CITRUS HEIGHTS, CA (MPG) - Imagine the sound of a Ford Model T rumbling along a dusty portion of Auburn Blvd., looking to turn at Sylvan Corners, heading toward San Francisco. Back then, Greenback Lane, named for the federal "greenback dollars" it was built with, had yet to be built.

Before 1913, a patchwork of country roads crisscrossed Citrus Heights as well as much of the country, until

businessman Carl G. Fisher began an effort to unite them into the first transcontinental highway, allowing drivers to travel from San Francisco all the way to New York City.

Fisher's vision for a transcontinental highway, which became known as the Lincoln Highway and named after President Abraham Lincoln, began in 1913 and lasted until the mid-1920s. The original transcontinental route ran from San Francisco to New York City, with Lincoln Park in San

Election Certification Can Take 28 Days

CALIFORNIA (MPG) - Due to the requirements outlined in Assembly Bill 3184, the Nov. 5 General Election results cannot be certified in California until Dec. 3, at the earliest. Assembly Bill 3184 establishes specific timelines and procedures for certifying election results in California.

Certification for the Nov. 5 general election is expected to be completed Dec. 3.

While the first release of results happens just after 8 p.m. Nov. 5 (Election Day), those results are in no way final. The county Elections Office has been tabulating ballots since two weeks ago and the first release of results will only be inclusive of Vote by Mail and Vote Center ballots that are returned and processed through Nov. 4.

The second report includes results from the Vote Centers on Election Day and is issued shortly after 10 p.m. Nov. 5, after press time, with subsequent updates approximately every two hours, if needed, until all Vote Centers have reported.

California allows for 28 days after elections to certify the election, in addition to seven days after Election Day to receive a mail ballot post-marked by Nov. 5.

The second report on Nov. 5 will include results from the Vote Centers on Election Day and will be issued by 10 p.m., with subsequent updates approximately every two hours, if needed, until all Vote Centers have reported (Elections Code 15151(b)).

The first interim report will be posted by 4:15 p.m. on Nov. 8 and will contain results from Vote by Mail ballots and provisional ballots received timely. Subsequent reports will be updated every Tuesday and Friday until certification is complete, which is expected to be Dec. 3.

The Election Results Schedule is provided pursuant to Elections Code 15306(a)(3).

SacRT Receives Grant Funding

SACRAMENTO COUNTY, CA (MPG) - Sacramento Regional Transit (SacRT) recently announced several grant awards, totaling more than \$105 million, that will benefit Sacramento commuters, public transit riders and the environment.

First on Oct. 23, SacRT announced that the California State Transportation Agency has awarded SacRT \$29 million in grant funding through the Transit and Intercity Rail Capital Program. The grant funding will be used for several high priority light rail projects. Funding for the program comes from the federal Greenhouse Gas Reduction Fund which was created and funded through the Inflation Reduction Act of 2022.

According to SacRT, the projects, once complete, will offer significant

benefits, including a reduction of 78,032 metric tons of CO2 equivalent in greenhouse gases, a decrease of 250 million vehicle miles traveled, \$160,722,974 in passenger

travel cost savings and the support of 984 full-time equivalent jobs.

"This funding will allow us to continue advancing our vision of a more connected, accessible, and

sustainable transit system for all Sacramento residents," said Henry Li, SacRT General Manager/CEO. "We are excited to work with our partners

to bring these projects to life, and we look forward to seeing the positive impact on our community.”

Light rail projects supported through this grant funding include:

New Low-Floor Light Rail Vehicles

SacRT will replace aging high-floor light rail vehicles with new state-of-the-art S700 low-floor light rail vehicles from Siemens Mobility. SacRT previously ordered 45 of these new light rail cars, with the first 20 already in service on the Gold Line. This new grant funding will assist with the purchase of 10 additional new low-floor light rail vehicles, bringing our total to 55.

Light Rail Station Conversions on the Blue Line

SacRT is converting 17 of the 19 light rail stations along the Blue Line to accommodate the height requirement of the new low-floor light rail vehicles, making the system more accessible by eliminating the need to climb stairs to board the vehicles. With this new grant funding, SacRT will be able to complete station conversions at all light rail stations. Learn more about this project at sacrt.com/modernization.

New Dos Rios Light Rail Station

A partnership between SacRT, the City of Sacramento, and the Sacramento Housing and Redevelopment Agency (SHRA), the new Dos Rios Station on the Blue Line will serve as a key part of the Twin Rivers-River District transformation. This project aims to provide connectivity to the historically isolated area, integrating transit access with Mirasol Village — a new development offering 427 low-income units and market-rate housing. The vision for the River District includes increased access to jobs, services, and cultural amenities, creating a vibrant gateway to downtown Sacramento. Learn more about the project at

Horn Road Light Rail Station and Complete Streets Improvements

SacRT is working with the City of Rancho Cordova and Sacramento County on “complete streets” projects along Folsom Boulevard, creating safer and more accessible routes for bicyclists and pedestrians near the future Horn Road Station. Rancho Cordova’s streetscape work and the design of a new Class IV Bike Trail will further connect the station to regional bike paths like the American River Bike Trail.

Transition to Digital Fare Technology

SacRT is transitioning to a digital fare system through the Cal-ITP Platform Validator and Smart Fare Vending Machine, in partnership with the CCJPA. This will streamline fare payments and transfers between SacRT services and Capitol Corridor trains, providing a more seamless experience for riders. SacRT plans to extend this template to other regional rail services, such as ACE and San Joaquins trains, making travel throughout Northern California easier and more efficient.

Then on Oct. 30, SacRT announced the Federal Transit Administration’s award of approximately \$76 million in Capital Investment funds. The federally

funded Capital Investment grant program funds transit capital investments, including heavy rail, commuter rail, light rail, streetcars and bus rapid transit.

The grant award will enable SacRT to purchase new hydrogen fuel cell buses, replace aging fleet vehicles, construct a permanent hydrogen fueling station, modernize a key bus maintenance facility, and establish a workforce development program to train local workers in maintaining and operating the advanced zero-emission buses.

