Community Rallies Against Placement of Sex Predator

GALT, CA (MPG) - Residents and the Galt City Council rallied against the potential placement of a sexually violent predator just outside of city limits at a special meeting convened on Tuesday, Jan. 28.

The Department of State Hospitals recommended 47, be placed in a home at Hospitals.

12655 Hauschildt Road, just a little over a half mile outside of Galt city limits. Dryden is classified as a sexually violent predator, a designation for those who have committed a sexually violent offense against one or more victims and who has been diagnosed with a mental disorder that makes them a danger to others, according that Christopher Dryden, to the Department of State School and adjacent homes successfully petitioned to

The news of the potential placement quickly spread across social media, causing concern among residents and various city boards and officials, especially considering the resident's proximity to schools including Liberty Ranch High School, Marengo Ranch Elementary School and Lake Canyon Elementary with young children.

Dryden was prosecuted and convicted in 1998 by the Sacramento County District Attorney's Office for two counts of lewd and lascivious conduct with a child under 14 years of age and sentenced to six years in state prison.

Following his sentence, Dryden was placed at Coalinga State Hospital after the district attorney Continued on Page 3

More Central Valley Water Deliveries

President Donald Trump signed a sweeping executive order on Jan. 21 that told federal agencies to "immediately take action" to deliver more Central Valley water and eliminate rules that stand in the way, including endangered species protections.

In the new order, Trump cited the Los Angeles fires, even though the actions he is ordering — delivering more water from the federal Central Valley Project — would primarily serve farms. About 75% of Central Valley Project water is used for agriculture, while much of the rest goes to cities and towns in the San Joaquin Valley, including Sacramento and Fresno.

"In particular, the Secretary of the Interior and the Secretary of Commerce shall immediately take actions to override existing activities that unduly burden efforts to maximize water deliveries," Trump's order reads.

At stake are the rules that guide two massive Delta water systems, the federal Central Valley Project and a state-operated system. the State Water Project. These networks of reservoirs, pumps and canals deliver water to millions of acres of farmland and 30 million people. They draw water from rivers that flow into the Sacramento-San Joaquin Delta and San Francisco Bay, which imperils Chinook salmon, smelt and sturgeon that are protected by the federal Endangered Species Act.

Trump ordered federal agencies to "expedite action related to any exemption under the Endangered Species Act... for the long-term operation" of the water delivery systems. In addition, he directed the federal Bureau of Reclamation to "take all available measures to ensure that State agencies — including the California Department of Water Resources — do not interfere." He entitled a section "Overriding Disastrous California Policies." Environmental groups

are likely to sue if federal agencies override the Endangered Species Act when setting rules that control how much water is delivered via the Central Valley Project or State Water Project.

Several community watchdog and environmental groups, including Restore the Delta and San Francisco Baykeeper, warned that Trump's actions "will have

ELK GROVE, CA - Four Cosumnes Fire Department firefighters returned home safely last week after spending more than two weeks in Southern California fighting the Los Angelesarea wildfires.

Captain Andy Shepard, Patrick Lynch, Dustin Romero and Masato

Seki were part of a 22-person

strike team organized through the California Office of Emergency Services to help respond to multiple blazes in Southern California that led damaged or destroyed.

to more than 200,000 people receiving evacuation orders and more than 16,000 homes and other structures Strike Team 4801-A was deployed on Jan. 7 specifically to the Palisades

Fire and was made up of five engines

and one pickup truck commanded

by a supervisor and a supervisor trainee. The other four engines were made up of two four-person teams from Sacramento Metropolitan Fire District and two four-person teams from Sacramento Fire Department.

The team returned on Jan. 22.

"We are happy to share that our personnel have returned home safely after countless hours on the frontlines, assisting with the Palisades and Eaton Fires in Southern California," Continued on Page 2

Person Struck and Killed by Train in Galt

GALT, CA (MPG) - An unidentified person was struck and killed by a train Wednesday morning on the Union Pacific tracks near the corner of A Street and McFarland Street.

The victim has yet to be identified by the Sacramento County Coroner's office. It remains unclear what led to the fatal collision.

According to Galt Police on the scene, a call for service was put out around 6:30 a.m. Initially the call was for medical service, but the victim was determined to be deceased at the

during the early stages of the investigation.

A Union Pacific spokesperson confirmed the incident in an email to The Galt Herald but did not respond to a multiple clarifying questions or provide any additional details by press time.

