**YUBA CITY, CA (MPG)** - The annual Summer Stroll, hosted by the Yuba City Downtown Business Association, is back for its 16th year, this time with a fresh twist and a new date. The groovy-themed street festival will now take place on May 31, moving up from its traditional midsummer slot for a few strategic reasons.

"We didn't want to conflict with the Yuba-Sutter Fair and we were also hoping for better weather," said Cameo Arrasmith, coordinator of the Yuba City Downtown Business Association. "Also, people like to go

on vacation during the summer, so this might be the perfect sweet spot for good attendance. Not only did we not want people to have to choose between the stroll or the fair, we also didn't want to put our vendors in a bind who depend on both of these big events for their livelihoods. Now, they can do both, and hopefully it's a win-win for everyone."

This year's Summer Stroll will still include the beloved lineup of local food, artisan vendors, community booths, and kid-friendly activities. But adding a new jolt of excitement is the debut of Pro Championship Wrestling (PCW).

"We were supposed to be at the

Christmas Stroll last year but it got cancelled because of the rain," said Zack Reeb, Pro Championship Wrestling's CEO and Founder. "I am very excited they wanted us back and I will be performing in front of my hometown family, friends and local residents that have never seen PCW and what type of entertainment we have brought to the Yuba-Sutter area and all of Northern California for the past 26 years. For this event, I'll be wrestling a guy from Texas on my bucket list, under the lights."

Reeb's match will take place on Center Street, now newly illuminated by festoon string lights

## Life Jacket Stations Now Open for 2025 Boating Season

**Sutter County Children Families Commission News Release**

**SUTTER COUNTY, CA (MPG)** - The Sutter County Children & Families Commission, in collaboration with the Sutter County Sheriff's Office, is pleased to announce the official opening of four life jacket loaner stations for the 2025 summer season.

Stations are now stocked and available from Memorial Day Weekend through Labor Day Weekend.

These stations offer free access to life jackets for families with young children and are located at key recreational water access points throughout the county at Verona Marina, Tisdale Boat Launch, Live Oak Boat Launch and Feather River Parkway.

Each site includes 10 life jackets, five infant (up to 30 pounds) and five toddler (30 to 50 pounds) sizes, specifically for children under the age of 5. Families are welcome to borrow jackets for day use and are kindly asked to return them after use to ensure availability for others. The program is based on the honor system and community participation helps sustain the stations throughout the summer.

"We want to make it easy for families to enjoy our beautiful waterways safely," said Dr. Michele E. Blake, executive director of the Sutter County Children & Families Commission. "Drowning remains one of the leading causes of death for children under five and properly fitted life jackets can significantly reduce that risk. Even if a child is just wading or playing near the water's edge, it's important that they wear a life jacket."

According to the World Health Organization, drowning is the third leading cause of unintentional death worldwide, with the highest rates among children ages 1 to 4, followed by those ages 5 to 9. By making life-saving gear available where it's needed most, this program aims to reduce those risks and promote water safety awareness throughout the region.

The jackets are made available through a partnership with the Sea Tow Foundation, a national nonprofit dedicated to water safety.

## Beale Air & Space Expo Returns

*Historic Show After Seven-Year Hiatus*

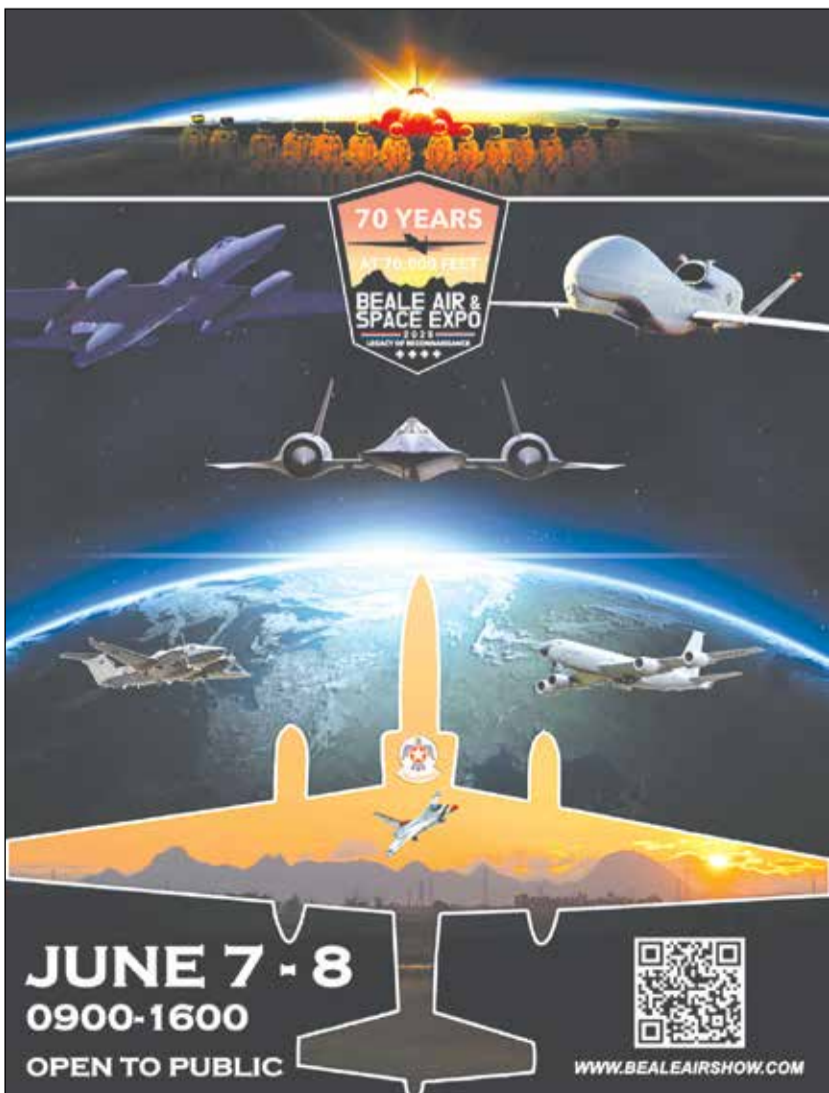
**YUBA COUNTY, CA (MPG)** - For the first time in seven years, Beale Air Force Base is opening its gates to the public for the 2025 Beale Air & Space Expo, a high-flying, family-friendly event celebrating "70 Years at 70,000 Feet."

Taking place on June 7 and 8, this long-awaited exposition promises cutting-edge aerial performances, ground displays, interactive exhibits and a few historic firsts.

"This is a rare opportunity for the public to visit the base, learn more about its operations, and see some really cool air-based performances," said Capt Breeze, Air Operations Director for the Beale Air Show.