As part of the grant award announcement, SacRT hosted a ceremonial ribbon cutting event at the site of the new bus facility to be funded through the grant. Several local elected officials and dignitaries attended the event and shared their thoughts.

“This investment solidifies SacRT’s commitment to a greener, more sustainable future,” said

SacRT General Manager/CEO Henry Li. “The new hydrogen fuel cell buses and modernized facilities will significantly reduce our carbon footprint while enhancing service for our riders. We are grateful for the federal partnership and the strong support from our congressional representatives.”

Said SacRT Board Chair Patrick Kennedy, “This grant is not just about upgrading our fleet; it’s about creating opportunities for the Sacramento community. By investing in workforce development, we’re ensuring that local residents have the skills needed for tomorrow’s jobs in the growing field of green transportation.”

Said U.S. Representative Doris Matsui, “Sacramento is leading the way in the transition to clean energy and this investment underscores our region’s commitment to sustainable transportation. The hydrogen fuel cell buses will make

a tangible difference in our air quality, while creating jobs and boosting economic development in our community.”

Said U.S. Representative Ami Bera, M.D., “This federal investment will have lasting benefits for Sacramento. It supports clean energy solutions while improving access to safe and reliable transit. Thanks to funding passed from the Bipartisan Infrastructure Law, I am proud to support SacRT’s efforts to modernize our transportation infrastructure.”

Said U.S. Representative Kevin Kiley, “This federal grant is not only a win for sustainable transit but also for job creation here in Sacramento. This will provide new employment opportunities for our community, equipping local workers with the skills needed to support innovative transportation for years to come.”

Said Ray Tellis, FTA Region 9 Administrator, “The FTA is proud to support SacRT’s forward-thinking vision for public transit. These funds will help reduce emissions, improve transit services and create opportunities for Sacramento’s workforce, all while moving us closer to a sustainable future.”

SacRT acknowledged the bus service improvement projects are made possible through strong partnerships with California Air Resources Board, Sacramento Area Council of Governments, Sacramento Metropolitan Air Quality Management District, Center for Transportation and the Environment, New Flyer of America, American River College, Clean Cities Coalition and the County and City of Sacramento. ★

Francisco as the western terminus.

The Lincoln Highway's special place in Citrus Heights history was recognized at an Oct. 7 public ceremony in front of the Sylvan Cemetery where a historical placard installed officially recognizing Auburn Boulevard as part of the Lincoln Highway was dedicated.

The city of Citrus Heights, in partnership with CHANT Neighborhood Area 3 board member Andrew Saunders and the Lincoln Highway Association California Chapter, identified four historical route points along Auburn Boulevard that are now officially marked as points on the historic transcontinental Lincoln Highway.

Multiple city leaders, community members, City Council members and Kelsey Nelson, the CHANT president, attended the unveiling of the placard at Sylvan Cemetery, along with the Lincoln Highway Association California Chapter's president and vice-president.

Saunders said his vision for installing historical placards only became a reality because of the help of the city and General Services director Regina Cave, who helped to bring the idea to fruition.

"Visions and dreams don't happen without a date put on it," Saunders said at the start of the dedication ceremony.

Lincoln Highway Association California Chapter Joel Windmiller said, "The chapter really appreciates the efforts of Andy here."

The new placards have since been added to a national Lincoln Highway map, which is accessed through the Lincoln Highway Association's website.

Each rectangular placard design has a brown, red, white, and blue color scheme, with "HISTORIC" written on top across a brown banner, and a large L in the center of the words "LINCOLN HIGHWAY."

Cave said two more historical placards have also been installed along the old Lincoln Highway route, including one on Auburn Boulevard adjacent to the 14-Mile House near Donegal Drive and another on Auburn Boulevard close to the 12-Mile House near Devecchi Avenue, south of

Greenback Lane.

There were once six "mile" houses located in the vicinity of what is now Citrus Heights used as way stations where people who traveled the two-day route between Sacramento and Auburn could spend the night.

One of those old country roads, now known as Auburn Boulevard, ran along a path in Citrus Heights that was used by freight wagons as far back as 1849. At that time, the road ran straight to the city of Auburn until 1864 when the Central Pacific Railroad reached Roseville, according to Citrus Heights Historical Society President Larry Fritz.

The city also plans to install a fourth Lincoln Highway placard at the northern city limits when a gateway arch into the city is completed, Cave said.

The Lincoln Highway Association (LHA) first published maps and travel guides to encourage drivers to venture out across the United States. Many did so and became the early residents of the community of Sylvan, now incorporated Citrus Heights.

While the concept of connecting existing county roadways, which Carl G. Fisher envisioned, to form a transcontinental highway worked, historical records show it left drivers with a confusing maze of road names and highway markers.

The Lincoln Highway transitioned into Highway 40 in the mid-1920s when the government dropped

"named" highways and transitioned to a numbered highway system.

To this day, a sign at the intersection of Antelope Road and Auburn Boulevard denotes both names, according to the Citrus Heights Historical Society.

In 1926, California Department of Transportation numbered the highways and Lincoln Highway became Highway 40.

Highway 40 was then replaced by Interstate 80 in 1956 when Caltrans built a new roadway from the Marconi Curve to the Atlantic Street overcrossing in Roseville, bypassing Auburn Boulevard completely.

At that time, the trail that began as Auburn Road, then Lincoln Highway, then Highway 40, was finally renamed Auburn Boulevard. The bend in the road, however, remains.

Today, the bend in that old country road is known as Sylvan Corners and marks the geographic center of Citrus Heights. Auburn Boulevard, Old Auburn Road and Sylvan Road, which all come together at the intersection.

Concrete benches installed by the City of Citrus Heights in the early 2000s bearing the lettering "Lincoln 40" at the intersection of Auburn Boulevard and Antelope Road, commemorate the city's own section of the first transcontinental highway and mark an important piece of history in the city. ★

Bera Announces Launch of Mail Theft Audit

SACRAMENTO COUNTY, CA - On Oct. 30, Representative Ami Bera, M.D. (CA-06) announced that the U.S. Postal Service (USPS) Office of Inspector General (OIG) has officially begun its audit of mail theft mitigation in Sacramento County.

