Dixon High School Rallies for Veterans

DIXON, CA (MPG) - The spirit of patriotism lives on at Dixon High School as they celebrated Veterans Day with a rally.

Starting at 11:14 a.m. Nov. 8, the Friday before Veterans Day, Dixonites entered the Dixon High School gym to witness the elaborate program the school had prepared.

The public was met with red, white and blue regalia, including star-shaped balloons, colored ribbons, Army National Guard banners, and, of course, American flags. There was a festive air as students piled into the gymnasium, joining military personnel, proud parents and teachers.

The event began with Dixon High School Principal and veteran Angela Brown giving a brief introduction before presenting Dixon High School student Cristian Mata. Mata entertained

the crowd with his rendition of the "Star-Spangled Banner" on electric guitar as Veterans of Foreign Wars Post 1851 presented the colors and saluted the young man's powerful performance.

Sgt. First Class Perez, a member of the Recruitment Retention Battalion in the Army National Guard, then addressed the student body about the significance of Veterans Day and the courage and commitment necessary to make such sacrifices.

"I think it is important to honor those that volunteer," Perez said. "Everyone who wears this uniform chose to do this. Someone that takes the time to fight for our freedom should be honored."

After Perez's speech, Dixon High School senior Humberto Maza was sworn into the Army National Guard. His family joined him in the center of the gym as his peers cheered Continued on page 3

City Council to Review **Homeless Camping Ordinances**

DIXON, CA (MPG) - At the Nov. 5 Dixon City Council meeting, city Treasurer James Ward presented a quarterly treasurer report, stating, "We're in good financial shape."

Ward said that more than 60 percent of the city's investments are an AA+ rating, "so we're doing well." The company that handles the city's asset investments is currently undergoing a system change, so exact numbers will be provided after that change is finalized. But, Ward said, the prior quarter was financially positive and this quarter showed even more improvement.

Deputy city attorney Nubia Goldstein presented an update regarding ordinances against homeless encampments, as requested by Councilmember Don Hendershot.

Goldstein explained that a recent Supreme Court ruling (Grants Pass v. Johnson) overturned prior restrictions on state and local governments' ability to enforce ordinances criminalizing behaviors related to homelessness, such as camping or sleeping in public places. Governments now have the authority to ban public camping and implement fines and arrests.

In response to the new ruling, Gov. Gavin Newsom issued an executive order earlier this year ordering the removal of homeless encampments on state properties, while also ensuring homeless individuals are given reasonable notice to move, or later retrieve, their belongings. The directive also requires that individuals be offered supportive services. While the executive order only applies to state properties, it does encourage local jurisdictions to adopt similar policies.

Goldstein cautioned that despite the ruling, there are still legal limitations, so selecting policies that align with those of the state could reduce the city's potential for litigation. She added that issuing fines is only an effective tool if people can pay them; otherwise, it will lead to issues of implementation and administration. Goldstein suggested it would be best to ensure any city policies provide due process and offer reasonable enforcement measures.

When Caltrans cleans up homeless camps along the highways, Hendershot said, "those people are going to migrate into our Continued on page 3

DIXON, CA (MPG) - There was a mean trick played on the Veterans Hall the day before Halloween, costing them hundreds of dollars in damage and about \$800 in cash kept in the safe from two fundraising dinners.

The Solano County Sheriff's Office was called when Wayne Holland, a past Post 208 Commander who handles the grocery shopping for the Friday night and various fundraising dinners, came to the hall to unload groceries and noticed the break-in at about 8:30

"The office door was open and that was unusual because we always close and lock it," Holland said. "I checked the bar area and noticed the cash register open. That's when I called dispatch."

The Solano County Sheriff's Department handles cases for the Veteran's Memorial Hall because the building is owned by Solano County and that is protocol. In the discovery, four bags of money were stolen. There

was money from the bar, petty cash, dinners, and about \$200 from lottery ticket sales.

"It's frustrating to come in and find it all gone. This is money we need to run the hall. I felt like I wanted to quit. I wanted to hand in my spatula... and my ladle. I'm here every day. If there are cooks who want to come in and cook...," Holland said.

Said Leah Marlin, "It's iust so discouraging."

