RIO LINDA, CA (MPG) - Summer is flying by and that means there is only so much time to enjoy the activities that the season brings before school starts back up and the weather cools down. Luckily, there is still plenty of summer fun to be had in the Rio Linda/Elverta area.

Those seeking reprieve from the record-breaking heat can find a great option for swimming in Rio Linda. While summer activities such as youth water polo have already ended and the swim team season is ending soon, there are still options for public swimming, swimming lessons and more.

According to the Rio Linda Elverta Recreation and Park District, public swimming is available through Aug. 11 at the Rio Linda High School Pool, 6309 Dry Creek Road, as well as multiple pool activities.

"Spending time at the pool is not just about cooling off; it's about creating memories with family and friends, staying active and

enjoying the outdoors," Rio Linda Elverta Recreation and Park District Recreation Supervisor Yanni Lagge said. "Our pool offers a safe and fun environment for all ages, with activities ranging from swimming lessons,

public swim, recreational swim teams and water aerobics. We host pool movie nights and it's a blast for the families. Whether you're looking to relax or get a great workout, the pool is the perfect place to make the most of your summer."

Assessor Wynn Releases Property Assessment Roll

SACRAMENTO COUNTY, CA (MPG) - Sacramento County Assessor Christina Wynn announced on July 8 that the annual assessment roll reached a new record high of nearly \$243 billion, a 5.18% increase over last year. The assessment roll reflects the total gross assessed value of locally assessed real, business, and personal property in Sacramento County as of January 1, 2024. After the deduction of property tax exemptions for homeowners, disabled veterans, and charitable organizations, the net assessed value is just over \$233 billion.

The annual increase is primarily attributed to the sustained increase in average home prices over the last few years and ongoing new housing development and construction projects.

The 2024-25 assessment roll will generate approximately \$2.3 billion in ad valorem property tax revenue. This year's roll growth will yield an additional \$115 million in gross revenue over last year. Property tax revenue funds over 175 local government agencies, including schools, special districts such as fire, park, and community service districts, as well as cities, and redevelopment agencies and is one of the largest sources of discretionary revenue for Sacramento County's General Fund.

While the total assessed value for the County increased by 5.18%, the assessed value of most properties increased only 2% due to the protections of Proposition 13. Most of the roll growth resulted from assessed values established at current market levels for properties that changed ownership or experienced new construction in 2023. Properties appraised and assessed at market value each year include properties impacted by decline in value conditions (Prop 8), mobile homes, and personal property not subject to Proposition 13 such as boats, aircraft, and business personal property. The values of these properties may fluctuate more than 2% each year.

California Capital Airshow Soars

RANCHO CORDOVA, CA (MPG) - The 18th annual California Capital Airshow took over the skies at Mather Airport on July 13 and 14, delivering a weekend packed with aerial acrobatics, educational opportunities and community engagement.

Presented by Sacramento County in partnership with the City of Rancho Cordova, the event celebrated the rich aviation heritage of the Sacramento region while offering an exciting, family-friendly experience. With a diverse lineup of performers and attractions, the airshow proved to be a major draw for aviation enthusiasts from across the state, with nearly 90,000 attendees over two days.

"The airshow is a massive gathering of people. Our Capital Airshow is unlike most because it is all choreographed and narrated and it all has a mission and purpose to tell

a story," said California Capital Airshow Executive Director Darcy Brewer. "The performances are so unique people are coming from all over the state."

Among the airshow highlights were the impressive performances of the

Freccie Tricolori, the Italian Air Force's renowned jet team, making its only performance in the western United States. Known for spectacular aerobatic displays, the team captivated audiences with their precision and elegance.

"The Freccie Tricolori are the most mesmerizing and elegant performance I have ever seen in my life," Brewer said. The team's 10 Italian-built aircraft dazzled spectators with synchronized maneuvers

Answer: They’re all part of the 170th California State Fair, which is open 10 more days this month.

