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Meals on Wheels Sits Down

WEST SACRAMENTO, CA (MPG) - There is something about breaking bread with someone, especially in the senior years.

Meals on Wheels (MOW) Yolo County Executive Director Joy Cohan said the U.S. Surgeon General declared an epidemic of loneliness last year, pointing to the negative effects on physical and mental health.

"The impacts of this epidemic are especially poignant for seniors, many of whom already bore the brunt of the pandemic," Cohan said.

But now Café Yolo, located in the City of West Sacramento Community Center, ends eating alone. "Revitalizing the

local businesses with increased tourism and promotes health, wellness and community spirit," Guerrero said. "Hosting such a prestigious event highlights our city's capacity for large-scale events while inspiring residents to engage in active lifestyles."

According to the city's government affairs manager Doug Drozd, the city is anticipating nearly 3,000 participants to make their way into West Sacramento during the Oct. 27 weekend. With that many visitors coming into town, the economic and social benefit to the city will be substantial, according to officials.

West Sacramento is an idyllic place for a triathlon,

as the American River was voted one of the best swimming courses in the country, according to IRONMAN officials.

Last year, IRONMAN and Visit Sacramento agreed to a five-year host venue agreement to keep the IRONMAN California triathlon in Sacramento through 2028.

"Sacramento, a city filled with restaurants, shops and a plethora of activities, serves as the perfect backdrop for this thrilling race," the event website reads. "The flat terrain allows triathletes to unleash their full potential, with a downriver 2.4MI swim, voted one of the best swim courses in North America as voted on by athletes, a fast and flat 112MI bike through beautiful farm and wine country, and a spirited 26.2MI run lined with cheering spectators. The race culminates at an epic finish line at the California State Capitol, providing a grand and iconic backdrop for becoming an IRONMAN."

Spectators are known to watch the race from the iconic Tower Bridge or along the run's sidelines.



The journey starts with the Washington Unified School District's Diversity Recruitment and Aspiring Leaders Program, which recruits and hires educators who better resemble students and the community.

The application and recruitment deadline is a "fantastic opportunity for individuals looking to begin their credential programs in Fall 2024 or earlier." according to Washington Unified School District Communications Director Giorgios Kazanis.

"Local diverse leaders bring invaluable cultural competence and lived experiences that resonate with our students and families," Kazanis said.

Being local matters in the search with Washington Unified School District employees and graduates specializing in math, science, special education or other hard-to-fill subject areas considered first.

"In-person interviews will take place in November and program acceptance letters will be provided by December," Kazanis said. "We encourage anyone interested in making a difference in our schools to apply."

The Diverse Educators program will recruit 30 educators over the next three years, creating a pathway for aspiring leaders by investing in current employees' development and training as potential Washington Unified School District leaders, the

didates over the next three years are part of the program that offers pursuing administrative credentials or non-credentialed leadership roles in the district.

"Both these programs will have the potential to expand in future years," Kazanis said.

The idea to train current employees for leadership roles is a strategic investment in Washington Unified School District's future.

"These individuals already possess in-depth knowledge of our district's culture, challenges, and strengths," Kazanis said of current staff. "By nurturing their leadership potential, we're capitalizing on their existing expertise while fostering a sense of growth and opportunity within WUSD."

The step-up ladder "approach ensures continuity in our educational mission and creates a pipeline of deeply committed leaders to our students and community," Kazanis said, adding, "It's a win-win situation that enhances employee retention and ensures our leadership is intimately familiar with the needs of our district."

Refining the search focus on differences rather than similarities is critical to success.

"This representation fosters a more inclusive learning environment, enhances communication with our diverse community, and provides powerful role models for our students," according to the communications director.

Students are the ones who make up the program. Through district-wide surveys, Kazanis said students made it clear they wished to campuses.

"This powerful feedback was the catalyst that sparked these initiatives," Kazanis said. "Our district leadership and school board members took this student input to heart and collaborated to develop these programs as a direct response."

Calling student's input "a testament to our commitment to listening to and acting upon student voices in shaping our educational environment," Kazanis said, "we're proud to be taking this student-centered approach, setting an example of how to actively respond to student feedback to create more inclusive and representative learning environments."

The more locals, the better.

"Searching for diverse leaders locally is crucial because it allows WUSD to build a workforce that truly reflects and understands its community," Kazanis said of the program approved in 2022 and funded through the Local Control and Accountability Plan and one-time general fund investment.

"By investing in local talent, we're not just filling positions; we're strengthening the fabric of our educational community and creating pathways for longterm success and stability within our schools," Kazanis said.

In addition to the 5K/10K flanked by River City High School cheerleaders, Sherwood said there were many tables and booths set up encouraging community engagement, including the District Attorney's Office. She also mentioned there were options for food and drinks, and a kids' area featuring a bounce house.

Also, at the K-9 Association event was a raffle giving away at least 28 prizes.

The total amount of funds raised is unknown as of press time.

