They may be vented with words that offend the off-handed listener. The point is no matter how these words are uttered, God hears them and knows how to interpret them.

Our problem often comes when, perhaps like this nurse, we close our hearts and our ears to the kind of language expressed in that level of pain. We do this because we think pain ought not become offensive. "Pain should be neat and controlled," we reason.

That's not the way the Psalmist saw it when he wrote, "I cry aloud to the Lord; I lift up my voice to the Lord for mercy. I pour out my complaint before him; before him I tell my trouble" (Psalm 142:1-2).

And it certainly wasn't the way Job saw it when he lost his entire family. "Therefore I will not keep silent; I will speak out in the anguish of my spirit, I will complain in the bitterness of my soul" (Job 7:11).

I'm not saying we should encourage this language in everyday use. I'm saying that if God doesn't turn his ears away from even the most excruciating levels of human pain, then how can we?

At the end of the day, I like the metaphor Susan Lenzkes uses in her book, "When Life Takes What Matters." She says expressing our anger is like beating upon the chest of God, but "... we beat on His chest from within the circle of His arms."

I returned a few hours later to find that his nurse had finally given him the pain meds he needed.

He apologized for the language he'd used toward his chaplain. "No worries," I said. "All forgiven."

A few minutes after that, I found the nurse in her station.

"Thanks for your help," I said. "God answers prayer chaplain, but sometimes he gets help from a nurse." ★

capital improvements, small business support, affordable housing and homeless prevention.

Every five years, the Draft Citizen Participation Plan must be updated so that it accurately reflects the needs and priorities of the residents who will benefit from these programs. Staff have been conducting outreach through pop-up events and online surveys, and now a public hearing, to obtain community feedback.

Proposed amendments include a Language Action Plan stating that any documents related to the Community Development Block Grant Program be available in Spanish and Russian to ensure the engagement of residents who do not speak English. Another change is to publish notices in local newspapers, such as the Citrus Heights Messenger, which is more likely to reach the local population. Outreach efforts will also focus on non-English speakers, low- and moderate-income residents, residents who are disabled or members of minority groups, and residents of public assisted-housing developments.

There were no public comments during the Public Hearing on this item.

Vice-Mayor Jayna Karpinski-Costa said Citrus Heights has many Ukrainian residents, so she suggested that Ukrainian also be included in the Language Action Plan.

City Council voted unanimously to approve the amendments to the Community Development Block Grant Draft Citizen Participation Plan.

The council also held a public hearing to consider a resolution confirming the report of delinquent solid waste charges and ordering that their collection be added to the property tax roll.

City Council takes this action every year to assist Republic Services in collecting past due charges for residential garbage and recycling services. The charges will be levied as a lien against the properties where the services were provided and the overdue amounts will be added to their property tax bill.

Notices of this public hearing were mailed to all the delinquent account holders, so they had an opportunity to either dispute the charges or pay them before they are sent for collection.

As of July 9, there were 1,035 delinquent accounts with a past due balance of \$608,262.13 and penalties of \$60,826.21 for a total of \$669,088.34. The final list will be sent to the county in August, and when property taxes are paid in December, the outstanding amounts from those properties will be collected and forwarded to Republic Services.

City Council voted unanimously to

confirm the report and send the delinquent accounts to the property tax roll.

At the end of the meeting, Vice-Mayor Karpinski-Costa asked for support on a future agenda item to increase the penalties for illegal fireworks in Citrus Heights. After hearing residents' concerns on this issue, she wanted the city to do more to stop the problem. Councilmember MariJane Lopez-Taff supported the request, so the item will come before City Council at a future meeting.

City Council then adjourned the regular meeting and convened a special meeting to consider buying two adjoining parcels, 7555 and 7569 Old Auburn Road by the city.

The 1.74-acre property is the site of a former preschool that recently closed with two existing buildings at 3,128 square feet and 4,000 square feet. There are fencing, landscaping and other improvements.