Marlin is a member of the American Legion Post 208 Women's Auxiliary. She is the volunteer office manager who helps coordinate hall use, including funerals and various fundraising activities.

"The person or people had to have used a crescent wrench or pipe wrench to break in the way they did and came in the back door. Then, broke every handle of every door down the hall...never touched anything in the offices but broke every door so we have to have each of them repaired," Marlin said.

They both were surprised no liquor was taken from the bar that is open

for special events and the Friday night dinners.

"I'm not a drinker but if I broke into a bar, I would have at least taken one bottle," Holland, who has lived in Dixon nearly 45 years, added with a laugh. He also noted that they were deeply appreciative of the Dixon Soccer Club that 'passed a hat' for them at their Saturday night recognition dinner at the hall to help defray repair expenses.

"They donated a whopping \$300," he added.

There are currently 137 members in Post 208, but Holland was quick to add that there were 228 members when he transferred to the club 15 years ago. As of 2024, dues are \$45 per year but will increase to \$50 per year in 2025.

"We need more—and vounger-members to join," he said.

Both Marlin and Holland gave credit to the Napa/Solano Veteran Riders Motorcycle Club for their support, but they also encouraged any local military to consider helping to keep the Greg 'Coach' Coppes Veterans Memorial Hall open by joining.

The Legion advocates for veterans'needs, including better pay, housing, and medical care. They also lobby for benefits, such as pensions and the Veterans Health Administration. The Legion offers services like temporary housing, mentoring, job training, career assistance, education assistance and family and community support. cities." Hendershot said he requested this information because the council needs to know the background to understand what they can do.

Councilmember Thom Bogue said that fines for the homeless do not make sense: "How are they going to pay that?"

Bogue said the presentation helped explain all the challenges, since "it's not nearly as simple as I thought it was going to be." Bogue said the council needs to "tread lightly and carefully in how we put things together in this going forward."

Councilmember Kevin Johnson suggested the council should review any relevant ordinances currently on the books.

"If we have it, it should be easy to understand, it should be enforceable, it should be something that's reasonable. And if it's not, it should be changed or removed."

Johnson said the next step should be to bring existing policies back to the council for a thorough review.

Councilmember Jim Ernest suggested it might be best to wait and see, because one side sees the restrictions as unreasonable and inhumane while the other side sees criminalization as a tool to force mental health treatment. Ernest said that bigger decisions need to be made at the national level before they implement any new policy at the local level.

During public comment, one resident said, "It looks like we're chasing an issue that doesn't exist. We have no public camping around here."

He said the city should wait to see the outcome of Gov. Newsom's plans for cleaning up homelessness in Sacramento, because if the governor isn't able to solve the problem, a smaller city likely won't have much success either.

"We need to put the problem back where it lies," with the closure of mental health facilities, the resident said. "We don't want to criminalize this" and run into problems with potential litigation. "I think we should be finding solutions for the homelessness, not simply getting them out of one place and having them move somewhere else."

Mayor Steven Bird said staff had enough direction from council to move forward with bringing applicable ordinances to a future meeting for review.

The next Dixon City Council meeting is scheduled for 7 p.m. Nov. 19. ★

My wife and I have paid off all our consumer debt, and we're in Baby Step 3 building up our emergency fund to six months of expenses. When do you recommend buying a new car in the process? Do we have to wait until we've finished all the Baby Steps?

Dear Aaron,

Congratulations! two are taking really positive steps forward in gaining control of your finances. I'm proud of you!

Ok, I'm not sure if you're talking about buying a newer car-like a great two- or three-yearold model-or an actual new car. I don't advise buying a brand new car, unless you have a net worth of at least \$1 million. Why? Because at that point, you've got enough assets that you won't get rocked by the crazy depreciation that comes with buying a brand new vehicle.

Don't get all down after hearing this. I'm not saying you should drive a junker until you pay off your house. I recommend that people drive the minimum they can in terms of a car until they complete the first three Baby Steps. As you already know, Baby Step 1 is a beginner emergency fund of \$1,000. Baby Step 2 is paying off all debt except for your home, and Baby Step 3 is fully funding

This Isn't Just a Dispute

Dear Dave,

Recently, my husband and I discovered that his ex-wife used his Social Security number to open three or four credit card accounts. We've called the credit card companies, and we've disputed the charges and explained the situation. Is there anything else we can do?