The California State Fair opened July 12 and runs through July 28.

Special days include Tuesdays at the Fair with free admission for children 12 and under. Plus all ages pay \$2 per carnival ride on Tuesdays. Fridays are Senior Savings Day with anyone 62 and older pay \$10 admission.

On July 19 and July 20, professional chefs will use a mystery ingredient to prepare a three-course, restaurant-quality meal at the Save Mart California’s Kitchen. The prelims are from 11 a.m. to 1 p.m., 2 to 4 p.m. and 6 to 8 p.m. July 19. Finals are from 6 to 8 p.m. July 20.

Fairgoers can enter an old-fashioned pie eating contest at 2 p.m. July 23 featuring cream pies from Save Mart Supermarkets at the Promenade Stage. Contestants can expect to have their faces covered in cream and crumbs by the end of the contest.

Appreciation Day for military, veteran and first responders on July 24 shows gratitude and celebrates the individuals and organizations that keep the country and communities safe. It’s free admission for active duty, reserve and veteran personnel from all military branches; active members of law enforcement, firefighters and first responder units; and active-duty military spouses and dependents. The free tickets are available online at the

Veteran Tickets Foundation at www.vettix.org or First Tickets at www.1sttix.org. Or veteran, military personnel and first responders can present valid military ID, proof of service or ID showing active first responder status at the California State Fair Admission Gates.

The Multicultural Gospel Celebration from 10 a.m. to 8 p.m. July 27 at the PG&E Center Stage will feature choirs, groups, ensembles and a youth choir.

The Toyota Concert Series is free with a state fair admission ticket. The first 700 fairgoers can line up at the back of the stage venue starting at 5 p.m. for first-come, first-served seating in the area behind the General Admission seating area. ADA (Americans with Disabilities Act) space is available on a first-come, first served basis. Reserved seats for the Toyota Concert Series are also available, starting at \$25.

Remaining concerts are '90s Rewind – Tone Loc, C&C Music Factory and Digital Underground, July 19; Patti LaBelle, July 20; Viva El Mariachi – Pablo Montero, Mariachi Los Camperos and Gabriela Sepulveda with

Main Gate and Blue Gate hours are from 11 a.m. to 10 p.m. Monday through Thursday and from 10 a.m. to 10 p.m. Friday through Sunday.

Green Gate opens at 2 p.m. Monday, Wednesday, Thursday and Friday, and at 11 a.m. Tuesday, Saturday and Sunday.

Carnival and Skyride hours are from 2 to 11 p.m. Monday,

Wednesday, Thursday and Friday, and from 11 a.m. to 11 p.m. Tuesday, Saturday and Sunday.

Kids’ Park hours are 1 to 11 p.m. Monday, Wednesday, Thursday and Friday, and 11 a.m. to 11 p.m. Tuesday, Saturday and Sunday.

Exhibit Building hours are 11 a.m. to 10 p.m. Monday through Thursday; and from 10 a.m. to 10 p.m. Friday through Sunday.

The Monorail opens at 11 a.m. Monday through Thursday, and at 10 a.m. Friday through Sunday.

Tickets can be bought online at <https://calexpostatefair.com/tickets> or at the fair’s box office. Daily tickets to the fair and food festival start at \$16 for adults, \$12 for seniors 62 and older and \$10 for children ages 5 to 12. Fair admission is free for children 4 and under.

In addition, a Family Fun Pack is \$49.99 and includes four single-day general admissions, four ride tickets (each good for one ride in the Carnival or on the Monorail), and a parking pass.

Parking is \$15 a day or three days for \$30.

There are also different prices for the carnival rides, starting

at \$1 per ticket and carnival fast passes from \$10 to \$15. An Unlimited Ride Wristband bought at the Carnival is \$39 Mondays, Wednesdays and Thursdays, and \$44 Fridays, Saturdays and Sundays.

