Captain Cook Shapes the Future

SACRAMENTO REGION. CA (MPG) - When Cathy Cook points out bullet holes in an A-10 fuselage at the California Aerospace Museum, she could be forgiven a shudder. As an aircraft commander during the Gulf Wars, she refueled these aircraft at 18,000 feet as they flew to enemy targets in Iraq.

During her 11-year Air Force career, Cook took the heat. Commanding the K C-135 air-refueling tanker, Cook dealt daily with Air Force, Navy and Marine and NATO pilots. Cook's missions included war zone deployments and duties in Europe.

"I've proven my skills in a career of

decision-making and troubleshooting," said the 67 year old. "Flying captain for the Air Force required great tack and diplomacy. Especially for a woman. I've applied everything I've learned to everything I've ever done."

Now retired from decades as a Delta Airlines pilot, Cook is a lead-by-example mentor for young visitors seeking STEM (Science, Technology, Engineering and Math) education at the Aerospace Museum.

"What I'm doing now is more important than anything I've done before," Cook said. "I'm helping to shape the future of our country. Young people I talk to are the next generation of engineers, pilots, astronauts and technicians.

Board advises Californians not to reply to suspicious text messages, download attachments or click on links in texts or emails if they are unsure of their authenticity. Visit the Franchise Tax Board's text messaging page at ftb.ca.gov/help/scams/ text-messaging.html to verify when Franchise Tax Board sends texts and what information is included. Scammers often prey on

taxpayers by impersonating Internal Revenue Service or Franchise Tax Board employees. They might attempt to scam taxpayers into sending money not owed or providing personal information that could be used to file fraudulent returns and steal refunds. If a taxpayer receives

a letter from Franchise Tax Board or the Internal Revenue Service that appears suspicious, call the Franchise Tax Board at 800-852-5711 or the Internal Revenue Service at 800-829-1040.

Women Comprise 39.9% of Farmers in Sacramento County

SACRAMENTO REGION, CA (MPG) - A quiet transformation is unfolding in American agriculture. Female farmers are taking on a larger role in shaping the future

of farming, contributing to both local economies and national food production.

Recent data from the U.S.

Department of Agriculture reveals a steady rise in the number of women involved in farm decision-making and management. From small family farms to large commercial operations, women are increasingly present in agricultural leadership. As this shift continues, certain parts of the country stand out for having a

higher concentration of female

farmers.

There has been a growing number of female farmers in the U.S. Over the past two decades, the share of female farmers in the United States has steadily increased. According to data from the most recent Census of Agriculture, women now make up more than a third of all agricultural producers, a notable rise from 26.9% in 2002.

A key turning point came with the 2017 Census of Agriculture, which expanded the definition of producers to provide a more comprehensive picture of the individuals involved in farm decision-making. As a result, the recorded number of female producers increased significantly from 969,672 in 2012 to 1,227,461 in 2017, in part due to this broader definition.

The data also shows a clear long-term trend: the number of male producers has been declining since 2007, when it peaked at 2.3 million. By 2022, that number fell to 2.15 million, continuing a downward trajectory.

Meanwhile, the share of female producers has grown consistently across every census, from 30.0% in 2007 to 30.5% in 2012, even before the definitional change in

2017 pushed it higher to 36.1%. The 2022 census confirmed that this upward trend has continued, with women now accounting for 36.3% of all producers.

While there are a record number of female farmers in the U.S., their presence varies significantly across different farming industries. Female producers are most concentrated in livestock operations involving smaller animals, specialty crops and greenhouse production, while they have lower representation in large-scale commodity farming.

Women have the highest representation in sheep and goat farming where they make up 46.1% of all producers, followed closely by aquaculture and other animal production (44.9%). This category includes horse farming, which has historically had strong female participation.

Poultry and egg farming also has a high share of female producers (43.2%). While large-scale poultry production is dominated by major agribusinesses, smaller-scale poultry operations, such as those focused on pasture-raised

eggs, organic poultry or specialty breeds are also common.

Female producers are well represented in vegetable and melon farming (39.3%), greenhouse and floriculture production (39.3%) and fruit and tree nut farming (38.0%). These sectors frequently involve intensive management, diversified crop production and specialty markets.