Dear Kendra,

File a police report immediately, and if possible, have this woman arrested. That may sound harsh, but the fact is she has committed criminal fraud. That's not something you, or anyone else, should take lightly. If you haven't already, make sure you both also put fraud victim alerts on your credit reports immediately.

I'm very serious about this, Kendra. Don't stop with just alerting the credit card companies. You should be speaking with, and communicating via email—plus snail mail directly with the fraud victim division at every credit card company involved. And here's the really important part. Make sure they understand that this is a denial of responsibility on your part—not simply a dispute.


Try to be nice, and let them know you're sorry this happened. But clearly explain that all these charges are the result of a criminal act perpetrated against you. You may have to stand your ground with some of the credit card companies, because they might try to lay a guilt trip on you—or outright lie to get you to pay the bills. Don't do it. These charges are not your responsibility. I'm really sorry this

happened to you folks.

This Veterans Day, I want you to do more than just thank a veteran for his or her service.

As a veteran of 28 years, I want to challenge you to go beyond patriotic rhetoric by asking some specific questions of the veterans you encounter.

First, ask us what we did in military service. Don't worry; our stories aren't just about bombs and bullets and boats.

For instance, most of us would love to tell you about how we deployed on more than a few humanitarian missions. If you ask, we'll tell about operations

like "New Horizon," where we built schools, clinics and playgrounds all over South America. Some of us can tell you about clean-

ing up New Orleans after Hurricane Katrina, while others will tell you about flying into countries devastated from earthquakes or tsunamis.

Ask us what we did, and we might recollect building runways in the desert, pitching tents in the jungle, hot-loading a plane, setting up communications links in the Australian outback and launching a satellite that gave you the cable TV you enjoy.

Get us talking and we'll tell you about fixing planes, loading planes, flying planes, jumping from planes, fueling planes in flight.

As a chaplain, I can tell you about the blessings I prayed over planes as well as the blessing I had of walking away from a plane crash.

This generation of service members might lose you in their technical talk, but I assure you they are proud to talk about the satellites they control, the drones they fly and the cyber warfare they engage.

They'll likely share their version of Johnny Cash's song, "I've Been Everywhere."

They've filled passports doing temporary duty in places like Antigua, Ukraine and Djibouti on the Horn of

They've flown planes over the North Pole, landed them on the South Pole and navigated submarines under both.

Thankfully, the stories of most servicemembers run the course of everyday life; albeit a life of transfers every two or three years, endless inspections and exercises, family separations, and making ends meet on military pay.

It was a life of long ago, but it was life from only yesterday.

California Will Likely Feel the Consequences of Donald Trump's Decisive Victory

Elections have consequences, as California is likely to learn when Donald Trump once again moves

into the White House. The state has been a bastion of anti-Trump sentiment ever since the bombastic billionaire real estate tycoon first ventured into politics nearly a decade ago.

Its political figures particularly Gov. Gavin Newsom, former House Speaker Nancy Pelosi and U.S. Senator-elect Adam Schiff — have sought and achieved notoriety for their public denunciations of Trump.

Trump has responded in kind. As president, he attempted to thwart some California policies, such as its reductions of farmers' supplies, and as a candidate portraying Vice President Kamala Harris's home state as a hellhole of crime and social decay.

There's no reason to believe that Trump, despite election night promises to bridge the nation's stark conflicts, will not continue using California as a punching bag during his second stint as president.

The agricultural water conflict is likely to resurface because the state is still trying to reduce farmers' share. Trump's promised crackdown on undocumented immigrants would likely what will be a clutch of have its greatest impact on California. The state's aggressive crusade to reduce reliance on carbon-based fuels will conflict with Trump's pledge to ramp up oil and gas production.

That's just three points of friction between California and Trump's second presidency, and many more are out there such as gun control and transgender participation in women's sports.

California officialdom appears ready for four years of confrontation. On election night, Assembly Speaker Robert Rivas told Politico, "California will do everything we can to protect America from Donald Trump." Attorney General Rob Bonta promised to wage legal battles against Trump on gun control and abortion rights, telling the political news outlet, "We have gone down to the detail of what court do we file in."

