

#### Age, Disability-Friendly **Action Plan** Launched

#### SACRAMENTO, CA (MPG)

- Sacramento County is taking a significant step toward ensuring a more livable and accessible future for its aging and disabled residents.

By 2030, one-fourth of Sacramento County's population will be 60 or older, and approximately 200,000 residents currently live with a disability.

In response to these growing needs, the Department of Child, Family and Adult Services has launched the Local Age and Disability-Friendly Action Plan (LADAP), a comprehensive initiative shaped by years of advocacy and community input. Sacramento County is proud to partner with the California Department of Aging and AARP's Age-Friendly Network of States and Communities to achieve this goal.

On Feb. 25, Sacramento County Board of Supervisors formally adopted the Local Age and Disability-Friendly Action Plan resolution, reinforcing the county's commitment to improving access to essential resources for older adults and people with disabilities. This plan aligns with the five bold goals of California's Master Plan for Aging.

The first goal is Housing for All Stages and Ages which is ensuring accessible and affordable housing options for residents of all ages. The second goal is Health Reimagined that is expanding healthcare access and wellness programs tailored to older and disabled adults.

The third goal is Inclusion and Equity, Not Isolation, which is fostering community connections and reducing social isolation. The fourth goal is

Caregiving That Works, which means strengthening support for caregivers and long-term care services.

The fifth and final goal is Affording Aging, which is addressing economic challenges that impact aging residents.

CITRUS HEIGHTS, CA (MPG) - At the Feb. 26 Citrus

Heights City Council meeting, Citrus Heights Police Chief Alex Turcotte presented three officers with the Distinguished Service

Turcotte said the medal is awarded for the "use of exceptional tactics and judgement" in stressful situations involving"the threat of imminent danger to themselves or others.'

Officer Hayden LaCurelle earned the medal for his remarkable composure under pressure when responding to an incident involving a man armed with a knife. He prioritized de-escalation tactics and was able to bring about a

Continued from page 1 actions "out of a sense of duty to the community. I can't tell you how much I appreciate that."

Councilmember Porsche Middleton said, "We are so fortunate to have law enforcement professionals like you amongst our ranks." She thanked them for putting themselves in the line of danger and using their exceptional training, character, and integrity to keep the community safe.

Vice-Mayor MariJane Lopez-Taff said she knows the officers perform heroic actions every day, so these must have been extraordinary circumstances to earn this recognition.

During Public Comment, two residents spoke against a proposal by Ethan Conrad Properties to build a Home Depot and In-N-Out Burger at Sunrise Mall. They said the redevelopment should revitalize the area by focusing on fine dining and housing.

City Council then considered possible options to deal with blight at existing recycling centers in Citrus Heights. Senior Planner Alison Bermudez said that some of the current challenges include the unattractive appearance of the centers and loitering around the premises.

Under the city's current regulations, recycling centers are private businesses allowed in commercial zones with a maximum of 600 square feet of space. There is no limit on the number of centers or on distance between centers.

State legislation imposes a one-mile convenience zone around qualified retailers who sell beverages to ensure that customers have a convenient opportunity to recycle the containers and get back their five or 10 cents from the California Redemption Value (CRV) deposit. If there is no recycling center within that convenience zone, the retailer is responsible for providing recycling opportunities, such as allowing recycling

within the store.

Currently, 12 retailers in Citrus Heights meet the total annual sales requirement for qualified retailers, which establishes 12 convenience zones in the city. The four existing recycling centers meet four of those zones but there are still many areas that are

Staff presented four options for potential policy changes. Option 1 was to require a full use permit for new centers, which would have a higher application cost and go to the Planning Commission for consideration, instead of the current administrative approval process.

Option 2 was a policy that any new center would have to be located within an existing convenience zone, which could benefit the retailers and reduce the number of potential new centers.

Option 3 was a requirement for new recycling centers to have full indoor operations, which would reduce the visual impact and fill vacant commercial spaces but those would have a much higher start-up cost for businesses.

Option 4 would be to change

the allowable space so existing centers could expand in order to implement modernizations.

Bermudez said the operators of the existing centers are very willing to work with the city to make improvements. And she also clarified that the city is not required to make any policy changes at

During Public Comment, Tim James of the California Grocers Association said that local grocery stores are very invested in the communities they serve and "based on state law, we're the epicenter of where all this emanates from."

James added that the state has "lifted some of these old school restrictions and created opportunities for us to comply in ways that use new technology," so now local grocers are looking into nonprofit cooperatives that can fulfill the recycling requirements. His concern was that without input from the grocers, the city might enact policies that unintentionally restrict those new opportunities or make it more difficult for grocers to comply with state law.

"Let's not commit to options tonight. Let's take some time. Do the bigger, deeper dive. Think about working with the grocers and getting some more information before you decide to move forward," James said.

