ELK GROVE, CA (MPG) - The new Elk Grove Macy's opened with a ribbon-cutting Aug. 23 in the Laguna Crossroads shopping center at Laguna Boulevard and Bruceville Road.

While the Elk Grove Chamber of Commerce staged the ribbon-cutting, early visitors browsed the store the day before its grand opening. The 31,000-square-foot store offers scaled-down departments for men's and women's clothing and shoes, children's wear and toys.

Council Weighs

Emissions Reduction **Ideas**

ELK GROVE, CA (MPG) - How to reduce greenhouse gas emissions from buildings was the focus of the Aug. 14 Elk Grove City Council meeting, with questions of how to balance the city's goal of addressing climate change with the costs faced by homeowners and business owners.

Carrie Whitlock, strategic planning and innovation program manager, made the presentation, which is part of development on the Climate Compass, the city's plan to meet its climate, sustainability and resilience goals. City Council did not take formal action on the informational

sions made up 38% of Elk Grove's greenhouse emissions in 2021; these emissions come from electricity generation for residential and nonresidential buildings, from residential and nonresidential natural gas and from backup generators.

Building sector emis-

Based on state forecasts, the city's overall emissions will decrease slightly by 2030 but the proportion of emissions from buildings will grow to 46%. The graph does not account for Sacramento Municipal Utility District's pledge to reach zero carbon emissions by 2030; Whitlock said if the district succeeds, this would eliminate the electricity emissions.

By 2045, overall emissions are projected to drop by more than half. Building emissions would make up more than 52% of the total, with natural gas as the only contributor.

Whitlock said the lack of electricity emissions is due to a state law requiring all electricity to come from renewable sources by 2045.

In both 2030 and 2045, a significant gap remains between the emissions currently projected and the state-mandated target.

Whitlock detailed potential strategies to lower emissions. One possibility involved creating a "reach code" that sets a higher standard in a certain metric for new construction, major renovations and appliance retrofits. For existing structures, this

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Californians: Your Rent May Go Up Because of Rising Insurance Rates

CALIFORNIA (MPG) - Like single-family homeowners in California, landlords are facing higher insurance premiums, too. And they're passing along some of those costs to their tenants.

Many insurance companies have stopped writing policies in the state because of increased wildfire risks, but that's not the only reason. They say in the case of any catastrophe, the potential costs of replacing any residential or commercial property, from labor to material costs, is just plain more expensive now. So even owners of properties in areas that are not at high risk for wildfires have had their policies canceled because their buildings may need repairs or improvements. Landlords are having to find other insurers, or having to turn to the ever-growing and more expensive FAIR Plan, the insurance industry-run plan that is mandated under California law to be the insurer of last resort.

This is where the insurance crisis could worsen the housing crisis, according to some experts. Increased insurance costs for properties other than single-family homes are starting to affect the rental market — in a state where almost half of residents are renters - and could compound the state's housing problems, they say.

Josh Hoover, an insurance broker in the Los Angeles area, handles mostly commercial accounts and said "it's almost impossible" to find coverage for any large structure. In late 2022, Allstate said it would stop writing new property insurance in the state, including commercial policies. Then State Farm, the biggest insurer in the state, recently canceled policies for tens of thousands of homes, residential community associations, business owners and commercial apartment properties.

"Even buildings made in the '80s are now considered old, which is ridiculous," Hoover said. "Most carriers want everything updated in the last 30 years. They want a new roof, electrical redone, plumbing redone — they want you to have copper pipes."

For Landlords, 'Death by a Thousand Cuts'

Earlier this year, Farmers canceled the policy on a 33-unit apartment building



in San Bernardino that was built in the 1960s, said its co-owner, Uwe Karbenk. Karbenk found an outof-state insurer instead of going with the more expensive FAIR Plan, but his premium has still increased by \$28,000 to more than \$41,000 a year.

Combined with state laws that limit how much he is allowed to raise the rent each year — 5% plus inflation, or up to 10% in some cases, with possibly other rent-control measures on the way — Karbenk said being a landlord in California is "a little bit like death by a thousand cuts." He added that if his profit margin continues to shrink, he would rather invest in something else besides real estate.

"One of these measures, it's not a big deal," Karbenk said. "But over the years, it's really difficult for mom-and-pops."

