WEST SACRAMENTO, CA (MPG) -On March 27, the City of West Sacramento ushered in a new era of baseball, as it celebrated the historic arrival of Major League Baseball (MLB) to the region.

The occasion was marked by a special news conference at Sutter Health Park located at 400 Ballpark Drive,

the home of the Triple-A River Cats, which now serves as the temporary home for the Athletics for the next three seasons.

The event highlighted not only the excitement of MLB baseball coming to the region but also the economic and cultural opportunities it presents.

"We've always been a baseball city but today, we expand beyond our horizons," said West Sacramento Mayor Martha Guerrero, reflecting on the city's deep roots in baseball, dating back to the opening of Sutter Health Park in 2000. "We are thrilled to welcome the A's and this marks a major milestone for our city. It's about more than just baseball; it's about building a culture that celebrates what we have to offer."

Los Rios **Chancellor Brian King** to Retire

College District Chancellor Brian King will retire at the end of the 2025-26 academic vear.

"Serving as the chancellor of the Los Rios Community College District has been the professional honor of my lifetime," King said in a video message to faculty, staff and administrators at the four Los Rios colleges and district office. "I'm so proud of what our district has accomplished over the past 13 years."

King joined Los Rios as chancellor in February 2012 after an extensive national search by the Los Rios Board of Trustees. He is the ninth chancellor in the 60-year history of the district.

Under King's leadership, Los Rios has raised more than \$60 million through grant-seeking and fundraising efforts and seen marked improvements in student success. In the last 13 years, Los Rios has built or significantly renovated more than a dozen major campus facilities, seen enrollment grow to beyond pre-pandemic levels and expanded programs for students and employers in the Capital region.

During his time at Los Rios, King has served in leadership roles in a number of significant local and statewide organizations, including serving as past president of the Chief Executive Officers of the California Community Continued on page 7

Behavioral Health Clinics Update Hours May 1

YOLO COUNTY, CA (MPG) -Effective May 1, the Yolo County Health and Human Services Agency (HHSA) will update operating days and hours of its Behavioral Health Clinics in West Sacramento and Davis. The Woodland location will keep its current schedule.

Health and Human Services Agency's Behavioral Health Clinics offer high-quality care to Yolo County residents who are uninsured or receiving Medi-Cal, providing clinic services, medication management and access to the wellness centers.

The updated information listed below was approved by the Yolo County Board of Supervisors on March 11 and will go in affect May 1.

The West Sacramento clinic's updated hours will be 8 a.m. to noon and 1 to 5 p.m. Tuesdays, Thursdays

and Fridays, starting May 1. The wellness center will be open from 10 a.m. to 3 p.m. those days.

The Davis clinic will update its days and hours to 8 a.m. to noon and 1 p.m. to 5 p.m. Mondays and Wednesdays, starting May 1. The wellness center will be open from 10 a.m. to 3 p.m. those days.

The Woodland clinic hours will be 8 a.m. to 5 p.m. Mondays through Fridays. The wellness center will be open from 10 a.m. to 3 p.m. those days.

"While our hours of operation are being reduced, our commitment to meeting the needs of our community remains unwavering,' said Samantha Fusselman, Health and Human Services Agency's Adult and Aging branch director. "We will ensure that clients continue to receive the services they require and crisis clinicians will be available to respond to all

Local Food and Hotel Destinations for A's Games in West Sacramento

WEST SACRAMENTO, CA (MPG) - The recent arrival of the Athletics to the Sutter Health Park to play their 2025 home games is a big change for fans and game-goers. From those coming into town for the game to locals interested in being more informed about what's around Sutter Health Park, here is a guide of what to look out for in West Sacramento.

There are many options available for food, drinks, hotels and transit options surrounding the stadium.

It is best to have a plan ready on how to get to the game. To help accommodate fans getting around West Sacramento, the city has launched a rideshare app called Via West Sac. Rides are available at an affordable and flat fare of \$3.50, \$1.75 for senior citizens.

Public transportation is available through Yolo bus route 42 from Davis, West Sacramento and downtown Sacramento that makes stops next to the ballpark on Cabaldon Parkway

For the Athletics supporters coming out of town, especially those from the Bay Area, Amtrak's Capital Corridor train route takes riders up to the Sacramento station that is about a mile away from the ballpark. One-way tickets are \$29.

Getting a bite before or after the game at the local food scene is a great way to catch specials.

Restaurants such as Drake's The Barn right around the corner from Sutter Health Park are offering A's game day deals on foods such as pretzels with beer cheese, chicken ranch wraps, hot

dogs and barbeque plates. A specialty drink is also available, the "Home Rum!" which is a tropical rum punch with a blue curação float which turns the drink green.