Tony Gonzalez spoke on behalf of Tomra North America, a recycling technology company operating in the U.S. and Canada. He explained that there is existing legislation that provides funding to incentivize the modernization of recycling programs. He pointed to a new recycling center, Simply Recycle, at 4805 San Juan Ave. in Fair Oaks, which is clean and approachable with all recycling operations occurring inside. Gonzalez said it is currently the only one like it in California but new technologies can help replicate its success in Citrus Heights.

During City Council comments, Councilmember Middleton said it is a priority to address the existing blight through controlled expansion, modernization and enforcement. She suggested that the city could limit the number of new centers and encourage their establishment in underserved convenience zones. She said incentives such as local grants could help existing centers move their operations indoors, and the City could mandate improved site design standards, as well as increased security and proper fencing.

Councilmember Nelson said she'd like to consider a combination of all the options recommended by staff.

Councilmember Schaefer said he supported the idea of the grocers creating a nonprofit cooperative.

"I really think that this is a problem that we can let the industry solve instead of coming up with our own solution for this," said Schaefer. "I think allowing them to take a crack at this first, before we start moving into a regulation, is the right move.'

Vice-Mayor Lopez-Taff agreed that it was important to talk to the grocers and see what is the best fit for them.

Polices for future centers should not be determined until after more outreach with the grocers, Mayor Karpinski-Costa said. She also agreed with Middleton that the city has to do something about the existing blight, such as increasing the allowable space so they have room to expand and improve.

Councilmember Schaefer cautioned that the grocers could have ideas that improve the entire recycling industry and make any immediate city plans obsolete. He suggested tabling the issue until the stakeholder discussions have been completed.

Despite Councilmember Schaefer's concerns, the City Council majority directed staff to meet with local grocers but also come back to council with policy proposals to improve the existing centers.

The next Citrus Heights City Council meeting is scheduled for 6 p.m. March 12.

## Local Snack Man's Birthday Time to Get Your Game On **Sock Drive**

CITRUS HEIGHTS, CA (MPG) - Every March, Citrus Heights local Alfredo Sanchez, known as Snack Man, becomes Sock Man for a month. For the past five years, his birthday wish has been for the community to help him collect more than 3,000 pairs of socks for the homeless.

Sanchez, who turns 62 years old this year, is a well-known friend and advocate to the local homeless population in his neighborhood on Greenback Lane.

"The reason for 3,000 pairs is that I go out 300 times a year and hand out about 10 pairs of socks each time. When I run out of what I've got for the day that's it," Sanchez said.

Sanchez estimates that he visits around 7,000 homeless people with snacks and personal care items each year. Friends help drive him around to make these visits, which greatly extends the range he can cover. This is compared to his usual method of handing items out on a colorful electric scooter that Sanchez calls the "Snackmobile."

Sara Wheeler, co-owner of the Grocery Outlet on 6059 Greenback Lane, has a colorful barrel ready to be filled up several times in the next three weeks to help make this happen.

In 2021, Wheeler's husband suggested to Sanchez, a frequent customer, to put a bin in their store for the sock donations. That was the beginning of a tradition and became "a fixture in our community," said Wheeler.

Socks can be dropped off at 6253 Longford Drive at any time. For those who prefer to shop online and have their socks delivered, Sanchez suggests buying from Amazon as it has deals. Larger socks size 11 or 12 are best for men and women. Sanchez is "very grateful" to all his donors who contribute to the sock drive that runs through March 31.

"We've created a very special space for our customers," Strobel said. Another larger Fire and Ice Games is in Rocklin at 6688 Lonetree Blvd, Suite 100 opened in 2021.

As a combination video game and card shop, Fire and Ice appeals to two very fast-growing customer profiles, who share a measure of passion and multi-generational appeal for what they

Strobel expressed his deep gratitude to the crowd and the chamber, thanking everyone for their support.

"You come in here, you're creating core memories with your kids, you're reliving core memories with your best friends, your dads, your grandparents, that's what it's about," Strobel said.

Customers also looked at card inventory of Magic: The Gathering tabletop and digital collectible cards. This series which was created by Richard Garfield was released in 1993 by Wizards of the Coast, Magic had approximately fifty million players as of February 2023.

You will feel like you've stepped inside of a video game itself when you walk inside Fire and Ice.

Turn around once you've walked inside the store and then quickly look back at a giant brightly colored mustachioed Super Mario themed mural featuring all the game characters you

know. There are artful splashes of color wherever you look, right down onto the floor, painted in swirling flaming yellow and black. A bin of popular character themed plushies invited a squeeze.

