ELK GROVE, CA (MPG) - On a rainy Veterans Day in Elk Grove, nothing stopped veterans from being honored by the 2024 Elk Grove Veterans Day parade hosted by American Legion Post 233.

According to some weather forecasts, there

was going to be rain on Veterans Day, Monday, Nov. 11. However, many floats had been built and many veterans, along with Scouts and Junior Reserves' Training Corps cadets from John F. Kennedy High School, were prepared to march down Elk Grove Boulevard and Elk Grove-Florin Road to Elk Grove

Regional Park to honor those who have selflessly served our nation.

Henry Sanchez, post adjutant and finance officer for American Legion Post 233, said that despite the inclement weather, the parade was still going to happen, rain or shine.

"We are blessed to have the vast majority of the Elk Grove community join us for this celebration," Sanchez said.

Initially, many high school bands were supposed to march in the parade but had to cancel because of the weather conditions. Sanchez noted that it was an understandable decision because of safety concerns. Miguel Ortega, sergeant major

ELK GROVE, CA (MPG) - If you are an artist or an art lover, visit the Elk Grove Fine Arts Center, Since 2008. this nonprofit organization has supported local artists.

"Local artists are contacted by email and invited to have their work curated," said gallery manager Darrci Robertson. "Seventy artists applied this year. We look for quality and composition. When selected, the artists decide on a theme. They create five small panels on precut wood in their chosen medium. We call this project the 'Small Treasures Event."

The artists chose from themes that include landscapes, fish, flowers, portraits, shells, butterflies and dogs. Different media were also used, including oil, pencil drawings, etchings, glass, mosaics, metal and sculpture.

Other displays in the spacious gallery include handmade jewelry, tree ornaments, pottery, ceramics, woodcraft, batik and silk painting. If you are seeking a unique gift for this holiday season, the Christmas boutique is open November through December. An original painting by a local artist makes a one-of-a-kind gift.

Every month, the Elk Grove Arts Center hosts a First Saturday Public Reception from 4 to 7 p.m. Enjoy live music, refreshments and an opportunity to meet the month's featured artists. The next reception will be on Dec.

Decorated with red, white and blue balloons, flowers and other American-themed memorabilia, WellQuest incorporated patriotism into the entire day.



In Lead for Mayor, Singh-Allen Promotes 'Unity'

School Board Incumbents Trailing Challengers in Two Races

ELK GROVE, CA (MPG) - Elk Grove Mayor Bobbie Singh-Allen appeared strongly favored for reelection in early vote counts released Nov. 8. While the two school board trustees up for reelection were trailing their challengers, Elk Grove's incumbent legislative representatives had strong leads.

In her bid for a second four-year term as mayor, Singh-Allen received more than two-thirds of votes counted, 69.3%.

Candidate Brian Pastor was in second place with 19.8%, followed by Lynn Wheat at 10.9%.

In a Facebook message on Nov. 6, Singh-Allen thanked her supporters.

"Thank you Elk Grove for your overwhelming support," Singh-Allen said. "I am humbled with the strong message that our city is heading in the right direction. Let's continue to be an example of good governance and promoting unity over division. Thanks

Wheat thanked "everyone who trusted me with their vote.'

"I invite any who did trust me with their vote to attend future Elk Grove City Council meetings," Wheat said.

Grove City E1kCouncilmembers Darren Suen and Kevin Spease ran for reelection unopposed.

The ballot-counting process takes several weeks and the vote totals are likely to change with each update from the Sacramento County Elections Office. A vote count update is scheduled at 4:15 p.m. Nov. 15 and the next update is at 4:15 p.m. Nov. 19.

As of Nov. 8, the county estimated that 260,000 ballots remain to be counted, with an unknown number containing votes in Elk Grove races.

In the Elk Grove

Unified School District races, incumbent Trustees Anthony Perez and Carmine Forcina were trailing their opponents.


In the vote for Trustee Area 1, Perez had 39% of votes counted, while Susan Davis was in the lead with

Forcina, facing a threeway race for Trustee Area 7, received 28% of ballots, placing him behind Heidi Moore, who led the race with 45.3% of the vote. Rehana Rehman was in third place with 26.8% of votes.


