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Rideout Hospital Auxiliary Dissolves

MARYSVILLE, CA (MPG) - On Nov. 13, President of the Auxiliary, Betty Howard presided over the festivities held at the Peachtree Golf and Country Club to celebrate 66 plus years of service. Speakers included Chris Champlin, President of Adventist Health + Rideout Hospital and Carol Ramirez, Director of Community Engagement and Volunteer Services.

Following lunch, Marlene Dorsey presented hour pins to active members that had achieved the next level of hours served: 3-1,000-hour pins, 2-2,000-hour pins, 1-4,000-hour pin, 1-5,000- hour pin, 1-9,000-hour pin,

1-13,000-hour pin, 1-16,000-hour pin and Marlene herself received a 25,000-hour pin. Each recipient also received a pink carnation. The flowers, as well as the centerpieces, were donated by the Country Florist. In the 66 plus years, the members have donated a total of more than 903,000 hours of their time to the hospital.

Founded Jan. 14, 1958, the precovid Auxiliary owned and operated the Pink Trunk Thrift Shop and the hospital gift shop. The money generated, along with fundraisers, was donated to various departments in the hospital for medical equipment and other needs. In total, the Rideout Hospital Auxiliary donated more than \$1,000,000. In addition, each year they

gave scholarships to high school and college students in the medical field.

As a service to the community, the auxiliary members assemble Vial of Life kits, which in a medical emergency will lead first responders to the resident's medical information. The vials are provided free by Walgreen's and the printed material and magnets are paid for by the Rideout Hospital Auxiliary. City Council **Opposes Proposed Water Rate Increase**

MARYSVILLE, CA (MPG) - The Marysville City Council held a special meeting Jan. 23 to discuss its opposition to a proposed 33% increase in water rates by California Water Service (Cal Water) over the next three years.

During Council Comments, Marysville Mayor Chris Branscum said water rates in Marysville are already double or even triple the rates in other nearby communities.

"It is one of the more persistent and, frankly, more important problems for the city and its residents," Branscum said.

Much of the city is designated as economically disadvantaged and those higher rates have a significant impact on family budgets, according to Branscum. He characterized the proposed rate increase as "an insult to the city." Branscum said the doc-

uments provided by Cal Water aggregate the data for Marysville with other neighboring areas and he previously asked Cal Water to provide data specific to Marysville. Branscum said that he asked again that Cal Water provide that data, so the city's consultants can review actual usage and cost, in comparison with other areas. That information will be useful in determining the next steps for the city, according to Branscum.

Many Marysville residents say they pay upwards of \$800 per month for water in the summer months, said Mayor Branscum, and "It's unsustainable."

While costs go up for the consumers, Branscum said, Cal Water is making "huge profits" and high water rates mean fewer and fewer people are able to keep their lawns green.

Councilmember Brad Hudson agreed that he had to give up lawns at two of his properties. Hudson said he appreciates the work that goes into procuring and delivering the water and understands rate increases are common practice for utility companies. But he said many Marysville residents are on fixed incomes and cannot shoulder that cost. Hudson added that he appreciates that Cal Water representatives were attending the meetings and making efforts to provide full transparency during this process. Councilmember Stuart

Gilchrist said to the residents in attendance, "We hear you and we're very

Live Oak Fire Station Gets Mural

LIVE OAK, CA (MPG) - In 2017, the city of Live Oak received its first documented mural by artist Rafael Blanco entitled "Railroading

Located on the back of the Live Oak Pharmacy, this 17-foot by 50-foot mural features a conductor peering out of a steam engine locomotive, a nod to the city's historical connection to the railroad industry.

Since then, the city's public art initiative has been full steam ahead, aided by the establishment of the Murals of Live Oak (MOLO) project and collaborations between the City of Live Oak and Yuba Sutter Arts & Culture. The Murals of Live Oak project, initiated in 2016, aims to commission two to three exterior wall murals annually and so far, the goal seems to be on track.

In 2021, Yuba Sutter Arts reported a total of 20 murals had been completed and as of Jan. 15, another project can be added to that count.

"I have to finish this today so I can get the varnish going," said Rebecca Wallace, as she added the finishing touches to her lion painting. "I started setting up last Monday and have been painting since about last Wednesday. The hardest part was probably the detail of the logo."

