



Changing Lives One Sticker at a Time

RANCHO CORDOVA, CA (MPG) - Helmet reward stickers for on-field achievement have been around since Bo Schembechler began using them at Miami University in Oxford, Ohio back in 1965.

Spring forward to 2024. At Cordova High School, a dozen different stickers go far beyond being awarded to players for wins and scoring touchdowns. Rather, they are earned for a wide range of activities with the long game in mind, preparing young men to become community-minded, productive members of society.

Clearly, the sticker paradigm has evolved into more purpose-based transformational coaching and preparing athletes for adulthood.

The godfather of this philosophy is former NFL player Joe Ehrmann, who wrote the blueprint in his 2004

book "Season of Life." The approach emphasizes healthy masculinity and relationship development through three concepts: Give to a cause larger than yourself; leave the world better than you found it; and practice radical inclusion. Ehrmann is President of the InSideOut Initiative. an evidenced-based, systems-level approach that inspires and catalyzes communities to transform the current interscholastic sports culture to one

Empowering Youth Futures

RANCHO CORDOVA, CA (MPG) - During the Rancho Cordova City Council meeting on Oct. 22, officials celebrated the 18-month milestone of the Rancho Cordova Youth Center (RCYC), a vital resource for local youth.

The center, established through a partnership between the City of Rancho Cordova and Center of Praise Ministries, Inc., aims to provide a safe and supervised environment for children to engage in academic, social and recreational activities.

Located at 10455 Investment Circle, the Rancho Cordova Youth

Center officially began operations in February 2023, collaborating with partners such as the Boys and Girls Club of Greater Sacramento and the Rancho Cordova Police Activities League.

"It is truly a unique model where we all operate under the same roof," said Kimberly Key, CEO of the Boys and Girls Club. "We are all very proud of that. It's providing youth opportunities for success and developing positive relationships with adults and law enforcement."

At the center, youth receive snacks, meals, academic support, and access programs emphasize highyield activities and targeted initiatives that encourage regular attendance. As a result, many participants report experiencing academic success, developing good character and practicing healthy lifestyles.

The Rancho Cordova Youth Center offers a variety of services, including before- and after-school programs, tutoring, sports leagues and leadership training, all designed to address the diverse needs of Rancho Cordova's youth population.

Open Monday through Friday from 2:30 p.m. to 6:30 p.m. during the the summer, the center has served 9,632 youths during regular hours. Additionally, 452 individuals have received ongoing support, and 400 households have benefited from its programs, according to Ian Winbrock, management analyst for the City of Rancho Cordova.

Demographic data highlights the center's inclusivity, with 25.8% of attendees identifying as African American, 23.9% as Hispanic/Latinx, and 12.4% as Asian. "We are thrilled to welcome Jennifer to our lifesaving team," said Susan Gray, Sacramento SPCA Board President. "She has a proven track record of effective leadership and a deep passion for helping animals and people. We are confident that her vision and expertise will guide us into the next chapter of lifesaving work in our community."

Brent recently moved from Southern California to take on the leadership role at the Sacramento SPCA, a nationally recognized leader for delivering high-quality, low-cost spay/neuter surgeries, along with adoption, wellness and outreach programs that positively impact more than 40,000 animals

that values the human growth and development of student-athletes.

JP Dolliver, in his second year as varsity head football coach, and Jason Harper, director of the Rancho Cordova Athletic Association, have adopted Ehrmann principles and play a central role in the sea change that is occurring at Cordova High School. Dolliver is the school's athletic director while Harper pulls double duty as director of character development.

"I think the players recognize that character impacts their own lives," Dolliver said. "This has to be top of mind in our program. We're trying to build and strengthen the minds of young men, and what kind of character they have is starting to be more present in their lives."

Said Harper, "All this is designed to teach athletes to chase after the best version of themselves. To create opportunities and outlets for these young people to showcase and be recognized for their goodness and build character within the community."

Ehrmann was ahead of the curve. Several years ago, a study by online journal PLoS ONE found that male athletes significantly modified their approach to competition, sacrificing their own best interest to serve the needs of

Taking this to the next level, if a singular sticker can reward great plays and touchdowns. imagine what a dozen different service-oriented and life skills stickers would do to build character and enhance an athlete's commitment to community. And that's what coaches are excited about the most.

Harper has extensive history with other high-flying character programs, including Del Oro, Oak Ridge and Destiny (formerly Capital Christian) high schools, each with great success. The incubator for character development were character combines that Harper created and ran for nearly 15 years, a must-attend for coaches and players throughout the region.



including the "ABC" sticker, chosen by the RCAA as a Certified 2024 leader.

"Being a part of something larger than themselves is what it's all about," Harper said. "What we are doing is preparing athletes not just for the next game but for life. It's that important."

Two of the Sacramento region's most prominent high school football coaches, Steve Eakes of Highlands and Casey Taylor of Oak Ridge, were early adopters of the concept.

Eakes, a former pro baseball player, attended one of Harper's early character combines and hasn't looked back.

"As players, you represent everyone in your circle. Family, friends and the family you don't have. It all expands out," Eakes said. "It's more important to win those kids over, teach them something that will benefit them later in life. You're thinking of others to advance yourself. Life stuff."