"It's a wonderful thing to get together and see what the dogs are trained in," Sherwood said. "More people should come out next year!"

WEST SACRAMENTO, CA (MPG) - As part of its partnership with Raising a Reader and Washington Unified School District, the Masons of California announced Sept. 24 its funding of bilingual books with Farsi translation for 150 young Afghan refugees currently enrolled in the Washington Unified School District. The Greater Sacramento region, where Washington Unified School District resides, is home to one of the largest populations of Afghan refugees in the United States.

"Imagine starting a life in a new country and not being able to communicate with your teachers and peers," said Doug Ismail, the California Masonic Foundation president. "As three organizations connected by their commitment to literacy, public education and improving educational outcomes, the partnership between the Masons of California, Raising a Reader and Washington Unified School District leverages key resources from each entity to maximize impact Raising a Reader president and CEO. "By offering books in native languages, we help foster a love of reading and learning among children and families across the United States. This bilingual collection is particularly meaningful as it supports newly-arrived Afghan families and helps build strong family connections through reading together."

Through the partnership with Washington Unified School District, Masons of California will bring the Farsi-translated materials to 50 classrooms across the district. In total, the Masons of California have supplied Raising a Reader materials to more than 900 classrooms across California, primarily focusing on underserved schools with below-grade level reading scores. The organization hopes to continue expanding its Raising a Reader partnerships, with a goal of reaching at least 1,000 classrooms throughout the state.

"With approximately 10% of our student population from countries outside the United States attending school in our district, it is clear that West Sacramento is seeing a rise of 'newcomers," said Dr. Cheryl P. Hildreth, Washington Unified School District superintendent. "We are grateful to Raising a Reader and the Masons of California for partnering with us to improve the educational outcomes for these students." 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Social Security Matters *Veteran Asks About Special Credits for Military Service*

Dear Rusty: I just learned that if I served in the military during an active-duty period, i could get extra earnings for Social Security and that these benefits would be automatically added to my record, but I was never asked by the SS employee who calculated my benefits if I was in the military. I took benefits at age 62 (2013) due to health reasons. Should I ask for a recalculation or is it too late? **Signed: Proud Veteran**

Dear Proud Veteran: Thank you for your service to our country, for which you have every right to be proud. You likely heard about "Special Extra Credits for military service," which applies to those who served in the military during certain periods earlier than the year 2001. This rule can add up to \$1,200 per year to your Social Security earnings record for the years you served and, since your SS benefit is based on your lifetime earnings record, your military earnings may have been included when calculating your Social Security benefit. But the rules for getting that "extra earnings credit" are a bit complex, and how much extra earnings credit you receive depends entirely on which years you served. Here's a quick summary:

• SS taxes have been withheld from military pay since 1957, so your actual military earnings are already included as part of your lifetime SS earnings record.

• If you served between 1957 and 1977, an extra \$300 for each quarter of activeduty service would be added to your military pay, up to \$1,200 per year maximum.

• If you served between 1978 and 2001, an extra \$100 would be added to your military pay for each \$300 of active duty pay received, up to a maximum of \$1,200 per year. FYI, no additional earnings are added to your military pay for service years after 2001.

• Those who served on active duty before 1967 should inform SS when applying for benefits about their military service (e.g., provide a copy of DD-214). For those who served after 1967, the "special extra credits" were automatically added to their military earnings record when they applied for SS benefits.

It's important to note that the "extra credits" are additional earnings added to your military pay record – not an additional benefit amount added to your Social Security payment because of your military service. If, however, your military pay was included in the 35 years used to compute your Social Security benefit when you claimed, then your military pay affected your SS payment amount.

In any case, if you served in the military after 1967, the special extra earnings credits were automatically included

in your military pay record and, thus, were automatically included when calculating your Social Security benefit when you applied. If your non-military working career consisted of over 35 years during which you earned more than you did while serving, your years in the military wouldn't be included when computing your Social Security benefit anyway (only your highest earning 35 years of earnings are included when calculating your SS benefit).

Although it's never "too late" to request a recalculation, if you served after 1967 your military pay during your service years was automatically increased by SS to account for your military service. If you served before 1967, you could contact Social Security to ensure that the extra credits were included when calculating your SS benefit. FYI, here's a copy of the Social Security rules on this topic: www.ssa. gov/pubs/EN-05-10017.pdf.

Bryte Park Receives \$15-Million in Federal Funding

WEST SACRAMENTO, CA (MPG) - On Sept. 25, Congresswoman Doris Matsui (CA-07) and the City of West Sacramento announced \$15 million in federal funding for the city's Bryte Park Master Plan Implementation Project.

"The partnership between the federal government and the City of West Sacramento is crucial to deliver tangible results for our residents. This infusion of federal funds goes right into the heart of the city to reinvigorate Bryte Park," said Congresswoman Matsui. "Parks have a transformative impact: expanding access to green space and recreation options creates a healthier, more resilient community. That's why I have been such a strong advocate for our city staff and their forward-thinking approach to bring community conscious amenities where they are needed most."