Citrus Heights City Manager Ashley Feeney said that public facilities are a permitted use in that zone, so the property provides "a unique opportunity for strategic investment for the city of Citrus Heights."

"It's not often that we see structures that could support future services that come available on the market that are not too far from our City Hall campus," Feeney said.

One of City Council's strategic objectives is to explore the feasibility of increased local shelter and reunification options for lost pets, Feeney said. This site has the potential to serve that need in the future or if they find other sheltering options, according to Feeney, this property still "provides for a number of different opportunities."

The proposed purchase agreement would be for a price of \$1.2 million, with a \$25,000 refundable deposit that guarantees a 60-day feasibility period to investigate the property. An additional 60 days could be secured with a non-refundable deposit of \$50,000. The deposit will be applied to the final sale price. The agreement also includes a \$5,000 per diem paid to the seller, Stoney Investment LLP, which is not applicable to the sale price. Escrow would close 130 days from the execution of the purchase agreement.

Mayor Bret Daniels called the purchase "a great opportunity." He said that the city has been "spending our money wisely and that's why we have the ability to make this kind of a purchase at this time," with enough in the General Fund reserves to cover the cost.

City Council voted unanimously to approve the purchase agreement.

The next meeting of the Citrus Heights City Council is scheduled for 6 p.m. July 24 at City Hall, 6360 Fountain Square Drive. ★

This summer, as Californians prepare for road trips and vacations, I wanted to share my thoughts on the Road Charge Collection Pilot, a mileage-based tax program designed to help fund road maintenance. This pilot program offers drivers the chance to voluntarily sign up and test a new funding approach, where they pay a set fee for each mile driven or a fee based on their vehicle's fuel efficiency. The program is set to run from August 2024 to January 2025.

In 2014, the California legislature passed SB 1077 to research a road charge system, which involved over 5,000 vehicles and documented 37 million miles of travel. The study proposed a shift to a per-mile charge to

distribute road maintenance costs among all drivers, regardless of their vehicle's fuel efficiency.

Historically, road maintenance has been funded through the gas tax. When you buy fuel, a portion of that expense helps maintain our roads. However, as electric vehicles (EVs), which bypass traditional fuel consumption, become more popular, revenue from this tax has been declining. The proposed state solution is to charge drivers based on the miles they drive.

Although this may seem fair on paper, it's important to consider the potential negative impacts. Firstly, charging by the mile could potentially increase your costs, especially when you're planning vacations or visiting relatives. This might discourage some from traveling, potentially affecting our state's tourism industry.

Another concern is privacy. If this pilot program were adopted nationwide, how would mileage be tracked and reported without infringing on individual privacy? How much would it cost to administer the tax?

Also, this mileage-based tax could impact lower and middle-income families. Those who rely on their vehicles for daily commutes,

especially in less fuel-efficient vehicles or from remote areas, might find this system feels like a double tax, disproportionately affecting them. How is that fair?

Lastly, California's push to move to electric vehicles by 2045 presents some infrastructure challenges. For instance, last summer's heatwaves led to blackouts that disrupted EV charging, showing that our current infrastructure may not yet be equipped to support a fully electric future.

While the Road Charge Collection Pilot has good intentions, its unintended consequences could place an extra burden on hard-working residents. Instead of creating more tax burdens, we should focus on managing our money better and prioritizing the use of funding.