Due to past cancellations caused by COVID-19 and ongoing construction, many locals and even current service members stationed at Beale have never experienced an air show at the base. While nearby areas such as Travis Air Force Base host one

Continued from page 1 zigzagging overhead. The avenue is home to popular businesses such as Sutter Buttes Brewing, Fernando's Cali Kitchen and Steele House Coffee, all of which are expected to be buzzing with activity during the event.

"They look amazing, and it really brings some charm to downtown," said Sandee Drown, past president of the Yuba City Downtown Business Association and owner of The Happy Viking Sports Pub & Eatery.

The new lighting project was made possible in part to a sizable grant from the Caltrans' Clean California Grant Program. Funds from this will work to support various downtown enhancements, including the Center Street lighting, aimed at revitalizing and beautifying the area.

The Summer Stroll will take place from 3 to 9 p.m. Saturday, May 31 on Plumas Street in Yuba

**WHEATLAND, CA (MPG)** - After last winter's inaugural show raised more than \$2,000 for Wheatland Union High School's special education program, local teacher and professional wrestler Olumide Coker is stepping back into the ring, this time for the fight of his life.

On Friday, May 30, Coker will headline West Coast Wrestling Federation's 12th Anniversary Show: "Uncharted Territory," an adrenaline-charged wrestling event taking place on his own campus at 1010 Wheatland Road in Wheatland. This match is especially meaningful, not just because it supports students with special needs but because Coker will face off against his mentor and friend, West Coast Wrestling Federation Champion Nathan Brick.

"Although it's the second event at the school, it's the most important," said

Coker, who teaches special education at Wheatland Union. "Me going against Nathan Brick, my wrestling trainer, mentor and friend; seems poetic. He's the person who took a chance on me and I wouldn't be where I am without him."

Coker, who performs under the ring name "The Dark Fox," will challenge Brick for the West Coast Wrestling Federation Championship title in front of his students, coworkers, and community.

"To have the opportunity to face someone of his caliber in front of my students at my school is surreal," Coker added.

The show is part wrestling spectacle, part fundraiser, and part graduation send-off. All proceeds will benefit the school's S.M.I.L.E. Foundation (Students Making It a Little Easier), which helps fund social, academic and extracurricular experiences for students with disabilities. Coker said

the foundation's work has created "some of the best memories and experiences of my life."

"High school is difficult and leaving can be a scary experience," said Coker. "I hope to give (our graduates) a special memory at the end of their high school career. They can go further and higher as long as they believe in themselves and have faith to persevere."

Doors open at 5:30 p.m. with bell time at 6 p.m. Tickets are available at GoFan, [gofan.co/event/3588653](http://gofan.co/event/3588653) or at the door: \$20 ringside, \$15 general admission and \$10 for students. For more information, call 530-870-2459.

This may be a battle for the belt but for Coker, it's also a chance to give back to the students who inspire him daily.

"I'm glad that I can bring my two worlds together," Coker said. "This is an opportunity for me to give back and create a night they will remember." ★

every two years and Sacramento holds one annually, Beale has often been overlooked despite its vital role in high-altitude reconnaissance and intelligence operations.

"Hosting an event on this scale at a military base like Beale is exceptionally difficult and I don't think the public understands how much work and red tape there is to open the gates to a base like Beale to the general public," Breeze said. "So, consider this your one opportunity to come out and see what Beale AFB has to offer. We're putting a really good program together for you and we're excited to show off what we do at Beale because we so rarely get to do that."

Headlining the event are the United States Air Force Thunderbirds, who will take to the skies at 3 p.m. each day. This performance marks a historic first where pyrotechnics will be incorporated into their show for the first time.

"This will be the first time in history that the Thunderbirds will have pyro added to their act," Breeze said. "We're hoping to do a proof of concept for the Thunderbirds so that moving forward we can open up pyro to the Blue Angels and the Thunderbirds. So, if you want to witness history, come to the Beale Air Show."

However, it won't just be the Thunderbirds lighting up the sky. Breeze said that the crew is planning to add pyro to "just about everything" to further punctuate the aerial acts.

"And yes, that means fire," added Breeze with a grin.

The Beale air show is set to feature more than 40 aircrafts, from warbirds and military jets to emergency response helicopters and even radio-controlled planes. Attendees will get a rare glimpse of the TS-11 Iskra, a Polish jet trainer that Breeze notes "might be the only one in the U.S. air show circuit right now."

Aviation fans of all ages will enjoy exploring hangars dedicated to interactive STEM education, simulations and a vibrant Kid Zone packed with activities. Live music will also be provided by the Band of the Golden West.

"There's going to be something for everyone, so bring out the whole family," said Breeze. ★

Another special highlight will include a dramatic display from the SERE specialists (Survival, Evasion, Resistance, and Escape) out of Edwards Air Force Base. These tactical experts will parachute from a Black Hawk and an Osprey while wearing U-2 pressure suits, mimicking conditions where aviators might have to eject from high-altitude aircraft.

"I'm really starting to dig into these niche portions of aviation, stuff that people might not expect to see at a military air show," Breeze said. "Aviation isn't just pilots flying the Thunderbirds; aviation is everything, from people flying balloons and drone aircraft and parachuting. We're trying to put all that on display for the public and let every corner of aviation be covered."

The Beale Air & Space Expo is free to attend, including parking, although upgraded seating, VIP passes and perks are available for purchase at [bealeairshow.com](http://bealeairshow.com). Those looking to attend should also claim their free passes and tickets online prior to arrival. Parking passes must be visible in the dashboard.

Gates open at 8 a.m., with venue access beginning at 9 a.m. and flying demonstrations starting around noon. Early arrival is highly encouraged for the best parking. Free shuttle service will be available for those parking farther out. Guests should enter through the Wheatland, Doolittle, or Snider gates and are strongly advised not to park along roadways or shoulders outside the base as all lanes will be dedicated to event traffic.

Prior to the air show, a special kick-off celebration will be held from 6 to 8 p.m. Friday, June 6, with a meet-and-greet with the Thunderbirds at Veterans Park in Marysville, an opportunity to grab autographs and photos before the big show.

Ear protection is recommended, especially for young children or anyone with sensitive hearing. Visitors are also encouraged to share their favorite moments online using hashtags #BealeAirShow and #BealeAirSpaceExpo.

"This is your one opportunity to come out and see what Beale AFB has to offer," Breeze said. "We're putting a really good program together for you and I hope that you enjoy it." ★

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# High Wheelers Knock Inaugural Season Out of the Park

**MARYSVILLE, CA (MPG)** - After much anticipation, the Yuba-Sutter High Wheelers knocked their inaugural season out of the park on Tuesday, May 20, at the newly renovated Bryant Field in Marysville. The long-awaited debut brought out civic leaders, baseball fans and curious locals eager to witness the return of professional baseball to the region.

The High Wheelers are the newest addition to the Pioneer League, one of Major League Baseball's Partner Leagues. While not directly affiliated with Major League Baseball farm teams, the Pioneer League maintains a professional level of play and operates in partnership with the MLB to scout and develop talent.

