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Captain Cook Shapes the Future

SACRAMENTO REGION, CA (MPG) - When Cathy Cook points out bullet holes in an A-10 fuselage at the California Aerospace Museum, she could be forgiven a shudder. As an aircraft commander during the Gulf Wars, she refueled these aircraft at 18,000 feet as they flew to enemy targets in Iraq.

During her 11-year Air Force career, Cook took the heat. Commanding the K C-135 air-refueling tanker, Cook dealt daily with Air Force, Navy and Marine and NATO pilots. Cook's missions included war zone deployments and duties in Europe.

"I've proven my skills in a career of

decision-making and troubleshooting," said the 67 year old. "Flying captain for the Air Force required great tact and diplomacy. Especially for a woman. I've applied everything I've learned to everything I've ever done."

Now retired from decades as a Delta Airlines pilot, Cook is a lead-by-example mentor for young visitors seeking STEM (Science, Technology, Engineering and Math) education at the Aerospace Museum.

"What I'm doing now is more important than anything I've done before," Cook said. "I'm helping to shape the future of our country. Young people I talk to are the next generation of engineers, pilots, astronauts and technicians."

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Fraudulent Invoices Target County's Planning Customers

SACRAMENTO COUNTY, CA (MPG) - Sacramento County officials have been made aware of a fraudulent email scheme targeting both current and former planning customers.

The scam involves sending fake invoices using the names of county officials and the official Sacramento County logo, instructing recipients to wire money. The current reports of this scam utilize an email address of "planning-applications.saccounty.gov@usa.com."

Customers are urged to be cautious and not respond to these emails or send any payments. Anyone who receives a suspicious email of this nature should forward it to sacplan@saccounty.gov for review.

"Sacramento County takes this matter very seriously and we are actively working to educate our customers so that they don't fall victim to this scam," said Sacramento County Planning Director Todd Smith. "We urge our customers to remain vigilant and verify any financial requests directly with the county before taking action. If you're unsure whether an invoice is official, contact us to verify."

The Sacramento County Department of Technology is investigating the incident and will collaborate with law enforcement if necessary.

The Sacramento County Department of Finance issues planning customer invoices through the U.S. mail and does not instruct customers to wire funds as a method of payment. Payments are only accepted by mail to P.O. Box 1587, Sacramento, CA 95812, in person at county locations, and certain payments are accepted online.

SACRAMENTO COUNTY, CA (MPG) - Sacramento County covers 965 square miles and is home to the California state capital, 1.6 million residents and seven incorporated cities: Citrus Heights, Elk Grove, Folsom, Galt, Isleton, Rancho Cordova and Sacramento. The population of Sacramento County's unincorporated area is approximately 600,000.

Sacramento County released its 2024 Year in Review, showcasing significant achievements and statistics across its more than 35 departments.

This award-winning ((Public Relations Society of America, California Capital Chapter, 2024 Influence Award for Annual Reports) annual report details where property tax dollars are allocated and provides insights into the demographic and economic landscape of the county.

This report distills the county's tremendous positive impact on residents and their quality of life, highlighting key achievements such as those listed below. There are many more achievements in the report.

Social Services

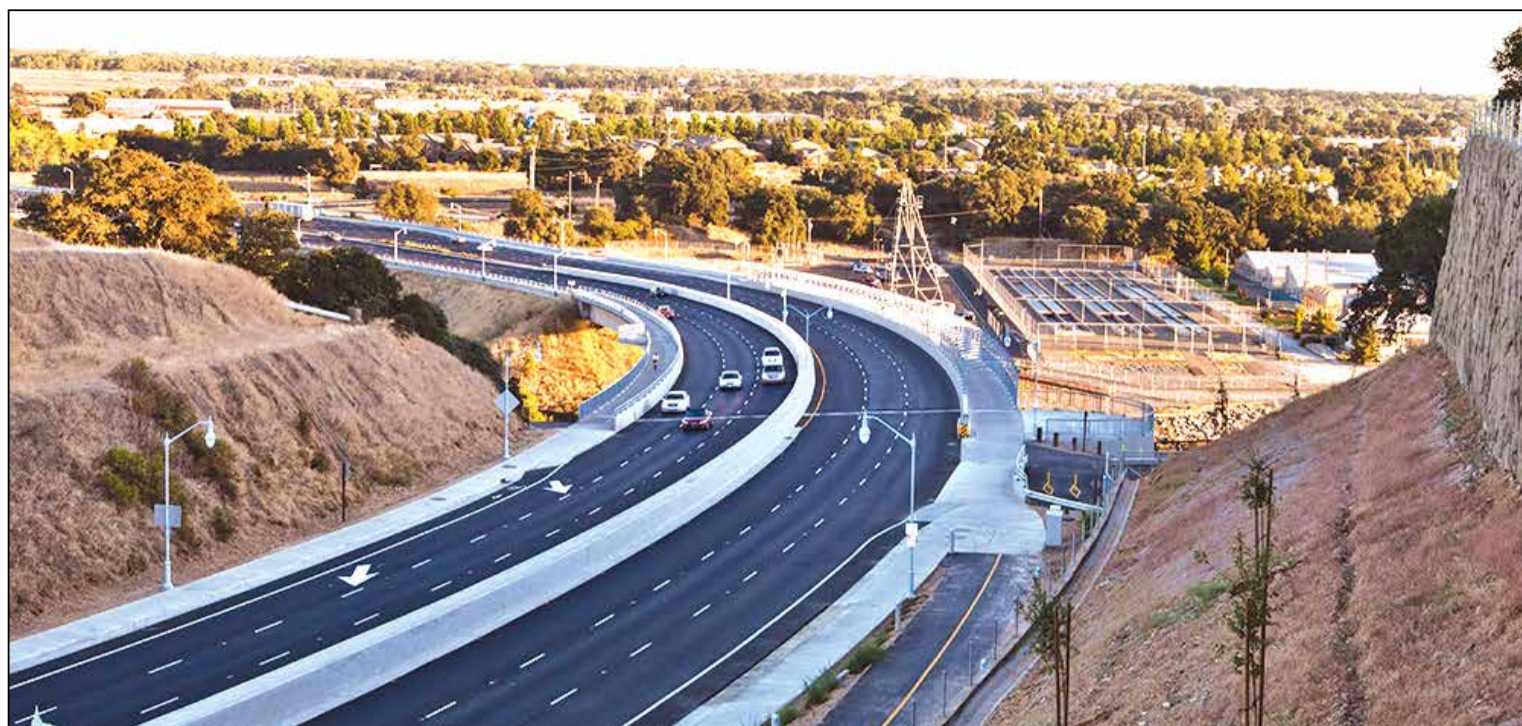
A remarkable 58% reduction in the number of youths in foster care since 2015, reflecting ongoing efforts to improve family stability and support systems.

In 2024, Child Support Services collected approximately \$129 million, playing a crucial role in preventing children and families from falling into poverty and ensuring financial stability.