The store's high sloping ceiling is painted bright blue. A large round ventilation pipe in the ceiling

located across from the Citrus Town Center, in the same shopping center as Buffalo Wild Wings and Red Lobster.

which runs the length of the store is painted to match the familiar green color of a Super Mario video game.

Hundreds of used and tested video games are displayed in different wall sections each representing popular individual gaming system manufacturers as Nintendo, Sega, Sony Playstation and Xbox.

Strobel said individual game cartridge prices vary depending on their rarity and collectible value with some starting under \$10.00.

Strober, in his 40s, is a longtime gamer himself. He recalled the camaraderie he felt when home gaming consoles first became popular, and game cartridges were often shared once they became mastered.

Video games make up \$100 billion global industry, and nearly two-thirds of American homes have household members who play video games regularly.

"There's a certain nostalgia associated with some of these popular original games as they are now shared with the next generation, and they compete with one another at home as they did with their friends growing up," Strobel said.

Nintendo Entertainment System (NES) first came to the United States in 1985 releasing video game franchises such as Super Mario Bros., The Legend of Zelda, and Metroid that is still enjoyed today.

There's also plenty of Nintendo game cartridges to choose from starting from 1990 when Nintendo released its cartridge-based 64-bit system, the Nintendo

In 1995, Sega released in North America its Saturn system, the first 32-bit console that played games on CDs rather than cartridges, and if you're looking for one of your favorites from that era, you'll find it.

Turn the corner and there's a selection for the Sony Playstation. Sony's Playstation 2, released in 2000, was the first console that used DVDs, went up against the Sega Dreamcast (released in 1999), the Nintendo Gamecube (2001), and Microsoft's Xbox in 2001.

In 2005 and 2006, Microsoft's Xbox 360, Sony's Playstation 3, and Nintendo's Wii then kicked off the modern age of high-definition gaming.

"I think of Fire and Ice as an historical experience, and not a typical retail store. We share the same passion for gaming that our customers do, and we do our best to put our customers first, to share the knowledge and joy we have," Strobel said.

## **UC Davis Offers Doctor of Nursing Program**

SACRAMENTO REGION, CA (MPG) -

The Betty Irene Moore School of Nursing at the University of California, Davis has earned accreditation for its Doctor of Nursing Practice - Nurse Anesthesia degree program by the Council on Accreditation of Nurse Anesthesia Educational Programs (COA).

This significant milestone marks the first Doctor of Nursing Practice - Nurse Anesthesia program within the University of California system and only the sixth of its kind in California. The program is set to welcome its inaugural cohort of students

The Doctor of Nursing Practice - Nurse Anesthesia program is an integrated, full-time, three-year curriculum designed to equip experienced critical-care registered nurses with the knowledge and hands-on training required to become Certified Registered Nurse Anesthetists.

The program blends rigorous online coursework with in-person simulation training and extensive clinical experience, ensuring students receive a comprehensive and immersive education.

'Earning COA accreditation validates the quality of our curriculum and faculty and highlights the caliber of the dedicated and supportive staff here at the School of Nursing," said Program Director Jakkarin "Jake" Sareerak. "As a new program, we prioritized hiring the highest caliber of Certified Registered Nurse Anesthetists faculty, many of whom have served in program administrator

roles and bring extensive experience in both education and clinical practice."

Certified Registered Nurse Anesthetists programs have transitioned from the master's degree to the Doctor of Nursing Practice level to better prepare clinicians for the increased complexity of patient care and to equip them with advanced leadership and quality improvement skills. This change, supported by accrediting bodies, ensures that Certified Registered Nurse Anesthetists are ready to meet modern health care challenges and effectively lead interdisciplinary teams.

Applicants must hold either a bachelor's degree in nursing science or an equivalent major or a bachelor's degree in another specialty in addition to a Master of Science in Nursing or an equivalent graduate degree.

Graduates of the Doctor of Nursing Practice - Nurse Anesthesia program will be fully prepared to take on leadership roles in anesthesia care, Sareerak said, which addresses critical gaps in health care access across California.

#### **Addressing the Shortage**

The demand for anesthesia providers continues to outpace supply nationwide. The American Association of Nurse Anesthesiology reports that by 2033, the anesthesiology workforce could experience a shortage of approximately 12,500 providers. That is further exacerbated in California's rural and underserved areas.

With 40-million residents, the state has a growing need for anesthesia services, especially

as its aging population requires more procedures. In addition, non-operating-room anesthesia sites are increasing due to technological advancements, which require more anesthesia care beyond traditional surgical settings.

By expanding nurse anesthesia education, the School of Nursing is actively addressing this workforce challenge and strengthening the future of anesthesia care in California.

"With the growing shortage of anesthesiologists and Certified Registered Nurse Anesthetists across the nation, this program is poised to help bridge the gap by preparing highly-skilled nurse anesthetists to serve diverse patient populations," said Dean Stephen Cavanagh.

