SACRAMENTO, CA (MPG) - The Sacramento Suburban Kiwanis Club will host its 67th Art Fiesta on Saturday, June 7 and Sunday, June 8 at the Scottish Rite Masonic Center in Sacramento.

This two-day, family-friendly event is free to attend and features fine art, emerging student talent and a deep commitment to community, all while kicking off summer with a celebration of creativity and connection.

The artists in the juried arts show will be on site.

This year’s Art Fiesta includes an exciting new addition: a student art exhibit showcasing the work of seventh- through 12th-graders from the San Juan Unified School District. They must currently attend a high school or community college in one of the 13 counties in SAFE’s service area: Sacramento, Placer, El Dorado, Yolo, San Joaquin, Contra Costa, Solano, Yuba, Sutter, Butte, Nevada, Alameda and Amador.

The scholarship program is among SAFE’s philanthropic initiatives that also include grants, direct giving and community partnerships. It ties in directly with the credit union’s philanthropic pillars of youth and young adult education, financial literacy, workforce development and affordable housing.

Sac State’s Commencement Brings Joy and Gratitude

SACRAMENTO, CA (MPG) - Sacramento State University recently celebrated thousands of new Hornet alumni as graduates, their families and their friends and guests packed into Golden 1 Center for spring commencement.

As more than 6,500 members of the Class of 2025 walked the stage across six ceremonies May 16 and May 17 in downtown Sacramento, each shook the hand of a representative of their college and President Luke Wood before celebrating their accomplishments with smiles, raised arms and other gestures.

They joined the more than 3,000 Hornets who graduated during winter commencement ceremonies in December, bringing the number of students receiving degrees this academic year to more than 9,000.

Among the graduates were this year’s Dean’s Award winners. During the final ceremony, Dean’s Award winner and President’s Medal recipient Jeffery Benson, who graduated in December, offered words of encouragement to his fellow Hornets.

“I would be remiss if I didn’t salute every professor on stage with me, in the audience or watching via livestream – the program administrators who poured into me at Sacramento State, your wisdom helped me turn my vision into a reality,” Benson said during the College of Education’s ceremony on May 17.

“Thurgood Marshall once said, ‘None of us got here by ourselves. We got here by being pulled up by someone else.’ And I paraphrase, so don’t forget where you come from and reach back and help someone else pick up their boots,” Benson said.

In addition to the Deans’ Awards, which are given each year to one student from each of Sac State University’s academic colleges,

and the President’s Medal, which is awarded to the university’s top graduate, Sacramento State and the California State University (CSU) conferred honors upon individuals who have provided outstanding service to the university, higher education and beyond. Honorary doctorates were presented to Thomas L. Karlo and Paul Lau and the President’s Medal for Distinguished Service was awarded posthumously to Randy Solorio.

Wood addressed graduates, including 5,342 bachelor’s recipients, 906 graduate degree recipients and 312 credential recipients, reminding them that the end of one journey begins another.

“You’ve become experts not just in your fields but in persistence, because there’s no such thing as the light that shines better than yours,” said Wood, who throughout the two-day event took selfies with graduates, danced on stage and celebrated with energy and enthusiasm. “You wrestled with doubt, and you kept going. You juggled multiple responsibilities but one would have been enough. You stayed enrolled when it would have been easier to have walked away. You built a life while building a future. That’s not

ordinary; that’s extraordinary.”

Wood highlighted the university as an engine for opportunity, calling out first-generation and transfer students, top graduates, veterans and parents and caretakers who juggled school while raising families. He also acknowledged graduates’ families and supporters.

The sea of students on the arena floor showed their styles and personalities with decorated mortarboards, colorful leis and footwear ranging from strappy sandals to Hokas.

One graduate’s bright pink

mortar board read “Biologist Barbie,” another’s “Finally Done with This BS.” Others carried phrases such as “My Turn to Teach,” “To My Daughter, Mommy Did It,” “Yeah Somebody Gotta Do It,” and “A Dream begins with a Dreamer, 1st gen.”

During a “Grad Jam” celebration prior to the ceremonies, Hornets and their loved ones grabbed a microphone and shared thoughts about their journeys.

