SACRAMENTO REGION, CA (MPG)

- When Cathy Cook points out bullet holes in an A-10 fuselage at the California Aerospace Museum, she could be forgiven a shudder. As an aircraft commander during the Gulf Wars, she refueled these aircraft at 18,000 feet as they flew to enemy targets in Iraq.

During her 11-year Air Force career, Cook took the heat. Commanding the K C-135 air-refueling tanker, Cook dealt daily with Air Force, Navy and Marine and NATO pilots. Cook's missions included war zone deployments and duties in Europe.

"I've proven my skills in a career of decision-making and

troubleshooting," said the 67 year old. "Flying captain for the Air Force required great tack and diplomacy. Especially for a woman. I've applied everything I've learned to everything I've ever done."

Now retired from decades as a Delta Airlines pilot, Cook is a lead-by-example mentor for young visitors seeking STEM (Science, Technology, Engineering and Math) education at the Aerospace Museum.

"What I'm doing now is more important than anything I've done before," Cook said. "I'm helping to shape the future of our country. Young people I talk to are the next generation of engineers, pilots, astronauts and technicians. It won't be a big deal for women to fill these jobs. They'll

Council Delays Decision on Mills Crossing Amid Community Concerns

RANCHO CORDOVA, CA (MPG)

- The Rancho Cordova City Council voted unanimously April 21 to delay a decision on the proposed Mills Crossing development, after a packed meeting filled with public comments raised significant concerns over parking, public safety and the role of a planned wellness center.

The project, proposed for 10153 Folsom Blvd., seeks to rezone the existing Residential Mixed-Use designation to High Density Residential, Medium Density Residential and Commercial Mixed-Use. The plan includes three mixed-use buildings that would feature office space, community flex rooms, health services, an event space and a flexible-use theater. Public open space, surface parking and community amenities are also part of the design.

Councilmembers agreed with City Manager Micah Runner's recommendation to "continue the item to a later date" due to lingering questions about operations and funding.

Residents voiced concerns ranging from infrastructure planning to the potential presence of drug rehabilitation services at the proposed wellness

"We have a couple concerns about the project," said Rancho Cordova resident Anita Cashette. "I don't know what people are going to do for facilities when they have big events on the green and before you get too far into this planning, I hope you talk about infrastructure. Where are the sewer lines, the water lines? This is a major consideration if you want to have successful events."

Melanie Freer, a Rancho Cordova Concert Band member, questioned the proposed arts venue's viability.

"They spoke of this project as being a catalyst for the arts," Freer said. "But it would be really difficult for us to use this space. The math doesn't add up on parking and there are major safety concerns."

Freer also raised alarm over the wellness center.

"It has come to light that this wellness center is actually incorporating a drug rehab component," she said. "As a nurse, I understand the need but I wouldn't want to bring my audience or band members to this building."

be naturally accepted.

That was not always the case. Tall, slender and long-legged, Cook stood out like a 1980s career Barbie when sauntering through airports in her Delta uniform.

"I got head-turns," she recalled. "It was so unusual to see a woman pilot back then. A captain friend was uncomfortable walking next to me. He didn't like the attention. When we said goodbye to people getting off our flights, women would nudge their husbands and say, 'See, honey, we had a woman pilot.' Moms would tell their daughters they could grow up to be like me."

Even now, in vintage flight suit, Cook is a magnet for youngsters. Her gender, uniform, rank, even the memorable "Captain Cook" moniker, have made her a force of inspiration for much of her life. When her late husband (Colonel Frasier Fortner) ran Junior ROTC programs at Highlands High School, his pilot wife was an unpaid

"He'd have me talk to his classes about careers in the Air Force and how my military time led to a Delta Airlines career," Cook said. "I told them when I first entered the Air Force, hardly any other women were flying. Even as a Lieutenant, I was invited to talk at schools and air shows. I always felt it was part of my job to expand people's ideas and to show girls and women that the glass ceiling was broken. You never know how you might spark someone's interest in a way that changes their life."

A mother of two sons, Cook has captained her Carmichael neighborhood's resident association for more than 10 years. In 2019, she unsuccessfully ran for District 7 Assembly. Following the election, Cook was sought by California Aerospace Museum directors.