UC Davis Health is also

meeting this need head-on by partnering with the School of Nursing through its expansion efforts. A key milestone in this expansion is the integration of the 48X Complex as part of the program's primary clinical training site.

Expected to open for patients in July, the four-story, 268,228-square-foot complex will feature 14 operating rooms. The large facility is ideal for presenting learning opportunities for Certified Registered Nurse Anesthetist students and addressing the shortage of ambulatory operating room capacity at the main hospital.

"This initiative will provide invaluable hands-on experience for future Certified Registered Nurse Anesthetists while ensuring a steady pipeline of highly trained anesthesia providers within UC Davis Health. We hope to retain many of the graduates which will help us reinforce our commitment to delivering safe, high-quality anesthesia services and shaping the future of health care excellence," said Kimberly Beres, the health system's chief nurse anesthetist.

The Doctor of Nursing Practice -Nurse Anesthesia program is the latest offering from the Top 25 15-year-old nursing school. The school already offers a popular Doctor of Nursing Practice - Family Nurse Practitioner program that is helping to fulfill California's shortage of primary care providers, along with master's degrees in nursing, physician assistant studies, a Doctor of Philosophy program and a psychiatric mental health nurse practitioner post-graduate certificate program.

## **California Comment on Latest Small Business Optimism Index**

Small business optimism across the nation fell a bit in January but for the third consecutive month, came in higher than its 51-year average, according to the release Feb. 11 of the monthly Small Business Optimism Index by the National Federation of Independent Business (NFIB).

"Prior to this nice three-month stretch, the Small Business Optimism Index went 34 consecutive months below its 51-year average," said John Kabateck, state director for National Federation of Independent Business in California. "What we could be witnessing is a possible rebound for all sectors of the economy. A rebound that could get some serious traction with the right state and federal policies. A possible rebound that could just as easily be undercut by the wrong ones."

The National Federation of Independent Business's monthly Small Business Optimism Index is the gold standard measurement of America's small business economy. Used by the Federal Reserve, Congressional leaders, administration officials and state legislatures throughout the nation, it's regarded as the bellwether on the health and welfare of the Main Street enterprises that employ half of all workers, generate more net new jobs than large corporations, and gave most of us the first start in our working life.

The Optimism Index (aka Small Business Economic Trends report) is a national snapshot of the National Federation of Independent Business member, small-business owners not broken down by state. The typical National Federation of Independent Business member employs between

one and nine people and reports gross sales of about \$500,000 a year. "Overall, small business owners



## **Drivers See a Slight Break at the Pump**

SACRAMENTO REGION, CA (MPG) - With winter nearly in the rearview, temperatures warmed up while gas prices cooled down. Last week, gas prices dropped by three cents, bringing the national average to \$3.12 per gallon.

Gas prices are expected to remain steady as March arrives and routine seasonal maintenance wraps up.

On Feb. 27, California drivers saw an average price of \$4.81, a three-cent drop from two weeks ago.

Fuel prices throughout the state on Feb. 27 included San Francisco at \$5.05, Oakland at \$4.98, San Jose at \$4.91, Sacramento at \$4.95, Fresno at \$4.82 and Stockton at \$4.77.

Regarding the Oil Market Dynamics, at the close of the Feb. 26 formal trading session, the West Texas Intermediate (WTI) rose \$2.54 to settle at \$80.04 a barrel. The Energy Information Administration (EIA) reported that crude oil inventories decreased by 2 million barrels from the previous week. At 412.7 million barrels, U.S. crude oil inventories are about 6% below the five-year average for this time of year.

A quick analysis of gas stats shows that the nation's Top 10 most expensive gasoline markets are California (\$4.81), Hawaii (\$4.54), Washington (\$4.14), Nevada (\$3.84), Oregon (\$3.76), Alaska (\$3.46), Arizona (\$3.40), Pennsylvania (\$3.33), Washington, D.C. (\$3.25) and Illinois

The nation's Top 10 least expensive gasoline markets are Mississippi (\$2.67), Texas (\$2.69), Oklahoma (\$2.73), Kentucky (\$2.74), Louisiana (\$2.76), Arkansas (\$2.78), Alabama (\$2.78), South Carolina (\$2.79), North Carolina (\$2.80) and Tennessee (\$2.80).

Taking a glance at the electricity stats in the nation shows that the Top 10 most expensive states for public charging per kilowatt hour are Hawaii (55 cents), West Virginia (47 cents), Montana (45 cents), Idaho (42 cents), Arkansas (42 cents), New Hampshire (42 cents), Tennessee (42 cents), Kentucky (41 cents), Alaska (41 cents) and South Carolina

The nation's Top 10 least expensive states for public charging per kilowatt hour are Kansas (22 cents), Nebraska (24 cents), Maryland (25 cents), Missouri (25 cents), Delaware (28 cents), Iowa (28 cents), Texas (29 cents), Michigan (29 cents), Utah (29 cents) and North Dakota (30 cents).