“It’s a great day to be a Hornet,” one student said. “Thanks Mom! Thanks Dad! Sac State is the

place!” He blew kisses to his cheering family, shown on a big screen above him.

Some in the crowd waved cardboard replicas printed with their favorite graduate’s face.

Jessica Ha, who earned her bachelor’s degree in health science and plans to become a nurse, said she was glad to be at commencement after completing a challenging journey.

“I’ve always had a passion to help others, especially my mom,” Ha said. “She had health problems while I was growing up, so she inspired my path. Going to college was hard, especially being first-generation and being Asian American.”

Denyse MacMillan watched with pride as her daughter, Bryce MacMillan, graduated with a degree in speech pathology. Bryce will return to Sac State to pursue a master’s degree.

“I love her and I’m super proud of her,” Denyse MacMillan said. “She did this in three years. She never stopped. Winter classes, spring classes, summer classes. She was just very focused, very driven, just stayed in her room studying a lot.”

At the health and human services ceremony, the college’s Dean’s Award winner Jesus Osvaldo Meza Nava told his fellow graduates that the education Sac State provides goes beyond the classroom.

“As a proud, first-generation Mexican American, I carry more than my own dreams across this stage today,” he said during his speech. “I walk with the hopes, the struggles and the triumphs of generations who believed in something bigger and refused to give up. Here at Sac State, we weren’t just educated. We were shaped by the values of compassion, inclusivity and excellence. Values we now have the responsibility to bring to the world.”

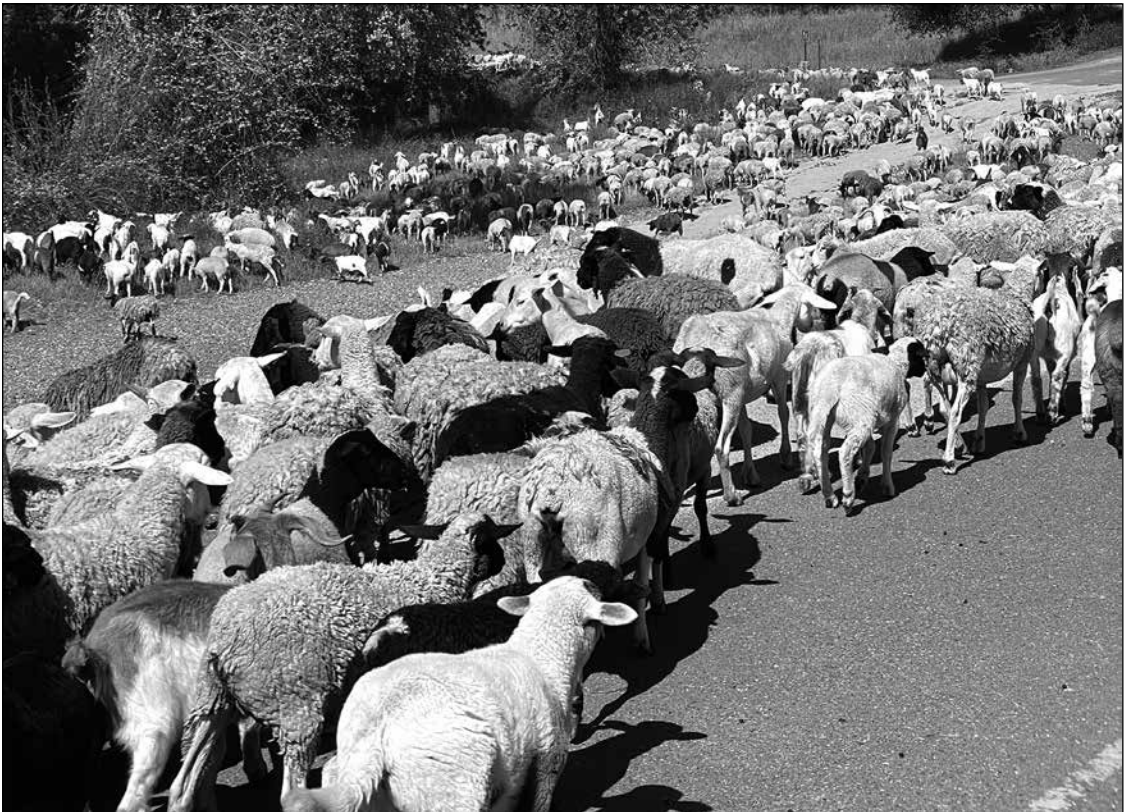
We’ve Got Ewe-nique Fire Fuel Reduction Techniques