"They told me they wanted to focus on STEM education," Cook said. "That really was up my alley. We had no hands-on museums when I was growing up. There weren't female role models in aviation, except perhaps for Amelia Erhardt and things didn't end well for her. So the museum's emphasis on science and technological learning was something I happily embraced."

The volunteer job includes board meetings and youth mentorship at the North Highlands facility.

"I'm in my element," Cook said. "My career has been a privilege. I want to show young people, especially girls, that they could have opportunities like mine. If I can inspire them to work hard and persevere, they can take their dreams as far as they want. The sky's no longer the limit; outer space is accessible. And it's not just for pilots and astronauts; there are so many exciting opportunities. So many smart, adventurous people will be needed for the future of aviation."

RANCHO CORDOVA, CA (MPG) - Spring is well under way, and so are these upcoming improvements in Rancho Cordova. Check out the latest from the Rancho Cordova Public Works team.

Grant Line Road Improvements

The city is currently improving a section of Grant Line Road between Raymer Way and White Rock Road. Improvements will include new LED curve-warning signs, rumble strips, widened shoulders and a high-friction surface treatment. The Preserve residential development will also be installing new storm drain facilities and roadway, and a new

As part of project construction, through next week, there will be lane reductions and traffic control will be on site. Please plan for additional travel time and drive the area with caution.

Chase Drive and American River **Parkway Connection**

Phase two of the Chase Drive and American River Parkway Connection is underway. Project improvements will include a separated pathway, pedestrian scale lighting, new ADA-compliant curb ramps, high-visibility crosswalks, trees and landscaping. The pathway will be installed along Mills Middle School and Cordova High School frontages on Chase Drive. Within Hagan Park, the pathway will connect to the American River Parkway bike trail. This project is currently under construction and is anticipated to be complete by this summer.

Sunrise Boulevard Rehabilitation

This project will rehabilitate Sunrise Boulevard from White Rock Road to Douglas Road by overlaying the existing pavement, improving median, curb and landscaping, and installing ADAcompliant curb ramps. This project will also include drainage upgrades on Mechanical Drive and Recycle Road to improve flood protection on Sunrise Boulevard. Completion of this project will result in improved road surfaces, improved pedestrian safety, improved flood protection and enhanced aesthetics

Ryla's Law to Hold Child **Abusers Accountable**

Office of Assemblyman Josh Hoover News Release

SACRAMENTO REGION, CA (MPG) - On April 8, the Assembly Public Safety Committee approved Ryla's Law (Assembly Bill 1011) authored by Assemblymember Josh Hoover (R-Folsom) to limit early release for those convicted of child abuse that results in the death of the child.

Ryla's Law was named after a child in Rancho Cordova who lost her life at the hands of a daycare worker in 2019. The law passed with strong bipartisan

"It's unreasonable that child abuse, even if it results in death, is classified as a non-violent crime in California where the abuser serves minimal time behind bars. Ryla's Law is a commonsense bill that ensures child abusers face appropriate consequences for killing a child," Assemblyman Hoover said. "It's refreshing that the Public Safety Committee has chosen to prioritize victims over criminals. Our number one job as lawmakers should be protecting our children from harm."

Under current law, physical child abuse and/or endangering the health of a child is considered a "non-violent" offense and therefore criminals are eligible for early

Further, even in circumstances where child abuse results in the death of a child. the crime is still considered non-violent whereby the offender qualifies for conservation/fire camp.

Fire camps are California's most generous credit awarding formula where offenders receive two-thirds or more off their total sentence. This bill would make this offense ineligible for those credits.

"This bill is a win for all children who have come and gone before us and holds deadly child abusers accountable," said Ryan Strange, Ryla's father.

Ryla's abuser was sentenced to 10 years in prison. But because child abuse is considered a "non-violent" crime, the daycare worker qualified to serve in a conservation camp and was released after being incarcerated for only two years and eight months for the crime of killing a child.

Josh Hoover represents Assembly District 7, which includes the cities of Citrus Heights, Folsom and Rancho Cordova and the unincorporated communities of Carmichael, Fair Oaks, Foothill Farms, Gold River, Mather, McClellan Park, North Highlands, Orangevale and Rosemont.

her sentiments.

James Garcia stated, "Having a drug clinic? That's not going to draw people in."