Positioning as a Trump foe is a slam dunk tactic for California politicians, especially those, such as Bonta, who may aspire to succeed Newsom as governor two years hence.

But, one might wonder, what does Harris's defeat and Trump's victory bode for Newsom? He will no doubt lead the opposition if Trump tries to punish the state, as he anticipated in a recent interview.

"They're not going to wait to wind up. It's ready, fire, aim — not ready, aim, fire," Newsom said. "And that is going to create a dynamic that will be profound in two senses — from a governing perspective and also from a

political attack perspective." However, would he take the next step of joining

Democratic politicians angling to succeed Trump in

While laboriously building a national political profile in the last two years, Newsom repeatedly denied any ambition of becoming a presidential candidate, saving at one point he has "sub-zero interest."

National political media never bought the line and continued to portray him as a potential aspirant for the White House. However, whatever ambition Newsom may have had if Joe Biden bowed out this year was dashed when Democratic leaders immediately anointed

Harris as the substitute. Her decisive defeat probably means that she has hit the political ceiling, particularly since initial election night finger-pointing dwelled on her shortcomings as a candidate, as well as the Democratic Party. The door is now open for Newsom to run, unless he truly intends to finish out his second term as governor and return to life as a restaurateur and wine merchant.

Newsom has spent half of his 57 years climbing up the political ladder, one rung at a time. Is he really willing to give it up? What he does in the coming months, either entering the Democratic Party's forthcoming battle royale or exiting the national political arena, will answer the question.

SACRAMENTO, CA (MPG) - California Secretary of State Shirley N. Weber, Ph.D., reminds all Californians that county elections officials are hard at work continuing to count ballots from the Nov. 5 General Election. County elections officials have up to

30 days after Election Day to complete their extensive tallying, auditing, and certification work (known as the "official canvass"). The frequency of updated results varies by county. As of Nov. 7, California's county elec-

tions officials have already processed and counted 10,728,985 million ballots from the Nov. 5 General Election. County elections officials estimate 5,472,423 million outstanding ballots remain to be processed and counted. The unprocessed ballots report—a compilation of estimates from county elections officials—is available at electionresults.sos.ca.gov/ unprocessed-ballots-status.

Vote-by-mail ballots postmarked on or before Election Day and received by county elections officials no later than 7 days after Election Day must be processed.

"County elections officials have been hard at work processing and counting the millions of ballots cast by California voters. Ensuring the accuracy and the integrity of the vote count is critical to our democracy. State law gives county elections officials up to 30 days after Election Day to complete vote counting. auditing, and certification," Secretary of State Shirley N. Weber said. "In California, we work to ensure every ballot is counted properly and every ballot is accounted for," Secretary Weber added. County elections officials must report

their final results to the Secretary of State for the Presidential contest by Dec. 3 and all other state and federal contests by Dec. 5. The Secretary of State will certify the results on Dec. 13. For additional information about

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Achieving Organic Targets May Require Creating New Markets

In April, Gov. Gavin Newsom's administration announced California will aim to convert 10% of its cropland to organic agriculture by 2030. Those targets could be a heavy lift in light of recent trends in organic acreage. In 2022, the most recent year with data reported, about 4% of the state's cropland was organic, and after years of expansion, the share of acreage that was organic had declined for two straight years. Some stakeholders are pushing for the state government—as a major food buyer for schools, prisons and other publicly funded institutions—to leverage its purchasing power to create the market needed for California to achieve its goals.

State Water Board Announces Draft Updates to Bay-Delta Plan

California water officials are taking another step forward as part of a broader process to improve conditions for struggling fish populations in the San Francisco Bay and the Sacramento-San Joaquin Delta and its tributaries. Last week, the California State Water Resources Control Board announced draft updates for the Sacramento River and Delta phase of the state's water quality control plan, known as the Bay-Delta plan. Thad Bettner, executive director of the Sacramento River Settlement Contractors, a group that holds contracts with the U.S. Bureau of Reclamation to divert water from the Sacramento River, said the draft updates mark the beginning of the implementation process, which he said "could have significant impacts on agriculture and the environment."

