

GALT, CA (MPG) - Galt Cemetery came alive on Oct. 26 with its annual celebration of Día de los Muertos, aka Day of the Dead.

Originating in Mexico as a festive remembrance of deceased loved ones, the event showcased performances of Mexican folk dances, Aztec blessings, mariachi music and a car show.

Attendees with loved ones buried at the cemetery built ofrendas, or altars, at their graves. Traditional decorations for an ofrenda include pictures of the person being remembered and foods that they enjoyed in life, along with marigolds and sugar skulls called calaveras. Guests placed pictures and other offerings on a community altar nestled under a tree.

The day began with a celebration of Mass; Galt-Arno Cemetery District Director Belinda Ellis said the service attracted more than 200 people. She was "thrilled" with the day's turnout.

General **Election's 18 Vote Centers** Open

SACRAMENTO COUNTY, CA (MPG) - Vote Centers in 18 convenient locations throughout Sacramento County opened Oct. 26 for the Nov. 5 Presidential General Election.

At a Vote Center, any Sacramento County resident can register to vote, request a replacement ballot, vote their ballot in person or use the assistive ballot-marking device. Operation times vary prior to Election Day, so check the times and location details carefully.

Voters wishing to return their mail ballot still have time to use a Ballot Drop Box. Visit the Ballot Drop Box page on the county website at elections.saccounty.gov under the How To Vote dropdown menu for more information on locations and times.

Each Ballot Drop Box location has specific hours of operation. Those preferring to mail their ballot can use their pink postage-paid envelope that came with their ballot. Mailed ballots must be postmarked on or before Election Day and received by 5 p.m. on Tuesday, Nov. 12. Voters must sign their ballot envelope for their ballot to be counted. GALT, CA (MPG) - The Galt City Council candidates spoke with city residents about their goals should they be elected, during an Oct. 23 town hall. Hosted by Galt District Chamber of Commerce at Back Alley Brewhouse, the three campaigners addressed topics from homelessness to government

transparency and Galt's community identity. Election Day is Nov. 5.

The City Council hopefuls are Tim Reed, Mathew Pratton and Bonnie Rodriguez. Two seats are open. During the forum, audience members came forward with questions and the candidates took turns responding.

Homelessness

Answering what he

would do about homelessness, Reed, who is Disaster Services Medical Division chief for the California Emergency Medical Services Authority, referred to his experience as a paramedic. Reed said he transported homeless people to the hospital every day.

"A majority of your homeless population want to be homeless. They don't want to be part of society,"

Reed said, continuing, "The thing that we've got to do is to initially address the ones that want help. There are a percentage out there that are just homeless because stuff happens."

He said the city needs to connect homeless people with services available through Sacramento County.

Pratton said Galt "doesn't have as big a Continued on Page 7

the performance stage was moved to the north side of the cemetery, ensuring that the acts had full lighting for much of the day.

Two ballet folklórico groups, Raíces Mexicanas and Nostalgias de México, performed traditional dances from different states across Mexico and many performers wore calavera face paint with their ornate dresses.

At the car show, a group of participants turned their '60s Chevrolet Impalas into ofrendas, honoring family members and friends buried in the cemetery.

The Yolotl Tonantzin Aztec dancers visited the personal ofrendas arrayed around the cemetery, performing a blessing over each one, before they held a ceremony at the community ofrenda.

Arturo Arroyo of Yolotl Tonantzin said the dances and ceremonial elements such as incense are "offerings for those who have left the Earth."

Arroyo added that the dances strengthen the community and remind people to think about those who have died, who he said are

"here all the time, not only one day."

Arroyo was grateful that his group is always invited to Galt's Day of the Dead celebration.

Sonia Leon was accompanied by her family in commemorating her son, Julio. They decorated the altar set up over his grave with flowers, candles and food.

Leon said she and her family have made Day of the Dead a tradition every year since Julio died in 2014 to "celebrate life for him."

"He was a wonderful kid. He was always very joyful, loveable," Leon

At another part of the cemetery, an ofrenda honored several Aguilar family members.

