CARMICHAEL, CA (MPG) - The Italian Cultural Society celebrated Mediterranean motors with a four- and two-wheeled festival last weekend.

A fleet of Vespa and Ducati motorcycles paraded rainbow colors at the Italian Cultural Center in Carmichael. Alpha Romeos lounged in splendor with Maseratis and Fiats. The center's second annual "Made in Italy Automotive Festival" brought hundreds of auto-fans to the center's parking lot.

"We love to bring our culture

to Carmichael," said the center's deputy director Vincenzo Cerruti. "Motorcycles are a cute novelty to Americans but in the streets of Italy, they're the default vehicle. They're absolutely everywhere."

The center sponsors folkloric dance troops, whose members hopped, skipped and hoofed on hot tar seal. Indoors, an exhibit honored "the Pride of Sacramento" Joe Petrali, the motorcycle champ who set a world speed record in 1937 at Daytona and won a record 49 national championships.

A mountain of pasta was washed down with Italian beer, wine and mineral water. Organizer Cerruti

ladled sausage sauce on rigatoni and called the event a "perfect blend of Italy's proudest products."

"Italian automobiles, music, dancing and great food: it all goes together like peanut butter and jelly," Cerruti declared. "Or perhaps I should say spaghetti and meatballs."

CARMICHAEL, CA (MPG) - Mira Loma High School students shared their talents, research and aspirations during the school's annual World Fair and Middle Years Program (MYP) Personal Project Exhibition. The event combined academic learning with global perspectives, giving students a space to explore real-world topics in creative ways.

Now in its 12th year, the World Fair is a key part of Mira Loma's International Baccalaureate (IB) Middle Years Program. Students conducted in-depth research on industries, traditions and innovations from around the world, creating interactive booths and performances to share their findings. Topics ranged from candy production and aviation to Japanese folklore and the film industry.

Rachel Volzer, a Mira Loma teacher and the World Fair event coordinator, explained that the project encourages students to apply global thinking to

"Students develop their own inquiry questions, conduct research and then present what they have learned in ways that engage their peers," Volzer said.

Alongside their academic work, students had opportunities to connect with one another and reflect on their interests, identities and goals.

The event encouraged students to celebrate culture while exploring new ideas that link classroom learning to real-life experiences.

Ahmad, an 11th-grader who recently moved from Afghanistan, said the event left a strong impression.

"In Afghanistan, school events like this were rare. Here, I saw booths that inspired me to think about my future. It was amazing," Ahmad said.

M o h a m m a d , a 10th-grader, found inspiration at the cinema booth.

"Seeing other students perform with confidence reminded me of my dream of acting. It gave me hope that I could do something like that in the future,"

Mohammad said.

Students behind the scenes also gained important experience. Ginger, a 10th-grader and a logistics team member, reflected on the challenges and rewards of group collaboration.

"We learned that when everyone shares ideas and works together, the project is stronger," Ginger said.

Through thoughtful projects and collaboration, students took the lead in shaping the event, leaving with new ideas, skills and experiences to build upon. ★

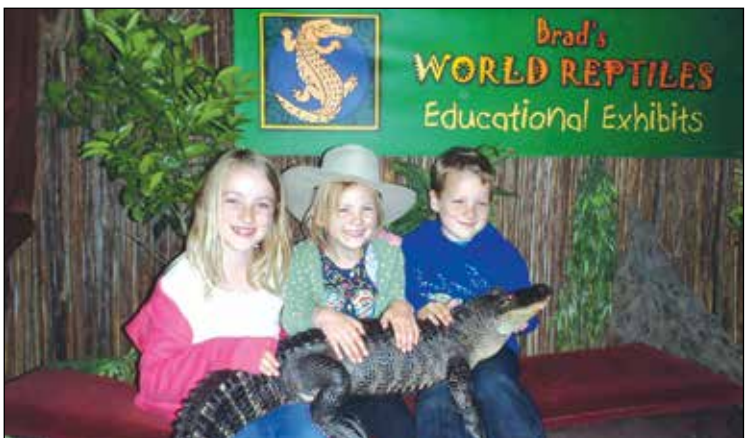

SACRAMENTO REGION, CA (MPG) - Almost 45 years after blast off, the Aerospace Museum of California two weeks ago celebrated 18 years as a self-supporting entity at the former McClellan Air Force Base.

Almost 80 supporters applauded \$500,000 in fundraising and the appointment a new emeritus board member. Aviation company founder Clay Lacy will chair the museum's 2025 board of emeritus trustees. The 92-year-old flight pioneer was presented with a crystal airplane trophy by one of the museum's youngest supporters, Caden Mara, 9.

A center of STEM (Science, Technology, Engineering and Math education), Aerospace Museum of California also awarded scholarships for aspiring pilots. Three young men each received \$12,500 toward acquiring

private pilot licenses. The future aviators will graduate from Sacramento-area high schools in the next few weeks. Last year's awardees, both female, are now professional pilots.

