Holliston murals connect downtown with Rail Trail

Caoin Springer O'Durgy and his team were busy this

summer creating vibrant murals around town as part of the Regional Trails Creative

Placemaking Strategy project, a collaborative effort between the town and the Metropolitan Area Planning Council.

The Select Board awarded the contract to O'Durgy in August.

"____," said Archana Menon, a Holliston resident and Arts & Culture Fellow who led the project. "___."

The whimsical murals, painted in a color-blind-friendly palette, can be found on the doors of the Blair Square pavilion and two downtown electrical boxes.

The Blair Square mural "features a pavilion symbolizing Holliston's history, with a trail weaving through the town's architecture and creating a path through time. Portals found in doorways physically connect different eras, inviting viewers to reflect on the town's rich heritage. The mural also includes dynamic 3D hanging

acrylic pieces that depict how the rail-trail might be traveled in different periods, with some figures designed to move in the wind."

The electrical boxes can be found along Washington Street at Green Street and Hollis Street. The Green Street box "represents Holliston's contemporary community, with figures walking towards downtown, their attire reflecting various historical periods beyond the colonial era;" and the Hollis Street box "symbolizes Holliston's future, featuring futuristic elements juxtaposed with the town's timeless architecture."

A "grand unveiling" celebration was held on Sept. 24.

O'Durgy and his team, The Good Boy Collective (a trans-led group of artists dedicated to fostering support and collaboration within the artistic community), are based in Somerville.



The primary logo Mark highlights is a colorful word collage calling out Holliston's many neighborhoods and longtime organizations that have contributed to the fabric of the town.



Reflecting on the year of celebration, Mark says the committee has done amazing work, and she says there are many ways for people to volunteer within the community.



Holliston's Citizen of the Year 2024

As we celebrate Holliston's 300 Anniversary we are pleased to announce the 2024 Citizens of the Year, Mark E. Dellicker and Gina Stucchi.

Gina Stucchi grew up and lives in Holliston with her husband, Rob Stucchi, who is also a lifelong Holliston resident. She is the mother of three children who are now growing up in Holliston, and she works full-time at Ahronian Landscaping here in town. Continuing the legacy of her parents, Mark and Linda Ahronian, she is now a second-generation Citizen of the Year.

Gina is an active leader in recovery-based ministry, the founder of the Holliston Drug and Alcohol Awareness Coalition, a member of the Holliston Lions Club, a room parent, and a volunteer for the Cystic Fibrosis Foundation Cycle for Life.

She has been a board member of the Celebrate Holliston committee for 8 years and is, more recently, the co-chair of the Holliston Annual Holiday Stroll. She has been instrumental in the town 300th Anniversary activities, especially the parade.

Gina has explained that volunteerism is foundational to the happiness and friendships she has enjoyed in this community.

The committee honors Gina as she embodies the word "volunteer," and her work helps make Holliston a wonderful place to live.

Mark E. Dellicker has lived in Holliston his whole life. He is the second oldest of five boys (son of beloved Jackie and Henry Dellicker). Mark has four



children and six grandchildren (2 sons and 2 grandchildren still live in Holliston!). Mark was a member of the Holliston Fire Department for over thirty-two years with a total of 41 years in the fire service. At age 65, Mark retired as the Deputy Fire Chief, however, is in the process of getting an extension to the age of 70.

Mark's love for Holliston is evident in everything he does. From helping the yearly "boot drive" for Muscular Dystrophy to donating heavy equipment during fire calls, you can find him everywhere in town.

Owning his own construction business since 1979, he has used his talents to help others in town. From helping with projects at the Green Street Pavilion and the High School Field house, to the Engine 3 garage expansion to aiding in the Historical Society's renovations (preserving their barn, donating old timbers etc.) as well donating his equipment to paint various flag poles in town as well as the Touch a Truck events for kids to the Holliston Booster Associations "Duck Drop" Fundraiser.

Mark also donated antique trucks and Holliston's 1928

Engine 1 to the Holliston Parades. He has also helped Holliston's Veterans by donating his time and equipment.

Perhaps what Mark is best known for helping elder neighbors and friends with snow removal and explaining property issues to new home owners. He is on the Board of Overseers at the Charles

River Bank, "giving a voice to the average homeowner and small businesses in town".

Moreover, Mark donated his time and equipment at the Food Pantry in its the transition from the Water Street to Charles location and is instrumental each year at their annual "Souper" Bowl fundraiser.

Mark enjoys volunteering because at a young age his parents, Jackie and Henry, instilled in him and his brothers that if you belong to a community, you give back to the community. That sense of pride and commitment to the town of Holliston is deeply rooted in Mark.

Open Enrollment: Medical Plans & Health Savings Accounts (HSA)

Open enrollment is a pivotal time to reassess and select the benefits that best suit your needs.

Among the key benefits you'll choose are insurances (i.e. medical. dental/vision. life, AD&D. disability), services (i.e. legal), tax benefit programs (i.e. dependent care, commuter) and retirement plan participation (i.e. 401k).