Another resident, Jim Garcia, called for the arts center portion to be relocated, citing a mismatch between the city's vision of a "family-friendly regional jewel" and the proposed services.

Resident Helen Whalen Beshaw was blunt in her criticism: "This is a white elephant. I don't see any data that proves this project is actually needed in the area."

Jeff Good, the Swinerton vice-president division manager, defended the project.

"This is much more than just a construction project," Good said. "The number of calls I've gotten about when we're starting work in our hometown is countless. This project is uniquely positioned to benefit small and diverse business contractors."

While all councilmembers agreed to postpone the vote, their opinions varied on the project's viability.

Councilmember Linda Budge praised the inclusion of public art but voiced concerns about the wellness center.

"We want to make sure that our own performing artists have hospitable space. In terms of landscaping, we need to make sure its kids-friendly and not a bunch of pokey plants. This can be a part of the offerings we have for the entire city as long as it's designed correctly" Budge said.

Vice-Mayor Garrett Gatewood took issue

with the parking situation. "I don't like doing this project without parking," Gatewood said. "I don't see how

this place can be functional without some sort of parking structure."

There are the times in the life of an NBA city, when sadness becomes an almost overwhelming reality. For some it is a different emotion because as fans we come in all shapes and sizes. But for those of you that are simply angry, let me say to you that life is too short, and if anything, this franchise needs your positive energy more than your anger.

The person responsible for giving away Davion Mitchell and then trading away the heart of the franchise in DeAaron Fox, has been given his walking papers, and many would say rightfully so.

Yes, the Sacramento Kings have a new general manager, and his name is Scott Perry. Unlike his two predecessors, Perry comes to the Kings with a resume of experience.

Sacramento is not new to Scott Perry, as he spent a short stint as the Kings vice president of basketball operations in 2017. After only three months in the head office, Perry was hired by the New York Knicks as their general manager.

Social Security Matters

When Should My Wife Claim Social Security?

Dear Rusty: My wife was born in July 1959, and her recent SS benefit estimate is \$3,337 at her full retirement age, or \$4,397 at age 70. She is presently employed fulltime and intends to continue working until she is aged 70. She is wondering when the most financially advantageous time would be to draw her SS retirement. Signed: Planning Ahead

Dear Planning Ahead: Obviously, the best time for your wife to get the highest possible monthly Social Security benefit would be age 70. Provided your wife's life expectancy is at least average (about age 87 for a woman her current age), she will likely receive the most in cumulative lifetime Social Security benefits by waiting until age 70 to claim.

For clarity, if your wife were to choose to claim before her full retirement age (FRA), her monthly amount would be less and she would be subject to Social Security's Annual Earnings Test (AET), which limits how much she can earn before her FRA. If the AET is exceeded, SS will take away \$1 for every \$2 her earnings are over the limit (they take away by

withholding future benefits until the penalty is satisfied). The AET (\$23,400 for 2025 but changes yearly) is in effect until your wife reaches her full retirement age of 66 years and 10 months, after which she can earn as must as she likes without penalty. Since she plans to work full time until age 70, your wife should likely not claim Social Security before her FRA. As mentioned, claiming at age 70 is probably a more prudent financial option.

Since your wife expects to continue working, she should also know that her estimated benefit will likely increase assuming her more recent earnings are among the highest over her lifetime. Social Security will review current year earnings annually to see if her current earnings warrant a benefit increase (SS benefits are always based on the highest 35 years of work earnings, and that includes earnings even after SS benefit are started). Also, the estimates provided by SS do not include Cost of Living Adjustments (COLA) which typically occur annually. FYI, the average annual COLA increase over the past two decades has been


about 2.5%. Based on her estimated FRA benefit, it is also evident that your wife will not get additional benefits as your spouse. For that to occur, your benefit at your FRA would need to be more than twice your wife's FRA amount, which it likely is not. Thus, your wife should make her claiming decision based

only on her own benefit opportunity, considering her personal financial needs and her life expectancy.

FYI, your wife's "breakeven age" - the age at which she will have collected the same amount of SS money by claiming at age 70 vs. claiming at her full retirement age (FRA), is about 82 years of age. Thus, assuming her life expectancy is more than 82, it would be prudent to wait until age 70 to claim Social Security.

