

MATSUI **APPLAUDS MILESTONE**

SACRAMENTO REGION, CA - Effective Oct. 1 and without much ceremony, the Sacramento International Airport (SMF) hourly parking lot was closed, according to the airport website.

This was the closest parking lot to Terminal B, had more than 600 parking spaces available and was ideal for short visits to the airport to meet or drop off travelers using Terminal B.

Terminal B accommodates the folwing airlines: Aeromexico, Alaska

The Sacramento International Airport's website indicates the hourly lot will be permanently closed to make way for a new parking garage that will boast more than 5,500 spaces when completed. This new development is part of a larger capital improvement project ongoing at the airport. The project, dubbed SMF Foreword, by Sacramento County leaders is expected to cost \$1.3 billion when completed.

According to a September airport news release, project funding is coming from the sale of General Airport ize the SMF Forward vision and Revenue Bonds. "Increasing close-in garage

parking capacity is the number one opportunity we have to improve the guest experience at SMF," said Cindy Nichol, director of airports for the Sacramento County Department of Airports, in an April 2024 news release.

Indeed, a day after the hourly lot was closed, airport officials were joined by local dignitaries to break ground on the new Terminal B parking garage.

Big Plans for Small **Businesses**

WEST SACRAMENTO, CA (MPG) - It's just like it sounds: Small Business Accelerator Program (SBAP).

City officials plan to thrust forward small business owners with 15 or fewer employees here.

Economic Development manager Meaghan Stiles held a brief workshop on Sept. 18 for the program funded through Measure N in 2019, when city officials committed 30% of resources over time to inclusive economic development.

Up to \$1.5 million was set aside for the program in 2023. Currently, 2,200 businesses reside in West Sacramento, with 1,700 considered small, not accounting for home-based commerce not eligible for the program.

Of the 1,700, Stiles said 68% have less than five employees, 24% have up to 10, and 8% have 11 to 15 employees.

"Part of the reason we went with the 15 and under is based on some research we did with our jurisdictions that have similar programs," Stiles said.

Accelerator Program has four funding categories. The first is for business makeovers.

To qualify, a business of less than 15 must make \$3 million annually and be located in a disadvantaged geographic or be a minority or majority-women-owned commerce. Once accepted, that business can receive up to \$75,000 in frontage and site improvements if accepted.

"If you are a small business that has an aging exterior, landscaping, signage or parts of our building that are struggling, that would be eligible under this," Stiles said.

The next Small Business Accelerator Program funding category is the Small Business Permit Fee Assistance Program. Of the four proposed funding categories, the Small Business Accelerator Program Permit Fee Assistant Program is the simplest to implement, according to a staff report, "but rather is used internally to reimburse staff time for plan

Not to mention focus groups, online engagement and a draft plan for public review between May and June.

Citizen opinions such as Caitlin Mueller's help make up the longawaited plan.

"I am a resident of the Lighthouse neighborhood and I just came across the complete street plan,"

Mueller noted in her public comment. "I am so glad the city recognizes the need for improvements to Sacramento Avenue since my experience of the road is that it's old, worn, barren, hot and very unfriendly."

The public hearing for

Continued from page 1 our community," said Congresswoman Doris Matsui at the groundbreaking event. "This new parking garage will greatly expand capacity while going above and beyond to make the facility convenient and technologically cutting edge. I'm proud to champion the work of our airport and we are only continuing to push the envelope to keep it the national gold standard for years to come."

According to a Sacramento County news release on the groundbreaking event, the parking garage project will generate 1,000 jobs during its construction phase and will utilize labor under a Community Workforce Training Agreement, creating opportunities for the local workforce.

Sacramento International Airport visitors have recently become accustomed to the airport's existing parking lots and parking garages near the terminals being full during busy travel periods, leaving travelers few options except to utilize the remote long-term parking lots and ride the shuttle to the terminals.

The new parking garage, when completed, will be a great asset to Sacramento travelers. In the meantime, the hourly lot closure will put additional pressure on the other airport parking lots during the new garage's construction.

Sacramento International Airport's senior public information officer Scott Johnston provided

this guidance, "Travelers are encouraged to check parking availability and track shuttles in real-time before arriving at the airport. We also recommend arriving two-and-a-half hours before a flight and using rideshare options instead of driving."

"SMF is seeing an average of one million passengers per month and is expected to surpass 13 million in 2024, which would be a record-breaking year for the airport." Johnston added explaining the need for the expanded parking facilities.

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Sacramento Avenue Complete Street Plan Big Plans for Small Businesses

Continued from page 1 transportation planner Stephanie Chan detailed a specific complete street plan and funding from the 2021 Sacramento Area Council of Governments (SACOG).

"The grant allowed us to complete the Sacramento Avenue Complete Street Plan," Chan said. "A complete street is a transportation planning policy and design approach for our streets to be accessible and safe and for all users, including pedestrians, bicyclists, transit users and motorists."

Sacramento Avenue, a city-inherited roadway from the state and county, is a four-lane roadway with a center-left turn lane from Harbor to Jefferson Boulevards, which narrows to a two-lane arterial from Jefferson Boulevard to 5th Street.

Mueller concurred in her written comments that. with improvements, it is a complete street.

"I greatly appreciate the depth of research and thought put into the plan as well as the community engagement," Mueller said. "I read through most of the comments on the interactive project map and I agree with many of them, based on my personal experience."

2022, Chan Ιn explained how another Sacramento Area Council of Governments Green Means Go grant funded a non-transportation infrastructure study to develop in-fill housing opportunities along the C-Street corridor, supporting future development.

Additionally, the study determined if future development could be incorporated and coordinated with the Complete Street Improvements, that would cause less disturbance multiple times for residents along the way.

With various pictures, Chan showed the unideal current conditions. including bike lanes and sidewalk gaps across the corridor. Chan brought her point home with a picture of a person pushing a cart in a bicycle lane, not in an ideal condition.

However, new proposed concepts drew attention, with Councilwoman Verna Sulpizio-Hull saying the protected bike lanes looked "phenomenal."

"I love roundabouts and I know a lot of people don't," Sulpizio-Hull said of the type of intersection that provides many safety features.

In an attempt to make use of the existing right of way, Chan said a roundabout is proposed at Harbor Boulevard and the beginnings of a sidewalk, with a one-way bike lane and eight-foot landscaping on each side.