Plenty of Fair Food for All Tastes

The Sacramento County Environmental Management Department (EMD) inspectors ensure that the operators of the 160 food stands at the California State Fair are preparing those traditional fair delicacies such as corn dogs and snow cones to bacon cinnamon rolls and funnel cakes using safe food practices.

“Food vendors at the California State Fair face the same level of inspection as all other restaurants in Sacramento County,” said Rolando Villareal, Environmental Health Division chief. “We want to ensure that they are all following safe food handling practices and adhering to state health codes to keep their customers from getting sick.”

Health inspectors will work throughout the duration of the fair doing unannounced inspections, investigating food-related complaints, and providing education to vendors. Some of what inspectors will look for are preparation of fresh food every day and keeping hot food hot and cold food cold. No cooling of food for the next day use is allowed. Also looked for are proper handwashing procedures, and ensuring there are safe water supplies and proper sewage disposal. ★

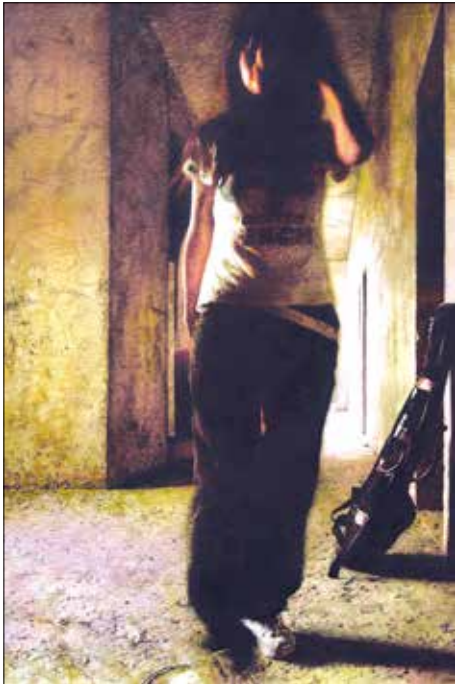

and vibrant red, green and white smoke trails.

The U.S. Air Force Thunderbirds also took center stage, with its F-16 Fighting Falcon jets performing daring aerial stunts.

“It’s incredible; they are so loud I hear my bones shake during their performance,” said spectator Patrick Martin.

Another major draw was the F-35 Lightning II Demo and the FA-18 E/F Super Hornet, both showcasing the cutting-edge technology of modern military aviation. The U.S. Air Force C-17 Globemaster III also made a grand appearance, offering a glimpse into the operations of this 250,000 plus pound aircraft.

“The F-35 jet is one of my favorites, especially when it slows down in the air. It almost looks like it comes to a complete stop” said Emma Davis when asked what she was most looking forward to seeing at the event.

The Patriot Parachute Team demonstrated their precision jumping skills, featuring former members of elite military units such as Navy SEAL Team, Air Force Wings of Blue and Navy Leap Frogs.

On the ground, visitors had the rare opportunity to tour large military transport aircraft such as the C-5 Super Galaxy and the KC-135 Stratotanker. Interactive exhibits provided insights into various missions, including aerial refueling and humanitarian aid. Public safety and first responder displays highlighted the crucial roles that airplanes and helicopters play in law enforcement, medical evacuation and firefighting.

One of the airshow’s unique aspects is its commitment to community engagement and education. As a nonprofit organization, the California Capital Airshow uses the event’s proceeds to fund scholarships, internships and free educational programs throughout the year.

“We decided this is a massive career day in a way,” Brewer explained. “The whole event is designed to share our nation’s rich aviation history, honor veterans and inspire the next generation.”

Volunteers play a huge role in the success of the event.

“We have at any time around 1,000 volunteers,” emphasized media spokesperson Lindsey Nelson.

Volunteer and team leader Michael Futes has been involved with the event for six years and emphasized the joy of seeing excited young faces at the show.