SACRAMENTO COUNTY, CA (MPG) - Have you herd the good news? Our four-legged firefighters are here and they’re ready to bleat back wildfire risks! The Sacramento County Department of Regional Parks is ramping up its multi-faceted strategy to reduce wildfire risk, protect wildlife habitats, and safeguard both our natural resources and the neighborhoods that border our parks.

For its 2025 Fire Fuel Reduction Action Plan, the Department of Regional Parks has lined up sheep and goat grazing contracts, is utilizing park maintenance crews (and other manned crews through contracts with the California Conservation Corps and Sacramento Regional Conservation Corps) to maintain firebreaks and is issuing fuel reduction permits by request to property owners bordering Regional Park properties.

“Fire is an ever-present danger in our Regional Parks, and with another moderately wet winter and spring behind us, the risk will only grow as vegetation dries out,” said Liz Bellas, director of Regional Parks. “I’m incredibly proud of the proactive work our staff and partners are doing to stay ahead of these risks. From hand crews and firebreaks to grazing programs and community partnerships, we’re

doing everything we can to protect our parks and the people who live near them.”

To reduce the potential number and size of wildfires in the Sacramento County Regional Parks system, a variety of fire management techniques are being implemented. Firebreaks, a combination of mowing, soil discing and herbicides will be used where appropriate to create perimeters around open fields, along fence lines and behind

neighborhoods. This work is scheduled to be completed by the end of June.

Ladder Fuel Hand-Crews is another technique. In limited, hard-to-reach areas, hand crews will remove vegetation that could provide a path for a fire to spread upward into tree canopies, where it is much harder to control.

Grazing is also being employed as part of the vegetation management plan. There

are thousands of acres of natural landscapes in the Sacramento County Regional Parks system. Goats and sheep are ideal for vegetation management to help reduce herbaceous fuels over larger areas and in areas with difficult terrain that are difficult to maintain with manned crews. Grazing is expected to occur through the end of June and some areas might be grazed in the summer to manage late emerging yellow star-thistle.

Residents can participate in the fire management efforts through annual encroachment permits. Those who live adjacent to Regional Parks’ properties can apply for free annual encroachment permits to maintain a firebreak behind their property line. These permits allow residents to string-trim herbaceous vegetation up to 50 feet beyond their private property line. To request a permit, provide your name, address and contact information to Regional Parks at parksinfo@SacCounty.gov.

In addition to these proven fire-fuel reduction measures, our Ranger Division is continuing its education and enforcement campaign related to illegal fires and cooking along the parkway in an effort to reduce the number of new fire outbreaks.

Visitors to Sacramento County Regional Parks should be aware of the following regulations. Open-flame fires are not allowed and barbecuing is only permitted in designated picnic areas. Smoking is only allowed in developed picnic areas, on asphalt surfaces, within golf courses and on levee tops along the American River Parkway.

SACRAMENTO REGION, CA (MPG) - Excitement is growing throughout the regional reading community about the May 31 inaugural Sacramento Book Festival presented by the California Writers Club-Sacramento Branch.

More than 130 local authors will tempt readers with their books for adults and children from 10 a.m. to 4 p.m. May 31 at the Shepard Garden and Arts Center adjacent to McKinley Park, 3330 McKinley Blvd., East Sacramento. Authors from every neighborhood in the Sacramento area will meet readers.

In addition, popular authors of mystery, thriller, romance, sci-fi/fantasy, historical fiction and Black women’s literature will participate in panel talks throughout the day.

The Kids Zone will host activities and readings with children’s authors.

The schedule and information about the attending authors, as well as on the festival’s other activities, can be found online at SacramentoBookFestival.com.

Festival volunteers briefly interviewed three attending authors to whet reader appetites: James Rollins, Sharon Johnson-Fujimoto, Catriona McPherson.

