ELK GROVE, CA (MPG) - Elk Grove Community Concert Band gave a moving performance on Oct. 28 at Joseph Kerr Middle School, with a program based on various kinds of travel or movement.

## Certifying Election **Can Take** 28 Days

### **County Issues** Twice-Weekly **Ballot Reports**

CALIFORNIA (MPG) - Due to the requirements outlined in Assembly Bill 3184, the Nov. 5 General Election results cannot be certified in California until Dec. 3, at the earliest. AB 3184 establishes specific timelines and procedures for certifying election results in California.

Certification for the Nov. 5 general election is expected to be completed Dec. 3.

While the first release of results happened just after 8 p.m. Nov. 5 (Election Day), those results are in no way final.

The county Elections Office has been tabulating ballots since two weeks ago and the first release of results will only be inclusive of Vote by Mail and Vote Center ballots that are returned and processed through Nov. 4.

The second report includes results from the Vote Centers on Election Day and is issued shortly after 10 p.m. Nov. 5, after press time, with subsequent updates approximately every two hours, if needed, until all Vote Centers have reported.

California allows for 28 days after elections to certify the election, in addition to seven days after Election Day to receive a mail ballot postmarked by Nov. 5.

The second report on Nov. 5 will include results from the Vote Centers on Election Day and will be issued by 10 p.m., with subsequent updates approximately every two hours, if needed, until all Vote Centers have reported (Elections Code 15151(b)).

The first interim report will be posted by 4:15 p.m. on Nov. 8 and will contain results from Vote by Mail ballots and provisional ballots received timely.

Subsequent reports will be updated every Tuesday and Friday until certification is complete, which is expected to be Dec. 3.

The Election Results Schedule is provided pursuant to Elections Code 15306(a)((3). For more informa-

## **FPPC Fines Shawn Farmer** for Conflict of Interest

GALT, CA (MPG) - The state's political ethics watchdog has fined Galt City Councilmember Shawn Farmer \$3,000 for violating conflict-of-interest rules early in his City Council tenure.

Filed in March this year, the decision by the Fair Political Practices Commission (FPPC) said that, in 2019, Farmer improperly voted on a sale of city land near his own

property. Farmer criticized the size of the

## Tuleyome Offers Certified California Naturalist Course

WOODLAND, CA (MPG) - Tuleyome, the expert organization on the Berryessa Snow Mountain National Monument, is offering a Certified California Naturalist course in early 2025. Instruction focuses on the Berryessa Snow Mountain National Monument region while providing participants with skills and resources that are applicable anywhere to increase their knowledge, understanding and enjoyment of the natural world.

The Certified California Naturalist course is presented by Tuleyome in partnership with the University of California extension program. This 10-week course is offered from January to March 2025, with classes occurring on 10 consecutive Fridays plus at least three field trips. Friday classes will be held at the UC Davis campus.

No advanced degrees or previous naturalist



participants are introduced to different ways to measure ecosystem health.

experience is required.

The UC California Naturalist Program introduces Californians to the wonders of our unique ecology and engages the public in study and stewardship of California's natural communities. The program uses a science curriculum, hands-on learning, problem-solving, citizen science and community service to instill a deep appreciation for the natural communities of the state and to inspire individuals to become stewards of their local resources.

In addition to in-person instruction, students are required to attend field trips in the Berryessa Snow Mountain National Monument region. Field trips consist of low-impact walking trips and auto-tours, so they are suitable for all fitness levels. Impromptu walks are also often provided by the instructors as time permits to give participants more experience in the field.

# Kings Korner By V.G. Harris



What a difference a week makes. Entering last week, the Sacramento Kings had lost all of their preseason games, and the first two games of the regular season.

Enter the Portland Trailblazers on Oct. 28 and the home crowd was treated to what everyone had envisioned the new and improved Sacramento Kings would look like.

DeMar DeRozan carved up the defensive of the Trailblazers along with point guard DeAaron Fox for 23 and 24 points respectively, but the real key was the way DeRozan got to his spots and made his mid-range game look easy.

Combined with the lightning quickness of Fox, this tandem poses a threat to opposing defenses every night, and other teams had better bring their "A" game when they come to Sac Town.

