CHP Receives Grant to Combat Distracted Driving

SACRAMENTO, CA (MPG) - The California Highway Patrol (CHP) is proud to announce it received a \$350,000 grant to address the growing issue of distracted driving on California roads.

Distracted driving remains a leading cause of traffic crashes across the state, with drivers often diverting their attention from the road to activities such as using mobile devices, eating or drinking, adjusting vehicle controls or engaging in conversations with passengers. Even a brief distraction can lead to severe crashes, injuries or fatalities.

To tackle this critical issue, the CHP will engage communities statewide through educational presentations, participation in local events, enforcement operations and social media. This comprehensive strategy emphasizes education and enforcement to reduce incidences of distracted driving. Education helps foster a safety culture on the road, while enforcement is a necessary deterrent to dangerous behavior.

"Every driver needs to recognize the serious dangers associated with distracted driving. Each time you look away from the road, even for a moment, you put yourself, your passengers and others at great risk," said CHP Commissioner Sean Duryee. "We all have a responsibility to make our roads safer by staying focused behind the wheel."

The CHP remains committed to ensuring the safety of California's drivers and will continue its efforts to reduce the risks posed by distracted driving.

Funding for this program is provided by a grant from the California Office of Traffic Safety through the National Highway Traffic Safety Administration.

The mission of the CHP is to provide the highest level of Safety, Service and Security. ★

City Council Honors Twin Rivers Unified School District

MCCLELLAN, CA (MPG) - The Sacramento City Council has recognized Twin Rivers Unified School District (TRUSD) with a resolution honoring the district's longstanding commitment to excellence in education, diversity and community service.

The resolution celebrates Twin Rivers Unified School District's achievements in promoting educational equity, sustainability, and community support throughout its vast service area, which spans 120 square miles and includes the Arden Fair, Del Paso Heights, North Highlands and Rio Linda neighborhoods.

Twin Rivers Unified School District serves nearly 25,000 students representing 50 languages across 52 school sites and is supported by more than 3,000 dedicated staff members.

Superintendent Steve Martinez expressed his gratitude for the Sacramento City Council's recognition, stating, "This resolution is a testament to the hard work

and dedication of our students, staff and community partners who make Twin Rivers a district of excellence."

"We are deeply committed to fostering a supportive and inclusive learning environment, promoting sustainability, and providing our students with the opportunities they need to thrive. We are grateful to the Sacramento City Council for honoring our work and our shared commitment to Sacramento's future," Martinez added.

Key highlights from the City Council's resolution include Twin Rivers Unified School District's 92% graduation rate, which exceeds state and county averages, and its dramatic 17% increase in graduation rates since 2012-2013.

Additionally, the district has reduced its dropout rate from 19.4% in 2011-12 to just 4.0% today. Programs such as Advancement Via Individual Determination (AVID), Career Technical Education (CTE), and Advanced Placement (AP) courses contribute to this academic success, with 77.4% of AVID seniors meeting college entrance requirements in the

out for its commitment to equity, diversity and sustainability. The district’s K-8 Dual Language Immersion Program, 1:1 student-to-device ratio and pioneering electric school bus program exemplify this dedication.

Twin Rivers Unified School District’s fleet now includes 78 electric buses and the district has secured \$9.2 million for future environmental initiatives.

The district’s We Are TR Foundation raised \$20,000 in scholarships last year and aims to double this support to \$40,000 for the 2024-2025 school year.

In recognition of Twin Rivers Unified School District’s accomplishments, the Sacramento City Council commended the district for its leadership and dedication to building a brighter future for the Sacramento community through a robust commitment to diversity, educational excellence, sustainability and public service. ★

Sexually Violent Predator in Antelope

ANTELOPE, CA (MPG) - The Sacramento Sexual Assault Felony Enforcement (SAFE) Team is a multi-jurisdictional task force initially created with grant funding from the California State Office of Emergency Services.