Candidate Jennifer Ballerini had the lead in the vote for the open seat in Trustee Area 6. She had received 61.9% of votes compared with 38.1% for Jacqueline Ortiz.

Voters favored the school district's Measure N bonds, with 58.7% voting yes and 41.3% voting no. It needs a 55% majority to pass.

Elk Grove's current congressional and state



Incumbent Elk Grove Unified School District Trustees Anthony Perez and Carmine Forcina trailed their challengers Susan Davis and Heidi Moore in the school board races. In the race for an open seat, Jennifer Ballerini had the lead.



Rep. Doris Matsui, D-Sacramento, and Assemblymember Stephanie Nguyen appeared likely to hold onto their legislative seats.

Assembly representatives had strong early results, with both getting more than 60% of the votes counted so far.

Rep. Doris Matsui, D-Sacramento, appeared likely to retain her House of Representatives seat representing Congressional District 7. The nine-term congresswoman had 65.4% of votes counted, according to the California Secretary of State. Republican Tom Silva had 34.6% of the

Assemblymember Stephanie Nguyen, D-Elk Grove, also seemed headed for reelection, with 66.1% of the votes. Her opponent, Republican Vinaya Singh, received 34% of the vote.

Sgt. Jim Withers of the Air Force. The National Anthem was then sung by Jim Hall, a local musician.

Next, District 5 County Supervisor Pat Hume spoke.

"I hold a very dear place in my heart for all our veterans," Hume said. "I appreciate all that you have done for our country. Liberty is not free."

Elk Grove Mayor Bobbie Singh-Allen added her own words of gratitude to the veterans, first thanking WellQuest for honoring their veterans, as "not every place does that."

"Our city is blessed," Allen said. "We have a community that always steps up to support our veterans. As an immigrant to this country, I hold America near and dear to my heart."

Following the mayor were three representatives from American River Health Care, who passed out certificates and pins to each of the veterans.

One of their representatives, Brian, spoke a few words before passing out the certificates.

"From the bead Normandy to the mountains of Afghanistan, you faced challenges most of us can only imagine," he said. "You've defended our freedoms, protected our values and shown us the true meaning of courage."

Next, the WellQuest Living Singing Group, led by resident Benna Munger, performed a rendition of "God Bless America," filling the room with patriotic

Following the song was a poetry reading from one of the residents, Diane Baker, whose husband is Colonel Jay Baker of the Air Force.

Baker gave a brief background behind the poem, saying she and Jay visited Vietnam after the war, where she was inspired to write the poem based on war prisoners' experiences.

One of Baker's lines includes, "But deep inside, I still have hope and dream of the day when I, too, will be found and taken away/and fly to my family and friends, then touch the ground of my beloved USA."

WellQuest of Elk Grove Executive Director Elena Cuevas next spoke briefly about her role and how the veterans have impacted

"It is my privilege and graceful honor to serve you every day," Cuevas said to the veterans.

The ceremony ended with Hall's trumpet rendition of "Taps," a military tune that is a call to remember fallen soldiers, often played at military funerals and memorial ceremonies.

After the ceremony, WellQuest veterans led the attendees into a separate

hallway, where the rededicated "Wall of Honor" was unveiled by Cuevas and several of the veterans, including 99-year-old Chief Boatswain Mate Cleveland Cushing of the Navy and Lt. Colonel John Hamilton of the Air Force.

The Wall of Honor displays official photos of all the WellOuest veterans with their names, years served and the branch they were in. Proud family members and friends crowded around the wall, eager to snap photos of their loved ones.

Lastly, Pastor Dr. Roy M. Brown read scripture from John 15:13 and led the entire group in prayer in front of the Wall of Honor.

"America is safer and stronger because these men and women have worn the


uniform," Brown said.

CORE Center Public Art to Draw on Community

ELK GROVE, CA (MPG) - The Cosumnes Community Services District board of directors unanimously approved a \$125,000 contract to install public art at the CORE Recreation Center. The sculpture will use images of value to the community.