Mike Placido and his wife are definitely a momand-pop. They own two rental properties, a fourunit building in San Gabriel and a duplex in Alhambra. He said they bought the properties as a way to supplement their retirement income when the time comes in a few

When State Farm canceled the policy on their San Gabriel property, Placido got a quote from the FAIR Plan for \$8,600, much higher than their old \$2,600 premium. Instead, he was able to cobble together three different policies from a Florida-based insurer to get the coverage the old policy provided for \$6,500, a 150% increase. So he said he plans to raise rents in January.

"It's not like I'm some land baron," Placido said.

"I'll pass along as much as I possibly can, as much as the market can bear, and I'll shoulder the rest. I have no choice '

Yet Another Worry for Renters

About 44% o f Californians are renters, according to the U.S. Census. The median monthly rent in the state is \$2,850, a third higher than the national figure, according to online real estate marketer Zillow. About 30% of the state's renters are considered severely cost-burdened, meaning they spend at least half of their income on housing, according to an analysis by the Public Policy Institute of California. Now their rents could rise to even more burdensome levels.

Shanti Singh, legislative director for statewide renters' rights organization Tenants Together, said "it's still kind of an unknown how common it is" that tenants' rents are rising along with insurance costs, partly because not all landlords say why they're raising rents.

"It depends on the landlords," Singh said. "Some are transparent; a lot of them aren't."

Any significant rent increases have not yet shown up in Zillow's data, which shows California's median rent is actually down about \$100 compared with last year, though it has climbed higher since the beginning of the year.

In the Bay Area, two renters who didn't want to be named out of fear of retaliation from their landlord said the rents at their live-work complex jumped earlier this year, and the reason was spelled out to them in an email that had "insurance costs" in the subject line.

Singh said she fears things will only get worse for renters as the effects of climate change, such as wildfires, continue to weigh on the affordability of insurance, and in turn, housing.

"Tenants are going to have the least recourse," Singh said. They "always uninhabitable and uninsurable — whichever comes

Sarah Karlinsky, director of research at the Terner Center for Housing Innovation at UC Berkeley, said the lack of enough housing within already developed cities means more building "at the fringe of regions, in places that are more dangerous,"

climate change make it more important than ever for renters to have their own insurance, said Emily Rogan, senior program officer for United Policyholders, a consumer advocacy group.

Renters insurance would cover the costs for tenants to stay "somewhere else as you figure out where to live in case of a severe weather event," Rogan

Effects on Commercial **Properties and Businesses**

Small businesses that rent their space will be affected by their landlords' rising premiums, too.

John Reed owns a mixed-use commercial property in Oakhurst, outside Yosemite — an area that has seen its share of fires in the past several years. Last year, his fire insurance cost about \$2,800, but Berkshire Hathaway canceled his policy. He got three different quotes from the FAIR Plan, with the highest being \$24,000. Then, he found a plan from Lloyd's of London for about \$14,000.

Reed said he will have

Housing and Climate Change

Singh and others who deal with California's lack of affordable housing expressed concern about whether certain parts of the state will eventually be also known as the wildland urban interface, or the WUI, in wildfire speak.

"If we don't want to continue down this road, we have to fundamentally rethink our development patterns," Karlinsky added.

Laurie Johnson, an urban planner and former chief catastrophe response and resiliency officer for the California Earthquake Authority, pointed out that some property owners in the state who own their buildings and have no mortgages might choose not to insure their properties because of the rising costs. That's worrisome, she said.

"It feels like we want to keep our multifamily stock insured and don't want to take the risk of losing it," Johnson said. Hoover, the insurance broker, agreed and said he has had some clients tell him they plan to forgo insurance.

Johnson added that just as jurisdictions have been requiring seismic retrofitting in case of earthquakes, protection against fires and other catastrophes — and the ability to replace whatever might be lost — is vital: "You would be dis-

placing so many people."

The growing risks of

to pass on his increased costs to his six tenants. "As a landlord, I can't hit them with the whole burden all at once," he said. "If I'm able to afford it, I will try to spread that out over a two- or three-year period."

California's insurance commissioner, Ricardo Lara, has unveiled a multipart plan to address the state's insurance woes, mainly focused on wildfires. For example, insurers will be allowed to use catastrophe models if they agree to write policies in certain areas of the state. But Insurance Department spokesperson Michael Soller pointed out that Lara also recently announced a deal with the FAIR Plan that creates a high-value commercial coverage option. "The reforms will have

broad benefits for the availability of insurance," Soller said.

SEATTLE (MPG) - Petty Officer 2nd Class Manuel BarriosLucano, a native of Elk Grove, California, serves aboard USS Barry, a U.S. Navy warship homeported at Naval Station Everett, Washington.