Taylor's teams won seven section championships, six at Del Oro and one at Capital Christian in 2018, and has coached teams to four state bowl games and one CIF state title. "Joe Ehrmann's approach

completely changed my thinking toward coaching. When kids understand that coaches are there for them through thick and thin, that's huge. Caring about other things than football, teaching them life skillsets." Taylor explained.

The stickers reflect a different life skill. Cordova football players can earn up to a dozen different sticker combinations this year:

ABC: awarded to those chosen by the Rancho Cordova Athletic Association as a Certified 2024 Leader. The A signifies Always Compete. B is Be Respectful to all, including parents, officials, the opposing team, everyone. C is Commit to Cordova. Harper envisions the movement will catch on quickly to other sports.

Rancho Cordova Athletic Association Hall of Fame Host: Five-point red star signifies players who participated as hosts at



the ninth induction of the Rancho Cordova Sports Hall of Fame on Sept. 14. Dressed in crisp pants and their varsity home jerseys, more than two dozen players were the embodiment of courtesy, as they welcomed attendees and inductees with respect and honor.

XMAS: Any member of the team who volunteers for the upcoming Christmas Tree Lighting Ceremony at Village Green earns an XMAS sticker.

916: Every team member received this sticker, which represents where they live with the full knowledge that an entire city is behind them. They represent an entire area code. Superman: Players earn this

sticker for community service in a wide range of activities such as participation in the annual Rancho Cordova International Festival (iFest) and the recent Kids Day. American Flag: participating

in major citywide events, such installing flags along Folsom Boulevard in advance of Veteran's

Title IX: Celebrating women's athletics. Several events have been slated where the entire football team shows up at what would be modestly attended events and blow the roof off the place as a special cheering section.

Academics: Two stickers for earning academic achievement: a 2.7 sticker and a 3.0. This year at grade check, every varsity player had achieved a 3.0 GPA.

Full Gas, No Brakes: adorned with the Lancer Shield, is awarded at the coach's discretion for unobtrusive acts of compassion and leadership by example.

Cordova Shield: The traditional sticker for performance and victories. The maximum any player can earn is five. Players are awarded these stickers at the weekly Thursday team dinner.

Bull's Eye: Two stickers can be earned for preparedness and completing tasks. One is a near-miss that signifies the player did everything correctly but missed the mark; the other is awarded for hitting the mark.

As the school year unfolds, Dolliver and Harper envision the movement catching on with other sports. Thus far, results are encouraging. For example, a football player on campus risked his own tardiness by assisting another student in a wheelchair get to class on time. Result, the player earned a Lancer Leadership sticker. On another occasion when Hall of Fame service stickers were awarded, one athlete declined the sticker, admitting that he did not participate with his teammates. "That right there shows me the program is working," Harper said.

It's Election Season Make Your Plans to Vote!

SACRAMENTO COUNTY, CA (MPG) - We are days away from the Nov. 5 General Election and ballots should be in hand (and hopefully already filled out and on their way back to the Elections Office, either by mail or Drop Box).

But never fear, if you haven't yet returned your voted ballot, you still have plenty of time.

For those voters or soon-to-be voters that need to register or update their voter registration file, Monday, Oct. 21 was the last day to make those changes or register online. While that deadline has passed, you can still visit the Election's Office in person or visit one of the Vote Centers that opened, starting Oct. 26, to conditionally register and vote.

Vote: Pick a Way, Any Way

Choose how, when and where you want

By mail: All registered voters received a ballot in the mail. Place the voted ballot inside the envelope provided, sign the envelope and return; your postage is paid! Ballots must be postmarked by Nov. 5 to count.

Vote Center: With the passage of the California Voter's Choice Act, traditional polling places were replaced with Vote Centers that are open for up to 11 days,

including Election Day. This means that voters can choose when, where and how they want to vote at any Vote Center in the county. Avoid the lines, vote early.

At the Vote Center, you can drop off your completed ballot or vote in person. There is even weekend voting.

Eighteen Vote Centers are open for 11 days, beginning Oct. 26.

An additional 70 Vote Centers are open for four days, beginning Nov. 2.

Eligible residents can also register to vote, update their registration and cast their ballot at a Vote Center, even on the day of the election.

Drop Boxes: Voted/signed ballots may be placed in any of the 60 secure Drop Box locations throughout Sacramento County.

When using a Drop Box, ensure that it is an official, secure box provided by the Sacrament County Election's Office. All official county drop boxes have the Sacramento County wave logo on them.

RANCHO CORDOVA, CA (MPG) - The Rancho Cordova Chamber of Commerce, with the Cordova Community Council, hosted the second 2024 Campaign Whistlestop Luncheon as a platform for candidates vying for local office.

Community members on Oct. 18 heard from incumbent candidates and challengers from the Cordova Recreation and Park District, including District 3 and 4, and Assembly District 7 candidates.

Rancho Cordova's campaign whistlestop honors the tradition of political candidates making quick stops across town to share their pitches and garner support from voters.

"We have been doing this for over 20 years," said Shelly Blanchard, Cordova Community Council executive director. "Getting the word out has always been job number one for candidates and for voters to get to hear how people plan to spend their years serving you in public office."

In District 3, encompassing the Stone Creek and Anatolia neighborhoods of Rancho Cordova, candidates include Brian Faulconer and Michael Yearwood.

Faulconer, a challenger and lifelong resident of Rancho Cordova, emphasized his belief that with a change in leadership, Cordova Recreation and Park District could set the gold standard.