The Sacramento Sexual Assault Felony Enforcement Task Force is comprised of members from the Sacramento County Sheriff’s Office, City of Sacramento Police Department, City of Elk Grove Police Department, Sacramento County Probation Department, the California Department of Corrections and Rehabilitation, Sacramento County Regional Parks, and the U.S. Marshal’s Office.

Sacramento Sexual Assault Felony Enforcement Detectives are skilled and experienced investigators who supervise, monitor and arrest registered sex offenders who are out of compliance with their statutory requirements or who are in violation of their probation or parole status.

Sixty-five-year-old Robert Singleton was released from the California Department of State Hospitals and is residing on Big Cloud Way in Antelope. He is classified and registered as a Sexually Violent Predator under Welfare and Institutions Code §6604, as he was convicted for multiple cases of Lewd or

Lascivious Acts with a Child Under 14 Years of Age by Force or Fear. Singleton was released from prison in 2003, sent to the California Department of State Hospitals, where he completed his parole and is now a lifetime sex registrant in the State of California.

Sacramento Sexual Assault Felony Enforcement detectives said that Singleton poses a heightened public safety risk, based on recent events that are being investigated, and want to ensure that nearby residents are aware of his presence in their neighborhood, especially in such close proximity to schools and a local park.

Tips leading to an arrest are eligible for a cash reward of up to \$1000, and tipsters remain anonymous. Tips are paid in cash, and you are never asked for identification. When you’re digging into that scrumptious Thanksgiving meal and settling in to watch umpteen football games, are you thinking back to that first Thanksgiving? Well, I got the scoop from historian Ken Davis, the author of the “Don’t Know About” series. The feast was more like surf and turf with venison, turkey, mussels, and scallops. Makes sense since they were close to the ocean. And the turkey was not a fat platter turkey filled with stuffing, but wild turkey (the critter, not the libation). And no pumpkin pies, just pumpkins. Dessert was most likely cornmeal breads and puddings. By the way, the Pilgrims actually had a true day of thanksgiving with a day of prayer and fasting, not feasting. And the Pilgrims did not call themselves by that name. They referred to themselves as “saints” and “First Comers.” Only later did William Bradford call them Pilgrims. And here’s one for you. It was first celebrated as an official holiday in 1777 to mark the patriot victory at Saratoga in the Revolutionary War. When Washington tried to proclaim a Thanksgiving Day, Congress complained that he had no right to make such a proclamation.

Presidents routinely proclaimed the day but the custom died out at the beginning of the 19th century. But 1837 came around and so did Sarah Joseph Hale (She wrote the poem “Mary Had A Little Lamb”) and initiated a campaign to reinstate the holiday. Lincoln finally proclaimed a national holiday in 1863. Suffice to day, our day of indulging, watching games and shopping came lots later and remains to this day. Let’s just remember that we might go back to the beginning with a prayer for all we have to be thankful for. Reach out to someone alone or hurting and share. It doesn’t have to be a feast, just a simple taste and a kind word.

Social Security Matters

Older Veteran Asks about Special Social Security Credit for Military Service

Dear Rusty: I served in the U S Army from January 1958 to Feb 1961. What increase should I receive for those years and who do I call and at what phone number?

Signed: Proud Veteran.

Dear Proud Veteran: First, thank you for your military service! I expect you are referring to the “special extra credits for military service” which are available to some who served in in the US Military in earlier years. It is important to note that these “extra credits” take the form of an adjustment to your military pay record while serving and are not an incremental amount added to your monthly Social Security benefit because you served.