This audit, launched in response to Congressman Bera's request, addresses the growing concern over mail theft across the Sacramento region. The USPS Office of Inspector General is expected to release a report along with recommendations addressing mitigation and responses to mail theft.

"I have heard directly from constituents throughout Sacramento County about their frustrations with stolen or missing mail, which disrupts daily lives and raises concerns about sensitive information, medication, and other essential items being stolen," said Representative Bera. "Every resident of Sacramento County deserves the peace of mind that their mail will arrive securely and on time. I am committed to holding the U.S. Postal Service accountable and ensuring they take the necessary steps to protect our community's mail."

As part of the audit fieldwork, OIG investigators made unannounced visits

last week to several postal facilities in Sacramento County. With the goal of reviewing actions to mitigate and respond to mail theft, the OIG has committed to providing Congressman Bera's office with a detailed briefing before releasing the final audit report to the public.

"I appreciate the Office of Inspector General fulfilling my request for this much-needed audit and their dedication to uncovering areas where improvements are needed," Representative Bera added. "Over the next couple of months, I will closely monitor the progress of this audit as we work to ensure that Sacramento County residents receive reliable and secure mail service."

This announcement follows Congressman Bera's ongoing efforts to improve mail service in Sacramento County. Last year, he sent a letter to Postmaster General Louis DeJoy, highlighting the significant increase in mail theft and vandalism in the region.

Residents experiencing mail theft are encouraged to report incidents to the U.S. Postal Inspection Service.

Congressman Ami Bera, M.D. has represented Sacramento County in the U.S. House of Representatives since 2013. The 6th Congressional District is located just east and north of California's capitol city, Sacramento, and lies entirely within Sacramento County. ★

Early Fish Counts Suggest It Could Happen

Farmers can estimate the size of a harvest months in advance by counting the blossoms on their trees. Similarly, salmon fishers can cast an eye into the future by counting spawning fish in a river. Fishery managers are doing that now in the Sacramento River and its tributaries, and what they're seeing could be a bad sign for next year.

The low count of returning adult salmon, made by the federally operated Coleman National Fish Hatchery, is preliminary, with several weeks left in the natural spawning period for the Sacramento Valley's fall-run Chinook, backbone of the state's salmon fishing economy.

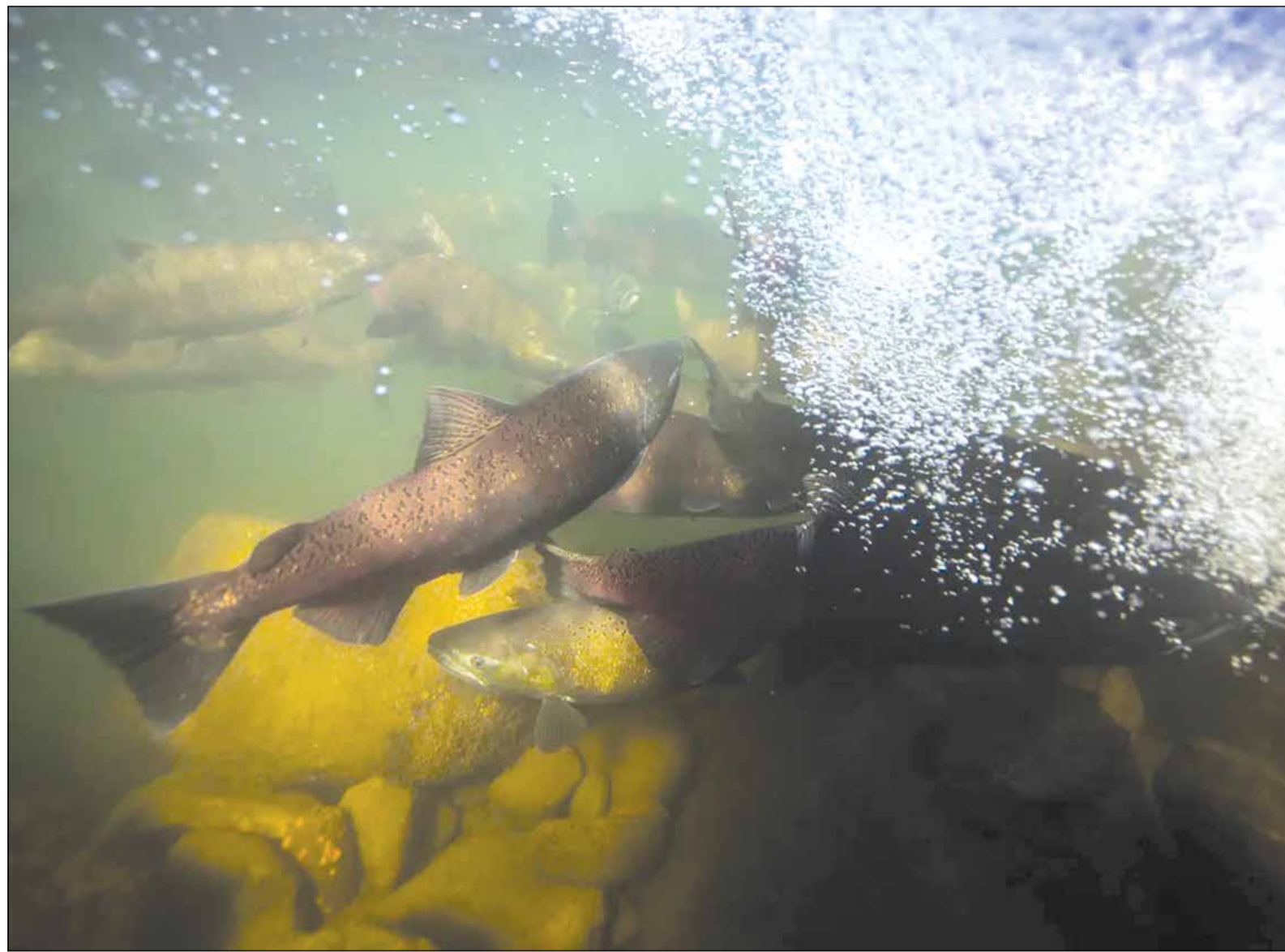
There is even some possible good news in the numbers — a large percentage of immature Chinook, called "jacks." This demographic slice of the salmon population can be a predictive indicator of ocean abundance for the coming season, and it could be a sign there are more fish in the ocean than many expected — though officials say it's too early to tell.