Opening night started strong. Alex Jones, Community Engagement director for Blue Zones Project Yuba-Sutter, hit a high note with the National Anthem, followed by a patriotic flyover courtesy of Beale Air Force Base. It was a grand-slam kind of start, right down to the ceremonial first pitch thrown by local legend Jim Stassi, grandfather of MLB catcher Max Stassi and longtime mentor to generations of area ballplayers.

Prior to opening, the City of Marysville stepped up to the plate with \$250,000 which the High Wheelers then matched through other private sources.

This team effort brought about \$500,000 in stadium upgrades, giving Bryant Field a fresh polish. The project included new lighting, padded outfield walls, improved seating and concessions, and a new scoreboard. As the sun dipped below the horizon, fans toasted the team's debut with locally brewed High Wheelers IPA from Sutter Buttes Brewing, while kids scrambled for foul balls near the dugout.

The High Wheelers kept their cool under pressure, securing a 5-2 win over the visiting Grand Junction Jackalopes on opening night. They followed it up with a 3-2 victory the next day, showing early signs that they're

a team with serious potential. The momentum continued into Thursday, May 22, with another nail-biting 6-5 win. On Friday, May 23, the High Wheelers dominated the field with a resounding 9-0 shutout, marking their fourth straight victory.

The streak came to an end on Saturday, May 24, as the Jackalopes managed a 6-3 win. But the High Wheelers bounced back in a big way on Sunday, May 25, sealing the six-game series with a commanding 14-4 victory.

The Jackalopes, hailing from Grand Junction, Colorado, are a seasoned squad in the Pioneer League. Like others in

the league, they face off in six-game series each week, a setup designed to cut down on travel and foster competitive rivalries.

Next up, the High Wheelers hit the road to challenge the Northern Colorado Owlz, based in Windsor, Colorado. They'll be back on home turf starting June 10, when they host the Glacier Range Riders from Kalispell, Montana.

## Supporting California's Salmon Supply

Governor Newsom announces upgrades to 21 fish hatcheries to boost salmon populations

**SACRAMENTO, CA (MPG)** -

Governor Gavin Newsom announced on May 8 that the California Department of Fish and Wildlife (CDFW) is upgrading 21 fish hatcheries to boost the state's salmon and trout populations and protect hatcheries from the impacts of climate change.

The project helps build the California salmon and trout supply, which are central to the health of California's biodiversity but also Indigenous peoples, communities and the state's multimillion-dollar fishing industry.

"Our salmon populations are not only an important part of our state's biodiversity but a rich component of our history and heritage. We have a responsibility to prepare for the future, protect the ecosystems, and people whose well-being are connected to the continued success of these important species," said Governor Newsom.

Over the past decade, state-operated hatcheries have experienced a host of climate-driven impacts, including reduced cold-water availability, increased disease outbreaks, emergency fish evacuations due to extreme weather events and wildfire threats, which caused temporary facility

closures. These issues have strained hatchery operations and threaten the California Department of Fish and Wildlife's ability to meet its fish production goals, including those for federally and state listed species.

The "Climate Induced Hatcheries Upgrade Project" was first funded with \$15 million in emergency drought funding in 2021. Since that funding was allocated, Department of Fish and Wildlife has been working with leading hatchery and hydrology consultants to identify specific concerns regarding water quality and quantity, fish rearing and water supply infrastructure and operational inefficiencies at the hatcheries. Consultants developed individual reports for each hatchery with recommendations and changes needed to address climate issues and provide reliable operations for the next 40 or more years.

"As climate disruption continues to reshape California's landscape, Department of Fish and Wildlife is committed to innovative action to support our state's fisheries and the communities that depend on them," said Department of Fish and Wildlife Director Charlton H. Bonham. "The Climate Induced Hatcheries Upgrade Project is a roadmap to ensure that our

state-operated hatcheries can meet the challenges of the future while promoting ecological health and economic vitality."

Jay Rowan, Department of Fish and Wildlife Fisheries branch chief said, "Department of Fish and Wildlife recognizes the important role our hatcheries play in species conservation and providing commercial and recreational fishing opportunities for Californians. Our hatcheries are on the front lines experiencing some of these rather dramatic changes in the environment that are impacting our operations. These upgrades and modernization efforts are key elements of the California Salmon Strategy for a hotter, drier future."

The Climate Induced Hatcheries Upgrade Project included a thorough assessment of each hatchery's water supply, fish-rearing infrastructure and operational efficiency.

Key findings and proposed upgrades include resilient infrastructure; replacement of aging plumbing and valving systems to prevent costly emergency repairs and ensure reliable operations into the future. Many state-operated hatcheries are more than 80 years old.

Implementation of partial recirculating aquaculture systems, water treatment and temperature

management systems will reduce water demand and improve efficiency, while reducing pathogens that can cause disease.

Integration of advanced control systems and passive energy generation will minimize water use, operational costs and environmental impacts.

Infrastructure upgrades tailored to withstand more extreme climate events are projected over the next 20 to 40 years, ensuring production remains

sustainable.

Governor Newsom has worked with tribes, communities and industry partners to help build and protect the state's vital salmon populations. Last year, Governor Newsom announced California's first strategy to protect the iconic fish species for generations to come through the California Salmon Strategy for a Hotter Drier Future. In March 2024, Governor Newsom distributed \$50 million

in grants to support a diverse array of habitat restoration projects in the Sacramento-San Joaquin Delta, McCloud River, and wetland and meadow projects statewide. And in August, as a result of the administration's Klamath Restoration Project, a collaboration between local, state and tribal partners, fish began swimming freely again in the Klamath River for the first time in more than 100 years. ★

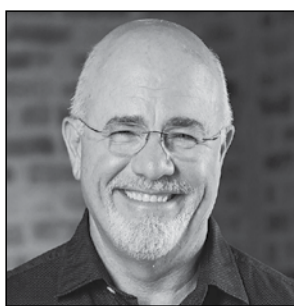

## Dave Ramsey Says Making Better Decisions

Dear Dave,

I own a small business, and over the years we haven't grown quite as much as I expected or hoped. We're doing okay, but I often find myself questioning my own decisions after the fact. Do you have any suggestions for an entrepreneur looking to improve their decision-making abilities?

- Nikki

Dear Nikki,

I'm glad you're taking the condition of your company, and the direction it's heading, so seriously. Believe it or not, developing your decision-making skills takes practice and hard work, just like anything else. Even the best thinkers and decision-makers look back from time to time and wonder if they really did the right thing for their businesses and their team members.

Now, you're not wrong if you're sweating a little at the thought of how much practice it takes to develop these skills. Developing finely-tuned decision-making skills isn't easy. And like any process, it takes time. Here are a few ideas that may help you develop into a better decision-maker in the future:

Take an appropriate amount of time to decide - Acting on impulse,

or with too little information, is foolish and dangerous. But then, so is thinking yourself to death. If the impact of the decision is small, don't waste too much time making the call. But if it's big or risky, spend more time thinking it through. It also doesn't hurt to seek the counsel of someone outside your organization you trust and respect.