The artist selected by a district committee is Sijia Chen, a Los Angeles-based multimedia artist who owns Sijia Chen Studio.

Engineering director Scott Jones said Chen's process of engaging the local community in her artwork set her apart from 13 other applicants.

"So in other words, this artwork isn't just going to be a reflection of Sijia's values, her thoughts, her ideas of what she wants in the art but a reflection of our community's, based on the feedback that we get," Jones said.

The community engagement process will begin with a website where Elk Grove residents can share their thoughts. That will be followed by an in-person workshop with Chen.

Jones read a statement from Chen describing her concept, which would include cutouts of images important to locals.

"In my paper-cut collage paintings, I construct intricate visual narratives using material of personal significance to the community," Jones read. "Immigration forms, menus, personal photos are turned into cut-out shapes, carefully woven together, reflecting the multifaceted layers of individual and shared experiences."

The sculpture would likely stand more than 11

feet tall, with columns made of stainless-steel cutouts. It would be lighted at night, projecting the shapes onto the surrounding space.

Jones said the selection committee was chosen to give a variety of perspectives. Members included Jones and Liz Irons from the Elk Grove Art Commission, and maintenance workers to assess the practicality of maintaining a proposed piece. A fire department inspector, a landscape designer and a recreation manager rounded out the committee.

The \$125,000 appropriation includes the planning and community outreach, engineering and permitting, Chen's design fee, and transportation and installation.

Jones said the art installation would be scheduled for completion in spring 2025, to coincide with

CORE's opening.

Director Angela Spease asked how the sculpture would be protected from rust. Jones replied that the combination of stainless steel and high-grade paint should keep it from rusting. He added that the bottom section of panels will be moveable, allowing maintenance staff to clean inside.

Director Orlando Fuentes commended the selection.

"I love public art. The more, the better, and the

more diverse the artists

are, in terms of how they express themselves through different materials," Fuentes said. "I really like this structure, and I'm looking forward to seeing its completion in the daytime but especially at night, when the lights are on and it's projecting out all of the shapes that are cut out from those stainless-steel panels."

The five board members unanimously approved the contract.

In other business, the board approved the annexation of a property at

8688 Sheldon Road into Community Facilities District No.1 (Elk Grove Fire Protection). Fees paid by property owners within the district support the Cosumnes Fire Department.

Firefighters Burn Institute Executive Director Director Joe Pick thanked the district for its support in the Fill the Boot fundraiser. The proceeds benefit the institute, which provides services for burn survivors. Pick said Cosumnes Fire raised \$28,879.

Despite centuries of genocide and occupation, the Miwok and Nisenan people continue as vibrant and resilient federally recognized tribes, bands, and rancherias. The waters of the Sacramento, American, and Cosumnes Rivers have nourished Miwok and Nisenan tribal communities with cultural and dietary sustenance throughout time. 'Cosumnes' of Cosumnes River derives from the Plains Miwok language. Stemming from the words "kosumu," meaning salmon and "umne," meaning the place of, it translates as "The Place of the Salmon." Today, we celebrate our Miwok and Nisenan tribal neighbors as the ancestral stewards of this land and honor

their sustained existence. It is with their blessing and continued guidance that Cosumnes River College seeks to provide an accessible, equitable, and principled institution of learning."

This month and throughout the year, we are committed to honoring Tribal sovereignty and to continuing our work to establish and maintain legal and ethical relationships with local Tribal Nations. We also support our American Indian and Alaskan Native students and employees. *

Parker said that this event was a good way to celebrate and honor the veterans and to bring the Elk Grove community together.




"We're big supporters, so we make a point to come out and honor the vets," Ming said. "The rain wasn't going to stop us from coming out and honoring those who fought for our country."