Overall, the unwelcome numbers, mirroring similar figures from last year, are alarming to people who fish, for they portend the possible continuation of the two-year-and-counting statewide ban on salmon fishing, imposed in 2023 following a weak spawning season.

Already, the loss of revenue from the fishery shutdown has devastated the coastal fishing fleet, which is still waiting for \$20 million in federal funds allocated for disaster relief early this year.

R.J. Waldron, who took recreational anglers salmon fishing on his Emeryville charter boat Sundance for more than a decade, recently sold his vessel. The reduced income was too skimpy to pay the overhead costs of owning a boat and renting a slip. He said relief funds, had they been portioned out, would have kept him afloat.

"That would have helped me maintain my boat and basically ride the storm out

until we get salmon fishing back — if we get salmon fishing back," he said.

Sarah Bates, owner of the San Francisco-based commercial vessel The Bounty, said she drew about 90% of her income from Chinook salmon sales prior to the closure and has helped make ends meet by fishing for other species, like black cod, shrimp and rockfish. Others, she said, have been targeting halibut.

Bates said the uncertain outlook has been disorienting for the men and women who shape their lives around a calendar year of fishing seasons and regulations.

"A lot of us feel a little untethered," she said.

At least six more months may pass before financial relief arrives. Barry Thom, executive director of the Pacific States Marine Fisheries Commission — which has helped facilitate the grant application process — said in an email that the federal funds could be distributed sometime in May and June of 2025.

The odds of whether fishers will be returning

to work by then still looks like a tossup. U.S. Fish and Wildlife Service's Brett Galyean, project leader at the Coleman hatchery, described "really low" numbers of 3- and 4-year-old adult Chinook. As of Oct. 29, his staff had collected 4 million eggs from female fish — less than one-third the hatchery's target of 14 to 15 million eggs.

The spawning run is drawing toward the end, too, with new arrivals at the hatchery now "slowing down," according to Galyean.

At several other Central Valley hatcheries operated by the California Department of Fish and Wildlife, facility managers have only just started counting salmon, an official said. This means overall numbers could still mount to promising levels.

The low returns to Coleman, the state's largest fish hatchery, reflect a long-term decline in Chinook salmon numbers region-wide. As many as 2 million adult Chinook historically spawned in the Central

Valley's rivers, and the fish were a keystone feature of marine and inland ecosystems.

The industrialization of the landscape to produce gold, water, cities, and crops has sent salmon runs tumbling. While the Central Valley's fish hatcheries — built last century to augment the wild stocks — release millions of baby Chinook each year, populations have dropped below fishable levels.

In 2022 officials counted just 69,000 adult fall-run Chinook in the entire Sacramento Valley, with a moderate improvement last year. In the mainstem of the Sacramento River alone, a key spawning destination, annual returns have dropped below 4,000 adults — down from an average of almost 60,000 each year from 1990 to 2009.

What ails California's salmon is perennially debated. Water users lean on explanations such as invasive species, reduced floodplain habitat, and climate change. Fishery advocates often stress the importance of water,

especially quantity and temperature.

Bates said the Central Valley needs more aggressive floodplain restoration to provide feeding and refuge habitat for small fish, but that sufficient water is the key.

"It's the water — there's no way around it," Bates said. "The water conditions in the Sacramento River and the Delta no longer support juvenile salmon migrating downstream."

Sometimes, the outflow from Lake Shasta and into the Sacramento River during the spawning season is just a few degrees too warm — conditions that can abort millions of eggs and newly born fish and has become a recurring problem in recent years. Hot weather has played a role, though environmentalists say negligent management of the reservoir — especially failure to keep its water sufficiently deep into the late summer — is just as problematic.

As the young salmon migrate downstream, they face such perils as low flows, high temperatures,

water pumps and predators. Thiamine deficiency, a relatively new and emerging ecological hiccup connected to the marine food web, has also impacted Chinook salmon. Climate change is a long-term threat.

Barry Nelson, policy representative for the Golden State Salmon Association, believes the main reason for the Sacramento's salmon collapse has been inadequate river conditions downstream of Shasta, and low smolt survival.

"We sterilized the Sacramento River," he said. "We killed almost all the fish, and rule number one in fisheries management is, if you kill all the baby salmon, three years later you don't have adult salmon."

What a difference a week makes. Entering last week, the Sacramento Kings had lost all of their preseason games, and the first two games of the regular season.

Enter the Portland Trailblazers on Oct. 28 and the home crowd was treated to what everyone had envisioned the new and improved Sacramento Kings would look like.

DeMar DeRozan carved up the defensive of the Trailblazers along with point guard DeAaron Fox for 23 and 24 points respectively, but the real key was the way DeRozan got to his spots and made his mid-range game look easy.

Combined with the lightning quickness of Fox, this tandem poses a threat to opposing defenses every night, and other teams had better bring their "A" game when they come to Sac Town.

Finally breaking into the win column and lighting the beam for the first time in the 2024/2025 campaign, lifted a heavy weight off the shoulders of the Kings players and fans alike, but the week was not over. Convincing victories on the road over Utah and the Atlanta Hawks gave the Kings a three-game winning streak and lifted the team over 500.

DeRozan looked like a natural fit as the Kings made victories over the Jazz and Hawks look pedestrian, and had the Kings been able to shoot a little better from the charity stripe, it's entirely possible the overtime loss to the Toronto Raptors could have been the Kings 4th win in a row.

Sacramento will wrap up their road trip Monday night against the formidable Miami Heat (after press time), but it's obvious that some of the swagger has returned to the team.