"What was once an organization devoted to serving our community has become lost in the fog of inefficiency and mismanagement," Faulconer said. "Communities lack basic amenities and needs are going unmet."

Yearwood, the incumbent and a lifelong resident of Rancho Cordova, defended the progress made by Cordova Recreation and Park District.

"The district is in a lot better shape than people think it is," Yearwood stated, citing new parks and pools as evidence of positive developments. "The district is moving in the right direction. There is still more work to be done and projects we want to work on."

In District 4, encompassing La Riviera, Mather and Lincoln Village, candidates include Joshua Arnold and Rick Sloan.

Challenger Arnold pointed out issues with sports field maintenance and scheduling for local teams.

"Rancho Cordova citizens should have priority," Arnold said. "Deferred maintenance needs to be addressed along with the growth and implementation of new parks."

Sloan, the incumbent, highlighted three focus key areas: commitment, accountability and passion.

"I will ensure our parks and facilities remain safe, clean and up- to-date for our next generations," Sloan said. "District 4 deserves a strong passionate voice and as a long-time board member, I will be that voice."

For Assembly District 7, candidates

include Republican Assemblymember Josh Hoover and Democrat Porsche Middleton. Middleton, a current Citrus Heights

councilmember, emphasized her advocacy for legislation that directly supports local business communities. "Actions beat words," said Middleton.

"My focus is to create opportunities for all. Be the voice of reason, common sense and fairness for our district." Hoover outlined main focuses, includ-

ing lowering costs for families, making neighborhoods safer and holding bureaucracy accountable for tax dollar spendings. "We are failing in this state and we

desperately need change," Hoover said.
"We successfully passed the Phone Free
School act and are working hard to get
Proposition 36 across the finish line."

The Rancho Cordova Luncheon returns at 11:30 a.m. Nov. 15, featuring Erik Swanson Superintendent of the Folsom Cordova Unified School District, at Rancho Cordova City Hall, 2729 Prospect Park Drive. ★

Elementary and Cordova High School,

and partners with multiple school districts such as Folsom Cordova and Elk Grove Unified.

"Some triumphs can be as small as

staff instilling a new love for volleyball with the teens, or as big as seeing youth break out of their shell and make new friends." Said Key. "No matter the size of the success the staff is dedicated to be there to support the families that need us the most."

Safety remains a top priority at

Rancho Cordova Youth Center, with extensive staff training and background checks in place according to Jon Rango, chief operating officer at the Boys and Girls Club.

"We also engage a third-party auditor

to come in annually to conduct a safety assessment" Rango said. "They have mentioned that it is one of the safest clubs for youths that they have been to."

Lieutenant Richard Meredith of the Rancho Cordova Police Department underscored the importance of fostering positive connections with law enforcement, stating, "Our ability to connect with the youth and have that first experience with law enforcement be positive is something we really focus on here."

Concerns about transportation barriers affecting youth attendance were raised during the meeting. Winbrock highlighted the challenge of ensuring safe routes for youth to and from the center.

"When we have lower numbers in our centers it is usually because families are having a hard time getting there," said Key. "It would be interesting to pilot some sort of transportation to see how it impacts the number of attendees."

Suggestions for improving community engagement included feedback boxes and surveys to gather input from youths and their families about potential improvements.

"Surveying the neighborhoods that aren't making it to the center would be really smart to identify what those barriers are," said council member Donald Terry. "I also want to commend the staff. This was a huge step forward for our community to even have this facility and you are doing a great job."

NO on 2 Why we're against it

Proposition 2 is \$10 billion of bonds, new state debt, to pay for school facilities. It is almost certain to result in higher property tax bills, because school districts must provide a "local match" of funds in order to receive money from the Prop. 2 state bonds. That will lead to districts issuing new local school bonds, which are paid for by adding new charges to property tax bills. Enrollment is declining in both K-12 district schools and community colleges and the declines are projected to continue. But Proposition 2 commits California to pay an estimated \$18 billion, including interest, for school buildings that may not even be necessary. VOTE NO ON PROPOSITION 2.

Proposition 3 HJTA takes no position on this measure

Proposition 3 removes language from the state Constitution that defines marriage as between a man and woman. It adds the language, "right to marry is a fundamental right." This measure has no effect on the current law, because the U.S. Supreme Court held that the federal Constitution protects the right to marry.

NO on 4 Why we're against it

This is the \$10 billion "climate bond" that state politicians have long planned. California already has too much bond debt, over \$78 billion outstanding as of Jan. 1. Then \$6.38 billion was added with Proposition 1 in March. Proposition 4 would add another \$10 billion in bond debt to pay for climate "programs." It's reckless to use borrowed money, an estimated \$18 billion with interest, to pay for "programs,"

not stopped, property tax bills are likely to go up after every election, forever. Proposition 5 will raise the cost of living in California, which already has the highest poverty rate in the country when the cost of living is taken into account. VOTE NO ON PROPOSITION 5.

Why we're against it

Proposition 33 is a rent control measure that would lead to a reduction in the supply of rental housing. It repeals a sensible 1995 law, the Costa-Hawkins Rental Housing Act, which put limits on rent control laws to ensure that

Proposition 35 HJTA takes no position on this measure

California currently taxes managed care organizations (MCOs) such as Anthem Blue Cross and others. The MCO tax is set to expire in 2026, and we expect the Legislature to make it permanent. Proposition 35 would also make it permanent but would require the revenue from the tax to fund Medi-Cal, the government health insurance program for low-income residents, instead of being used to close gaps in the state budget. About 14 million California residents rely on the Medi-Cal program for their health care needs.