In the end, the "best" time to claim Social Security depends on a few factors - most notably, life expectancy, and financial need. If the SS money isn't urgently needed now, and your wife's life expectancy is at least "average," then it appears from what you've shared that her best choice would be to wait until age 70 to claim Social Security. If life circumstances change over the years, your wife can take comfort knowing that she can also claim her Social Security at any time before age 70 and she will get benefits right up to the month she claims. Note that by waiting until after her FRA to claim, she will earn **Delayed Retirement Credits** (DRCs) of .667% more benefit for each month of delay (about 8% more for each

Salmon Fishing Shutdown Marks a Grim Milestone

This week, a public federal process determined there will be no commercial salmon fishing off California's coast for the third year in a row. It's a grim milestone for our state.

While we will see some recreational ocean fishing, we're at the low-water mark. With so few fish available, we know this won't be enough to meet the demand of our state. That's hard news in hard times.

Thirty years ago, the idea we would be implementing, yet alone discussing, these restrictions would have been unthinkable. Back then, millions of salmon swam through the rivers of California every year. It was a bountiful, thriving species.

But last year, the number of adult salmon in the Sacramento Index, a critical measure of the Sacramento River salmon population and an indicator of the overall health of California's salmon, shrank to roughly 100,000 fish. It's a tiny fraction of salmon's former might.

The reasons for the decline are numerous and complicated. Decades of severe drought, climate disruption, water management challenges and habitat loss threaten the future of salmon in California. The loss of salmon would wound California deeply.

Salmon are the basis of a multibillion-dollar fishing economy that creates jobs across the state. They support thriving forests, rivers and floodplains and serve as one of the most popular seafood choices across the country. Salmon provide vital subsistence to numerous California tribes. Recreational salmon fishing trips form the basis of family legend and lore.

For the salmon lovers among us, these are dark times. But I see glimmers of hope.

Two weeks ago, the California Department of Fish and Wildlife revealed the progress on California's "Salmon Strategy for a Hotter, Drier Future." It was an update on the strategy Gov. Gavin

Newsom released last year, which outlined dozens of key action items the state must take to better support healthy salmon In the last year alone, state fish and wildlife and its partner agencies have

made critical headway on nearly 70% of the action items set by Governor Gavin Newsom. Another 26% are already done.

California finished removing the

outdated and obsolete Klamath River dams, allowing for a free-flowing river and access to cold-water habitats blocked for

more than a century. California's initiative to fast-track approvals for salmon restoration projects led to the streamlining of more than 60 important projects to support salmon pop-

ulations over the past year. Fish and wildlife has also worked with the State Water Resources Control Board to develop flow recommendations in drought-prone watersheds like the Scott and Shasta rivers and Mill and Deer creeks. This ensures salmon populations have enough cold water to survive during

Investments to expand and modernize the state's fish hatcheries, ensuring California is supporting the production of a resilient salmon population, have increased fall run production from state-operated hatcheries in the Central Valley by over 9.7 million fish.

dry periods.

The state's salmon strategy was designed for long-term salmon support. But we're already seeing early benefits, some that even surprised fish and wildlife officials. Ten days after the final Klamath dam came down, state scientists spotted salmon swimming north of the dam sites into Oregon.

Experts originally estimated that would take 10 years.

Data shows that, while salmon numbers from 2024 are down, California saw the highest number of jacks (2-year-old fish) returning to the Central Valley since 2019. Jacks are an important predictor of the number of adult salmon that will return to spawn the following year.

In Lagunitas Creek, there's been a 60% increase in spawning of endangered Coho salmon. In Mendocino County, adult coho salmon returns have almost quadrupled their 15-year average.

To be clear, these wins are just the beginning. The road to reviving California salmon will be long. But these successes give me hope and the drive to keep fighting for salmon.



Roger's Review

By State Senator Roger Niello



Hi everyone, I'm Senator Roger Niello, your guide to the twists and turns of California's legislative landscape. I am honored to represent Senate District 6, which includes portions of Sacramento and Placer Counties.

Welcome to my new monthly column, Roger's Review. Here, I will shine a spotlight on policies that impact our lives and highlight the amazing news that's happening in our community.