Military pay has been subject to deductions for Social Security since 1957. Thus, while serving between 1958 and 1961 you paid SS tax on your military earnings. But, for purposes of determining your Social Security benefit, your military earnings record would be increased by \$300 for each quarter you served on active duty

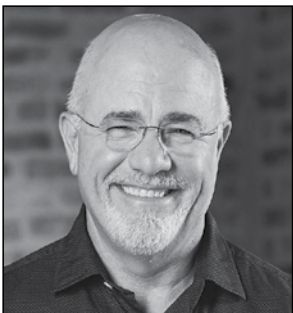
up to a maximum of \$1,200 increase per year of service. That means for 1958 - 1960, when calculating your SS benefit, \$1,200 would be added to your military earnings record for each year you served. FYI, for those who served after 1967, this adjustment was automatically made by Social Security. But for service years prior to 1967 (as in your case) you would need to inform Social Security of your service when you claimed SS and provide a copy of your military form DD-214 (your discharge papers). SS would then make the appropriate adjustment to your military earnings record prior to calculating your benefit amount. And, for clarity, additional credits for military service are not available to those who served after 2001.

A key point to understand is that this adjustment to your military pay may – or may not – affect the amount of your Social Security benefit. Social Security determines your benefit amount based on your highest earning 35 years over your entire lifetime (adjusted for inflation). If, after you served in the military, you had at least 35 years of civilian employment where you earned more than your military pay, it is probable that your military pay is not included when calculating your Social Security benefit. If that is the case, it is likely that the “special extra

credits for military service” would have no effect on your Social Security payment. If, however, your military pay (including those special extra credits) for any year is more than you earned in civilian life, then you can contact Social Security (1.800.772.1213), provide them with a copy of your DD-214, and ask that they recalculate your Social Security benefit to include the extra credits for your years of military service.

Still, when you do stupid things, you've got to pay what I call “stupid tax.” I'm talking about the consequences of your actions. It sounds like you're going to have get two or three jobs, and find a really cheap car that will get you around for a while. If you do this for maybe 12 to 18 months, and live on a very strict monthly budget, you'll probably be able to pay off all that stupid tax you've accumulated.

I think you've also recognized the fact that you left your integrity and self-respect on the sidelines for way too long. That means doing the right things really needs to be a priority from now on. The cool thing about the practical issues you mentioned—finding an-

other permanent place to live, something to drive and paying off the debt—is that all this will get better because you've made a conscious decision to be better.

You might want to think about finding and regularly attending a good church, too. Any understanding and caring pastor would be honored to pray with you, and walk with you as you get your life back together and headed in the right direction.

Living in Sacramento County, we all know how essential our roads are. Every day, whether we're heading to work, dropping kids off at school, or running errands, we rely on our roads. With over 5,200 miles of roads used by nearly 85% of us, the importance of maintaining and improving our road infrastructure

is clear. We also know that far too many of our roads are in a dangerous state of disrepair and critical improvements are bogged down in bureaucratic agendas.

Recently, the Sacramento Transportation Authority (STA) suggested forming a seven-member subcommittee to consider if we need another sales tax increase - but most of the funds are allocated for underused public transit and questionable environmental programs. I voted against this because the idea doesn't meet the needs of most county residents, especially those

living in rural communities like Orangevale and Rio Linda who rely heavily on roads.

We've seen similar tax proposals fail before, like Measure B in 2016, which didn't address the real concerns of our community. Our roads rank among the worst in the nation, affecting us all every day.

There is an obvious need for serious improvements to our roads and highways. This isn't just about patching up potholes but making big changes to cut down on traffic, make our drives safer, and improve our quality of

life. We need to make sure that every dollar spent is watched over closely and used well.

I'm not a knee-jerk opponent of all taxes. But I firmly believe in being transparent about how any new tax money would be used, ensuring there's a clear end date for these taxes. We need to be careful and clear, demonstrating exactly what improvements will be funded and when the taxes will expire to avoid undue financial pressure on our taxpayers. Our residents want to see real, lasting results from their taxes, not more empty promises.

Our main goal should be to focus on actions that genuinely improve our roads. This is the practical and necessary choice for our community's well-being.

