

GALT, CA (MPG) - Galt planning staff clarified the status of an application from a fuel and convenience store chain, saying at the Nov. 14 Planning Commission meeting that it has been the subject of east of Highway 99. "false information" on social media.

Galt Interim Community Development Director Amie Mendes said she has been fielding calls about an application to build a Maverik gas station and convenience store in the Galt Ranch development area, which is north of the

this is not a truck stop," Mendes told the commissioners. "There is no truck parking associated with this particular site plan that we're reviewing."

According to the city website, if approved, the 4-acre location would include 26 gas pumps, five commercial fuel islands, two truck scales and an RV sewage dump.

There would also be a nearly 6,000-square-foot convenience store, which Mendes said would include a hot-food counter.

Maverik has locations in multiple Western states, with nine stores in California, according to its

GALT. CA (MPG) - A second community meeting on Galt's Parks and Recreation Master Plan is set for December, Parks and Recreation Director Armando Solis said at the Parks and Recreation Commission's Nov. 13 regular meeting.

Besides the master plan, Solis gave updates on the Galt Skatepark renovations and the Gora Aquatic Center waterslide replacement.

Parks and rec staff have discussed the Parks, Recreation and Open Space Master Plan with multiple community groups the past few months, including older adults, youth sports and community groups, and nonprofit organizations.

## **Toy Drive Applications Open**

GALT, CA (MPG) - First responders are accepting applications from families for the annual Galt Toy Drive. The drive provides holiday gifts for Galt families in need and the deadline to apply is Dec. 5. Toy donations are also open.

Galt Police Department and Cosumnes Fire Department partner each year on the giveaway, which helps hundreds of local families make the season bright for their children. For example, the 2023 drive benefited 625 kids from more than 300 families in Galt.

Galt Community Service Officer Colby Cuthbertson said this year's drive is on track for a similar number of recipients.

On distribution day, a large room is filled to bursting with paper bags, each loaded with toys handpicked by volunteers, who work to get each set of gifts to its recipient. Children can visit with Santa Claus as they collect their presents. Wrapping paper and other supplies are on hand so families can wrap the gifts for the big day.

"One of the big things we get from these families is relief," said Cuthbertson, who organizes the drive. "This program is the only opportunity they have for a holiday season."

Cuthbertson said the drive's goal is to give recipients "one less thing to stress about for the holiday season and really try to bring those toys and that holiday cheer to everyone in that household.'

plan will lay out community priorities for parks and rec and help guide Galt City Council as it decides how to distribute revenue from the Measure Q sales tax. A workshop in August gathered residents' initial comments on the city's services.

Galt parks and rec users are encouraged to take an online survey about how they use the city's offerings and what changes they want. The survey is at surveymonkey.com/r/ h7c2z7x.

Solis said a second and final workshop has been scheduled for 6 p.m. Dec. 12 at Littleton Community Center. Afterward, consulting firm RHAA will compile the information and present it to the commission in early 2025.

Bidding has closed for those interested in doing engineering and design work on the Galt Skatepark renovation. Solis said the city received four bids and is reviewing them.

Once the design is complete, the city will seek a construction contractor, with the goal of starting construction in late 2025.

Commissioner Chris Brossman asked about the renovation's projected cost and Solis said it depends on the revamp's extent. The commission will first make a recommendation on whether to do a more limited project or expand the park with permanent concrete features; City Council will then make the

#### final decision.

Turning to the Gora waterslide, Solis said he expected construction to begin in late 2025 after the awarding of a construction contract. The new slide will be 30 feet tall.

The manufacturer is "projecting July to have the slide completed to start installation. But if they have it in late July, I would prefer just to wait until (the pool) is closed in August, so it doesn't disrupt any of the pool," Solis said.

City Council had been slated to consider the construction contract on Nov. 19, but Solis told the Herald that the item was pulled.

With three Galt City Council members either not seeking reelection or taking a new office, the terms of their appointees on the commission will end. Those appointees, Commissioners Ernie Cason Jr., Chris Smith and Jed McNamara; can request to be considered for reappointment. Other Galt residents can apply for consideration; application forms are online at cityofgalt.org/government/ city-commissions-committees.

The commission will hold a special meeting at 6 p.m. Dec. 2 in the City Hall conference room, to provide feedback on the Walker Park Conceptual Master Plan. Solis said this scheduling is intended to get a final meeting in before the end of Cason's, Smith's and McNamara's terms. It will take at least a few weeks for the new councilmembers to reappoint them or select new commissioners; until at least one of the open seats is filled, the commission won't be able to form a quorum. ★

## Grant Funding Aims to Restore and Protect Thriving Forest Ecosystems

**SACRAMENTO, CA (MPG)** - The California Department of Forestry and Fire Protection (CAL FIRE) is announcing the availability of up to \$70 million in funding for projects aimed at improving forest health across the state. CAL FIRE is soliciting applications for projects that work to proactively prevent catastrophic wildfires and restore forests to healthy, functioning ecosystems while also sequestering carbon and reducing greenhouse gas emissions.