• **Gather several options** - Creativity may be problem-solving's best friend, but options are the fruit of creative thinking that lead to amazing solutions. You'll feel more confident when you gather information and ideas, and study what you're dealing with.

• **Learn how to delegate** - By doing this, you'll free up more brain space to make decisions. And most likely, make better decisions.

• **Set a deadline** - This will help you overcome procrastination, or freezing in fear of making the wrong decision. Put a target date on your calendar, and decide by that day. Period.

• **Play out the worst** - case scenario in your mind - This may sound counterintuitive, but when you think through the worst that possibly happen, you'll see that making the call probably won't kill you—even if you're wrong.

• **Remember, choosing**

not to decide is a decision - Sometimes, it's the best path you can take for the short term.

• **Commit to your decision** - Follow through!

• **And finally, take care of yourself physically** - Get enough sleep and exercise so you can think logically and be well-reasoned. James Clear, the bestselling author of Atomic Habits, says, "Your problems adjust to their true level of importance after a hard workout and a good night of sleep."

Leaders lead. Always. When your team sees you taking steps to improve yourself and the company, they'll buy-in more easily to your vision for the future. They'll have added confidence in you. And it may just inspire them to undertake a journey of self-improvement, as well.

Watering is also more important now than earlier in the season where if you missed the watering, the weather is pretty forgiving and no dire consequences. Now that it is getting warmer, the need to keep on the schedule is important. Be sure your watering system is working well. Check all the emitters on the drip systems and be sure they are not clogged and are working as they should. It's best to do watering in the early morning before the heat of the day. There will be less evaporation and your plants can get a good soak to go through the days. Be sure to add mulch to your landscape. Three inches of mulch is recommended in garden beds and around trees. Mulching keeps the moisture in the soil so you use less water.

It is generally recommended that fertilizing should be done 3 times a year, February or March, June and September. March fertilizing helps to get everything off to a good start after the winter dormancy. June is for maintaining growth and energy needed for flowering and/or fruiting. September's feeding is taken up by the plant, some of it used and most of it is stored by the plants through the winter while they are dormant and then used when needed as they awaken for spring. Many people have definite ideas about fertilizing and what should be used. Basically, we have chemical or organic fertilizers to use. You will usually see a faster response by the plants to the chemical fertilizers, but organic fertilizers actually build up the soil so have a much better long term effect. If you have always used the chemical fertilizers and decide to go organic, keep in mind that you will see slower results from the organic fertilizers but they work equally well, and do it without

depleting the soil.

During the summer there is lots of color to see from all the blooming plants. If you are looking for colorful plants that are great summer bloomers that really seem to enjoy our heat, look for Crape Myrtles or Rose of Sharon, and many perennials. They are available in several different colors - shades of red, white, pink. Of course there are many beautiful roses to add color to the landscape. They need good soaks a couple of times a week and fertilizer every four to six weeks to keep them looking their best. It is also necessary to dead head them regularly. If the spent flowers are left on the plant they will become red seed pods, called rose hips, and the rose will quit blooming because it has done its job for the year. That is true of many plants since they set seed to carry on their species. If the seed pod - or whatever form they are - is removed, they will bloom again to produce more seeds. Perennials are also a good choice for summer color and they come back year after year.

More calls come during the summer months about wilting and dead plants than any other time of the year. The best thing you can do for your plants, is to mulch around the base, keeping the mulch a few inches away from the trunk or main stem, and deep water it twice a week. Deep watering is achieved by creating a slight basin and laying a hose or drip that is running slowly enough so that there is no run off, or allowing drip systems on trees and shrubs to run for longer periods but fewer times per week. This allows water to soak into the soil at the base of the plant. When the plant is deep soaked, roots are better able to get well into the soil, thus the plant is able to better sustain itself through the heat of summer.

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### Farmers Liquidate Assets to Pay for Operating Costs as Lenders Retreat

California farmers are selling land, water, equipment and other assets to raise the cash they need to grow their crops this year as a struggling farm economy affects lending activity by banks. Many farmers typically take out yearly operating loans to pay for labor, fertilizer, fuel and other costs, and then they pay back the loans after harvesting and selling their crops. But after consecutive years of rising production costs and low crop prices, "what's happened is the working capital—those loans—just dried up," said Bill Berryhill, a former state lawmaker who grows winegrapes, walnuts and almonds in Sacramento, San Joaquin and Stanislaus counties.

### Tariff Uncertainty Hurts Agricultural Exports and the Economy

California agriculture advocates made the case in Sacramento this month that federal trade policies should prioritize certainty and predictability to benefit farmers and agricultural exporters. "Countries are looking at us as not as reliable a trade partner as we used to be," Matthew Viohl, a California Farm Bureau policy advocacy director, said while testifying during an informational hearing hosted by California Treasurer Fiona Ma. The hearing focused on consequences of President Trump's tariff policies on California industries, including agriculture, and came as the U.S. and China announced a 90-day scaling down of their triple-digit tariffs.

### Fish and Game Shelves Proposal to Restrict Coyote Control Efforts

California farmers and ranchers expressed

relief after the California Fish and Game Commission decided last week to hold off on making any changes to how coyotes are managed in the state. On the table was a proposal to consider restricting take—or killing—of coyotes and establishing a regulated hunting season and bag limits for the predator. The commission said it would not pursue any changes for now, though it may consider other, more narrow proposals in the future. "There is no empirical evidence coyote populations are threatened in any sense," said Ned Coe, a cattle rancher and Modoc County supervisor, adding he has lost calves to coyotes. "That is my livelihood."

### Newsom Budget Proposes Fast Track for Delta Water Conveyance Tunnel

Gov. Gavin Newsom released his revised budget last week, saying the state faces a \$12 billion budget deficit. The governor's \$322 billion spending plan for 2025-26 includes a proposal to fast-track the construction of the Delta Conveyance Project, a \$20-billion tunnel beneath the Sacramento-San Joaquin River Delta. The tunnel would create a second route to move water to State Water Project pumps that transport water to urban and agricultural users south of the delta. The project supplies water to 27 million people and 750,000 acres of farmland. "While the project has received some necessary permits, its path forward is burdened by complicated regulatory frameworks and bureaucratic delays," the governor's office said in a statement. ★

What do the Dallas Mavericks and the Sacramento Kings have in common? Both teams traded away inexplicably the face of their franchises, and both were in the recent lottery draft with almost impossible odds to acquire the #1 pick.

The Dallas Mavericks traded beloved Luka Doncic to the L.A. Lakers, and GM Nico Harrison somehow retained his job. The Mavericks came to the NBA lottery night with a 1.8 percent chance of acquiring the #1 pick. Fans know that the lottery is anyone's guess, as the Dallas Mavericks defied the odds and are poised to choose 6'9" Cooper Flagg out of Duke.