In contrast, female representation is lower in commodity crop production and large-scale livestock operations.

Women account for just 27.5% of cotton farmers, 25.9% of oilseed and grain producers and only 21.2% of tobacco farmers, which is the lowest share among all major agricultural sectors. Similarly, industries that require large-scale infrastructure, such as cattle feedlots (28.4%) and dairy farming (29.9%), have lower female participation rates.

Female farmers are not evenly distributed across the country. The western United States and the Northeast have the highest concentrations of female producers while much of the Midwest and parts of the Southeast have the lowest.

Arizona leads the nation, with 47.9% of its agricultural producers being women. Other western states also rank high, including Alaska (47.6%), Oregon (44.0%) and Nevada (42.7%).

In the Northeast, New Hampshire (44.8%), Maine (43.1%) and Rhode Island (42.9%) have a high share of female producers. These regions tend to have a greater proportion of smaller farms, direct-to-consumer markets and diversified operations.

In contrast, the Midwest has the lowest share of female farmers, with the bottom five states being Illinois (28.0%), North Dakota (29.9%), Minnesota (31.0%), South Dakota (31.2%) and Iowa (32.7%).

The Southeast also has relatively lower concentrations, with North Carolina (33.3%), Mississippi (34.4%), Alabama (34.7%) and several other southern states ranking below the national average. These regions are home to large-scale commodity crop operations such as corn, soybeans and commercial livestock.

County-level data reinforces these trends. Among the nation's largest agricultural counties, Coconino County, Arizona (52.9%) has the highest share among large counties, followed closely by Apache County, Arizona (52.6%) and Navajo County, Arizona (51.0%).

Other counties with a high proportion of female farmers include Pierce County, Washington (49.5%); Deschutes County, Oregon (49.2%); and McKinley County, New Mexico (49.1%), reinforcing the regional trend of stronger female representation in the West.

It won't be a big deal for women to fill these jobs. They'll be naturally accepted."

That was not always the case. Tall, slender and long-legged, Cook stood out like a 1980s career Barbie when sauntering through airports in her Delta uniform.

"I got head-turns," she recalled. "It was so unusual to see a woman pilot back then. A captain friend was uncomfortable walking next to me. He didn't like the attention. When we said goodbye to people getting off our flights, women would nudge their husbands and say, 'See, honey, we had a woman pilot.' Moms would tell their daughters they could grow up to be like me."

Even now, in vintage flight suit, Cook is a magnet for youngsters. Her gender, uniform, rank, even the memorable "Captain Cook" moniker, have made her a force of inspiration for much of her life. When her late husband (Colonel Frasier Fortner) ran Junior ROTC programs at Highlands High School, his pilot wife was an unpaid aide.

"He'd have me talk to his classes about careers in the Air Force and how my military time led to a Delta Airlines career," Cook said. "I told them when I first entered the Air Force, hardly any other women were flying. Even as a Lieutenant, I was invited to talk at schools and air shows. I always felt it was part of my job to expand people's ideas and to show girls and women that the glass ceiling was broken. You never know how you might spark

someone's interest in a way that changes their life."

A mother of two sons, Cook has captained her Carmichael neighborhood's resident association for more than 10 years. In 2019, she unsuccessfully ran for District 7 Assembly. Following the election, Cook was sought by California Aerospace Museum directors.

"They told me they wanted to focus on STEM education," Cook said. "That really was up my alley. We had no hands-on museums when I was growing up. There weren't female role models in aviation, except perhaps for Amelia Erhardt and things didn't end well for her. So the museum's emphasis on science and technological learning was something I happily embraced."

The volunteer job includes board meetings and youth mentorship at the North Highlands facility.

"I'm in my element," Cook said. "My career has been a privilege. I want to show young people, especially girls, that they could have opportunities like mine. If I can inspire them to work hard and persevere, they can take their dreams as far as they want. The sky's no longer the limit; outer space is accessible. And it's not just for pilots and astronauts; there are so many exciting opportunities. So many smart, adventurous people will be needed for the future of aviation."