Now, let's talk about the state budget. This year, the state budget is going to be difficult to balance, and legislators will have to make tough choices to avoid fiscal challenges like deficits in the future.

As the vice-chair of the Senate Budget and Fiscal Review Committee, I sent a letter to the budget committee chair to address some of the priorities, and here are some of the issues I included in the letter to get California back on track. The full letter can be found on my website at sen.ca.gov/niello.

The rising homelessness issue in our communities is a big concern. Wellfunded mental health and substance abuse services will result in meaningful and positive outcome that leads some of the homeless population to self-sufficiency. With nearly 70% of voters in support, Proposition 36 is not just popular but also good policy. My fellow legislators and the governor must fully fund the needs of Proposition 36 and give law enforcement and local governments the resources to improve public safety in our communities.

Many of us know someone who was impacted or lost their home and much more in the tragic wildfires in Southern California earlier this year. California needs to invest more in fire prevention through vegetation and forest management. After decades of neglect, the state of California began to improve on fire prevention in recent years, but even in the surplus years of 2021 to 2022 and 2022 to 2023, most of the fire prevention funds were short-term in nature. My request seeks funding toward fire prevention efforts, including forest and vegetation management.

High school seniors who are preparing to attend college after graduation may be impacted by the governor's plan to cut from the University of California and California State University systems and nearly \$400 million from Middle Class Scholarships. The legislature must reject this plan and make sure our schools focus on supporting California students. Our local business owners are being

crushed by unemployment insurance debt left over from the pandemic shutdowns. Despite a \$98 billion surplus in 2022 to 2023, the state failed to retire its unemployment debt unlike 48 other states. Creating a payment plan to eliminate the debt over time would save interest costs and help Californians by enabling job creators to boost employment.

The governor's May revision announcement will happen in May, and I will be paying close attention to see if the administration's priorities reflect those of all Californians.

FAIR OAKS, CA (MPG) - The U.S. Army Corps of Engineers (USACE), in cooperation with the Central Valley Flood Protection Board, is proposing to remove more than 600 trees and acres of riparian vegetation along the Wild and Scenic American River. This includes potentially dozens of heritage oak trees, some older than the country itself, as part of an erosion control effort.

Driving over the H Street bridge in the past few years, one can see how the landscape has changed. The same fate is in store for large stretches of the north side of the American River Parkway from Howe Avenue to Watt Avenue, and on the south side from east Watt Avenue to Larchmont Community Park.

The American River Parkway was established in 1959. It is the only state and federally designated Wild and Scenic River flowing through an urban area. Often referred to as "the jewel" of the Sacramento region, it attracts more than 8 million visits a year and generates over \$365 million for our local economy. American River Trees (ART) is a grass-

root, volunteer advocacy group working to preserve the American River Parkway

trees and its wildlife habitat corridor. American River Trees asks the U.S. Army Corps of Engineers to "pause, engage the community and develop alternative designs" for a better, more focused, appropriate method of preventing erosion on this beautiful stretch of natural paradise. This is in keeping with the American River Management Plan and the Lower American River Conservancy program to protect and restore the natural resources of this river.

The U.S. Army Corps of Engineers will issue its final environmental report, including responses to public comments, this spring. Vegetation clearing could begin as early as fall. The reports and related information are available on the U.S. Army Corps of Engineers website at spk. usace.army.mil/Missions/Civil-Works/ Sacramento-Levee-Upgrades/.







John F. Kennedy Assassination Files Revealed 'A State Within a State'

The vast importance of the John F. Kennedy (JFK) Assassination Files, hidden from the public for 62 years through multiple congressional hearings over the years, just released by President Donald Trump under enormous opposition to its release, was not who killed John F. Kennedy, but that the entity who did still exists.

The Central Intelligence Agency (CIA) has always been the prime suspect. I was a boy of 16 and heard this at the time. This notion that it was more than just Oswald was quickly smothered by the then Deep State media who preferred and promoted the lone-wolf narrative, but it never felt right nor was it ever fully accepted by most Americans. The Federal Bureau of Investigation "suddenly uncovered" 2,000 John F. Kennedy related files, these reveal the Central Intelligence Agency as a "state within a state" and most responsible for the assassination.