“After nearly three decades in Rancho, I found myself drawn into volunteering. It’s my way of getting closer to the planes I love,” Futes said. “Over the past six years, I’ve met countless genuine people willing to take time out of their day to volunteer. This event is part of the community and is one of the

biggest events Rancho has to offer.”

Pilot Mike Kelly, 99th Commander, highlighted his love for flying.

“I think any pilot would say it’s kind of visceral a sense of freedom and adventure. Growing up, I always wanted to be a pilot. It’s a very cool opportunity to be able to fly for the community because this is home,” said Kelly when asked about performing in the show a couple of years ago. “It’s pretty cool that every year we get the big names here. Getting those names out here puts this airshow on the map.”

For those who stayed until the finale, a memorable night awaited with a unique pyrotechnic display. The performance features 500 synchronized drones, fireworks, explosive effects, parachutist and acrobatic planes launching fireworks.

“It’s theatrics, it’s noise, it’s color, it’s just so exciting,” Brewer said. ★

Prices vary for pool use. A daily drop-in is only \$6, while children 2 and under are allowed in for free. A 10-visit punch card is \$50, with a limit of one per person. An individual pass is \$80, allowing unlimited pool use. Lastly, family passes are available for \$175, which can accommodate four family members.

In addition, Twin Rivers Unified School District students are granted free entry to the pool with their school IDs.

Those who want to take it up a notch and have a pool party can rent the space on Saturdays and Sundays for \$65 an hour,

with a two-hour minimum. Although the rentals are not entirely private since there are public swim hours, renters will get a reserved area with tables, chairs, certified lifeguards and the ability to bring up to 15 guests.

The Rio Linda High School Pool is open to the public from 1:30 to 4:30 p.m. Monday through Wednesday and Friday through Sunday The pool will be closed July 20.

Property owners who disagree with their assessed value should contact the Assessor’s office to discuss their concerns. If the market value of a property is less than the assessed value, property owners can request a review online, by mail, or in-person. This free service is available now through Dec. 31, 2024. Any corrections to annual secured real property values processed by Sept. 1 will appear on the annual property tax bill issued in October. Corrections processed after Sept. 1 will require the issuance of a revised annual secured real property tax bill.

The Tax Collector will mail 2024-2025 unsecured property tax bills beginning July 12. For questions regarding business personal property and fixtures, taxpayers

can contact the Business Personal Property Division at (916) 875-0730 or PPdutyapr@saccounty.gov. Taxpayers can contact the Marine and Aircraft section to get assistance with vessels and general aircraft valuations at (916) 875-0740 or ASR-marine@saccounty.gov. Leased equipment questions can be referred to (916) 875-0745 or ASR-leasing@saccounty.gov.

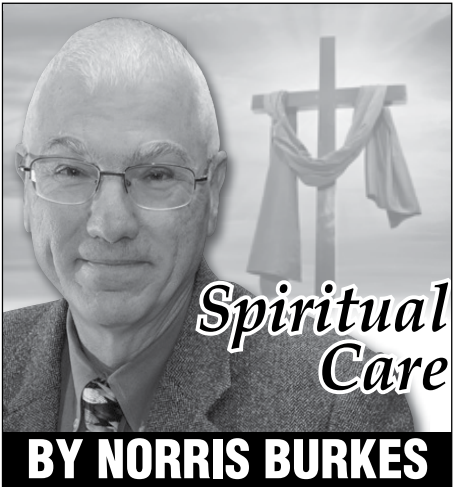

Some Prayers Come in A Different Language



Not too far away or long ago, I was working as a hospital chaplain at Sutter Medical Center in Sacramento when a nurse suggested I visit one of her patients. The only reason she offered for her referral was that our patient might need “some counseling or something.”

Before entering the room, I sought more explanation from the patient’s chart. Turning to the patient history page, I read aloud, “Patient is consuming multiple six-packs each day.”

“Something indeed,” I muttered, repeating the nurse’s euphemism.

A few steps away in the room, I met a man who was writhing in the pain of detoxification. I knew little about the process, but I once heard a doctor say that “Detox makes waterboarding look tame.”