Cosumnes Fire Department wrote in a social media post. "Thank you to all the members of Strike Team 4801 and Task Force 7 who helped protect lives and property during these challenging fires."

"The bond shared across departments, cities, and regions is a reminder of the strength of our firefighting family—where no one stands alone," the post continued. "Welcome home."

Shepard, who is a 24-year veteran, all with CFD, said the fire was bigger than any incident that he has been a part of as a member of a strike team in the past.

Since 2002 he said he's responded to the North Complex, Lightning Complex, Mendocino Complex and, most recently, the Bear Fire in September 2024.

"This is what people call a career fire," Shepard said. "Just the amount of buildings that were destroyed and burned. All the complex problems with resources. It was definitely unique."

Fueled by powerful winds and dry conditions, a series of wildfires erupted on Jan. 7, ripping through the Los Angeles area. The fires started in Pacific Palisades, a neighborhood east of Malibu, as a brush fire, before growing to almost 23,500 acres, according to CAL FIRE.

Shortly after, the Eaton

Fire and the Hughes Fire erupted near a canvon in the national forest lands north of downtown Los Angeles and near Castaic Lake. Combined, the two fires burned over 24,400 acres. Other smaller fires also erupted in Los Angeles and have been completely contained.

According to Los Angeles County fire officials, 29 people died in the fires, 17 in the Eaton Fire and 12 in the Palisades Fire, in addition to an untold number of significant injuries.

The cause of the blazes is still under investigation. According to estimates from JPMorgan, the economic losses tied to the fires could reach \$50

"The deployment showcases the strength and resilience of the California master Mutual Aid Agreement and highlights the importance of emergency resources sharing statewide," Sacramento Metro Fire wrote in a news release.

Shepard said the strike team made it to the scene around 8 a.m. on Jan. 8 but couldn't progress to their command post due to debris and downed power lines in the road. As soon as they arrived at the fire zone they got to work.

Due to the chaotic nature of the fire, Shepard said, the crew got to work putting out whatever fires they could.

"Just pick what you can save with what you have," Shepard said.

Shepard said the team was able to save a few large home properties and apartment buildings, as well as the Palisades Charter High School.

Shepard said the team went about 56 hours with few moments of rest because there were no crews to relieve them. In a more common response, the standard would be 24 hours on duty and 24 hours off with CAL FIRE; with federal fires, the standard is 12 hours on and 12 hours

"No one wanted to be leaving the line," Shepard said. "It is just kind of hard to leave that behind."

Shepard said the team was able to meet some of the tenants and residents of Pacific Palisades, who were more than welcoming and thankful for the firefighters' help. He added the local community banded together to make sure the firefighters were well taken care of in terms of food and drinks.


He said the experience built a bond among the strike team and the other firefighters that were called to fight the blaze.



"These things just kind of build that," Shepard said. "We don't always get this kind of work, but when you do, it builds that camaraderie." ★






Big Rig Crash Halts Northbound Traffic on Interstate 5

GALT, CA - A big rig carrying hair gel crashed near the Twin Cities Road onramp on Interstate 5 blocking northbound traffic for more than six hours on Tuesday,

The driver was taken to a

nearby hospital, according to the California Highway patrol. No other injuries were reported.

The CHP was dispatched to the scene around 3 a.m., according to CHP incident logs. It is unclear why the big rig overturned. According to a CHP spokesperson, driver

fatigue is believed to have played a factor in the crash.

The truck was carrying a variety of grocery store items, including meat and

Caltrans was on scene to divert traffic off Twin Cities Road, but authorities reopened the northbound lanes around 9:20 a.m. ★

Community Rallies Against Placement of Sex Predator

Continued from page 1 have him designated as a sexually violent predator. The Sacramento Superior Court granted a petition to release Dryden to the community for outpatient treatment, based on recommendations made by the Department of State Hospitals in July 2024.

Before the jam-packed meeting finished, the Galt City Council voted 4-0 to send a letter in opposition to Dryden's placement. Council member Mathew Pratton was absent from the meeting.

The Galt City Council 101ned both the Galt Joint Union High School and Galt Joint Union Elementary school boards, which sent letters earlier in the month opposing the placement.

The Sacramento Sheriff's Office, County Supervisor Pat Hume's office, the Galt Police Department and the Sacramento County District Attorney's Office also sent letters in opposition.