Additional roundabouts are proposed on Jefferson as well. Also, a shareduse path is proposed for Elkhorn Road to "provide for pedestrian access, and a less stressful option for cvclists.

Vice-Mayor Dawnte Early said the plan has been

coming for a "very, very, long time."

"I am excited for our kids and for the families that live there as well," Early said.

Ultimately, the proposed concepts "create an accessible Green Corridor, Community Streetscape and Multimodal Street themes," Chan explained, detailing features with several pictures.

The estimated cost is \$125 million

Councilwoman Quirina Orozco said every time officials discuss spending funds from voter-approved measures, "it has to be what we tell the voters."

But it's not just about keeping the promise; it's about improving areas with heavy impact fees, especially in older parts of the city.

"Seeing it come to the first step of fruition is incredible," Orozco said.

Mayor Martha Guerrero mentioned the importance of parking and EV charging stations, how officials need to obtain grant funding for that, and other plan features.

"I am just trying to figure out what components we need for the future," Guerrero said, noting while she hopes wide bicycle lanes are possible, it might be hard to integrate into the older part of the city.

"I just want to make sure as we are moving forward, we educate the community," Guerrero said.

That could mean more Post-its.

"Let's start raising \$125 million," Verna-Sulpizio Hall said.

Continued from page 1 check and review costs associated with improvement project(s)."

The following funding category is the Small Business Microgrant Program, allotting up to \$20,000 for small businesses transitioning to brick-and-mortar or expanding to larger commercial space. Lastly, the Small Business Vandalism Relief program provides up to \$5,000 for victimized business owners.

"This was created through talks with PD (police department)," Stiles said of funds that can be used for high insurance deductibles related to vandalism.

Additional program costs for the new program include funding a dedicated website and design cost assistance to seek out architects familiar with city features regarding redesign.

Councilwoman Verna Sulpizio Hull said the idea of an "on-call architect and people that know city processes and how we do business will really help usher in businesses who haven't gone through the permitting process."

While Stiles said a small business could take care of all four funding category avenues, Sulpizio Hull suggested adding a "fifth bucket" that has everything to do with the A's coming to town.

According to the councilwoman, a more unified voice and marketing dollars are vital to attracting new businesses now that the Major League Baseball team calls West Sacramento home.

"Hire a marketing agency specifically focused on restaurants and hotels and get ahead of creating a brand for the community to lead off," Sulpizio Hull said.

West Sacramento Chamber of Commerce President Denice Seals approached city officials, saying the Small Business Accelerator Program is "a long time coming."

"It is so encouraging," Seals said, specifically of the permit assistance fee funding.

"Entrepreneurs and small businesspeople are people that start with a passion," Seals said. "They are excited about what they do."

According to the commerce president, "acknowledging that passion by reducing a fee sets a tone with the city for the rest of their relationship with the city."

"This is worth waiting for and will make a difference for businesses," Seals said.

OCTOBER 2024 **DTSC PUBLIC NOTICE** Department of Toxic Substances Control – Our Mission is to protect California's people, communities, and environment from toxic ostances, to enhance economic vitality by restoring contaminated land, and to compel manufacturers to make safer consumer products.

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WHEN: MAY 31, 2025

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On May 20, 2022, the Department of Toxic Substances Control (DTSC)'s Lead-Acid Battery Recycling Facility Investigation and Cleanup (LABRIC) Program issued a Public Notice of the initiation of the investigation and site evaluation of the area at, and around, the former C&S Battery and Lead Company (C&S Battery) at 860 Riske Lane, West Sacramento, CA 95691. DTSC is generally required to complete its investigation and designate a site as determined with reasonable certainty to have been contaminated by a lead-acid battery recycling facility within two years of its public notice. DTSC may extend that deadline for up to three months, with good cause shown and adequate public notice. DTSC may make up to three additional three-month extensions.

Since issuing its Public Notice in May 2022, DTSC completed an investigation work plan and obtained permission to sample the former C&S Battery property and some nearby properties. DTSC also began collecting and analyzing soil samples from the C&S Battery property and some of the nearby properties.

On July 12, 2024, DTSC provided a Notice of Extension, extending the investigation period until November 19, 2024. At this time, while continuing to act judiciously and in good faith, DTSC has not yet completed its evaluation of the investigation results. DTSC hereby extends and provides notice of the extension of the deadline by three months from November 19, 2024, to February 19, 2025.

Social Security Matters

Will my Wife's Survivor Benefits be Less if she Claimed Her Social Security Early?

Dear Rusty: I claimed Social Security at 70. My wife claimed her own SS at 62, and her earnings were significantly lower than mine. I understand my wife will be eligible to claim my benefit if I pass before she does, but will Social Security reduce that benefit because she didn't wait until age 65 to claim hers? **Signed: Concerned Husband**

Dear Concerned: Your wife's benefit as your surviving spouse will be based on two things:

• Her age when she claims her survivor benefit,

• The amount you were receiving at your death. If she has reached her

own Full Retirement Age (FRA) when she claims

her surviving spouse benefit, she will get 100% of the amount you were receiving when you died (instead of her own smaller SS retirement amount). However, if she claims her survivor benefit at any time before her full retirement age, it will be reduced for claiming the survivor benefit early.

Thus, when your wife claimed her own Social Security retirement benefit (in her case, age 62) doesn't matter and doesn't affect her potential surviving spouse benefit - what matters is her age when she claims her survivor benefit. If she claims before reaching her own FRA, her survivor benefit will be reduced according to the number of months before her FRA that the survivor benefit is claimed. That reduction would be about 4.75% for each year earlier than her FRA she claims it. But if she claims her surviving spouse benefit at or after she reaches her full retirement age, she will get the amount you were receiving at your death, instead of her own smaller age 62 Social

Security retirement benefit amount. FYI, your wife's full retirement age is somewhere between 66 and 67, depending on the year she was born (born in 1960 or later, her FRA is age 67).

And, just for clarity, your wife's payment as your surviving spouse will consist of her own SS retirement benefit plus an auxiliary amount to bring her monthly payment up to what she is entitled to as your surviving spouse.