Fixing me with a crazed look, the patient ordered me to “Get some &%@’n drugs, Doc!” He was, no doubt, assuming that the male entering his room wearing a necktie was his doctor.

I took a deep breath and assured him I was his chaplain, not his doctor.

Arming himself again with a limited vocabulary, he fired another volley aimed at convincing me he didn’t care whether I was the pope; he wanted his drugs.

I nodded and left the room to relay his message to the nurse.

A bit shocked, the old-school nurse asked me, “Did you tell him that he shouldn’t talk to a chaplain that way?” she asked.

My forthcoming answer seemed to surprise her nearly as much as the patient’s vocabulary.

“No. I think his language represents a

kind of prayer.”

“Prayer?” she asked, as if now questioning my sobriety.

I took her stance as invitation to say more. In the next few minutes, I shared my belief that God hears our expressions of agony, loss or pain as a prayer.

These prayers can be expressed in a wordless whimper, and God hears them. They can be voiced with bloodcurdling screams, and God hears them. They may be vented with words that offend the off-handed listener. The point is no matter how these words are uttered, God hears them and knows how to interpret them.

Our problem often comes when, perhaps like this nurse, we close our hearts and our ears to the kind of language expressed in that level of pain. We do this because we think pain ought not become offensive. “Pain should be neat and controlled,” we reason.

That’s not the way the Psalmist saw it when he wrote, “I cry aloud to the Lord; I lift up my voice to the Lord for mercy. I pour out my complaint before him; before him I tell my trouble” (Psalm 142:1-2).

And it certainly wasn’t the way Job saw it when he lost his entire family. “Therefore I will not keep silent; I will speak out in the anguish of my spirit, I will complain in the bitterness of my soul” (Job 7:11).

I’m not saying we should encourage this language in everyday use. I’m saying that if God doesn’t turn his ears away from even the most excruciating levels of human pain, then how can we?

At the end of the day, I like the metaphor Susan Lenzkes uses in her book, “When Life Takes What Matters.” She says expressing our anger is like beating upon the chest of God, but “... we beat on His chest from within the circle of His arms.”

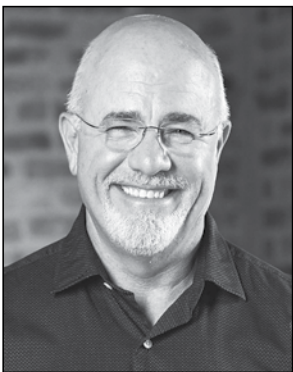
I returned a few hours later to find that his nurse had finally given him the pain meds he needed.

He apologized for the language he’d used toward his chaplain. “No worries,” I said. “All forgiven.”

A few minutes after that, I found the nurse in her station.

“Thanks for your help,” I said.

“God answers prayer chaplain, but sometimes he gets help from a nurse.” ★

STANDARD FAMILY LAW RESTRAINING ORDERS
Starting immediately, you and your spouse or domestic partner are restrained from:
1. removing the minor children of the parties from the state or applying for a new or replacement passport for those minor children without the prior written consent of the other party or an order of the court;
2. cashing, borrowing against, canceling, transferring, disposing of, or changing the beneficiaries of any insurance or other coverage, including life, health automobile, and disability, held for the benefit of the parties and their minor children;
3. transferring, encumbering, hypothecating, concealing, or in any way disposing of any property, real or personal, whether community, quasi-community, or separate, without the written consent of the other party or an order of the court, except in the usual course of business or for the necessities of life; and
4. creating a nonprobate transfer or modifying a nonprobate transfer in a manner that affects the disposition of property subject to the transfer, without the written consent of the other party or an order of the court. Before revocation of a nonprobate transfer can take effect or a right of survivorship to property can be eliminated, notice of the change must be filed and served on the other party.
You must notify each other of any proposed extraordinary expenditures at least five business days prior to incurring these extraordinary expenditures and account to the court for all extraordinary expenditures made after these restraining orders are effective. However, you may use community property, quasi-community property, or your own separate property to pay an attorney to help you or pay court costs.