These files prove the existence

of the Deep State in 1963 powerful enough by then, over years of development and secrecy, to kill the president of the United States and keep that fact from being revealed until all responsible for the death were unpunished and safely dead. Yes, the documents first tried to blame the assassination on Cuba and the Soviets. We, among others debunked this story. There were three reasons Kennedy was assassinated:

He opposed the CIA's Bay of Pigs invasion of Cuba.

He wanted America's withdrawal from the Vietnam War

He opposed the Federal Reserve's Central Bank currency control authorizing the printing of silver certificates in defiance of it (Why the Deep State Assassination of John F. Kennedy? LibertyUnderFire. com, Dec 6, 2023).

Opposition to these three issues could not be tolerated. Kennedy could not be controlled by them so they could not wait another year for a new election to remove him.

The "new" files confirm that Lee Harvey Oswald was in fact a Central Intelligence Agency asset, "recruited by the CIA in JAPAN while he was in the service at the Naval Air Facility Atsugi in the late 1950's." The Naval Air Facility Atsugi (NAFA) was "a known CIA hub for covert operations, including U2 spy plane missions from 1957 to 1958" as per a suppressed document from his commander at the base at the time.

Documents show that "as late as 1996 this story was almost broke by 'a credible UPI reporter' and had to be covered up 30 years after the assassination."

The "CIA was deeply concerned about the story getting traction." They rightly realized it could be viewed "as a smoking gun." They allowed just enough information out "to appear transparent while withholding the most damning evidence that Oswald was recruited, trained, and groomed by the CIA during his time in Japan."

We soon learned of Oswald's defection to the Soviet Union in 1959, his return to the U.S. in 1962, and his eventual role in the assassination in 1963. This was common knowledge soon after the assassination.

President Kennedy was warned of the presence of a "state within a state" or the Deep State as we call it today. Presidential adviser Arthur Schlesinger, in a 15-page Memo to John F. Kennedy called for Kennedy to break up the CIA

"Schlesinger called the CIA a rogue 'state within a state'... his memo told the president 'The contemporary CIA possesses many of the characteristics of 'a state within a state' adding 'there is no doctrine governing our conduct of clandestine operations." Schlesinger noted that, "A

number of governments still in power know that they have been targets of CIA attempts at overthrow, not a state of mind calculated to stimulate friendly feelings" toward the US. He also wrote, "CIA operations have not been held effectively subordinate to US foreign policy," He told the president, "In practice the State Department had become a 'rubber stamp' for CIA clandestine operations.'

A month after John F. Kennedy's assassination, former President Harry Truman, "echoed Schlesinger's fears outlined in the 1961 Memo. There is something about the way the CIA has been functioning that is casting a shadow over our historic position."

Truman wrote, that "he set up the CIA to streamline information gathering... but between his presidency, and John F. Kennedy's, Truman witnessed a change in the CIA." He wrote of this, "For some time, I have been

disturbed by the way the CIA has been diverted from its original assignment. It has become operational and at times a policymaking arm of the government. I never had any thought that when I set up the CIA that it would be injected into peacetime cloak and dagger operation." Truman "called for the termination of the CIA operation duties, and the restoration of the agency to its original assignment as the intelligence arm of the president" (X22 Report, Ep. 3599b, 03/19/2025, 11:59).

Instead of destroying the Central Intelligence Agency as Kennedy intended the Central Intelligence Agency destroyed him, and worse, came to control the organization Kennedy created, the United States Agency for International Development (USAID) responsible for administering civilian foreign aid and development Assistance throughout the world.

The "rogue state within a state" came to fund shadow governments and regime change in the world, even in Ukraine in 2014 and the United States in 2020 and thus far got away with it. Most importantly the "rogue state within a state" was never identified, removed or punished and thus is still very much alive today fighting Trump.

How Transfer Taxes Steal Your Home Equity

As a homeowner, you dutifully pay your property taxes every year, no matter how painful. Notwithstanding Proposition 13's tax limitations, California is not a low property tax state. According to the Tax Foundation, we rank 18th out of 50 states in per capita property tax collections.