Admit One

You land up in a hospital and you feel like you are in a maze. Do you have the correct information when you go in? Did you know that communication breakdowns in hospitals in the U.S. leads to hundreds of deaths? Never happen to you? Let's face it, in the trauma of being admitted, patients and family can easily become confused by the tons of information and instructions from these strangers. That's why Kati Kleber, BSN, RC, and CCRN and nationally certified critical care nurse in the neurosciences pulled together information you need to know before it all comes crashing down and you become one of those victims. It's called "Admit One" with what you must know when going to the hospital, but no one actually tells you. From CNN to Dr. Oz Kati shared the insider information with me on POPPOFF.

1. BRING A LIST OF HOME MED-ICATIONS. Know what medications you take on a regular basis. When you are admitted someone will ask you to provide a list of your med and will put them in your chart. Your attending doctor will decide which to keep you on in the hospital. On this one, I asked Kati if it's a good idea to have a list of vitamins and herbs you take, and she said absolutely because of interactions.

2. MAKE A LIST OF HEALTH CARE TEAM MEMBERS. An extensive team of health professionals will come and go from your room. It's hard to tell which is which ... doc, nurse, consultant etc. You and your support person will want to write down who is who, along with their instructions. **3. KNOW YOUR CODE.** Your code status informs staff what to do if you stop breathing or your heart stops. Patients without chronic health issues who aren't nearing the end of their life may want health professionals to do everything to revive them. Others with terminal diagnosis or advanced age may choose not to be revived. This is called DNR or Do Not Resuscitate.

4. ASSIGN A SPOKESPERSON. Identify someone the hospital staff can call when changes occur. It is important this person can be easily reached and that you trust.


5. WRITE DOWN QUESTIONS AS YOU THINK OF THEM. Except for nurses, most team members stop by your room once a day, review your care plan, and make adjustments. It's not easy to remember all your questions.

6. ADVOCATE FOR YOURSELF. Let the nurse know of any changes in your condition so the information can be relayed to your health care team. Also, if for any reason, you are not happy with a member of your health care team, let your nurse know that you'd like to speak with a nurse manager.

7. LEAVE THE EQUIPMENT TO THE EXPERTS. Hospitals are full of elaborate, high-tech equipment. If any equipment becomes dislodged, always alert a nurse. Unfortunately, incidents have occurred where patients or family inflict irreparable harm when trying to fix things themselves.

That's just the tip of the iceberg, lots more in "Admit One."

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California Is Banning Artificial Food Dyes in School Snacks and Drinks. Here's What the Science Says

Many brightly colored kids' snacks and beverages will disappear from California schools under a new law Gov. Gavin Newsom signed on Sunday that bans certain artificial food dyes from K-12 campuses.

Starting in 2028, six common food dyes will no longer be allowed in food sold at schools because of concerns that they cause behavior and attention problems in some children. The banned dyes are: Blue 1, Blue 2, Green 3, Red 40, Yellow 5 and Yellow 6.

Artificial food coloring production in the U.S. has increased more than six-fold since the Food and Drug Administration first issued safety regulations in the 1930s. Although initial studies indicated that artificial colors were nontoxic, recent research has linked eating foods containing synthetic dyes to hyperactivity and trouble concentrating, particularly among children.

This legislation builds on a first-in-the-nation law Newsom signed last year to ban the sale of food containing four food additives common in candies and baked goods, and are thought to be harmful. That law applies to food sold anywhere in California, while this year's legislation focuses solely on school nutrition.

"The reason it makes sense to focus on schools is because that's where a lot of those behavioral and hyperactivity issues are going to compound," Melanie Benesh, vice president for government affairs with Environmental Working Group, a national advocacy group that co-sponsored the legislation. "If you know there are kids in these schools that have a sensitivity to these dyes, and it makes it harder for them to concentrate, then you are not creating the most conducive learning environment for those kids."

Several state legislatures are considering bills similar to California's. The federal government, however, has not updated its safety standards.

"California is once again leading the nation when it comes to protecting our kids from dangerous chemicals that can harm their bodies and interfere with their ability to learn," said Assemblymember Jesse Gabriel, the Democrat from Encino who authored the law.

Packaged food manufacturers opposed the food dye restrictions, saying that the FDA — not California — is the appropriate food safety regulator.

"The approach taken by California politicians ignores our science and risk based process and is not the precedent we should be setting when it comes to feeding our families," said John Hewitt, a senior vice president at Consumer Brands Association, which opposed the measure. The organization represents major food manufacturers, such as Coca Cola and J.M. Smucker.

What does the science say on food dyes?

Managing risk of harmful chemicals can be tricky, and California is no stranger to considering controversial legislation that attempts to reduce exposure.

An early version of the law Newsom signed last year to ban certain food additives was derided by critics as a "Skittles ban" before lawmakers amended it in a way that excluded the dye in the popular candy. Meanwhile,

cancer warnings that are required by a 1986 law known as Proposition 65 are often criticized for creating consumer confusion and spurious lawsuits.

But advocates say federal regulations don't move as quickly as science, requiring state lawmakers to take initiative.

California's environmental hazard research agency published a 300-page report assessing the risk of synthetic food dyes in 2021. The conclusion: The studies used by the FDA to develop safety standards did not assess neurological outcomes that have since been associated with food coloring. Those papers, which are between 35 to 70 years old, instead looked for physiological toxic effects, such as weight gain or decreased liver function in animals.

More recent research,

including clinical trials, show links between eating dye and behavioral problems in children at much lower doses than the FDA's current allowable limit.

"We all agreed that the weight of evidence supported an association, and that the current acceptable daily intakes for some of the dyes set by FDA may not adequately protect against behavioral or neurobehavioral outcomes," said Asa Bradman, a public health professor at UC Merced who worked on the state's risk assessment. "And you know, that's kind of a bombshell."

Hewitt from the Consumer Brands Association said packaged food manufacturers stand by the FDA guidelines.

"It's unfortunate the scientifically proven, safe ingredients have been demonized without a scientific basis," Hewitt said.

But Bradman said the industry hasn't been able to discredit any of the newer research — it has only pointed to the original studies, which are outdated and not appropriate for assessing behavioral changes.

Dyes in juice, soda and ice cream

Children are the most vulnerable to the adverse effects associated with food coloring, in part, because they're more likely to eat foods and beverages that are dyed. Even medications for children, such as cough syrup and vitamins, are manufactured with synthetic dyes. Kids are also more susceptible because their brains are still developing, and their body weight is smaller compared to the amount of dye consumed, research shows.

Juice, soda, icing and ice cream cones are major sources of exposure among kids.