Health Services

Sacramento County Public Health earned national accreditation from the Public Health Accreditation Board, becoming the 26th local health jurisdiction (of 61) in California to achieve this feat.

The Community Wellness Response Team began operating

24 hours a day, seven days a week in 2024, providing field-based in-person crisis intervention, assessment of needs and risks, and safety planning. In 2024, the response team received 964 calls, of which 595 resulted in an in-person response.

Homeless Services and Housing

Dedicated outreach teams served 1,469 individuals experiencing homelessness, successfully transitioning 396 individuals out of unsheltered conditions, illustrating proactive steps toward addressing homelessness in the community.

Community Services

The Department of Airports was the first airport in the country to submit a Safety Management System Implementation Plan to the Federal Aviation Administration (FAA) in 2023, the first to get it approved by the FAA and the first to submit a Safety Management System manual.

County staff supported the development of six major industrial and commercial projects, creating 1,156 new jobs

and \$60.5 million in capital investment.

The Department of Transportation filled an impressive 90,798 potholes, removed 132,000 square feet of graffiti, investigated 933 traffic-safety complaints; and replaced 126 curbs, gutters and sidewalks.

The Sacramento County Water Agency installed a new, 22-mile pipeline, replacing an outdated and undersized system in Arden. The agency installed more than

1,000 new water meters.

Animal Care placed 3,278 dogs and 3,541 cats into new adoptive homes, and helped safely reunite 983 lost dogs and 69 lost cats with their owners. In addition, 1,821 pets were vaccinated and 351 animals were spayed/neutered through the PAWS (Pet Aid and Wellness Services) program, which also performed 1,055 wellness exams and saved 18 pets from shelter surrender by assisting owners in crisis. Another

1,200 animals were spayed and neutered at Mobile Animal Sterilization Hospital (MASH) clinics, providing essential services in underserved areas.

Administrative Services

The General Services' Surplus Unit was recognized with the prestigious Public Surplus Excellence Award, placing the Surplus Unit among the Top 10 sellers nationwide and the Top 5 county sellers. The Surplus Unit is vital in efficiently redistributing and reselling retired county assets, ensuring valuable resources are maximized and put to good use.

The Finance Department collected and distributed more than \$2.8 billion in property taxes to local government agencies.

The Consolidated Utility Billing division collected more than \$500 million in utility charges for water, sewer, garbage and drainage services.

It won't be a big deal for women to fill these jobs. They'll be naturally accepted.

That was not always the case. Tall, slender and long-legged, Cook stood out like a 1980s career Barbie when sauntering through airports in her Delta uniform.

"I got head-turns," she recalled. "It was so unusual to see a woman pilot back then. A captain friend was uncomfortable walking next to me. He didn't like the attention. When we said goodbye to people getting off our flights, women would nudge their husbands and say, 'See, honey, we had a woman pilot.' Moms would tell their daughters they could grow up to be like me."

Even now, in vintage flight suit, Cook is a magnet for youngsters. Her gender, uniform, rank, even the memorable "Captain Cook" moniker, have made her a force of inspiration for much of her life. When her late husband (Colonel Frasier Fortner) ran Junior ROTC programs at Highlands High School, his pilot wife was an unpaid aide.

"He'd have me talk to his classes about careers in the Air Force and how my military time led to a Delta Airlines career," Cook said. "I told them when I first entered the Air Force, hardly any other women were flying. Even as a Lieutenant, I was invited to talk at schools and air shows. I always felt it was part of my job to expand people's ideas and to show girls and women that the glass ceiling was broken. You never know how you might spark

someone's interest in a way that changes their life."

A mother of two sons, Cook has captained her Carmichael neighborhood's resident association for more than 10 years. In 2019, she unsuccessfully ran for District 7 Assembly. Following the election, Cook was sought by California Aerospace Museum directors.

"They told me they wanted to focus on STEM education," Cook said. "That really was up my alley. We had no hands-on museums when I was growing up. There weren't female role models in aviation, except perhaps for Amelia Erhardt and things didn't end well for her. So the museum's emphasis on science and technological learning was something I happily embraced."

The volunteer job includes board meetings and youth mentorship at the North Highlands facility.

"I'm in my element," Cook said. "My career has been a privilege. I want to show young people, especially girls, that they could have opportunities like mine. If I can inspire them to work hard and persevere, they can take their dreams as far as they want. The sky's no longer the limit; outer space is accessible. And it's not just for pilots and astronauts; there are so many exciting opportunities. So many smart, adventurous people will be needed for the future of aviation."

and performing arts, San Juan Sings has been a part of the district for nearly 15 years.

Nick, a student from Mira Loma High School, said, "Choir has made me more confident. It's helped me feel comfortable

asking questions and finding my own voice."

Kylie, a student from Del Campo High School added, "I used to be really quiet but being in choir has helped me step out of my shell and make more friends."

Choir provides a way for students to express themselves. Emily from El Camino Fundamental High School reflected on how music has been a positive outlet.

"I was always full of energy as a kid and choir has helped me channel that. Instead of being restless, I get to put that energy into singing and just enjoy the moment," Emily said.

Dittmer emphasized the lasting impact of this kind of events on students.

"Choral music offers a different opportunity for students who may struggle with playing an instrument. It teaches them teamwork, collaboration, and the joy of creating something together," Dittmer said.

As the final performance wrapped up, the energy in the room reflected what San Juan Sings is all about: a shared love for music, connection and the joy of performing together.

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Storms Increase Water Allocation to 40 Percent

NORTHERN CALIFORNIA (MPG) - On March 25, the Department of Water Resources (DWR) announced that wet and cold storms in March have allowed for another increase to the State Water Project (SWP) allocation forecast for 2025.

The allocation has increased to 40 percent of requested water supplies, up from 35 percent last month. The State Water Project provides water to 27 million Californians and 750,000 acres of farmland.

The latest allocation forecast is based on increases in precipitation, snowpack and reservoir storage in the past month. The allocation increase comes ahead of the April 1 snow surveys next week, when Sierra Nevada snowpack typically peaks.

“As we near the end of the wet season, our focus shifts to snowpack runoff and whether temperatures allow for a slow melt so we can capture as much of that runoff as possible,” said Department of Water Resources Director Karla Nemeth. “Despite periods of extremely dry conditions this season, water managers have been able to effectively capture, move and store water for use later this year while also maintaining flood protection.”

The State Water Project was able to increase storage this month at its largest reservoir, Lake Oroville, and nearly fill the State Water Project’s share of storage at San Luis Reservoir in Merced County. That storage will help meet the needs of State Water Project contractors and their customers this year as well as provide some water supply next year if dry conditions return.

Lake Oroville storage is now up to 86 percent of capacity and

121 percent of historical average for this time of year. Department of Water Resources has been releasing water from Lake Oroville to maintain enough empty space in the reservoir for flood management. As spring progresses, the need for flood space will diminish and storage could increase.