Gerard Aguilar said the relatives buried there include his brother, one of his sons and several others. Asked why he celebrates, Aguilar said the holiday allows participants to "keep that established connection with" deceased loves ones but, he said, "this is not the main point" of Día de los Muertos.

"This may be my

romantic answer but for (those who have died), for everybody here, I think they'd love their (living relatives) to come out, and everybody's rejoicing, celebrating, that they're not forgotten, they haven't forgotten us."

Is there panic in Sactown? Angry fans? How about just plain dismay?

My response would be no one should panic two games into the regular season.

Do you have the right to be angry? Of course you do, but dismay is probably better and it's a practical emotion when you consider that the hometown ballers lost every preseason game and have now opened the season with a dismal 0-2 record.

More puzzling than the zero-win Kings, however, is trying to figure out what is going through the mind of former coach of the year Mike Brown.

After losing to the Timberwolves in a game that, by my estimation, the Kings should have won, coach Brown relegated his protégé Keon Ellis to the end of the bench. Arguably the Kings best defender sat out the entire game with no explanation from the head coach.

While the Lakers ran off 21 unanswered points to start the fourth quarter, and the Kings allowed Lebron James to literally take over the game by himself, defensive standout Keon Ellis cooled his heels and watched Lebron show the Kings how to shoot 3-point baskets.

From a fans perspective it was hard to watch, but by all accounts, the game was ostensibly over. But no, the Sactown boys came roaring back to make the game a dogfight, and with less than a minute remaining, Sacramento needed only a stop, and a 2-point shot to tie the score.

Sadly, as in the Minnesota game, this one would slip away too, but the question remains, why was Keon Ellis conspicuously absent when defense was so sorely needed.

After being awarded coach of the year two seasons ago, Mike Brown had arguably one of his worst coaching performances last season, as the Kings were eliminated in the play-in series.

What contributed to the abrupt ending was in large part the frenetic way coach Brown managed his bench all season.

Previously much heralded Davion Mitchell never received consistent minutes off the bench, and like Keon Ellis just discovered, was listed as did-not-play (DNP) in the box score too many times.

This should be perplexing for any fan,

but in fairness to coach Brown, I simply want to hear from him the reasoning behind these moves.

Surely there is a cogent reason for starting Keon Ellis in the first game of the season, and then putting him on the bench for the entire game against the Lakers.

It was obvious the Kings had no answer for defending Lebron James, so why not let Mr. defense Keon Ellis have a try?

In the past I have given coach Brown a lot of credit for bringing Ellis along, and certainly taking a player from the G league to starting on an NBA squad is worthy of praise.

But please answer the question. Why is Keon out, completelv!

This is exactly what happened to fan favorite Davion Mitchell, and now he plays for another NBA team.

I don't expect coach Brown to reveal every element of his coaching strategy, but lineup changes make for obvious questions.

At the end of the day, the fans are poised to forgive it all for a win Monday night over the Portland Trail Blazers.

As I said before, this is not the time to panic, but it is time for the coaching team to make some practical decisions, which should include playing the best players we have.

Inserting newcomer Doug McDermott into the Minnesota game to start the fourth quarter was a real head scratcher, and although like most Kings fans, I'm curious to see what he can do, bringing in a new player in the heat of the fourth quarter seemed questionable at best.

I would love to see McDermott get some minutes off the bench but getting him some playing time earlier in the game seems like a more practical approach, so let's keep our fingers crossed that we'll see Doug on the hardwood sometime soon.

King's fans let's bring our A game to the arena Monday night (after press time) and root our gladiators onto their first win of the season. Positivity is the name of the game, so let's enjoy this one together!

Tell me, did you have a frightening Halloween? Were you visited by a slew of goblins and ghosts?

If you thought that day was frightening, brace yourselves for the election next Tuesday. A good many of us are absolutely terrified who might win. I'll admit, I'm scared, too.

Fortunately, I found some clarity about our elected power in an incident recorded in the eleventh chapter of Mark's Gospel, v. 31 and following.

In the account, you read that Jesus leads his parade of followers toward Jerusalem, when he decides to share with them a prediction of absolute terror.