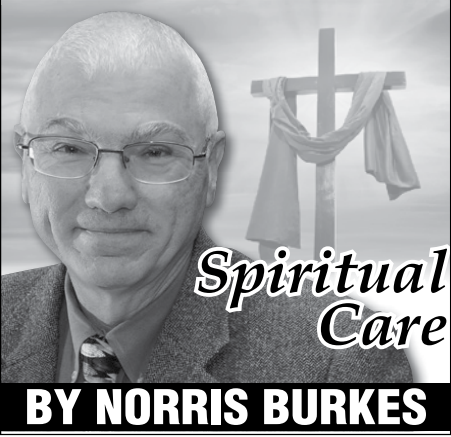

Sonoma County Farmers Celebrate Measure J Defeat

The defeat of a Sonoma County ballot measure last week brought relief for farmers in the county. As of Friday, more than 85% of voters had voted against Measure J, which within three years would have banned large dairies and poultry farms in the county. The measure would have capped the number of animals each farm can raise, banning large farms or forcing them to downsize. Doug Beretta, owner of Beretta Family Dairy in Santa Rosa and president of the Sonoma County Farm Bureau, said he was “ecstatic” so many voters had sided with the county’s farmers. “The community came together to fight for agriculture,” Beretta said. “When those results came in, it really showed.”

Brussels Sprouts Nab More Acreage as Demand Grows

As Brussels sprouts have become trendy on social media and restaurant menus during the past several years, California farmers have been able to cash in on the vegetable’s popularity. “The market’s really grown, especially the fresh market, and a lot of that has to do with the food shows on TV and chefs’ artistic abilities,” said Monterey County-based vegetable grower Jeff Hitchcock. “It’s really put Brussels sprouts on the map.” U.S. per capita consumption of Brussels sprouts increased from 0.33 pounds in 2011 to 0.78 pounds in 2019, according to U.S. Department of Agriculture statistics.

Agencies Identify Organized Farm Equipment Theft Ring

As part of a monthslong investigation known as Operation Tractor Pull, California law enforcement agencies have uncovered an organized agriculture equipment theft ring that targeted San Joaquin Valley farms. After conducting extensive surveillance operations throughout the San Joaquin Valley, authorities said evidence collected accounted for 24 pieces of stolen equipment valued at more than \$2.25 million. Authorities recovered \$1.3 million worth of equipment. “This is a large-scale theft ring impacting our farmers, our ranchers and our agricultural community,” said Tulare County Sheriff Mike Boudreaux during an Oct. 29 press conference.

Turkey Supplies Ample Heading into Thanksgiving

The Voice of California Agriculture podcast, produced by the California Farm Bureau, discussed turkey supplies heading into the Thanksgiving holiday season. Bill Mattos, president of the California Poultry Federation, said on the podcast that despite millions of turkeys being lost to bird flu across the country during the past two years, “I think you’ll find plenty of turkeys for Thanksgiving,” including fresh California turkeys. Mattos said prices may be slightly higher on average this year, but that many grocery stores offer steep discounts on Thanksgiving turkeys to get shoppers into their stores. The episode also covered the efficiency of autonomous sprayers, water flow standards for the Scott and Shasta rivers, and crop damage estimates resulting from hurricanes in Florida and North Carolina. ★

New Republic FC Stadium Back on Track

SACRAMENTO, CA (MPG) - A project that was on life support had some much-needed life injected into it on Tuesday, Nov. 12, when the Sacramento City Council voted unanimously to approve the framework for a \$321 million downtown railyards soccer stadium and entertainment venue. A long-awaited development needed to provide a permanent home for the Sacramento Republic Football Club (FC).

According to the information provided by council staff in support of the proposal, the projects being approved include a soccer stadium with supporting infrastructure occupying approximately 31 acres, as well as a new 3600-seat live entertainment venue that would occupy existing historic buildings in the railyard.