An area perplexing many is analyzing High Deductible Health Plans (HDHP) and their tax savings counterpart, Health Savings Accounts (HSAs). Understanding these options can help you make informed decisions.

Choosing the right medical plan.

When it comes to selecting a medical plan, a few ground rules take precedence.

First, a medical plan is a personal choice, and you need to be comfortable with the care received "in-network". Second. need to understand of your historical annual medical bills and expect consistency moving forward.

Case for High Deductible Health Plans (HDHPs).

Cost Structure: HDHPs feature lower monthly premiums but higher deductibles. You pay all costs up to the deductible before your plan starts covering expenses.

Financial Management: While HDHPs can have higher out-of-pocket costs, the lower premiums and tax advantages of an HSA can offset these costs.

Health Savings Account (HSA) Eligibility: Selecting a HDHP is required to participate in a HSA.

HDHPs are often beneficial if you are healthy, don't anticipate high medical expenses, and want to take advantage of the HSA's tax benefits.

Health Savings Account (HSA).

Only during Open Enrollment or Life Event can you Opt-In to an HSA with a HDHP and \$ amount to contribute. You can change the \$ amount later, but not the ability to Opt-In.

Key HSA facts:

- In 2025, an individual can contribute \$4,300 and a family up to \$8,550.
- If over 55, contribute an additional \$1,000.
- All contributions are tax-free federal, state, and FICA (Social Security and Medicare).
- No federal taxes on HSA funds spent on qualified health care expenses.
- Excess HSA funds can be invested for tax-free growth to compound for years.

Thus, unlike any other tax-advantaged savings plan, HSA can offer "triple tax benefits": taxfree contributions, tax-free earnings, and tax-free distributions.

Free money.

Shockingly, over 50% of eligible Americans decline to participate in an HSA. Unbelievable considering most employers put \$500-\$2,000 each year into an

HSA. In theory, \$1 per pay period could return \$500-\$2,000 per year from your employer take it!

Furthermore, "health rewards" programs can earn deposits into HSA by doing preventative care activities. Examples like \$400 deposited when each spouse had an annual physical.

Get the tax savings.

Consider a family in 24% tax bracket averaging \$4,000 in outof-pocket medical expenses. HSA tax-free contributions would provide them tax savings of \$1,466 (\$960 federal 24% + \$200 state MA 5% + \$306 FICA 7.65%). A family in 32% bracket can max out 2025 contributions and gain tax savings of \sim \$3,817.

Leverage tax-free growth for retirement.

Gaining momentum is a financial planning strategy of avoiding withdrawals from HSAs and pay medical expenses from free cash flow. This allows for investment in funds/ETFs to grow tax-free for years before using in retirement for eligible expenses like Medicare premiums, vision, dental, hearing aids, nursing services, long-term care premiums, and medical expenses.

Retire Early crowd please note, while HSAs cannot be used to pay private health insurance premiums, they can pay for health care coverage purchased through an employer-sponsored plan under COBRA, which may be a desired option leaving a company and maintaining 18 months until reaching Medicare eligibility.



Knights of Columbus Fundraising Events | Struggling With **Raise Record Amount for Charity**

Knights of Columbus Council 14224 conducted two major fundraising events this year for charity. They held their Sixteenth Annual Charity Raffle and Third Annual Swing for Charity Golf Tournament, with both events culminating at the golf event on June 21.

Combined, they raised \$30,000 for local non-profit charitable organizations. This brings their 16-year charitable fundraising to \$350,000 - and they're not stopping there!

When the raffle originally began, raffle chair Tom Anguish explained that it was designated as "temporary" since it is very labor-intensive and timeconsuming. It was supposed to be replaced when the council brothers found an easier way to raise funds. Sixteen years later it's still going on, but slightly reduced in size as the golf tournament has found its footing and increased in popularity due to its charitable focus.

Golf chair Tony Polise feels that the two events combined seem to have found the key to success even though they still demand considerable effort to achieve the results the council wants to reach. Still - success for both activities depends on the support of the public. Council Grand Knight Al Scaramella pointed out that "these funds can only be reached as long as people believe that the organizations we're supporting are doing good work and they want to contribute to their success."

The raffle raised \$15,000 while offering \$3,000 in total prize money this year with five winners. First Prize went to Ellie Stackpole, Second Prize was won by Cindy Pratt, and Third Prize by Colleen Rainsford. A generous patron purchased the ticket which was drawn for Fourth Prize winner - the MetroWest Veterans Emergency Relief Fund, and the Fifth Prize winner was Tim Perry. All the winners were very thankful for winning and grateful for where the donations were going to be distributed.