Jesus prophesizes, he's about to be mocked, flogged and killed. And three days later he will rise.

What follows is a request from two

of his main men, James and John. The request seems to be the perfect example of a non sequitur speech – a conclusion or statement that does not logically follow from the previous argument or statement.

James and John interrupt Jesus' ghoulish talk with, "Can we get a seat in your Kingdom cabinet, one on the left of you and the other on the right?"

These guys are all about me. Me. Me. Can't it be me in power with you?

Jesus is like, sure, you'll get a piece of this, too. For following me, you'll be "drinking out of the same cup."

Jesus wasn't talking about happy hour here. He was saying, following me has a cost you might not want to pay.

But here's where Jesus speaks the truth to James and John as they seem to seek the power then being held by only the influential rulers and religious leaders.

Jesus gets in his disciples' faces and tells them. "You've observed how godless rulers throw their weight around," he said, "and when people get a little power how quickly it goes to their heads."

He points out that Christ-followers have to be different. "It can't be the same with you. Whoever wants to be great must become a servant.

"That's what I've done," he explains, "I came to serve, not to be served."

Power is not the model we follow. Instead, Jesus is showing we wield ultimate power only when we set ourselves aside.

We employ true power by serving. But if we serve only to climb a ladder, we will fall. We must serve only for the sake of service — even to the point of giving our lives away.

Jesus was patient with James and John in their misguided search for power. And as one who sometimes follows the fame, I count his patience as good news for me. I just might have a chance as well.

So, if you count yourself as a servant this election day, let your ballot fall silently into the ballot box and return to service. And, I must point out, if you're voting to bring Jesus into power, he doesn't want that power. If all we seek in this election is a shortcut to Christian power, we only do damage to ourselves or those around us.

The winners this election year will be the ones who serve. Not the ones who demand they be served.

That's not how Christians roll. We don't roll with power; we roll with Jesus.

problem as some of the other communities because we're smaller," adding that many of the city's homeless residents have local connections.

"I know the council that's in there now, and I believe the next council. will continue to focus on this issue. And if we focus on the issue, I think we'll make it better. Can we eliminate it? I doubt it. But if it's criminal activity, we need to make sure we make the phone calls and push the issues and hopefully get them the resources they need," Pratton said.

Said Rodriguez, noting complaints from business owners and from homeowners near Dry Creek and the county line, "I don't have a quick answer."

"I think, as a community, there are some creative things that are out there," Rodriguez said, "and instead of what's been happening on Facebook and social media, people are getting almost (vigilante justice), instead of that, we might need to look at some creative ideas where maybe the business owners and other volunteers, we make relationships with these homeless."

Rodriguez suggested creating agreements where homeless people are allowed space at night with nondisruptive behavior and are expected to "clear the way" during the day.

Transparency

Asked how to make Galt government more transparent, Rodriguez said the current City Council and city leadership are "so much better" on transparency than their predecessors.

As a point of improve-Rodriguez ment, highlighted the relationship of City Council with the city's commissions and

committees. Rodriguez serves on the Planning Commission.

"I want to make sure that those citizens who are serving on these commissions are able and feel like they can come to council anytime and say, 'Here's an issue that we just saw before us. Here's our recommendation' or 'Here's my concern' and it shouldn't have to be filtered through staff," Rodriguez said.

Pratton, a former Planning Commissioner, promised to improve his own transparency. Pratton said he comes to public meetings having already thought the items through and hasn't "always been the best at communicating out to the public."

Pratton said many Galt residents don't know about major city decisions until they are implemented, pointing to complaints over road closures for the C Street Enhancements Project.

"I feel that is my job, the transparency piece. I've always pushed it," Pratton said. "Absolutely, not just at my level but the directors and everybody else do need to get more communication and that's always an issue."

Reed, who chairs the Public Safety Committee, said he gives City Council regular updates on the committee's actions. For more transparency, Reed highlighted the city's finances.

"We've got to figure out the transparency for the money because I've had a lot of people come to me and go, 'Well, I can't really figure out where this money's going," Reed said.

The city's budget documents need to be structured so regular Galt residents can understand where the city's money comes from and how it is being spent,

Reed said.