Captain Cook Shapes the Future Sacramento State's Spring **Enrollment Hits Historic High**

SACRAMENTO REGION, CA (MPG) - California State University, Sacramento's Spring enrollment this year was the largest in the university's history, continuing to buck trends and exceeding the California State University's enrollment goals for the campus.

The official Spring 2025 head count stands at 30,164. That's 197 more students than last year, said Brian Henley, interim senior associate vice-president for Enrollment Management.

"That gives us a record number of students enrolled for a spring term in the history of the university," Henley said.

The number exceeds by 3.5% the enrollment target for the academic year that the California State University set for Sac State.

Across the country, enrollment in both community colleges and four-year universities appears to be on the upswing after years of declines in the wake of COVID-19, national data suggests. Last fall, enrollment increased by a modest 0.4% above levels achieved prior to the pandemic, according to the National Student Clearinghouse Research Center.

"One of the things that we are emphasizing is that we have great programs and services that can help all students be successful. We are here to meet their needs," said Henley.

Even as other institutions saw post-pandemic declines, Sac State's enrollment held steady. Henley said this spring's enrollment bump is the result of hard work behind the scenes.

"We're getting the message out about Sac State and that message is very positive," said Henley.

Admissions staffers have been visiting high schools and community colleges, attending college fairs and messaging prospective students via text and email about Sac State's attributes, said Henley.

"One of the things that we are emphasizing is that we have great programs and services that can help all students be successful," Henley added. "We are here to meet their needs."

Sac State's tuition remains relatively low compared to other California universities, Henley pointed out, and financial aid is available to most students. The university boasts programs such as a food pantry and peer mentoring that can help clear obstacles to students' academic goals.

"Across the board, we're just doing a very good job of delivering our message and it's making a difference," Henley said.

CITRUS HEIGHTS, CA (MPG) - I am honored to share an important initiative that I, alongside Senator Roger Niello, am advocating for in our state budget. We have officially submitted a request for funding to support the Citrus Heights Veterans Memorial Project (CHVMP). This project is dedicated to honoring the bravery and sacrifice of the more than three-million Americans who served in the Vietnam War, including the 58,281 who made the ultimate sacrifice.

The requested funding will enable the immediate construction of a Westcoast replica of the Vietnam Veterans Memorial Wall. This memorial will be a place of reflection and healing for veterans, their families and visitors, providing a solemn space to pay tribute to those who served. Located within the Veterans section of Calvary Cemetery, the memorial will be visible from Interstate 80 and open to the

SACRAMENTO REGION, CA (MPG) - On a routine Monday meal delivery, a volunteer driver with Meals on Wheels (MoW) Sacramento County made a frightening discovery. A senior had been trapped in a collapsed bed since Friday, without food, water or a way to call for help. Staying calm, the driver called 911 and remained at the scene until the emergency contact

Reflecting on moments like these, Mindy Klick, executive director of Meals on Wheels Sacramento County shared, "I want to say these are success stories but they are more like life-saving stories."

Although often mistaken for a public agency, Meals on Wheels Sacramento County is a program of the private nonprofit called ACC Senior Services, formerly known as The Asian Community Center of Sacramento Valley.

Meals on Wheels Sacramento County partners with Sacramento County Department of Child, Family and Adult Services to tackle senior hunger and isolation head-on.

Department of Child, Family and Adult Services' support has helped shrink the growing waitlist by providing funding, vehicles and equipment to make meal delivery safer and more efficient.

"We try to provide whatever we can to help seniors stay in their homes safely," Klick said.

In the current fiscal year, Meals on Wheels Sacramento County is serving an average of about 1,500 meals to seniors each month, with flexible meal options designed to fit their lifestyles:

Home delivery gives participants a choice of daily hot meals or weekly frozen meal packs.

Restaurant meal vouchers provide flexibility and the opportunity to dine out at local partner restaurants.

Community Cafés, located in community centers and other sites across the county, provide more than just a meal; they offer a space for seniors to connect, socialize and combat loneliness. For many participants, the opportunity for conversation is just as important as the food itself.