YES on 36 Why we're for it

Proposition 36 is the "Homelessness, Drug Addiction and Theft Reduction Act," backed by law enforcement groups and retailers. It makes thoughtful changes to Proposition 47 (2014), which reduced some theft and drug felonies to misdemeanors. California voters will have several very important decisions to make as they complete their November 2024 ballots. One that has the potential to reverse a decade of deterioration of the state's criminal justice system is Proposition 36.

To adequately analyze the merits of Proposition 36, a quick review of history is in order. Ten years ago, voters approved Proposition 47 based upon assurance that it would improve public safety. The voters were deceived - Proposition 47 eliminated compounding consequences for several theft and possession and use of dangerous drugs. Many crimes were reduced from felonies to misdemeanors, eliminating the deterrent value of discipline.

The results have been devastating for the state of California. Urban, suburban, and even rural areas once used for recreation have been taken over by critically addicted people living like walking zombies. Retail businesses have become so frequently victimized by "smash and grab" thieves that merchants have been forced to lock up much of their merchandise out of reach, inconveniencing legitimate costumers and staff. Fentanyl poisoning has become the leading cause of death for Americans 18-45-years-of-age. On average, over 200 deaths by fentanyl poisoning occur in the United States every

people were killed in a commercial airline crash every day – public outcry would be extreme and warranted; change would be mandated by an outraged public. Yet persons in positions of leadership seem

oblivious or apathetic to the plight of our youth.

Proposition 36 will restore the ability of the criminal justice system to impose compounding consequences on chronic habitual offenders for the sake of discouraging unacceptable behavior. Specifically,

offenders convicted not once, but twice of possession of hard and dangerous drugs will be eligible for felony prosecution or completion of a court-supervised treatment for addiction. This course of action was common before the passage of Proposition 47, when drug court was a viable option for those first charged with felony drug possession. The impetus for treatment is now gone by virtue of chronic drug offenders suffering through addiction and only being cited for misdemeanor violations of law. That means no time in cus-

Preseason games don't matter. No one cares about preseason games. Preseason games are just about getting the players in shape. Coaches and fans don't care about wins and losses in preseason games.

Wrong! Wrong! Wrong!

The truth is losing matters, and unfortunately it creates a tone and can be contagious.

Preseason games show teams what they have, and winning creates positive habits that more often and not carry over into the

So, if I'm right, what do Kings fans make of a zero-win preseason record?

You should be concerned, but not worried. There's a difference, so don't wring your hands just yet.

The good news is the Kings starters overall looked pretty good. In the first two preseason games against the Golden State Warriors, the Kings starters played the Warriors to a standstill for the first half

The starters did not participate in the second half of either game, and the Kings were forced to take a long look at their bench strength.

I'm not certain how deep coach Brown intends to go as it relates to bench players, but my guess with the recent signing of Doug McDermott, he will probably play 10 or even 11 players.

What we know is that due to injuries to Trey Lyles and Kevin Huerter, the Kings have yet to see a true picture of what their regular season bench will look like.

Both Lyles and Huerter are experienced NBA players, and both can have an immediate impact when they enter a game. Both are good passers, can drive effectively to the hoop and have a better than average three-point game.

What we also know is that Malik Monk is likely to be the first player off the bench, so when Lyles and Huerter return, we can see with some certainty who the first three off the bench will undoubtedly

Although in a pinch Lyles can play the five, it is more likely that veteran Alex Len will be called on to give Domantas Sabonis a blow every game, and at times in the preseason Len has been a bright spot. I have long believed that Len may have another level to his game, and I'm hopeful that if he sees consistent playing time, his game will demonstrate the kind of NBA confidence the Kings have longed for. Seven footers with skills are in short supply, so giving Len every opportunity to shine just makes lots of sense. At age 31 Len is still in his prime, and with every season he brings much needed veteran experience to the lineup and represents a rim protector when Sabonis is off the

So, with Huerter, Lyles, Monk, and Len coach Brown is nine deep, so who do the Kings have that could also make a

I would hope that the signing of Doug McDermott is not just ceremonial, so this veteran sharpshooter should be seeing 10 to 15 minutes nightly.

If last season proved anything to me it was that coach Brown is anything but predictable as it relates to his bench rotation, and I believe his frenetic experiments last year were a contributor to the Kings missing the first round of the playoffs.

Settling into a bench rotation builds confidence in players and gives the team an opportunity to gel. I'm crossing my fingers that any experiments have concluded in the preseason, and the regular season will bring a level on continuity that was missing last year.

Do I think the preseason matters? Of course I do. But I also know the Sacramento Kings have yet to lose a game in the regular season, and I believe in the players we have.

I hope you will all join me in applauding our gladiators as they step on the hardwood for the first time on Thursday night (Oct. 24) and open the regular season against the Minnesota Timberwolves.

The NBA schedulers did the Kings no favors as they will face the number one ranked defensive team in the NBA, but I say bring them on.

California Has Seen Too Many Debacles. **Prolonged School Closures May Be the Worst**

What truly sets California apart from other states is its sheer immensity.

While Alaska and Texas may be physically larger, in all other respects California towers above other states in population, ethnic diversity, cultural impact and economic power — the latter being equivalent to that of a major nation.