The ship is currently in a Seattle shipyard undergoing routine maintenance.

BarriosLucano graduated from Elk Grove High School in 2020.

The skills and values needed to succeed in the Navy are similar to those found in Elk Grove.

"Two lessons I learned growing up in my hometown that I apply to my Navy career are being aware of different cultures and being openminded," said BarriosLucano. "We have a lot of cultures in the Navy and a lot of different types of people, so you have to be mindful of how you talk to people and be open-minded."

BarriosLucano joined the Navy three years ago. Today, BarriosLucano serves as a damage controlman.

With 90% of global commerce traveling by sea and access to the internet relying on the security of undersea fiber optic cables, Navy officials continue to emphasize that the prosperity of the United States is directly linked to recruiting and retaining talented people from across the rich fabric of America.

BarriosLucano has many opportunities to achieve accomplishments during military service.

County Rezones Aim to Boost Affordable Housing

Sacramento County News Release

SACRAMENTO COUNTY, CA (MPG) - The Sacramento County Board of Supervisors voted Aug. 20 to adopt a series of resolutions and ordinances to rezone sites throughout the county, a move aimed at addressing the shortfall of 2,884 units in the county's Regional Housing Needs Allocation (RHNA) for the lower-income category (households with incomes less than 80 percent of area median income; income levels less than \$69,050).

The plan will rezone 74 infill sites across the county to allow for the construction of housing units for a range of income levels. By rezoning these parcels, the county hopes to encourage developers to build more multi-family units and subsidized housing projects.

"This rezone project is a significant step toward addressing the critical housing shortage in Sacramento County and we have certain sites that already have developer interest," said Todd Smith, Sacramento County planning director.

"By prioritizing the development of lower-income housing units, we are not only meeting our immediate obligations but also laying the groundwork for a more inclusive, equitable and green future," Smith said. "These rezones will create opportunities for families and individuals who need it most, ensuring that our communities remain vibrant and diverse while also reducing vehicle miles traveled, meaning lower greenhouse gas emissions."

The 74 rezoned sites are located

within 10 community planning areas: Antelope, Arden-Arcade, Carmichael/ Old Foothill Farms, Cordova, Fair Oaks, North Highlands, Orangevale, Rio Linda/

Elverta, South Sacramento and Vineyard.

These rezones take effect on Sept. 19. While the Regional Housing Needs Allocation obligations have now been met, the county remains committed to increasing residential capacity in furtherance of section A1 of the County's Housing Element with a goal of rezoning additional sites in 2025. ★

Back when flip phones were on the cutting edge, I was a police reporter, pho-

cutting edge, I was a police reporter, photographer and religion-page editor for The Cañon City Daily Record newspaper in Colorado. Life was never boring.

But I wanted to be a novelist.

Writing feature stories assuaged my longing to push a more creative pen, and my newspaper's Back in Time section often had me mining treasures at the local history museum for all sorts of fascinating facts.

Like the account of Utes in the 1860s who made off with a settler's child. Mom quickly retrieved her son, trading him for a pan of freshly baked biscuits. Another settler camping along the Arkansas River

dropped his sidearm on a rock in his firepit and shot himself to death.

Who needs fiction?

Evidently, I did, because all those stories from the 1800s primed the pump of my author's heart. I began incubating the historical-fiction series, The Cañon City Chronicles.

Gold was never found in Cañon City, but the fertile fields and orchards fed miners at Cripple Creek, Leadville and elsewhere. And the gold that mattered most trickled down mountain ravines in yellow aspen and shone in the character of hearty souls who peopled the town.

Such background details made it into my first book in the series, "Loving the Horseman." So did the bit about the guy who shot himself.

Over time, the fictional Hutton family developed against the backdrop of actual local events like the Royal Gorge Wars and the Bone Wars. One book mentions Old Mose, a famous rogue grizzly, and focuses on moving pictures, or flickers, filmed in the area in the early 1900s.

Most of the characters in these books are people I've cooked up on my own. But others sneak up on me when I'm

not looking, leaving me with the sense that I've met them before and just can't remember when or where.

One such character fits the latter category: a little cowboy named Kip.

He's the youngest of three brothers, the tag-along. The one who gets left out more often than not.

Recently, I realized where I'd met Kip,

though that wasn't his real name. He was a student from my other life as a sixth-grade teacher: my Dandelion Cowboy.

Each morning he'd line up in front of my classroom with the rest of the first-period students. Except he wasn't much like the rest of the students.

In his Wranglers and scuffed cowboy boots, he didn't dress like the others.