Finally breaking into the win column and lighting the beam for the first time in the 2024/2025 campaign, lifted a heavy weight off the shoulders of the Kings players and fans alike, but the week was not over. Convincing victories on the road over Utah and the Atlanta Hawks gave the Kings a three-game winning streak and lifted the team over 500.

DeRozan looked like a natural fit as the Kings made victories over the Jazz and Hawks look pedestrian, and had the Kings been able to shoot a little better from the charity stripe, it's entirely possible the overtime loss to the Toronto Raptors could have been the Kings 4th win in a row.

Sacramento will wrap up their road trip Monday night against the formidable Miami Heat (after press time), but it's obvious that some of the swagger has returned to the team.

I'm impressed with DeMar DeRozan in nearly every facet of his game, and like Malik Monk, DeRozan will be an asset and a role model as it relates to free throw shooting. An 84% career free throw shooter, DeMar has proven his reliability at the charity strip, and with the Kings coming off the 2023/2024 campaign in the cellar of the NBA in free throw shooting, adding a 6-time all-star that can shoot free throws at a consistently high level, is just

what the doctor ordered for the Kings.

Big man and double-double king Domantas Sabonis, like Fox, has struggled in the past from the free throw line, but has looked better so far this season, and has raised his average. It's still early, but if both Fox and Sabonis can get to 80% or better at the line consistently, look for Sacramento to be lighting the beam with increased regularity.

At 3-3 the Kings may not have a gawdy win-loss record, but the last four games have given all the fans a positive look at what the season can look like.

Although DeRozan has already shown he can connect from long range when called upon, he consistently passes up 3-point opportunities for mid-range looks, and he is deadly from the 10 to 15-foot range. DeMar looks so comfortable in mid-range, his stroke is almost effortless, and with that kind of confidence, he poses a serious late game option to go along with Fox and Sabonis.

Shout out to Kevin Huerter who after a subpar start in game one, has returned to what fans have expected to see, and once again, Huerter has shown his acumen both beyond the 3-point line, and driving to the hoop.

Huerter's defense has taken a step forward as well, so we'll give some atta-boys to coach Brown for putting Huerter back in the starting lineup and sticking with him. If we can keep Kevin off the injury list, the 2024/2025 season could be a breakout year for a popular player with a big upside.

More than anything, the recent wins, particularly on the road, are spurring a higher volume of optimism, and look for an already loud arena to get even louder.

For any naysayers that felt it would take a long time for newcomer DeMar DeRozan to fit in, he is well ahead of schedule, and the way he and Fox are sharing the ball is a pleasure to watch.

Stay tuned Kings fans. This is what you've been waiting for, and the best is yet to come!

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
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18-year-olds. While the volunteers help all year long, the Kindergarten Project is their "special" project of the year. ★





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## GLANCE BACK

### 80 Years Ago Nov. 10, 1944

Art Dowdell and Jack LeTourneau have purchased the McFarland property on the corner of A Street and Old Highway 99 and have been busy for several weeks installing up to date welding equipment. The blacksmithing department will still be conducted by Mr. I.C. McFarland until such time as the new owners are able to leave their present war work.

On Oct. 27 a group of sportsmen of the Alta Mesa, Clay, Wilton, Herald and Galt districts met at the Alta Mesa Farm Bureau hall and organized the Alta Mesa Rifle & Gun Club, affiliated with the National Rifle Association. The club is now composed of 27 charter members.

### 70 Years Ago Nov. 18, 1954

Galt voters, in one of the biggest and most overwhelming school elections ever held in the area, passed two propositions Wednesday that will pave the way for up to \$400,000 in new construction of elementary school facilities. 

A special election to consolidate the Herald, Arno and Colony schools unanimously carried, and it now converts the three schools into a union school district. The election, held last Tuesday resulted in a more than 5-1 majority in favor of consolidation at all three schools.