West Sacramento's Bryte Park Master Plan will transform the park by developing a lighted, all-weather soccer field, an aquatics facility, a dog park, an outdoor amphitheater and ample green space.

"I am excited about these much-needed renovations coming to Bryte Park," said West Sacramento Mayor Martha Guerrero. "These amenities, which will include upgraded fields for both adult and youth sports used by our entire community, will enhance quality of life, promote healthier lifestyles, and provide a space for families to connect and thrive."

Funding comes from the National Park Service's Outdoor Recreation Legacy Partnership (ORLP) Grants Program established in 2014. The nationally-competitive program provides matching grants to assist communities with little to no access to outdoor recreation opportunities in urban areas. Funds can be used for the acquisition and development of or to substantially renovate public parks and other outdoor recreation spaces. West Sacramento was one of four communities across the country to receive the top allotment of \$15 million.

The 14 other California park projects receiving grants this cycle are:

City of Adelanto – Bellflower Park: \$1 million

City of Anaheim – La Palma Park: \$6 million

City of Bakersfield – Martin Luther King Jr. Park: \$11.9 million

City of Baldwin Park – Roadside Park: \$2.1 million

City of Beaumont – Stewart Park: \$3.1 million

City of Glendale – Central Park: \$5.95 million

City of La Puente – Veterans Memorial Park: \$1 million

Housing Authority of the City of Los Angeles – Jordan Downs Central Park: \$11 million

County of Los Angeles – Puente Hills Landfill Park: \$15 million

City of Menifee – Quail Valley Nature Park: \$750,000

City of Oxnard – Campus Park: \$6.7 million

City of Redding – Panorama Park: \$4 million

City of San Jose – Spartan-Keyes Park: \$4.5 million

City of Stockton – Van Buskirk Revitalization Park: \$7 million.

Congresswoman Matsui represents California's Seventh Congressional District, which includes West Sacramento, Elk Grove, Galt, Wilton, Rancho Murieta, Vineyard, Isleton, Walnut Grove, Herald, Clay and the California Delta.

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Trail Project Riding Along as Planned

WEST SACRAMENTO, CA (MPG) - The Clarksburg Branch Line Trail is all over the map on local, regional and state planning sketches.

West Sacramento Mayor Martha Guerrero pulled the item from the Sept. 18 meeting consent agenda to discuss the project progress, also detailed in a staff report.

In June, the City of West Sacramento awarded Mark Thomas & Company, Inc. almost \$1.9 million in grant funding from the Sacramento Area Council of Governments (SACOG). The Delta Protection Commission gave \$75,000 to the project and another \$143,000 was used from the Measure E fund. In August, officials gave final approval for the overall \$2,177,877 for the extension of the city-owned trails' right-ofway from the Barge Canal locks to Pumphouse Road. The almost \$1.9 million SACOG funding covered the preliminary and final

engineering plans and the environmental exemption documentation for trail portions from the south city limit to Willow Point Road.

A 10% contingency of nearly \$199,000 was also allocated for unexpected complications. However, on Sept. 18, staff reported a monetary shortfall in the project and followed it with an answer: transfer \$248,761 to the one-time General Fund budget.

While officials did not mention the monetary change, Guerrero had something to say about the project.

"I wanted to make sure

The staff report thoroughly details the project and cites the transportation app "Strava" to stress the importance of completing the trail. According to the app, Baby Boomers' median bicycle trip distance is 20.9 miles, and 14 miles for Gen Z riders.

Furthermore, the staff notes that with "approximately 13.75 miles to downtown Sacramento and approximately 11 miles to central West Sacramento, the ride is accessible to strong bicyclists and to the growing number who use e-bikes."

"People are going to be jumping on their bikes,

That camaraderie is why senior residents Mark and Diane attend the weekly early afternoon meals. Leaving out their last name, the couple said they love gathering with peers at 11 a.m. Wednesdays.

"It's much easier to plan lunch dates with friends because we used to try meeting downtown but it wasn't always convenient," the couple said.

The social gathering meets critical needs, according to gerontologist and Meals on Wheels Yolo County program director Alexa Torres, who said senior nutrition directly impacts physical, mental and emotional health.

"As we age, our bodies require specific nutrients to maintain muscle mass, energy levels and overall health while reducing the risk of chronic conditions such as heart disease and diabetes," Torres said.

A registered dietician ensures each meal meets the California Department

of Aging's rigorous nutritional standards, according to Torres.

"Proper nutrition is also crucial to maintain cognitive function, improve mood and support overall mental resilience as we age," Torres said.

By pairing balanced meals with the social experience at Cafe Yolo, Torres said, "We guarantee that seniors not only receive the nourishment they need but also benefit from meaningful community connections that contribute to their overall well-being."

The new café would not have been possible without the county's and city's partnership.

"Partnerships and collaborations are critical to the advancement of social services nonprofits, such as Meals on Wheels Yolo County, and among the most impactful partnerships are those with local government," Cohen said.