Down the street, folks can grab a drink at The Tree House Café on Third

Street. The cafe plans to extend its hours to 8 p.m. and will have a full bar to serve drinks.

Burgers & Brews are offering customers deals on game day; call (916) 572-0909 for more information about A's specials. Another eatery and bar in area is 319 Broderick, which serves classic American dishes such as burgers, wings, macaroni and more.

Athletics supporters coming from out of town and staying in West Sacramento should get to know the best lodging available.

There are several places nearby to stay and rest after the game. For those looking for a nice and affordable visit within West Sacramento, the SpringHill Suites and the Hampton Inn & Suites offer rooms for under \$200. Both are located approximately 10 minutes driving distance from Sutter Health Park.

Crossing the river on I Street Bridge and heading down Jibboom Street are more affordable and comfortable options available that are less than five minutes away in car. Hotels with rooms starting at \$100

or less a night include the Best Western Sandman Hotel, Comfort Suites Downtown Sacramento and Howard Johnson by Wyndham.

If folks who would like to experience the Downtown Sacramento atmosphere during their stay can consider hotels such as (in order of lowest to highest price) the Holiday Inn Sacramento Downtown starting at \$170 a night, The Exchange starting at \$295 a night, Hyatt Centric Downtown for around \$220 and Kimpton Sawyer Hotel starting price at \$360 a night.

For game-goers wanting a closer and more luxury accommodation, cross the Tower Bridge and arrive at the Embassy Suites Sacramento Riverfront Promenade with rooms starting at around \$380. ★

Continued from page 1 the city's readiness for the national spotlight, pointing to recent upgrades at the ballpark.

"Our partnership with the Sacramento Kings has elevated Sutter Health Park to MLB standards, proving that West Sacramento is ready for this moment," Guerrero said. "We have what it takes to make this a seamless, successful experience for both our residents and visitors."

The mayor also spoke about the city's future growth.

"We have been doing a lot of work in developing this city, and once they come here, people will see how comfortable and enjoyable it is to hang out, spend time in our local restaurants," Guerrero said. "We will definitely see economic growth."

Guerrero emphasized the city's identity, referring to West Sacramento as the "baseball side of the river."

West Sacramento City Manager Aaron Laurel echoed the sentiment, adding that the A's arrival represents the culmination of a long-term vision for the city.

"Twenty-five years ago, this area was a landscape of industrial warehouses and rail lines. Today, the Bridge District has emerged as a thriving urban center,

and now, welcoming the A's is the next step in that growth," Laurel said. "This is a new chapter, not just for West Sacramento, but for the entire region."

Laurel also highlighted the city's preparation for the influx of visitors, emphasizing improvements in traffic management and parking.

"We've coordinated with local law enforcement and businesses to ensure that fans have a safe, enjoyable experience," Laurel said. "We're also excited

to promote tourism and create lasting economic opportunities for our local businesses. We have introduced new grant programs that are available to businesses in the city to make upgrades, to position themselves as best as possible for increased traffic and tourism."

West Sacramento Police Chief Rob Strange outlined the department's efforts to ensure public safety during A's games.

"Our officers are committed to ensuring a safe environment for fans and residents," Strange said. "We're working closely with local law enforcement and businesses to manage traffic and mitigate any impacts on the surrounding neighborhoods."

"We've been preparing for this moment for a year," Strange said. "The exhibition game last Sunday showed us that we're ready and we're confident that we'll be able to provide a smooth, safe experience for everyone involved."

The city's preparation for

the A's arrival goes beyond traffic and security. Local businesses are also gearing up to capitalize on the increased foot traffic. For example, the Tree House Café, located at 630 3rd I think it's great what St near the ballpark, has they're going to bring for added an outside bar and extended hours to accomeverybody."

"We are super excited. The owner has been keeping us updated and we're hoping to be an afterparty spot for fans," said employee Brooke.



In the life of every NBA team there is a lowest spot of the season. Sunday night in Orlando Florida could very well be the Mendonza line for the Sacramento Kings.

It was not a pretty sight as a tired Kings team fought in futility just to stay in the game. The Magic jumped out to a 10-1 lead, and it went downhill from there. There are many reasons the Kings lost this game, and shooting 25% from beyond the arc was front and center. Social Security Matters

Can My Wife and I Get Spouse **Benefits from Each Other?**

Dear Rusty: My wife and I are currently collecting Social Security. We both started receiving SS at 62 years old. That said, we get by on a tight budget.

