WEST SACRAMENTO, CA (MPG) - As Valentine's Day approaches, many start to think about floral art for their

loved ones.

But Sherry Sanbo and her Golden State Floral/West Sacramento Flower Shop team think about it every day for 38 years.

Sanbo's busiest days are a "toss up between Valentine's Day and Mother's Day." "We hire twice as many people as usual and work overtime," she said.

Although her business is open on Valentine's Day, customers should not procrastinate in placing an order.

"Order early because if we fill our

"Order early because if we fill our max, we can't take any more," Sanbo said.

From Golden State Floral's massive compound on Enterprise Boulevard in West Sacramento, Sanbo has built a wholesale and retail floral operation (West Sacramento

Flower Shop) that rivals the largest, with 36 full- and part-time employees. That includes drivers, production specialists, team leaders, assembly line workers, office managers, operation manager Siu Wong and lead designer Eloisa Castaneda. Many of the 36 employees have been with Sanbo more than 10 years and some employees since she opened in 1987.

While it might be a formidable challenge to manage for anyone,

Council Approves Street Vacating, Naming Policy Updates

WEST SACRAMENTO, CA (MPG) - Abandonment of an unused West Sacramento Street and updates to the city's park and facility naming policy were presentation subjects at the City Council's Jan. 15 meeting.

City Council held a public hearing to consider a resolution vacating the public right-of-way known as Middle Avenue, located in the 600 block of Sutter Street. Middle Avenue is west of Sutter Street in an area of the city bordered by First Avenue on the south, Interstate 80 to the west and the Southern Pacific Railway line to the north.

According to the staff report, Middle Avenue was built and dedicated to Yolo County in April 1927 as part of the Sutter Gardens Acres final development map. It was subsequently transferred to the city of West Sacramento upon its

incorporation in 1987.

"It was never improved as a road or public right of way," Community Development Department principal engineer Mark

Collier told the council.

The request for vacating Middle Avenue comes from the adjacent property owner, who owns property on both sides of the right of way. The abandonment is part of the property owner's proposed XTRA Lease project currently under review by the city.

The five council members voted unanimously to approve the Middle Avenue vacation.

City Council also received a staff presentation and report on proposed revisions to the city's Park and Facility Naming Policy. Council had previously directed city staff as part of its 2024 Strategic Plan to combine the park and facility naming policies into one policy with "best practices for equitable and intentional naming."

Art Shapiro Does it Again: Wins Beer-for-a-Butterfly Contest

WEST SACRAMENTO, CA (MPG) - University of California, Davis distinguished professor emeritus Art Shapiro has done it again.

He won the 2025 Beer-for-a-Butterfly Contest, a scientific research project he has sponsored since 1972 to seek the first cabbage white butterfly of the year in the three-county area of Sacramento, Yolo and Solano.

The person who collects the first live butterfly, Pieris rapae and is judged the winner, receives a pitcher of beer or its equivalent.

Shapiro, who works in the Department of Evolution and Ecology, College of Biological Sciences, will be drinking his own beer.

He collected the butterfly by hand along railroad tracks in West Sacramento at 12:13 p.m. Jan. 23. Shapiro brought it back to his Storer Hall campus office in a Big Blue soda bottle.

"When I collected it, I looked in my pocket for the little pill box to put it in," he said. "It was not there."

What to do?

Nearby, Shapiro spotted a trashed Big Blue soda bottle at an unoccupied homeless encampment. He gingerly lowered the butterfly inside the bottle and wadded a paper towel to close the opening.

"I don't know what Big Blue is," he said Friday. "Never heard of it." (It's a soft drink bottled in Waco, Texas and is a popular Southern soft drink along with its older cousin, Big Red. Big Blue is reportedly three times sweeter than Big Red.)

In an email with the subject line, "Pop Goes the Weasel," to his posse of fellow scientists and butterfly enthusiasts, Shapiro wrote "The minute I arrived at my West Sac site---at noon--I KNEW

Continued from page 1 The forecast looked perfect, so I went there. 64F, clear, dead calm. The lack of rain this month has dried up all the mud and most of the puddles. The vegetation has if anything regressed; there is less in bloom now than last time--one Hirschfeldi (mustard family), three Raphanus (wild radish), and several each Melilotus alba (white sweetclover) and Sonchus (sow thistles). Five homeless, including a young woman with a dog that looks like a dingo and has its ribs showing. One butterfly--an antiopa (mourning cloak). No

rapae. It sure felt like a

rapae day, though!"