A towhead among dark-haired children,

he quietly stuck out in spite of how much he tried not to.

But in the spring when the dandelions

But in the spring when the dandelions sprouted, he was often at the front of the line with a short-stemmed bouquet and a shy smile.

The little cowboy was a loner. A throwback, perhaps, from a long line of those who prefer the company of their horse and a good view of the herd. I didn't realize he was Kip until after the fact. After he'd become a favorite secondary character in books 4, 5 and 6 of my series.

series.

Today when I see a patch of what most people call weeds, I wonder about my Dandelion Cowboy, if he stuck to his ways

in spite of the crowd.

I like to think he embodies a verse from the New Testament that says, "Obviously, I'm not trying to win the approval of people, but of God" (Galatians 1:10 NLT).

And maybe there's a little bit of me in Grace Hutton, the main character from Book 6, when she says of her favorite nephew Kip, "That boy could smile the sun right out of the sky."

Board of Supervisors Adopts Infill Program

Sacramento County News Release

SACRAMENTO COUNTY, CA (MPG) - The Sacramento County Board of Supervisors voted Aug. 20 to adopt the County's Infill Program Update and directed staff to implement certain actions identified in the plan to accelerate the Program.

Ιn 2021. July Sacramento County received a Local Early Action Planning (LEAP) grant for an update to the 2008 Infill Program with the purpose of identifying current barriers to infill development and developing a strategy to address these barriers.

Informed by the prior effort, stakeholder engagement and recent Board

direction resulting from the Development Review Process Improvements Review and the Board's Housing and Infill Workshop, the Infill Program Update is a roadmap to facilitating policy and procedural changes and increasing and accelerating housing production in the county.

'Residential, commercial and mixed-use projects resulting from the adoption of this program will create more vibrant communities, and investment in these communities," said Todd Smith, Sacramento County planning director.

"Infill development also helps cut down on long commutes, lowering greenhouse gas emissions, contributing to a more sustainable environment, which is a big priority for Sacramento County."

The Program Update identifies seven barriers to infill development and provides an implementation program consisting of 13 actions intended to address these barriers.

New growth areas -Greenfield development in new growth areas is often

Barriers to infill include:

seen as being more cost-efficient and easier than acquiring and assembling land for the construction of infill development.

Infrastructure - Many of the traditional commercial corridors in the county were built and designated for cars rather than people and have aging utility infrastructure that may now be equipped to handle new higher-density

development.

High development costs Another major barrier to infill can be the high cost associated with acquiring urbanized land, project application fees and development impact fees for improvements in the public right of way.

Lot size and parcel assembly - It is common for parcels in already urbanized areas to be smaller than in areas designated for greenfield development.

Permitting process -Longer and more difficult paths to approval can dramatically add to project costs and timelines.

Development regulations – Strict and complex zoning standards and design guidelines that do not allow for flexibility can

present barriers to successful infill development.

Coordination - The number of departments and agencies in the county necessitates time-consuming coordination among internal departments and divisions and external agencies.

The actions identified to address these barriers range from actions that can be taken immediately to those that may take years to fully implement and include: increase coordination with residents. community groups and stakeholders, increase coordination and partnerships with agencies/ departments involved in the development review process, amend existing fee reduction and waiver programs, expand other financial programs and resources, Development Process Managers, hire Infill Coordinators, hire on-call consultants, expand the Fast Track Permit Processing Program, expand and routinely update applicant resources, analyze and amend Special Planning Areas and Neighborhood Preservation Areas and Corridor Plans, establish mixed-use zoning districts and objective standards, update Zoning Code Development Standards and update the County's General Plan.

could be triggered at the time of retrofit. She said this policy would allow flexibility in which fuel source a house will use. The city of Sacramento has adopted a similar policy, and Sacramento County is considering its own.

For existing developments, the city could develop a comprehensive building energy retrofit plan aimed at decarbonization. This choice would delay implementation until after the plan is complete, and the extent of emissions benefits would depend on the plan's details.

Another suggestion was to raise the minimum percentage of new residential development that must be all-electric. Whitlock said 43% of Elk Grove's new development is all-electric, above the city's current quota. She noted that the concept could have a "significant impact" on emissions, depending on the new minimum, but it gives less fuel-source

Additionally, Whitlock was concerned such a regulation could run afoul of a recent federal court decision that prevents local governments from regulating the amount of natural gas used on a property.

Representatives of Realtors and building trades supported reducing emissions but urged City Council to assist homeowners and mitigate effects on housing costs.

