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Stiffened Penalties for Theft

SACRAMENTO REGION, CA (MPG) -Californians accused of certain drug and retail theft crimes may already be facing stiffer penalties under an initiative voters passed this year, alongside related bills Gov. Gavin Newsom signed into law.

Voters this November overwhelmingly approved Proposition 36, which both modifies and adds key changes to California law.

able to charge people convicted of various third-time drug offenses with a so-called treatment-mandated felony, which would direct them to substance use disorder or mental health treatment in lieu of up to three years in jail or prison.

Under the new law, courts are also obligated to warn people convicted of selling or providing certain drugs, such as fentanyl, that they could face murder charges for later distributing illegal drugs that kill someone.

And neavier consequences may That includes prosecutors being also extend to petty theft and

shoplifting offenses, including the possibility of up to three years in jail or prison if a person has already been twice convicted for certain theft offenses.

Several district attorneys and police departments announced arrests this month that they planned to charge under the new law, including in San Francisco, Solano and Shasta counties.

The measure partially reversed a different initiative voters approved a decade ago, which reduced penalties

SacRT Launches Shared-Use Mobility Service

SACRAMENTO, CA (MPG) -

The Sacramento Regional Transit District (SacRT) has launched a shared-use mobility program. SacRT Flex is a limited subsidized neighborhood shuttle service for a limited group of qualified riders, including seniors (age 62 and older), low-income individuals and individuals with disabilities.

SacRT Flex, a new program operated by Via, officially started service on Jan. 2. SacRT Flex is a limited shared-use service designed to provide greater accessibility and mobility for riders with the greatest transportation needs. During the soft launch phase, eligible riders are invited to test the new service and familiarize themselves with its features.

"This new program, although not a replacement for SmaRT Ride, ensures that we continue to meet the mobility needs of our community while maintaining fiscal responsibility and optimizing resources," said SacRT General Manager/CEO Henry Li. "We are excited to introduce a program that prioritizes accessibility and convenience for those who need it most."

SacRT Flex is operated

by Via, the same vendor responsible for scheduling the SmaRT Ride service. For the SacRT Flex program, Via manages the app, schedules the trips, maintains the vehicles, provides the drivers and collects the fare revenue, ensuring a seamless experience for riders. SacRT Flex is being funded by Measure A as a pilot for the next 18 months. Measure A is a Sacramento County program that funds transportation projects and services through a halfcent sales tax. SacRT Flex operat-

ing hours are 7 a.m. to 7 p.m. Mondays through Fridays (excluding most holidays). SacRT Flex will operate in the same nine zones as SmaRT Ride: Citrus Heights-Antelope-Orangevale, Arden-Carmichael. Downtown-Midtown, Elk

Grove, Florin-Gerber, Folsom, Franklin-South Sacramento, Natomas-North Sacramento and Rancho Cordova. Ride requests must be

booked at least 24 hours in advance (up to two days in advance) using Via's SacRT Flex app or by phone. Same-day requests are currently not available. Cost is \$2.50 per trip for

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January is National Human Trafficking Awareness Month

SACRAMENTO, CA (MPG) - Human Trafficking is more prevalent than you think. Every two minutes, a child is trafficked or sexually exploited in the United States. The average age of exploitation is 12 to 15 years old.

For every 10 trafficking victims identified globally, five are adult women and two are girls, meaning 70% are female.

The total number of trafficked individuals is unknown but estimates range from 28 million to 50 million globally.

This crime is often underreported and hard to track as it is the second largest worldwide criminal enterprise.

Sacramento is within the top 10 U.S. cities that are a trafficking hub, primarily due to I-5 that runs between Canada and Mexico, and I-80 which runs from the West Coast to the East Coast and California is a

oastal state

The Impact of Trafficking

Human trafficking can happen to anyone, regardless of race, ethnicity, religion, age, gender, sexual orientation or social class but some people are more vulnerable than others. Vulnerable groups include recent migrants, those with substance use/mental health illnesses, people with limited education and individuals experiencing poverty or homelessness (especially youth).