The executive director added that Yolo County "has invested deeply" in Meals on Wheels in recent years with one-time, pandemic-era American Rescue Plan funds.



Assembly Majority Leader Aguiar-Curry's Bill Signed by Governor

Office of Assembly Majority Leader Cecilia Aguiar-Curry

SACRAMENTO, CA (MPG) -Assembly Majority Leader Cecilia Aguiar-Curry (D-Winters) announced Sept. 25 that her Assembly Bill 2680 was signed by Governor Newsom. AB 2680 updates the Alzheimer's Disease and Related Conditions (ADRD) Advisory Committee to remove stigmatizing language in the code and ensure that Californians impacted by Alzheimer's disease and related dementia disorders can participate fully in the Committee.

The Alzheimer's Disease and Related Conditions Advisory Committee is essential for the planning and execution of strategic projects like the 2011 California State Plan for Alzheimer's disease and the 2021 Master Plan for Aging.

In California alone, there are

approximately 690,000 individuals living with Alzheimer's disease, a number that is expected to double by 2040. This condition disproportionately affects women, African Americans, and members of the Latinx community who are at increased risk for developing Alzheimer's.

The Alzheimer's Disease and Related Conditions Advisory Committee was established in 1988 to advise the Legislature on the needs of persons impacted by Alzheimer's disease and dementia and includes representation from people living with Alzheimer's, their families, caregivers, and providers. The Advisory Committee benefits from the collaborative efforts of its members, but due to its limited membership, several key stakeholders and care providers have been disconnected from its work

Today, stigma around

Alzheimer's disease still exists due to a lack of public awareness and understanding of the disease. This stigma prevents people from seeking medical treatment in a timely manner, planning for their future, participating in clinical trials and delaying an early or any diagnosis.


"I want to thank Governor Newsom for signing this critical legislation to support Californians living with Alzheimer's and dementia, as well as their families and caregivers," said Cecilia Aguiar-Curry (D-Winters). "Since the creation of the ADRD Advisory Committee, the population of people living with Alzheimer's has increased, the needs of the people affected by Alzheimer's have changed, and society's understanding of Alzheimer's has improved. This bill modernizes the Advisory Committee to ensure Californians impacted by Alzheimer's disease have their voice heard. Out of respect for them, we've also removed outdated, stigmatizing term limits for members of the panel, and language in the code."

This bill updates the name of the Alzheimer's Disease and Related Conditions to the "Alzheimer's Disease and Related Conditions Advisory Committee" and expands it to have up to 20 members. Additional members include representatives from the Commission on Aging, an additional consumer representative, one representative from the California Alzheimer's Disease Centers, two non-voting representatives from the State Legislature, and up to four representatives appointed by the Secretary of Health & Human Services.

"The Alzheimer's Association extends our heartfelt thanks to both Majority Leader Aguiar-Curry and Governor Newsom for their continuing efforts to fight for the needs and priorities for persons impacted by Alzheimer's disease and related dementias," said Jason Gabhart, Director of Government Affairs at the Alzheimer's Association.

AB 2680 will ensure that relevant stakeholders' voices are heard as the Advisory Committee issues necessary advice for addressing Alzheimer's across California. Importantly, this bill also gives informal caregivers representation on the Advisory Committee by broadening caregiver terminology and removes unfair term limits that do not reflect advances in modern medicine.

Assemblymember Aguiar-Curry represents the 4th Assembly District, which includes all of Lake, Colusa, Napa, and Yolo Counties, and part of Sonoma County.

I'm glad you two are making smart changes in your lives, but I wouldn't stop what you've been doing where your kids are concerned. It can be a series of great teachable moments for them. Dear Cody,





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

1. Continued Public Hearing Regarding Proposed Amendments to Title 17 (Zoning) to Facilitate Tiny Homes on Wheels as Legal Dwellings (Berumen)

This item is a public hearing regarding proposed amendments to Title 17 (Zoning) of the City's Municipal Code that if approved, tiny homes on wheels, which are legally vehicles, will be employed as primary and/or accessory dwelling units in residentially zoned parts of the City. The amendments include proposed design and site planning standards as well. The Planning Commission will consider a Resolution making its recommendation to the City Council, who via Ordinance would make the final decision. The proposed amendments are categorically exempt pursuant to Class 5, Section 15305 of CEQA Guidelines (Minor Alterations in Land Use Limitations).