Wallace is a Northern Californiabased artist and muralist with more than 25 years of experience. She has contributed significantly to public art in Yuba and Sutter counties, particularly the city of Live Oak, through several notable projects including the Live Oak Public Library Mural and 48-Hour Mural Marathon in 2018, the AT&T Building Mural in 2020 and the Yuba City Mural Marathon of 2024. Wallace was also commissioned to paint the first on-campus mural at Yuba College in Marysville in

Live Oak's new mural addition is featured on the outer wall of the Live Oak Fire Station 5 located at 2745 Fir St., Live Oak. Live Oak Station 5 is a fire station operated by the Sutter County Fire Department that provides fire protection for most of Sutter County's unincorporated areas, including Live Oak.

The Sutter County Fire Department was formed in 1996 when the Live Oak, Sutter and Oswald-Tudor fire departments merged.

grateful you're here." Councilmember Marjorie Rollins said, "I think that private water companies, including Cal Water, are primarily accountable and beholden to their stockholders, not the people they serve."

While the City of Marysville has the goal of ensuring that residents thrive, Rollins said, Cal Water does not have the same goal: "We need to protect our residents and businesses at all costs. This cannot continue."

City Manager Jim Schaad said there is a significant difference in rates in Marysville compared to neighboring communities, which gives those communities an advantage and makes it harder to grow the Marysville economy with new homes and businesses. Schaad said that the higher rates paid in Marysville are not invested within the city and instead, "that money goes to shareholders and corporate salaries.

Schaad said he and his staff will work with Cal Water to understand the cost of service and how the rates are determined.

"I intend to dig into this," Schaad said.

Yuba County District 2 Supervisor Renick House spoke during Public Comment at the meeting, offering his support to Marysville in their opposition to the rate increase. He said it's important to ensure equitable access to water resources throughout the region and he would support other options for Marysville, such as switching to a different service provider.

Yuba County District 5 Supervisor Jon Messick also offered his support to Marysville. Messick serves as chair of the Yuba Water Agency, which is a public agency managing water resources within Yuba County. If the City of Marysville decided to buy out their contract with Cal Water and look into merging with a regionalized water system for water treatment and delivery, Messick said, the Yuba Water Agency could help with grant funding. "It's worth looking into," Messick said.

Cal Water's Marysville District Manager Tavis Beynon said they "want to be as transparent as possible" and would like to return with a detailed presentation answering all the questions raised at this meeting and explaining the numbers, the process and the current

system status. Cal Water's Government and Community Affairs Director Kevin McCusker said that "people might not like the answers, but we do want to bring the answers back and be respon-

"This is the beginning of the process, not the end of the process. It is a proposal; it's not a decision," McCusker said.

sive to the questions being asked."

McCusker explained that their proposed rate increase will be considered by an administrative judge with the California Public Utilities Commission (CPUC) to determine what is "prudent and necessary." McCusker expected that review would not take place until next December and he said the City of Marysville can submit written opposition to the proposal at any time during the process.

To address the higher costs in Marysville versus other areas, McCusker said that costs vary based on the actual cost of delivery. So, if an area has contaminants in the water that must be filtered out before distribution, then that community will have to bear the cost. McCusker added that other areas might be paying less if their service providers aren't imposing the state's legal conservation

Councilmember Gilchrist said that's why City Council wants to see all the specific data for Marysville, so that those factors can be considered.

Mayor Branscum agreed, stating that they need to look at all options, including severing their relationship with Cal Water.

"You have to have water, you have to find a way to pay for it, and you can only reduce your use so much," Marysville resident Susan Townsend said. Townsend added that she tore out her lawn

and put in drought-resistant landscaping but her bill keeps going up, although less water is used. While costs are expected to go up over time, she said, a 33% increase over three years is "just not right." Mayor Branscum closed the meeting by

saying, "We have a problem here. We're going to try to work our way through it." Councilmember Gilchrist made a motion

directing staff to put together a team of experts to review this issue and Councilmember Hudson seconded the motion with the addition that the experts work in cooperation with Cal Water to get the necessary data. The motion was unanimously approved by the Council.

The next regular Marysville City Council meeting is scheduled for Feb. 4.

City of Marysville Opposes Water Service's Proposed 33% Rate Increase

Flows on South Yuba River to Fluctuate During Powerhouse Testing



NEVADA COUNTY, CA (MPG) - Flows on the South Yuba River may increase by as much as a few inches starting Thursday, Jan. 23 through Feb. 3, while Pacific Gas and Electric Company (PG&E) conducts tests at an upstream powerhouse in Nevada County. Despite the higher flows, water levels are expected to be far lower than what is often seen during winter storms.