Another vulnerability is lack of companionship, loneliness or boredom, and youth at home alone. Unsupervised or under-supervised youth because both parents/guardians must work, tend to retreat into social media or online video gaming where traffickers also hunt. Traffickers also prey on these vulnerabilities to create a dependent relationship and make it more difficult for victims to leave. Most frequently, people are trafficked by someone they know and taken by

manipulation rather than force. This manipulation and coercion often escalate to physical, emotional and financial abuse. (Source: https://preventht.org/human-trafficking-101.)

Once immediate safety is established, the United Nations states that "acquiring skills and competencies for sustainable livelihoods" is an intermediate need and crucial part of a successful recovery for trafficked individuals. Soroptimists have decades of experience with providing this intervention through our education awards and other financial support. Women and girls who have been trafficked often suffer financially, being forced to rely on their trafficker or forced to turn over their earnings to their trafficker. Even after they escape and are safe, they often face unfair societal stigma that can make finding meaningful

employment difficult.

How Soroptimist Can Help

Reducing poverty is a powerful way to lower the risk of trafficking and education is a key pathway to doing just that. Access to formal education can provide women with the tools to prevent trafficking and to command better wages after surviving trafficking. Leading organizations addressing trafficking agree that holistic methods are the best prevention. One of the most impactful preventative methods is to invest in building the agency of women and girls through access to education. Ensuring that women and girls have the opportunity and ability to complete school and earn a livelihood plays a significant role in reducing vulnerability.

A former member also crocheted more than 20 one-of-a-kind beanies to be offered on a first come, first served basis to any female veteran who would like one. The stockings were

stuffed on Nov. 21 and delivered the next day for distribution, starting in December at the VA Northern California Healthcare System.

"Our Soroptimist club cares deeply for our brave veterans and the staff who serve them. MEDnRX Launches Innovative Telemedicine and Telepharmacy Kiosk

RANCHO CORDOVA, CA (MPG) - MEDnRX, an El Dorado Hillsbased healthcare technology company, officially launched its first telemedicine and telepharmacy kiosk on Dec. 12 at SF Market, 2738 Sunrise Blvd.

This innovative kiosk aims to transform access to healthcare by combining virtual medical consultations with convenient on-site prescription pickup.

The MEDnRX kiosk is designed to provide an efficient, patient-centered experience by eliminating long waits at traditional doctor's offices and pharmacies. Patients can use the MEDnRX app to connect with a healthcare provider for a virtual consultation, and if prescribed medication, can pick it up directly from a secure Dropbox at the kiosk.

Alternatively, patients can have an on-site consultation by stepping inside the kiosk for a video call with a provider. After each visit, the kiosk automatically sanitizes to ensure a clean and safe environment for the next user

For those who don't need a consultation and simply need to pick up their prescriptions, the MEDnRX kiosk features a rapid refill pickup area for immediate access to medications.

MEDnRX also offers a convenient prescription pickup option for patients who prefer not to use the kiosk. Through a secure locker system, patients can access their medications at extended hours by entering their information and retrieving their prescriptions from a designated locker. This flexible system ensures patients can pick up their medications at a time that works best for them.

MEDnRX co- founder and CEO, Dr. Steven Gest, expressed the company's commitment to addressing gaps in healthcare

access.

"We surveyed the community's needs and found that pharmacies were closing, creating pharmacy deserts," Gest said. "A lot of people don't have transportation or access, so our main goal is to make healthcare more affordable and accessible. About a third of people don't pick up their medication or don't do so in a timely manner, which can aggravate the issue. We're working to make healthcare more efficient, more effective and more accessible."

In addition to its telemedicine services, MEDnRX plans to build a medical office on-site.

"For every 15 kiosks, we need a pharmacy, and for every pharmacy, we need a medical office," Gest said.

The company's expansion plans include targeting underserved communities, particularly

areas facing pharmacy deserts.

"Rancho Cordova is a great center of innovation," Gest said. "It's a growing community that's flexible and open-minded, and we already had an office here. It's the perfect place to launch this initiative."

Said Vaibhav Shah, co-founder and CTO of MEDnRX, "Our goal is to make healthcare more accessible and affordable for everyone. As pharmacies close and people are forced to travel long distances to fill prescriptions, we're working to solve that problem. By providing an efficient, cost-effective alternative, we can serve underserved communities."

Several city official representatives were on hand to celebrate the grand opening with proclamations and certificates of recognition.

"We're so happy you're

here in Rancho Cordova serving our community," said Josh Gumacal, a representative from Congressman Ami Bera's office.