Poverty and race also increase exposure risk, the state's report found. Black children and women of childbearing age ingested significantly more food coloring than other ethnic groups.

The foods that contain the most dye are "poor quality junk food," Bradman said. Most schools already have healthy food programs aimed at reducing them on campus. This legislation would help encourage schools to serve even healthier foods, he said.

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Transportation Impacts Dialysis Patient Outcomes

SACRAMENTO REGION, CA (MPG) - An estimated 35.5 million Americans have kidney disease and more than 554,000 of them are on dialysis, according to the National Kidney Foundation.

Dialysis is a treatment to replace the filtering function of the kidneys. It removes waste and extra fluid from a person's blood, and then returns the filtered blood into their body.

Most patients go to a dialysis center three times a week, where each treatment takes three to four hours to complete. Skipping dialysis can be harmful — causing fluid overload, high potassium and elevated phosphorus levels - and can lead to severe health problems.

Dialysis requires consistency and a significant time commitment. But what happens when patients don't have reliable transportation? How consistently can they receive dialysis treatment?

That is a question UC Davis Health researchers are asking. Through a collaborative effort between Family and Community Medicine and Nephrology, a team of researchers are conducting a study to better understand the impact transportation and different modes of transportation have on dialysis patient outcomes.

"As a nephrologist, I see patients missing their dialysis appointments on a daily basis due to the variable quality of their transportation," explained Baback Roshanravan, associate professor of nephrology at UC Davis Health. "However, we have little research about who qualifies as transportation insecure and how we can best help them."

Transportation data collection

For the study, researchers will be working with a prospective cohort of 300 patients. Through U.S. Renal Care, they will collect transportation screening data from dialysis centers across the country and then look at each patient's outcomes following one-year of treatment.

The researchers will also analyze a quantitative data set looking at the associations of patient outcomes and particular modes of transport, including services provided by Medicaid, paratransit, public transportation or private pay transportation.

"Our hope is this data will help guide us on how to screen for patients who are transportation insecure and help us develop the best strategies to better support them," said Na'amah Razon, assistant professor of family and community medicine at UC Davis Health and principal investigator of the study.

Measuring transportation insecurity

Researchers will also evaluate different tools to measure the extent transportation impacts dialysis patient outcomes.

One of the tools is the Transportation Security Index developed at the University of Michigan. It is the first validated measure of transportation security that offers insights into who experiences transportation insecurity and enables researchers and practitioners to determine which interventions can improve this condition.

"The transportation security index is modeled after the food security index," explained Razon. "The survey is composed of items that focus on the material and relational aspects of transportation insecurity."

Razon added, "We don't really have a common language with a shared definition to talk about or measure transportation insecurity. This index could help us identify the symptoms of transportation insecurity and think about specific interventions that could move the needle."

The study is being funded by the Mentored Patient-Oriented Research Career Development Award (K23) from the National Institute of Diabetes and Digestive and Kidney Diseases (NIDDK). The K23 supports the career development of individuals with a clinical doctoral degree who focus their research endeavors on patient-oriented research.

Collaborators include researchers from the University of Michigan, Stanford University, University of California San Francisco and Vanderbilt University.

DWR Marks 10 Years of the Sustainable Groundwater Management Act

SACRAMENTO, CA (MPG) - Sept. 16 marks the 10th anniversary of the Sustainable Groundwater Management Act (SGMA), a landmark law that is driving reductions in the overuse of groundwater, protecting drinking water supplies, and making communities, agriculture and ecosystems more resilient to the impacts of climate change.

The Sustainable Groundwater Management Act was signed into law on Sept. 16, 2014, midway through the historic 2012-2016 drought. Driven by the need to address declining groundwater supplies, the law created a statewide framework to protect this critical resource in California, which provides 41 percent of the state's total supply in a normal year and up to 60 percent during droughts. About 85 percent of Californians rely on groundwater for some portion of their water needs.

In the 10 years since its passage, remarkable accomplishments have been achieved under the Sustainable Groundwater Management Act:

More than 250 local Groundwater Sustainability Agencies (GSAs) have been formed to protect drinking water wells, reduce land sinking and improve groundwater supplies.

These Groundwater Sustainability Agencies are implementing over 100 Groundwater Sustainability Plans, using creative solutions like recharging groundwater supplies, limiting usage, and other management actions that will help create a resilient and sustainable water supply for California.

California is now collecting more groundwater

The State has invested nearly \$1 billion in the Sustainable Groundwater Management Act in 10 years, including more than \$100 million through the Department of Water Resources for local groundwater recharge projects.

"It has been impressive to see that through the tireless efforts of local groundwater sustainability agencies, every ambitious SGMA milestone has been met so far," said Paul Gosselin, Department of Water Resources (DWR) Deputy Director of Sustainable Water Management. "A foundational part of SGMA is that groundwater is best managed locally, by the people that know their groundwater basins and depend on the resource. As a result, over 95 percent of groundwater pumping is subject to a locally adopted, enforceable groundwater sustainability plan."

The State's goal is to help Groundwater Sustainability Agencies reach sustainable groundwater conditions in their basins while maintaining local control, for the benefit of sustainable agriculture, drinking water supplies, and healthy ecosystems.

Under the Sustainable Groundwater Management Act, local agencies are responsible for the sustainable management of their groundwater basins. However, state agencies namely the Department of Water Resources and State Water Board - are responsible for ensuring local groundwater management achieves the Sustainable Groundwater Management Act 's goals.

The Department of Water Resources is the primary technical assistance and oversight agency responsible for assessing and evaluating basin compliance with the Sustainable Groundwater Management Act. The State Water Board acts as the state "backstop" and will temporarily intervene in the management of a groundwater basin when the Department of Water Resources determines that the basin is not in compliance, working with local agencies to resolve failures and end state intervention. "Improving groundwater management practices to achieve sustainable aquifers is essential for the future of California and the ability of agriculture to continue food production in a hotter, drier future," said Karen Ross, Secretary, California

Department of Food and Agriculture. "The State of California has made significant investments to support local authorities with financial investments, policy development to accelerate groundwater recharge, sharing of data and technical assistance to chart a pathway forward to successfully implement this historic law."

"Ten years ago, when SGMA became law, all of us took on the responsibility of bringing about sustainable management of our groundwater basins for the benefit of everyone who relies on them," said Joaquin Esquivel, board chair of the State Water Resources Control Board. "A lot of progress has happened since then to meet this challenge, and we have more work to do to achieve sustainability for California's groundwater basins."