Comprehensive Update on Response to Homelessness

Sacramento County News Release

SACRAMENTO, CA (MPG) -

The Sacramento County departments of Homeless Services and Housing, and Health Services presented their biannual report to the Board detailing outreach efforts to the homeless population in the unincorporated region of Sacramento and along the American River Parkway from July 1 to Dec. 31, 2024.

This is the third such report out since the start of the city/county partnership agreement was signed in December 2023. In addition to reporting on joint outreach efforts in the City of Sacramento, county staff also report on similar activities in the unincorporated county.

Looking at the county outreach items by the numbers starting from July 1 to Dec. 31, 2024, 10 parkway staff, 10 encampment services staff and six community-based outreach staff provided 25,274 services to 810 unduplicated individuals and supported 184 unduplicated individuals with transitioning out of unsheltered homelessness (which includes shelter and housing). On average, that is 31 services per participant.

45% of individuals are between the ages of 45 and 64, 64% report a disabling condition, 40% have no income, and on average, have experienced nearly four years of homelessness.

From July 1 to Dec. 31, 2024 county shelters enrolled 1,137 unique households.

Taking a look at behavioral health services by the numbers indicate that from July 1 to Dec. 31, 2024, 1,360 unhoused residents were referred to behavioral health services and 947 individuals were successfully admitted and linked to services.

During the same period, HEART Team efforts included 1,607 individuals engaged, 342 referrals to behavioral health services and individuals linked to and served by outpatient programs.

From July to December 2024, the Full-Service Partnerships (FSPs) served 2,631 (95% of total capacity) unduplicated individuals out of which 76% of those individuals are housed, 11% are in shelters, 9% are unsheltered and 4% are unknown.

The Department of Homeless Services and Housing continues to update its data dashboards, reflecting its commitment to providing clear, accessible information to support

data-driven decision-making and continuous improvement in addressing homelessness.

Data presented in the dashboards is organized into two general categories: program performance data and demographic insights data.

Program performance data helps track key performance metrics, including program reach, services provided to program participants, program utilization and connections to shelter and housing.

Demographic insights include data on age, gender, race/ethnicity and vulnerability factors such as lengths of homelessness, disability conditions and financial resources.

Social Security Matters

When is the Best Time for Me to Claim Social Security?

Dear Rusty: I will be 66 ½ in June and would like to discuss when would be the best time for me to start taking my social security benefits. I am still employed full time and don't want to be penalized because of that. Please let me know what I need to do to set up an appointment with you. I got your information from the AMAC website, and I look forward to hearing from you. Signed: Ready to Claim

Dear Ready: You can certainly call us on 1.888.750.2622 during normal EST business hours for a personal conversation. But to facilitate that conversation, be aware that deciding when to claim your Social Security benefit normally depends on just a few factors, including your financial need, your health and expected longevity, and your marital status. A few things to be aware of:

• Born in 1958, your "full retirement age" is age 66 years and 8 months. If you were born in October 1958, you will reach you FRA in June 2025, and that is the point you can get 100% of the SS benefit you've earned from a lifetime of working.

• Once you reach your FRA in June, Social Security's "annual earnings test" no longer applies. Thus, you can continue working after you start your SS benefits and your earnings will not negatively affect your monthly benefit amount. If you claim any earlier than your FRA, you will get a smaller benefit and also be subject to Social Security's annual earnings test (which for you this year - your FRA year is \$62,160, or \$5,180/month after you start your SS benefits). If you decide to claim before your FRA, your benefit will be reduced by .556% for each month early (a permanent reduction).

· You can also wait beyond your FRA to claim and earn Delayed Retirement Credits (DRCs) at the rate of .667% per month (8% per year of delay), in order to get an even higher benefit later. If financially feasible, you can delay up to the age of 70 when your monthly benefit will reach maximum - about 27% more than it will be in June of this year.

• If you are single and will not be eligible for a spousal benefit, then you should make your claiming decision based only on your own needs. If, however, you are married and your spouse's FRA benefit is more than twice your FRA amount, you may be entitled to a "spousal boost" (a supplemental amount added to your own SS benefit).