#### 60 Years Ago Nov. 12, 1964

The officers of the Galt Warriors Boosters Club met Monday night with the board of trustees of Galt High School and informed the board that the first goal of the club is to buy lights and bleachers for the high school so the school can have its first home game in September in Galt, instead of having to go to Lodi for home games. Al Wharton is club president with Robert Johnson vice president, Bea Strange secretary-treasurer, Ruth Roza reporter, Gordon Williams, Bill Mori, Bill Sartini, Bill Ward and Gerald Nelson, area directors.

### 50 Years Ago Nov. 14, 1974

An Air Force Senior Master Sergeant from Thornton was decorated with the U.S. Air Force Commendation Medal in recent ceremonies at McChord Air Force Base, Washington. Sgt. Aleck E. Dambacher III, son of Mr. and Mrs. Aleck E. Dambacher II of Thornton, is a weather forecaster and was cited for meritorious service at Ramsteen Air Force Base, Germany. He graduated from Galt High School in 1954. 

Mr. and Mrs. Ron Pruitt, Galt, are the proud parents of a baby girl born Nov. 6 in Lodi Memorial Hospital. The young lady weighed 7 pounds 3 ounces and is named Julie Dawn ... Mr. and Mrs. Robert Erman, Galt, are the proud parents of a baby son

born Oct. 16 in Lodi Community Hospital. The young man weighed 7 pounds 4 ounces and is named Matthew Edwin.

#### 40 Years Ago Nov. 8, 1984

Class sizes at Galt High School are up by about 1.7 students per class this year reflecting the impact of the switch from three 90-minute periods per day to six 53-minute periods for each student. The district hired four new teachers before the school year to help offset larger class sizes. 

On Oct. 28, the 15th Annual International Senior Olympics cycling road race and time trials took place in Wilton. The Saturday event included entrants whose ages range from 21 to 79. One of the two eldest, Ed "Foxy Grandpa" Delano, 79, started serious cycling at 58 and has become evangelical about the activity. ★

## Blanket, Sock Drive Calls for Donations

GALT. CA (MPG) - The Galt Commission on Aging is calling on the community to help it provide warm blankets and socks for local older adults.

The commission is looking to collect 350 blankets and 350 pairs of socks, which it plans to distribute to residents of nursing homes and senior apartments around the city. It is requesting new blankets and socks.

Blankets can be either hand-made or store-bought. Barrels for donations are

at four locations: Stratton's Pizzeria (330 S. Lincoln Way), The Coffee Shop Bakery (239 Fourth St.), Fitness Pro (550 Industrial Drive) and Chabolla Community Center (600 Chabolla Ave.) The donation deadline is Dec. 2. Commissioner Libby

Robinson said the blanket drive is about more than the blankets and socks themselves.

"It's making people warm, I suppose, but it's also just having a gift and somebody to deliver it to them because our goal for most of the homes is to deliver it directly to the residents, to have a visit from somebody and companionship for each resident. Some have family close by; some don't," Robinson said.

Robinson has fond memories of the last time she helped with the blanket

"The town came out and really donated quite a few (blankets)," Robinson said. "We ended up with extra blankets. ... And it was very rewarding to see people be so happy about a blanket."

The Valhalla Club, a recently founded charitable organization, is chipping in this year by donating

activity books and magnifying glasses.

The Galt Youth Commission will assist with the distribution, which Robinson said gives youth and older adults a chance to spend time together.

## **FPPC Fines Shawn Farmer for Conflict of Interest**

March 19, 2019, when staff recommended selling city-owned land on Cornell Road to expand the planned Fairway Oaks subdivision. Farmer had taken office in December 2018.

The city had purchased the roughly 6-acre parcel as possible parking space for the Galt Market but that did not materialize. With the land's initial cost of nearly \$400,000, plus ongoing maintenance, and the low chance that the parcel would support a stand-alone development, staff proposed selling the land to Fairway Oaks developer Arcadia Development Co. This would allow Arcadia to expand the subdivision.

Farmer voted with three other councilmembers to approve the sale.

A Fair Political Practices Commission spokesperson told the Herald that the agency started its investigation based on an anonymous complaint received in 2020.

According to a report

by the commission's Enforcement Division, the Cornell property was within 500 feet of a property that Farmer declared on financial-interest paperwork when he took office.