In the Sacramento-San Joaquin Delta, April and May are ecologically important times and the State Water Project will need to adjust operations accordingly. Pumping

rates will likely fall to minimum levels during those months to protect endangered fish species. Releases from Lake Oroville for endangered species and water quality protection also might be necessary, depending upon precipitation and other factors.

These constraints reinforce the need for California to invest in additional water supply infrastructure to provide operational flexibility. The proposed Sites Reservoir and Delta Conveyance Project would have been hugely

beneficial to water supply had they been in place this season. The Delta Conveyance Project could have captured more than 750,000 acre-feet of additional water supply this winter, which would have translated to a 20-percent increase in the current State Water Project allocation, on top of the increase announced on March 25.

Each year, Department of Water Resources provides State Water Project allocation forecasts based on available water storage, projected water supply and water demands. Allocations are updated monthly as snowpack, rainfall and runoff information is assessed, with a final allocation typically determined in May or June. Any additional increases in the 2025 State Water Project allocation will depend heavily on the water content and runoff of the Sierra Nevada snowpack.

California Farm Bureau Highlights Urgent Challenges

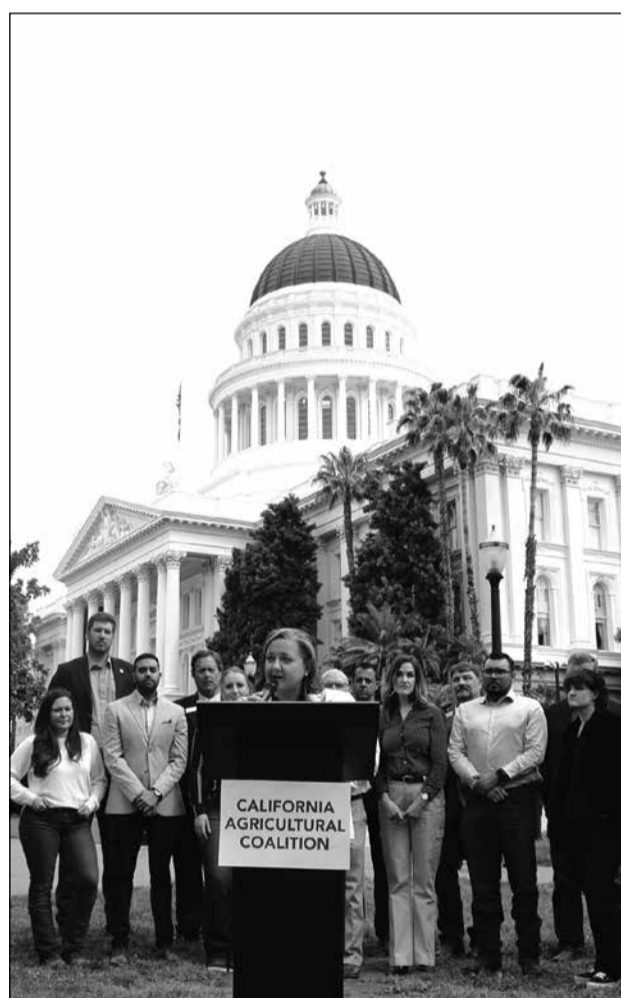
NORTHERN CALIFORNIA (MPG) - California Farm Bureau President Shannon Douglass identified critical issues facing the state’s farmers and ranchers, stressing immediate action is needed to support small and mid-sized farms, streamline regulations and invest in innovative water management practices.

“Agriculture has been the backbone of California’s economy for generations,” Douglass said. “However, today, our sector is facing significant challenges that (not only) threaten our state’s economy but the very future of food and farming.”

On behalf of the California Agricultural Coalition, Douglass spoke during a press conference Wednesday at the California State Capitol. She was joined by fellow coalition members Michael Müller, director of government relations for the California Association of Winegrape Growers, and Roger Isom, president/CEO of the California Cotton Ginners & Growers Association and Western Tree Nut Association.

California has lost 15,000 farms between 2012 and 2022, according to the most recent U.S. Census of Agriculture, Douglass said. Pointing to the rising regulatory pressures facing farmers, she cited a Cal Poly, San Luis Obispo, study that found regulatory costs and the cost of compliance by agriculture have increased nearly 1,400% in less than 20 years.

“We must examine and streamline the regulatory framework that governs agriculture. While there are regulations that are needed, they should be tailored to support farming and not drive-up costs,” Douglass said. “We need

to find a better balance that supports sustainable farming practices without putting an undue burden on our growers.”

Citing high costs of labor, energy, transportation, litigation and water availability challenges, Müller of California Association of Winegrape Growers said, “California is no longer affordable for many growers.” He added there is a commitment from many state lawmakers to make affordability part of the conversation when crafting legislation.

“Our farmers face challenges that nobody else in the world faces,” Isom said. “Frankly, we can’t compete on a level playing field with states across the country or other nations.”

The coalition, which includes 32 statewide agricultural organizations, Isom said, is asking

the California Legislature for \$600 million a year for five years to fund programs to help farmers through the Greenhouse Gas Reduction Fund. “This is a win-win to help ag and the environment,” he said.

Douglass concluded that the challenges facing California agriculture are urgent but not insurmountable. “By working together, with farmers, regulators and policymakers, we can create a more sustainable and resilient agricultural system that continues to feed our state and nation.”

California Seizes 650,000 Fentanyl Pills

SACRAMENTO, CA (MPG) - Continuing an enhanced focus in 2025 to combat the scourge of illegal fentanyl trafficking, the California National Guard (CalGuard) seized 1,045 pounds and more than 650,000 pills containing fentanyl, with a street valuation of more than \$6.8 million, in January and February.

Through its Counter Drug Task Force operations, the Cal Guard Task Force members have been strategically deployed statewide, including at ports of entry, to combat transnational criminal organizations and trafficking illegal narcotics like fentanyl, in support of federal, state, and local law enforcement partners.

“By disrupting the trafficking of the 1,045 pounds of fentanyl so far this year, Cal Guard’s Counter Drug Task Force continues to save countless lives across our state. I cannot thank them enough for their support in keeping deadly fentanyl out of our communities,” said Governor Gavin Newsom.

Service members helped confiscate 488 pounds of powder-laced fentanyl and 331,069 pills of this dangerous drug in February, adding to the efforts in January.

In addition, Cal Guard service members continue to transform drug prevention in elementary, middle, and high schools statewide through the Task Force’s Drug Demand Reduction Outreach program. Since October 2024, servicemembers visited 112 schools across the state and engaged with 57,442 students. By conducting in-person outreach and understanding students’ beliefs about their own health using a Health Belief Model, Cal Guard is implementing an impactful initiative in the fight against opioid abuse.

Latest laboratory testing from the federal Drug Enforcement Agency indicates five out of 10 pills tested in 2024 contain a potentially deadly dose of fentanyl, which is down from seven of 10 pills in 2023.