The corollary to California's outsized prominence, however, is that when its officialdom makes mistakes, they, too, are often gigantic embarrassments.

One that comes to mind is what happened three decades ago when a Republican governor, Pete Wilson, and a Legislature controlled by Democrats decided to completely overhaul the state's electrical utility system.

Officials called it "deregulation" and promised a new era of more abundant and less expensive power, but it was an ill-conceived mishmash that opened the door to manipulation by suppliers, forced one utility into bankruptcy, almost destroyed another, and increased consumers' costs.

There have been too many other California debacles.

For instance, when Oroville Dam was completed nearly six decades ago, California officials bragged about its being the nation's highest at 770 feet. However, in 2017 the earthfill dam's spillway was fully employed due to record amounts of snow runoff, revealing major flaws. As the concrete spillway collapsed, releases were shifted into an alternative spillway, but it was just dirt and rock and also began to

The dam was close to collapse, but while a complete catastrophe was averted, the incident revealed major lapses in the dam's design, construction and maintenance.

More recently, when the COVID-19 pandemic struck, businesses were forced to close, about 3 million workers lost their jobs and the **Employment Development** Department was overwhelmed by applications for unemployment insurance.

The chaos resulted in thousands of jobless workers not receiving the benefits to which they were entitled. thereby imposing financial distress on them and their families, while tens of billions of dollars were paid out to fraudsters.

The bullet train project is a looming candidate for the state's list of shameful failures. It's decades behind initial promises of completion, is costing many times the estimate when voters passed a \$9.95 billion bond issue in 2007 and lacks a viable financial plan.

That brings us to what may be California's worstever political policy decision: Closing the state's public schools for many months during COVID-19 and forcing nearly 6 million students to cope as best they

Those with affluent parents fared fairly well. They were more likely to work from home, so they could monitor internet instruction. Some pooled resources, hired teachers and created ad hoc schools.

Students from lower-income families had no such advantages. Their parents more likely had jobs that could not be done remotely, and were less likely to have internet service or their own computers.

The result, later academic testing revealed, was a widening of an already immense achievement gap between kids from poor families roughly 65% of the state's enrollment — and their more privileged peers.

Last week, the state Department of Education released results of the latest round of state achievement tests. Overall, there were fractional gains, but California's students are still behind where they were prior to the pandemic, and the achievement gap is fundamentally as wide as ever about 30 percentage points in English language and math.

Moreover, national achievement tests have shown that California's kids are well behind those in all but a handful of other states.

California's educational

achievement crisis is negatively impacting the futures of millions of kids and the state's economy. That would have been a far

more important topic for the nothingburger special legislative session that Gov. Gavin Newsom called on gas prices. Dan Walters is one of

Spooooooky

Little ghosts and goblins will be at your door to celebrate Halloween. It's all about dress-up and treats! But traditions go back a lot longer than you can imagine.

Halloween straddles fall and winter... plenty and paucity...life and death. It is a time of celebration and superstition. It's thought to have originated with the ancient Celtic festival of Samhain, when people would light bonfires fires and wear costumes to ward off roaming ghosts. Like they were so stupid

they wouldn't recognize you all decked out in some crazy getup? But I digress. The Celts, who lived some 2,000 years ago in the area that is now Ireland, the Unit-Kingdom, Northern and France, celebrated the New Year on No-

vember 1. This day marked the end of summer and the harvest, and the beginning of the dark, cold winter, a time of year that was often associated with human death. Celts believed that on the night before the New Year, the boundary between the worlds of the living and the dead became blurred. That's why on October 31, they celebrated Samhain. They thought these roaming ghosts would cause trouble and damage crops, that the presence of the other worldly spirits made it easier for the Druids, or Celtic priests, to make predictions about the future. These prophecies were an important source of comfort and direction during the long, dark winter.

When Halloween came to America, it was extremely limited in colonial England because of the rigid Protestants. Merging different ethnic groups and Native Americans gave America a distinct version of Halloween. The first celebrations included "play parties," public events held to celebrate the harvest, where neighbors would share stories of the dead, tell each other's fortunes, dance, and sing. Colonial Halloween festivities also included the telling of ghost stories and mischief making of all kinds. In the second half of the 19th century, America was flooded with new immigrants, millions of Irish

fleeing Ireland's potato famine of 1846. That helped to popularize the celebration of Halloween nationally. Taking from Irish and English traditions, Americans began to dress up in costumes and go house to house ask-

ing for food money. The "trick or treat" tradition was born. Young women believed that they could divine the name or appearance of their future husband tricks doing with yarn, ap-

ple parings or mirrors. By the late 1800s, there was a move to mold Halloween into a holiday more about community and neighborly fun than about ghosts, pranks, and witchcraft.

Today's Halloween traditions may even dates back to the early All Soul's Day parades in England. During the festivities, poor citizens would beg for food and families would give them pastries called "soul cakes" in return for their promise to pray for the family's dead relatives. The soul cake was encouraged by the church as a way to replace the ancient practice of leaving wine and food for roaming spirits.

So go the stories I gathered from history.com. They will all come-a-calling on with their funny costumes and the call of "trick or treat." My choice...Chocolate please!