## Should I Wait until Age 70 to Claim Social Security?

Dear Rusty: I am a married woman, at my full retirement age, and the primary earner in my marriage. How do I know if I should take my Social Security now or wait till 70? I will lose quite a bit if I take it now. How will it affect my taxes if I take it now while still working a full-time job? Signed: Undecided

Dear Undecided: As you apparently already know, waiting until you are 70 to claim Social Security will result in you getting your maximum possible monthly SS retirement benefit. After your full retirement age, you get about 8% more each year you delay claiming up to age 70. But deciding exactly when to claim should consider both your financial needs and, importantly, your life expectancy. If you don't urgently need the money now and your life expectancy is at least "average," then waiting until age 70 to claim is usually the right choice. But if you urgently need the money, or your life expectancy is less than average (mid-80s for a woman your current age), then claiming before age 70 is usually prudent.

Regarding taxation, Social Security benefits may be taxable if your combined income from all sources exceeds the threshold for your IRS filing status. If you file taxes as "married/jointly" and your combined income (including your work income) exceeds \$32,000, then half of the SS benefits you received during the tax year becomes part of your taxable income. But if your combined income is over \$44,000, then up to 85% of your SS benefits becomes taxable income (the thresholds are lower for those who file as a single). So, your full-time work income will likely affect how much of your Social Security benefits are subject to income tax

by the IRS.

In the end, only you can decide when you should claim Social Security. Taxation of benefits may be a factor to consider since you are still working full time (thus more

of your SS benefits will be taxable). But waiting longer to claim results in a higher benefit for the rest of your life (your SS retirement benefit will be .667% more for each month you delay, up to age 70). If the "rest of your life" is a long time and you don't urgently need the money, waiting is often the right choice. If not, claiming earlier may be wiser.

## Lacking the Capacity to Store Water That Atmospheric Rivers Dump on the State

President Donald Trump is obsessed with how California manages its water supply, demanding changes as one price of giving the state billions of dollars in aid to cope with Southern California's deadly and destructive wildfires.

However, Trump's specific complaints are not grounded in hydrologic or managerial reality — such as his insistence that a lack of water from Northern California was a factor in either the fires' eruption or the firefighting efforts. Hydrants dried up largely because systems were designed to deal with individual structure fires, not widespread wildfires involving thousands of buildings.

That said, there's much to criticize in how California, once a global leader in large-scale water management, has faltered. Population growth and evolving agricultural practices have increased demand, while federal and state environmental laws, judicial decisions, political foot-dragging and climate change have restricted supply.

One major failing has been a slow response to an obvious need for more water storage — either in reservoirs or underground aquifers — to capture winter rains and spring snowmelts as a buffer for dry years.

Scientists believe that even if California's overall water supply from rain and snow storms doesn't decline, wet and dry cycles have become more intense, and more precipitation is coming as rain instead of snow. Thus the natural reservoirs of snow-packs in the Sierra and other mountain ranges are becoming less dependable, increasing the need for supplemental storage.

California's most recent experiences — two wet winters that defied some forecasts — underscore the need.

A new report from the Public Policy Institute of California points out that the atmospheric rivers that dropped immense quantities of rain and snow on the state this month, following a very dry January, did not result in substantial new storage in the state's major reservoirs.

"Rather than storing all the water they can, during the winter reservoir operators are required to maintain enough space in their reservoirs to capture high inflows and reduce the risk of flooding downstream," PPIC researchers Jeffrey Mount and Greg Gartrell wrote.

"When the February storms arrived, the surge of water into the state's two largest reservoirs — Shasta and Oroville — quickly filled the flood reserve space. Because the winter flood season is far from over, dam operators had no choice but to let the water go to make space for possible future floods.

"And they let go a lot of water. Between February 1 and 18, those two reservoirs alone released more than 2 million acre-feet of water into the Sacramento and Feather Rivers to maintain

Scientists believe that even space for future stormwater."

An acre-foot is 325,851 gallons and 2 million-acre feet equates to more than half of Oroville's capacity, or about 20% of what Californians consume each year for non-agricultural purposes.

Overall, Mount and Gartrell calculated, 5.1 million acre-feet of water flowed into the Sacramento-San Joaquin Delta from storm runoff and reservoir releases during that period in February. Just 4% of it could be diverted into storage because of insufficient capac-

ity and operational mandates.

Even a relatively tiny increase in storage capacity could pay huge dividends when wet winters such as this evolve into periods of drought. Had the long-proposed Sites Reservoir on the west side of the Sacramento Valley existed, it could have banked as much as 1.5 million acre-feet of that excess flow.