Before testing, flows in the South Yuba River at the Bowman Lake Road bridge crossing have averaged 10 cubic feet per second (cfs) over the last week. PG&E anticipates that flows in the South Yuba River will fluctuate throughout the testing period, ranging from 10 cfs to as high as 150 cfs.

The expected fluctuations in flow are well within the normal range encountered during this time of year, which may go as high as 10,000 cfs during winter storms. Nonetheless, PG&E urges those recreating in and near the river to



exercise caution, particularly due to the cold-water temperatures this time of year. ★

'Put Me in A Box'

New Yuba City Artist Popping onto Music Scene

YUBA CITY, CA (MPG) - On Jan. 4, a young blonde-haired singer followed by a posse of cameramen was spotted along the Plumas Street corridor of Yuba City. His name is Luke Poppinga, better known among his followers as "Luke Popp," an independent pop music artist who's ready to share his music with the world

"We were filming a music video that day for my newest song 'Put Me in a Box," said Poppinga. "It had been a little while since I'd gone to Plumas Street, but all the new murals made it the perfect location."

While a few teasers have already circulated, the full rendition of 'Put Me in a Box' will be dropped onto streaming platforms and social media on Jan. 31. Its sound was loosely inspired by both Weezer and a new wave of pop-punk artists such as Olivia Rodrigo.

"It's kind of a song about rediscovering yourself after a bad relationship," said Poppinga.

Looking outside the box, it's easy to find some of Poppinga's other tunes such as "Laid Back Love" and "Summer Girl." These songs are already available online, the latter of which was a collaboration with both Poppinga's father and Chris August - an American Contemporary Christian musician based in Nashville.

"We actually got to meet him through Adventure Church," said Poppinga. "Then my dad and I flew out to his studio, and it was just an amazing time."

If Poppinga's name sounds familiar, it should. His family has a long-standing musical reputation within the Yuba-Sutter community starting with his father, Jeff Poppinga. Jeff

Poppinga currently serves as the Worship Pastor at Adventure Church of Yuba City and also works as the Director of Music for both the Franklin School District and Sutter Union High School. He is married to Starr Poppinga and together they've had four children: Noah, Luke, Kyle, and Kaylee. The former has also hit it big in the local musical world and abroad.

Kaylee Poppinga (now Kaylee Everson), professionally known as Kaylee Starr, has had her musical journey well documented by the local papers since her emergence on the county fair scene around 2012. She has since gone on to release a full-length album entitled "Shine," as well as other singles.

"I grew up in a musical family and have always been surrounded by music," said Poppinga. "I have a total rockstar sister and dad, my brother plays guitar too."

A recent sound engineering graduate of Azusa Pacific University, Luke Poppinga is ready to step up his musical career and is actively looking for performative opportunities. He currently works for Hip Entertainment who will be playing at the Hard Rock in Sacramento for the

Yuba-Sutter Chamber of Commerce's 39th annual Gala.


"We play all types of different things," said Poppinga. "I was stressed about learning all the dance moves at first, but it's always a fun time and has made me a better performing artist."

This Month In Your Garden

One more month of bare root season to go for February. All varieties of dormant fruit trees are currently available. If you are wanting to plant bare root fruit trees there is still time and selections are still good. Bare Root Season is January and February.

One of the most important gardening things to be done in February, is the third and final dormant sprayingon your fruit trees. This should be done mid-February with a copper based fungicide, but watch the weather closely. If it is warm, trees may begin to bud out early. You want to get the final dormant spray application on before the buds swell and show color.

It is important to keep ahead of the fungal pests that might occur on fruits and nuts, as well as some vegetables and ornamentals. Rose are very susceptible to black spot, powdery mildew, and rust. Copper spray is well known for its use for curly leaf on peaches and nectarines, but it can also be used as a dormant spray on roses to help stop the fungal diseases before they start. Once a fungal disease is started it is difficult to control because the spores produced are easily blown to neighboring plants that might become infected. Because of its variable uses, it is a good product to have on your shelf for gardening needs. You should mix it with horticultural oil or Neem Oil, to help the spray spread evenly and cling to the foliage. Neem Oil has many other good uses. It is an excellent insecticide as well as controlling some fungi, to a lesser extent than the copper spray.