Mark Cullum from Assemblyman Josh Hoover's office, also spoke, noting the evolution of healthcare.

"Healthcare is so important, and it's great to see how healthcare has diversified. This is the way of the future," Cullum said. "We're excited that you chose Rancho Cordova and hope to see many more locations across the Sacramento region."

Kosim Latipov from state Sen. Roger Niello's office extended congratulations, stating, "On behalf of Senator Niello, I want to thank you for bringing such an innovative way to deliver healthcare to our community. We're so pleased you chose Rancho Cordova."

Curt Haven, a chamber board

member, presented a proclamation from the City of Rancho Cordova, signed by Mayor David M. Sander, Ph.D.

"On the occasion of your ribbon cutting, we present this proclamation to MEDnRX in recognition of your innovative contributions to our community," Haven said.

Other officials included Bee Lopez with Explore Rancho Cordova and Josh Gumacal, a representative from Congressman Ami Bera's office.

The kiosks will be strategically placed in public spaces such as SF Market to ensure convenience for those who might not have easy access to medical offices or pharmacies. MEDnRX accepts all major insurances, including Medicare and Medi-Cal, and allows patients to select their preferred location for prescription pickup.






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Gregg Fishman Elected SMUD Board President

SACRAMENTO REGION, CA (MPG) - SMUD's Board of Directors elected Director Gregg Fishman as president of the board. His term as president runs from January through December.

Fishman first began serving the SMUD Board of Directors in January 2015 and represents Ward 3, which includes East Sacramento, much of the Arden-Arcade area, and the Campus Commons, College Glen, and Rosemont neighborhoods, as well as parts of Carmichael, Florin, Fruitridge and Vintage Park.

Fishman has been a clean-energy advocate for much of his career. As a former SMUD employee, Fishman promoted wind and solar energy when they

were in their infancy. At the California Independent System Operator, he led public engagement efforts supporting new wind energy farms in California. As president of the SMUD Board in 2018, Fishman led the utility in passing its Integrated Resource Plan, hailed by the California Energy Commission as "... an ambitious road map for lowering greenhouse gas emissions in the Sacramento region."

In his varied career, Fishman was a news reporter and anchor at KFBK and KGO Radio, a public information officer at SMUD and the California Independent Operator System (California ISO), and communications coordinator for the California State Association of Counties. He currently works at Sacramento Regional Transit as the senior community relations officer.

Fishman is an active vol-

unteer with the Sacramento Tree Foundation and has led a neighborhood effort that has planted more than 2,000 new trees since 2001. He received an award from the MLK 365 organization for helping to make it easier to remove racially-restrictive clauses from local property records. Fishman is

and a frequent volunteer master-of-ceremonies for Project Ride in Elk Grove.

Fishman is a graduate of California State University, Sacramento with a bachelor's degree in journalism. He and his wife live in Arden Park and are the parents of two daughters.

for certain lower-level drug and petty theft offenses from felonies to misdemeanors. The initiative, Proposition 47, was intended to develop new public safety strategies and reduce incarceration after the state's prison population exploded due to tough-on-crime policies dating back to the 1980s.

But prosecutors, law enforcement and large retailers who rallied in favor of Prop. 36 said those sentencing reforms went too far and created a revolving door for people to repeatedly commit crimes without being held accountable.

"It's a clear mandate from the public that we need to take a new approach on public safety issues, specifically hard drugs, retail theft and fentanyl," said Jeff Reisig, Yolo County District Attorney.

Those who opposed the measure

warned that it will worsen homelessness,

drug use and crime by cutting funding

for treatment programs and increasing court and prison costs in the hundreds of millions of dollars. Behavioral health experts across the state have voiced concern over the efficacy of a treatment-mandated felony, given that most California counties lack

treatment' that has been promised by the measure's proponents. "I believe that (proponents) have also received a mandate to embrace problem solving and supportive services for peo-

ple who are struggling," said Cristine

Soto DeBerry, executive director of the Prosecutors Alliance of California, a nonprofit organization that opposed Prop. 36.

"I don't believe the mandate was (to) put more people in prison. It was not what people believed they were voting for. I hope that people with the discretion to enforce this law will think very carefully about the communities they serve and what they were asking for in this moment," she said.