California Lawmakers’ Safety Gets New Attention After Trump Shooting

Former President Donald Trump evaded serious injury, or death, by mere centimeters after a bullet struck his upper right ear during a campaign rally July 13 in Pennsylvania. The Republican presidential candidate pumped his fist, his face bloodied, as Secret Service agents hustled him off the stage following the shooting. But one spectator was killed, two were critically injured and the Secret Service killed the suspected shooter, identified by the FBI as a 20-year-old Pennsylvania man.

Saturday’s mayhem is the most recent known assassination attempt of a president or presidential candidate since the 1981 shooting of President Ronald Reagan, and renewed conversations about the country’s deep partisan divide, gun safety and dangerous political rhetoric — especially violent threats toward officials and candidates.

So it’s no wonder that beefing up personal security has been a priority for some lawmakers. As explained earlier by CalMatters Capitol reporter Sameea Kamal, the Secretary of the Senate and chief administrative officer of the Assembly said that there has been heightened concern about political violence in recent years, and a bill is underway to protect California lawmakers and candidates from rampant threats.

The measure, Assembly Bill 2041, would allow candidates and elected officials to use more campaign funds for personal security for themselves, family members and staff. Democratic Assemblymember Mia Bonta of Oakland is carrying the bill and said she hopes to “see it across the finish line for the safety of candidates across the state.” If passed, Bonta’s measure could be enacted in time for the November election.

Bonta, in a statement: “(Saturday’s) events show that political violence continues to plague our democracy. ... This bill has had bipartisan support because people on both sides of the aisle recognize the safety needs in this charged political climate.”

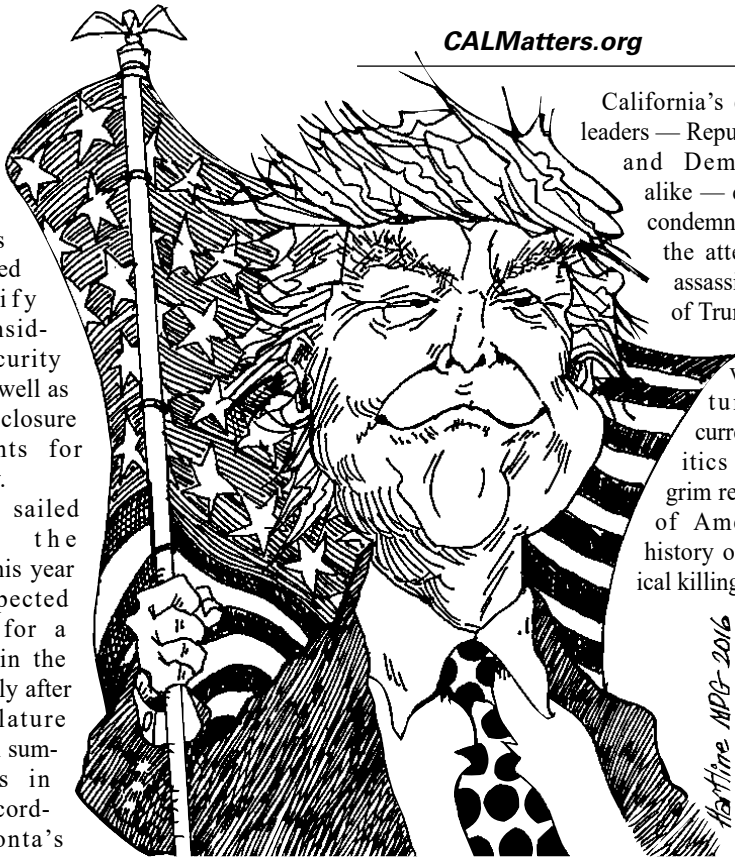
Gov. Gavin Newsom, whose office did not immediately reply to a request for comment, vetoed similar legislation last year, saying that the bill did not clearly define “security

expenses.” Bonta’s newest bill, however, has been amended to specify what’s considered a security expense, as well as clarifies disclosure requirements for transparency.