"Only a few days behind model prediction, as you can see by the position of the red dot (this year) a bit above the line," noted Forester, who received his Ph.D. in ecology from University of California,

Davis in 2004.

Shapiro, who has monitored butterfly populations in Central California since 1972 and maintains a research website at http://butterfly.ucdavis.edu/, said the contest's point "is to get the earliest possible flight date for statistical purposes." It's all part of his scientific research involving long-term studies of butterfly life cycles and climate

change.
P. rapae is emerging earlier and earlier as the regional climate has warmed, Shapiro said: "Since 1972, the first flight of the cabbage white

butterfly has varied from Jan. 1 to Feb. 22, averaging about Jan. 20."

Since 1972, Shapiro has been defeated only four times and those were by University of California, Davis graduate students. Adam Porter won in 1983; Sherri Graves and Rick VanBuskirk each won in the late 1990s; and Jacob Montgomery in 2016. The first three were his own graduate students.

Shapiro collected or recorded the last four winning butterflies at the same railroad site in West Sacramento. The dates and times were 11:30 a.m. Jan. 29, 2024; 11:22 a.m. Feb. 18, 2023; and 1:25 p.m. Jan. 19, 2022.

The butterfly inhabits vacant lots, fields and gardens where its host plants, weedy mustards, grow. It's a white butterfly with black dots on the upperside, which could be faint or not visible in the early season. The male is white. The female is often slightly buffy; the "underside of the hindwing and apex of the forewing may be distinctly yellow and normally have a gray cast," Shapiro said. "The black dots and apical spot on the upperside tend to be faint or even to disappear really early in the season."

In its larval stage, the cabbage white butterfly is a pest of cole crops, including cabbage, cauliflower and broccoli.

Assisting with the 2025 contest was the Bohart Museum of Entomology, directed by professor Jason Bond. The 2025 alternative rules stipulated that contestants must collect a live butterfly in the wild, video it and email the entry to the Bohart Museum at bmuseum@ucdavis.edu, listing

Convicted Child Molester to Be Freed

WEST SACRAMENTO, CA (MPG) - On Jan. 23, Yolo County Superior Court Judge Daniel Maguire granted a compassionate release to convicted child molester Kevin Ellis.

Ellis, 67, was before the court after the California Department of Corrections and Rehabilitation petitioned the court for consideration of a recall and resentencing. The petition stated Ellis suffered from a serious and advanced illness with a life expectancy of less than six months, meeting the criteria of a compassionate release.

If the court finds the defendant meets the criteria, there is a rebuttable presumption in favor of release, unless the court finds the defendant is an unreasonable risk of danger to public safety. An unreasonable risk of danger to public safety is defined as

an unreasonable risk of committing a specified violent felony often referred to as a "super strike."

Ellis was convicted by a jury in 2013 of multiple counts of child molestation against two victims. He was also convicted of failure to register as a sex offender and two counts of furnishing marijuana to a minor under the age of 14. Ellis had a prior conviction for child molestation from 1995 involving two victims. As a result, he was sentenced to a term of 112 years, eight months to life in prison.

At a Jan. 16 hearing, the District Attorney's Office elicited testimony from the director of Health Care Services for the California Department of Corrections and Rehabilitation that Ellis, although wheelchair bound, was able to perform daily activities. Prosecution argued that the crimes committed by Ellis did not require him to be mobile and that his compromised mobility did not lessen any

risk to public safety.

On Jan. 23, based upon the rebuttable presumption and the current state of the law, the court said it had no discretion to deny release and found the defendant did not pose an unreasonable risk to public safety.

Acknowledging the horrific nature of the defendant's crimes, the court cited the statute's limitations of judicial discretion. Despite objections from the District Attorney's Office and the victims, Ellis was granted a release from prison. Only after the court grants the release does California Department of Corrections and Rehabilitation determine suitable placement.