Farmer told the Herald that this was his father's house; the councilmember said he added his own name to the deed during his father's illness. Fairway Oaks got its

initial approval in 2002. Arcadia originally planned to build 100 single-family units, with the additional acreage, it has since raised that number to 173 units.

Under California's Political Reform Act, the Fair Political Practices Commission said, a conflict of interest exists when an official participates in a government decision that has a "reasonably foreseeable" financial effect on a location within 500 feet of the official's property. The commission said a financial impact could be anticipated from the land

"It is reasonably

foreseeable that the sale of undeveloped property to a developer would have a financial effect on the surrounding properties such as raising property values or changing the character of the neighborhood," the Fair Political Practices Commission wrote. The commission cited

comments Farmer made to the Herald after the vote: "What we're getting is fair. I look at this as infill. It will help property values in the area and money to our Parks and Rec. For these reasons, I support it."

The maximum fine for a conflict-of-interest violation is \$5,000 per count; the Fair Political Practices Commission chose a lower amount, \$3,000, in Farmer's case, saying that "there was no evidence to support an intent to conceal, deceive or mislead the public as to Farmer's financial interests." He disclosed the property in a financial-interest form filed with the Fair Political Practices Commission upon assuming office.

"Instead, the evidence suggests that Farmer was inexperienced with the Act's conflict of interest provisions as a newly elected public official and negligently voted on the governmental decision at issue here," the Fair Political Practices Commission's decision

Farmer said the item first came before City Council at a closed session on Feb. 19, the first closed meeting he attended after taking office. He said that the location of the city land was not well explained during the Feb. 19 meeting. "We were never shown

maps or anything. They were just like, 'Here's where it is.' There was just a parcel number. Even on the agenda for the closed Farmer said.

session, there was just a parcel number. There was no map or anything," The Fair Political **Practices Commission said** it found nothing to contra-

dict this but noted that the

agenda for the March 19

vote in open session said the parcel is "located on Cornell Road."

Farmer pointed out that he has since recused himself from several votes when they related to areas near his property, including the one central to the Fair Political Practices Commission case.

In August 2020, when City Council approved the Fairway Oaks subdivision map and the annexation of an "island" of Sacramento County land within city limits, Farmer and then-Councilmember Paige Lampson recused themselves, both noting that they lived nearby. Farmer spoke in a personal capacity during public comment on the item.

The Fair Political Practices Commission report said Farmer "does not have a prior history of violating" the Political

Reform Act. Farmer also disputed the idea that the sale would

have a foreseeable effect

on his property because the


action was an expansion

of an already-approved development.

Farmer said the investigation, which lasted several years, and the fine have been "stressful." While he praised the work of the city's current legal counsel, Farmer said the city's attorney at the time failed him by not flagging the conflict.

"(It is) just a really sore subject of mine because, you know, you go to bat for the city, you try to do the right thing for the people, and here I am thinking I'm doing a good thing, Farmer said. "We got all this money for Parks and Rec from selling the property, and then somebody comes along, anonymous ... and just accuses me of maliciously trying to pad my own pockets and it costs me thousands of dollars." South America. Some of us can tell you about cleaning up New Orleans after Hurricane Katrina, while others will tell you about flying into countries devastated by earthquakes or

Ask us what we did, and we might recollect building runways in the desert, pitching tents in the jungle, hot-loading a plane, setting up communications links in the Australian outback and launching a satellite that gave you the cable TV you

Get us talking and we'll tell you about fixing planes, loading planes, flying planes, jumping from planes, fueling planes in flight.

As a chaplain, I can tell you about the blessings I prayed over planes as well as the blessing I had of walking away from a plane crash.

This generation of service members might lose you in their technical talk, but I assure you they are proud to talk about the satellites they control, the drones they fly and the cyber warfare they engage.

After you ask them about what they did, ask them where they've been.

They'll likely share their version of Johnny Cash's song, "I've Been Everywhere."

They've filled passports doing

temporary duty in places like Antigua, Ukraine and Djibouti on the Horn of

They've flown planes over the North Pole, landed them on the South Pole and navigated submarines under both.

And yes, they've even spent some time in "dark sites" that don't exist.