I'm impressed with DeMar DeRozan in nearly every facet of his game, and like Malik Monk, DeRozan will be an asset and a role model as it relates to free throw shooting. An 84% career free throw shooter, DeMar has proven his reliability at the charity strip, and with the Kings coming off the 2023/2024 campaign in the cellar of the NBA in free throw shooting, adding a 6-time all-star that can shoot free throws at a consistently high level, is just

what the doctor ordered for the Kings.

Big man and double-double king Domantas Sabonis, like Fox, has struggled in the past from the free throw line, but has looked better so far this season, and has raised his average. It's still early, but if both Fox and Sabonis can get to 80% or better at the line consistently, look for Sacramento to be lighting the beam with increased regularity.

At 3-3 the Kings may not have a gawdy win-loss record, but the last four games have given all the fans a positive look at what the season can look like.

Although DeRozan has already shown he can connect from long range when called upon, he consistently passes up 3-point opportunities for mid-range looks, and he is deadly from the 10 to 15-foot range. DeMar looks so comfortable in mid-range, his stroke is almost effortless, and with that kind of confidence, he poses a serious late game option to go along with Fox and Sabonis.

Shout out to Kevin Huerter who after a subpar start in game one, has returned to what fans have expected to see, and once again, Huerter has shown his acumen both beyond the 3-point line, and driving to the hoop.

Huerter's defense has taken a step forward as well, so we'll give some attaboys to coach Brown for putting Huerter back in the starting lineup and sticking with him. If we can keep Kevin off the injury list, the 2024/2025 season could be a breakout year for a popular player with a big upside.

More than anything, the recent wins, particularly on the road, are spurring a higher volume of optimism, and look for an already loud arena to get even louder.

For any naysayers that felt it would take a long time for newcomer DeMar DeRozan to fit in, he is well ahead of schedule, and the way he and Fox are sharing the ball is a pleasure to watch.

Stay tuned Kings fans. This is what you've been waiting for, and the best is yet to come!

California's Transition Off Carbon Fuels Could Upset Gasoline Supply, Prices

California motorists buy and consume a billion gallons of gasoline each month and are very sensitive about pump prices, which are markedly higher than those in other states. Naturally, they are a political football.

Gov. Gavin Newsom has repeatedly characterized refiners as price gougers, even though most of the differences are caused by taxes, fees and regulatory mandates. Recently, he persuaded the Legislature to pass a watered-down version of his proposal requiring refiners to maintain higher reserves to avoid price spikes.

However the gasoline situation is far more complicated than Newsom's approach, and California may be facing a period of volatility on both supply and price as it attempts to wean itself from combustion-powered transportation, its largest single source of greenhouse gas emissions.

The California Air Resources Board is on the verge of expanding its program of reducing the amount of carbon in the current gasoline recipe, regarded as an interim step before completely converting vehicles to electricity or some other non-polluting power.

Last year, CARB published an analysis of the proposed Low Carbon Fuel

Standard to provide "the economic incentives to produce cleaner fuels like electricity, hydrogen and biofuels that are needed to displace fossil fuels and reduce transportation sector emissions."

The report estimated that adoption could immediately increase gas prices by 47 cents a gallon and then, "on average, from 2031 through 2046 the proposed amendments are projected to potentially increase the price of gasoline by \$1.15 per gallon, the price of diesel by \$1.50 per gallon and fossil jet fuel by \$1.21 per gallon."

The cost estimate generated a storm of media and political attention and CARB backed off, continuing the adoption process but refusing to put a number on the potential pump price. Last week, the board's top official conducted an electronic press conference in which he stressed positive impacts, but continued to sidestep questions about consumer impacts.

"It's a win-win," executive officer Steven Cliff insisted. "We get public health benefits, we reduce health costs, we see lower costs of driving and we help turbocharge those investments in clean energy infrastructure that helps drive our zero emissions future."

CARB now intends to act on the policy three days after Election Day, without offering any estimate of consumer costs — a potential signal that those costs will be hefty.

While Newsom wants to be remembered as someone who tried to reduce gasoline prices, his governorship probably will be one that substantially increased them.

The other uncertainty is whether California will have

enough gasoline, even a variety with less carbon, over the next two decades as it transitions away from carbon fuels altogether.

California once had dozens of refineries producing the state's unique fuel blend, but in recent years just nine. After the Legislature gave Newsom the new laws on gasoline reserves, one refiner, Phillips 66, announced that it would shutter its plant in Southern California that's no longer profitable. The company said the closure had nothing to do with politics.

Very quickly, Valero, which has two refineries in the state, hinted that it may follow suit. CEO Lane Riggs said during a conference call that "all options are on the table" for the company's two California refineries, one in Benicia and the other in Wilmington, because of increasing state regulation of operations.

"Clearly the California regulatory environment is putting pressure on operators out there and how they might think about going forward with their operations," Riggs said.

Transitioning transportation to non-carbon power — while maintaining sufficient and reasonably priced supplies for gas-powered cars until they're replaced — was destined to be a fraught process.

If poorly managed, it could be a monumental disaster.

I had a little of that experience too. Rick (my husband) and I were married about four months when he was deployed to Vietnam. It was a long time ago, but it still hits home every Veteran's Day. I can still feel the emotions he and I felt as we said goodbye at the airport, not knowing if we would ever see each other again, hoping and praying that we would. It was not a popular war as if any war is, but this one was very difficult for those who returned and the names they were called. After several months, we met for R&R in Hawaii. The joy was there, but dread too, because he had to return to Vietnam after just a few days. But we were grateful.

Thank God my First Lieutenant re-

turned to me with no injuries on the outside, but what about the inside? We never really talked about all that went on for quite a few years. I felt he would share when he was ready. Perhaps it was better that he was a little older...about 24... and he took on the job of looking after some of the younger guys to keep them out of trouble. I remember the letters he sent, which I still cherish and the cassette tapes we sent back and forth just talking about stuff. No computers back then. I can still remember hearing the pouring monsoons in the background and how he tried to keep busy painting

his room.

After Hawaii, it was some months before he came home. It was over the New Year holiday, and I can still feel the terror when I did not know where he was as Saigon was falling. I heard nothing for days and then the call came from him that he was in Seattle. I was at Indiana University working on my Phd, but no gift or degree could have given me such joy as when I heard his voice.