The agreement, albeit non-binding, does include information regarding project costs, economic impact and anticipated public and private funding sources. The estimated \$321 million price tag breaks down to, \$175 million for the new stadium, \$56 million for the new live entertainment venue and \$90 million for associated

infrastructure. The projects altogether are expected to generate more than 1,500 jobs for the Sacramento region. The agreement includes a provision by which the city would waive reimbursement for municipal services for off-site police, fire, emergency medical services, traffic control and code enforcement for stadium events for up to a maximum of \$300,000 per year for a ten-year period.

The official press release from the city indicates the new stadium will be supported and privately financed by the Wilton Rancheria Tribe which became majority owners of Sacramento Republic FC on Nov. 7. The press release includes a quote from Mayor Darrel Steinberg on the importance of the council’s vote.

“We are breaking barriers and making history here in Sacramento,” said Mayor

Steinberg. “Wilton Rancheria is the first tribe to own a professional men’s sports team in North America, and the projects in The Railyards will double the size of the central business district—what an incredible opportunity! This is the foundation for something beautiful today that will become even more beautiful in the years and decades to come.”

In a Nov. 7 press conference, in advance of the Nov. 12

council vote, city officials joined together with representatives of Sacramento Republic FC, Downtown Railyards Venture LLC and Wilton rancheria Tribe members to celebrate the new energy being pumped into the soccer stadium/railyard development. At the press conference, Wilton Rancheria Chairman Jesus Tarango commented on the importance of the project.

“I am deeply proud to witness this moment, which stands as a profound testament to the resilience and determination of the people of Wilton Rancheria,” said Chairman Tarango. “In just over a decade, our Tribe has transformed from landless to becoming a significant economic force in the region. The opportunity to drive a project of such scale and importance, on land where our ancestors once walked, is deeply meaningful. This is not only a chance to honor our history and uplift our community, but also to envision a future where we are not only part of Sacramento’s past, but an integral part of its future as well.”

According to the city, the stadium project is scheduled for completion by late 2026, and the entertainment venue by 2027. ★

Facing teams from across the nation, the Hornet tandem opened their run with a straight-set victory over Emilia Valentinsson and Sara Zalukar from Miami University, 7-5, 6-3, then outlasted Bryant's team of Caitlyn Munson and Natalia Vela in three sets, 5-7, 6-4, 10-4.

Ferreros and Riva continued to roll on day two, easing past the Naval Academy's Emily Tannenbaum and Parvathi Shanker, 6-2, 6-0, before suffering their first loss of the tournament in the semifinals to Appalachian State's Savannah Dada-Mascoll and Isabella

Romanichen, 6-3, 6-1.

With the top three doubles teams earning a spot in the NCAA Tournament, Ferreros and Riva faced off against Celia-Belle Mohr and Sophia Webster from Vanderbilt for third place, winning the first set in a tiebreaker, 7-6 (5), before falling by the scores of 6-0 and 10-5 to finish fourth.

In singles, sophomore Lou Baudoin fell in her main draw opening round match to Charleston Southern's Marina Skegro, 2-6, 6-4, 6-2, but rebounded in the consolation draw defeating Illinois-Chicago's Mayu Ushio, 4-6, 6-1, 6-2, and advancing to the semifinals with a walkover against South Carolina State's Sofiya Chursina.

In the semis, Baudoin was finally subdued, falling to South Dakota's Beata Havlickova, 6-0, 6-4.

The Hornets have wrapped up the fall portion of the team's schedule and will open the spring championship season on Jan. 26 at home against the University of the Pacific. ★

Hornet’s Goalkeeper Sierra Sonko Earns Player of the Week Honors

SACRAMENTO, CA (MPG) - Redshirt freshman goalkeeper Sierra Sonko came up aces not once, not twice, but three times in penalty kicks for the Sacramento State women’s soccer team last week during the Big Sky Conference Tournament, stopping a pair of attempts in all three contests to earn National Player of the Week honors from Top Drawer Soccer on Tuesday, Nov. 12.

