# The Nevermind Shop will close its doors on Oct. 19

Shop to reopen in Burlington, Conn.

UPTON - The Nevermind Shop, a vinyl and vintage store in Upton Center, will close its doors for good on Oct. 19.

Shop owner Mick Lawless made the announcement in a Facebook reel on Sept. 19. "A programming note going forward, I want to thank each and every one of you guys out there for 16 absolutely fantastic, wonderful years here in Upton. The Nevermind Shop will be closing its doors in Upton as of Saturday, Oct. 19."

In an interview with the *Upton & Mendon Free Press*, Lawless said, "It's kind of somber and it's kind of sad but, at the same time, I really am looking forward to new adventures and maybe laying the same foundation in [Burlington] Connecticut for the

same kinds of things we did in Upton. I have a feeling we'll make it work just fine."

This little shop opened in Upton Center in 2008. Lawless lived in Milford and had operated a similar shop in Hudson until that building was sold. He said, "I just stumbled across a 'For Rent' sign in Upton in November 2008, called it up, and the rest is history."

# Mendon to vote on proposed Senior and Community Center in November

Revised building has smaller footprint, lower tax increase

MENDON – When voters head to the polls in November, they will be casting their vote for a possible debt exclusion, and resulting temporary tax increase, for a new Mendon Senior and Community Center (MSCC) to be built on town-owned land on North Avenue near Milford Street.

At May's Annual Town Meet-

ing, voters defeated the plan for the project which was 2,000 square feet larger and expected to cost \$1.3 million more.

The plan has now been decreased in size and cost.

Selectperson Michael Goddard said town officials used what they

# **Mendon Senior and Community** Center still vital

Despite a narrow defeat in last May's vote, the proposed Mendon Senior and Community Center still remains an essential resource in our Town. The proposal to secure funding for the center fell short by a slim margin, yet the need for this facility has not diminished!

Our center serves as a vital hub for Mendon's seniors and broader community, providing a wide range of services, including social programs, health and wellness activities, and spaces for community gatherings. Many residents, especially older adults, depend on these services to maintain their health, social connections, and independence.

Our Town's growing senior population and the needs of the community underscore the importance of an adequate space to provide these services. The center currently struggles to keep up with demand, and some critical services may be at risk of

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scaling back or being discontinued altogether.

Various Town groups compete for valuable space to hold meetings or have events. The proposed Center will provide space to assist these groups with viable alternatives.

Recognizing the importance of this project, the Mendon Select Board has agreed that this project remains a key priority for the community. They have tasked the MSCC Building Committee with renewing its efforts by exploring ways to reduce costs while still achieving the project's essential goals. A revised proposal will be brought to voters on two key dates: during the National Election on Nov. 5 and at the Special Town Meeting on Nov. 18.

To keep the community informed, informational meetings have been held at the Town Hall in September and will continue into October, giving residents the opportunity to learn more about the updated plans and provide feedback. Additionally, all residents are encouraged to attend the Building Committee meetings, which are posted on the Town's website, to stay involved in the planning process. Please join us Oct. 28 at 6:30 p.m.

As Mendon moves forward, this new Senior and Community Center remains a critical part of its future and a key priority, offering valuable and much needed space for people of all ages to connect, learn, and stay active. Although the previous ballot vote outcome was not what was hoped, we do understand and respect the various reasons why. The proposed facility provides equal support for both the Seniors and the Community. Please consider this project on Nov. 5 and Nov. 18 when you cast your vote.

# **People of Upton**

At November's Special Town Meeting, we are being asked to add 150 housing units to meet the requirements of the MBTA Communities Housing state mandate. The Planning Board wants us to place these homes in the front of the already approved GL 100-unit development on Route 140, the entrance to our town and beautiful historic center.

This brings a potential of 500 cars entering and exiting the development onto route 140 often during rush hour. Route 140 is hilly, visibility is an issue, and cars go fast. This concern was a major one previously for Governor's Landing approval and should be discussed for this project. Traffic all along route 140 will be impacted including our downtown and the traffic lights at Maple Ave.

The downtown area is being quickly densified: GL development (100/127-units) 40B(60-units), and now an

additional 150 units in the same area? The increased car traffic would be +620 cars.

How many people know about this project? There is no information available on line. This was proposed at a planning board meeting and then quickly approved. This is a fundamental change to the look of our town, without a public information session, and we are being asked to vote at a sparsely attended special town meeting, not the annual when attendance is high.

This state mandate encourages towns to provide housing for people to take the train to work to meet climate goals and keep more cars off the road. Trains are in Ashland, Westboro, and Grafton-We need to find 10 acres in Upton nearest to these train stations and spread the newer develop-

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# Do you need to fear retirement?

learned at spring Town Meeting to adjust the plan.

"I give the [MSCC] committee kudos because it's not lost on them how the spring went," said Goddard. "I think taking that feedback, and the feedback through the whole process, to reevaluate the cost, location, and continue to determine the need, has led to this new proposal."