I can't even imagine what it would be like to have a chaplain and officer come to my door, or know that his wounds were so bad, he would never be whole again. My love passed last December, but Veteran's Day will always be special.

Social Security Matters

Why Does the Government Raid Social Security?

Dear Rusty: The Social Security program is funded by employees and their employers. The federal government does not contribute to the program, right? So why does the federal government feel they have the right to raid the fund? All the money sent to Ukraine and other unnecessary programs could have been used to pay back what they owe to Social Security. **Signed: Disgruntled Senior**

Dear Disgruntled Senior: You are correct that the Social Security program is mainly funded by payroll taxes on employee earnings and by employers who match those employee contributions. FYI, some additional SS revenue is received from income tax on Social Security benefits, as well as from interest on the special issue government bonds held in the Social Security Trust Fund. But the assertion that the Federal Government used (raided) the Social Security Trust Fund for any other purpose is a myth. All Social Security revenue received since the program began in 1937 has been accounted for, and all excess funds are contained in a special Trust Fund in the form of interest-bearing government bonds, reserved to

pay future benefits. FYI, the interest on those bonds contributed about \$67 billion to the Trust Fund reserves in 2023.

Social Security revenue, today, is not adequate to pay all benefit obligations, and the extra money needed to pay full SS benefits for everyone is obtained by redeeming Trust Fund reserves. Redemption of those Trust Fund bonds is how the federal government “pays back” the cash loaned to it by Social Security. The excess SS money received from contributions was loaned to the Federal Treasury by the SS Trust Funds, interest-bearing bonds were issued by the government in return for the cash received, and the bonds issued are redeemable as needed by Social Security to pay benefits. FYI, the average interest on the 2023 bonds in the Trust Funds was about 4.125%, whereas the average rate of return on all bonds held in reserve was about 2.387%. This transaction is the same as for any other investment vehicle, except the bonds in the Trust Funds are redeemable at any time without penalty. Said another way, all excess money ever received by Social Security is/was invested in special-issue government bonds, and resides in reserve to pay future benefits, as needed.

“Paying back” the money represented by bonds held in the Trust Funds would not be a wise financial move because it would eliminate all future interest earned by those bonds (again, that interest was about \$67 billion in 2023). Federal money spent for other purposes

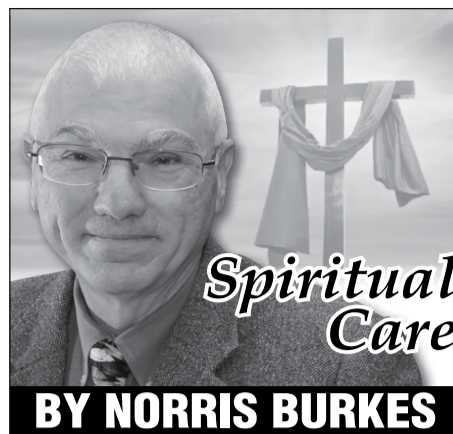
(e.g., Ukraine) is from the general U.S. Treasury and not from the Social Security Trust Fund, which is held totally separate from the U.S. Treasury. Since inception, all money ever contributed to Social Security has been (and is) used for one purpose (and one purpose only) – to pay Social Security benefits to those eligible (which, by the way, does not include “illegal aliens” or anyone else who is not a legal resident of the United States).

For clarity, Social Security does have a future financial issue because annual benefit obligations are now greater than annual Social Security revenue, and money from the SS Trust Fund is now used to make up the difference. Unless the program is reformed soon, the Trust Fund reserves (about \$2.8 trillion as of 2023) will be depleted and benefits for all Social Security recipients will be cut by about 23% starting in 2033 or 2034 (according to the Trustees of Social Security and the Congressional Budget Office).

Congress needs to act soon to enact Social Security reform to restore the program to fiscal solvency. The Association of Mature American Citizens (AMAC) is steadfastly lobbying Congress to enact the needed Social Security reform as soon as possible.

Right to Judge or Judging Right

During the past 23 years of writing this column, I’ve occasionally used my platform to cast a negative spotlight on scoundrels, rascals and scallywags.

I’ve even gone so far to name the names of the political pundits, candidates and officials who’ve used their offices to spew hateful rhetoric on the less fortunate.

And I haven’t held back my judgments when it comes to the religious field, I’ve panned plundering preachers for their judgmental-Jesus, churches who’ve brought politics into the pew, and chaplains who’ve pressed their views on the sick.

I’ve censured meandering athletes for their marital missteps, disparaged depraved entertainers, and even called out commanders who forced their religion on their subordinates.

My ruminations have occasionally inspired a few readers to insist that I apologize for my judgmental stance toward their cute celebrity, their precious preacher, or their nuclear network commentator.

Invariably, there are those who measure my words against Matthew 7:1, “Do not judge, or you too will be judged.”

Matthew 7:1-5 is not telling us not to judge, it’s telling us HOW to judge, Jesus is saying we can’t judge hypocritically. He never suggested that we can’t ever judge!

The problem with using the verse against your critics to disqualify their judgments is that the verse loses balance without Jesus’ commandment from John 7:24, “Stop judging by mere appearances, but instead judge correctly.” (NIV)

The former verse is an admonition against self-serving judgment; the latter verse allows us to make discerningly helpful judgments.

It’s useful to understand that the first verse plays a small, but important part in Jesus’ Sermon on the Mount. It chastises the hypocrites who use their judgmental pronouncements as a smoke screen to hide their own inequities.

This kind of judging is hypocritical and it’s not restorative as it only serves to help the judge feel better about him or herself. Over the years, I’ve heard the verse grafted into a popular philosophy that professes that any kind of judging attitude is wrong.

This thinking becomes a flippant way of saying “I’ll ignore your shortcomings if you’ll ignore mine.”

To that I respond, “No. I won’t give you a free pass from criticism and neither will I expect one in return.”

At the end of the day, a world without discerning judgments will become a lawless one. That’s why it’s important to mix in Jesus’s words from the above-mentioned verse.