2. Public Hearing on Liberty Specific Plan (Hardy)

The purpose of this item is to conduct a public hearing on a variety of actions and recommendations related to the proposed 342-acre Liberty development project ("Project"). The Project covers an area generally bounded on the east by the Sacramento River setback levee; on the south by Davis Road; on the west by the Clarksburg Branch Line Bike Trail; and on the north (from east to west) by Linden Road, Bastone Estates, the Linden Acres community, the Linden South subdivision, and the Parlin Ranch residential development. The Project proposes a Liberty Specific Plan Land Use Plan that would support the development of a primarily residential community consisting of 1,503 singlefamily detached, single-family attached, and multi-family residences that would develop in three phases. The phasing of the Project generally calls for development to progress from north to south as logical extensions of the existing development pattern, with gradual transition from lower density uses on the edges to higher density uses in the center (consistent with the General Plan, the Southport Framework Plan, and Resolution 06-63). The Project would also include supportive uses such as a centrally located recreation area called "The Commons" that would contain private recreational amenities and a small neighborhood commercial site permitting with up to 10,000 square feet of retail and service uses. Finally, the Specific Plan Land Use Plan calls for an integrated network of parks and open spaces, including a community park, several neighborhood and pocket parks, and greenbelts. The Specific Plan also calls for the development of infrastructure and provision of services to support the new development.

The Planning Commission will consider the following actions related to the Project: approval of a Vesting Tentative Map and recommendations to the City Council concerning certification of the Environmental Impact Report (EIR), adoption of the Liberty Specific Plan, amendment of the City of West Sacramento General Plan, amendment of Southport Framework Plan, rezoning of the property covered by the Specific Plan, and approval of a Development Agreement.



WOODLAND, CA (MPG) - As flu season approaches, the Yolo County Health and Human Services Agency (HHSA) is encouraging all residents to stay current with their vaccinations. To support this effort, Health and Human Services Agency will host nine free flu clinics throughout Yolo County this fall.

The clinics will provide residents with easy access to the influenza vaccine, which is recommended for everyone aged six months and older. Below is the schedule for the clinics:

County's Public Health Officer, emphasized the value of these free clinics by stating, "Vaccines play a key role in reducing severe illness, hospitalization, and death. I strongly recommend that everyone in Yolo County who is six months old and older get a flu shot every year. Now is a great time to get a flu vaccine before flu season begins in November."

While these clinics focus on making flu vaccinations available to people without insurance and do not offer other vaccines, residents are also encouraged to consider RSV and COVID-19 vaccinations heading into winter. An updated '24-'25 COVID-19 vaccine is recommended for everyone 6 months and older. In addition, the CDC recommends a single dose of the RSV vaccine for infants younger than 8 months, high risk infants and toddlers up to 18 months, people who are 32 to 36 weeks pregnant, adults aged 75 and older, and for adults aged 60 to 74 with increased risk of severe RSV disease.

In addition to the county-run flu clinics, residents can obtain flu and other vaccines through their healthcare providers and local pharmacies. To find nearby vaccination options, visit www.Vaccines.gov/ Find-Vaccines.

"WOLFS" UNITES KNOWN COMMODITIES FOR AN OFFBEAT THRILLER

"WOLFS" RATED R on Apple TV+ As some may surmise that the incipient decline and potentially eventual doom of network and cable television might actually be a thing, streaming services like Netflix and Amazon Prime may strive even harder to satisfy the need for home entertainment

These two behemoths of streaming options may be challenged to a greater extent in the future, but for now Apple TV+, approaching the fifth anniversary of its launch in 2019, is impressive for its catalog and ongoing production of original television and films.

During television press tours, critics have witnessed Apple TV's presence at our biannual meetings to tout their new programs, and only this past winter was there an ostensible "executive session" that served not much greater purpose other than to recap past hits and provide a quick preview.

But who really needs executives spewing the party line like Baghdad Bob when the product speaks for itself? Apple TV+ has delivered popular hits like "Ted Lasso" and "Slow Horses" along with Steven Spielberg and Tom Hanks' limited series "Masters of the Air."

What could Apple TV+ do to generate more traffic than pick up the crime thriller film "Wolfs," starring Brad Pitt and George Clooney in roles as incognito fixers who seem to require little more than acting like they did in "Ocean's Eleven" and the two sequels that followed?

Apparently, "Wolfs" had a very limited theatrical run that seemed to escape widespread public notice, at least because of the telltale sign that the box office receipts weren't found on a website devoted to imparting that information.

Would signing up for Apple TV+ be worth the cost just to view "Wolfs" at home? The answer depends on how much you want to see Brad Pitt and George Clooney as rivals who wink, banter and trash-talk for just shy of two hours

"Wolfs" is a bit convoluted in its plot and storyline of a thriller tinged with comedic elements that come from Pitt and Clooney, whose characters' names are never revealed, bickering over their assigned roles in a messy clean-up operation.

The film opens with Amy Ryan's Margaret, a district attorney with a public image to protect, distraught over the fact that she's in a luxury New York hotel suite with the body of a half-naked, presumably dead young man.

up the mess to cover the tracks of what would be a scandal not only for Margaret but also a hotel seeking to avoid bad publicity.

Enter Clooney's fixer with a luggage cart and a duffel bag of considerable size to save the day. Wearing surgical gloves, Clooney seeks to calm his client with a stiff drink, reassuring her that he has everything under control.

But then things get interesting when Pitt's nameless character shows up, knocking on the door, at the behest of the unseen hotel owner, Pam (the voice of Frances McDormand), as a matching fixer. That the situation was captured on a hidden camera creates another puzzle.