The newly configured building has a smaller footprint (a decrease of 2,000 square feet), less storage, no garage, some function rooms are smaller (though the larger function room remained untouched), the food pantry was resized and reconfigured, and some services were moved from the main floor to the lower level. Parking was decreased but still provides approximately 100 spots.

The building is positioned in a way that allows for future expansion.

There is no cost associated with the land since it is townowned property.

The cost of the project is expected to be \$11.9 mil-

lion, down from \$13.2 million proposed in the spring. Town Administrator Jeremy Stull said the town expects to bond 90% of the project which would result in a tax increase of between \$130 and \$135 (approximately \$11.25 per month) on a house valued at \$500,000.

"We think the time is right," said Phil Cieply, who has been in town for 40 years and is a member of the MSCC, acknowledging the lessons learned in May. "I think people had other priorities that they didn't see recognized." Those concerns related to capital planning, affordable and diverse housing, recreational fields, and more.

Cieply said, "I think this has been talked through quite a bit, not just the senior center but the community needs as well... There are more strategic planning processes than we've probably had in the past."

Advocates say a new senior and community center is needed for program and function space. The current senior center was built 37 years ago and was added onto 18 years ago. There is not enough room in

the building to properly operate its programming effectively, nor is it ADA-compliant. The food pantry is located down a narrow staircase into a section of the basement. There is one function room making it impossible to conduct multiple programs at one time, and there are space limitations for staff who need to have private service conversations with patrons.

"There's a lot of things that manage to get done but this provides a level of privacy and proper set up," said Goddard, noting Mendon's senior population continues to grow and town officials are working on ways to help seniors age in place. "I want to be part of a community that supports our veterans and seniors."

Cieply said, "I think the seniors deserve the respect for all the years they served the community and it's a solid investment to give them a little more comfort in their later years. The Mendon Center will also become the heart of the community"

It was noted that the veterans currently meet at a local restaurant because there is no

availability at the current senior center.

The question will need to pass at the general election ballot box on Nov. 5 (simple majority) and at Special Town Meeting on Nov. 18 (two-thirds majority). Mendon does not have a quorum requirement.

If it passes, there will be an

adaptive reuse evaluation of the current senior center to see how it can be repurposed.



Lawless said several factors contributed to the shop's closure, including inevitable roadwork in Upton Center (and possible displacement), a new personal relationship based in Connecticut, along with other opportunities that have arisen for him.

The lifelong musician says he is in his 60s and thinking about his "next act."

"I am still very much playing music and I think I have many more opportunities [in Conn.] that will benefit me a little bit better than in the Metrowest area," giving him opportunities in New York, New Jersey, Conn.,

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# The future of eye care: A revolution in ophthalmology

Ophthalmology, the medical field dedicated to eye health, has witnessed remarkable advancements in recent years. These conditions, often caused by genetic mutations, were once considered incurable. However, advancements in gene therapy have opened new possibilities for restoring vision or halting disease progression. Luxturna, approved by the FDA in 2017, was the first gene therapy

for an inherited retinal disease, offering hope to patients with Leber's congenital amaurosis. Researchers are now exploring gene therapies for other retinal diseases, such as retinitis pigmentosa and choroideremia, expanding the potential benefits of this technology.

# Minimally Invasive Glaucoma Surgery (MIGS)

Glaucoma, a leading cause of blindness, is characterized by increased intraocular pressure. Traditional surgical treatments for glaucoma often involve invasive procedures with long recovery times. Minimally invasive glaucoma surgery (MIGS) has emerged as a less invasive alternative, offering quicker recovery, fewer complications, and improved patient satisfaction. MIGS devices, such as the iStent and Hydrus Microstent, are designed to enhance the eye's natural drainage pathways, reducing intraocular pressure without the need for large incisions. MIGS can often be



performed in conjunction with cataract surgery, providing a comprehensive solution for patients with both conditions.

## Advanced Intraocular Lenses (IOLs)

Cataract surgery, a common procedure to remove a cloudy lens and replace it with an artificial lens, has been transformed by advancements in intraocular lens (IOL) technology. Modern IOLs can now address a variety of vision problems, including astigmatism, presbyopia, and myopia. Multifocal and extended-depth-of-focus (EDOF) lenses allow patients to achieve clear vision at multiple distances without relying on glasses. Toric IOLs can correct astigmatism,

reducing the need for corrective eyewear.

Keratoconus, a progressive eye condition that causes the cornea to thin and bulge, can lead to significant vision impairment. Corneal cross-linking, a procedure that strengthens the cornea using ultraviolet light and riboflavin, has been a game-changer for patients with keratoconus. By halting the progression of the disease, corneal cross-linking can help prevent vision loss and reduce the need for corneal transplants.

#### Teleophthalmology: Remote Eye Care Delivery





Allen said his team should be competitive in the State Vocational Tournament as well as the state sectional tournament, even though the latter will be played at an unfamiliar course.



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
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