At 6'9" and 225 pounds, as impossible as it may seem, the Mavericks are poised to replace Luka with a carbon copy that is 3 inches taller and 8 years younger.

After Harrison's Lakers trade, nothing's certain in Dallas, but it's hard to imagine anyone botching the most obvious pick since, dare I say, Luka Doncic, who was acquired via trade after being drafted #3 by Atlanta.

The Kings have improved their team defensively, and that is in no small part to building from within, as Keon Ellis continues to raise eyebrows with his defensive skills, and Keegan Murray has made similar strides over the past two seasons.

Holiday commands a steep paycheck at over 40 million a year, so at least one

high priced King would likely have to go. Many believe that would point to a trade involving DeMar DeRozan, but a trade involving 3-point specialist Zach Lavine can't be ruled out.

Whether the Kings make a play for Holiday or someone else, it's certain that Scott Perry and assistant B.J. Armstrong will be looking to add a true NBA point guard, and not just a capable fill-in.

King's fans would love to see Devin Carter make a leap forward and show fans why he was drafted in the first round a year ago. Carter had many moments last season that gave rise to the notion that this could be the Kings point guard of the future. Only time will tell, but it's unlikely that the new front office will be in wait mode.

Sacramento is looking for some of the Dallas lottery magic, and if there's anything we've learned about the NBA, nothing is taken for granted.

Scott Perry and B.J. Armstrong deserve to show what they can bring to the table, and just how well they can assess talent. A new culture is brewing, and fans are going to have to wait to see what that will look like.

I'm guessing that next season will bring a renewed focus on defense, and even without a trade, the Kings have a roster that can either start or bring players off the bench that can play defense at a high level.

Expect to see changes in the roster, sooner rather than later. If Jrue Holiday is among those changes, he gets my vote, as I believe Holiday's game would be a natural fit for the Kings, and he checks multiple boxes.

For many fans, it's not hard to remember the agonizing 20-win seasons, so despite the disappointment that 40 wins created last year, don't lose heart.

There is real talent on this team, and has been stated many times before, Domantas Sabonis is the real deal. I hope Scott Perry realizes what he has, because this is one big man to build a team around, and I want to see Sabonis in the paint next season leading the NBA in rebounds and double doubles once again!

# Social Security Matters

## Will "DOGE" Hurt our Social Security or Medicare Benefits?

**Dear Rusty:** I am a new AMAC member and have an important question for you, and your answer will be greatly appreciated. My question is: Is the new DOGE effort going to help us, or hurt us, all those living on Social Security and receiving Medicare benefits? Please let us know soon. **Regards: Worried Senior**

**Dear Worried Senior:** Here at the AMAC Foundation, we offer free access to everyone, the public as well as AMAC members, for our acclaimed Social Security Advisory Service, at which we answer all inquiries from anyone with questions about Social Security and enrollment in Medicare. As you can imagine, we very closely watch all action in Washington, D.C. which will affect Social Security and Medicare, especially any Congressional legislation being considered.

The new "DOGE" (Department of Government Efficiency) organization is tasked with uncovering and eliminating fraud and waste in all areas of the Federal

Government, and that includes Social Security and Medicare. But the important thing to remember is that DOGE is seeking only to discover fraud and government waste.

Recently a great deal of visibility has been given to DOGE's efforts to discover potential fraud (and waste) in the Social Security Administration. Everything we have seen thus far indicates that DOGE's efforts have identified opportunities for reducing fraud and waste at the Social Security Administration, so our expectation is that DOGE's efforts will tend to help the Social Security Administration become more efficient but not endanger anyone's Social Security benefits. Indeed, President Trump and the DOGE team have repeatedly said that no cuts in Social Security benefits will occur as a result of DOGE's efforts. Reducing fraud and waste at the SSA would tend to improve the agency's financial posture and improve their ability to pay full benefits longer. The same is true for Medicare. Actually, DOGE is very transparent and posts everything they find on this website: [www.doge.gov](http://www.doge.gov). A quick look at this website reveals that none of what they have found at the SSA indicates any threat to SS or Medicare benefits.

I suggest that any negative news media and social media accounts of DOGE's activities be taken

with a grain of salt. All such articles are largely meant to attract attention to unlikely "doomsday" scenarios. The reality is that our government is over \$36 trillion in debt, and that debt is growing, which is an unsustainable financial path for our country. DOGE is specifically tasked with eliminating the deficit gap by reducing frivolous government spending and fraud. But reducing crucial benefits for seniors on Social Security and Medicare are NOT part of DOGE's efforts, nor their goal.

Rest assured that here at the AMAC Foundation we are watching all current DOGE efforts very closely and will vigorously oppose anything which will negatively affect Social Security and Medicare. Indeed, AMAC's stated goal is to strengthen and preserve Social Security for all future generations.

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### Introducing the Trump Doctrine

President Donald Trump gave an important speech in Riyadh that may come as close to outlining a "Trump doctrine" as we'll probably see. It was a direct counterpoint to George W. Bush's second inaugural address. The simplistic way to put it is that what liberty was for Bush, money is to Donald Trump.

That's not quite right, though. The speech had values, they just weren't typical values -- accountable government, human dignity -- but simply prosperity and peace. If Bush wanted to spread freedom, Trump wants to spread gleaming high-rise buildings.

He hailed the rise in the Gulf of a Middle East "defined by commerce, not chaos, where it exports technology, not terrorism, and where people of different nations, religions and creeds are building cities together."

Notably, there is no liberty in this affirming sentence -- it's all economic activity. The speech was very critical of Iran, but his critique was that it isn't constructing anything. Instead, its landmarks "are collapsing into rubble and dust."

Trump's speech wasn't isolationist, or alien to American traditions. The address ran in the slipstream of the Hamiltonian tradition as famously outlined by Walter

Russell Mead, with its emphasis on the role of commerce in foreign affairs. And there was, as always, a Jacksonian element, as Trump spoke of smiting America's enemies. There was, however, no Wilsonianism. In a passage that got attention, Trump rapped neocons and liberal nonprofits for trying, but failing, to develop the Middle East because they didn't know or respect the culture of the region.

There is merit in this charge. We had no idea what we were getting into in Iraq and Afghanistan, while George W. Bush's vision for the spread of democracy systematically failed to account for the influence of culture, and for the centrality of order to liberty and other social goods.

That said, both Afghanistan and Iraq were originally conceived as wars of self-defense in the wake of a terror attack that shook America to its core. It's also unpersuasive to hold up the Gulf states as a counterexample of development -- anyone can run an emirate sitting atop gobs of oil and living under the U.S. security umbrella.

Trump's vision is actually as universalist as Bush's; Bush believed every country could become a democracy, and Trump believes that every country can prosper.

Iran can be "a wonderful, safe, great country, but they cannot have a nuclear weapon." Lebanon, too, can embrace "a future of economic development and peace." He'll reach out to anyone and bring them into this charmed circle of commerce and comity. "As I've shown repeatedly," he

said, "I am willing to end past conflicts and forge new partnerships."