But it could be worse. Much worse. Without Prop. 13, most homeowners would see their property taxed at least double or, in some cases, by a factor of five or six. (For those curious about how much they would pay without Prop. 13, try out Howard Jarvis Taxpayers Association's calculator at GuessingGame.org.) Prop. 13 works by limiting

the property tax rate to one percent and then limiting the increases in "taxable value" to two percent per year. It is the latter provision that allows homeowners in California to build up equity in their homes, year after year, without being forced to sell because of an annual tax bill based on current market value. But there is another type of

property tax that lies in wait for homeowners when they sell their property, transfer taxes. Technically, transfer taxes are not property taxes in the traditional sense because they are not imposed

as an incident of property ownership.

Rather, they are imposed on the sale or other transfer of real property.

When Howard Jarvis wrote Prop. 13, he knew that, if he just limited the ad valorem (based on value) property tax, governments would circumvent that limitation by quickly imposing other local taxes. That's why Prop. 13 expressly prohibited taxes on the sale of property. Here's the language: "Cities, Counties and special districts, by a two-thirds vote of the qualified electors of such district, may impose special taxes on such district, except ad valorem taxes on real property or a transaction tax or sales tax on the sale of real property within such City, County or special district." (emphasis added).

To any normal, fair-minded person, this constitutional language is crystal clear in prohibiting transfer taxes. But the judiciary in California is neither normal nor fairminded. Over a strong dissent, the California Supreme Court defined "special taxes" as only those taxes that were for a "special purpose." This created a massive loophole and severely in a way that limited the reach of Prop. 13.

At the time of Proposition 13's passage in 1978, state law permitted the collection of a "documentary stamp tax" on transferring of interests in real property. The tax, still imposed in many jurisdictions, is relatively modest, with the standard rate being \$1.10 per \$1,000 of value. But now many cities are

imposing real estate transfer taxes in excess of \$45 per \$1,000 of value based on the Home Rule doctrine that grants charter cities more taxing authority. Moreover, under Home Rule, cities can impose higher rates for more valuable property rather than the flat rate of \$1.10 per

Even worse, because of the infamous Upland decision, local governments operating behind the front of "citizen groups" can propose "special taxes" by initiative, evading the requirement of a two-thirds vote of the electorate to pass. And while the courts originally said transfer tax revenue must go into a municipality's general fund, special taxes under Upland can be exclusively directed to whatever the local government or special interest group,

The worst abuse of Upland occurred in Los Angeles. Pursuant, to Measure United to House Los Angeles (ULA) which became effective in 2023, high-value properties are now subject to very high transfer taxes. Although the ballot measure was sold to the voters as a "mansion tax," it applies to all properties, both commercial and residential, worth more than \$5 million, including apartments.

As expected, the United to House Los Angeles tax is generating a lot less revenue for homeless programs than the proponents thought. Instead, it has thrown the real estate market in one of America's largest cities into chaos. It has gotten so bad that even Mayor Karen Bass said she thinks the whole issue of Measure United to House Los Angeles should be revisited. For ordinary homeowners,

be aware that transfer taxes are only increasing, both in terms of the amount of the tax and the purposes for which they are being collected. There are very powerful progressive interests which intend to impose transfer taxes at a level to completely "recover" all the taxes that were not owed by homeowners because of Prop. 13.

And that's how they plan to steal the equity in your home. Jon Coupal is president of the Howard Jarvis Taxpayers Association. ★

In fact, this legislation could lead to nearly tripling the number of children who have the option of attending a charter school. Parents know what is best for their children, and by providing parents with options, we can improve educational outcomes across our country," said

Representative Tenney. "As a former high school teacher, I understand the important role education plays in our children's future and the importance of charter school options. The High-Quality Charter Schools Act is a critical measure to expand educational opportunity, uphold rigorous accountability, and foster innovation within our public school system. game crowd of more than 7,000 fans, the Sacramento State football team completed its offseason practice with the annual Spring Game at Hornet Stadium on April 12.

In a controlled setting, the offense accumulated over 500 vards and scored 10 touchdowns while the defense intercepted a pass and forced five tackles-forloss, including three sacks.

"Sacramento is a football town and we're going continue to make sure we have a great fan experience to bring fans here and give them a great product on the field to be proud of," Sacramento State head coach Brennan Marion said. "I just told the players that's it's really about their work and commitment to the program that's got excitement going and the buzz and the energy. None of this happens without the players' hard work and what they've done. I'm just very grateful to everybody in Sacramento who showed up and supported us." The scrimmage began with

the offense starting at their own 25-yard line. After allowing the offense to convert a third-and-2 for a first down, the defense responded with a third-down sack from Xavier Williams to end the drive.