Rollins, the No. 1 New York Times best-selling author of international thrillers and high fantasy, has sold more than 20-million books.

One of the first authors on board with the festival, Rollins shared his enthusiasm about the event.

“While I’ve not ventured far from the Sacramento Valley, having only moved up to Tahoe, I look forward to returning to my roots. My veterinary practice was in the Greenhaven/Pocket area, so an event at McKinley Park is like coming home,” Rollins said. “At the festival, I’m glad to share how a local veterinarian became an author. And not just the author of one genre of fiction but of two: action thrillers and high fantasy. I still continue to write in both fields, with ‘Arkangel’ being my latest Sigma thriller and ‘A Dragon of Black Glass’ continuing a four-book fantasy series. Hopefully, I’ll also have further news about Sigma being picked up by Amazon MGM for a streaming series.”

Starting off the day in the Kids Zone will be children’s author Fujimoto-Johnson.

Fujimoto-Johnson is a Japanese American author-illustrator of two children’s picture books, “The Mochi Makers” and “Shell-Song: Based on a True Family Story.”

“The Mochi Makers” celebrates the joy of a girl and her grandmother spending the day making mochi together. “Shell-Song: Based on a True Family Story” also focuses on family and tradition by drawing on the experiences of the author’s grandfather.

“When I was a young girl, I inherited my grandfather’s seashell collection. He had collected these shells in a Japanese American incarceration camp in Hawaii during World War II. My grandfather’s shells carried his story across generations to me,” Fujimoto-Johnson said. “It is such an honor to share his story in my new book, ‘Shell-Song,’ the first children’s book to address the incarceration camps in Hawaii. Digitally collaged into the artwork for this book are my grandfather’s actual shells (and) texture from my grandmother’s wedding kimono.”

Sacramento gained one of its most well-known authors, McPherson, when she emigrated from Scotland.

"I write all over the mystery map: pre- and post-WWII detective fiction and modern psychological thrillers, all set in Scotland. It was a concern when I immigrated to California, let me tell you," McPherson said. “Turns out you lovely American readers have voracious appetites for both. Thank you, Masterpiece Theater, I reckon; between the period drama and the Nordic Noir, I fit right in. That said, I also write comic mysteries about a Scot who’s moved to a ‘fictional’ college town in NorCal (it’s Davis) and nothing makes me happier than sharing them with local readers who get all the references. I say it with love ... but I still say it."

McPherson will be part of the historical fiction panel and signing.

The 130-plus authors will be seated at tables, ready for visiting with readers of all ages and sharing their tales.

Food will be available from the Ju-Ju Burgers and ShakesFood Truck.

The Sacramento Book Festival’s host, the California Writers Club-Sacramento Branch, is celebrating its centennial year this year. SACRAMENTO, CA (MPG) - Twenty former foster youth studying at Sacramento State and University of California, Davis, received their first payments from United Way California Capital Region's Collegiate Guaranteed Income program that will provide them with \$500 a month for one year.

Some of the checks were distributed at a joint press conference with the two universities where United Way announced the expansion of the program to include another year of funding for the 10 Sacramento State students in the pilot program that launched a year ago, as well as the inaugural year of funding for 10 students at UC Davis, distributing a total of \$120,000 over the next year to support these students.

“Over the past year, we have witnessed the hard work and resilience of these 10 Sacramento State students, and we are thrilled to provide them with an additional year of guaranteed income so we can see them through to graduation, while also extending this opportunity to 10 former foster youth students at UC Davis,” said Dr. Dawnté Early, president and CEO, United Way California Capital Region. “We know the disheartening statistics that currently show only 3% of former foster youth will obtain a college degree. We at United Way refuse to accept that status quo and instead are mobilizing our community to create change and build a future where former foster youth can reach their full potential and thrive. These 20 students at Sacramento State and UC Davis are changing the educational landscape for themselves and future foster youth.”

United Way launched its Collegiate Guaranteed Income program in May 2024 as a pilot with 10 Sacramento State students in the university's Guardian Scholars Program for former foster youth. The 10 students received \$500 a month for a year and were surprised in April to learn they will receive an additional year of guaranteed income to help them through their junior and senior years of school so they can obtain their degree. United Way's Women United action group provided the funding for the pilot year and will continue to fund the Sacramento State cohort this year.