Joshua Oken, government affairs coordinator for Sacramento Association of Realtors, commended Elk Grove for taking steps on climate change.

"However, it is crucial to our fight against climate change does not inadvertently place undue burdens on homeowners and prospective homeowners within our communities," Oken said, adding that rising house prices disproportionately affect first-time buyers. He supported a program to recycle old appliances and said education is important for residents to engage.

Vance Jarrard, a legislative advocate for North State Building Industry Association, said his group sees "challenges" in how a reach code could raise housing costs and looks forward to continuing discussion.

Councilmember Darren Suen supported city-funded grants to help existing residents meet new standards.

Registering surprise at the proportion of new all-electric housing, Suen asked Jarrard to comment on the trend.

"In general, I would say that the trend is going toward more electric overall. I think homebuilders see that there is a desire for it in the market and a push from the state to head in that direction," Jarrard said. He continued that developers have concerns about the ability of utilities to meet the higher electricity demand.

Vice-Mayor Rod Brewer agreed with Suen on retrofit costs; he supported working with banks to create homeowner

Councilmember Kevin Spease asked about the triggers for the reach code proposal, which Whitlock said would have to be defined while developing the policy. Spease asked to involve the restaurant industry in discussions.

Councilmember Sergio Robles reiterated the need to involve industries.

"Let's just make sure that we're not affecting the first-generation business owners, the first-generation restaurants at a time when they're closing all over the region," Robles said.

Mayor Bobbie Singh-Allen pointed to the practical and legal concerns with the proposals as the "greatest challenge" and emphasized avoiding harm to low-income


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Kings Korner By V.G. Harris

Labor Unions, Cities Unite Against Cardroom SB 549

Elevate Public Affairs News Release

SACRAMENTO REGION, CA (MPG) - The California Gaming Association, California Cardroom Alliance and Communities for California Cardrooms announce growing opposition with many labor unions joining against Senate Bill 549 by Sen. Josh Newman as it could have a "devastating impact on public sector jobs."

Joining in opposition to SB 549 includes the American Federation of State, County and Municipal Employees (AFSCME), California Professional Firefighters, and SEIU California and Teamsters Local 630 as well as a growing number of locals such as AFSCME District Council 36, **AFSCME District Council** 57. AFSCME Local 101. International Union of Painters and Allied Trades DC 36, Los Angeles County Firefighters Local 1014 and the Los Angeles County Professional Peace Officers Association.

They join a growing number of cities that have filed letters in opposition including California Contract Cities Association, California Cities for Self-Reliance Joint Powers Authority, California Cities Gaming Authority, City of Bell Gardens, Town of Colma, City of Chula Vista, City of Citrus Heights, City of Commerce, City of Compton, City of Emeryville, City of Gardena, City of The measure

Hawaiian Gardens, City of Inglewood, City of Oceanside, City of San Jose and City of Tracy.

SB 549 will create a PAGA-like law for gaming tribes to be able to sue their competitors - the cardrooms. This would usurp state regulators and the Attorney General which oversee the legality and permissibility of cardroom games. It would also permit for the first time ever a one-sided injustice as cardrooms would not be allowed to sue tribal casinos. The joint letter opposing SB 549 by these labor unions states: "SB 549 Could Have a Devastating Impact on Public Sector Jobs: SB 549 is an attack on local cardrooms, which are a significant source of revenue for general funds in many cities across California... Many have revenue sharing agreements with municipalities providing a significant amount of funding for essential public services like police,

fire, parks and recreation, etc. The measure could easily force cardrooms out of business and result in a loss of \$500 million in tax revenue statewide — meaning less revenue for public safety, public health, homelessness services and infrastructure.

The loss of local tax revenue could spell devastation for many cities across California. For example, approximately 78% of the City of Hawaiian Gardens' general fund comes from cardroom revenues. Similarly, 50% of the City of Commerce's general fund comes from cardroom revenues. Larger cities like San Jose and Fresno would also be seriously impacted. This bill will destabilize essential services.

If signed into law, cities who depend on this revenue stream could be forced into municipal bankruptcy or even disincorporation. This could have potentially devastating impacts that puts jobs, pensions and the financial wellbeing of working families at risk. We have seen this happen before: the Orange County Bankruptcy."

"SB 549 Puts Workers in the Middle: The mere cost of litigation alone could lead to lower wages, loss of jobs or cardroom closures. And cardroom closures could devastate some cities who may have to file for municipal bankruptcy or disincorporate."