"These scholarships are life-changing," said Aerospace Museum of California advancement Vice-President Karen Jones. "We award them to young people who demonstrate outstanding passion for aviation."

Funds raised by the gala will boost Aerospace Museum of California's continuing STEM education

programs. Donations also sponsor traveling displays. The upcoming 'Snoopy and the Red Baron' exhibit, on loan from the Charles M Schulz Museum in Santa Rosa, does not cost peanuts. Acquisition of rare aviation artifacts is also enabled by supporter gifts.

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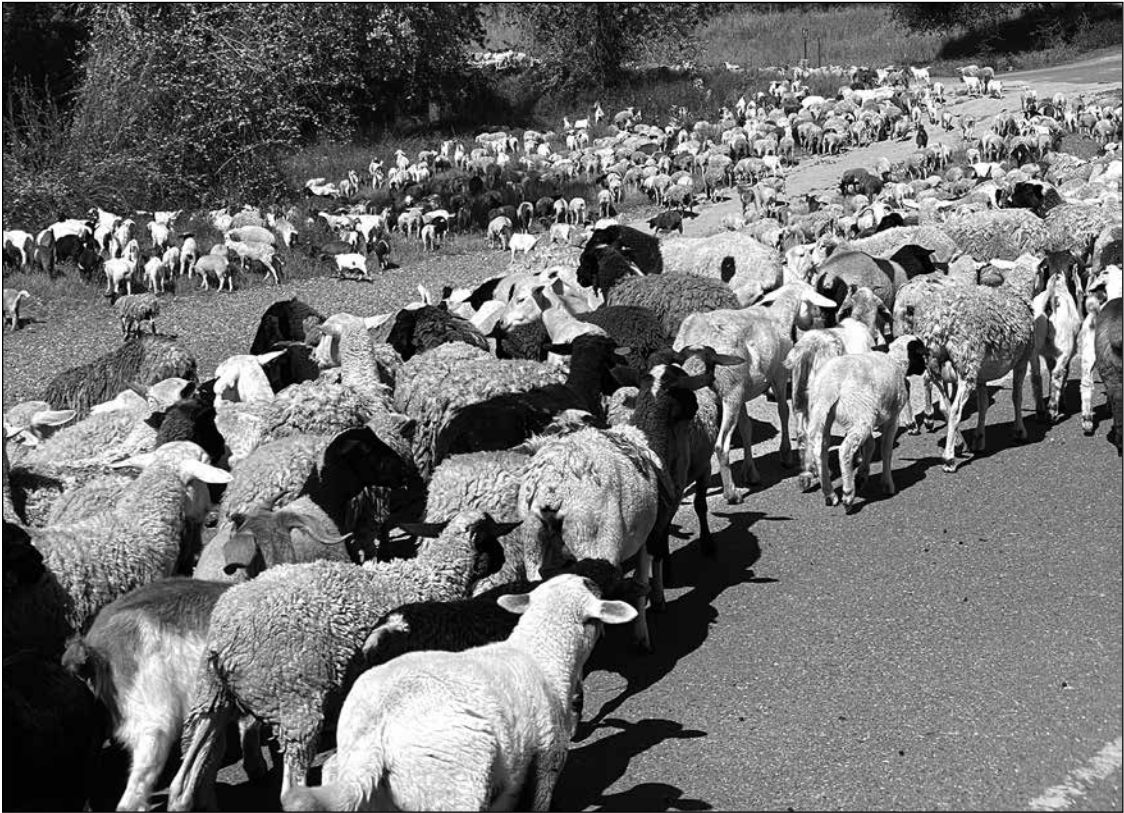
We’ve Got Ewe-nique Fire Fuel Reduction Techniques

SACRAMENTO COUNTY, CA (MPG) - Have you herd the good news? Our four-legged firefighters are here and they’re ready to bleat back wildfire risks! The Sacramento County Department of Regional Parks is ramping up its multi-faceted strategy to reduce wildfire risk, protect wildlife habitats, and safeguard both our natural resources and the neighborhoods that border our parks.

For its 2025 Fire Fuel Reduction Action Plan, the Department of Regional Parks has lined up sheep and goat grazing contracts, is utilizing park maintenance crews (and other manned crews through contracts with the California Conservation Corps and Sacramento Regional Conservation Corps) to maintain firebreaks and is issuing fuel reduction permits by request to property owners bordering Regional Park properties.

“Fire is an ever-present danger in our Regional Parks, and with another moderately wet winter and spring behind us, the risk will only grow as vegetation dries out,” said Liz Bellas, director of Regional Parks. “I’m incredibly proud of the proactive work our staff and partners are doing to stay ahead of these risks. From hand crews and firebreaks to grazing programs and community partnerships, we’re

doing everything we can to protect our parks and the people who live near them.”

To reduce the potential number and size of wildfires in the Sacramento County Regional Parks system, a variety of fire management techniques are being implemented. Firebreaks, a combination of mowing, soil discing and herbicides will be used where appropriate to create perimeters around open fields, along fence lines and behind

neighborhoods. This work is scheduled to be completed by the end of June.