California's water managers acknowledge the need for more storage to take advantage of high-precipitation winters such as this one, but clearing all of the legal and financial hurdles and actually building it take decades. Sites, first proposed seven decades ago, is just now beginning to appear feasible.

The hydrological reality of California's water supply is changing faster than our willingness to deal with it. The outcome of that disparity is perilous.

## **Defendant Convicted of Road Rage** Murder, Attempted Murder

Sacramento District Attorney's Office News Release

SACRMENTO, CA (MPG) - On Feb. 6, David Perry was convicted by a jury of first-degree murder.

The special circumstance that the murder was committed by firing from a motor vehicle and the allegation that he personally discharged a firearm causing death were also found true. He was also convicted of attempted murder with the allegation that he personally discharged a firearm causing great bodily injury found

On Oct. 26, 2021, Perry was driving when he hit the victim's vehicle. Perry quickly drove away and the victim followed him while calling 911 to report the license plate number. Perry made a U turn aligning his car with the victim and shot six rounds at him, striking him in the

face and arm before fleeing. That victim survived his injuries.

On Dec. 6, 2021, Perry and the second victim had an interaction in their vehicles on Watt Avenue near I-80. Perry began to pursue the victim, who attempted to flee on I-80 and then I-5 while calling 911 for help. Perry pulled alongside the victim and fired several shots into his truck, hitting him in the arm and waist. The victim stayed on the phone with 911 for five minutes during which time Perry circled back to the victim on I-5 and shot him one more time in the head, killing him. Perry was observed getting out of his vehicle on the West Sacramento overpass where he discarded the firearm.

Perry faces a maximum sentence of life in prison without the possibility of parole. Sentencing is set at 10:30 a.m. April 4 in front of the Honorable Michael Bowman.

## **Defendant Sentenced for Child Molestation**

Sacramento County District Attorney's Office

**SACRAMENTO COUNTY, CA (MPG)** - On Jan. 24. the Honorable Ernest Sawtelle sentenced Michael Huey to 96 years

in prison. On Dec. 20, 2024. a jury convicted Huey of 16 counts of child molestation with force, violence and duress.

The jury also found true aggravating factors that the victims were vulnerable; that Huey took advantage of a position of trust; the crimes involved

great violence, great bodily harm, threats of great bodily harm or other acts disclosing a high degree of cruelty, viciousness or callousness; and the manner in which the crimes were carried out indicates planning,

sophistication or professionalism. From 1995 to 2008, Huey used

his position of trust, his size and his strength to overpower and molest two minors. For one of the victims, Huev used mental and emotional manipulation by threatening


> physical violence against their family and instilling a fear of separation from other loved ones if they told anyone. During the investigation, Huey was found to be in possession of multiple images of child sexual abuse material on a tablet.

Under current California law, Huey, 54, will become eligible for release at an Elder Parole hearing after he reaches the age of 50 and serves 20 years of his 96-year sentence. With his in-custody credits, that will be in approximately 17 years.



## **Community Grants to Area Non-Profits**

Dignity Health News Release

SACRAMENTO, CA (MPG) - Dignity Health announced on Feb. 27 that it has awarded \$1,017,000 in grants to nonprofit organizations across the Greater Sacramento Region. The grants, part of the CommonSpirit Health Community Health Improvement Grants program, are dedicated to improving the health and well-being of vulnerable and underserved populations.

"Dignity Health is committed to improving the health of our community beyond our hospital and clinic walls," said Dr. Tina Johnson, Dignity Health Sacramento Market President. "These grants are a reflection of our work toward a healthier future for all, and support the great work being done by our community nonprofits to bring critical programs and services into the Sacramento Region. It is helping ensure individuals and families are able to access the services they need.'

The grant program helps to improve community health and health equity, and enhance local service systems, via restricted charitable contributions for defined projects. Collaborating 501(c)3 non-profit organizations applied to receive grant funds to address significant issues identified in the hospital's/hospitals' community health needs assessment/s. These can include improving behavioral health, homelessness, substance abuse services, food insecurity, basic needs such as housing, jobs and food, and more.

The following organizations received grants to support program activities between March 2025 and February 2026:

The ACC Telephone Reassurance & Companionship Services program meets a growing demand to reduce isolation, promotes physical activity, improves access to health and social services, and increases social interactions in the older Asian American/Pacific Islander adult community. ACC will recruit and train volunteers for this project and two existing programs for vulnerable seniors: Senior Escort and Friendly Visitor. These three programs will provide companionship and socialization for seniors of diverse ability-levels. Trained volunteers are used to interact with community members to improve health literacy and reduce anxiety and depression in family caregivers.