Galt's Identity

A forum attendee recalled defunct festivals from Galt's past, asking, "What are we going to do for an identity in Galt when there's nothing here anymore for people to say, 'That's where I'm from'?"

Rodriguez said the chamber and City Council have been trying to address that question.

"This is something that needs to be answered because we do need to have an identity," Rodriguez said, continuing that several festivals stopped because they were expensive to run and had difficulty finding volunteers.

"We need to engage our community so we can have more," Rodriguez said. She cited the chamber's Old Galt Festival as an example of progress.

Reed agreed with Rodriguez's assessment, comparing the city to a teenager figuring out who they are. Reed called for collaboration between City Council, city commissions, the chamber and community organizations.

"We all come together to figure out what do we want Galt to be," Reed said. "And it's going to take everybody to come together. It's going to take a group effort, so we've got to figure out how to get those types of groups together. And maybe it is another committee that we form to try to figure this out."

Galt's identity "continually changes and it's an issue," Pratton said. Pratton said volunteers have become harder to find as the city grows and private businesses are taking a larger role.

"It is one of the pluses of growing, is hopefully we can have more things available and more things going on. To me the identity ... it's turning more toward this business. Back Allev Brewhouse, and the events that they put on, so a lot of our newer businesses have been very active," Pratton said.

Tasty Calzones or Versatile Vinegar? Today's a Twofer

According to the National Today website, there's a lot to love about calzones - and very little to dislike about them. That's why those of us who love to celebrate today, National Calzone Day, are going to stuff a calzone with our favorite pizza toppings and then stuff ourselves with the results.

Of course, since a calzone is actually a folded pizza, those toppings are not really toppings so much as stuffings. Anyway, stuffing is the key — and stuffed I will be today. Join me on this most tasty of celebrations for some honest-to-goodness goodness.

In the 1700s, Calzones were invented in Naples, Italy, supposedly as a way to serve people a pizza they could walk around with. In 1933, the first documented use of the word "calzone" referred to "a baked or fried turnover of pizza dough stuffed with various fillings."

Calzones have become widely popular in recent years, perhaps due to the



influence of television shows such as "Seinfeld" and "Parks and Recreation," both of which have featured story lines about calzones.

However, if you have lived in Galt for a very long time — let's say since the 1970s — you would know about calzones. like only yesterday.

I have another Nov. 1 celebration. Happy National Vinegar Day! Now you may be asking what does vinegar have to do with calzones? Nothing, nada, no connection whatsoever. I just like to eat calzones, and I use vinegar almost every day. Vinegar is the result of the natural fermentation process that creates wine when it is left unchecked or deliberately allowed to proceed. Otherwise, it is the fluid left after something rots. Under controlled conditions, that is.

I use white vinegar in the laundry to get rid of odors — like wet, mildewy smelling towels left out too long. Ugh! It works great to wash windows, remove stains and odors from carpets and — here's a crucial one — release tangles out of matted hair. I like to dip slices of fresh crusty French bread in balsamic vinegar or other flavored vinegars mixed with olive oil for a yummy snack. And I love malt vinegar on my fish and chips. Yum! Vinegar is very versatile; you just need to experiment with it to find out what you like or how to use it.

Daylight saving time ends this weekend. Turn your clocks back by one hour on Saturday night, and you will get one hour of extra sleep on Sunday morning. That is quite a deal except for the animals that wake you up because they are used to being fed at their biological time every day. We voted to be rid of daylight saving time years ago, but like a bad penny it is still showing up.

Veterans Day is in 10 days, on Nov. 11. True, it is a three-day weekend but let us remember why we celebrate the 11th hour of the 11th day of the 11th month. This holiday started as a day to reflect upon the heroism of those who died in our country's service and was originally called Armistice Day. It is the anniversary of the signing of the armistice that ended World War I. However, in 1954, the holiday was changed to "Veterans Day" in order to account for all veterans in all wars.

Thanksgiving, Nov. 28, is sneaking up on us. So, while polishing the silver, have your to-do list, shopping list and prep list at hand, and start writing.