In 2024, Governor Newsom doubled down on the deployment of the Cal Guard’s Counterdrug Task Force by more than doubling the number of service members supporting fentanyl interdiction and seizing other drugs at California ports of entry to nearly 400. Fentanyl is primarily smuggled into the country by U.S. citizens through ports of entry.

Cal Guard’s coordinated drug interdiction efforts in the state are funded in part by

California’s \$60 million investment over four years to expand Cal Guard’s work to prevent drug trafficking by transnational criminal organizations. This adds to the governor’s efforts to address fentanyl within California, including by cracking down on fentanyl in communities across the state.

The state has launched various initiatives in recent years to combat illicit opioids through the governor’s master plan for tackling the fentanyl and opioid crisis, which provides a comprehensive framework to support overdose prevention efforts, hold the opioid pharmaceutical industry accountable, crack down on drug trafficking, and raise awareness about the dangers of opioids like fentanyl.

Recently, through funding designated by the governor in the 2022-23 budget to develop the Fentanyl Enforcement Program, the Department of Justice recently announced a significant fentanyl bust worth \$55 million and leading to the arrest of three major fentanyl traffickers.

The Campus Opioid Act, signed by Newsom in 2022, requires that every public college campus in California distribute a federally-approved opioid overdose reversal medication, such as naloxone, and include information about opioid overdoses in their orientation process. Building on this effort, the governor last year signed AB 2429, requiring that fentanyl education be included in high school health classes starting in the 2026-27 school year.

Serving as a one-stop tool for Californians seeking resources for prevention and treatment, the website opioids.ca.gov provides information on how California is working to hold big pharma and drug traffickers accountable in this crisis.

The public education campaign Facts Fight Fentanyl informs Californians about the dangers of fentanyl and how to prevent overdoses and deaths. This effort will provide critical information about fentanyl and life-saving tools such as naloxone.

Through the Naloxone Distribution Project (NDP), over-the-counter CalRx, branded naloxone, is now available across the state. The CalRx-branded over the counter naloxone HCL nasal spray, 4 mg, is available for free to eligible organizations through the state and for sale for \$24 per twin-pack through Amneal. Since 2018, there have been more than 334,000 reversals reported from Naloxone Distribution Project since 2018. ★

In desperation, coach Christie turned to little used Doug McDermott in an effort to ignite the team in the second half, but it was too little, too late as McBuckets contributed 8 points in a 30-point blow-out loss.

Scoring an anemic 91 points, the Kings now head for Indiana where the Pacers await. Currently in the No. 4 place in the eastern conference, the Pacers are playing some of their best basketball of the season and are 7-3 over the last 10 games.

With eight games remaining, Sacramento is faced with winning games against teams they are not favored to beat and that begins with the Pacers Monday night.

Already looking like a tired team, besting Tyrese Haliburton and his Pacer teammates is a tall order, but fans should remember that this is the same team that went into Boston and blew out the hometown Celtics, and although that was prior to the DeAaron Fox trade, Fox did not play in that game.

Yes, the Kings can surprise you, and although the media has all but counted out the Sactown ballers, I hope the loyal fans of Sacramento haven't given up hope.

I continue to hope that coach Christie pays close attention to his bench, as players like Isaac Jones, and even Doug McDermott can make contributions that matter if they are used on a consistent basis.

For the Johnny come lately Kings fans, there was a time in Sacramento, that Arco Arena was filled with screaming fans that would have been over the moon for a 30-win season, let alone a shot at post-season basketball.

Losing season after losing season had fans standing in a line for season tickets that were 5 years in the waiting. This is true, and even with the inconsistent play of the 2025 Kings squad today, there is still hope.

The Yeoman like work of Domantas Sabonis alone is worth the ticket, and right now Kings fans have the opportunity to see a burgeoning Keon Ellis, as he begins to make his mark on the NBA. His defensive excellence is something to behold, and the best for Keon is yet to come.

Many pundits believe a change in the front office is imminent, and that means a new GM. Typically new GM's want to pick their own coach, and since coach Christie has the word interim next to his name, don't be surprised if you see more changes within the administration than you do on the court.

Social Security Matters

Can My Wife and I Get Spouse Benefits from Each Other?

Dear Rusty: My wife and I are currently collecting Social Security. We both started receiving SS at 62 years old. That said, we get by on a tight budget.

A retired friend told us about an option which allows a spouse to collect half (1/2) of the other spouse's SS monthly income. My question has two parts: 1. Can we both collect on each other's SS? And 2. Are there any pitfalls? **Signed: Seeking an Increase**

Dear Seeking: Well, I'm afraid spousal benefits aren't quite that simple. One spouse may be eligible for additional benefits from the other, but only if that spouse's personal Social Security retirement benefit at their full retirement age (FRA) is less than half (50%) of the other spouse's FRA entitlement. Note

that for spouse benefits, FRA amounts are used regardless of when you actually claim benefits. Full retirement age for both you and your wife is 66, so that means that if you both claimed at 62 your FRA entitlements were higher – about 25% more - than you are both currently receiving.

Since you applied for benefits some time ago at about the same age, one way to estimate if one of you may be entitled to an additional amount as a spouse is to evaluate your current monthly amounts. If either of you are getting a benefit which is less than half of the other's amount, it's possible that the one with the lower benefit may be entitled to more as a spouse. And note, only one spouse is eligible for benefits – you cannot both get spouse benefits from each other.

Another way to explore this is for the spouse with the lowest monthly Social Security benefit to contact Social Security at 1.800.772.1213 to ask if spouse benefits are available. Noting that contacting SS these days can be a time-consuming process, yet another way is for you to provide us (the AMAC Foundation's

SS Advisory Service) with both of your current monthly SS benefit amounts (before any deductions) and the exact ages when each of you claimed. Using that information, we can do the math to see if either of you might be entitled to more as a spouse. But, in the end, only the spouse with the lower benefit may be eligible, and then, only if their FRA entitlement (not their actual current amount) is less than 50% of the other spouse's FRA entitlement.

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The Real Crisis in California Schools is Low Achievement, Not Cultural Conflicts

When Governor Gavin Newsom unexpectedly voiced opposition to allowing transgender women to compete in women's sports, he was throwing gasoline on an issue that was already burning in state and national political arenas.

"I think it's an issue of fairness," Newsom told right-wing iconoclast Charlie Kirk on the inaugural segment of the governor's new podcast. "I completely agree with you on that. It is an issue of fairness. It's deeply unfair. I'm not wrestling with the fairness issue. I totally agree with you."

The remark generated a tsunami of media commentary about Newsom's motives and a torrent of criticism from fellow Democrats, particularly from lesbian, gay, bisexual and transgender (LGBTQ) rights advocates. It also focused attention on two Republican bills that would ban transgender women from women's high school and college sports.

Ordinarily, given Republicans' lack of legislative clout, Democratic leaders would just dump both bills in the wastebasket, as they have done innumerable times.