Applications will be accepted from Nov. 13 and are due by no later than 3 p.m. Jan. 15, 2025.

"We know this work makes a difference both in forest health and wildfire resilience and that is why CAL FIRE is proud to have awarded over \$700 million in Forest Health grant funding since 2017," said Chief Matthew Reischman, Deputy Director of Resource Management. "This Forest Health grant funding supports sustainable land management practices, reforestation efforts, promotes a healthier ecosystem, and ensures that future generations can enjoy and benefit from California's natural resources."

The Forest Health Program funds active restoration and reforestation activities aimed at providing for more resilient and sustained forests. This ensures the future existence of forests in California while also mitigating climate change, protecting communities from fire risk, strengthening rural economies, and improving California's water and air.

A virtual pre-recorded workshop will be made available to explain the grant process and requirements. Please check the Forest Health webpage at www.fire. ca.gov/what-we-do/grants/forest-health to view the workshop. Any questions can be directed to ForestHealth@fire.ca.gov.

Projects that receive funding from the Forest Health grant program are designed to complement the California Forest Carbon Plan, California's Natural and Working Lands Implementation Plan, California's Wildfire & Forest Resilience Action Plan, California's Strategic Plan for Expanding the Use of Beneficial Fire, and AB 32 Climate Change Scoping Plan.

The Forest Health grant program is part of California Climate Investments, a statewide program that puts billions of cap-and-trade dollars to work reducing greenhouse gas emissions, strengthening the economy, and improving public health and the environment, particularly in disadvantaged communities.

Projects will reduce the risks to California's forests from extreme disturbance events including catastrophic wildfires, drought, disease, and pest mortality.

Continued from page 1 Galt senior planner Kristyn Bitz said the application isn't complete yet and is likely to come before the Planning

Commission for consideration in the first quarter of E 2025.

Commissioner Dan Denier said he was reserving judgment on the matter.

"I told a few people I have no opinion of something that I have not seen. I cannot make an opinion one way or another on something I have not seen, and that's, I think, the entire commission at this point," Denier said.

The commissioners unanimously approved architectural designs for a section of the Elliott Ranch development between Boessow and Simmerhorn roads.

The section, called Unit 2, consists of 112 single-family residential lots on the east side of Carillion Boulevard. The developer, Elliott Homes, presented four floor plans, which will have three style variations each: craftsman, farmhouse and contemporary. Bitz called the contemporary look "unique and a first time for Galt."

"So we don't have a contemporary elevation really anywhere else in town," Bitz added. "This being built in Elk Grove, and evidently it's doing well up there. It gives buyers a new option that they don't have currently in Galt."

Unit 2 is divided into a slightly denser section north of Officer Tonn Parkway and a less dense section to the south. The houses in the denser area will range from about 1,600 square feet to 2,300 square feet. Houses in the less dense area will be 2,000 to 2,700 square feet. The 2,700-squarefoot houses will feature an auxiliary dwelling unit or in-law suite.

The overall Elliott Ranch project, formerly known as Simmerhorn Ranch, will have 429 single-family units along with sites for a park and an elementary school. In 2022, the Planning Commission previously approved a different section of the development, Veranda at Simmerhorn Ranch.

Bitz said Elliott Homes has added embellishments to the exterior designs, including faux brick and faux stone treatments, and shutters.

The commissioners approved the designs with minimal comment, which Commissioner Bonnie Rodriguez explained.

"I do want to make it public that the reason why there's not a lot of conversation is because we've been looking at these for quite a while and staff has been able to discuss these things with the developer," Rodriguez said.

In news on other developments, Mendes said that Tim Lewis Communities has applied to build at the Liberty Ranch subdivision on Marengo Road. Liberty Ranch is split into "villages" that different homebuilders can develop. The Galt Planning Commission is set to consider the application at its Dec. 12 meeting.





## **Do You Relish Cranberry Relish?**

Or another idea: In 1789, President George Washington issued a proclamation designating Nov. 26 of that year as a "Day of Publick Thanksgiving" (yes, that is how it was spelled) to recognize the role of providence in creating the new United States and the federal Constitution.

In 1863, President Abraham Lincoln designated the National Day of Thanksgiving to be the last Thursday in November. But 75 years later, in 1938, President Roosevelt changed it to the third Thursday in November. But according to the Farmer's Almanac that wasn't very popular, so three years later it was changed to the fourth Thursday of November.

The Farmer's Almanac also says it's important to note that it wasn't Lincoln, or anyone else for that matter, who declared the Friday after Thanksgiving as the National Day of Shopping, aka Black Friday.