It’s another award added to the mantle for the Seattle, Wash., native, who was named the Big Sky Tournament Most Valuable Player for her performance in net as the Hornets claimed their first league tournament championship, and the automatic NCAA berth that goes with it for the first time since 2010.

Having appeared in one match and playing in only five minutes during the regular season, Sonko answered when called upon for No. 5-seeded Sacramento State, stopping a pair of penalties following a 2-2 draw against No. 4-seeded Northern Arizona and repeating the feat against regular season champion, host, and top-seeded Montana after the Hornets and the Grizzlies played to a scoreless draw.

Two days later, it took eight rounds of penalties to finally decide a winner, but Sonko stopped defending tournament champion Idaho on its fourth attempt as the Hornets drew even and then denied the Vandals on what turned out to be their final attempt of the day to secure the victory.

Following the match, Sonko became the third Sacramento State women’s soccer player to be named the Big Sky Tournament’s MVP, joining Katie McCoy (2007) and Elece McBride (2010). She was one of six named to the all-tournament team along with teammates Teysha-Ray Spinney-Kuahuia, Ellie Farber, Sydney Sharts, Dalen Lau, and Izzy Palmatier, matching the most selections in school history along with the 2007

and 2010 squads.

You might have noticed the press coverage last year for the Light the World images that filled the large screens of Times Square in New York City. Visitors to Times Square were in for a surprise when its famous billboards became a larger-than-life tribute to the true reason for Christmas: Jesus Christ.

Instead of the usual array of promotional brand logos and marketing graphics to entice viewers to purchase more products, the screens were filled with images of the baby Jesus, lying in a straw-lined manger, with a new star in the heavens luminating his face.

The billboard takeover at Times Square in New York City was part of Light the World initiative, an annual movement from The

Church of Jesus Christ of Latter-day Saints to bring people from all over the world together to share the light of Jesus Christ during the Christmas season.

The beautiful nativity scene that emerged from the blackout was a tender reminder of the Savior's birth and why we need His light and love in our lives. The event was truly a Silent Night surprise as thousands of people stood in awe

Watching the miraculous events of the first Christmas on the mammoth screens overhead.

The good news is that one does not have to travel to Times Square to embrace the Light the World experience. Following the doctrine of all faiths to "love our neighbors as ourselves," everyone this holiday

season can do something to light the world for another, such as donating cans to your local food bank, leaving a kind note for your mail and package carrier, visiting an elderly neighbor, texting someone a note that says "I'm so grateful for you," paying for the person behind you in line, asking a co-worker how you can lighten their load and leaving a small gift at a neighbor's doorstep.

There is a plethora of variety in these community service prospects for individuals, couples, families,

One of our holiday family favorites is to prepare gift bags for children living in the margins. Our family, including children and grandchildren, numbers 26, and each of us has an assignment to bring something to add to the gift bags.

We set up a couple of large tables near our Christmas tree and have an assembly line to fill the bags, tie with ribbons and deliver to one of the several organizations that support needy children. It is a joy watching our grandchildren delight in filling these gift bags for others.

Another part of Light the World is the Giving Machines, vending machines with a twist. The Giving Machines have become known

internationally for offering livestock that charities distribute to families to help them feed themselves or start small businesses. In a single year, givers purchased 41,000 chickens, 25,000 ducks and 3,800 beehives. Chickens, goats, piglets and beehives provided through the Giving Machines have benefited 20,000 families in Kenya and Tanzania over three years.

One year a family in Kenya received three chickens. Three years later, those three had grown to a flock of over 7,000 that provided food and income to support not only their family but the entire village. Giving Machines partner each year with both global charities and local nonprofits to allow people to donate items to people in need and have raised more than \$32 million

since 2017.

The Giving Machines will be back in Northern California this year. The big red vending machines will again be at the Westfield Galleria Mall in Roseville and at the Vintage Fair Mall in Modesto as two of the 106 global locations.

addition to being a full-time performer and instructor, John is currently on faculty at Palenke Arts, a multicultural arts organization in Seaside, California.