However Assembly Speaker Robert Rivas is allowing Assemblywoman Kate Sanchez of Rancho Santa Margarita and Assemblyman Bill Essayli of Corona to present their measures, Assembly Bills 89 and 844, to the

Assembly's Committee on Arts, Entertainment, Sports and Tourism.

That's probably as far as the measures will go. The Legislature's influential lesbian, gay, bisexual and transgender caucus will see to that. But the maneuver protects Rivas from allegations that he was not willing to have at least a discussion on the issue that Newsom, for whatever reason, chose to highlight.

While these well-orchestrated events feed political junkies' voracious appetite for cultural conflict, they also underscore the pathetic lack of interest Capitol politicians have in a real crisis, the shamefully low levels of academic achievement in California's schools.

California fares very poorly vis-a-vis other states in federal academic testing, seventh from the bottom, and there's a yawning achievement gap separating low-income students from their more privileged classmates. Moreover, California is one of several states whose students still lag behind pre-pandemic achievement levels.

A few days ago, the Washington Post published an article by Rahm Emanuel, former mayor of Chicago and chief of staff to President Barack Obama, about the neglect of educational achievement.

Emanuel called it a "Sputnik moment in education" and declared that "almost no one among the nation's purported adults seems to want to solve the problem."

Emanuel continued, "On both sides of the aisle, we're caught in wild and beside-the-point education debates, whether the Education Department should be closed, which students should change in which locker rooms or

participate in which sports, and whether curriculums should be stripped of diversity, equity and inclusion. All those disagreements deserve a hearing. But they are shiny baubles distracting us from the real crisis, namely, our children's failure to meet basic standards in reading, writing and arithmetic."

That's precisely what's happening in California.

Emanuel cited examples of states that have taken educational achievement seriously, one being Mississippi, where deep poverty is a way of life.

"Mississippi's early embrace of 'the science of reading', that is, the restoration of phonics in teaching literacy, has led to what some call a miracle: The state's reading scores for fourth graders rose from 49th nationally in 2013 to ninth in 2024," Emanuel noted. "We ought to be bringing these approaches to scale with urgency."

Phonics has made some inroads in California, but unlike Mississippi, California has not fully embraced it, despite ranking 33rd in fourth grade reading.

That could change if the Legislature adopts AB 1121, a newly introduced measure by Assemblymember Blanca Rubio, a West Covina Democrat, with support from EdVoice and other education reform groups.

The bill would encourage school districts to adopt "evidence-based means of teaching foundational reading skills."

It deserves at least as much legislative attention as the transgender bills.

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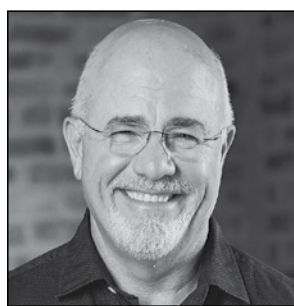

Wealth Magnifies What's Already There

Dear Dave,

My wife and I started out broke when we married. Since then, we've been very blessed in our work and investments. We're currently looking at retiring early in a few years, with a nest egg of somewhere between \$8 million and \$12 million. Our four daughters, all between the ages of 7 and 12, have been raised in the church, and we've tried our best to teach them to love God, not money. Is there a certain limit we should look at in terms of how much we leave them as an inheritance?

Dear Mark,

First off, wow! You two have done an incredible job managing your money. I'm so proud of you and what you've been able to accomplish.

Honestly, I don't look at things like this in terms of an amount, but as a principle. You aren't obligated, biblically or otherwise, to leave your money to your kids. At the same time, I think it's wrong to assume that leaving them your money will damage them in some way. Wealth always magnifies the character of the person hold-

ing it. That includes both their positive and negative traits. You said you're raising your girls to love God and understand that the church is important. I believe those are great first steps toward teaching children to have good, strong character.

One of the first things we taught our kids about, aside from God, was how they were not entitled to anything just because they hit the gene pool lottery. Another thing we taught them was that in order to be qualified to manage the Ramsey wealth, they had to understand they didn't own it — God did. Every bit of it. Their job was to manage it wisely. Once you understand that concept, you also begin to realize why the Bible has so many warnings about wealth. It's a heavy thing to carry in a wise manner.

The Bible tells us that a good man leaves an inheritance to his children's children (Proverbs 13:22). for our public-school students. What we know is that students who are not reading at benchmark by the third-grade will have less opportunities than those who can read, including their employment, education and lifetime earnings.

The Sacramento County Office of Education and other important groups provide background on the science of reading but it is imperative that the action of reading be pursued at the parent and teacher level.

Parents should know early literacy strategies that they can do themselves.

First, have the K-2 students assessed and monitored on their reading ability throughout the school year. We use a program called DIBELS in the public charter schools that I lead.

Second, intervene when

the students are not meeting benchmark status for their grade level.

Finally, be aware of three key factors to determine whether the intervention and instruction works. (1) What is the curriculum or program that the teacher or parent uses (2) how often is the program being used (i.e. daily, every other day, etc.) and (3) for how long is the program being used with the student (i.e. 10 minutes, 20 minutes, etc.)?

All students should have the best opportunity to read, using these simple, yet effective strategies.

CARMICHAEL, CA (MPG) - A five-year-old child was discovered alone in an apartment on the afternoon of March 24, alongside the body of his deceased mother, authorities said.

Sacramento Metropolitan Fire District personnel responded to the 6000 block of Rutland Drive in Carmichael at approximately 2:55 p.m., March 24 after reports of an unresponsive person inside a residence. Upon arrival, firefighters confirmed the death of a woman. They also found her young child, alone inside the apartment.

Earlier in the day, the Sacramento County Sheriff's Department had been

called to the scene around 2:15 p.m. for a welfare check. A woman, concerned about her mother's well-being, requested assistance. However, the Sheriff's Office said it did not deem the situation suspicious and therefore did not respond.

The woman who initiated the welfare check found a maintenance worker who helped her gain access to the apartment, according to officials. The Sheriff's department was subsequently notified by the fire department, which was called for a report of an unresponsive person.