A retired friend told us about an option which allows a spouse to collect half (1/2) of the other spouse's SS monthly income. My question has two parts: 1. Can we both collect on each other's SS? And 2. Are there any pitfalls? Signed: Seeking an Increase

Dear Seeking: Well, I'm afraid spousal benefits aren't quite that simple. One spouse may be eligible for additional benefits from the other, but only if that spouse's personal Social Security retirement benefit at their full retirement age (FRA) is less than half (50%) of the other spouse's FRA entitlement. Note

that for spouse benefits, FRA amounts are used regardless of when you actually claim benefits. Full retirement age for both you and your wife is 66, so that means that if you both claimed at 62 your FRA entitlements were higher – about 25% more - than you are both currently receiving. Since you applied for

benefits some time ago at about the same age, one way to estimate if one of you may be entitled to an additional amount as a spouse is to evaluate your current monthly amounts. If either of you are getting a benefit which is less than half of the other's amount, it's possible that the one with the lower benefit may be entitled to more as a spouse. And note, only one spouse is eligible for benefits – you cannot both get spouse benefits from each other.

Another way to explore this is for the spouse with the lowest monthly Social Security benefit to contact Social Security at 1.800.772.1213 to ask if spouse benefits are available. Noting that contacting SS these days can be a time-consuming process, yet another way is for you to provide us (the AMAC Foundation's SS Advisory Service) with both of your current monthly SS benefit amounts (before any deductions) and the exact ages when each of you claimed. Using that information, we can do the math to see if either of you might be entitled to more as a spouse. But, in the end, only the spouse with the lower benefit may be eligible, and then, only if their FRA entitlement (not their actual current amount) is less than 50% of the other spouse's FRA entitlement.

The Real Crisis in California Schools is Low Achievement, Not Cultural Conflicts

When Governor Gavin Newsom unexpectedly voiced opposition to allowing transgender women to compete in women's sports, he was throwing gasoline on an issue that was already burning in state and national political arenas.

"I think it's an issue of fairness," Newsom told right-wing iconoclast Charlie Kirk on the inaugural segment of the governor's new podcast. "I completely agree with you on that. It is an issue of fairness. It's deeply unfair. I'm not wrestling with the fairness issue. I totally agree with you."

The remark generated a tsunami of media commentary about Newsom's motives and a torrent of criticism from fellow Democrats, particularly from lesbian, gay, bisexual and transgender (LGBTQ) rights advocates. It also focused attention on two Republican bills that would ban transgender women from women's high school and college sports.

given Ordinarily, Republicans' lack of legislative clout, Democratic leaders would just dump both bills in the wastebasket, as they have done innumerable times.

However Assembly Speaker Robert Rivas is allowing Assemblywoman Kate Sanchez of Rancho Santa Margarita and Assemblyman Bill Essayli of Corona to present their measures, Assembly Bills 89 and 844, to the Arts, Entertainment, Sports and

That's probably as far as the measures will go. The Legislature's influential lesbian, gay, bisexual and transgender caucus will see to that. But the maneuver protects Rivas from allegations that he was not willing to have at least a discussion on the issue that Newsom, for whatever reason, chose to highlight.

While these well-orchestrated events feed political junkies' voracious appetite for cultural conflict, they also underscore the pathetic lack of interest Capitol politicians have in a real crisis, the shamefully low levels of academic achievement in California's schools.

California fares very poorly vis-a-vis other states in federal academic testing, seventh from the bottom, and there's a yawning achievement gap separating low-income students from their more privileged classmates. Moreover, California is one of several states whose students still lag behind pre-pandemic achievement levels.

A few days ago, the Washington Post published an article by Rahm Emanuel, former mayor of Chicago and chief of staff to President Barack Obama, about the neglect of educational achievement.

Emanuel called it a "Sputnik moment in education" and declared that "almost no one among the nation's purported adults seems to want to solve the problem."

Emanuel continued, "On both sides of the aisle, we're caught in wild and besidethe-point education debates, whether the Education Department should be closed, which students should change

in which locker rooms or

Assembly's Committee on participate in which sports, and whether curriculums should be stripped of diversity, equity and inclusion. All those disagreements deserve a hearing. But they are shiny baubles distracting us from the real crisis, namely, our children's failure to meet basic standards in reading, writing and arithmetic."

> That's precisely what's happening in California.

> Emanuel cited examples of states that have taken educational achievement seriously, one being Mississippi, where deep poverty is a way of life.