They shivered with their families on assignment in Minot, N.D., and spent a few sweltering years in Fort Huachuca, My family loved the two years they

spent in Izmir, Turkey, while other military families enjoyed the island seclusion of Guam or the Azores. A few lucky ducks will regale you with

stories of embassy duty in Paris, London

But if you want to go deep, ask them what it means to have served. If you listen well and they think you're

interested, they just might tell you. But it's just as likely they won't be able to tell you. It's just as likely that there will be a hitch in their voice, a mist will form in their eyes and they'll turn away from that question.

Don't get me wrong. They're proud of the things they've done and they want to share them with you.

But I caution you: There are some things they won't share.

Taking an oath to obey the legal orders of those appointed over them meant that they also did the unimaginable and for some the unspeakable.

I know because they told their chaplain. They told me about the lives they couldn't save and the lives they had to take. They've shown me their physical wounds and they've bared their moral wounds.

Thankfully, the stories of most servicemembers run the course of everyday life; albeit a life of transfers every two or three years, endless inspections and exercises, family separations and making ends meet on military pay.

It was a life of long ago, but it was life from only yesterday.

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
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
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







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
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## SIR Keeps Local Retired Men Active

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



## The History of Habit-Forming Cappuccino

According to National Day Calendar, today, Nov. 8, is National Cappuccino Day. Named for the habits of Italian friars, it's a perfect drink on a frosty morning, meeting with friends or just to enjoy a cup at home by the fireplace. Traditionally prepared with espresso, hot milk and steamed milk foam, a cappuccino is an Italian coffee drink.

A little history: The word "cappuccino" comes from the Capuchin friars and is the diminutive form of "cappuccio" in Italian, meaning hood or something that covers the head. This popular coffee beverage got its name not from the hood on their habits but from the color of the hooded robes that the friars wore.

A little more history: In 1945, Achille Gaggia invented the modern espresso machine which further popularized the cappuccino. In the late 1900s, cappuccino was made more widely available to North Americans as upscale coffee houses

In the late 1990s to early 2000s, cappuccinos became popular in the United States concurrent with the boom in the American coffee industry. At the start of



the 21st century, a modified, shortcut version of the cappuccino being served at

While steaming the milk, you must pay close attention to attain the correct ratio of foam, thus making cappuccino one of the most difficult espresso-based beverages to

## Hawks Win 13th Straight Dairy Bowl

GALT, CA (MPG) - On Friday, Nov. 1, the last football game of the regular season was played between crosstown rivals Liberty Ranch and Galt High School, better known as the Dairy Bowl.

The Hawks shut out the Warriors 49-0 before the clock ran down to zero at Galt High stadium.

The game began with the Hawks receiving the kickoff. They moved downfield until quarterback Wyatt Blevins was able to finish the drive, scoring a touchdown with 6:13 left in the first quarter.

When the Warriors got the ball on offense, they began to make some progress when Hawk Kyle Quaresma pancake-tackled Galt quarterback Robert Rubio for a large loss. The Warriors had to punt.

Blevins completed a pass to Andrew Quinn, who scored on a 42-yard reception, making the score 14-0 with 3:38 left in the first quarter.

At the start of the second quarter, Blevins couldn't find any open receivers, so he ran almost 60 yards and scored again.

Galt turned the ball over once again and Joseph Brown scored for the Hawks. At the halftime buzzer the score was 28-0.

The rain started at halftime, and that made for a lot of fumbles and recoveries with a slippery ball.

The Hawks finished the season third place in league and will begin playoffs Friday, Nov. 8 at home (after press time).