At this time, authorities are not considering the woman's death as suspicious or criminal. The cause of death remains under investigation. ★

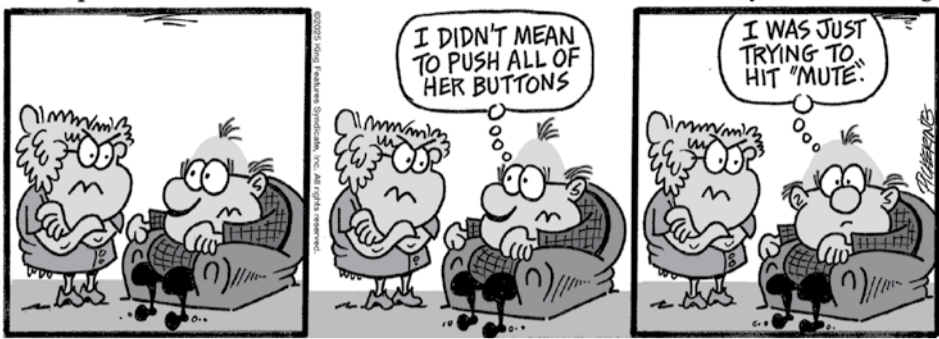

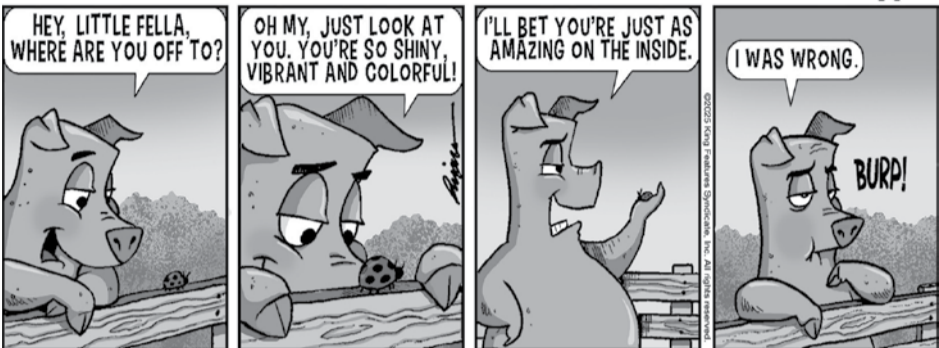

Bibby to Coach the Hornets

SACRAMENTO REGION, CA (MPG) - Former Sacramento Kings legend Mike Bibby is coming home.

On March 25, Sacramento State Director of Athletics Mark Orr announced that Bibby has been named the 17th head men's basketball coach in program history.

Bibby, who spent half of his 14-year NBA career with the Sacramento Kings, returns to the city where he became a fan favorite while helping the Kings to multiple playoff appearances in the early 2000s. A first team all-American, Pac-10 Conference Player of the Year and the No. 2 overall pick in the 1998 NBA draft, Bibby helped Arizona to a 1997 NCAA national championship.

"Since 2001, Sacramento has felt like home to me," Bibby said. "The people, the fans and the passion they have for the city and their teams is unmatched. I have always felt that passion, and will always be thankful for how I was embraced. Sacramento State is no different. After seeing the campus, and meeting with President Wood and Mark Orr, their vision for the University and program was something I shared. We are going

to build, we are going to develop, and we are going to win."

Recently, Bibby had assistant coaching stops with the Puerto Rican National Team, the Cleveland Cavaliers and Memphis Grizzlies summer league teams, and the NBA G-League Ignite. He coached 25 players who received collegiate scholarships during his time as head coach at Shadow Mountain High School (2014-19) in Phoenix, Ariz. During his six seasons at Shadow Mountain (five as head coach), he coached the team to five state championships, a 157-21 overall record, a 72-game winning streak, and a six-year home winning streak.

"I'm ecstatic to announce Mike Bibby as the new head coach of Sacramento State men's basketball, and welcome him back to the community of Sacramento," Orr said. "Mike will recruit talented student-athletes and develop a team culture that embodies success both on and off the court. I am convinced that Mike will pour every ounce of his energy into Sacramento State and engage the entire Sacramento region. I could not be more excited about the future of our program."

As an NBA player, Bibby appeared in over 1,000 career games, finishing with averages of 14.7 points, 5.5 assists and 1.2

steals during a 14-year run that began in 1998 with the Vancouver Grizzlies, and concluded in 2012 with the New York Knicks. He averaged better than 13 points in each of his first 11 seasons, including a seven-year stint with the Sacramento Kings (2001-08).

During those seven seasons, he averaged 17.6 points and helped the Kings to the franchise's most successful era. That included three straight Western Conference semifinal appearances, and a conference final in 2002. It was Bibby that hit the game winner in Game 5 of the 2002 conference final to give the Kings a 3-2 lead over the Los Angeles Lakers. Among franchise

leaders, he remains fifth in 3-pointers made (775), sixth in assists (2,580) and seventh in steals (584).

"Mike Bibby's basketball expertise, love for Sacramento, and passion for developing student-athletes perfectly align with our goals for Hornet basketball," said Sacramento State President Luke Wood. "His leadership and vision will elevate our program to new heights and inspire our community to rally behind Sac State basketball."

A native of Phoenix, Bibby spent two highly decorated seasons at Arizona (1996-98), where he helped the program to its lone national championship in 1997. He was the Pac-10 Freshman of the Year in 1997, and a consensus first team All-American and Pac-10 Player of the Year in 1998 after averaging 17.2 points, 5.7 assists and 2.4 steals. He had his No. 10 jersey retired by Arizona.

After his senior season at Shadow Mountain High School in 1996, he was named Mr. Basketball USA, McDonald's All-American and first team All-American.

Bibby graduated with a bachelor's degree (multidisciplinary studies) from UNLV in 2017. He and his wife, Darcy, have four children - Michael, Janae, Mia and Nylah. ★

Community Grants to Area Non-Profits

The grants, part of the CommonSpirit Health Community Health Improvement Grants program, are dedicated to improving the health and well-being of vulnerable and underserved populations.

“Dignity Health is committed to improving the health of our community beyond our hospital and clinic walls,” said Dr. Tina Johnson, Dignity Health Sacramento Market President. “These grants are a reflection of our work toward a healthier future for all, and support the great work being done by our community nonprofits to bring critical programs and services into the Sacramento Region. It is helping ensure individuals and families are able to access the services they need.”

The grant program helps to improve community health and health equity, and enhance local service systems, via restricted charitable contributions for defined projects. Collaborating 501(c)3 non-profit organizations applied to receive grant funds to address significant issues identified in the hospital’s/hospitals’ community health needs assessment/s. These can include improving behavioral health, homelessness, substance abuse services, food insecurity, basic needs such as housing, jobs and food, and more.

The following organizations received grants to support program activities between March 2025 and February 2026:

The ACC Telephone Reassurance & Companionship Services program meets a growing demand to reduce isolation, promotes physical activity, improves access to health and social services, and increases social interactions in the older Asian American/Pacific Islander adult community. ACC will recruit and train volunteers for this project and two existing programs for vulnerable seniors: Senior Escort and Friendly Visitor. These three programs will provide companionship and socialization for seniors of diverse ability-levels. Trained volunteers are used to interact with community members to improve health literacy and reduce anxiety and depression in family caregivers.

The lead organization for the program is the Asian Community Center of Sacramento Valley Inc., dba ACC Senior Services. Collaborators include Meals on Wheels, Society for the Blind, Agency on Aging Area 4 and Resources for Independent Living. The grant award is for \$78,500.