For Trump, it's the results that matter -- the prosperity and peace -- not how a given government achieves them. That's none of our business. "I believe it is God's job to sit in judgment," he pronounced. Trump's job is to promote "stability, prosperity and peace."

In sum, the speech was a deal-maker's realpolitik, or a doctrine that we won't really have a doctrine except for trying to get everyone rich and to get along with as many people as possible.

The address was certainly bracing. But values do matter. Liberal societies are, as a general matter, more reliably our friends, and more reliably achieve prosperity. If Bush's vision advanced an unrealistic view of what motivates mankind -- all yearning for liberty, no yearning for power or revenge -- Trump drastically simplifies human motivation in his own way. As history has shown, people will fight and die for faiths and ideologies when these have nothing to do with prosperity, or actively destroy it.

Also, it should be said that standing for democratic ideals is an enormous part of America's appeal around the world, and if we get into a competition with China purely over who is richer and can cut more deals, we are kicking away a major advantage. That's likely an insight for another president, though. Trump has his doctrine.

## Ask DR. UNIVERSE

### Why do we Lose our Hearing when we Get Older?

Dear David,

I love visiting with my grandcat. But sometimes I have to talk loudly so she can hear me.

I asked my friend Christine Portfors why that is. She's a biologist at Washington State University.

She told me it's all about the hair cells inside our ears.

They aren't really hairs. They're sensory cells. Hair cells have tiny, bristle-like tufts that stick out—called cilia—that look a little bit like hairs.

Those hair cells are why we can hear.

First, sounds funnel into our ears. They bonk into the ear drum and make it vibrate. Then, three itty, bitty bones make those vibrations bigger. They send the vibrations to the inner ear. There are tons of hair cells there. The vibrations ripple over our hair cells, making the cilia move or bend. It's like turning on a switch. Electrical signals zoom up the auditory nerve to our brains. Then, our brains make sense of what we're hearing.

But, as we get older, our hair cells start to break down. After years and years of responding to sound vibrations, they simply wear out.

"The real problem is that hair cells can't repair themselves or regrow," Portfors said. "So, once they wear out, they're gone—and you lose your ability to hear all those different types of sounds."

Besides normal wear and tear, there are other ways our hair cells can take damage. Sometimes ear infections, head injuries and other diseases harm them. Sometimes medicines damage hair cells as a side effect.

Sounds that are too loud also hurt your hair cells. That's extra true if the loud noises go on for a

long time or happen regularly.

Maybe you've been somewhere super noisy or had your headphones cranked up mega loud. When things were quiet again, you may have heard a ringing sound inside your ears. Portfors

says that's your hair cells alerting you that loud sound is damaging them.

Luckily, it's usually easy to protect your hair cells from loud noise. You can avoid very loud places—or only stay a short time. You can wear ear muffs or ear plugs when it's loud. You can turn down your

headphones. I learned that if someone else can hear my headphones while I'm using them, that means they're definitely too loud.

Someday scientists will probably be able to fix damaged or worn-out hair cells.

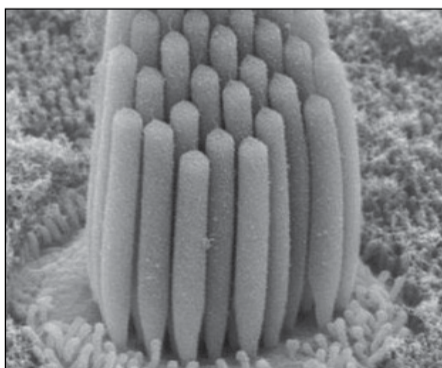
"What's interesting is birds and reptiles regrow their hair cells," Portfors said. "So, there's lots of research trying to understand why mammals don't. Is there a way that we can understand the different genetics and help humans regrow their hair cells? That's a huge area of study."

In the meantime, use your ear protection—just like you use other safety gear like seatbelts and helmets. And if you're lucky enough to have an older person in your life, help them stay connected.

It can be lonely to lose your hearing due to age, but spending time with you is ear-resistible.

This hair cell is in the inner ear of a frog. The long bits that look like hairs or bits of spaghetti are the cilia. Image: NIH



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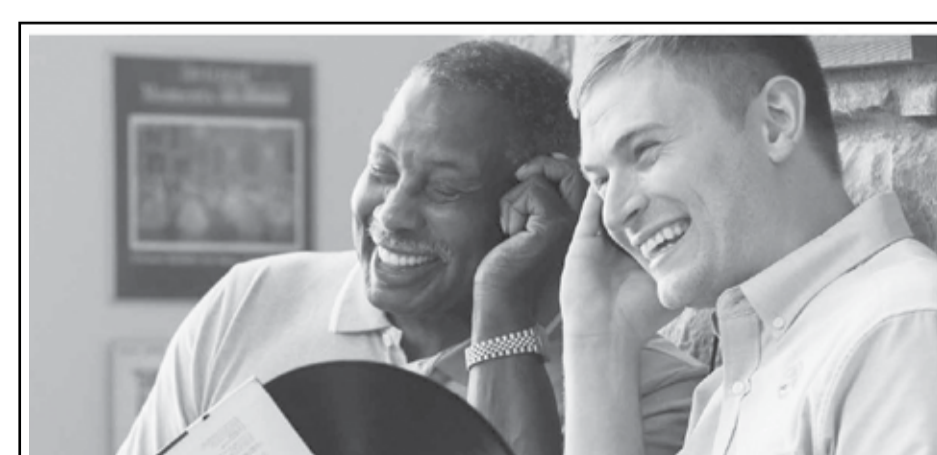
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# The Brownsville Bailiwick & Beyond

## Munger's Mantras

Famous investor Warren Buffett and his company Berkshire Hathaway have been in business making investors rich since 1965. Although Berkshire was founded in 1839, it was a much different company. The company buys other companies by investing directly in them or buying their stock. As any stock, Berkshire has its risks, and as part of the stock market, may go down in market crashes.

Although Buffett's name is the one most often tossed around when mentioning Berkshire Hathaway, he had a right hand man named Charlie Munger. Having met at a party in 1959, they had been together as business partners up until Munger's death and both steered the company to legendary greatness.

Munger passed in 2023 at age 99 and worked as vice chairman up until the day he died.

Both Munger and Buffett shunned things they didn't understand and had more of a general macro view when deciding what companies to buy.

Munger's approach on how to invest were simple and straight forward and unlike any I have ever heard of before or since.