The hotel room scene includes blood and broken glass, with the body of a character only referred to as Kid (Austin Abrams) on the floor, who is presumed to be a male prostitute, contrary to the protests of Margaret who insists otherwise.

Awkwardly, Clooney and Pitt have no choice than to work together, which results in two leading men with easy charm to trade oblique glances and sarcastically whimsical insults.

The body disposal gets more complicated in a number of ways, and more so than the discovery that Kid had a backpack with bricks of heroin presumably belonging to some crime lord.

As the action goes, a chase through Chinatown is exhausting for everyone, followed later with Clooney and Pitt crashing a wedding party. An intense shootout with Albanian or Croation (who can be sure?) gangsters a burst of unexpected violence.

For lack of a better description, "Wolfs" is disposable entertainment, one that has a glossy superficial appeal but ultimately is as forgettable as watching a Chicago White Sox game as the team flails away at setting a record for the most losses ever in a season for a major league baseball team.

The best bet for watching Brad Pitt and George Clooney at their finest as a team for a thriller is to watch "Ocean's Eleven" for their gold standard of a snarky buddy film. You can skip the sequels.

Nevertheless, it's fair to say that Pitt and Clooney acquit themselves decently enough as their initial hostility, driven by some nice rebukes, gradually fades to a grudgingly joint effort that makes the whole enterprise reasonably watchable.

A nice touch comes near the end when Clooney says to his fellow fixer, "I never did catch your name," and Pitt's reply about surviving a shootout hints a sequel could be in the works. Nothing is certain,



Sacramento Kings fans will be watching with great interest, as training camp begins Oct. 1, and there will be long shots looking to make the team. Names like Terry Taylor, Skal Labissiere, Jalen McDaniels, Colby Jones, Boogie Ellis and recent invitee Justin Powell are but a few of the players with aspirations of making the big club roster.

Add Orlando Robinson's name to the list, but Orlando could potentially have a good chance of making the opening day roster because of his NBA experience with the Miami Heat, and his size. Robinson at 6'10" represents the type of front court player the Kings are in desperate need of, and he showed flashes with Miami that give the Kings hope that this aspiring 24-year-old may be able to provide some valuable minutes off the bench.

Without question Sacramento will be leaning on the talents of power forward Trey Lyles, who at 28 is in his prime, and showed Kings fans last year that even coming off the bench, Trey can be an impact player. Like his teammates De'Aaron Fox and Malik Monk, Lyles came to the NBA from the Kentucky Wildcats and was drafted twelfth overall in the 2015 NBA draft by the Utah Jazz. Trey spent time with the Denver Nuggets, San Antonio Spurs and Detroit Pistons, before being acquired by the Sacramento Kings in February of 2022.

Lyles found a home in Sacramento, and his production immediately took a jump, as the Kings gave their young big man an average of nearly 23 minutes per game. Showing this kind of confidence led to Lyles most productive season as a pro, and in 2022 Trey averaged 10.6 points per game.

The last two seasons, for reasons that are difficult to understand, Lyle's time on the hardwood has diminished, and with it his scoring as well. Averaging seven points per game, Lyles has struggled to get the consistent playing time he needs to be a double-digit contributor, and I am hopeful, that coming into his prime and going into his fourth season as a Sacramento King, coach Brown will give this talented forward more time on the court.

As fans we each have our favorites, but in Trey Lyles I see a player that needs to feel the confidence of his team and his coach, and I would like to see how he would produce in a starting role.

The Kings have been unable thus far to land an impact power forward, and it may be inevitable that they may have to look from within or continue to build this roster via the draft.

Without question Monte McNair has had opportunities to land an impact forward, but I give him great credit for passing up on trades that would have sent the Kings in the wrong direction. Too many NBA general managers are looking for steals, and I love the fact that McNair has kept the fabric of today's team intact.

Many pundits and I could myself as one, feel that with the addition of DeMar DeRozan the Sacramento Kings have arrived, and without that elusive forward they have been seeking, I want to see what the team we have assembled can do.

In just a little over a week the Golden State Warriors come to town, and thirsty for basketball Kings fans will get their first taste of the new look Kings.

I can't deny that I will miss Davion Mitchell, but I am also very curious to see what newcomers like Orlando Robinson or Boogie Ellis may contribute. Is there a diamond in the rough on this team?

I don't know that I ever expected to read or hear that NBA pundits would rate the Sacramento Kings as the best basketball team in the state of California, but that is exactly what is occurring.

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Brutal' Wine Market Leaves Farms in Peril

A downturn in wine sales worldwide has shaken California's winegrape sector. After years of growth, U.S. sales have declined for three straight years. The shrinking market has left wineries oversupplied and California's vineyard acreage out of step with demand. This year, many growers could see their entire crop rot on the vines. "It's leaving some guys in some very precarious positions," said Jeff Bitter, president of Allied Grape Growers, a grower-owned marketing group that sells winegrapes for 400 growers across California.