The verse from John 7:24 is a weighty and difficult pronouncement that finds modern clarity in this paraphrase from The Message, “Don’t be nitpickers; use your head — and heart! — to discern what is right, to test what is authentically right.”

This admonition coaches a more self-reflective attitude toward judgment. It calls for us to apply our discernment in a humble manner. That humility only comes when we acknowledge our own shortcomings.

In other words, even though we may be right in our judgments, we acknowledge that there is a place inside of us that is not yet right — a place that will only be made right in the sight of God.

Finally, while I have used this column to share my assessments about the actions of others, I will not take God’s place in determining someone’s eternal spiritual fate.

That verdict belongs to God, whose judgments I would never assume and whose endless love I can only imagine. ★

Cell Phone Restrictions Increasingly Implemented in Area Schools

SACRAMENTO, CA (MPG) - Before freshmen and sophomores ever make it to their desks in an English classroom at Rio Americano High School, their cell phones are immediately stored in a collection caddy, where they remain until the period ends. But when they return for social studies classes to the room next door, they are free to check texts or step aside to take a call.

The fate of cell phones at Rio Americano – that individual teachers dictate their own policies for in-class use absent a campus-wide rule – is illustrative of the 91% of U.S. high schools that don't have all-day phone bans.

The number of schools cracking down on phone use is increasing every day, though, in both Sacramento and nationwide.

According to San Juan Unified spokesperson Raj Rai, the district already has a policy that restricts in-class phone use. However, she noted that the rule is more than a decade old, and that enforcement does not look the same at every school.

"We will be reviewing this policy this fall and having conversations with our students, staff and families regarding any potential updates that may need to be made based on feedback collected," Rai said.

Cell phone policies vary across the Sacramento region: students store phones in designated holders in classrooms at McClatchy High School, while West Campus High School has "phone pockets" for all students. Rosemont High School, on the other hand, adopted an all-day ban this year.

Nationwide, schools are turning to the use of "phone lockers" and Yondr

pouches, device storage bags that can only be unlocked by administrators.

But while the issue has so far been left to the school and district level, California will soon follow other states in mandating cell phone bans.

In late August, the assembly passed AB 3216, new legislation that will require every California school district to create a policy prohibiting student cell phone use during all school hours by July 2026. The bill was signed in September by Gov. Gavin Newsom, who had previously spoken out in support of a ban.

"We know that excessive smartphone use increases anxiety, depression and other mental health issues," Newsom said in a statement. "This new law will help students focus on academics, social development, and the world in front of them, not their screens, when they're in school."

Leaders of AB 3216's only official opponent, the California School Boards Association, said they feel the legislation is a mistaken "one-size-fits-all approach."

"This bill limits the decision-making authority of the governing board as they would now have to adopt a policy, even if, through local community meetings, it was found that there was no need to limit/prohibit the usage," the association said in a statement. "These decisions are best made at the local level by people who understand, reside, are invested in, and accountable to the

communities they serve."
 While they understand the benefits, some students, parents and even teachers and school officials aren't sure an all-out ban is the best answer to address excessive cell phone use because of the many ways cell phones are utilized.

"I hope that they can make exceptions for those students who may need reminders for medication or need extra support for outside people that they contact through their phone, but I think the general consensus about banning phones is mostly positive," Rio Americano senior Marin Abood said.

Cell phones are seen as a way to contact students in case of emergency, and limiting access to a student's personal device at all times might be a step too far, many parents and ban opponents say.

The National Parents Union reports that 78% of parents want their children to retain cell phone access during the school day.

Overwhelming parent opposition to complete phone bans comes amid incidents of school violence nationwide.

When fake social media threats of school violence affected dozens of Sacramento-area schools in September, cell phone access provided parents individualized communication with students in addition to general district statements. During the mid-September threats, students texted their parents to let them know they were OK and coordinated



AG Bonta's Recycling Lawsuit Will Harm Consumers

California's Attorney General Rob Bonta is suing ExxonMobil over accusations of deception. Allegedly, the company deceived Californians for nearly 50 years "by promising that recycling could and would solve the ever-growing plastic waste crisis," even though ExxonMobil knew that it could never handle "more than a tiny fraction of the plastic waste it produces."

The AG's lawsuit will harm families, and not just in California but throughout the country. Notably, while he is suing a private company over their efforts to promote plastic recycling, the state continues to promote recycling as part of the solution to plastic pollution.

Consider the programs of CalRecycle, a branch of the California Environmental Protection Agency. The department was established in 2010 to replace the California Integrated Waste Management Board and is responsible for recycling all solid waste in California.

Through CalRecycle, California openly advocates for building "a circular economy across all materials"

With respect to plastic materials, CalRecycle states that "California is addressing plastic waste by building a circular economy" by focusing on, among other priorities, cutting "the amount of plastic waste made", investing and expanding "domestic recycling" and increasing "market demand for recycled plastic by using more recycled content".

The iRecycleSmart campaign provides additional evidence that CalRecycle supports plastic recycling. Introduced by CalRecycle in 2022, the campaign provides information on what items are recyclable in the state and how to recycle properly. Recycling plastics features prominently on the campaign's website.

Government support for plastic recycling goes beyond the CalRecycle agency. California has implemented four major existing environmental laws that, in one way or another, mandate some form of plastic recycling. These are: the California Integrated Waste Management Act, the Rigid Plastic Packaging Container Act, the Plastics Trash Bag Law, and the California Beverage Container Recycling Act of 1986 or AB 2020 (also known as the Bottle Bill).

In response to these requirements, California now has an extensive array of curbside collection programs, state-certified beverage container buyback centers, and drop-off centers run by non-profit organizations, small firms, and individuals. It also has programs to undertake recycling, notably the California Bottle Bill buy-back collection program that has 2,400 sites established to collect soft drink containers under California's Redemption Law.

Beyond this clear evidence that the state advocates plastic recycling, AG Bonta's lawsuit confuses the recycling rate in the U.S., which are generally viewed as low, with the viability of plastic recycling as a concept. The low plastics recycling rate in the United States is not evidence that only "a tiny fraction of the plastic waste" is recyclable as the AG asserts. In other countries, such as Germany, recycling rates are substantially higher. Specifically, while the U.S. recycling rate for plastics is around 9%, "Germany set a record for plastics recycling in 2022" at a rate of over 67%.