The project proposes the new construction of a 70-unit affordable housing complex for senior veterans aged 55+ experiencing homelessness, comprised of 58 one-bedroom units and 12 two-bedroom units. The common areas and amenities include a 3,500 square foot community building and an outdoor open courtyard. The project would also construct 45 onsite uncovered spaces that would include ADA and electric vehicle spaces. The project is requesting \$30,950,195 (over a 20-year contract) in Project Based VASH Vouchers and \$1,000,000 in CPF funds. The total estimated project cost including HUD and non-HUD funds is approximately \$43,879,875.

The Board of Directors ("Board") of the California Municipal Finance Authority is considering

the formation of a community facilities district (the "CFD") under the authority of the Mello-Roos Community Facilities Act of 1982, as amended, to fund certain public facilities related to new development within the City of Rancho Cordova, and to incur bonded indebtedness of the CFD. This Notice contains a brief summary of the proposal, but you are referred to the Board's Resolution of Intention (Resolution No. 24-415, adopted October 11, 2024) and its Resolution of Intention to Incur Bonded Indebtedness (Resolution No. 24-417, adopted October 11, 2024) for details of the proposal. The proposal is to subject the property within the CFD to a special tax which will be used to pay for authorized facilities for the CFD, including paying principal and interest on bonds used to pay for authorized facilities. The proceeds of the bonds will be used to pay for the facilities and other expenses set forth in the resolutions referred to above. A map showing the land proposed to be included in the CFD is on file with the Board.

As set forth below, the Board will hold a public hearing on the establishment of the CFD, the facilities to be financed by the CFD, and the levy of the special tax within the CFD. The proposal also includes authority to issue up to \$5,100,000 in bonds for the CFD, to be repaid by the special tax levied in the CFD. Neither the Board nor any person outside the CFD has any liability for the special tax or the bonds. The security for the bonds issued for the CFD is limited to the property subject to the special tax within the CFD. In order to confer the authority upon the Board to levy the special tax and to issue the bonds, a public hearing must be held on the proposal, then the Board will decide whether to form the CFD, and finally the qualified electors within the CFD must approve the proposal by a two-thirds vote. Where the CFD is uninhabited (as is the case here) the qualified electors are, pursuant to law, the owners of property within the CFD.

This is the notice of the public hearing. The public hearing will be held during the Board meeting

on Friday, November 22, 2024, at the hour of 11:00 a.m. or as soon as possible thereafter, at City Hall, 200 S. Anaheim Blvd., Public Works South Conference Room, 2nd Floor, Anaheim, California 92805. At the hearing, the testimony of all interested persons or potential special taxpayers for or against the formation of the CFD, the authorization to levy the special tax within the CFD, and the authorization to issue the bonds for the will be heard. If written protests against the proposed CFD are delivered to the Board at or before the time set for the hearing by either registered voters residing within, or the owners of property within, the proposed CFD, they will be counted toward a possible majority protest. Such protests by a majority of the registered voters residing within the CFD or by the owners of a majority of the land area within the CFD which is or will be subject to the special tax, if not withdrawn prior to the close of the hearing so as to reduce the value of the protests to less than a majority, will require the proposed CFD to be eliminated from immediate consideration, and prevent its being included in a subsequent proceedings for at least one year. If the Board, after the public hearing, determines that a majority protest under Section 53324 of the California Government Code was not made at the hearing, the Board may conduct an election by mailed ballot to levy a special tax within the CFD.







RANCHO CORDOVA, CA (MPG) - The Cordova Lancers honored their seniors on the field prior to their final home game of the season last Friday, Oct. 18, inside Lancers Stadium in what was a nice display of recognition for all their hard work. That was the only celebrating the team would do on the night however, as they were dealt a 0-49 loss to visiting Destiny Christian Academy.

The Lancers (5-3 overall, 2-3 Metro League) never got going offensively in this one, tallying just 118 yards of total offense. The Lions (5-3 overall, 2-2 Metro League) meanwhile, were

clicking on all cylinders as they put up 28 first half points mostly by the arm of senior quarter-back Dallas Munn, who tossed three first half touchdowns. The Lions would add three rushing scores in the second half to put the game on ice.

"We had a lot of crucial mistakes at the wrong time," Lancers head coach JP Dolliver said following the loss. "I thought we protected the ball much better, but the penalties at the wrong time really hurt us. We didn't sustain our blocking long enough like we normally do. There's a different physicality that exists in the Metro (League) than the Greater Sacramento League, and

we just have to get used to playing that week after week. We're not going to get any reprieve from it, it's just going to keep coming."

Dolliver was also asked if he was disappointed by the big loss on a night that was supposed to be special for his senior players on the team. True to form, Dolliver offered a glimpse at the bigger picture.

"I'm not disappointed,"
Dolliver said. "You have to be able to compartmentalize what's going on. Yes, it's senior night.
Would I have put senior night on against Destiny? Maybe not.
I told these guys after the game that we have a chance to get to

six wins next week. If we can get to six wins, that puts us in a spot where we haven't been for a long time, and that's something the seniors helped us do."

Sophomore quarterback Trey Wallace was 5-of-14 passing for 49 yards. On the ground, sophomore tailback Zachary Mcintire led the Lancers with 11 carries for 49 yards. Junior wide receiver Damaje Moses tallied a team-high three receptions for 26 yards to round out the offensive output on the night. For Destiny Christian Academy, Munn totaled 232 yards on 15-of-22 passing and his three touchdowns. Junior wide receiver Greyson Smith recorded

seven receptions for 103 yards and a score.