The lead organization for the program is the Asian Community Center of Sacramento Valley Inc., dba ACC Senior Services. Collaborators include Meals on Wheels, Society for the Blind, Agency on Aging Area 4 and Resources for Independent Living. The grant award is for \$78,500.

The Bridging House for Women

and Children Experiencing Homelessness Due to Domestic Violence, Sexual Assault, and Human Trafficking organization will also be receiving a grant to support program activities. Bridging Initiatives International will assist families and individuals experiencing homelessness due to domestic violence, sexual assault, and human trafficking. They plan to support them with shelter for a 3-6 month period, while facilitating their transition to rental assistance through the BII housing program. Additional services include motel voucher services, and referrals to the continuum of care network. The lead organization is Bridging Initiatives International (BII) and their collaborators are Sacramento Steps Forward, Carmichael HART and Mercy Holistic Ministry. The total grant award is \$100,000. The Foster Youth Success pro-

gram partners with Interns to Pros and Hearts & Hands Counseling to provide comprehensive support to former foster youth, focusing on college success, career readiness, emotional well-being, and life skills. This initiative strives to guide successful transitions from college to impactful lives. Mentorship, counseling, career pathways, and workshops, aiming to enhance personal and professional success are offered to the students. An incentivized schol-

arship process covering housing,

tuition, and food eliminates the basic need barriers for foster youth students to succeed in college. The organization leading the effort is Fostering Success & Significance along with their collaborators that include Interns 2 Pros (I2P) and Hearts & Hands Counseling. The grant award is \$43,000.

Cut to the Chase is a program for Black men and women to meet up to discuss the daily challenges and issues they face to improve their mental health in Del Paso Heights and Oak Park. To eliminate the stigma around seeking mental-emotional support in the Black community, , this program 1 provides therapy in spaces in the barbershops and beauty salons that Black men and women already comfortably frequent throughout our community. This program is expanding with partnering organizations to include Medical Moments: a segment in each group therapy session to include health education. The lead organization is Greater Sacramento Urban League and their collaborators are Capitol City Black Nurses Association and Heart of the Matter Counseling. The total grant award is \$100,000.

The Young Adults Lift and Youth Activities Programs will provide basic needs, transition support and positive development for vulnerable and at-risk youth/young adults. Targeted youth from economically disadvantaged communities will be provided opportunities to participate in youth sports, camps, and STEM programs for positive development, etc., and Young adults transitioning back into the community from the Sacramento County Probation's Youth Detention Facility will be assisted with immediate needs and insecurities, including provision of monthly groceries and clothing, while offering a structured curriculum of financial literacy workshops, goal development, and career planning. The organization leading this program is HERB Nonprofit along with their collaborators that include the Sacramento County Probation's Youth Detention Juvenile Justice Chaplaincy, Turning Point Community Programs (TPCP) and Safe Credit Union. The grant award is \$100,000.

health, and well-being of the unhoused by providing hygiene kits, haircuts, clean undergarments, food, jobs, counseling, and housing voucher leads. The lead organization is Mercy Holistic Ministries, and their collaborators are Town and Country Lutheran Church, Mt. Calvary Baptist Church, Faith Presbyterian Church and Harvest Missionary Church. The grant award is \$75,000.

The North Sacramento HART project involves a weekly respite, warm breakfast ,clothing giveaway, personal hygiene bags, and To Go lunches. North Sacramento HART has also partnered with Sacramento County Department of Health to provide free vaccinations for the unhoused. The project will allow expansion to longer hours and additional dates of operation as well as, providing more resources to gain access to human needs and care.

The lead Organization is North Sacramento HART and their collaborators are Mount Calvary Missionary Baptist Church and Sacramento Alumnae Chapter of Delta Sigma Theta Sorority, Inc. The grant award is \$20,000.

The Skate Nights Youth Development Program is a collaboration between Project Lifelong, the San Juan Unified School District, and Sierra Club's Inspiring Connections Outdoors, to address social isolation among youth. The Skate Nights program is a pop-up skateboarding park created on middle school campuses to integrate Social Emotional Learning (SEL) to develop life skills and foster a sense of belonging. This program positively impacts the mental and physical health of students by utilizing a Youth Advocate and LCSW within San Juan Unified School District to connect with participants in cases where mental health services may be needed. The lead organization is Project Lifelong, and their collaborators include Sacramento Inspiring Connections Outdoors and Edison Language Institute – SJUSD. The grant award is \$33,902.

The Safer Alternatives through Networking & Education project will address the need for two services among people experiencing homelessness and substance use disorder in Sacramento County: wound-care and education for soft tissue infections from IV injection, and access to medications for opiate use disorder. The project will provide wound care clinics and distribute wound care kits to unhoused persons through targeted outreach. Collaborating organizations will participate in training/sharing sessions, develop new health education materials to distribute to participants. Three medical providers from Sacramento Street Medicine will be trained to treat patients with limited access to health care and drug treatment with medications for opioid use disorder (MOUD).