Ladder Fuel Hand-Crews is another technique. In limited, hard-to-reach areas, hand crews will remove vegetation that could provide a path for a fire to spread upward into tree canopies, where it is much harder to control.

Grazing is also being employed as part of the vegetation management plan. There

are thousands of acres of natural landscapes in the Sacramento County Regional Parks system. Goats and sheep are ideal for vegetation management to help reduce herbaceous fuels over larger areas and in areas with difficult terrain that are difficult to maintain with manned crews. Grazing is expected to occur through the end of June and some areas might be grazed in the summer to manage late emerging yellow star-thistle.

Residents can participate in the fire management efforts through annual encroachment permits. Those who live adjacent to Regional Parks’ properties can apply for free annual encroachment permits to maintain a firebreak behind their property line. These permits allow residents to string-trim herbaceous vegetation up to 50 feet beyond their private property line. To request a permit, provide your name, address and contact information to Regional Parks at parksinfo@SacCounty.gov.

In addition to these proven fire-fuel reduction measures, our Ranger Division is continuing its education and enforcement campaign related to illegal fires and cooking along the parkway in an effort to reduce the number of new fire outbreaks.

Visitors to Sacramento County Regional Parks should be aware of the following regulations. Open-flame fires are not allowed and barbequing is only permitted in designated picnic areas. Smoking is only allowed in developed picnic areas, on asphalt surfaces, within golf courses and on levee tops along the American River Parkway.

SACRAMENTO REGION, CA (MPG) - Excitement is growing throughout the regional reading community about the May 31 inaugural Sacramento Book Festival presented by the California Writers Club-Sacramento Branch.

More than 130 local authors will tempt readers with their books for adults and children from 10 a.m. to 4 p.m. May 31 at the Shepard Garden and Arts Center adjacent to McKinley Park, 3330 McKinley Blvd., East Sacramento. Authors from every neighborhood in the Sacramento area will meet readers.

In addition, popular authors of mystery, thriller, romance, sci-fi/fantasy, historical fiction and Black women’s literature will participate in panel talks throughout the day.

The Kids Zone will host activities and readings with children’s authors.

The schedule and information about the attending authors, as well as on the festival’s other activities, can be found online at SacramentoBookFestival.com.

Festival volunteers briefly interviewed three attending authors to whet reader appetites: James Rollins, Sharon Johnson-Fujimoto and Catriona McPherson.

Rollins, the No. 1 New York Times best-selling author of international thrillers and high fantasy, has sold more than 20-million books.

One of the first authors on board with the festival, Rollins shared his enthusiasm about the event.

“While I’ve not ventured far from the Sacramento Valley, having only moved up to Tahoe, I look forward to returning to my roots. My veterinary practice was in the Greenhaven/Pocket area, so an event at McKinley Park is like coming home,” Rollins said. “At the festival, I’m glad to share how a local veterinarian became an author. And not just the author of one genre of fiction but of two: action thrillers and high fantasy. I still continue to write in both fields, with ‘Arkangel’ being my latest Sigma thriller and ‘A Dragon of Black Glass’ continuing a four-book fantasy series. Hopefully, I’ll also have further news about Sigma being picked up by Amazon MGM for a streaming series.”

Starting off the day in the Kids Zone will be children’s author Fujimoto-Johnson.

Fujimoto-Johnson is a Japanese American author-illustrator of two children’s picture books, “The Mochi Makers” and “Shell-Song: Based on a True Family Story.”

“The Mochi Makers” celebrates the joy of a girl and her grandmother spending the day making mochi together. “Shell-Song: Based on a True Family Story” also focuses on family and tradition by drawing on the experiences of the author’s grandfather.

“When I was a young girl, I inherited my grandfather’s seashell collection. He had collected these shells in a Japanese American incarceration camp in Hawaii during World War II. My grandfather’s shells carried his story across generations to me,” Fujimoto-Johnson said. “It is such an honor to share his story in my new book, ‘Shell-Song,’ the first children’s book to address the incarceration camps in Hawaii. Digitally collaged into the artwork for this book are my grandfather’s actual shells (and) texture from my grandmother’s wedding kimono.”

Sacramento gained one of its most well-known authors, McPherson, when she emigrated from Scotland.

"I write all over the mystery map: pre- and post-WWII detective fiction and modern psychological thrillers, all set in Scotland. It was a concern when I immigrated to California, let me tell you," McPherson said. “Turns out you lovely American readers have voracious appetites for both. Thank you, Masterpiece Theater, I reckon; between the period drama and the Nordic Noir, I fit right in. That said, I also write comic mysteries about a Scot who’s moved to a ‘fictional’ college town in NorCal (it’s Davis) and nothing makes me happier than sharing them with local readers who get all the references. I say it with love ... but I still say it."

McPherson will be part of the historical fiction panel and signing.

The 130-plus authors will be seated at tables, ready for visiting with readers of all ages and sharing their tales.