After the meeting, Mayor Shawn Farmer said he's optimistic that the concerns of the community would be enough to sway

"I think we have a really good shot at this being

successful; I feel really good about it," Farmer said. "Honestly, I don't know how a judge could see letters from the city council, school board members, the police department, the sheriff's department, from the county supervisors, from the DA's office, and hundreds of the people that have written letters and the people that live there and say, '(no), this is the best place."

According to the council, over 160 pages of opposition were sent to the judge.

Galt Police Department took issue with the claim that it would respond to any calls for service at the home within nine minutes. Chief Brian Kalinowski said due to the home's placement outside of the department's jurisdiction, the Sacramento County Sheriff's Office would have to respond, which could take upwards of 40 minutes.

"This placement is strongly opposed by Chief Kalinowski and the City of Galt leadership," the department wrote in a statement. "The proposed site lacks access to essential social and medical services and is in an area

historically underserved by county resources. This decision disregards the needs and safety of both our community and the individual."

More than 16 people spoke in opposition to the placement at Tuesday's meeting; most of them were residents and some live on Hauschildt Road.

Jolene Metcalf Koyama said she and her husband live about 40 feet away from the prospective residence and said it's not the first time a sexually violent predator was proposed to move into the property.

Metcalf Koyama said the landlord of the property "does not have any consideration for the families and the neighborhood."

"With all these new families, I would love to sit outside and see the children; listen to the children, but I know the families are very afraid and they should be," Metcalf Koyama said. "I myself do not feel safe in any shape or form."

Paul Nadarisay lives on Hauschildt Road with his two children and pregnant wife, and said he would not feel safe leaving his family alone during his work hours if Dryden was allowed to move into the home.

"I am deeply troubled by the possibility of this individual being relocated to an area that is home, as you already know, to many young families and children," Nadarisay said.

Priscilla Lucero also lives on Hauschildt Road, where she owns Lucero Organic Farms, and said her business and her family could be impacted by Dryden's placement at the

"I strongly oppose this, and I hope the council also will take up for us," Lucero said. "We don't have a voice when it comes to this kind of placement."

George Kirbyson, a Galt resident, said he grew up next to a mental health facility in Vacaville that housed similar individuals as Dryden and remembered the sense of terror families would go through when someone would escape the

"That is an area where people are behind bars," Kirbyson said. "Now we want to allow these people to move into our community where we live. My children luckily are adults now, but I have nephews, nieces, and great nephews and nieces. ... Part of the reason we moved here is because it felt so safe to raise our children."

Multiple residents also questioned the system that selects where sexually violent predators are released.

Rebecca Thornton Sloan, chief of staff for Supervisor Hume's office, also spoke at the meeting and said the supervisor's office is working with the District Attorney's Office to oppose the placement.

"I can assure you that Supervisor Hume shares (the) concerns about the number of placements that get placed in this district," Thornton Sloan said.

Deputy District Attorney Carolyn Masingale said District Attorney Thien Ho filed a motion of opposition to the placement of Dryden in the community.

The deadline to submit letters to the court at SVPDDryden@sacda.org is Thursday at 5 p.m.

The final court hearing on Dryden's placement is scheduled for Friday at 9

Council member Tim Reed said he would attempt to attend the hearing, as did Farmer.

Farmer implored the community not just to send letters, but also to attend the hearing if they can. ★

devastating consequences for California's water future, public health, and environmental protections, threatening a federal takeover of California's right to manage its land and waters."

The powerful Westlands Water District, representing farmers in parts of Kings and Fresno counties, said Sunday that they welcome Trump's order. "The challenges that he highlights are real, and his leadership in addressing the barriers to water delivery are welcomed," the district said in a statement. "It's clear that what we've been doing for the past few decades has not been working; not for the people, for agriculture, or for the fish."

Trump's order said "it is in the Nation's interest to ensure that California has what it needs to prevent and fight these fires and others in the future. Therefore, it is the policy of the United States to provide Southern California with necessary water resources, notwithstanding actively harmful State or local policies."

The environmental groups said Trump's directives "conflate fire prevention needs with water operations in California all based on the myth that water operations for environmental protections had any impact on water infrastructure used in the Los Angeles fires."

Some Los Angeles fire hydrants ran out of water fighting the fires, but city fire and utility officials say it was caused by a sudden surge in demand and limited capacity of city pipelines, not lack of water supply. In addition, the city's water comes mostly from the Owens Valley, the Colorado River and groundwater, not the Delta or the Central Valley, and Southern California cities say they have ample supply after two wet winters.