The organization leading the project is Safer Alternatives through Networking & Education (SANE) along with collaborators Sacramento Street Medicine and Joan Viteri Memorial Clinic. The grant award is \$100,000.

Basic Needs, Family Services, and Behavioral Health/SUD Services, for Unhoused Women & Children is a project will address the basic needs of unhoused

women and children in the Greater

necessary skills to obtain stable housing, economic security. and overall well-being. For up to 12 months each, this project will provide unhoused women and children with housing, meals, childcare, employment training, psycho/social education, transportation, housing navigation, and family services. Family services encompass children's case management, and ensuring children receive assessments and treatment/referrals for appropriate intervention. Adult clients will receive mental health and substance use treatment services.

The lead organization is Saint John's Program for Real Change with their collaborators that include Highland Community Charter and Technical Schools, and UC Davis Health REACH Families Project. The grant award is \$50,098.

Adjustment to Blindness Mental Health Project provides individual and group counseling for clients who are blind or have low vision to help them adjust to this life-altering experience. Low vision has led to isolation, depression and dependence on alcohol and drugs. Older adults with cognitive problems have experienced medical emergencies. Counseling can provide resources that address their mental health issues and increase their ability to once again thrive. This project will provide a safe, supportive space to grieve their vision loss and rebuild their mental health and self-confidence. Counseling services are offered remotely and in-person in multiple languages. The lead organization is Society for the Blind, and their collaborators are H.O.P.E. Counseling and WEAVE. The grant award is \$80,000.

The Ukrainian American House project will address critical gaps in health access and mental health services for low-income, non-English speaking Slavic immigrants and Ukrainian refugees in Sacramento County. It will provide culturally competent mental health support, health services, education resources, and referrals to licensed counselors. The project will assist with navigating the complicated healthcare system and assist with Medi-Cal enrollment, Cal-Fresh and Cal-Works for active clients. Through these efforts, the project seeks to enhance the well-being and integration for immigrants and refugees.

The lead organization is Ukrainian American House, and their Collaborators are Parasolka and Community Connection Center. The grant award is \$50,000.

The Wind Youth Services Community Health Partnership aims to enhance access to supportive services for highly vulnerable homeless youth, aged 12-24, in Sacramento County. Along with One Community Health and Juma Ventures, the project seeks to increase youth awareness and access to essential services and distribute information to transitional-age youth. This includes connections to housing and homelessness services, medical care, and employment support. The lead organization is Wind

The Resilient Futures Fund aims to remove financial barriers to success by partnering with agencies who represent and/or provide services to justice impacted clients. This project will provide support to unique justice-involved individuals by removing barriers such as housing, transportation, food, clothing, hygiene, basic necessities and medical supplies. The lead organization is Yolo County Public Defender CARES and their collaborators are Yolo County Public Defender's Office, Yolo County Probation and Yolo County Health & Human Services Agency -Forensic Team. The grant award

is \$25,866. The Employment Support for Parents (ESP) Program at Yolo Crisis Nursery offers comprehensive assistance to help low-income parents secure employment. Through this program, parents receive support by working directly with a dedicated case manager to receive one-on-one case management, assistance with job applications, and housing navigation. This initiative also includes free childcare during job interviews and related activities. It will also cover costs as needed for interview transportation and appropriate work attire. Collaborators will also provide client referrals, host weekly office hours/drop-in sessions, and other specialized training, ensuring a holistic approach to support clients' employment and stability goals. The lead organization is Yolo Crisis Nursery Inc. and collaborators include RISE and YoloWorks. The grant award

Yolo Food Bank with Yolo County Children's Alliance (YCCA) and Rural Innovations in Social Economics (RISE) in partnership aims to provide free culturally appropriate food boxes monthly to Yolo County families in need. In direct response to data that almost forty percent of households with children are experiencing food insecurity YFB will provide a combination of fresh produce and shelf stable goods to families with young children ages 0-5 that are food insecure. A Nutrition Intern will be hired to provide families with supplemental bilingual nutrition education materials such as menu plans and recipe cards. The Nutrition Intern will also participate in home visits and will lead nutrition education workshops. The lead organization is Yolo

The eight strikeouts matched his high bar set in 2023 against Utah Tech and tied twice in 2024 in starts against Utah Valley and Stephen F. Austin. Gibbons is tied for second on the team with 10 strikeouts over 10.2 innings of work, holding opposing hitters to a .231 batting average.

Following a short break, the Hornets returned to the diamond on Feb. 26, defeating South Dakota State 14-2 in the opening game of a four-game home series at John Smith Field.

Sky Championship and beyond."