The Bridging House for Women and Children Experiencing Homelessness Due to Domestic Violence, Sexual Assault, and Human Trafficking organization will also be receiving a grant to support program activities. Bridging Initiatives International will assist families and individuals experiencing homelessness due to domestic violence, sexual assault, and human trafficking. They plan to support them with shelter for a 3-6 month period, while facilitating their transition to rental assistance through the BII housing program. Additional services include motel voucher services, and referrals to the continuum of care network. The lead organization is Bridging Initiatives International (BII) and their collaborators are Sacramento Steps Forward, Carmichael HART and Mercy Holistic Ministry. The total grant award is \$100,000.

The Foster Youth Success program partners with Interns to Pros and Hearts & Hands Counseling to provide comprehensive support to former foster youth, focusing on college success, career readiness, emotional well-being, and life skills. This initiative strives to guide successful transitions from college to impactful lives. Mentorship, counseling, career pathways, and workshops, aiming to enhance personal and professional success are offered to the students. An incentivized scholarship process covering housing,

tuition, and food eliminates the basic need barriers for foster youth students to succeed in college. The organization leading the effort is Fostering Success & Significance along with their collaborators that include Interns 2 Pros (I2P) and Hearts & Hands Counseling. The grant award is \$43,000.

Cut to the Chase is a program for Black men and women to meet up to discuss the daily challenges and issues they face to improve their mental health in Del Paso Heights and Oak Park. To eliminate the stigma around seeking mental-emotional support in the Black community, this program provides therapy in spaces in the barbershops and beauty salons that Black men and women already comfortably frequent throughout our community. This program is expanding with partnering organizations to include Medical Moments: a segment in each group therapy session to include health education. The lead organization is Greater Sacramento Urban League and their collaborators are Capitol City Black Nurses Association and Heart of the Matter Counseling. The total grant award is \$100,000.

The Young Adults Lift and Youth Activities Programs will provide basic needs, transition support and positive development for vulnerable and at-risk youth/young adults. Targeted youth from economically disadvantaged communities will be provided opportunities to participate in youth sports, camps, and STEM programs for positive development. etc., and Young adults transitioning back into the community from the Sacramento County Probation's Youth Detention Facility will be assisted with immediate needs and insecurities, including provision of monthly groceries and clothing, while offering a structured curriculum of financial literacy workshops, goal development, and career planning. The organization leading this program is HERB Nonprofit along with their collaborators that include the Sacramento County Probation's Youth Detention Juvenile Justice Chaplaincy, Turning Point Community Programs (TPCP) and Safe Credit Union. The grant award is \$100,000.

The Folsom Lake College MESA Program at Folsom Lake College will offer a robust Mathematics Engineering Science Achievement (MESA) program. MESA is dedicated to supporting women, low-income individuals, and people of color by providing tailored academic resources, mentorship, and opportunities to excel in STEM fields with a focus on diversifying the Allied Health Field. By providing comprehensive academic support, professional development opportunities, and a nurturing community, they aim to empower students to achieve their full potential. The lead organization is Los Rios Colleges Foundation and their collaborators that include CSU Sacramento/Black Honors College, El Dorado County Office of Education and Folsom Cordova Unified School District. Total grant award is \$100,000.

The Mercy Holistic Showers for the Homeless project provides mobile on-site showers to the homeless population in different locations throughout Sacramento. The program also addresses the

health, and well-being of the unhoused by providing hygiene kits, haircuts, clean undergarments, food, jobs, counseling, and housing voucher leads. The lead organization is Mercy Holistic Ministries, and their collaborators are Town and Country Lutheran Church, Mt. Calvary Baptist Church, Faith Presbyterian Church and Harvest Missionary Church. The grant award is \$75,000.

The North Sacramento HART project involves a weekly respite, warm breakfast, clothing giveaway, personal hygiene bags, and To Go lunches. North Sacramento HART has also partnered with Sacramento County Department of Health to provide free vaccinations for the unhoused. The project will allow expansion to longer hours and additional dates of operation as well as, providing more resources to gain access to human needs and care.

The lead Organization is North Sacramento HART and their collaborators are Mount Calvary Missionary Baptist Church and Sacramento Alumnae Chapter of Delta Sigma Theta Sorority, Inc. The grant award is \$20,000.

The Skate Nights Youth Development Program is a collaboration between Project Lifelong, the San Juan Unified School District, and Sierra Club's Inspiring Connections Outdoors, to address social isolation among youth. The Skate Nights program is a pop-up skateboarding park created on middle school campuses to integrate Social Emotional Learning (SEL) to develop life skills and foster a sense of belonging. This program positively impacts the mental and physical health of students by utilizing a Youth Advocate and LCSW within San Juan Unified School District to connect with participants in cases where mental health services may be needed. The lead organization is Project Lifelong, and their collaborators include Sacramento Inspiring Connections Outdoors and Edison Language Institute – SJUSD. The grant award is \$33,902.

The Safer Alternatives through Networking & Education project will address the need for two services among people experiencing homelessness and substance use disorder in Sacramento County: wound-care and education for soft tissue infections from IV injection, and access to medications for opiate use disorder. The project will provide wound care clinics and distribute wound care kits to unhoused persons through targeted outreach. Collaborating organizations will participate in training/sharing sessions, develop new health education materials to distribute to participants. Three medical providers from Sacramento Street Medicine will be trained to treat patients with limited access to health care and drug treatment with medications for opioid use disorder (MOUD).

The organization leading the project is Safer Alternatives through Networking & Education (SANE) along with collaborators Sacramento Street Medicine and Joan Viteri Memorial Clinic. The grant award is \$100,000.

Basic Needs, Family Services, and Behavioral Health/SUD Services, for Unhoused Women & Children is a project will address the basic needs of unhoused women and children in the Greater Sacramento area and improve social determinants of health by assisting them in developing the

necessary skills to obtain stable housing, economic security, and overall well-being. For up to 12 months each, this project will provide unhoused women and children with housing, meals, childcare, employment training, psycho/social education, transportation, housing navigation, and family services. Family services encompass children’s case management, and ensuring children receive assessments and treatment/referrals for appropriate intervention. Adult clients will receive mental health and substance use treatment services.

The lead organization is Saint John's Program for Real Change with their collaborators that include Highland Community Charter and Technical Schools, and UC Davis Health REACH Families Project. The grant award is \$50,098.

Adjustment to Blindness Mental Health Project provides individual and group counseling for clients who are blind or have low vision to help them adjust to this life-altering experience. Low vision has led to isolation, depression and dependence on alcohol and drugs. Older adults with cognitive problems have experienced medical emergencies. Counseling can provide resources that address their mental health issues and increase their ability to once again thrive. This project will provide a safe, supportive space to grieve their vision loss and rebuild their mental health and self-confidence. Counseling services are offered remotely and in-person in multiple languages. The lead organization is Society for the Blind, and their collaborators are H.O.P.E. Counseling and WEAVE. The grant award is \$80,000.