“Sacramento State is honored to have taken part in the pilot phase of United Way California Capital Region's Collegiate Guaranteed Income program and support its continued expansion,” said Sacramento State President Dr. Luke Wood. “This initiative has played a vital role in easing the financial challenges our students face as they transition out of the foster care system. We remain committed to this important partnership and to building opportunities that help our students achieve their educational aspirations.”

With the success of the pilot at Sacramento State, United Way is expanding its Collegiate Guaranteed Income program to UC Davis, providing funding for 10 students in the university's Guardian Scholars Program. “UC Davis Guardian Scholars are some of the most ardent and dedicated students I know,” said Dr. Gary S. May, UC Davis chancellor. “We are grateful to United Way for expanding its Collegiate Guaranteed Income program to our community of former foster youth. Guaranteed income will give these 10 students the opportunity to focus more on their educational goals and less on how they will afford rent, groceries and transportation.”

The Collegiate Guaranteed Income program brings together United Way's experience working with foster youth with its expertise in guaranteed income. United Way has been supporting foster youth for more than two decades and launched the first Guaranteed Income program of its kind in the California Capital Region in July 2021, following

Newsom Funds Millions to Reduce Youth Homelessness

SACRAMENTO, CA (MPG) - Continuing California’s success in reducing homelessness in youth, Governor Gavin Newsom and the California Department of Housing and Community Development (HCD) announced May 23 \$56 million awards to help 52 California counties provide housing and supportive services to young adults at risk of homelessness.

The funds will help counties prevent homelessness by providing services for youth transitioning out of foster care or probation systems in California. Last year, California reduced the number of youths experiencing homelessness and saw a smaller increase in unsheltered homelessness than 44 other states. This is in part due to programs such as this program, which has helped 14,048 young adults since 2020.

“California will continue to support our local governments in their efforts to address homelessness. California has provided unprecedented resources to counties and local communities to help their residents in need. We will continue to work together to help them address these local issues and ensure those experiencing homelessness have the support and care they need,” said Newsom.

There are currently an estimated 9,871 young adults between the ages of 21 and 24 in California who exited foster care at age 18 or older and another 3,000 young adults exit foster care in California each year. Studies have shown that those exiting the foster care or probation system face disproportionately higher rates of homelessness, with unaccompanied youth up to age 24 comprising 10 percent of California’s homeless population. Researchers and advocates also cite lack of stable housing as a significant barrier to continuing education for current and former foster youth.

“These grants will provide vital services to our young adults as they transition out of foster care and probation system so that they are able to access housing and wrap-around supports,” said Tomiquia Moss, Business, Consumer Services and Housing Secretary. “In partnership with counties, these state resources will create pathways to stable housing and independent lives.”

The awards were granted by the Transitional Age Youth programs

administered by the California Department of Housing and Community Development, which include the Transitional Housing Program, the Housing Navigation and Maintenance Program, and the Transitional Housing Plus Housing Supplement Program.

“Many young adults exiting the foster care or probation systems face homelessness and need resources and guidance to thrive,” said Housing and Community Development Director Gustavo Velasquez. “These programs, and the important partnership with our counties, helps our

vulnerable youth receive the tools and support they need to secure and maintain housing and succeed in the future.”

The \$56 million in awards are allocated to counties based on need as demonstrated by each county’s percentage of the statewide total of young adults who are currently or formerly in the foster care or probation systems. The awards are as follows:

Transitional Housing Program which helps county child welfare agencies identify and assist with housing resources and improve service coordination, received

\$33.3 million for 52 counties.

Housing Navigation and Maintenance Program, which provides counties funding to train child welfare agency social workers and probation officers working with non-minor dependents as housing navigators with a broad understanding of available housing resources, received \$13.7 million for 51 counties.

Transitional Housing Plus Housing Supplement Program, which allocates grants to assist young adults who have exited foster care on or after their 18th birthday in counties with the state’s highest market-rate apartment rental costs, received \$9 million for six counties.