Gov. Gavin Newsom tried to keep Prop. 36 off of the fall ballot and for a time considered putting a competing crime measure before voters. Instead, he signed a package of 10 bills in August that will make it easier to prosecute retail and vehicle theft. Those laws go into effect on Jan. 1.

Although Gov. Newsom didn't put any money into fighting Prop. 36, he referred to the initiative as an "unfunded mandate" that will take California back to the war on drugs. Indeed, the measure included no new funding streams. But supporters like Reisig voiced optimism that funding opportunities already exist in the law, pointing to a \$6.4 billion from the mental health bond voters approved

"I hope that lawmakers and the governor embrace the mandate and work collaboratively to make sure that we're successful in delivering the promise of Prop. 36," Reisig said.



You'll also have repairs to contend with, renters who don't pay and other expenses. See what I'm saying? You won't be able to count on an easy \$400 in your

Now, I love real estate. I understand the excitement and allure. But what you're really saying is you want to cash out part of your retirement, get hit with a penalty and take on debt, all to buy an investment property. This is not a good plan.

My advice is to save up, and pay cash for one small, decent rental property to see if the landlord game is really for you.

Where is the best place to keep my savings?

Dear Angie,

In my mind, when it comes to savings, the idea is to park the money in a safe place—like a money market account or basic savings account—and keep it separate from the rest of your cash, so you don't accidentally spend it on the wrong thing. I'm not really concerned

with making money in a savings scenario, so things like setting money aside for an emergency fund or vacations fall into this category.

Investing, on the other hand, is when you're going to leave the money alone for a bare minimum of five to 10 years in order to grow it. Things like college planning and retirement fall into this category. In these instances, I recommend good, growthstock mutual funds that have stable track records of at least 10 years.

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
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
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

Dear Rusty: I'm 72 years old with 20 years of military service. I am retired collecting Social Security, my military pension, and State retirement benefits. According to my SSA statement, over my working lifetime I paid \$14,302 into Medicare, but I never used that medical plan. I only bring in \$33,000 in annual income. Can I get those Medicare taxes back somehow? I've run into dead ends at SSA, Medicare and IRS websites. Signed: Veteran Seeking Answers

Dear Veteran Seeking Answers: First, I want to thank you for your military service to our country. You may find the "For Veterans" section of our www.amacfoundation.org website of interest.

Regarding the contributions you have made over the years to federal Medicare, I'm afraid you cannot get any of those taxes back even though you have never used Medicare healthcare services. That's because Medicare, like Social Security, is a "pay as you go" program where all contributions received from workers are used to pay for benefits for current beneficiaries (contributions aren't put into a separate account to pay for your coverage). It's also important to know that your Medicare taxes were used only to fund Medicare Part A, which is coverage for inpatient hospitalization services. Those contributions (via payroll taxes) did not entitle you to outpatient healthcare services, as provided by Medicare Part

B (for which there is a


monthly premium).

FYI, you must be enrolled in Medicare Part A to collect Social Security benefits after age 65. Medicare Part B isn't mandatory to collect Social Security, but assuming that, as a retired military veteran, you now receive healthcare benefits under the military's TriCare-for-Life program for retired veterans, you must be enrolled in Medicare Part A and Part B to maintain your TriCare-for-Life coverage. Your military TriCare coverage coordinates with Medicare to pay for your healthcare costs. Thus, even though it may not be transparent to you, you may be benefiting from your current enrollment in Medicare.

Note that some non-career veterans can use VA healthcare services based on their service years, instead of TriCare-for-Life for retired military veterans. Non-career recipients of standard VA healthcare services are not required to be enrolled in Medicare but, in any case, cannot receive their past Medicare Part A contributions back if they choose to decline Medicare. One woman seemed interested, but questioned the sparse accommodations, hoping to book her own hotel.

Well, you know me. I had an answer

"Both trips have nice accommodations, but if you want the 5-star trip, then join us in March 5-16. It'll be an "immersive experience of volun-tourism that will allow you to explore one of the hidden gems of Honduras.

"Arguably the most beautiful colonial town in the country, Copan boasts traditional Mayan chocolate, the best Honduran coffee, and some of the most incredible and well-preserved Mayan

Yup, I was reading from the travel brochure.