"The premise of this executive order is false," said Newsom spokesperson Tara Gallegos. "Attempts to connect water management in Northern California to local wildfire fighting in Los Angeles have zero factual basis. California continues to pump as much water as it did under the Trump administration's policies, and water operations to move water south through

the Delta have absolutely nothing to do with the local fire response in Los Angeles."

State reservoirs in Southern California are at above-average levels. "There is no shortage of water in Southern California, which is why the Governor has called for an investigation into the local response," Gallegos

Rosenfield said the State Water Project ensures, even in the worst of droughts, that communities have a minimum share of water designated for purposes of "human health and safety," which includes firefighting needs. "They always deliver that human health and safety water, always — it's never interrupted," Rosenfield said.

The Central Valley Project provides about 5 million acres feet of water to farms, enough to irrigate about a third of the agricultural land in California, according to the Bureau of Reclamation.

It also delivers about 600,000 acre-feet for municipal and industrial use in the San Joaquin Valley and some Bay Area cities, enough to supply

about 1 million households with water each year.

Trump called on the Bureau of Reclamation to operate the Central Valley Project with rules that his first administration implemented in 2020. Reverting to those rules could override rules signed into law in December by Biden administration officials and endorsed by Gov. Gavin Newsom administration officials. The Biden rules would reduce Central Valley Project farm deliveries, but the State Water Project — which serves Southern California cities as well as San Joaquin Valley farms — would receive more water compared to Trump's 2020

Directors of the state's water and resources agencies could not be reached for comment.

Ryan Endean, a public information officer with the California Department of Water Resources, said in a statement last week that his agency stands by its new Delta water management rules.

Under those rules, Endean said, "farms and cities have the potential to gain additional water supply, while endangered species are protected. To abandon these new frameworks would harm California water users and protection of native fish species."

Experts say the Bay-Delta ecosystem is collapsing, and salmon populations have declined so severely that commercial and recreational salmon fishing have been banned in California for two straight years — with a third year expected, too.

The order follows a series of remarks in recent weeks by the President that reflect a profound misunderstanding of California's water supply, weaving between inaccurate and fantastical.

In Pacific Palisades on Friday, while visiting with local leaders in the aftermath of the region's wildfires, Trump said, "We have to have that water ... You're talking about unlimited water coming down from the Pacific Northwest, even coming up from parts of Canada, and it pours down naturally ... you'll never run out, you'll never have shortages and you won't have things like this, and

when you do you'll have a lot of water to put it out." Water does not flow into California from Canada, and the Pacific Northwest does not feed into Central Valley rivers. Instead, the water comes largely from Sierra Nevada snowmelt.

The order also includes provisions to expedite aid to victims of the Southern California wildfires and Hurricane Helene in North Carolina.

He ordered federal agencies to provide a plan that "expedites options for housing relief to survivors displaced by wildfires in California." Also, "within 5 days from the date of this order," he ordered federal agencies, including the **Environmental Protection** Agency, to "expedite the bulk removal of contaminated and general debris" in order "to accelerate the rebuilding of areas devastated" by the wildfires.

County officials and the Army Corps of Engineers officials have warned homeowners in the fire zones that sifting through debris and removing it could be harmful without guidelines and precautions from the EPA for handling hazardous waste.

Make absolutely certain you know what you have before you give away a future allstar, and by all means pay attention to your rookies.

Players like Isaac Jones are just waiting for an opportunity to shine, and his recent

accomplishments in the G league should serve notice to every fan that his big man has some real game. Jones played for three colleges in three different conferences and earned awards wherever he went. Finally arriving at Washington State Jones earned All-Pac-12 conference honors.

Amazingly, 6'9" Isaac Jones was overlooked in the 2024 NBA draft, and before it's over there will be a lot of teams that will wonder what their scouts were looking at.

When I see the infrequent time that Isaac has had with the Kings, I'm constantly impressed with the way he carries himself on the court, and in this young rookie the Kings have a legitimate forward who seems to get better every time he takes to the hardwood.