With the investment announced May 23, the three programs will have funded housing assistance for 14,048 young adults ages 18 to 24 since 2020. Of the counties eligible to receive Transitional Age Youth funding this round, 52 of 56 accepted Transitional Housing Program awards; 51 of 56 counties accepted Housing Navigation & Maintenance Program awards; and all six counties eligible for Transitional Housing Plus Housing Supplement Program accepted their awards. Counties that declined awards even after receiving technical assistance from Housing and Community Development indicated a combination of low Transitional Age Youth caseload and insufficient staffing for a new program. Consistent with previous years, any funds that were declined were redistributed to eligible counties with the highest demonstrated need.

The Point in Time Count for homelessness among the age group served by Transitional Age Youth dropped from 11,403 in 2020 to 9,908 in 2022, and again to 8,569 by 2024.

Counties receiving funding include Alameda, Amador, Butte, Calaveras, Colusa, Contra Costa, El Dorado, Fresno, Glenn, Humboldt, Imperial, Kern, Kings, Lake, Lassen, Los Angeles, Madera, Marin, Mariposa, Mendocino, Mono, Monterey, Napa, Nevada, Orange, Placer, Plumas, Riverside, Sacramento, San Benito, San Bernardino, San Diego, San Francisco, San Joaquin, San Luis Obispo, San Mateo, Santa Barbara, Santa Clara, Santa Cruz, Shasta, Siskiyou, Solano, Sonoma, Stanislaus, Sutter, Tehama, Trinity, Tulare, Tuolumne, Ventura, Yolo and Yuba. ★

LaMalfa Celebrates Senate Repeal of Extreme Vehicle Emissions Mandates

WASHINGTON, D.C. (MPG) - On May 22, Congressman Doug LaMalfa (R-Richvale) applauded the Senate’s passage of three Congressional Review Act (CRA) resolutions that block California’s sweeping vehicle emissions mandates from taking effect nationwide. The measures now head to President Donald Trump’s desk for signature.

“I’m happy to see the Senate follow the House in pushing back on California’s extreme vehicle mandates,” said Congressman LaMalfa. “These rules are completely unrealistic and would have made it harder for working families to afford a reliable car or truck. Forcing California’s failed model onto the rest of the country is bad policy and bad for consumers. Americans should be free to choose the vehicles that fit their lives and budgets, and I look forward to

seeing the President sign these resolutions into law.”

Congressman LaMalfa co-led the resolutions with Representatives John Joyce (R-Pennsylvania), John James (R-Michigan) and Jay Obernolte (R-California).

Under the Clean Air Act, states are generally prohibited from setting their own tailpipe emission standards for cars and trucks. However, California has a unique exemption under Section 209, which allows the state to establish its own emissions regulations if it submits a waiver to the Environmental Protection Agency (EPA) and receives approval. Once granted, these California standards can also be adopted by other states under Section 177 of the Clean Air Act. Currently, about a dozen states follow California’s emissions policies, effectively turning the state’s regulations into a nationwide mandate.

President Joe Biden’s administration approved several controversial waivers requested by the California Air Resources Board (CARB), allowing the state to impose extreme emissions rules that impact car and truck costs and availability across the country. These include:

Advanced Clean Cars II (ACC2): Approved in December 2024, this regulation mandates that 35% of new car sales be zero-emission by 2026,

increasing to 100% by 2035. At least 12 states have already adopted Advanced Clean Cars II. Failure to meet this goal means a maximum penalty of \$25,000 per non-compliant vehicle sold to consumers.

Advanced Clean Trucks (ACT): Approved in March 2023, this regulation forces truck manufacturers and retailers to meet strict zero-emission quotas by 2035, including 55% of Class 2B-3 truck sales, 75% of Class 4 to 8 straight truck sales and 40% of truck tractor sales. At least 11 states have adopted Advanced Clean Trucks.

Omnibus Low-NOx Emissions Rule: Approved in December 2024, this regulation imposes aggressive emissions reductions on medium- and heavy-duty truck and other engines, requiring NOx emissions to be cut by 75% below current standards for Model Year 2024-2026 compared to 2010 levels and particulate matter emissions to be cut by 50%.