February usually brings hints of spring with it. Buds for the spring blooms begin to form. Wait to fertilize until the plants have their full set of leaves. The plants won't utilize fertilizer when they are bare of leaves. Once they are in leaf they will use the fertilizer. If you apply early and we get lots of rain, lots of the value of the fertilizer washes away with the rain. So- not too soon, but get on it when the signs of life show and give them a boost into spring. Use an appropriate fertilizer for the plants being fertilizes. There is a basic all purpose fertilizer that can be used on most things. It is often referred to as a "balanced" fertilizer since it has almost equal amounts of the three basic

elements that are in moist formulas. Those three elements are N.P and K. or Nitrogen, Phosphorous and Potassium. They will frequently be seen on the front of fertilizer packages. Acid fertilizer is used on azaleas, camellias, rhododendron and gardenias, plus other things that do well in similar conditions. Other elements will have been added to the basic three to create the desired acidity. Citrus trees have a special fertilizer with nutrients needed by that species. There is an abundance of formulas available to meet the needs of differing plants, there is also an abundance of plants that do well on the basic fertilizers.

Grasses are growing and weeds will be growing right along with them. Weeds can be controlled quite well in flower beds, now before they have emerged. by covering the areas with 2" of mulch. That will also help with watering chores later by reducing the frequency of watering since evaporation will be slowed.

As the weather gets warmer, be on the lookout for slugs and snails. Irregular holes in leaves are a clue that they are out and about. They also leave a slightly shiny trail behind. Use snail bait to destroy them. I have had very good luck with Sluggo - it is granular and is sprinkled in the infested areas. It is safe around pets and wildlife. I never saw the snails, just their empty shells. Snails also like beer and will be attracted to a bowl of beer cradled in a depression in the ground and will drown when they fall into it. Of course, it has to be emptied and wastes a bit of beer. Aphids are also one of the early pests that you will encounter. They produce a sweet and sticky substance that is left on the leaves. Ants are attracted to that and will farm the aphids and that compounds the problem, so look for ants at the base of a plant infested with aphids and bait for or spray them.

Spring is on the way soon – enjoy it.

A team of University of California Cooperative Extension advisors at the UC South Coast Research and Extension Center grew seven basil varieties last year as part of a study to explore whether producing pesto could provide a useful revenue stream for small-scale growers. "The rationale was to provide a high-value crop and a value-added solution for urban horticulture, transforming a highly perishable product into something that can be conserved," said Gerardo Spinelli, UCCE production horticulture advisor for San Diego County, who initiated the project. ★

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Trump Jumps Back into California's Water Wars with a Pro-Farmer Decree

It would be impossible to overstate the complexity of water supply management in California.

Hundreds of federal, state and local agencies decree who or what is supplied with water, when and how much will be delivered, and the prices recipients must pay.

Moreover, there are policy differences within those broad categories. For instance, local agricultural water agencies and municipal providers to homes and businesses often have different priorities.

The politics of water are even more convoluted, involving not only the public agencies but seemingly countless outside stakeholders, ranging from developers who need water supply commitments for their projects to commercial fishermen who want to protect spawning salmon.

The proliferation of competing agendas explains why it is so difficult to reach the consensus needed to move policy forward. It's not unusual for proposed projects and policies to kick around for years, if not decades, before something concrete occurs.

For example, the proposed Sites Reservoir on the west side of the Sacramento Valley now seems likely to be built, but only after 70 years of promotion by backers. The long-planned expansion of Los Vaqueros Reservoir in Contra Costa County collapsed recently when the East Bay Municipal Utility District pulled out, citing ever-rising costs.

More than six decades ago, state water officials proposed a canal to carry water around the Sacramento-San Joaquin Delta. After gaining legislative approval, a 1982 referendum blocked construction, and 40 years later, a proposed tunnel beneath the Delta remains stalled by a political stalemate.

Operations of existing of dams and canals are similarly fraught, particularly divvying up water among farmers, municipal users and flows to protect fish and other wildlife as supplies fluctuate due to climate change.

For years, federal and state authorities have sought to reduce diversions by agriculture — by far the largest water users — to bolster habitat flows. Farmers have resisted.

The state has sought "voluntary agreements" from farmers in the San Joaquin River watershed between Stockton and Fresno to enhance natural flows, threatening to order reductions if agreements are not reached. But unilateral action by the state would spark a legal battle over water rights whose outcome could not be predicted.

Another player in

California's high-stakes water game emerged eight years ago when Donald Trump became president for the first time. He forcefully backed farmers in their conflict with state water managers, ordering the Bureau of Reclamation and other

federal agencies to adopt more agriculture-friendly policies.