In fact, due to the potential benefits and possibilities created by plastic recycling, the broad expectations are that the

demand for recycled plastics will continue to grow. A report by Allied Market Research estimates that "the global recycled plastic market generated \$66.7 billion in 2022, and is anticipated to generate \$141.9 billion by 2032, witnessing a CAGR of 7.9% from 2023 to 2032." This growth is driven by "increasing awareness about environmental issues such as plastic pollution and ocean trash and garbage, as well as rising greenhouse gas emissions are expected to drive the growth of the global recycled plastic market in the forecast period from 2023 to 2032."

The growth in the plastic recycling market directly contradicts the AGs claims that a large volume of plastic recycling could not be processed – clearly it can.

This brings us to the harm that the lawsuit could potentially impose on families. Win or lose, the AG's lawsuit is imposing costs on ExxonMobil. These additional burdens, by definition, must either increase the price of plastics, reduce the returns to shareholders, or reduce the incomes of workers. Consumers may also suffer from greater scarcity.

The greater business

uncertainty created by this lawsuit will also, ultimately, harm consumers. Other companies, particularly if the AG's lawsuit is successful, now face the threat that they will be subjected to expensive litigation regardless of whether the state government supports (or engages in) these same activities. Just like with the direct costs the lawsuit imposes on ExxonMobil, the business uncertainty costs will harm consumers and risk product scarcity.

Vilifying businesses through dramatic lawsuits has unfortunately become a strategy used to raise politicians' profiles in the hope that they can further climb the political ladder. All too often, the economic and legal merits of the case become secondary considerations. If allowed to fester, the expected consequences from these ill-advised lawsuits are slower economic growth and increased financial burdens on families.

Doctors Say Bacterial Pneumonia Increasing, Especially Among Children

SACRAMENTO, CA (MPG) - Cases of pneumonia caused by the bacteria *Mycoplasma*, also known as “walking pneumonia,” have been on the rise this year in the United States, according to the Centers for Disease Control and Prevention.

The agency reports an increase among all age groups across the United States from March 31 to Oct. 5 of this year, with the peak in August, and levels remaining high. The data come from the National Syndromic Surveillance Program and bioMérieux BIOFIRE Syndromic Trends.

Young children, particularly those ages 2 to 4, have been most affected this year, with an increase from 1% to 7.2% among children ages 2 to 4. Children ages 5 to 17 also saw an increase from 3.6% to 7.4%.

Dean Blumberg, chief of pediatric infectious diseases at UC Davis Children’s Hospital, answered some questions about walking pneumonia and what parents and families can do to keep their children healthy. His comments follow below.

What is Mycoplasma Pneumoniae?

“Pneumonia from *Mycoplasma*, also known by the nonmedical term ‘walking pneumonia,’ is caused by the bacteria *Mycoplasma pneumoniae*, which causes a respiratory tract infection. These can be mild infections which, most often, do not require hospitalization, but for some, they can be severe and

require antibiotics to get better. Both children and adults can get pneumonia from *Mycoplasma*.”

What are the Common Symptoms of Pneumonia Caused by Mycoplasma?

“Common symptoms can include fever, cough, sore throat, headache and feeling tired.

It’s often called ‘walking pneumonia’ since some people don’t feel sick enough to stay home but they are still contagious and can spread the disease to others. Complications can occur that require hospital care, including new or worsening asthma, severe pneumonia and encephalitis (inflammation of the brain).

Children under 5 often have different symptoms, including diarrhea, sneezing, sore throat, stuffy or runny nose, vomiting, watery eyes and wheezing

Symptoms typically last for several weeks.

Some infected people may have no symptoms but it can still damage the lining of the respiratory tract, including the throat, windpipe and lungs.”

How is it Spread?

“It can spread person-to-person through the respiratory route, particularly when people are coughing or sneezing. People who live or work in crowded settings are at an increased risk for outbreaks.

It can take one to four weeks for symptoms to appear after someone has been exposed to the bacteria.”

Who is at Highest Risk for This?

“Anyone is susceptible but those recovering from a respiratory illness are at an increased risk for serious infection. Anyone with a weakened immune system or with preexisting lung conditions such as asthma or reactive airway disease are also at greater risk for serious infection.”

Is there a Vaccine Available for Mycoplasma Pneumoniae?

“No, unfortunately there is no vaccine.”

How is it Diagnosed?

“Testing is available through a nose or throat swab PCR test at your doctor’s office.”

How is this Treated?

“Macrolides (such as azithromycin) are a class of antibiotics used commonly to treat bacterial pneumonia including infections caused by *Mycoplasma pneumoniae*. Make sure to take the full course of antibiotics and don’t stop when you start feeling better.”

What are some ways to keep Families Safe?

“I think a lot of families may not have heard of *Mycoplasma pneumoniae* or know that it is going around. I would advise families to follow these common-sense strategies:

Stay home when you are feeling sick. Keep your children away from others if they are not feeling well.

Cover your cough and sneeze and teach your kids to use their batwing to cover their cough or sneeze.

Wear a well-fitted KN95 or N95 mask if you feel sick and need to be out in public or if you are in crowded settings with others. According to the American Academy of Pediatrics, children ages 2 and older can safely wear a mask. But the exception is for anyone who cannot easily remove their own mask or who has trouble breathing.

Those who get worsening symptoms, have difficulty breathing or are unable to keep liquids down, should seek medical attention immediately.” ★

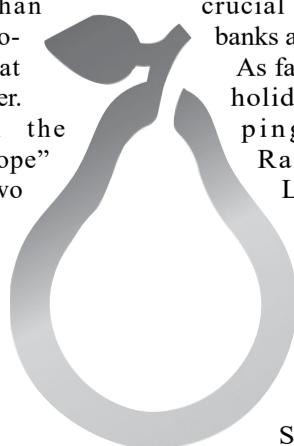
The data, recently released by the California Association of Food Banks, reveals that food insecurity today is similar to that seen in the early months of the COVID-19