The Ukrainian American House project will address critical gaps in health access and mental health services for low-income, non-English speaking Slavic immigrants and Ukrainian refugees in Sacramento County. It will provide culturally competent mental health support, health services, education resources, and referrals to licensed counselors. The project will assist with navigating the complicated healthcare system and assist with Medi-Cal enrollment, Cal-Fresh and Cal-Works for active clients. Through these efforts, the project seeks to enhance the well-being and integration for immigrants and refugees.

The lead organization is Ukrainian American House, and their Collaborators are Parasolka and Community Connection Center. The grant award is \$50,000.

The Wind Youth Services Community Health Partnership aims to enhance access to supportive services for highly vulnerable homeless youth, aged 12-24, in Sacramento County. Along with One Community Health and Juma Ventures, the project seeks to increase youth awareness and access to essential services and distribute information to transitional-age youth. This includes connections to housing and homelessness services, medical care, and employment support.

The lead organization is Wind Youth Services and collaborators include One Community Health and Juma Ventures. The grant award is \$86,500.

In Yolo County, \$123,500 in community grants have been awarded to three community projects:

The Resilient Futures Fund aims to remove financial barriers to success by partnering with agencies who represent and/or provide services to justice impacted clients. This project will provide support to unique justice-involved individuals by removing barriers such as housing, transportation, food, clothing, hygiene, basic necessities and medical supplies. The lead organization is Yolo County Public Defender CARES and their collaborators are Yolo County Public Defender's Office, Yolo County Probation and Yolo County Health & Human Services Agency - Forensic Team. The grant award is \$25,866.

The Employment Support for Parents (ESP) Program at Yolo Crisis Nursery offers comprehensive assistance to help low-income parents secure employment. Through this program, parents receive support by working directly with a dedicated case manager to receive one-on-one case management, assistance with job applications, and housing navigation. This initiative also includes free childcare during job interviews and related activities. It will also cover costs as needed for interview transportation and appropriate work attire. Collaborators will also provide client referrals, host weekly office hours/drop-in sessions, and other specialized training, ensuring a holistic approach to support clients' employment and stability goals. The lead organization is Yolo Crisis Nursery Inc. and collaborators include RISE and YoloWorks. The grant award is \$37,634.

Yolo Food Bank with Yolo County Children’s Alliance (YCCA) and Rural Innovations in Social Economics (RISE) in partnership aims to provide free culturally appropriate food boxes monthly to Yolo County families in need. In direct response to data that almost forty percent of households with children are experiencing food insecurity YFB will provide a combination of fresh produce and shelf stable goods to families with young children ages 0-5 that are food insecure. A Nutrition Intern will be hired to provide families with supplemental bilingual nutrition education materials such as menu plans and recipe cards. The Nutrition Intern will also participate in home visits and will lead nutrition education workshops.

The lead organization is Yolo Food Bank (YFB) and their collaborators are Yolo County Children's Alliance (YCCA) and Rural Innovations in Social Economics. The grant award is \$60,000.

Women Comprise 39.9% of Farmers in Sacramento County

SACRAMENTO REGION, CA (MPG) - A quiet transformation is unfolding in American agriculture. Female farmers are taking on a larger role in shaping the future of farming, contributing to both local economies and national food production.

Recent data from the U.S. Department of Agriculture reveals a steady rise in the number of women involved in farm decision-making and management. From small family farms to large commercial operations, women are increasingly present in agricultural leadership. As this shift continues, certain parts of the country stand out for having a higher concentration of female farmers.

There has been a growing number of female farmers in the U.S. Over the past two decades, the share of female farmers in the United States has steadily increased. According to data from the most recent Census of Agriculture, women now make up more than a third of all agricultural producers, a notable rise from 26.9% in 2002.

A key turning point came with the 2017 Census of Agriculture, which expanded the definition of producers to provide a more comprehensive picture of the individuals involved in farm decision-making. As a result, the recorded number of female producers increased significantly from 969,672 in 2012 to 1,227,461 in 2017, in part due to this broader definition.

The data also shows a clear long-term trend: the number of male producers has been declining since 2007, when it peaked at 2.3 million. By 2022, that number fell to 2.15 million, continuing a downward trajectory.

Meanwhile, the share of female producers has grown consistently across every census, from 30.0% in 2007 to 30.5% in 2012, even before the definitional change in

2017 pushed it higher to 36.1%. The 2022 census confirmed that this upward trend has continued, with women now accounting for 36.3% of all producers.

While there are a record number of female farmers in the U.S., their presence varies significantly across different farming industries. Female producers are most concentrated in livestock operations involving smaller animals, specialty crops and greenhouse production, while they have lower representation in large-scale commodity farming.

Women have the highest representation in sheep and goat farming where they make up 46.1% of all producers, followed closely by aquaculture and other animal production (44.9%). This category includes horse farming, which has historically had strong female participation.

Poultry and egg farming also has a high share of female producers (43.2%). While large-scale poultry production is dominated by major agribusinesses, smaller-scale poultry operations, such as those focused on pasture-raised

eggs, organic poultry or specialty breeds are also common.

Female producers are well represented in vegetable and melon farming (39.3%), greenhouse and floriculture production (39.3%) and fruit and tree nut farming (38.0%). These sectors frequently involve intensive management, diversified crop production and specialty markets.

In contrast, female representation is lower in commodity crop production and large-scale livestock operations.

Women account for just 27.5% of cotton farmers, 25.9% of oilseed and grain producers and only 21.2% of tobacco farmers, which is the lowest share among all major agricultural sectors. Similarly, industries that require large-scale infrastructure, such as cattle feedlots (28.4%) and dairy farming (29.9%), have lower female participation rates.

Female farmers are not evenly distributed across the country. The western United States and the Northeast have the highest concentrations of female producers while much of the Midwest and

parts of the Southeast have the lowest.

Arizona leads the nation, with 47.9% of its agricultural producers being women. Other western states also rank high, including Alaska (47.6%), Oregon (44.0%) and Nevada (42.7%).

In the Northeast, New Hampshire (44.8%), Maine (43.1%) and Rhode Island (42.9%) have a high share of female producers. These regions tend to have a greater proportion of smaller farms, direct-to-consumer markets and diversified operations.

In contrast, the Midwest has the lowest share of female farmers, with the bottom five states being Illinois (28.0%), North Dakota (29.9%), Minnesota (31.0%), South Dakota (31.2%) and Iowa (32.7%).

The Southeast also has relatively lower concentrations, with North Carolina (33.3%), Mississippi (34.4%), Alabama (34.7%) and several other southern states ranking below the national average. These regions are home to large-scale

commodity crop operations such as corn, soybeans and commercial livestock.

County-level data reinforces these trends. Among the nation's largest agricultural counties, Coconino County, Arizona (52.9%) has the highest share among large counties, followed closely by Apache County, Arizona (52.6%) and Navajo County, Arizona (51.0%).

Other counties with a high proportion of female farmers include Pierce County, Washington (49.5%); Deschutes County, Oregon (49.2%); and McKinley County, New Mexico (49.1%), reinforcing the regional trend of stronger female representation in the West.