Food will be available from the Ju-Ju Burgers and ShakesFood Truck.

The Sacramento Book Festival’s host, the California Writers Club-Sacramento Branch, is celebrating its centennial year this year. Medicaid Program Ranks Tenth Worst for Mental Health Services

NORTHERN CALIFORNIA (MPG) - A new study on behalf of Addiction-Rep has identified which U.S. state Medicaid programs provide the best mental health care.

Medicaid is the single largest payer for mental health services in the United States, playing a critical role in ensuring access to care for millions of adults with mental illness and substance use disorders. An estimated 58.7-million U.S. adults, nearly one in four, live with a mental illness, according to national health data. Among this population, individuals enrolled in Medicaid are more likely to experience mental illness than those with private insurance, underscoring the program's central role in combatting America's mental health crisis.

While Medicaid is federally-funded, it is administered by individual states, each of which has broad discretion over how it structures, finances and delivers services. As a result, the availability and quality of behavioral health services can vary significantly from state to state. These differences are especially important now, as many states face financial pressures and potential budget cuts that could make it harder for people to access the care they need.

This analysis by Addiction-Rep, a consulting firm specializing in the behavioral health sector, draws on data from the Substance Abuse and Mental Health Services Administration (SAMHSA), Centers for Disease Control and Prevention (CDC) and Centers for Medicare and Medicaid Services (CMS). It examines how the prevalence of mental illness has changed over time, highlights its disproportionate

impact on low-income individuals and Medicaid enrollees, and ranks state Medicaid programs based on their performance across key behavioral health indicators.

The United States is facing a sustained mental health crisis, marked by a steady rise in the share of adults experiencing mental illness over the past decade. In 2015, about 17.9% of adults reported a mental illness, according to data from the Substance Abuse and Mental Health Services Administration. By 2023, that figure had climbed by more than a quarter to 22.8%.

Young adults between the ages of 18 and 25 have been disproportionately impacted. Their rate of mental illness rose from 21.7% in 2015 to a peak of 36.2% in 2022, before dipping slightly to 33.8% in 2023. Meanwhile, adults aged 26 and older saw more gradual increases, rising from 17.2% in 2015 to 21.1% in 2023.

Outside of age, income is also an important factor impacting the prevalence of mental illness. National health data from the Centers for Disease Control and Prevention shows that in 2023, nearly one in five adults living below the federal poverty line (19.4%) reported regularly feeling worried, nervous or anxious. That compares to 15.8% of those with incomes between 100% and 199% of the poverty line, and just 10.7% of adults with incomes at or above 200% of the poverty line.

As a result of these differences, Medicaid plays an outsized role in connecting Americans with mental illness to care. In 2023, 34.6% of adults enrolled in Medicaid experienced some form of mental illness, compared to 24% of uninsured adults and about 23.9% of those with private insurance, according to Substance Abuse and Mental Health

Services Administration data.

The gap is even more pronounced when looking specifically at serious mental illnesses, such as bipolar disorder, major depressive disorder and schizophrenia. Nearly one in 10 Medicaid enrollees (9.8%) reported having a serious mental illness in 2023, compared to 6.6% of uninsured adults and just 5.8% of adults with private insurance.

To assess how state Medicaid programs perform in delivering behavioral health care, researchers at Addiction-Rep developed a composite score, the Behavioral Health Performance Index. This index ranks states based on a range of quality measures grouped into four categories: initiation and engagement, evidence-based medication use, care continuity and follow-up, and patient experience.

The specific metrics within each category are detailed in the methodology section below but they include key indicators such as how often patients receive timely follow-up care after emergency department visits for mental illness, the rates at which individuals initiate and stay engaged in substance use disorder treatment, and the use of Food and Drug Administration-approved medications, like buprenorphine or methadone, for treating opioid use disorder, among others.

The top-performing states are heavily concentrated in the Northeast and parts of Appalachia. New Hampshire, Massachusetts and Vermont rank first, second and third respectively, each earning a Behavioral Health Performance Index score above 73. These states consistently performed well on metrics related to initiation, follow-up care and evidence-based

medication use, but scored lower on patient experience. West Virginia and Pennsylvania round out the top five, demonstrating stronger performance regarding patient experience, but scoring slightly lower in other categories.

By contrast, several large and populous states landed near the bottom of the rankings. California, Texas, Illinois and Georgia all appeared in the bottom ten, along with states such as Arkansas and Oklahoma. California stood out for its strong performance in the use of evidence-based medications and follow-up care after behavioral health episodes but it scored poorly on treatment initiation and patient experience, pulling down its overall ranking. Other lower-performing states tended to show more consistently weak results.

Here is a summary of the data for California: Behavioral Health Performance Index at 38.44; Initiation & Engagement at 1.10; Evidence-Based Medication Use at 72.88; Care Continuity & Follow-Up at 68.40; Patient Experience at 11.37.