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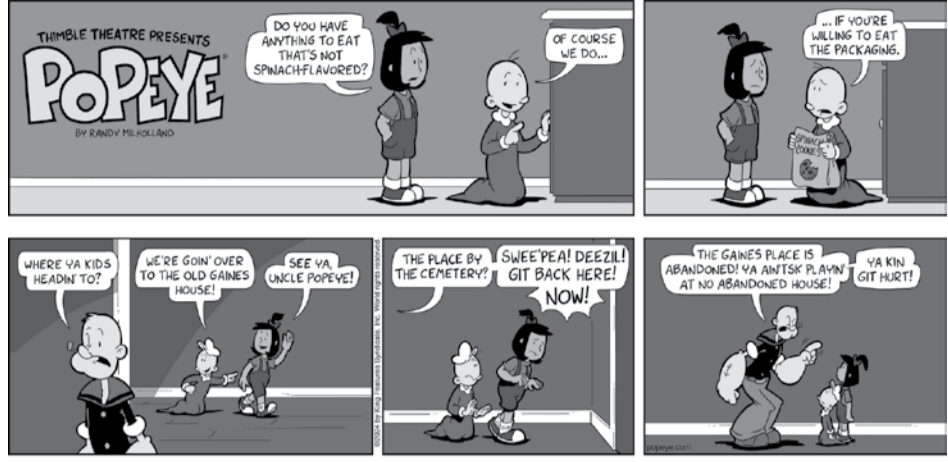
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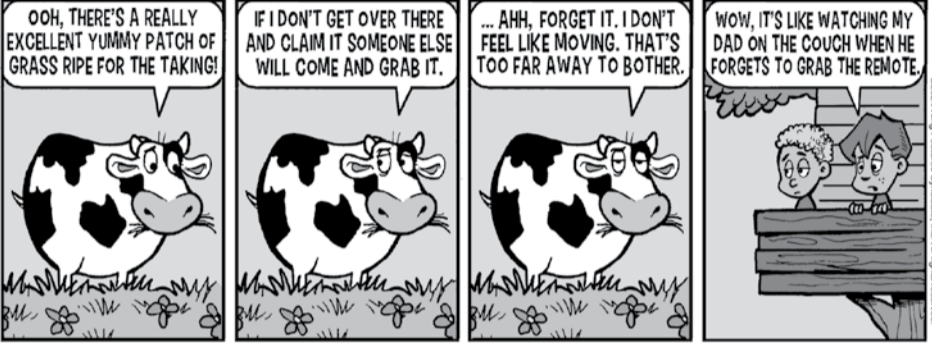

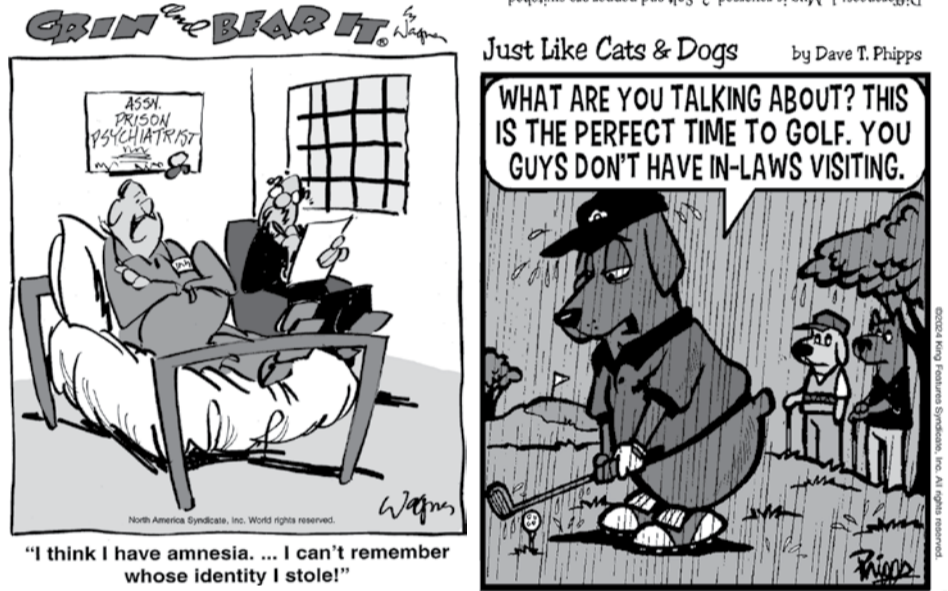