The next 10 years of the Sustainable Groundwater Management Act will focus on implementing the plans developed so far. Projects and decisions aim to bring California's groundwater basins to sustainable conditions by the early 2040s. Weather extremes, especially drought, make this work even more critical, as the state must store and capture as much water as possible during wet years.

To celebrate this milestone anniversary. the Department of Water Resources will host an event on Nov. 18. Featured speakers and panelists will include Department of Water Resources Director Karla Nemeth, and Department of Water Resources Deputy Director of Sustainable Water Management Paul Gosselin, as well as representatives from Groundwater Sustainability Agencies, community organizations, state leaders and others in the Sustainable Groundwater Management

(MPG) - On Oct. 4, Congresswoman Doris Matsui (CA-07), Ranking Member of the House Energy and Commerce Communications and Technology Subcommittee, issued the following statement after the National Telecommunications and Information Administration (NTIA)approved California's Broadband Equity, Access, and Deployment (BEAD) Program Initial Proposal Volume 2. This approval enables California to request access to funding and begin implementation of the BEAD program.

"In an increasingly interconnected world, closing the digital divide is an economic imperative. From finding a job to growing a business to submitting a homework assignment everyday necessities require a reliable connection," said Congresswoman Matsui. "Born out of the Bipartisan Infrastructure Law, the BEAD program represents a generational investment to connect every American to affordable, high-quality broadband. Today's announcement is a critical milestone on our road to realizing that vision and allowing us to begin selecting the broadband projects that will receive funding."

"We know the stakes couldn't be higher for those still lacking access," Matsui continued. "Almost two-thirds of Californians without home broadband say cost is a key reason. In my district, I hear about the need

ing communities down in the Delta. That's why we have done the important work to identify and acknowledge our most overlooked and unserved Californians. Now we must continue to push hard to deploy these funds and get our neighbors connected."

Congresswoman Matsui has led national efforts to close the digital divide and ensure access to affordable broadband. Earlier this year, Matsui and House Energy and Commerce Committee Ranking Member Frank Pallone, Jr. wrote to the National Telecommunications and Information Administration supporting its efforts to prioritize affordability in the BEAD Program as it reviews state plans.

She and her colleagues previously wrote a letter to the National Telecommunications and Information Administration in March 2022 as the agency prepared to implement the broadband programs in the Bipartisan Infrastructure Law, stressing the importance of affordability and empowering the agency to ensure as many people as possible benefit from the program.

Background

The Broadband Equity, Access, and Deployment Program provides \$42.45 billion to expand highspeed internet access by funding planning, infrastructure deployment and adoption programs in all 50 states. In California, the BEAD program is being implemented by the California Public Utilities Commission (CPUC).

States were required to submit an Initial Proposal for the National Telecommunications

Information a n d Administration's approval - detailing how they plan to spend their Broadband Equity, Access, and Deployment allocation to deliver high-speed internet access to all unserved and underserved locations within their borders. All states submitted their Initial Proposals by Dec. 27, 2023. One year from Initial Proposal approval, states must submit a Final Proposal that details, among other things, the outcome of the subgrantee selection process and how the state will ensure universal coverage.

I love that you're thinking about the future. I also think it's great that you've learned from past mistakes and are determined not to repeat those mistakes.


You've got a smart idea,

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

Sen. Dodd's Defensible Space **Bill Signed by Governor**

Office of Sen. Bill **Dodd News Release**

SACRAMENTO, CA (MPG) -Sen. Bill Dodd, D-Napa, announced Oct. 1 Gov. Gavin Newsom has signed his measure to enhance wildfire safety by improving standards for creation of defensible space.

"This measure saves lives by improving on my previous legislation on defensible space," said Sen. Dodd. "With more destructive and frequent wildfires, we must take every opportunity to protect ourselves and our communities. One of the best things we can do is to clear the space around our homes of combustible brush and other flammable material."

Sen. Dodd has long been a leader in wildfire legislation, authoring more than a dozen bills signed into law. This year, he continued with more bills, including Senate Bill 504. The proposal establishes more robust standards, especially for new construction and home upgrades, with creation of an ember-resistant zone between 5 and 30 feet of a dwelling.

SB 504 was approved by overwhelming Assembly and Senate votes before being signed by the governor. The bill is supported by local government including the city of Santa Rosa.

"Local firefighters know that in an emergency, every inch of defensible space counts," Santa Rosa City Councilmember Chris Rogers said. "This bill prioritizes resources to cities like Santa Rosa that have set safety standards and helped homeowners protect their properties. I look forward to my community benefiting from this new law."

Governor Signs Sen. Dodd's Generative AI Accountability Act

Office of Sen. Bill **Dodd News Release**

SACRAMENTO, CA (MPG) - Gov. Gavin Newsom on Sept. 29 signed legislation from Sen. Bill Dodd, D-Napa, that will build upon recent directives from President Joe Biden and Gov. Gavin Newsom addressing the unprecedented growth of generative artificial intelligence technology by encouraging continued innovation while ensuring the rights and opportunities of all Californians are protected.

"Today, we take a big step toward identifying potential problems with generative AI and developing appropriate guidelines to protect our state and the public as we take advantage of this transformative technology," Sen. Dodd said. "Because we know AI has tremendous potential to improve our lives and the functioning of government. But we also know it presents risks, specifically the threat to consumer privacy, transparency and fairness. This new law will help us address many of these concerns."

The 2023 White House Blueprint for an AI Bill of Rights, in addition to recent executive guidance from Gov. Newsom, establish a framework for addressing concerns including AI-driven algorithms that discriminate against people based on income levels or race, and the effects of the technology on our workforce. Additionally, the president and governor have underscored threats posed by AI to data and consumer privacy, and the potential for misusing the technology to deceive and defraud.

Dodd's Sen. California Generative AI Accountability Act, also known as Senate Bill 896, will guide the decision-making of state agencies, departments and subdivisions in the review, adoption, management, governance and regulations of AI technologies. One provision in the bill would require state agencies to notify users when they are interacting with AI. Further, the act encourages the state to invest in AI education and build AI competency in the state's workforce. It also requires state agencies to consider opportunities in which generative AI can improve the efficiency, effectiveness, accessibility and equity of government operations.

The bill was approved with unanimous Assembly and Senate support before being signed by the governor.