This analysis evaluates how effectively state Medicaid programs serve adult patients with mental health and substance use needs, based on data from the Centers for Medicare and Medicaid Services (CMS) Medicaid and Children's Health Insurance Program (CHIP) Scorecard, Core Set Year 2023. To compare performance across states, Addiction-Rep developed a composite score called the Behavioral Health Performance Index. This index averages scores

across four key categories: initiation and engagement, evidence-based medication use, care continuity and follow-up and patient experience.

Each category consists of multiple metrics, most of which focus on adult behavioral health patients aged 18 to 64. However, patient experience measures apply to all adult Medicaid enrollees, as condition-specific experience data is not available. Only states with sufficient data across all four categories were included in the final rankings. However, states with partial data are still shown in visualizations and detailed tables for the metrics where data is available.

Below is a breakdown of the metrics included in the final index, organized by category, along with descriptions of each: Substance use disorder initiation (14 days); Share of new substance use disorder (SUD) treatment episodes where the patient began treatment within 14 days of diagnosis. Substance use disorder engagement (34 days); Share of new substance use disorder treatment episodes where the patient attended additional treatment within 34 days of starting care.

Evidence-based medication use included Opioid Use Disorder Pharmacotherapy; Share of adults with opioid use disorder (OUD) who received Food and Drug Administration-approved medication-based treatment options, such as buprenorphine or methadone. Antidepressant Acute Adherence (12 weeks); Share of adults with major depression who

remained on prescribed antidepressants during the initial 12-week treatment phase. Antidepressant Continuation Adherence (6 months); Share of adults with major depression who remained on prescribed antidepressants through a six-month treatment period. Antipsychotic Adherence; Share of adults with schizophrenia or schizoaffective disorder who remained on prescribed antipsychotic medications for at least 80% of their treatment duration.

Substance Use Disorder/Overdose Eating Disorder follow-up (7 days); Share of emergency department visits for substance use or drug overdose with a follow-up visit within seven days. Mental Health Eating Disorder Follow-Up (7 days); Share of emergency visits for mental illness or intentional self-harm with a follow-up visit within seven days. Mental Health Hospital Follow-Up (7 days); Share of adults discharged after hospitalization for mental illness or self-harm who had a follow-up visit within seven days.

The patient experience results included health care satisfaction (nine to ten rating); Share of adults who rated their overall health care experience as a nine or ten on a ten-point scale. Health Plan Satisfaction (nine to ten Rating); Share of adults who rated their Medicaid health plan as a nine or ten out of ten. Always got needed care; Share of adults who reported “always” getting the care they needed, based on a four-point response scale ranging from “never” to “always.” ★

Unlicensed Drivers Cause Shocking Number of Crashes

SACRAMENTO, CA (MPG) - A new study by auto accident attorneys Sutliff & Stout revealed that California had the seventh-highest rate of fatal crashes involving an unlicensed driver between 2019 and 2023.

The study analyzed 2019 to 2023 data from the National Highway Traffic Safety Administration's Fatality and Injury Reporting System Tool (FIRST) to find the proportion of fatal crashes that occurred in each state where the driver's license was “suspended,” “revoked,” “expired” “canceled,” “denied” or “not licensed.”

The average number of fatal crashes involving unlicensed drivers was calculated as a proportion of all fatal crashes during the five-year period.

California had the seventh-highest rate, at 17.53%, not too far behind Texas, which had the highest rate, at 20.14%.

“According to our analysis, a staggering 41,375 drivers were involved in fatal crashes between 2019 and 2023, who didn't hold a valid driving license,” said Hank Stout, co-founder of Sutliff & Stout. “Driving without a license is not only illegal but also extremely irresponsible. Unlicensed drivers are more likely to take risks, such as speeding or driving under the influence. These offenders are also unlikely to be insured, making it more difficult for victims to claim financial compensation if their actions

cause a collision.”

Texas has the highest rate, with 20.14% (1,184 out of 5,880) of fatal crashes involving unlicensed drivers. Between 2019 and 2023, Texas experienced an average of 3.99 fatal crashes involving unlicensed drivers per 100,000 people, ranking it ninth in the nation for this statistic.

Hawaii follows closely in second-place, with 19.73% (26 out of 134) of fatal crashes involving unlicensed drivers. From 2019 to 2023, Hawaii had an average of 1.84 fatal crashes per 100,000 people.

Louisiana ranks third, with 18.06% (227 out of 1,193) of fatal crashes involving unlicensed drivers. Over the same five-year period, Louisiana had an average of 4.92 fatal crashes per 100,000 people, the second-highest rate in the country.

North Carolina holds the fourth position, with 17.72% (403 out of 2,213) of fatal crashes involving unlicensed drivers. Between 2019 and 2023, the state had an average of 3.80 fatal crashes per 100,000 people, the 10th-highest rate in the U.S.

Finally, Montana ranks fifth, with 17.93% (46 out of 257) of fatal crashes involving unlicensed drivers. From 2019 to 2023, Montana experienced an average of 4.17 fatal crashes per 100,000 people, making it the seventh-highest state for this statistic.