So now you know. On to what needs to happen now — by now you should have your home clean and decorated, the table and chairs in place, and your guest list and what your guests are bringing to share under the turkey magnet on the refrigerator along with the menu for the day, including appetizers and desserts, all the ingredients you will need for the day, the linens, glassware, and silverware readily available.

A helpful hint: If you are serving buffet style, draw a map of the flow of your serving area so your guests aren't backtracking. One more thought, if some of your guests offer to do the dishes, say yes. Let them fill the dishwasher, wash and dry the rest and leave them for you to put away. One less chore for you to do.

Leftovers? Now is the time to use all those plastic containers you couldn't bear to throw away throughout the year and fill them with the leftovers. Sharing is caring. And the containers have a no-return policy, unless they are returned with homemade cookies and brownies in them.

From my family to yours, may you have a blessed, "fulfilling" Thanksgiving, feast on the bounty the Lord has provided, enjoy the comfort of your family and friends, take lots of photos, gobble till you wobble, and have a good nap. Safe travel to those on the move, be mindful, and be a blessing to those around you.

# New Republic FC Stadium Back on Track

#### By Daniel Canfield

**SACRAMENTO, CA (MPG)** - A project that was on life support had some much-needed life injected into it on Tuesday, Nov. 12, when the Sacramento City Council voted unanimously to approve the framework for a \$321 million downtown railyards soccer stadium and entertainment venue. A long-awaited development needed to provide a permanent home for the Sacramento Republic Football Club (FC).

According to the information provided by council staff in support of the proposal, the projects being approved include a soccer stadium with supporting infrastructure occupying approximately 31 acres, as well as a new 3600-seat live entertainment venue that would occupy existing historic buildings in the railyard.

The agreement, albeit non-binding, does include information regarding project costs, economic impact and anticipated public and private funding sources. The estimated \$321 million price tag breaks down to, \$175 million for the new stadium, \$56 million for the new live entertainment venue and \$90 million for associated

infrastructure. The projects altogether are expected to generate more than 1,500 jobs for the Sacramento region. The agreement includes a provision by which the city would waive reimbursement for municipal services for off-site police, fire, emergency medical services, traffic control and code enforcement for stadium events for up to a maximum of \$300,000 per year for a ten-year period. The official press release from the city indicates the new stadium will be supported and privately financed by the Wilton Rancheria Tribe which became majority owners of Sacramento Republic FC on Nov. 7. The press release includes a quote from Mayor Darrel Steinberg on the importance of the council's vote.

"We are breaking barriers and making history here in Sacramento," said Mayor Steinberg. "Wilton Rancheria is the first tribe to own a professional men's sports team in North America, and the projects in The Railyards will double the size of the central business district what an incredible opportunity! This is the foundation for something beautiful today that will become even more beautiful in the years and decades to come."

In a Nov. 7 press conference, in advance of the Nov. 12 council vote, city officials joined together with representatives of Sacramento Republic FC, Downtown Railyards Venture LLC and Wilton rancheria Tribe members to celebrate the new energy being pumped into the soccer stadium/railyard development. At the press conference, Wilton Rancheria Chairman Jesus Tarango commented on the importance of the project.

"I am deeply proud to witness this moment, which stands as a profound testament to the resilience and determination of the people of Wilton Rancheria," said Chairman Tarango. "In just over a decade, our Tribe has transformed from landless to becoming a significant economic force in the region. The opportunity to drive a project of such scale and importance, on land where our ancestors once walked, is deeply meaningful. This is not only a chance to honor our history and uplift our community, but also to envision a future where we are not only part of Sacramento's past, but an integral part of its future as well."

According to the city, the stadium project is scheduled for completion by late 2026, and the entertainment venue by 2027.  $\star$

Facing teams from across the nation, the Hornet tandem opened their run with a straight-set victory over Emilia Valentinsson and Sara Zalukar from Miami University, 7-5, 6-3, then outlasted Bryant's team of Caitlyn Munson and Natalia Vela in three sets, 5-7, 6-4, 10-4.

Ferreros and Riva continued to roll on day two, easing past the Naval Academy's Emily Tannenbaum and Parvathi Shanker, 6-2, 6-0, before suffering their first loss of the tournament in the semifinals to Appalachian State's Savannah Dada-Mascoll and Isabella Romanichen, 6-3, 6-1.

With the top three doubles teams earning a spot in the NCAA Tournament, Ferreros and Riva faced off against Celia-Belle Mohr and Sophia Webster from Vanderbilt for third place, winning the first set in a tiebreaker, 7-6 (5), before falling by the scores of 6-0 and 10-5 to finish fourth.