"SB 896 codifies several important aspects of this EO, including direction to CalOES to perform risk analyses on potential threats posed by the use of GenAI to California's critical infrastructure," wrote Governor Newsom in a signing statement

on the bill.

"Under this direction, CalOES has been working with frontier model companies to analyze energy infrastructure risks and convened power sector providers to share threats and security strategies. Building on this work, and in signing this bill, I am further directing CalOES to undertake the same risk assessment with water infrastructure providers in the coming year, and the communications sector shortly thereafter."

"In this era of disinformation, it is critical that guardrails be in place for the use of generative AI," said Brian Hofer, executive director of the nonprofit Secure Justice, a bill supporter. "By addressing procurement, use, and training, Sen. Dodd's SB 896 will help California mitigate risk from using AI, while allowing for careful exploration and appropriate uses of this fast-emerging field."

SB 896 is a follow-up to Sen. Dodd's Senate Concurrent Resolution 17, adopted last year, which sets forth many of the ideas and was the first AI-drafted state resolution in history.

CW FALL SCHEDULE SEEKS TO BUILD ON ITS BRAND OF TELEVISION

The President of Entertainment at the CW Network, Brad Schwartz, would like us to know that their Fall season is "another leap forward in the transformation" of the network as it continues "building a media brand with broadcast at its core."

His optimism is to be admired because there are conflicting views on the future of broadcast television. There was a time, in a galaxy long ago, when three major networks, ABC, NBC and CBS, dominated and we mostly watched the same shows, some good and others eminently forgettable.

The Detroit Free Press published an article earlier this year noting that the answer to the question of the future of television was a "one-way ticket down a rabbit hole of potential outcomes." During the latter part of last century came the rise of cable TV, and now the hot market is streaming.

Mondays will be game show night with two new series based on familiar names. First up is "Trivial Pursuit," reimagined in a question-packed entertainment format. Gameplay takes place on a giant version of the iconic game board, as contestants fight it out.

Participants battle over a range of playalong question categories to win wedges and beat each other to the center. The victor then takes on a dramatic finale against the clock to claim the jackpot. "Trivial Pursuit" is hosted by Emmy Awardwinning actor LeVar Burton.

Hosted by fan-favorite actor and singer Raven-Symone, "Scrabble" is a captivating, fast-paced take on the global board-game phenomenon. In each episode, wordsmiths skirmish over a series of addictive word games of skill and strategy to win points and master a giant Scrabble board.

Ten years ago, TNT debuted "The Librarians" series that featured a diverse group, including a skilled thief and art historian, working below the public library in order to protect mystical artifacts.

"The Librarians: The Next Chapter," a spinoff of that original series, follows the adventures of the custodians of a magical repository of the world's most powerful and dangerous supernatural artifacts.

The wait is finally over and once again a frenetic group of nearly 20,000 fans will hear the introduction, "and now running the point for the Sacramento Kings from the Kentucky Wildcats, De'Aaron Fox!"

On Wednesday night for the very first time Sacramento fans will hear the introduction of newcomer DeMar DeRozan out of the University of Southern California. DeRozan, like many of his comrade's, chose to bolt to the NBA after just one year in college, and the ninth overall pick in the 2009 draft has been an overwhelming success ever since.

Since then, he has said all the right things, and like many NBA fans, I believe he will fit in extremely well alongside De'Aaron Fox and Domantas Sabonis. Great players are replete, but great people and great players are a scarce commodity. Mr. DeRozan brings both qualities to a team that is replete with team chemistry, and like most Kings fans, I want to see what Monte McNair's standout acquisition can do.

It is entirely possible that amid all the hype, Kings fans may have to be patient while the big three learn to play alongside one another, but I firmly believe that this six-time all-star will make the transition quickly.

Able to play guard or small forward, much has been reported about the uptick we are likely to see with regards to better looks for Fox, Sabonis, and three-point shooter Keegan Murray.

Lost to some degree in all the uproar of the signing of DeRozan, is how third year hoopster Murray will use DeRozan's talents to get better looks, and more opportunities to drive the lane.

I was impressed with Keegan's introduction of a true mid-range game last season, and along with some notable shooting inside the three-point line, like former teammate Harrison Barnes, Murray became a threat driving to the basket.

The combination of Murray's three-point shooting, mid-range game, and ability to go to the hole, will have a positive impact on DeRozan as well, and I expect to see this career 21 points per game player, potentially pad that number in the upcoming season.

Not to be overshadowed, Domantas Sabonis could elevate his game even more with the myriad of scoring ability around him, and a return to the high octane offense that led the NBA two years ago may well be in the offing.

It remains to be seen what the loss of defensive minded Jordi Fernandez will do to the Kings, and without question assistant head coach Jay Triano will have big shoes to fill.

Fitting that Sacramento's first opponent of the preseason will be archrival, The Golden State Warriors, and like the Kings, the Warriors will bring a vaunted offensive into Golden One.

Notably missing Wednesday night will be perennial three-point shooter and other half of the splash brothers, Klay Thompson, who has now donned royal blue colors of the Dallas Mavericks.

Joining all-stars Luka Doncic and Kyrie Irving, Thompson hopes to reignite a career that took a two-and-a-half-year hiatus after suffering back-to-back injuries to his ACL and Achilles.

It's important to note that Thompson helped the Warriors to an NBA title in his comeback season of 2022, but the past two years have seen Klay a step slower, and his offense not as reliable as it once was. At age 34 the 6'6" Thompson may still have more in the tank, but we won't witness that until the Mavericks come to town on Dec. 30.

Hitch up your britches Kings fans. We are in for a different look than perhaps this team has ever presented, and it's going to be a fun ride.

Ballot Measure Threatens Sonoma County Dairies and Poultry Farms

As voters cast their ballots in the coming weeks, farmers in Sonoma County say the future of the region's dairy and poultry farms is on the line. Measure J, a ballot initiative in Sonoma County, would within three years cap the number of animals each farm can raise, banning larger farms or forcing them to downsize. "If some of the larger farms in our community are no longer able to operate, it may lead to a collapse of the entire sector," said Albert Straus, owner of Petaluma-based Straus Family Creamery.