Clash Over Teen Sex Solicitation Reveals Rift Within California Democratic Party

A reliable political axiom — at least in California — is that when one party achieves dominance in some arena, it fragments into factions defined by ideology, gender, economics, ethnicity, geography or even personality. The axiom has been demonstrated at the local level for decades, such as the perpetual infighting among San Francisco's dominant Democrats, or the ceaseless squabbling among Republicans when they controlled Orange County.

Democrats achieved absolute dominance in state politics over the last quarter-century, holding all statewide offices and capturing supermajorities in the Legislature and within the state's congressional delegation.

One might think that such hegemony would manifest itself in sweeping responses to California's most pressing issues, such as homelessness, poverty, water supply, wildfires and housing shortages — particularly after Gavin Newsom became governor on promises to seek “big, hairy audacious goals.”

It was not to be. The issues that were plaguing California when Newsom took office in 2019 are as formidable as ever, reflecting not only their complexity but the tendency of the dominant party to become a collection of often

hostile quasi-parties.

The disunity has appeared on multiple occasions, but what's happened over legislation to crack down on sex crimes against children is a stark example.

Two years ago, state Sen. Shannon Grove, a Republican from Bakersfield, carried legislation that would have added human trafficking of a minor to the state's list of serious felonies, thereby qualifying an offender for tougher penalties. Democrats stalled the bill, which was opposed by criminal justice reform groups. But when reporters asked Newsom about it, he intervened, essentially compelling the Legislature to pass it.

Last year, Grove took up the issue again with legislation that would increase penalties for anyone who solicited sex from a minor, but Democrats insisted that they wouldn't apply if the minor was 16 or 17 years old. Gay rights advocates demanded what was termed a “carveout,” contending that including older teens could backfire if the law was used to punish consenting relationships.

Grove grudgingly accepted the amendment as the price of getting the measure approved, but the issue was rejoined this year with a bill carried by Assemblywoman Maggie Krell, a Sacramento Democrat who had been a sex crime prosecutor.

Krell's measure would eliminate the carveout for 16- and 17-year old victims but in a replay of the previous year, fellow Democrats on the Assembly Public Safety Committee struck that provision of the bill, leading to a public squabble on the Assembly floor last week.

Republicans sought to restore the bill's original purpose and Krell endorsed the effort, saying “We need to say, loud and clear, that if you're under 18, a child, a minor ... the person buying that person should be charged with a felony. It's plain and simple, sex without consent — that's rape.”

She picked up vocal support from some other Democrats but Assembly Speaker Robert Rivas beat back the effort and punished Krell by taking her name off the bill and inserting a phrase declaring an intent to deal with the issue later.

“No one in the room is OK with” minors being sold for sex, Rivas said. “This is a nuanced issue and conversation.”

That, however, is not the end of it because Newsom once again entered the debate.

“The law should treat all sex predators who solicit minors the same — as a felony, regardless of the intended victim's age,” Newsom said in a statement. “Full stop.”

The image that emerges from this dustup is that of a Democratic Party at war within itself, with Rivas trying to be an “ayatollah,” as former Speaker Willie Brown once described himself, and Newsom distancing himself from his party's leftist tendencies as a prelude to running for president in 2028.

SACRAMENTO REGION, CA (MPG) - Roadways are a vital component of infrastructure in the United States. The vast majority of goods are transported by truck, highlighting the economy’s need for reliable roadways to connect supply chains and move goods and services efficiently across borders. Most commuters use roads daily to get to work, and individuals also rely on roadways for crucial access to resources including employment, social, health, and education services.

However, many highways, major roads, and bridges need repair. Hazardous road conditions can negatively impact the economy, contribute to traffic congestion, and impact the safety of Americans. The passing of the Infrastructure Investment and Jobs Act (also referred to as the Bipartisan Infrastructure Package) highlights the importance of reliable roads in the U.S., and the commitment to improving America’s infrastructure. The 2021 bill signed by President Joe Biden dedicated \$110 billion in funding to repair and update roads and bridges, in addition to supporting major transformational roadway projects across the U.S.

Highway and Street Construction Spending Over Time

Investment in America's roadways skyrocketed in recent years. The passage of the Infrastructure Investment and Jobs Act came at a critical time. After adjusting for inflation, highway and street construction spending had largely stagnated for much of the previous decade. From 2010 to 2020, real spending hovered around \$120 billion annually with little sustained growth, despite persistent infrastructure needs across the country.

The new federal investment helped reverse that trend. In constant 2025 dollars, monthly spending surged from about \$120 billion in mid-2022 to nearly \$150 billion in early 2025, providing renewed capacity to address long-standing maintenance backlogs and advance long-term transportation projects.

Trends in America's Road Conditions

The share of roads in good condition has increased steadily. Despite increased investment, many U.S. roads remain in poor shape. From 2000 to 2023, the share of major roadways in poor condition rose slightly—from 11.8% to 13.0%. At the same time, there has been clear

progress: the share of roads in good condition increased by nearly 10 percentage points, reaching 55.2% in 2023, with noticeable improvements in the years following the 2021 infrastructure law.