During the past 23 years of writing this column, I've occasionally used my platform to cast a negative spotlight on

scoundrels, rascals and scallywags. I've even gone so far as to name the names of the political pundits, candidates and officials who've used their offices to

spew hateful rhetoric on the less fortunate. And I haven't held back my judgments when it comes to the religious field, I've panned plundering preachers for their judgmental-Jesus, churches who've brought politics into the pew, and chaplains who've pressed their views on the

I've censured meandering athletes

Right to Judge or Judging Right

for their marital missteps, disparaged depraved entertainers, and even called out commanders who forced their religion on their subordinates.

My ruminations have occasionally inspired a few readers to insist that I apologize for my judgmental stance toward their cute celebrity, their precious preacher or their nuclear network commentator.

Invariably, there are those who measure my words against Matthew 7:1, "Do not judge, or you too will be judged."

Matthew 7:1-5 is not telling us not to judge, it's telling us HOW to judge. Jesus is saying we can't judge hypocritically. He never suggested that we can't ever judge!

The problem with using the verse against your critics to disqualify their judgments is that the verse loses balance without Jesus' commandment from John 7:24, "Stop judging by mere appearances, but instead judge correctly." (NIV)

The former verse is an admonition against self-serving judgment; the latter verse allows us to make discerningly helpful judgments.

It's useful to understand that the first verse plays a small but important part in Jesus' Sermon on the Mount. It chastises the hypocrites who use their judgmental pronouncements as a smoke screen to hide their own inequities.

This kind of judging is hypocritical and it's not restorative as it only serves to help the judge feel better about him or herself. Over the years, I've heard the verse grafted into a popular philosophy that professes that any kind of judging attitude is

This thinking becomes a flippant way of saying, "I'll ignore your shortcomings if you'll ignore mine."

To that I respond, "No. I won't give you a free pass from criticism and neither will I expect one in return."

At the end of the day, a world without discerning judgments will become a lawless one. That's why it's important to mix in Jesus' words from the above-mentioned

The verse from John 7:24 is a weighty and difficult pronouncement that finds modern clarity in this paraphrase from The Message: "Don't be nitpickers; use your head — and heart! — to discern what is right, to test what is authentically right."

This admonition coaches a more self-reflective attitude toward judgment. It calls for us to apply our discernment in a humble manner. That humility only comes when we acknowledge our own

In other words, even though we may be right in our judgments, we acknowledge that there is a place inside of us that is not yet right — a place that will only be made right in the sight of God.

shortcomings.

Finally, while I have used this column to share my assessments about the actions of others, I will not take God's place in determining someone's eternal spiritual fate.

That verdict belongs to God, whose judgments I would never assume and whose endless love I can only imagine.







Champion believes that constructive criticism is key to the team's growth.

"Once you know each other better, you can give better feedback because you feel more comfortable around them," he noted.

Newcomer Lilia Yeh highlighted some of her initial challenges as a runner.

"I had a hard time keeping up with the other people," she admitted. "I was also really horrible at planning my time properly with all the new practices and meets." Yeh also addressed

the impact of heat on the sport, noting, "Running in heat is harsh on our bodies, but I still believe some heat training is good for preparation." Despite the challenges,

she emphasized the community aspect of cross country as a source of joy.

"I love talking to

everyone during practice and just knowing that I have people who support and believe in me," she said. "It's always so much fun with them!"

Yeh reflected on the diversity within the sport, countering the stereotype that all cross country runners are the same. "I've seen so many different people with various interests. It's wonderful to try different things with cross country people during school.'

Originally drawn to the sport for health benefits and college preparation, Yeh has found a deeper

"I've stayed in it because it's actually fun. I'm kind of addicted to the feeling of passing others during races and just the infectious euphoria I feel."

As the season progresses, the friendships formed through shared struggles become invaluable. "Just do it," Coverrt

advised those considering joining the sport. "The friends you make and the changes you undergo as a person are well worth it."

Elk Grove Moves on to Quarterfinals


ELK GROVE, CA (MPG) - In a game where mistakes were capitalized on, the Elk Grove Thundering Herd defeated the Kimball Jaguars by a score of 32-7 in the first round of the CIF Sac-Joaquin Section playoffs in the Division II playoff bracket.

Fumbles and interceptions were capitalized on by the Herd which led them to run away with the game.