As for the Swing for Charity Golf Tournament, this year's event was dedicated to

St. Mary's of Holliston the memory of Sylvia and Bill Stickney who devoted many years guiding and improving the Holliston Pantry Shelf. It also raised \$15,000 with 91 golfers participating and the weather was beautiful. Two teams tied for First Place with a low score of 58. A tie-breaker rule determining that Steve Snow, Dan Higgins, Brian Sanford, and Tim Smith were the winners. The Second Place Team was composed of Karen, Dan, Sean and Patrick Jewett. There was another tie for Third Place and this time the tie-breaker rule determined that Paul Fitzpatrick, Jim MacMunn and Noak Yanes received the award. Garland Busby won the Longest Drive (Men) and Jim Archer the Closest to the Pin Award at 9ft 10 inches. There was also an Air Cannon Closest to the Pin contest which was won by Mike





Holliston Volleyball Wants To Take That Next Step

Last fall the Holliston volleyball team was able to put together a 14-4 regular season record earning themselves a five seed in the Division 3 State Tournament.

Once there the Panthers took out Chicopee and Greater New Bedford each by a decisive 3-0 win. Unfortunately, in the next round, Holliston would go the distance and fell 3-2 to Amherst-Pelham in the Quarter Finals ending their season.

Having lost five seniors to last year's squad, Coach Bob Scumaci will once again be going back to this year's seniors to carry the team. Over the past few years, the Holliston coach has looked to his seniors to carry the bulk of the work on the court and this year is no different; all eight upper classmen will be relied on to take this team deep into the post-season.

Tri-captains Ashley Rokus (outside hitter), Shea Aldredge (libero) and Isabelle Glenn-Smith (middle hitter) will be at the top of the senior chain guiding the Panthers this season. Veronica "Ronni" Stasevich will be the floor captain or the manager on the court. She will interact with the referees and run the Panthers defense on the court.

Seniors Michaela McGovern (middle hitter) and Alia Montvila (right side) round out the senior starters for this year's team.

Stasevich, the floor captain, will be looked upon to continue playing her typical fantastic volleyball. According to the Coach, she does it all – pass, serve and hit. She is also a very quick individual and Scumaci noted he would love to have 10-12 Stasevich's on his team.

"Ronni is a very coachable individual who listens to everything you tell her," the Coach said. "She is a very quiet person, but when she does talk, the rest of the team listens. Her volleyball IQ is tops and she plays club volleyball for Slam and is part of their National team."

Glenn-Smith is what the Coach calls an unassuming player; she is not your typical big



normal middle hitter but being a basketball player, she can jump and does hit hard.

"The opposition looks at her and thinks that she is too thin to hit hard, but she has technique and hitting is her hidden power," Scumaci said. "Teams don't think that they need to double block her, but they soon find out that by not doing so is a big, big mistake and she makes them pay."

Aldredge is the team's number one defensive player and as the libero she knows where she needs to get the ball. She is a very smart player that can move short distances at lightning speed and if she can not get to that destination she is more than willing to sacrifice her body and slide on the court to do so. She gives everything that she has and plays all out all of the time.

Montvila is a lefty that plays on the right side feeding into her skill set. She is another unassuming young lady who according to the Coach has the best vertical leap on the team.

"Alia can not only jump, but she can hit the ball with the best of them," said the Coach. "She is just amazing to watch on the court and this is her year. Last year she didn't get a lot of balls sent her way, but I'm expecting great things from her this year." Rokus is your typical volleyball player – tall, thin, smart and knows where and when to be when hitting the ball. Over the years Scumaci has seen her go from a timid individual to the powerhouse she is today. The Coach noted that when she is right, there is no one that can defend her hits.

McGovern is a great volleyball player in the middle; she knows exactly what needs to be done and where to do it. When she is not on the court, Scumaci considers her the team cheerleader where she is cheering and clapping for her teammates. She has an incredible presence and knows how to play the game.

Junior Grace Whitten will be the Panther's setter or as Scumaci calls her, the team's offensive conductor. Everything that happens on the Holliston side of the court goes through the junior. Her volleyball play is phenomenal, while her vertical leap is fantastic – she is another player that Scumaci says he would love to have a bunch of playing for him. The coach also believes that come next fall she is going to blow people away with her play as well as her knowledge of the game.

Although at the time of this writing the season was still in the early stages of the season, the Coach has liked what the team has shown him and believes that if they continue this way they should be able to accomplish their goals.

Holliston stepped on the court for the first time this year with the thought of capturing the ever-so-tough Tri-Valley Legue Championship. Once that is accomplished, their next goal is to go further in the playoffs than they did last fall and eclipse the Quarter Finals.

"In my opinion I want them to go out and have fun without getting hurt," Scumaci said. "However, the girls want to win and you can see that they did work hard in the off-season and are ready to make that a reality. If they continue to practice and keep care of themselves the way that they should there is absolutely no doubt that they can do anything they set their minds to."

The Holliston Coach went on to say that his philosophy is that everything they do in the gym is the most important part of a successful season.

"As a Coach, that's where I come in - I can help them get ready in the gym but that is all that I can do," he said. "What happens after that is all up to them; they're the ones, all of them, on the court playing the game."

With all the work that the team put in prior to the season getting underway there is no reason that the Panthers cannot accomplish what they set out to do this fall; that is if they stay healthy and play their game on the court.