The Lancers are scheduled to go on the road this Friday, Oct. 25 to face Elite Public, a charter school in Vallejo California, in a late season non-league contest. Kickoff is set for 7 p.m. after press time.

"Elite is a really big game for us," Dolliver said. "We have to win that one to move forward. I don't want our guys to take it lightly because they've been beating a lot of teams. They are a smaller school; they're going to have some speed I'm sure. I think they're a very comparable team athletically, and I think we can beat those guys."

Lady Lancers Split Season Series with Kennedy

RANCHO CORDOVA, CA (MPG) - The Cordova Lady Lancers were dealt a 21-33 defeat at the hands of the Kennedy Lady Cougars on Tuesday, Oct. 15, inside Lancers Stadium, in a game that proved to be a microcosm of how their season has gone.

The Lady Lancers (6-17 overall, 2-6 Metro League) would score on their first play from scrimmage as sophomore quarterback Becca Lee tossed a shovel pass to junior running back Kaylee Mitchell, who then took it 60 yards to the endzone. That would be the lone first half highlight for Cordova, as the Lady Cougars (4-10 overall, 1-7 Metro League) would score 12 unanswered points to take a 6-12 halftime lead.

Kennedy would score on their first possession of the second half, extending their lead to double digits at 6-19. Cordova would turn the ball over on downs on their next possession, but that turned out to give the Lady Lancers the spark they needed. The Lady Cougars would surrender a safety after a bad snap went into the endzone, cutting the Lady Lancers' deficit to 8-19. From there, junior Taliyah Johnson put her team on her back as she zig-zagged 52 yards for a touchdown

on Cordova's next possession, cutting the

Kennedy lead to five.

The two teams would trade touchdown scores on ensuing drives, with Cordova trailing 21-25 with just 30 seconds remaining and a chance to get the ball back due to having all their timeouts remaining to stop the clock. But Kennedy junior quarterback Nielah Cornelius had other plans as she broke off a 60-yard touchdown run to put the game on ice.

After the game, Lady Lancers head coach Garrett Roth was clearly disappointed with

the outcome.

"To an extent," Roth said when asked if he was proud of the way his team clawed their way back into the game late. "We've had a rough season, and it seems like a common theme of being down at halftime and now there's no other option. It needs to start earlier than that. So sure, I'm proud of their effort there but I'm over moral victories."

On the night, Lee would go six-for-16 passing for 89 yards and two touchdowns to lead Cordova. On the ground, Johnson's late-game heroics ultimately earned her an eight-carry, 131-yard stat line to go along with her scoring jaunt.

Roth, who was visibly frustrated after the game, voiced his frustrations with how things have gone for Cordova this season. "Seems like there's some problems we can't figure out how to solve," Lady Lancers head coach Garrett Roth said. "I don't know if it's effort, intensity, winners' mentality...No disrespect to Kennedy but I don't think they are the caliber of team that should be beating us. Pretty disappointed with the all-around effort."

It wasn't all bad news for Cordova on the night, however. Roth revealed that he has accepted the head coaching position at Ferrum College in Ferrum Virginia, to coach Division II flag football, and has given an official offer to the team member Kaylee Mitchell to play for him at the collegiate level after she graduates with the Class

Cordova is scheduled to wrap up their season with home games this week against Antelope and West Park, after press time. ★

The Capital SouthEast Connector: A Lifeline for Public Safety and Emergency Response

Imagine driving on a partially flooded roadway, where last year, drivers in southern Sacramento County experienced this life-threatening situation firsthand as floodwaters engulfed their cars. Or fleeing a fast- moving wildfire, as hundreds of others did, bottlenecked on narrow two-lane roads with little to no shoulders, while emergency responders struggled to reach them.

These scenarios are not hypothetical. They continue to occur in southern Sacramento County, where existing roads designed decades ago for far fewer residents-now represent a clear danger. Last year,

Sacramento Metro Fire reported performing over 30 flood rescues along area roads due to poorly designed drainage systems.

When fully built,



the Capital SouthEast Connector will solve those problems in southern Sacramento County. This modern roadway will connect I-5 and Hwy 99 near Elk Grove to Hwy 50 in Folsom and the El Dorado Hills, providing a safer and more reliable transportation network.

As our region faces the dual dangers of summer wildfires and winter storm flooding, the importance of this project becomes even more evident. Roadways play a huge role in the safety and well-being of our community. The Connector is designed to ease traffic congestion while forming part of a resilient transportation network that protects lives, enables emergency responses, and ensures safe evacuations during disasters.

Sheriff Jim Cooper emphasized the critical need for quicker response times in emergencies: "It's a safety issue for our motoring public and also for your first responders. We've got to get there to service those people, and those minutes are critical. Time is of the essence."

Sacramento Metropolitan Fire District Assistant Chief John Rudnicki echoed this concern, noting the importance of the Connector's Grant Line Road improvements: "When we look at the number of fatalities and incidents that have affected this roadway, we can clearly see why it is so crucial to make this improvement an engineered solution to prevent future problems."

Every second counts in an emergency. Whether it is a medical crisis, a fire, or a flood, first responders need reliable, safe, and efficient routes to reach people in need. The Capital SouthEast Connector will be a crucial thoroughfare for emergency vehicles, reducing response times and ensuring that help arrives as quickly as possible.