Four years later, after Trump was defeated by Joe Biden, the policies were reversed. Just days before Biden's tenure ended, federal and state water managers last month announced a new operational agreement.

This week, when Trump once again became president, he essentially sought to cancel that agreement and reinstate his previous policies. Based on a memo to federal water agencies, he directed them to draft a plan "to route more water from the Sacramento-San Joaquin Delta to other parts of the state for use by the people there who desperately need a reliable water supply."

Trump not only cited farmers' needs for a reliable water supply but reiterated his belief that a lack of water deliveries to Southern California made it more difficult to fight deadly wildfires - a contention that has no basis in fact. Los Angeles had plenty of water to fight fires, but hydrants ran dry because the system was designed for fighting individual building fires, not massive wildfires, and was overtaxed.

Despite the media splash, it's doubtful that Trump's decree will be anything more than a relatively brief pause in efforts to resolve California's water conflicts simply because they are measured in decades, not any one president's term.

Dear Dave, Our son is in high school, and he has a car and a parttime job nights and weekends. We've worked with him on saving, spending and giving, but should a teenager have an emergency fund, too? If so, how much do you recommended them setting aside?

Dear Dominic,

This is a great question! I'm glad to know you're working with your son and teaching him wise financial habits.

I always recommend an emergency fund of three to six months of expenses for adults, and I think that's a fair expectation for teens. as well. We're already living on a budget, but the problem is we'll have \$15,000 in student loan debt to repay, plus \$5,000 in credit card debt. What should we address first?

It sounds like all your hard work is about to pay off in a big way. And I've got some more good news for you. If you two keep living the way you have been, and put the rest toward debt, you can have that student loan and credit card debt knocked out in just a year or so.

But I want you to pay close attention to what I'm about to say next. Just because you're making more money doesn't mean you should start buying a bunch of toys or pick up a car payment. Sit down together now—don't wait—and practice making a written

monthly budget based on

your new income. Give every dollar a name before you spend it, and don't forget to work the debt snowball, too. List your debts from smallest to largest, make minimum payments on the largest, and then attack that credit card debt with a vengeance.

Chances are you can get the credit card debt taken care of in two or three months. Then, roll the money from that payment over, and apply it and any other cash you can scrape up toward the student loan debt.

With just a little more work, you folks are going to find yourselves in a really great place soon!

Tomorrow I'll circle that kitchen island twice. Life is good today.



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


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Kings Korner

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



CHICO, CA (MPG) - The Chico State men's basketball team delivered a stellar offensive performance on Jan. 25, securing a 95-86 win over a resilient Golden Eagles side. The Wildcats posted their second highest scoring total of the season, with all five starters reaching double figures, highlighted by JoJo Murphy's season-high 31 points.

With the win, the Wildcats are back in the win column, improving to 15-3 overall and 11-1 in conference play. Meanwhile, Cal State LA drops to 7-11 on the season and 5-7

in CCAA action. With a loss in Humboldt for the Toros, Chico State climbs back into a head-to-head tie for the top of the conference with Cal State Dominguez Hills as they reach the halfway mark of the season.

Murphy led the Wildcats with a season-high 31 points and eight assists, while Trae Taylor delivered an incredibly efficient performance, scoring 16 points on a flawless eight for eight shooting night.

Miles Daniels and Caden Harris each contributed 14 points, with Harris adding nine rebounds and Daniels recording six assists.

Isaiah Kerr delivered a crucial 15 points, including 11 in the second half of this tightly contested game.

It was a competitive first half, with both sides connecting on seven of their first 10 shots. Daniels started strong, hitting his first four attempts, while Murphy poured in 19 points before the break. However, the Golden Eagles stayed within reach, fueled by senior guard Dominic Escobar's impressive 18 first-half points.

Chico State shot an impressive 69 percent from the field in the first half and maintained strong efficiency throughout, finishing the game with a field goal percentage of 61.4 percent.

The Wildcats came out firing in the

second half, building a 15-point lead by the 11:51 mark. Just as it seems they might pull away, the Golden Eagles mounted a steady comeback, trimming the lead to just four with four minutes remaining.

The game remained back-and-forth until a pivotal block by Taylor at the 1:34 mark, which set up a dagger three-pointer from Kerr to extend the lead to eight, putting the game out of Cal State LA's reach.

The Wildcats will hit the road for their next two games, starting with a visit to third-place Cal State San Bernardino. Tipoff is set for 7:30 p.m. on Jan. 30, after press time.