Gavin Newsom’s Off-The-Mark Budget Numbers Undermine His Credibility Again

Governor Gavin Newsom’s revised state budget assumes California will see a sharp decline in projected revenue, largely because President Donald Trump’s tariffs will slow the nation’s economy.

Newsom blames a “Trump slump,” as well as an unanticipated increase in spending on Medi-Cal, California’s medical program for the poor, for punching a \$12 billion hole in the budget.

Both of those factors, however, underscore a consistent trend in budgets Newsom has proposed and signed during the last six years, projections of income and outgo that miss the mark, often by many billions of dollars, thus undermining the credibility of the governor’s financial depictions.

The most obvious example happened in May 2022, as the state’s economy was recovering from the brief, but severe recession caused by shutdowns during the COVID-19 pandemic.

Newsom presented a revised 2022-23 budget that was \$14 billion higher than his original proposal, boasting that the state was experiencing a \$97.5 billion surplus. “No other state in American history has ever experienced a surplus as large as this,” Newsom said as he unveiled the revision.

The budget he signed a

month later added still another \$7 billion in spending with immense new commitments, including cash payments to poor families, expanded health care for undocumented immigrants and new funds for early childhood education.

The surplus Newsom extolled, however, was an illusion. He and his budget advisors had assumed that a one-time spike in state revenues would be permanent, setting a new base of personal and corporate income taxes and sales taxes well in excess of \$200 billion a year.

But it didn’t happen.

A year ago, a brief passage in Newsom’s 2024 to 2025 budget revision acknowledged the error.

“Due to the revenue spike from 2019 to 2020 to 2021 to 2022, the budget acts of 2021 and 2022 were based on forecasts that projected substantially greater revenues in the last two fiscal years than occurred,” the budget declared.

“Substantially greater” indeed.

An accompanying chart on revenues from the state’s three major tax sources revealed that “The total difference across the four fiscal years is a negative \$165.1 billion,” meaning the error was \$40 billion or more a year.

However, the fiscal damage was done. Newsom and the Legislature had already committed the state to tens of billions of dollars in new spending based on revenues that didn’t exist. They created what’s called a structural deficit, a chronic gap between income and outgo, that’s currently estimated at \$10 billion to \$30 billion a year.

One might think that, having made such an immense error of fiscal judgment,

Newsom and his Department of Finance would be ultra-careful in projecting revenues and spending.

Apparently not.

Last year, one of those 2022 commitments based on the erroneous surplus projection, the extension of Medi-Cal coverage to everyone in the state, including undocumented immigrants, took effect. Early this year, the administration revealed Medi-Cal costs were outpacing expectations by more than \$6 billion, mostly due to the coverage expansion.

In other words, it’s a double whammy. The false assumption of budget surpluses has been compounded by a false assumption about Medi-Cal costs, thereby worsening the structural deficit that, if left to fester, would compound itself even more. The Legislative Analyst’s Office says the deficit could reach \$42 billion by 2028-29.

The administration’s sorry record on income and outgo projections should make the Legislature and the voting public very skeptical of Newsom’s current assumption that the “Trump slump” from tariffs will punch an even larger hole in the budget.

That certainly could happen, but with tariffs and their impact shifting day-to-day, putting any number on the revenue impacts is nothing more than guesswork. And we already know that the administration’s fiscal guesses are unreliable.

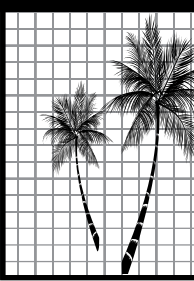

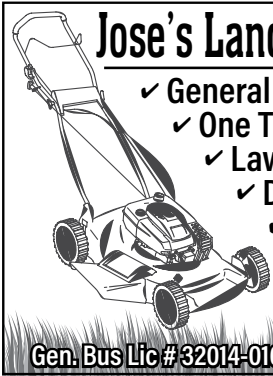

Hornets Wrap Up a Successful Year

Sacramento State Athletics News Release

GOLD RIVER, CA (MPG) - In its first appearance at the West Coast Conference (WCC) Championship as a league affiliate, Sacramento State University placed fourth out of nine schools in the final team points standings on the morning of May 17 at Lake Natoma.