Certifiers Among Those Affected by New **Organic Rules**

New federal rules meant to prevent organic fraud have been praised by organic farmers for helping to protect the integrity of the national organic label. But the rules have also brought unintended consequences as smaller operations struggle to keep up with the new requirements. Those struggling include government agencies that inspect and certify farms to ensure they comply with standards of the National Organic Program.

State Water Board Agrees on Probation for Tule Subbasin

Last week, the California State Water Resources Control Board placed the Tule Subbasin in Tulare and Kern counties in probation under the state's Sustainable Groundwater Management Act. The board said state intervention was warranted because plans submitted by most of the subbasin's groundwater sustainability agencies failed to adequately address problems such as land subsidence. Under probation, some farmers who rely on groundwater in parts of the subbasin will be required to monitor their water use and pay extra fees.

Wolves and Mountain Lions Prev on Livestock

The Voice of California Agriculture podcast, produced by the California Farm Bureau, discusses wolf and mountain lion attacks on livestock. The episode also covers a Sonoma County ballot measure, sponsored by animal activists, that would bar certain poultry and livestock farms from operating in the county, phasing them out within three years. Poultry and livestock farmers say the measure, if passed, would threaten their businesses and the region's farm economy.

Hitch In Higher Ed Master Plan: California's Colleges Still Don't Work Well Together

California's Master Plan for Higher Education, adopted 64 years ago, envisioned that three systems — the University of California, California State University and dozens of community colleges — would cooperatively, seamlessly and inexpensively generate the educated citizenry and workforce a rapidly growing state needed.

The plan assumed that community colleges eventually numbering more than 100 — would provide sub-professional job training to some students while preparing others for transfers to four-year schools.

The state colleges (later state universities) would train teachers, engineers, accountants and other professionals and award master's degrees in some fields.

The University of California would admit students with especially high potential, educate them in scientific and other complex fields up to the doctorate level and conduct research.

It didn't quite work out that way.

The three systems often have been more competitive than cooperative, particularly when vying for money from governors and state legislators. They've erected barriers that make transfers difficult and squabble over academic turf.

Community colleges, for instance, have encountered stiff opposition from the state university system as they sought legislative permission to award four-year degrees in some fields, while the state universities have faced equally tough resistance from the UC system to their efforts to award doctorate degrees.

The master plan's assumption that higher education in California would be inexpensive to students also has taken a beating as other programs and services claimed ever-larger shares of the state budget.

That's been particularly true since 1978, when the passage of Proposition 13, California's iconic property tax limit, forced the state to become the major source of financing for K-12 schools, a role that a 1988 ballot measure, Proposition 98, lodged into the state constitution.

The current state budget allocates more than \$81 billion to K-12 schools while higher education would get less than \$24 billion. UC estimates that a year of attendance at one of its campuses costs about \$45,000.

Finally, students who seek to transfer from community colleges to either a UC campus or a state university face daunting barriers because the three have differing notions of how that should occur, as a new report from state Auditor Grant Parks underscores.

"Although most transfer students who applied to CSU and UC gained admission to at least one campus in those systems, CCC students still struggle to transfer," Parks said in a letter summarizing his agency's audit. "Only about 1 in 5 students who began community college from 2017 to 2019 and intended to transfer did so within four years, and transfer rates were even lower for students from certain regions and demographic groups. The vast majority of students who did not transfer never reached the point of applying to CSU or UC, mainly because they had not earned enough units."

Parks suggests that community colleges could make transfers easier with counseling and giving students "a clear roadmap," but he points out that "another barrier to transfer is the variation in transfer requirements across and within the three systems, which makes the process difficult for students to navigate."

There's nothing that would prevent the three systems from reducing the barriers to transfer that Parks cites, but they have taken only fitful and obviously inadequate steps in that direction.

Parks' report is only the latest bit of evidence that the 1960-vintage master plan never worked out as planned and needs a thorough overhaul if its rosy vision is to even approach reality.

Although the plan's deficiencies have been obvious for years, neither governors nor legislators have expressed interest in making needed changes, because the politics of dysfunction are so daunting.

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EV Chargers Require More Revenue to be Profitable

SACRAMENTO, CA (MPG) -Just like gas stations, EV charging infrastructure requires additional sources of revenue to be profitable. Whether it's a gas station or an EV charging station, co-located services and amenities are needed to improve return on investment, according to a new report and EV driver survey released today by Next 10 and authored by the Institute for Transportation Studies at UC Davis.

A survey from the same report finds that California EV drivers, whether or not they can charge at home, are willing to pay a premium for more accessible fast public charging, especially if one can charge near other services with little to no wait. Based on these insights, the report, Analyzing the Business Case & Consumer Preferences for Fast Chargers in California, includes recommendations on where to place EV charging stations to maximize use and revenue.

"We already know that the next generation of EV owners want more public chargers," said Noel Perry, founder of the non-partisan, non-profit Next 10. "This report shows that building chargers where people are and where they want to be, especially for longer trips, is what's best for both California drivers and charging station investors."