The most significant shift occurred in the middle category. Roads classified as being in fair condition declined from 42.6% in 2000 to 31.8% in 2023. This suggests that many roads have either improved or worsened enough to move into a different category—reflecting a gradual but measurable change in overall road quality.

Percentage of Roads in Poor Condition by State

The Northeast and California have the most roads in poor condition.

While public investment in roads is growing, many states continue to face significant maintenance challenges—particularly in the Northeast and along the West Coast. Rhode Island leads the nation, with 37.2% of its major roadways rated in poor condition—a slight improvement from years past. Other Northeastern states, including Massachusetts (27.0%), New York (23.7%), Maryland (21.2%) and Connecticut (20.4%) also rank among the worst. These states feature dense urban centers

and high public transit use, yet still rely heavily on aging and heavily trafficked roadways.

Outside the Northeast, California reports 26.6% of its roads are in poor condition, reflecting wear from its large, car-dependent population. Hawaii follows closely at 26.5%, despite its small population and geographic footprint.

In contrast, many Midwestern and Southern states report far lower shares of deteriorating roads. Kansas (2.9%), Wyoming (2.9%), and Indiana (2.7%) are among the best-performing states, highlighting a stark regional divide in infrastructure quality. Lower traffic volumes and a higher share of rural roads make maintaining highway infrastructure easier in many of these states.

For California, the share of major roadways in poor condition is 26.6%, share of major roadways in fair condition is 35.5%, share of major roadways in good condition is 37.9% and daily vehicle-miles traveled per capita is 22.3%.

For the entire United States, the share of major roadways in poor condition is 13%; share of major roadways in fair condition is 31.8%, share of major roadways in good condition is 55.2% and daily vehicle-miles traveled

per capita is 26.6%.

Methodology

The data used in this analysis is from the U.S. Department of Transportation Federal Highway Administration’s 2023 Highway Statistics Series. To determine the states with the worst roads, researchers at Construction Coverage calculated the percentage of major roadways in poor condition using the latest data available.

In the event of a tie, the state with the lower share of major roadways in good condition was ranked higher. Major roadways are defined to include interstates, other freeways and expressways, other principal arterials and minor arterials.

The International Roughness Index (IRI) was used to classify poor, fair and good conditions of roadways by the following criteria. Poor conditions have an International Roughness Index greater than 170 inches/mile. Fair conditions have an International Roughness Index between 95 and 170 inches/mile. Good conditions have an International Roughness Index less than 95 inches/mile.

SACRAMENTO, CA (MPG) - Twenty former foster youth studying at Sacramento State and University of California, Davis, received their first payments from United Way California Capital Region's Collegiate Guaranteed Income program that will provide them with \$500 a month for one year.

Some of the checks were distributed at a joint press conference with the two universities where United Way announced the expansion of the program to include another year of funding for the 10 Sacramento State students in the pilot program that launched a year ago, as well as the inaugural year of funding for 10 students at UC Davis, distributing a total of \$120,000 over the next year to support these students.

"Over the past year, we have witnessed the hard work and resilience of these 10 Sacramento State students, and we are thrilled to provide them with an additional year of guaranteed income so we can see them through to graduation, while also extending this opportunity to 10 former foster youth students at UC Davis," said Dr. Dawnté Early, president and CEO, United Way California Capital Region. "We know the disheartening statistics that currently show only 3% of former foster youth will obtain a college degree. We at United Way refuse to accept that status quo and instead are mobilizing our community to create change and build a future where former foster youth can reach their full potential and thrive. These 20 students at Sacramento State and UC Davis are changing the educational landscape for themselves and future foster youth."

United Way launched its Collegiate Guaranteed Income program in May 2024 as a pilot with 10 Sacramento State students in the university's Guardian Scholars Program for former foster youth. The 10 students received \$500 a month for a year and were surprised in April to learn they will receive an additional year of guaranteed income to help them through their junior and senior years of school so they can obtain their degree. United Way's Women United action group provided the funding for the pilot year and will continue to fund the Sacramento State cohort this year.