At this time, it is unknown where Ellis will be living. Under the law, his previous and current child molestation convictions are violent felonies that fall within the enumerated list of crimes considered risks to public safety.

"the representation and land acknowledgement of the local indigenous tribes."

Historically, the park naming process has been separate from the facility process and has usually taken place as part of development. The current process begins with residents' submitting a proposed name to the director of Parks and Recreation, which is then reviewed by the Parks, Recreation and Intergenerational Services (PRIS) Commission and subsequently submitted for final approval to City Council.

Besides the combining of policies and assigning of final authority, other proposed naming policy changes noted that facilities included are city buildings, parks, bridges, overpasses, trails "and other related public amenities and locations."

In his presentation, Capital Projects Department Capital Improvement manager Peter Ibrahim told council that the naming criteria included the provision that "names selected should reflect DEI (diversity, equity, inclusion) of the West Sacramento community and have local, state or national relevance."

Under the new policy, City Council,

department staff and residents can submit requests for naming at any time. Requests should be filed on the appropriate form with the City Clerk, who reviews it for completeness and forwards it to City Council where it can be discussed, modified and placed on an upcoming agenda for consideration.

At the meeting, council can decide if the proposal needs community input, and if so, it is referred to the Community Relations Department for outreach to citizens and the PRIS Commission for review. If the nomination is an individual, it must have the approval of the individual or their families.

After review and consideration of community input, the proposal is again sent to City Council for final approval.

During council questions, Mayor Martha Guerrero asked Ibrahim if staff could make sure that the public vetting process for park and facility naming will be conducted in multiple languages. Ibrahim confirmed that there was a way to meet that request.

Council unanimously approved the proposed park and facility-naming policy undates.

SACRAMENTO REGION, CA (MPG) -Two high school students have found a way to give back to

young patients and their families at Shriners Hospital in Sacramento this Valentine's Day.

Norcal Gift From the Heart Foundation's second annual

Foundation's second annual Valentine's Day Drive is underway and preparing to shower patients and their families with handmade Valentines and hundreds of toys and teen items on Feb. 14.

Oak Ridge High School Junior Aislynne Hartman, 16, and Ponderosa High School Sophomore Sophia Alonso, 15, created their nonprofit organization, the Norcal Gift From the Heart Foundation, in 2024 with the mission of encouraging philanthropy among students in their community while focusing on the specific support of children's charities.

The nonprofit Norcal Gift From the Heart organization is based out of Gold River.

"It all started with the simple idea of collecting handmade Valentines with loving messages for teens," Hartman said. "The first year, it was just the two of us and we asked our own schools to help us make Valentines but this year, more than 12 schools in four counties have agreed to either make Valentines or collect toys for Shriners."

While their first year was largely focused on all the paperwork necessary for starting a nonprofit organization and getting their IRS tax-exempt status, the teens shared that this year has been dedicated to spreading the word and encouraging other schools to help them reach their goal of collecting 1,200 valentines.

To reach this goal, Hartman and Alonso created a Student Ambassador program, recruiting

"Our foundation supplies premade valentine kits for all the schools that want to participate. The kits include things like stickers, card-making materials and sample messages," said co-founder Alonso. "This year, we also created a special QR code to link our Amazon Gift List to our website and social media so donors could ship a toy or teen item directly to the foundation." Both girls agreed that their favorite part of the drive is reading the sincere personal messages and seeing how much effort kids put into making their cards.

"We hope the kids and teens at Shriners really feel all of our love this Valentine's Day," Hartman added.

Yes, on that night when the San Antonio Spurs arrive, you'll have the opportunity to once again witness the fastest man in the NBA, and you guessed it, none other than former King DeAaron Fox.

Emotions are running high right now as arguably the best overall player in Sacramento Kings history leaves the Sactown family to join the San Antonio

What do I think of that? Sad simply doesn't get it. There's a hole in my heart, but a gratitude for a player that turned back the clock when it comes to professionalism and fan involvement.