Beyond day-today emergencies, the Connector will play a pivotal role in regional emergency preparedness. During disasters like wild-

fires, its wide lanes and

better access will allow

for smoother evacuations and faster movement of emergency personnel and heavy equipment. Rudnicki recalled the devastating Camp Fire in Paradise, where poor road access severely hindered evacuation efforts. "On a roadway, we're worried about the smoke, we're worried about the shoulder. How do you turn your vehicle around if the road is narrowing from four lanes down to two and there's nowhere to go?" he asked.

Winter brings its own set of challenges, with flooding posing a significant danger to residents and first responders in southern Sacramento County. As Cooper noted, drivers often misjudge the depth of floodwaters or fail to see warning signs, trapping themselves in dangerous situations. The Connector's design will address these issues with improved drainage systems and clearer signage, ensuring that emergency vehicles can navigate the region safely, regardless of weather conditions.

This project has been a long time coming, but it is now gaining real momentum thanks to recent federal support. "It's been going on for a long time... trickle here, trickle there, and never a lot of money,"

Cooper reflected, adding, "Finally, we get a lot of money." This muchneeded funding will allow us to address the most dangerous stretches of road and create a safer, more resilient network for

The Capital SouthEast Connector is not just a transportation project; it is a lifeline for our community. By building a roadway that can withstand the challenges of flooding and wildfires, we are ensuring that our residents remain safe and connected—no matter what challenges lie ahead.

QWhat is the Capital SouthEast Connector Expressway?

A The planned Connector is an expressway that will link Interstate 5 and Highway 99 near Elk Grove to Highway 50 in El Dorado County. The new expressway will relieve congestion by directing commuter and commercial traffic around the city on a safe expressway. Travelers to and from areas south of Sacramento will no longer need to go through the city to get to their destinations. The Capital SouthEast Connector Expressway also features a parallel bike and pedestrian

Who will benefit from the SouthEast Connector Expressway when completed?

A The entire region will benefit from reduced congestion on area highways, particularly Hwy 50, and from fewer toxic fumes spewing from thousands of vehicles stuck in traffic. Southeastern Sacramento County residents will have a safe new route to avoid Hwy 50 congestion and bypass downtown traffic. Businesses, companies, farmers, and ranchers will also be able to receive supplies and send products to market

more safely and quickly. Most importantly, the modernized roadway will be safe to travel, unlike current conditions that endanger lives.

Who approved building the SouthEast Connector Expressway?

In 2004, by a 3-1 margin, A In 2004, by a 2 themselves for 30 years for transportation maintenance road improvements, mass transit, mobility for seniors and people with disabilities, and specifically to construct a new expressway connecting I-5 and Hwy 99 in the Elk Grove area to Hwy 50 in El Dorado County, now known as the Capital SouthEast Connector. Since the vote, the tax has generated about \$2 billion. To date, the Capital SouthEast Connector has received about \$58 million of those funds, which were paired with federal and state funds to complete 11 miles of the 34-mile project.


QWhere have the transportation tax funds not allocated to the Capital SouthEast Connector been used?

A The transportation sales tax funds are allocated according to a formula voters approved when they approved the tax. The largest single

recipient of the funds since the tax began is the Regional Transit Authority (38%, amounting to \$709 million) for operating and maintaining light rail and bus services; and providing transportation options to seniors and individuals with disabilities. Street and road maintenance projects have received 29.4%, amounting to \$545.5 million. Overall, capital improvement projects have received 20.4%, amounting to \$377.4 million. The rest of the funds went to smaller projects, and less than 34 of one percent is spent on program administration.

What has the Sacramento QArea Council of Governments' role been in the Capital SouthEast Connector's construction.

The Capital SouthEast **A**Connector is part of the "Sacramento Blueprint," adopted over 20 years ago by SACOG's board of directors and still consulted today. The Blueprint's goal is to integrate land use and transportation planning to improve the region's quality of life. It was SACOG's idea to create the Capital SouthEast Connector Joint Powers Authority to manage the design and construction of the expressway. Over the years, SACOG

has been mostly supportive of efforts to advance the project, but in 2016 the organization decided to remove a portion of the Connector in its MTP update, introducing notable funding challenges for the project. More recently, SACOG determined that constructing a segment of the project was the region's number one transportation priority, greatly enhancing a successful project application for federal funding.

What environmental Uimpacts will the South-**East Connector Expressway** create, and how will they be mitigated?

Like any road project, Athe Capital SouthEast Connector will affect the environment during and after construction, but all federal, state, and local regulations to protect the environment are being followed. After construction, the environment will be greatly enhanced due to a design that controls and channels damaging groundwater that currently floods the roadway and adjacent lands. The Connector Joint Powers Authority is a member of the South Sacramento Conservation Agency (SCCA) that oversees compliance with the South Sacramento Habitat Conservation Plan and its rules for road construction.

to purchase lands to replace impacted agricultural land or vernal pools in accordance with the conservation plan's vision.

QHow will the Capital SouthEast Connector affect bike and pedestrian traffic in the area?


A Bicyclists and pedestrians who currently face grave danger will be able to avoid traffic entirely by using a paved, Class 1 bike trail that will be built separate from the expressway along its entire length. The bike trail is designed to enable residents to walk or ride their bikes to visit friends in neighboring communities; or peddle to work, local restaurants, stores, parks, and entertainment venues; or simply to exercise and enjoy the outdoors.