The bill sailed through the Assembly this year and is expected to be up for a floor vote in the Senate shortly after the Legislature returns from summer recess in August, according to Bonta’s office. It has received no vote in opposition so far, though three Republican senators voted against last year’s bill. During a March hearing in the Assembly’s elections committee, Republican Assemblymember Tom Lackey of Palmdale raised concerns about the “broad potential interpretation of security expenses.”

California is no stranger to shootings tied to the Oval Office. In 1975, a member of the Manson family cult attempted to shoot President Gerald Ford near the state Capitol in Sacramento while Ford was en route to meet then-Gov. Jerry Brown. And in 1968, U.S. Sen. Robert F. Kennedy died shortly after being shot at the Ambassador Hotel in Los Angeles while running for the Democratic presidential nomination.

On July 14, Newsom said he has deployed 61 Highway Patrol and police officers to assist local, state and federal law enforcement during the Republican National Convention in Milwaukee, which kicks off July 15. “Public safety transcends party lines,” said Newsom in a statement. The plan to send these officers has been in the works since May. ★

Gov. Newsom promptly posted on social media that “violence has NO place in our democracy,” a reaction echoed by Assembly Speaker Robert Rivas.

Assembly GOP leader James Gallagher said in an initial statement that “we must completely shut down those who would use violence to snuff out their political opponents.” July 14, he followed up with a post asserting that “calling Trump a modern-day Hitler and making crazed assertions about the end of democracy has not been helpful to the chaos that we now find ourselves in.”

In a statement, Senate Republican leader Brian Jones urged “Americans to take a

That same media has spent hours casting this attempted assassination as anything but what it was, and that’s sickening, even laying it off as “loud noises” disrupt the rally. It’s difficult to even believe that given the level of threats towards him, that a shooter was able to scale a building within 150 meters of his speech and fire multiple rounds. A full and serious investigation needs to be launched into how this failure in security happened. Every single detail about the shooter needs to be public, now.” ★

FBI Investigation Encourages Tips from the Public

WASHINGTON, D.C. (MPG) - The FBI continues to investigate the shooting incident at the July 13 rally in Butler, Pennsylvania, which resulted in one victim's death and injuries to former President Trump and other spectators, as an assassination attempt on former President Donald Trump and as potential domestic terrorism.

The investigation is still in the early stages, and the FBI is providing the following updates, as of 12:05 p.m. July 15:

FBI technical specialists successfully gained access to alleged shooter Thomas Matthew Crooks’ phone and they continue to analyze his electronic devices.

The searches of the subject's residence and vehicle are complete.

The FBI has conducted nearly 100 interviews with law enforcement personnel, event attendees and other witnesses. That work continues.

While the investigative work continues, FBI victim services personnel have offered assistance to the victims of Saturday's incident.

While the investigation to date indicates the shooter acted alone, the FBI continues to conduct logical

investigative activity to determine if there were any co-conspirators associated with this attack. At this time, there are no current public safety concerns.

The FBI has not identified a motive for the shooter’s actions but is working to determine the sequence of events and the shooter’s movements prior to the shooting, collecting and reviewing evidence, conducting interviews and following up on all leads. The shooter’s telephone was obtained for examination.

Suspicious devices found at both locations have been rendered safe by bomb technicians and are being evaluated at the FBI Laboratory.

The firearm used in the shooting was purchased legally.

The shooter was not known to the FBI prior to this incident.

The FBI has received hundreds of digital media tips, which include photos and videos taken at the scene, and continues to review incoming tips. Anyone with information that might assist with the ongoing investigation is encouraged to submit it online at tips.fbi.gov or call 1-800-CALL-FBI.