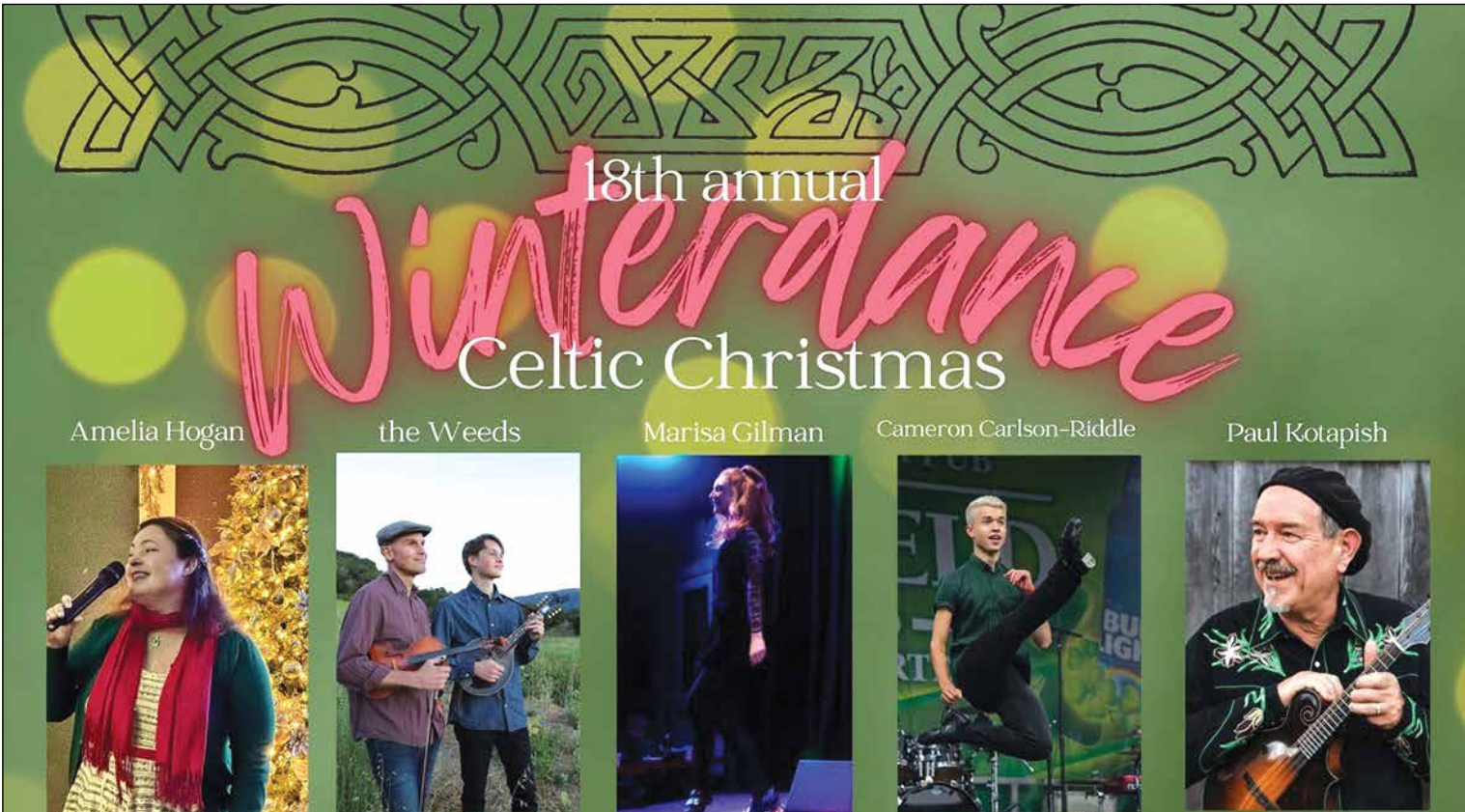