• Your life expectancy should be considered when deciding when to claim your SS retirement benefits. If you expect to enjoy at least "average" longevity (about 87 for a woman your current age), then you might also consider delaying your claim (if financially feasible) and that is often a prudent choice. If you don't expect to achieve a long life, or if you need the money sooner, or if you are entitled to spousal benefits, then claiming at your FRA of 66 years and 8 months is likely your best option. In the end, only you can

decide when you should claim your Social Security, but we're always here to answer any additional questions you may have. In California's Capitol, Some Political **Fights Span Decades**

Were we able to transport ourselves back in time 50 years and into California's Capitol, we would find a governor seeking and enjoying massive attention by national political media as he eyes some greater office. We'd also find a Legislature dealing with conflicts among influential interests with heavy financial impacts.

In other words, the Capitol's dynamics in 1975 were pretty much what they are today.

The resemblance even extends to specific issues. For instance, then-Gov. Jerry Brown was touting a "peripheral canal" in 1975 to carry water around the Sacramento-San Joaquin Delta. Gavin Newsom was seven years old then, but now as governor is waging the same campaign for a tunnel to do the same thing and is facing the same opposition.

Other conflicts that confronted Brown and legislators a half-century ago can be found again among the hundreds of bills introduced so far in the 2025 legislative session.

On Tuesday, for instance, the Senate Judiciary Committee took up Senate Bill 29, a measure that would extend indefinitely the ability of survivors of people who died as a result of medical malpractice to sue for "pain, During the COVID-19 pandemic, the Legislature provided a temporary window for such suits because the court system was in pandemic-induced turmoil.

Insurers and other opponents of the measure contend that it violates a 2022 compromise on the limits of malpractice damages, a deal that seemingly ended a 47-year-long political battle that began when Brown signed the Medical Injury Compensation Reform Act in 1975.

A half-century ago, doctors and other health care providers were also skirmishing over "scope of practice," the body of state law that defines in great detail which medical professionals can perform which procedures on which parts of the human body.

The hardest-fought battle pitted orthopedic surgeons against podiatrists over the legal right to perform ankle surgery, and it raged for years until the latter prevailed. Ever since, there have been similar conflicts too numerous to list, such as psychologists vs. psychiatrists over the right to prescribe drugs, optometrists vs. opticians over eye treatment — and even veterinarians vs. dog groomers over who could legally brush a dog's teeth.

The current version of this perennial turf battle is Assembly Bill 876, which would allow nurse anesthetists to provide their services more independently — the latest in a years-long string of legislative efforts by nurses to bolster the scope of their

practices. Soon after becoming governor, Brown pledged to reform workers' compensation, the system that

suffering, or disfigurement." provides income and medical care to those with work-related illnesses and injuries. That effort failed, but as one of the last acts of his first governorship, Brown signed a bill to increase payments to such workers by about \$3 billion a year, angering employers who must provide coverage.

That touched off a predictable cycle in which a majority of the workers' compensation interest groups would work out some sort of systemic overhaul once each decade and get it enacted over objections of groups left out of the negotiations.

The last such instance occurred in 2012 when Brown, once again governor, negotiated and signed legislation to raise benefits again, but impose new rules on eligibility and medical care to save enough money to pay for the benefits.

The Capitol is overdue for another workers' compensation deal and a newly introduced measure. Senate Bill 555, could be the vehicle. It would increase benefits to workers with partial but permanent disabilities, which have been capped at \$1,256 a month for the last decade.

The bill would provide automatic cost of living increases and is certain to draw fire from employers — another chapter in what has been one of the Capitol's longest running high-dollar conflicts.

Two days later, Ferreros rallied for another singles victory at the top spot in the lineup, outlasting Idaho State's Asem Shoybek, 3-6, 6-2, 6-2, en route to a 5-2 team victory over the Bengals.

Ferreros' two singles triumphs extended her winning streak to six straight matches and improved her to 10-4 overall at the top spot in the lineup this year, the most wins in the Big Sky at that position.

As a team, the Hornets have a 15-2 overall record and a 5-0 mark in Big Sky play, having won their last eight straight matches. ★