> "Mississippi's early embrace of 'the science of reading', that is, the restoration of phonics in teaching literacy, has led to what some call a miracle: The state's reading scores for fourth graders rose from 49th nationally in 2013 to ninth in 2024," Emanuel noted. "We ought to be bringing these approaches to scale with urgency.'

> Phonics has made some inroads in California, but unlike Mississippi, California has not fully embraced it, despite ranking 33rd in fourth grade reading.


> That could change if the Legislature adopts AB 1121, a newly introduced measure by Assemblymember Blanca Rubio, a West Covina Democrat, with support from EdVoice and other education reform groups.

> The bill would encourage school districts to adopt "evidence-based means of teaching foundational reading skills." It deserves at least as much

> legislative attention as the transgender bills.



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
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FastPass Program Secures Conviction Under New Law

WOODLAND, CA (MPG) -On March 25, Kenneth Matthews of Woodland pled no contest to several felony theft-related crimes, including a new law created by California's voter-initiative, Prop 36.

Matthews pled no-contest to retail theft with two or more prior convictions, grand theft and unlawful use of personal identifying information with a prior conviction.

Additionally, Matthews admitted to eight prior qualifying convictions. Per the terms of the plea, Matthews will be sentenced at 9 a.m. May 20 in Department 10 of the Yolo Superior Court to three years and four months in the local prison.

These convictions stem from Matthews' repeated thefts in Yolo County from The Home Depot, Target and the unauthorized use of credit cards belonging to a Woodland resident.

At several Home Depot stores, between July and December 2023, Matthews was caught on surveillance cameras ticket-switching on numerous occasions. Matthews would scan a lower-priced item in place of the higher-dollar item he had selected, often paying less than a few dollars for merchandise worth thousands.

Matthews' scheme was caught by The Home Depot loss prevention team, which then submitted their reports directly to the Yolo County District Attorney's Office through the "FastPass" program. Charges were filed in March 2024.

On Feb. 26, 2024, Woodland Police received a report of credit card fraud from a resident. The investigation led them to Matthews, who had unlawfully obtained the victim's credit and bank cards.

Matthews used the cards several times, charging about \$1,000 on the victim's cards in just one day. Matthews also had a prior conviction for unlawful use of personal identifying information. Charges for this incident were also filed in March 2024.

While those cases were pending and Matthews was out on bail, California voters passed Prop 36, which was aimed at addressing the retail theft crisis by increasing penalties for repeat thieves. The new law went into effect on Dec. 18,

2024.

On Dec. 20, 2024, Matthews was arrested during a retail theft blitz operation conducted by the California Highway Patrol's Valley Division at Target in Woodland.

He was observed ticket-switching, paying only \$2.17 for about \$200 worth of merchandise. Matthews was stopped by California Highway Patrol as he exited the store with the unpaid merchandise and was arrested. After a record check, it was revealed that Matthews had numerous qualifying convictions, making the conduct a felony offense.

"California voters have spoken by an overwhelming majority passing Prop 36 by nearly 70%, calling for change and accountability for repeat theft offenders. This case is just one example that demonstrates the need for the changes that voters have rightfully demanded. The Yolo County District Attorney's Office will continue to fight to ensure that the voters' will is done by holding serial thieves accountable in a meaningful way to combat the retail theft crisis," said District Attorney Jeff Reisig.

SACRAMENTO REGION, CA (MPG) -Former Sacramento Kings legend Mike Bibby is coming home.

On March 25, Sacramento State Director of Athletics Mark Orr announced that Bibby has been named the 17th head men's basketball coach in program history.

Bibby, who spent half of his 14-year NBA career with the Sacramento Kings, returns to the city where he became a fan favorite while helping the Kings to multiple playoff appearances in the early 2000s. A first team all-American, Pac-10 Conference Player of the Year and the No. 2 overall pick in the 1998 NBA draft, Bibby helped Arizona to a 1997 NCAA national championship.

"Since 2001, Sacramento has felt like home to me," Bibby said. "The people, the fans and the passion they have for the city and their teams is unmatched. I have always felt that passion, and will always be thankful for how I was embraced. Sacramento State is no different. After seeing the campus, and meeting with President Wood and Mark Orr, their vision for the University and program was

He had his No. 10 jersey retired by Arizona.

After his senior season at Shadow Mountain High School in 1996, he was named Mr. Basketball USA, McDonald's All-American and first team All-American.

Bibby graduated with a bachelor's degree (multidisciplinary studies) from UNLV in 2017. He and his wife, Darcy, have four children - Michael, Janae, Mia and Nylah.