In singles, sophomore Lou Baudoin fell in her main draw opening round match to Charleston Southern's Marina Skegro, 2-6, 6-4, 6-2, but rebounded in the consolation draw defeating Illinois-Chicago's Mayu Ushio, 4-6, 6-1, 6-2, and advancing to the semifinals with a walkover against South Carolina State's Sofiya Chursina.

In the semis, Baudouin was finally subdued, falling to South Dakota's Beata Havlickova, 6-0, 6-4.

The Hornets have wrapped up the fall portion of the team's schedule and will open the spring championship season on Jan. 26 at home against the University of the Pacific.  $\star$





WEST SACRAMENTO, CA (MPG) - First pitch of the A's inaugural game at Sutter Health Park in West Sacramento will take place at 7:05 p.m. on Monday, March 31, as the Athletics take on the Chicago Cubs.

Across the 81-game home slate, the A's will play 60 night games, including 25 of their 28 games in June and July. Eleven of the A's 21 total day games will be played in April and May, with only six Sunday day games scheduled from June through August. Night games begin at 7:05 p.m.

The home schedule features matchups against eight National League clubs, including the San Diego Padres (April 7-9), New York Mets (April 11-13), Philadelphia Phillies (May 23-25), San Francisco Giants (July 4-6), Atlanta Braves (July 8-10), Arizona Diamondbacks (Aug. 1-3), and Cincinnati Reds (Sept. 12-14).

The A's will play at home for three

popular summer holidays, taking on the New York Yankees on Mother's Day (May 11), the Phillies over Memorial Day Weekend (May 23-25), and the Giants on Independence Day (July 4).

The A's will share Sutter Health Park with the Sacramento River Cats. MLB and MiLB have coordinated home schedules to accommodate both teams, ensuring that there are no instances in which both teams play at home on the same day.

The 60 home night games would tie the 1968 A's for the most in a season in franchise history.

A's season tickets for 2025 are on sale now and will be released in phases.

Current A's season ticket holders will be notified when seats comparable to their 2024 plan are available to purchase.

Fans who have placed a season ticket deposit will be notified based on priority when tickets are available for purchase. Single-game tickets will go on sale in early 2025.

The Sacramento Kings were 2-2 in the past week, but that doesn't begin to tell the tale

Beginning with a disappointing 116-96 loss to the San Antonio Spurs and concluding with a thrilling 121-117 win over the Utah Jazz, the Sac Town ballers had an up and down week that ended on a high note.

Sadly, injuries played a role, sidelining big man Domantas Sabonis and newcomer all-star DeMar DeRozan, both with lower back issues.

In between the Spurs and the Jazz, saw the Kings take a tough overtime loss to a talented Minnesota Timberwolves team, and win decisively over the Phoenix Suns by the score of 127-104.

The real story of the week was none other than the offensive show put on by point guard DeAaron Fox, who scored a total of 109 points in back-to-back games against the Timberwolves and the Utah Jazz.

Setting a Sacramento Kings scoring record, DeAaron put the team on his back against the Timberwolves, scoring 60 points and shattering his previous personal record. Just one game later, with Malik Monk, DeMar DeRozan, and Domantas Sabonis sidelined with injuries, Fox backed up his 60-point performance with 49 more, this time in a win over the Jazz.

Thanks to the offensive explosion of DeAaron Fox, the Kings now have a player in the top ten in scoring. DeAaron is currently #6 in the NBA in scoring, and remarkably the Kings are the only team in the NBA to feature three players with a scoring average of 20 points or higher per game.

In addition to raising his scoring average, DeAaron is fifth in the league in steals, averaging 1.8 per game. I look for Fox to challenge the top spot in steals as the season wears on.

Overall, the Kings are off to an 8-6 start, and most pundits and fans alike are well aware that their record could be decidedly better.

It took a few games for DeRozan to become completely comfortable with his teammates, and that should be taken for granted.

So, what kind of a report card should the Kings receive as they play in their 15th game against the Atlanta Hawks on Monday night.

I give the team a solid B, considering the addition of DeMar DeRozan and understanding it takes time for a starting five to jell.

Let's not forget the energy and scoring punch that Malik Monk brings to this team. and the sooner we see Malik back in action, the better off the Kings will be. Reportedly, Malik has a week to go before he'll be ready for any hardwood action.

Sadly, after witnessing what I consider to be one of the worst officiating seasons in the past 50 years last season, the zebras were back to their old ways Saturday night and were it not for Kings ability to challenge two horrific calls by the referees, the Kings would have likely lost to the Utah Jazz.

I have no answer for what the NBA needs to do, but clearly the officiating is sadly lacking in quality, and this has not always been the case.

I credit the NBA with putting challenges into the mix, but there is still more that needs to be done.

Meanwhile, keep the faith Kings fans. This team is showing a lot of bright spots, so let's get everyone healthy and see if the Sac Town boys can get on a winning streak!