If you've only recently joined my readership, you'll need to know that my daughter, Sara, started Chispa Project, pronounced cheez-pah, meaning

"spark" in Spanish. Hondurans use the word to describe people with spark or drive.

Chispa has a simple mission: Sponsor children's libraries and equip them with quality books in Spanish by working side by side with Honduran community leaders and educators.

In the 80 schools where Chispa works, they build alliances with communities to design, fund and manage their own libraries. Community members also volunteer in the library project and raise a symbolic portion of the funding that ensures sustainability and ownership.

"What will we do during the volunteer week?" asked another.

"We begin the day after arrival by decorating library spaces that will make children proud of their school. We paint the walls with colorful murals, assemble bookshelves, and stock and catalog an entire library.

"Imagine us working together, rolling two coats of white paint on crumbling walls. The paint provides a bright pallet for those murals intended to inspire future readers.

The children will surround us, chattering the few English words they know. Their smiles go for miles as they read the picture books we bring."

Some in my group gave an empathetic sigh.

Finally, one woman asked the most common question about our trips "Is it dangerous?'

"That's a risk you will have to assess on your own. We safely welcomed volunteers from ages 3 to 83. I can also tell you that that my daughter, Sara, her husband and her two children spent several years in Honduras.

Unsure how many takers I'd persuaded, I added, "While the days are sometimes hot and long, I reward my volunteers with ice-cream cones."

"If you can't fly with me, then "Buy

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

First Snow Survey Shows Snowpack Near Average

After a Warm, Dry Fall, Recent Storms Provide Boost to Snowpack but Return of Dry Conditions Looms

SACRAMENTO, CA (MPG) - The Department of Water Resources (DWR) Jan 2 conducted the first snow survey of the season at Phillips Station. The manual survey recorded 24 inches of snow depth and a snow water equivalent of 9 inches, which is 91 percent of average for this location. The snow water equivalent measures the amount of water contained in the snowpack and is a key component of the Department of Water Resources' water supply forecast. Statewide, the snowpack is 108 percent of average for this date.

Recent years in California have been marked by extremely hot and dry conditions broken up by periods of intense rain and snow. So far, this water year has been no different. A record-breaking hot and dry summer continued well into the fall, but a powerful atmospheric river in November broke several rainfall records in Northern California. A series of storms in late December provided another boost.

"While our snowpack looks good now, we have a long way until April when our water supply picture will be more complete," said Department of Water Resources Director Karla Nemeth. "Extreme shifts between dry and wet conditions are continuing this winter and if the past several years are any indication, anything could happen between now and April and we need to be

The Department of Water Resources' electronic readings from 130 stations placed throughout the Sierra Nevada indicate that the statewide snowpack's snow water equivalent is 10.7 inches, or 108 percent of average for this date, compared

before. In both 2013 and 2022, the January snowpack was well above average thanks to December storm activity, only for dry conditions to take over the rest of the winter, quickly erasing early season snow totals and continuing existing drought conditions across the state.

"We are fortunate to have had several solid snow-producing atmospheric river systems so far

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this season," said Department of Water Resources Snow Surveys and Water Supply Forecasting Unit Manager Andy Reising. "The fall was extremely dry, so our healthy snow totals are thanks to a handful of big storm systems in November and late December. But to finish the year where we need to be, we will still need additional snow building at a regular pace throughout the winter."

Major reservoirs statewide are currently 121 percent of average thanks to two consecutive years of above average snowpack conditions, which occurred after the driest three-year period on record in California. DWR is preparing for these swings between extreme conditions by investing in climate resilience, including the use of Forecast Informed Reservoir Operations, floodplain and flood infrastructure improvements and groundwater recharge efforts that will ensure California is able to capture and use as much water during flood conditions as possible.

On average, the Sierra snowpack supplies about 30 percent of California's water needs. Its natural ability to store water is why the Sierra snowpack is often referred to as California's "frozen reservoir." Data from these snow surveys and forecasts produced by the Department of Water Resources Snow Surveys and Water Supply Forecasting Unit are important factors in determining how Department of Water Resources manages the state's water resources.

Department of Water Resources conducts four media-oriented snow surveys at Phillips Station each winter near the first of each month, January through April and, if necessary, May. The next survey is tentatively scheduled for Feb. 3.

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