1. Inversion: Solve a problem from the back end forward. As a weather forecaster in the air corps, instead of opionating on what weather was good to fly in, he instead thought of what weather would instead might kill pilots and simply avoided that. When investing, consider not only what you could make but what you could lose.
2. Opportunity cost: Could you make more money elsewhere. Should you invest in that dividend stock paying 3% when you could buy a CD paying 4%?
3. Circle of Competence: Admit what you don't know and stick within the circle of what you do know. Stay within your limits of what you know and don't guess.
4. Confirmation Bias: Avoid leaning into what you BELIEVE should happen and instead only focus only on what IS happening. We often look through rose colored glasses and see only what we want to see.
5. The Lollapalooza Effect: Multiple positive factors can amplify gains many times over. When all things align and are positive, gains can explode.
6. Second Order thinking: Considering

the many possible outcomes now and farther down the road instead of just considering the initial idea, concept or possible expected outcome. Consider all possibilities that can occur now AND later.

7. The Map is not the Territory: All economic or investing theories are just theories only. Consider they are not absolute predictors of what will happen. Nothing is cast in stone.
8. Mr. Market: The market is a fickle beast and an emotional one. It may not always be logical or rational and in actuality, seldom is.
9. Social Proof: Avoid jumping o band-wagons or following the mob. Stay rational. When everyone is thinking the same thing, nobody's thinking.
10. Occam's Razor: The most logical and obvious answer often is the correct one. Consider all possibilities, but the most obvious answer more often than not is the right one.

In conclusion, Munger and Buffett used common sense to steer their company Berkshire Hathaway. Buying iconic brands like Coca-Cola, Wells Fargo and See's Candies, among others, the reason for buying companies were not complexed.

It's just a good business!

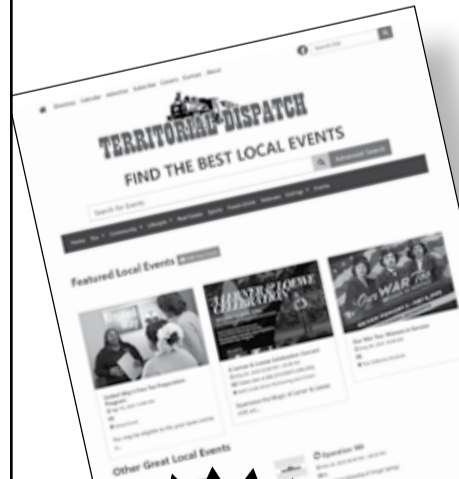

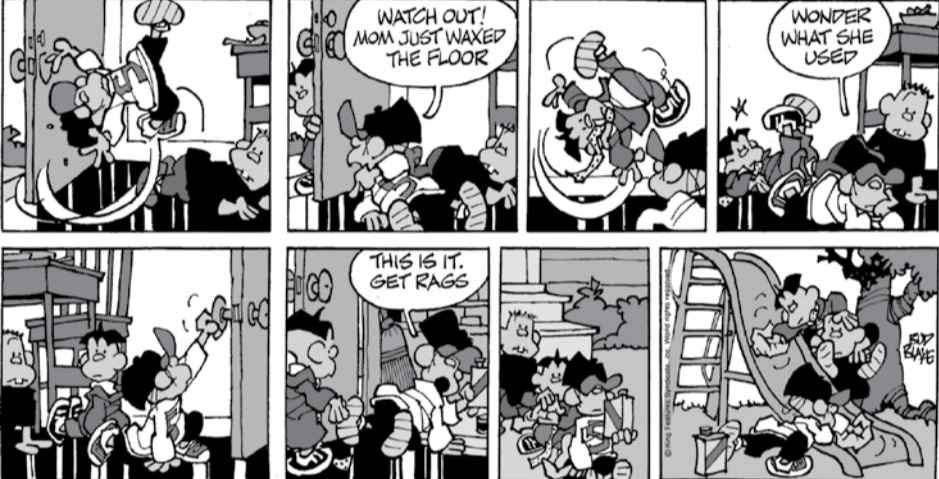

# Newsom Funds Millions to Reduce Youth Homelessness

**SACRAMENTO, CA (MPG)** - Continuing California's success in reducing homelessness in youth, Governor Gavin Newsom and the California Department of Housing and Community Development (HCD) announced May 23 \$56 million awards to help 52 California counties provide housing and supportive services to young adults at risk of homelessness.

The funds will help counties prevent homelessness by providing services for youth transitioning out of foster care or probation systems in California. Last year, California reduced the number of youths experiencing homelessness and saw a smaller increase in unsheltered homelessness than 44 other states. This is in part due to programs such as this program, which has helped 14,048 young adults since 2020.

"California will continue to support our local governments in their efforts to address homelessness. California has provided unprecedented resources to counties and local communities to help their residents in need. We will continue to work together to help them address these local issues and ensure those experiencing homelessness have the support and care they need," said Newsom.

There are currently an estimated 9,871 young adults between the ages of 21 and 24 in California who exited foster care at age 18 or older and another 3,000 young adults exit foster care in California each year. Studies have shown that those exiting the foster care or probation system face disproportionately higher rates of homelessness, with unaccompanied youth up to age 24 comprising 10 percent of California's homeless population. Researchers and advocates also cite lack of stable housing as a significant barrier to continuing education for current and former foster youth.

"These grants will provide vital services to our young adults as they transition out of foster care and probation system so that they are able to access housing and wrap-around supports," said Tomiquia Moss, Business, Consumer Services and Housing Secretary. "In partnership with counties, these state resources will create pathways to stable housing and independent lives."

The awards were granted by the Transitional Age Youth programs

administered by the California Department of Housing and Community Development, which include the Transitional Housing Program, the Housing Navigation and Maintenance Program, and the Transitional Housing Plus Housing Supplement Program.

"Many young adults exiting the foster care or probation systems face homelessness and need resources and guidance to thrive," said Housing and Community Development Director Gustavo Velasquez. "These programs, and the important partnership with our counties, helps our

vulnerable youth receive the tools and support they need to secure and maintain housing and succeed in the future."

The \$56 million in awards are allocated to counties based on need as demonstrated by each county's percentage of the statewide total of young adults who are currently or formerly in the foster care or probation systems. The awards are as follows:

Transitional Housing Program which helps county child welfare agencies identify and assist with housing resources and improve service coordination, received

\$33.3 million for 52 counties.

Housing Navigation and Maintenance Program, which provides counties funding to train child welfare agency social workers and probation officers working with non-minor dependents as housing navigators with a broad understanding of available housing resources, received \$13.7 million for 51 counties.

Transitional Housing Plus Housing Supplement Program, which allocates grants to assist young adults who have exited foster care on or after their 18th birthday in counties with the state's highest market-rate apartment rental costs, received \$9 million for six counties.

With the investment announced May 23, the three programs will have funded housing assistance for 14,048 young adults ages 18 to 24 since 2020. Of the counties eligible to receive Transitional Age Youth funding this round, 52 of 56 accepted Transitional Housing Program awards; 51 of 56 counties accepted Housing Navigation & Maintenance Program awards; and all six counties eligible for Transitional Housing Plus Housing Supplement Program accepted their awards. Counties that declined awards even after receiving technical assistance from Housing and Community Development indicated a combination of low Transitional Age Youth caseload and insufficient staffing for a new program. Consistent with previous years, any funds that were declined were redistributed to eligible counties with the highest demonstrated need.