Irrigation Districts Work to Enhance Tuolumne River Salmon Habitat

Partnering with fisheries agencies, Central Valley irrigation districts, whose water users face flow reductions under the state's Bay-Delta water quality plan, are enhancing habitat along the Tuolumne River to improve conditions for struggling fish. The \$7.8 million habitat restoration project, happening downriver from the La Grange Dam in Stanislaus County, includes a \$5.5 million grant from the California Department of Fish and Wildlife and \$2.3 million invested by Turlock Irrigation District, Modesto Irrigation District and the San Francisco Public Utilities Commission.

How Bird Flu Spreads Among Dairy Cows Remains a Mystery

With cases of highly pathogenic avian influenza in dairy cows rapidly rising in California, animal health officials continue to try to contain the spread, even as they remain flummoxed by how the virus moves among herds. "The truth is that we don't really know how this virus spreads exactly," said Deniece Williams, head clinician at the University of California, Davis, School of Veterinary Medicine. As of Sept. 30, 43 dairy herds in the state—all in the Central Valley—have been confirmed with H5N1.

Input Costs Cut Into Ranching Profits as Beef Prices Hit Record Highs

The Voice of California Agriculture podcast, produced by the California Farm Bureau, discusses conditions that have caused the U.S. cattle inventory to decrease to its lowest levels in more than 70 years. Drought, deteriorating pasture conditions, inflation and high costs for feed and other inputs reduced herd sizes in recent years, causing beef prices to hit record highs, according to the U.S. Department of Agriculture. The episode also covers a rise in bird flu cases in Central Valley dairies, challenges related to new regulations for organic livestock certification and date harvest in the Coachella Valley. ★





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IRS Encourages People to Do an End-Of-Summer Tax Checkup

WASHINGTON (MPG) - The Internal Revenue Service recently encouraged taxpayers to consider using the end of the summer to make tax withholding or payment updates to avoid a potential surprise next year at tax time.

While most taxpayers get a refund after filing their taxes, many also find they unexpectedly owe taxes. This can be due to a life or job change for which they did not make the necessary tax adjustment during the year.

Those who should be especially careful are Gig economy workers, those with a "side hustle" and anyone earning income not subject to withholding.

These individuals should check the amount they pay, or the amount of tax they have withheld throughout the year, to bring the tax they pay closer to what is owed. The IRS has a special Tax Withholding Estimator that can help taxpayers align their tax withholding or tax payments with what they owe.

The IRS reminds taxpayers that tax planning done now can save time and frustration later. Here are some important things to keep in mind:

How Refunds Work

The federal tax system is pay-as-you-go. Taxpayers pay tax as they earn wages or receive income during the year. For many, taxes are withheld from their paycheck by their employer and then given over to the IRS on their behalf. Others, such as gig economy workers, make or should make quarterly estimated tax payments throughout the year to stay current. A refund normally results when too much is withheld or paid throughout the year.

Recent IRS statistics show that two-thirds of taxpayers received a refund so far in 2024. As of mid-May, nearly \$270 billion in refunds went to taxpayers with the average refund just under \$2,900.

Avoid an Unexpected Bill

On the other hand, many taxpayers end up with estimated tax penalties because they underpay throughout the year. The penalty amount varies but for some it can be several hundred dollars. Adjusting withholding on paychecks or the amount of estimated tax payments can help prevent penalties. This is especially important for self-employed people, including those in the gig economy, those with more than

one job and those with major changes in their life, like a recent marriage or a new child.

With that in mind, the IRS encourages taxpayers to use the IRS Tax Withholding Estimator this summer to help better align their tax withholding or tax payments with what they owe.

Tax Withholding Estimator

This handy tool on IRS.gov helps people figure the amount of federal income tax they should pay during the year. All that's needed for taxpayers to use it are paystubs for all their jobs or other income information, such as from side jobs, self-employment or investment income and a copy of their 2023 tax year return.

People can use the Tax Withholding Estimator to estimate their federal income tax withholding, see how a refund, takehome pay or tax due are affected by withholding amounts and choose an estimated withholding amount that works for them and their family.

If a withholding change is needed upon completion, taxpayers should adjust their withholding by submitting a new Form W-4 to their employer or pension provider. They can also adjust quarterly estimated tax payments as appropriate.

IRS also reminds people to use the Tax Withholding Estimator if there's a major life change such as a new job or other paid work, major income change, a marriage, childbirth or adoption and a new home purchase.

While the Tax Withholding Estimator works for most taxpayers, people with more complex tax situations should instead use the instructions in Publication 505, Tax Withholding and Estimated Tax. This includes taxpayers who owe Alternative Minimum Tax or certain other taxes, and people with long-term capital gains or qualified dividends.

California's Expensive Explosion of Real Estate Fraud Hits Home

Rana Robillard came very close this year to losing her life's savings and with it her dream home, when she wired nearly \$400,000 to an internet scammer.

Robillard, ironically, is an experienced veteran of the Bay Area technology industry, but when she received what she thought was a request for her down payment on a home in Orinda, she sent the money, only to learn that she had been tricked.

"That's when I went into a full panic," Robillard, 55, told CNBC, the cable channel devoted to financial matters, which chronicled her terrifying experience.

Robillard was not alone in being victimized.

The real estate industry has fully embraced online transactions, thus eliminating the hassle of having buyers, sellers, real estate agents, mortgage lenders and title company employees shuffle through dozens of paper documents that must be signed or initialed to complete transactions.

It's made the process of buying and selling houses much more convenient, but it's also given scammers an opening for fraud that has cost home buyers many millions of dollars.

The request for down

payment that Robillard received was virtually identical to the many email messages she had exchanged and, in fact, was the only bogus one, which is why scammers have been so successful.

Cyber crooks have mastered the dark art of mimicking legitimate messages, complete with the real names of title company employees and authentic-looking logos, and artificial intelligence could make their scams even more successful in the future.

FBI data, CNBC reported, reveal that real estate fraud involving bogus emails has risen from less than \$9 million in 2015 to \$446.1 million in 2022.

A study of real estate fraud commissioned by Anidjar and Levine, a Florida law firm, found that California's 1,583 cases in 2023 far surpassed those of any other state, as did its \$24.8 million in losses.

Robillard is one of the lucky victims. She quickly reported her loss and her \$398,359.5 was tracked through several banks as the thieves shifted it around to avoid detection. Five months later, after CNBC began making inquiries, she received \$150,000 from one bank and then the remaining nearly \$250,000 from another.

Robillard contacted CNBC about her case both to help her recover the money and bring more attention to the real estate fraud explosion.