Hawk head coach Warren Schroeder has been preparing the team for the

Senior Rachel Smith had nine kills, six blocks, five digs, and received the ball


Junior Haley Smith had 10 kills, two blocks, six digs, and received the ball nine

Girls varsity 5K race results: Senior Emilyann Sheldon placed sixth with a season-best time of 21:16.68 and earned allleague honors. Sophomore Emily Razo took 13th at 22:29.95, a new personal

best. Junior Nora Werdon finished 18th in 24:17.47; junior Elia Rodriguez came in 22nd at 25:23.74; senior Alanna Juarez was 23rd at 25:38.03; seniors Ella Ipson placed 25th with a new personal record (PR) of 27:24.72, and Mae

Trull's time was 27:38.42. Boys varsity 5k race results: Seniors: Kitto Gonzalez finished first with a time of 16:34:27; Logan Rose took second at 16:36.19, achieving a PR. Juniors: Alejandro Herrera placed 10th in 17:43.36, setting a new PR; and Xavier Gomez completed the race in 20:00.18. Sophomores: Elliott Kramer finished 35th with a time of 20:15.99, a new PR, and Garrett Rose came in 38th at 20:41.69. ## The Capital SouthEast Connector: A Lifeline for Public Safety and Emergency Response

Imagine driving on a partially flooded roadway, where last year, drivers in southern Sacramento County experienced this life-threatening situation firsthand as floodwaters engulfed their cars. Or fleeing a fast- moving wildfire, as hundreds of others did, bottlenecked on narrow two-lane roads with little to no shoulders, while emergency responders struggled to reach them.

These scenarios are not hypothetical. They continue to occur in southern Sacramento County, where existing roads—designed decades ago for far fewer residents—now represent a clear danger. Last year,

Sacramento Metro Fire reported performing over 30 flood rescues along area roads due to poorly designed drainage systems.

When fully built,



the Capital SouthEast Connector will solve those problems in southern Sacramento County. This modern roadway will connect I-5 and Hwy 99 near Elk Grove to Hwy 50 in Folsom and the El Dorado Hills, providing a safer and more reliable transportation network.

As our region faces the dual dangers of summer wildfires and winter storm flooding, the importance of this project becomes even more evident. Roadways play a huge role in the safety and well-being of our community. The Connector is designed to ease traffic congestion while forming part of a resilient transportation network that

protects lives, enables swift emergency responses, and ensures safe evacuations during disasters.

Sheriff Jim Cooper emphasized the critical need for quicker response times in emergencies: "It's a safety issue for our motoring public and also for your first responders. We've got to get there to service those people, and those minutes are critical. Time is of the essence."

Sacramento Metro-

politan Fire District Assistant Chief John Rudnicki echoed this concern, noting the importance of the Connector's Grant Line Road improvements: "When we look at the number of fatalities and incidents that have affected this roadway, we can clearly see why it is so crucial to make this improvement an engineered solution to prevent future problems."

Every second counts in an emergency. Whether it is a medical crisis, a fire, or a flood, first responders need reliable, safe, and efficient routes to reach people in need. The Capital SouthEast Connector will be a crucial thoroughfare for emergency vehicles, reducing response times and ensuring that help arrives as quickly as possible.

When we look at the number of fatalities and incidents that have affected this roadway, we can clearly see why it is so crucial to make this improvement an engineered solution to prevent future problems.

Beyond day-today emergencies, the Connector will play a pivotal role in regional emergency preparedness. During disasters like wildfires, its wide lanes and better access will allow

for smoother evacuations and faster movement of emergency personnel and heavy equipment. Rudnicki recalled the devastating Camp Fire in Paradise, where poor road access severely hindered evacuation efforts. "On a roadway, we're worried about the smoke, we're worried about the shoulder. How do you turn your vehicle around if the road is narrowing from four lanes down to two and there's nowhere to go?" he asked.

Winter brings its own set of challenges, with flooding posing a significant danger to residents and first responders in southern Sacramento County. As Cooper noted, drivers often misjudge the depth of floodwaters or fail to see warning signs, trapping themselves in dangerous situations. The Connector's design will address these issues with improved drainage systems and clearer signage, ensuring that emergency vehicles can navigate the region safely, regardless of weather conditions.

This project has been a long time coming, but it is now gaining real momentum thanks to recent federal support. "It's been going on for a long time... trickle here, trickle there, and never a lot of money,"

Cooper reflected, adding, "Finally, we get a lot of money." This muchneeded funding will allow us to address the most dangerous stretches of road and create a safer, more resilient network for all.

The Capital SouthEast Connector is not just a transportation project; it is a lifeline for our community. By building a roadway that can withstand the challenges of flooding and wildfires, we are ensuring that our residents remain safe and connected—no matter what challenges lie ahead.