Farmers are in peak season producing Japanese dried persimmons

Otow Orchard in Placer County is in full swing producing hoshigaki, traditional Japanese dried persimmons. Each year, farm owners Tosh and Chris Kuratomi set aside some of the persimmons grown on their 40-acre property, and over about three to six weeks, handpeel the fruit, string it onto a rack and massage it every three to five days until it's sufficiently dried into a sugary delicacy. They then package it and sell it at their farmstand and by mail order. This year's persimmon crop has been plentiful but with small fruit, Tosh Kuratomi said, adding that he's almost running out of rack space. As usual, customer demand nearly is exceeding supply, even at a cost of \$60 per pound mail order or \$37 per pound at the farm

Online Grocery Shopping Continues to Gain Popularity

A recent report from the U.S. Department of Agriculture highlights a significant shift toward online grocery shopping in the U.S. It notes that about one in five individuals who typically do household grocery shopping made an online purchase in the past month. Shoppers most likely to shop online were women, ages 15-24, non-Hispanic White, married or partnered, from a household with young children and more educated. Time constraints were the top reason for shopping online. Pickup and delivery options were used almost equally. USDA noted that the rise in online grocery shopping presents opportunities to improve food access, encourage healthier choices and reshape the grocery retail landscape.

DA's Office Receives Grant for Specialized DUI Prosecution Team

You can count on the Hallmark Channel to fill their schedule with a surfeit of Christmas movies. It happens every year, and this one is no exception.

Kings Korner By V.G. Harris



What a difference a week makes, and after Sunday night's thrilling overtime win over a much-heralded Phoenix Suns team that had only one loss on their season record, Sacramento Kings fans are flying high.

After a disappointing and somewhat head scratching start, the Kings have climbed out of an 0-2 hole, to post a respectable 6-4 record after ten games.

Sunday's contest featured three Kings players with 20 points or more, with Huerter and Murray chipping in with 17 and 14 points respectively.

Well balanced is the name of the game, and in the fourth quarter, the Suns were without an answer for the mid-range game of both DeRozan and Fox. Both players drove deep into the paint time and time again, only to step back and take easy 6-to-10-foot jumpers that touched nothing

It was a mid-range clinic, and DeMar DeRozan has already given Kings fans a serious dose of what to expect the rest of the season. This heady veteran has the quintessential mid-range jump shot, and he not only makes them with regularity, he has a habit of getting fouled as well.

Fouling DeRozan is probably not the best strategy for opposing teams as he is shooting a sizzling 86.4% from the charity stripe.

Going into the Nov. 10 game against the Suns, remarkably, the cellar dweller Sacramento Kings in 2023/2024 in free throw shooting, were leading the entire league with an 84% success rate. All but one player on the team is averaging 80% or better from the line, and this represents one of the most dramatic turnarounds in many years.

Only bench player Alex Len, shooting a dismal 50% from the line, is struggling, and if this trend continues the Kings will add significantly to their season win total.

Among the most notable contributors are stalwarts DeAaron Fox and Domantas Sabonis, who after averaging a paltry 71% last season, have raised their averages to 86% and 83% respectively. This is a dramatic improvement, and it begs the question, what happened during the off season to contribute to such a remarkable improvement?

I have noticed that DeAaron is taking just

a split second longer before releasing the ball, and some wrist action has been eliminated. His shot has more push and less wrist, which will undoubtedly lead to more made free throws.

Sabonis' shot looks the same, but his concentration looks better, and he's putting more arc on his shot than in seasons before.

All said, we will gladly applaud these early season results and say going from last to first in the NBA in anything deserves noteworthy credit.

After the season's first two games, both losses, pundits and fans alike were wondering how long it would take for 6-time all-star DeMar DeRozan to fit in with his Kings teammates.

The next eight games have answered that question, and with the exception of the Kings 107-98 loss to the Los Angeles Clippers, the Sac Town boys have been in every game this season. The current 6-4 record could easily be 8-2, but without question, the ranks of Sacramento Kings fans are filling every game with excited basketball fans that are ready for a historic season. My prediction of 50 plus wins, barring injury, will not only happen, it will propel this team beyond the first round of the playoffs.

Many fans are hoping and predicting that Monte McNair will make an in-season trade or acquisition that will strengthen the