"It was huge and that was the difference in the game this week was getting us those turnovers and giving the ball back to the offense and getting points off of those turnovers was huge for us," head coach of the Herd John Heffernan said.

Even when not scoring off the turnovers, Heffernan said that it kept the Jaguars from scoring.

After going down 7-0 on the first drive but getting

Along with the offense, Heffernan wasn't pleased with the team's execution.

"We just got to execute cleaner and be a lot sharper and we didn't do that today offensively and with a team like Rocklin (their next opponent) we got to be perfect in our execution if we're going to have a chance," Heffernan said.

The dominant performances did not stop there as the Herd's defense was able to stop the run game and play well, Heffernan said, after only surrendering a single score after the Jaguars' first drive.

"Watching film we knew numbers three and two (Jermaine Nance and Josiah Wilson of the Jaguars) were really good and fast so a great job stopping the run and secondary-wise, those interceptions we had really made a big difference," Heffernan said.

The last time the Thunder and Herd clashed was also in the playoffs on Nov. 20, 2009, where the Thunder was victorious by a score of 35-7.

The Herd will travel to Rocklin to take on the Thunder, who achieved a regular season record of 8-2, on Nov. 15 at 7 p.m. in the quarterfinals. ★

What a difference a week makes, and after Sunday night's thrilling overtime win over a much-heralded Phoenix Suns team that had only one loss on their season record, Sacramento Kings fans are flying high.

After a disappointing and somewhat head scratching start, the Kings have climbed out of an 0-2 hole, to post a respectable 6-4 record after ten games.

Sunday's contest featured three Kings players with 20 points or more, with Huerter and Murray chipping in with 17 and 14 points respectively.

Well balanced is the name of the game, and in the fourth quarter, the Suns were without an answer for the mid-range game of both DeRozan and Fox. Both players drove deep into the paint time and time again, only to step back and take easy 6-to-10-foot jumpers that touched nothing but net.

It was a mid-range clinic, and DeMar DeRozan has already given Kings fans a serious dose of what to expect the rest of the season. This heady veteran has the quintessential mid-range jump shot, and he not only makes them with regularity, he has a habit of getting fouled as well.

Fouling DeRozan is probably not the best strategy for opposing teams as he is shooting a sizzling 86.4% from the charity stripe.

Going into the Nov. 10 game against the Suns, remarkably, the cellar dweller Sacramento Kings in 2023/2024 in free throw shooting, were leading the entire league with an 84% success rate. All but one player on the team is averaging 80% or better from the line, and this represents one of the most dramatic turnarounds in many years.

Only bench player Alex Len, shooting a dismal 50% from the line, is struggling, and if this trend continues the Kings will add significantly to their season win total.

Among the most notable contributors are stalwarts DeAaron Fox and Domantas Sabonis, who after averaging a paltry 71% last season, have raised their averages to 86% and 83% respectively. This is a dramatic improvement, and it begs the question, what happened during the off season to contribute to such a remarkable

ason to contribute to such a remarkable approvement?

I have noticed that DeAaron is taking just

a split second longer before releasing the ball, and some wrist action has been eliminated. His shot has more push and less wrist, which will undoubtedly lead to more

made free throws.

Sabonis' shot looks the same, but his concentration looks better, and he's putting more arc on his shot than in seasons before.

All said, we will gladly applaud these early season results and say going from last to first in the NBA in anything deserves noteworthy credit.

After the season's first two games, both losses, pundits and fans alike were wondering how long it would take for 6-time all-star DeMar DeRozan to fit in with his Kings teammates.

The next eight games have answered that question, and with the exception of the Kings 107-98 loss to the Los Angeles Clippers, the Sac Town boys have been in every game this season. The current 6-4 record could easily be 8-2, but without question, the ranks of Sacramento Kings fans are filling every game with excited basketball fans that are ready for a historic season. My prediction of 50 plus wins, barring injury, will not only happen, it will propel this team beyond the first round of the playoffs.

Many fans are hoping and predicting that Monte McNair will make an in-season trade or acquisition that will strengthen the