The Point in Time Count for homelessness among the age group served by Transitional Age Youth dropped from 11,403 in 2020 to 9,908 in 2022, and again to 8,569 by 2024.

Counties receiving funding include Alameda, Amador, Butte, Calaveras, Colusa, Contra Costa, El Dorado, Fresno, Glenn, Humboldt, Imperial, Kern, Kings, Lake, Lassen, Los Angeles, Madera, Marin, Mariposa, Mendocino, Mono, Monterey, Napa, Nevada, Orange, Placer, Plumas, Riverside, Sacramento, San Benito, San Bernardino, San Diego, San Francisco, San Joaquin, San Luis Obispo, San Mateo, Santa Barbara, Santa Clara, Santa Cruz, Shasta, Siskiyou, Solano, Sonoma, Stanislaus, Sutter, Tehama, Trinity, Tulare, Tuolumne, Ventura, Yolo and Yuba. ★

## LaMalfa Celebrates Senate Repeal of Extreme Vehicle Emissions Mandates

**WASHINGTON, D.C. (MPG)** -

On May 22, Congressman Doug LaMalfa (R-Richvale) applauded the Senate's passage of three Congressional Review Act (CRA) resolutions that block California's sweeping vehicle emissions mandates from taking effect nationwide. The measures now head to President Donald Trump's desk for signature.

"I'm happy to see the Senate follow the House in pushing back on California's extreme vehicle mandates," said Congressman LaMalfa. "These rules are completely unrealistic and would have made it harder for working families to afford a reliable car or truck. Forcing California's failed model onto the rest of the country is bad policy and bad for consumers. Americans should be free to choose the vehicles that fit their lives and budgets, and I look forward to

seeing the President sign these resolutions into law."

Congressman LaMalfa co-led the resolutions with Representatives John Joyce (R-Pennsylvania), John James (R-Michigan) and Jay Obernolte (R-California).

Under the Clean Air Act, states are generally prohibited from setting their own tailpipe emission standards for cars and trucks. However, California has a unique exemption under Section 209, which allows the state to establish its own emissions regulations if it submits a waiver to the Environmental Protection Agency (EPA) and receives approval. Once granted, these California standards can also be adopted by other states under Section 177 of the Clean Air Act. Currently, about a dozen states follow California's emissions policies, effectively turning the state's regulations into a nationwide mandate.

President Joe Biden's administration approved several controversial waivers requested by the California Air Resources Board (CARB), allowing the state to impose extreme emissions rules that impact car and truck costs and availability across the country. These include:

Advanced Clean Cars II (ACC2): Approved in December 2024, this regulation mandates that 35% of new car sales be zero-emission by 2026,

increasing to 100% by 2035. At least 12 states have already adopted Advanced Clean Cars II. Failure to meet this goal means a maximum penalty of \$25,000 per non-compliant vehicle sold to consumers.

Advanced Clean Trucks (ACT): Approved in March 2023, this regulation forces truck manufacturers and retailers to meet strict zero-emission quotas by 2035, including 55% of Class 2B-3 truck sales, 75% of Class 4 to 8 straight truck sales and 40% of truck tractor sales. At least 11 states have adopted Advanced Clean Trucks.

Omnibus Low-NOx Emissions Rule: Approved in December 2024, this regulation imposes aggressive emissions reductions on medium- and heavy-duty truck and other engines, requiring NOx emissions to be cut by 75% below current standards for Model Year 2024-2026 compared to 2010 levels and particulate matter emissions to be cut by 50%.

## Gavin Newsom's Off-The-Mark Budget Numbers Undermine His Credibility Again

Governor Gavin Newsom's revised state budget assumes California will see a sharp decline in projected revenue, largely because President Donald Trump's tariffs will slow the nation's economy.

Newsom blames a "Trump slump," as well as an unanticipated increase in spending on Medi-Cal, California's medical program for the poor, for punching a \$12 billion hole in the budget.

Both of those factors, however, underscore a consistent trend in budgets Newsom has proposed and signed during the last six years, projections of income and outgo that miss the mark, often by many billions of dollars, thus undermining the credibility of the governor's financial depictions.

The most obvious example happened in May 2022, as the state's economy was recovering from the brief, but severe recession caused by shutdowns during the COVID-19 pandemic.

Newsom presented a revised 2022-23 budget that was \$14 billion higher than his original proposal, boasting that the state was experiencing a \$97.5 billion surplus. "No other state in American history has ever experienced a surplus as large as this," Newsom said as he unveiled the revision.

The budget he signed a

month later added still another \$7 billion in spending with immense new commitments, including cash payments to poor families, expanded health care for undocumented immigrants and new funds for early childhood education.

The surplus Newsom extolled, however, was an illusion. He and his budget advisors had assumed that a one-time spike in state revenues would be permanent, setting a new base of personal and corporate income taxes and sales taxes well in excess of \$200 billion a year.

But it didn't happen. A year ago, a brief passage in Newsom's 2021 to 2025 budget revision acknowledged the error.

"Due to the revenue spike from 2019 to 2020 to 2021 to 2022, the budget acts of 2021 and 2022 were based on forecasts that projected substantially greater revenues in the last two fiscal years than occurred," the budget declared.

"Substantially greater" indeed.

An accompanying chart on revenues from the state's three major tax sources revealed that "The total difference across the four fiscal years is a negative \$165.1 billion," meaning the error was \$40 billion or more a year.

However, the fiscal damage was done. Newsom and the Legislature had already committed the state to tens of billions of dollars in new spending based on revenues that didn't exist. They created what's called a structural deficit, a chronic gap between income and outgo, that's currently estimated at \$10 billion to \$30 billion a year.

One might think that, having made such an immense error of fiscal judgment,

Newsom and his Department of Finance would be ultra-careful in projecting revenues and spending.

Apparently not. Last year, one of those 2022 commitments based on the erroneous surplus projection, the extension of Medi-Cal coverage to everyone in the state, including undocumented immigrants, took effect. Early this year, the administration revealed Medi-Cal costs were outpacing expectations by more than \$6 billion, mostly due to the coverage expansion.

In other words, it's a double whammy. The false assumption of budget surpluses has been compounded by a false assumption about Medi-Cal costs, thereby worsening the structural deficit that, if left to fester, would compound itself even more. The Legislative Analyst's Office says the deficit could reach \$42 billion by 2028-29.

The administration's sorry record on income and outgo projections should make the Legislature and the voting public very skeptical of Newsom's current assumption that the "Trump slump" from tariffs will punch an even larger hole in the budget.

That certainly could happen, but with tariffs and their impact shifting day-to-day, putting any number on the revenue impacts is nothing more than guesswork. And we already know that the administration's fiscal guesses are unreliable.