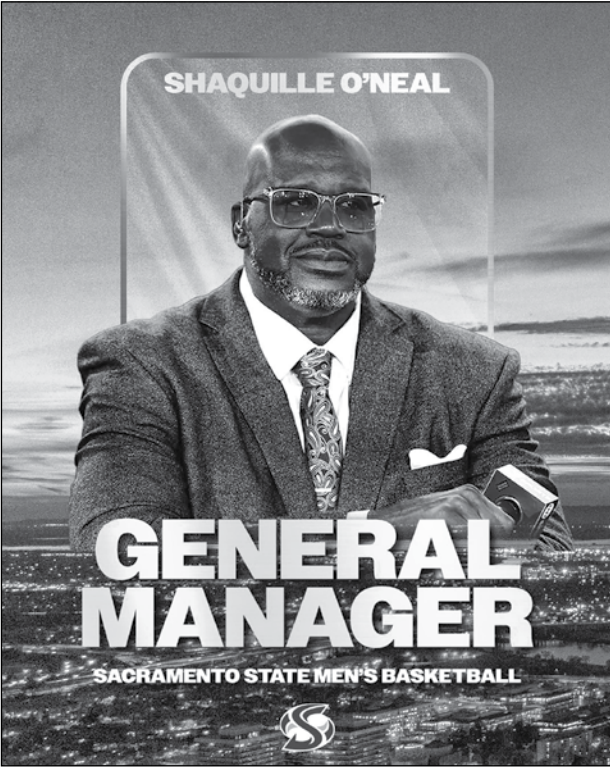
Shaquille and Shaqir O’Neal Join the Hornets

athleticism resulted in worldwide admiration and one of the largest fan bases in sports and entertainment.

“I know what it takes to build a winning culture. Coach Bibby, President Wood and Athletic Director Mark Orr are putting something powerful together at Sacramento State and I’m honored to be part of it,” Shaquille O’Neal shared to

Sacramento State Athletics. “This is more about banners and trophies but preparing these student-athletes for life on-and-off the court.”

Shaquille O’Neal played for six teams throughout his 19-year basketball career and was inducted into the Naismith Memorial Basketball Hall of Fame in 2016.

“His presence, experience

and leadership will elevate everything we’re building here and that’s why I reached out to Shaq to get involved with the program,” Bibby said.

Sacramento State President Luke Wood also shared his thoughts on Shaquille O’Neal’s arrival as general manager to the Hornets.

“This is an incredible moment for Sacramento State. Shaquille O’Neal is a difference-maker in everything he touches and we are thrilled to have him join our program. I’m especially grateful to Coach Bibby for making this extraordinary partnership possible,” Wood said. “He is showing what we already knew that he will transform Sacramento State Basketball and elevate the program to a top tier national program.”

Shaquille O’Neal’s son, Shaqir O’Neal, was the first recruit following Bibby’s

appointment as head coach of the men’s basketball team. In a news release from Sacramento State Athletics on April 5, it was announced that Shaqir O’Neal will be a senior next season playing for the Hornets.

Here are Shaqir O’Neal’s basketball career background and highlights. Standing at six-foot-eight inches, 200-pounds, he is a forward position from Los Angeles. He played his junior season (2024 to 2025) at Florida Agricultural and Mechanical University of the Southwestern Athletic Conference, after spending his first three seasons (redshirt in 2021 to 2022) with Texas Southern of the Southwestern Athletic Conference.

Last season at Florida Agricultural and Mechanical University, Shaqir O’Neal played in 27 games (15 starts), averaged 6.7 points and 3.2 rebounds on 50%

shooting (65-129) from the field and 41% (17-42) from the three-point line. He scored in double figures seven times, including a pair of 20-point games and had a double-double (12 points, 10 rebounds) in a win over Alcorn State.

Shaqir O’Neal played in 40 games during his two active seasons at Texas Southern (2022 to 2024).

He was a three-star recruit out of high school, being a 2021 graduate of Union Grove High School in McDonough, Georgia, Shaqir O’Neal played his senior season for the Wolverines. He played his first three prep seasons with Crossroads High School in Santa Monica.

“We are pleased to announce the signing of Shaqir. He gives us size and tremendous versatility. Shaqir has made a habit of performing his best during games against the strongest competition,” Bibby said. ★

Hoover Wants Folsom Lake Reopened to Decontaminated Boats

SACRAMENTO, CA (MPG) - Assemblyman Josh Hoover (R-Folsom) announced that he has joined Congressman Kevin Kiley, Senator Roger Niello, and Assemblyman Joe Patterson in sending a letter to the U.S. Bureau of Reclamation (USBR) and the California Department of State Parks regarding the ongoing closure of Folsom Lake to motorized boats and the handling of the invasive golden mussel. Despite having

knowledge of the golden mussel threat for over six months, the relevant agencies did not inform the public of the new boating restrictions until April 7. While Assemblyman Hoover and his colleagues share the commitment to protecting the local environment and water delivery systems, they expressed serious concerns about the lack of preparation and the resulting economic harm to the region.

The letter specifically calls on the U.S. Bureau of Reclamation and State Parks to:

Authorize decontamination procedures similar to those already implemented at Lake Tahoe.

Immediately reopen Folsom Lake to all boats that have been properly decontaminated.

Develop a coordinated system allowing watercraft seals issued after decontamination or quarantine

to be recognized at multiple lakes.

“The residents of our region deserve better than an abrupt closure when other options exist to safely open the lake,” said Hoover. “We must protect our waterways from invasive species, but we can and must do so in a way that maintains recreational opportunities and supports our local economy.”

Hoover remains committed to working with local, state, and federal partners to ensure Folsom Lake is reopened safely and responsibly.