The next series saw Cardell Williams lead the offense on an 11-play drive which was capped by a 1-yard rush of his own for the game's first touchdown. The two big plays in that series were an 18-yard rush from Michael Johnson and an 11-yard scamper from Williams. The defense again had a response as Javland McGlothen sacks Williams on the final play of the first quarter.

The second quarter placed the ball at the defense's 40-yard line, but the defense struck first when Koa Akui intercepted Carson

Conklin along the sideline for the only turnover of the game. Williams started his next series with a 40-yard toss to tight end Logan Tanner deep across the middle of the field for a touchdown.

After halftime, the offense was hard to slow down. Rodney Hammond caught a 27-yard touchdown pass from Conklin on the opening drive and Damian Henderson II found the end zone on a 4-yard rush on the second offensive series.

The defense then produced backto-back stops with an incompletion on third-and-10 and later a sack by Hunter Boeddeker on third-and-5.

Santino Chavez made his debut on the following series and completed all five of his pass attempts for a total of 40 yards. Chavez capped the series with a 4-yard fade to Tommy Poe for a score.

With ball starting at the defense's 25-yard line, Jamar Curtis tallied rushes of four, eight and 13 yards to score an offensive touchdown. The defense then got a stop and saw the offense miss a 41-yard field goal attempt to keep the team off the board. Conklin responded with a 23-yard run of his own and the drive was sealed with a 2-yard plunge from Hammond.

The offense continued to pile on points as Williams had a 24-yard completion to Ajon Bryant to set up a 1-yard quarterback sneak for a score. Conklin added a 4-yard touchdown pass to Sammy Norris and Hammond had a 1-yard plunge for his second score.

The quarterback trio of Conklin, Williams and Chavez completed 22-of-37 passes with four touchdowns and an interception. The completions were spread between 14 players with Onterrio Smith, Jr., leading the way with four receptions for 42 yards. Ten players had carries with Williams rushing for 99 yards and two scores and Curtis compiling

"I was proud of all three (quarterbacks) to just put it put it together today and go out there and give us a chance to go down the field and score," Marion said. "Today was just our base generic offense. I always say that's what you're going to know, when the game's on the line, that's what you're going to depend on, and I was proud of how the guys operated it."

Defensively, Brodie Tagaloa, Xavier Williams and McGlothen each had sacks while Jalen Williams, Diego Davis and DeSean Watts combined for two tackle-for-losses.

"The guys flew around and made big plays," Marion said. "The first team defense shut out the one offense in the beginning and really got after it and I was proud of how they competed and how physical they were. We've got to continue to shore some things in the back end, but I like the way that the front seven is playing right now."

Sacramento State will start its season on Aug. 30 at South Dakota State. The team's first home game will come on Sept. 13 against Mercyhurst.

California is home to 109 federally recognized tribes, the most in the contiguous United States, and has the largest Native American population in the nation, accounting for over 12 percent of the total Native American population.

With over 26,000 American Indian K-12 students, California also has one of the largest American Indian student populations in the country. However, Native students face significant educational disparities, their college-going rate is about half that of their peers in other racial or ethnic groups, and only 42% graduate from college within

six years, compared to 64% of all students, according to the Post-Secondary National Policy Institute.

Native American K-12 stu-

dents also significantly trail their

peers in nearly every educational indicator. Nationally, American Indian and Alaska Native students experience a poverty rate 10 percent higher than the U.S. average, demonstrating the need for support through policy change, scholarships and more.

To be eligible for the Indigenous Future Leaders scholarship, applicants must be of Native American descent and a resident of the six-county Sacramento region. They must also be enrolled at an eligible high school or in a minimum of six units at a California Community College and intend to enroll in a four-year college or university, or a California Community College (minimum 12 units).

Applications must be submitted by 11:59 p.m. on Friday, May 2. A special committee of Republic FC representatives and Native American leaders including Chairman Jesus Tarango and Chief Operating Officer Chris

Franklin will select the grant