"This is not what I thought my public representation would look like, which is that I've lost all this money," Robillard told CNBC. "If it helps other people, I'm happy to do it, even though it's obviously not my proudest moment."

I take a particular interest in Robillard's case not only because it's important but because I came within a whisker last week of also becoming a victim.

I, too, received a very authentic-looking instruction from the title company handling my purchase of a smaller home for downsizing, seeking down payment and closing costs to complete the purchase. It seemingly came from the title company employee who had been handling my transaction and had all of the appearances of a legitimate communication.

I intended to comply with the request a few hours later, but then received a phone call from my lender about closing the transaction. I told him of the request and he immediately smelled a rat.

That phone call was a lifesaver. A few days later, I presented a valid cashier's check to the title company employee whose identity had been borrowed by the scammer and signed the legitimate paperwork to finalize the purchase.

One of the documents I signed was a warning about phony payment instructions. Perhaps it should have been one of the first documents I was given, rather than one of the last.

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Sacramento Woman Indicted for Fraudulent Investment Scheme

SACRAMENTO, CA (MPG) - A federal grand jury returned a 32-count indictment against Maria Dickerson, also known as Dulce Pino, 47, of Sacramento, charging her with 24 counts of wire fraud, one count of securities fraud, and seven counts of money laundering, U.S. Attorney Phillip A. Talbert announced. The indictment was unsealed following her arrest.

According to the indictment, from 2020 through 2024, Dickerson created an investment scheme, selling interest in her illusory shell company, Creative Legal Fundings of California, to investors. Dickerson promised investors that their investments were safe and secure and backed by substantial starting capital. Dickerson promised approximately 140 investors a fixed percent of return per month on their principal investment with additional compounding monthly interest if they left their money invested with her.

In reality, Dickerson used new investor money to pay off prior investors, to fund a lavish lifestyle, and to purchase Mercedes-Benz vehicles and a home in Sacramento. Dickerson did not register the sale of her securities with the Securities and Exchange Commission. Dickerson took money from investors and collected millions of dollars in investment funds solicited with her false promises and representations.

This case is the product of an investigation by the Federal Bureau of Investigation and IRS Criminal Investigation, with assistance from the Alabama Securities Commission. Assistant U.S. Attorneys Kristin F. Scott and Rosanne L. Rust are prosecuting the case.

The Securities and Exchange Commission is filing a parallel action against Dickerson. The Business, Consumer Services and Housing Agency of the California Department of Financial Protection and Innovation previously filed a Desist and Refrain Order against Dickerson.

If convicted, Dickerson faces a maximum statutory penalty of 20 years in prison and a \$250,000 fine for each count of wire fraud. Additionally, she faces a maximum statutory penalty of 10 years in prison and a fine of \$250,000 for each count of money laundering. On the securities fraud charge, Dickerson faces a statutory maximum penalty of 20 years in prison and a fine of up to \$5 million. Any sentence, however, would be determined at the discretion of the court after consideration of any applicable statutory factors and the Federal Sentencing Guidelines, which take into account a number of variables. The charges are only allegations; the defendant is presumed innocent until and unless proven guilty beyond a reasonable doubt.



The Biden Administration is "Marching In" On Innovation

What do the HIV drug Emtricitabine, next-generation navigation gyroscopes for autonomous cars, and unmanned air vehicles have in common?

All three were developed at prestigious research universities -- and were created in part using basic scientific research funded by the U.S. government.

All three are also examples of technology success stories that could be threatened if the Biden administration's proposed changes to federal research licensing go into effect.

Last year, the National Institute of Standards and Technology (NIST) published a proposal that, for the first time, would allow the federal government to "march in" and rescind patent protections for commercial products developed with federal dollars when the government deems those products too expensive.

Understanding the significance of this decision requires looking back to the Bayh-Dole Act of 1980. Prior to Bayh-Dole, the United States had established itself as a research powerhouse. But while the U.S. government had accumulated more than 28,000 patents, it had licensed less than 5% of them for commercial development. Bayh-Dole changed that by allowing small businesses and universities to retain patent rights on inventions developed with the help of federal funding. Studies have found that, in the four decades since its inception, Bayh-Dole has generated \$1.9 trillion in U.S. economic growth, supported 6.5 million jobs, and spawned over 17,000 startup companies.

Bayh-Dole gives the federal government the ability to "march in" and relicense these patented technologies to third parties under certain conditions. But in more than 40 years since Bayh-Dole's inception, there has never been a single occurrence of a federal agency exercising march-in rights. It has historically been understood as a form of recourse appropriate only in exceptional circumstances. And the authors of Bayh-Dole explicitly stated that price is not a legitimate basis for march-in.

Across all industries, Bayh-Dole has been a huge success because it balances the risks and incentives between public funding of early-stage research and the private sector's R&D efforts. This has fueled research and development across all industries -- and generated billions in private-sector capital investment to support the licensing and commercialization of federally sponsored technologies.

If, under the proposed framework, companies and investors must contend with federal agencies relicensing their technologies based solely on price, investors may simply decide that the risks of investing in federally backed research outweigh the rewards -and shift their investments to technologies that are not funded by federal dollars.

If that happens, it will take us back to the stagnant, pre-1980s era of commercialization of federally funded research. It would also undermine technologies developed through the CHIPS Act, among many other federal programs.

Earlier this year, a bipartisan group of 28 lawmakers sent a letter to President Biden to express their concerns with the proposal. We can only hope the White House listens.

California Comment on Latest NFIB Jobs Report

SACRAMENTO, CA (MPG) - Release Sept. 5 of the National Federation of Independent Business' (NFIB) latest monthly Jobs Report once again confirms that finding qualified, or any, workers remains an intractable problem for small busistate director for the National Federation of Independent Business in California. "What would be helpful in the meantime is not to exacerbate the many other problems Main Street entrepreneurs have with running their businesses."

Fifty-six percent (90% of those hiring or trying to hire) of owners reported few or no qualified applicants for the positions they were trying to fill. Thirty-six percent have openings for skilled workers (up four points) and 15% have openings for unskilled labor (down one point). up five points from July and over half of them (60%) have a job opening they can't fill. Job openings were the highest in the transportation, construction, and manufacturing sectors, and the lowest in the agriculture and finance sectors.

A seasonally adjusted net 13% of owners plan to create new jobs in the next three months, down two points from July.