Social Security Matters

Social Security Benefits for Someone with Multiple Ex-spouses

Dear Rusty: If a financially well-off individual had multiple ex-spouses, could it happen that the multiple ex-spouses could each be collecting Social Security based on their own financial situation as compared to their rich ex-spouses? Thus, multiple payouts by SS? Just curious, because there are probably many people in this situation as a result of the ever-increasing number of people involved in multiple marriages that each lasted more than ten years. Signed: Curious Ex-Spouse

Curious D e a r Ex-Spouse: A former spouse can only collect one SS benefit - either their own SS retirement amount, or an amount as an ex-spouse if the marriage lasted 10 years or more. And it is possible for multiple ex-spouses

of a marriage to the same person to qualify for benefits from those unions, if each marriage lasted at least 10 years. But each ex-spouse can only qualify for one benefit payment – either their own earned SS benefit, or their benefit as an ex-spouse. In other words, someone with two (or more) ex-spouses might have their ex's collecting full benefits on their record, provided that each marriage lasted at least 10 years. But an ex-spouse can only get one benefit –their own SS retirement amount or an ex-spouse amount whichever is higher).

It's possible, also, that an ex-spouse can collect benefits from a former spouse at the same time as a current spouse is also collecting spouse benefits on the same record. And there is no detriment to either's amount because multiple spouses or ex-spouses are collecting on a one person's SS record (Social Security is, after all, a means for spouses, or ex-spouses, to avoid poverty). However, an ex-spouse's own SS retirement benefit (from their personal lifetime work record) must be less than any ex-spouse benefit they are entitled to from a former spouse. Essentially, if the "10-years-married" rule is satisfied, ex-spouses are subject to the same benefit rules as a current

You are correct that we see some cases like this these days, but each eligible ex-spouse can only get one benefit, and their ex-spouse benefit is always offset by any personal SS retirement benefit the ex-spouse may also be entitled to on their own lifetime work record.

California's Taxes on Wealth May Hinge on How Trump Treats Deductions

California's state budget is inordinately dependent on taxing the incomes of wealthy residents.

Gov. Gavin Newsom's proposed 2025-26 budget assumes that the state will receive \$133.7 billion in personal income taxes, more than 60% of general fund revenues. Nearly half of that would be paid by the 1% of Californians sitting atop the taxable income ladder.

The downside risk of such dependency is that taxes on the rich tend to swing up and down more than taxes on ordinary wage earners, because earnings on investments are substantial portions of wealthy people's taxable incomes.

When the rich are getting richer, California sees multi-billion-dollar revenue windfalls. But downturns in their investments often result in sharp declines in tax receipts. In his budget, Newsom mentions the "swings in revenues and uncertainty that are a hallmark of California's volatile tax system."

The new budget cites a recent uptick in revenues that allowed Newsom's budget to expand some categories of spending, such as a big increase in tax subsidies for the beleaguered Southern California film and

budget's revenue assumptions is in doubt because of the wildfires that have afflicted Los Angeles County. But regardless of their impact, the state will continue to depend on volatile revenues from the

The limit has the indirect effect of increasing federal levies on taxpayers who pay more than \$10,000 in SALT each year. Other aspects of the 2017 tax bill, signed by Trump, benefited the wealthy but even so, California's tax officials estimated that the net impact on California tax-

lost their homes in Pacific Palisades and Malibu.

By happenstance, just as the new budget and the wildfires become prominent items on the Capitol's political agenda, something else is happening in Washington that could affect California's harvest of taxes on the rich.

With Donald Trump back in the White House, negotiations are underway on repeal or retention of a 2017 change in federal tax law that adversely affected states such as California and New York, whose budgets depend on taxing the incomes of the rich.

The change, part of a much larger overhaul of tax policy, limited deductions for state and local taxes - SALT in the politi-

cal vernacular - on federal

payers would be a \$12 billion annual increase in their federal tax obligations.

New York and California legislators and governors saw it as a deliberate hit by Republicans, including Trump, on blue state finances and have tried, on and off, to have it repealed ever since, to no avail. They worried aloud that the much-reduced SALT deduction would encourage wealthy taxpayers to move to states with low or no income taxes, such as Nevada, Texas and Florida.

Prior to heading to Southern California, Narang was ranked as the No. 7 prospect in Northern California by Top Drawer Soccer and played club with the Sacramento Republic FC Academy. He made his debut with the first team on Aug. 31, 2021, against San Diego Loyal and helped lead the U19 squad to the final four of the "MLS Next" Tournament.