This analysis shows public chargers are frequented more when located within 500 meters of both dining services (with an average increase of 2.7 times more charging events per month per nearby restaurant) and grocery stores (with an average increase of 5.2 times more charging events per month per nearby grocery store). Chargers could therefore bring more customers to businesses (improving business revenue) or fast chargers could be located with amenities co-owned by charging providers to provide a viable alternative revenue source and help break even on EV charger costs.

reinforces the findings on charging behavior:

Rest stops (74%), malls (71%), parking garages (65%), and restaurants (59%) were the most commonly selected public charging locations, indicating that California EV drivers also prefer charging at destinations they frequently travel to or where they have opportunities to do other activities while they charge.

California EV drivers are 37% more likely to choose a charger with additional amenities (for example, restrooms and convenience stores).

Drivers are also more likely to choose chargers that are closer to travel routes, have shorter wait times, and have faster chargers.

"Our research shows us what electric vehicle drivers want: fueling infrastructure located with additional amenities that can also help stations become profitable," said Dr. Scott Hardman, Associate Research Faculty for the Electric Vehicle Research Center at UC Davis. "Whether it's a gas station or an EV charging station, co-located services and amenities are needed to

people want."

The survey found that EV drivers are willing to pay a premium for chargers with no wait time, and access to other services along with charging is especially attractive for California EV drivers. This added cost for convenience is offset by the savings of fueling with electricity instead of gasoline.

California EV drivers would be willing to pay almost a dollar more per hundred miles of charge if no wait time is required.

The cost to go 100 miles in an EV falls between \$8 to \$13 while the average gasoline car costs approximately \$18.50 to go the same distance.

Wait times for chargers deter drivers. If a charger requires a wait, the odds that a driver will choose that charging station decrease by 13% (0.87).

Every minute of extra wait time reduces the willingness to use a charger by 6%.

A California EV driver is 37% more likely to choose a charging station within close proximity to other services (like a restaurant or playground) than one located in isolation. visited public locations like grocery stores, green spaces and restaurants is likely to address the concerns of EV drivers while adding potential revenue to adjacent businesses.

"EV drivers are telling us that they want chargers co-located with amenities like cafes and restaurants, and they are willing to pay more to charge at locations with the amenities," said Alan Jenn, Assistant Professor at the Electric Vehicle group of the Institute of Transportation Studies at UC Davis. "This symbiotic relationship between businesses and EV chargers may benefit both EV chargers and local businesses."

Subsidies allow for faster recouping of costs regardless of whether services and amenities are co-located to drive additional revenue. Subsidies are important for creating greater access where co-locating with services isn't possible or not profitable. Without subsidies, it would take more than 10 years to break even on charging infrastructure investments based on average use. Other options for reducing the payback period include leveraging symbiotic business relationships

between convenience stores or restaurants and EV chargers, changes in the charging model, increases in electricity prices, or reductions in charging installation costs beyond subsidies.

Historically, new technology adoption requires subsidies to get infrastructure where it's needed most. For example, this year's federal budget set aside more than \$40 billion for states to build broadband internet infrastructure. The Bipartisan Infrastructure Law invested \$2.5 billion in the Charging and Fueling Infrastructure (CFI) Discretionary Grant Program with a 10% set-aside from the National Electric Vehicle Infrastructure (NEVI) Program. Formula Globally, fossil fuel subsidies reached a record high of \$7 trillion in 2022.

"California is leading the nation in EV charging infrastructure investment," continued Perry. "We hope our research will help fill a gap in understanding so we can continue to be strategic about where and how EV charging gets built to best serve drivers and our communities. For now, subsidies remain critical to meeting that goal." While the demand for public charging is strong, the report survey reiterates the importance of home charging, finding that, without access to home charging, 35% of EV owners would replace their EV with a traditional gas car, while 38% and 41% would replace their EV with a plug-in EV or a hybrid, respectively.

84% of California EV drivers are worried about the lack of charging options outside their homes.

70% of California EV drivers surveyed reported having used public charging stations.

66% of California EV drivers said they were concerned about the cost of publicly available chargers.

84% of California EV drivers are worried that public chargers would take them too far out of their way.

"EV sales continue to rise so we must do what we can to speed the build-out of charging infrastructure to meet growing demand," concluded Perry. "We can't lose sight of where the market is headed and meet these challenges head-on."

Many California utility providers and air districts offer rebates for home charging stations. Governor Newsom's Executive Order requires the installation of 250,000 publicly available EV chargers by 2025. For every 1,000 EVs in the United States, there are approximately 20 publicly available fast chargers — half of those are in California.

Overall, the report recommends that California continue to support charging access at home and in the community while balancing subsidies with strategies for improving the profitability of charging stations. Key recommendations of the report include:

Increase the availability of public chargers at places where Californians do or want to visit, while upping the efficiency with DC fast chargers.

Increase public support for home charger installation while using consumer prefer-