Social Security Matters Clarification of Medicare

Dear Rusty: I am confused by an article in my local newspaper which said that "MAGI" (modified adjusted gross income), on which my Medicare Part B premium is based, is my Adjusted Gross Income, plus any non-taxable interest, plus 50% of the social security I received. The part that is confusing is the 50% part. When I look at my tax return my Adjusted Gross Income includes the taxable portion of my Social Security benefit which, in my case, is 85% of my total benefits. Why must 50% of benefits be added to my AGI if it is already included in my total AGI? Signed: Confused

Dear Confused: The article you refer to was misleading for stating that the Modified Adjusted Gross Income (MAGI) used to determine your Medicare premiums includes your normal Adjusted Gross Income (AGI) from your

income tax return, plus

any non-taxable inter-

est you may have had,

plus 50% of the SS

benefits you received during the tax year. What the article should have said was that the MAGI which determines your Income-Related Monthly Adjustment Amount (IRMAA) to your Medicare premiums consists of your normal AGI from your tax return (which includes the taxable portion of your Social Security benefits), plus any non-taxable interest you may have had.

For additional clarity, the Income-Related Monthly Adjustment Amount (IRMAA) is a supplemental amount added to the standard Medicare premium for those with higher incomes. The thresholds at which the IRMAA supplements apply depend on your IRS filing status, and your MAGI determines the amount of supplement which will be added to the standard Medicare premium. Single filers with MAGI over \$103,000, or married filers with MAGI over \$206,000 will see an IRMAA supplement added to their Medicare premium. Those whose MAGI is under the first IRMAA threshold pay the standard Medicare premium, but those whose MAGI exceeds the first IRMAA threshold above will pay more. How much more depends on how much their MAGI

exceeds the first IRMAA

threshold by. The IRMAA

supplement (the addi-

tional premium amount)

IRMAA and MAGI could be anywhere from \$69.90 to \$419.30 per month for Medicare Part B (coverage for outpatient services), or an additional \$12.90 to \$81.00 per month to the Medicare Part D (prescription drug plan) premium - again dependent on how much over the initial MAGI threshold the person is for their IRS filing status. 

Like most pastors, I send out a weekly email to church members and friends previewing my sermon topic and promoting our upcoming events.

After the election, I received this jarring email from a person we'll call "Joe Christian."

"Please remove us from your e-mail list." Joe asked. "I wish to get as far away as possible from the poison in this country that is evangelical Christianity."

I have to admit, the email saddened me a bit.

But I understood.

Joe C. understandably mistook me for those evangelicals that I call the "Christ-mericans."

That's what I call the believers who've morphed Christ into their American patriotism. These are those who promote a certain candidate, issue, or who insist on a certain form of biblical interpretation on both Christians and non-Christians.

These "Evangelicals" are led by those trying to convince parishioners that they are being persecuted and that they've lost their freedom to profess their beliefs and follow Christ.

They urge their communities to ban library books, install their evangelical choice on the city council using methods that exploit hot issues like gay rights, abortion, and immigration.

If that describes your church, would you mind if I forwarded Joe's email. Maybe your pastor can help me compose an answer.

In the meantime, I've informed

Joe in no uncertain terms, "I am evangelical, just not THAT kind of evangelical.

"I am not the kind of evangelical who engages with the political process to protect my 'Biblical values.'

"I do not use my pulpit to preach for or against issues such as abortion, euthanasia, gay rights, or science."

away from my pulpit, I invite a local woman pastor to fill my preaching duties. (Shout-out to Cherise. My folks love you!) So, as some evangelical churches

And during the eight Sundays I'm

preach the "Christ-merican" idea, they may enjoy some "growth," – for just a little bit longer, anyway.

But in the meantime, I accept all as my brother.

And even as some dismiss me as their "Liberal brother," I'll continue to interpret Jesus' teaching in the light of modern knowledge, science and ethics. I'll lean forward using reason and experience over doctrinal authority.

I'll address folks like Joe in more relatable language, admitting that, yes, I am evangelical. But only in the sense that I think Jesus spoke with common sense. I encourage all to consider Jesus's ideas, and I will try to make my church a welcoming place to explore faith.


I'm evangelical because I believe the Holy Bible retains a message for every generation. I'm evangelical in that I believe Jesus loves all of us the way he loves each of us. AND he intensively loves each of us as if we were the only ones on earth.

So, I'll keep standing in my small pulpit with the same message I always bring "Love the Lord Your God with all your heart and your neighbor as yourself."

Eventually, Joe replied with the kindest of words.

"Thank you, Norris. I apologize for my abrupt tone. I painted with too broad of a brush."

It's OK, Joe. In the words my hospice team imprinted on their sweatshirts, "We're all just walking each other home." ★