There were four race categories, varsity eight (V8), second varsity eight (2V8), varsity four (V4) and second varsity four (2V4) at the West Coast Conference Championship, which began on May 16 with heat racing. Based on the results from May 16, the Hornets advanced their varsity eight, second varsity eight and varsity four to May 17's grand finals and the second varsity four qualified for the petite final.

Sacramento State University, which joined the West Coast Conference for rowing prior to this season, competed against five full-time members (Gonzaga University, Portland University, Saint Mary's College, San Diego State and Santa Clara University) as well as affiliates Creighton University, Oregon State and Washington State.

In the racing on May 17, Sacramento State University's varsity eight placed fourth in its final with a time of 6:58.18, finishing ahead of Saint Mary's College and San Diego State, respectively.

Oregon State, which is ranked 20th in the country and the only nationally ranked West Coast Conference program, finished first with a time of 6:36.16, followed by Gonzaga University and Washington State, respectively, to round out the top three.

Sacramento State's Daria Okhremtchuk and Kaylee Godwin were named to the All-West Coast Conference team.

Oregon State, in its first year in the West Coast Conference, was crowned the conference champion by virtue of winning gold in each of the points races (V8, 2V8 and V4). The Beavers placed first in all four-race category and will represent the West Coast Conference at the National Collegiate Athletic Association (NCAA) Championship May 30

through June 1 at Mercer Lake in New Jersey. The Beavers' championship snapped a string of nine consecutive West Coast Conference titles won by Gonzaga University.

This event marks the end of the season for Sacramento State University. SACRAMENTO, CA (MPG) - Sacramento State University head coach Mike Bibby announced May 1 that high-profile guard Mikey Williams will transfer from University of Central Florida and join the Hornets for the 2025- 2026 season.

Williams becomes the fifth player to sign with the Hornets since Bibby was named head coach for Sacramento State's men's basketball team on April 1. He joins senior forwards Jeremiah Cherry and Shaqir O'Neal, as well as freshmen guards Romari Robinson and Taj Glover. Local product Mark Lavrenov, a forward position, also signed with the program during the early signing period prior to Bibby's arrival.

Here is Willams basketball career background and highlights: Standing at six-foot-three inches, Willams is a 193-pound guard position originally from San Diego. He played the 2024 to 2025 season at University of Central Florida of the Big 12 Conference, after redshirting with Memphis (American Athletic Conference) during the 2023 to 2024 season. Williams will be joining as a sophomore with the Hornets. He is a four-star recruit out of high school, he was ranked as the number 19 overall player in the nation by 247Sports in the class of 2023.

Also in the class of 2023, Williams was named the number four combo guard in the country by On3 Consensus, the average ranking from all four major recruiting media companies. Last season, at University

of Central Florida, he played in 18 games (five starts) and missed 19 games due to injury. Williams averaged 5.1 points and 1.9 rebounds for the Knights and scored a season-high 14 points twice versus Iowa State, and at Oklahoma State. He also scored in double figures versus Texas Christian University. Grabbed a

season-high seven rebounds at Oklahoma State and versus Kansas State.

Williams did not see any game action at Memphis in 2023 to 2024, earning a redshirt. He was named the 2019-2020 MaxPreps national freshman of the year and after averaging 29.9 points, 6.7 rebounds, 4.9 assists and 1.6 steals while

leading San Ysidro High School (San Diego) to the California Interscholastic Federation-San Diego Section title. He scored a San Diego Section single-game record 77 points with nine three-pointers as a freshman in a 116-52 win over Kearny High School. He played for San Ysidro High School during both his freshman

and senior seasons, where he averaged 23.8 points, 9.2 assists and 3.2 rebounds during his senior season. He spent his sophomore season at Lake Norman Christian Academy in Davidson, North Carolina and as a junior, he played at Vertical Academy in Charlotte where he was rated the number one junior in North Carolina. That season at Vertical Academy, he averaged 24.2 points, 7.1 rebounds and 6.0 assists while playing in showcase tournaments across the country.

Williams is also a social media star, having a combined 5.4 million followers across Instagram and TikTok.

“We’re excited to bring Mikey into the family. He’s an incredibly talented player with something to prove, and this is the right environment for him to grow, both on and off the court,” said Bibby. ★