**Q**What is the Capital SouthEast Connector Expressway?

A The planned Connector is an expressway that will link Interstate 5 and Highway 99 near Elk Grove to Highway 50 in El Dorado County. The new expressway will relieve congestion by directing commuter and commercial traffic around the city on a safe expressway. Travelers to and from areas south of Sacramento will no longer need to go through the city to get to their destinations. The Capital SouthEast Connector Expressway also features a parallel bike and pedestrian

QWho will benefit from the SouthEast Connector Expressway when completed?

A The entire region will benefit from reduced congestion on area highways, particularly Hwy 50, and from fewer toxic fumes spewing from thousands of vehicles stuck in traffic. Southeastern Sacramento County residents will have a safe new route to avoid Hwy 50 congestion and bypass downtown traffic. Businesses, companies, farmers, and ranchers will also be able to receive supplies and send products to market

more safely and quickly. Most importantly, the modernized roadway will be safe to travel, unlike current conditions that endanger lives.

QWho approved building the SouthEast Connector Expressway?

A In 2004, by a 3-1 margin, voters agreed to tax themselves for 30 years for transportation maintenance road improvements, mass transit, mobility for seniors and people with disabilities, and specifically to construct a new expressway connecting I-5 and Hwy 99 in the Elk Grove area to Hwy 50 in El Dorado County, now known as the Capital SouthEast Connector. Since the vote, the tax has generated about \$2 billion. To date, the Capital SouthEast Connector has received about \$58 million of those funds, which were paired with federal and state funds to complete 11 miles of the 34-mile project.


Where have the transportation tax funds not allocated to the Capital SouthEast Connector been used?

A The transportation sales tax funds are allocated according to a formula voters approved when they approved the tax. The largest single

recipient of the funds since the tax began is the Regional Transit Authority (38%, amounting to \$709 million) for operating and maintaining light rail and bus services; and providing transportation options to seniors and individuals with disabilities. Street and road maintenance projects have received 29.4%. amounting to \$545.5 million. Overall, capital improvement projects have received 20.4%, amounting to \$377.4 million. The rest of the funds went to smaller projects, and less than 34 of one percent is spent on program administration.

QWhat has the Sacramento Area Council of Governments' role been in the Capital SouthEast Connector's construction.

The Capital SouthEast **A**Connector is part of the "Sacramento Blueprint," adopted over 20 years ago by SACOG's board of directors and still consulted today. The Blueprint's goal is to integrate land use and transportation planning to improve the region's quality of life. It was SACOG's idea to create the Capital SouthEast Connector Joint Powers Authority to manage the design and construction of the expressway. Over the years, SACOG

has been mostly supportive of efforts to advance the project, but in 2016 the organization decided to remove a portion of the Connector in its MTP update, introducing notable funding challenges for the project. More recently, SACOG determined that constructing a segment of the project was the region's number one transportation priority, greatly enhancing a successful project application for federal funding.

What environmental impacts will the South-East Connector Expressway create, and how will they be mitigated?

Like any road project, Athe Capital SouthEast Connector will affect the environment during and after construction, but all federal, state, and local regulations to protect the environment are being followed. After construction, the environment will be greatly enhanced due to a design that controls and channels damaging groundwater that currently floods the roadway and adjacent lands. The Connector Joint Powers Authority is a member of the South Sacramento Conservation Agency (SCCA) that oversees compliance with the South Sacramento Habitat Conservation Plan and its rules for road construction.

The Connector project has obtained environmental permits and has also agreed

to purchase lands to replace impacted agricultural land or vernal pools in accordance with the conservation plan's vision.

QHow will the Capital SouthEast Connector affect bike and pedestrian traffic in the area?


Bicyclists and pedestrians Able to the party face grave danger will be able to avoid traffic entirely by using a paved, Class 1 bike trail that will be built separate from the expressway along its entire length. The bike trail is designed to enable residents to walk or ride their bikes to visit friends in neighboring communities; or peddle to work, local restaurants, stores, parks, and entertainment venues; or simply to exercise and enjoy the outdoors.
