Sayonara Project Breaks Ground

CITRUS HEIGHTS, CA (MPG) - Some 14 gold-plated shovels struck the earth the morning of June 2, marking the start of construction of eight new homes being built by Habitat for Humanity of Greater Sacramento in partnership with the City of Citrus Heights at 7795 Sayonara Drive.

Construction of the first phase of a planned 26-home residential project that has now started has been three years in the making, said Leah Miller,

president and CEO of Habitat for Humanity of Greater Sacramento.

Miller welcomed and thanked Congressman Ami Bera who helped secure federal funding for the \$8 million project, representatives of local nonprofit organizations including the Rotary and Kiwanis Clubs, and city planning officials who were instrumental in guiding the project forward.

The Sayonara Drive project is Habitat for Humanity of Greater Sacramento's largest project to date, Miller said.

District Attorney's Office Holds Youth Shadow Day

SACRAMENTO COUNTY, CA (MPG) - High school students in Sacramento County can shadow an array of positions within the criminal justice system through a pairing process at this year's Criminal Justice Shadow Day and Crime Lab Shadow Day, according to the Sacramento County District Attorney's Office. The one-day events are on July 11 and July 25. Spaces are limited and the deadline to register for both events is June 27.

The DA's office partnered with different programs agencies to coordinate a comprehensive and engaging learning experience and has offered the program for many years.

According to the DA's office, the DA's Youth Academy has had great success and an overwhelming positive response from the thousands of students reached from schools and neighborhoods across the county.

The program's goal is to encourage students to pursue a career within the criminal justice system and steer them away from criminal conduct, according to the DA's office.

The Criminal Justice Shadow Day takes place from 8 a.m. to 1 p.m. July 11 at the Jan Scully Training Center on 906 G St., Sacramento, according to a flier from the DA's office.

For the Criminal Justice Shadow Day, prosecuting attorneys, defense attorneys, probation officers, law enforcement officers, investigators and judges will provide students with first-hand experience regarding different processes in the criminal justice system, according to the DA's office.

The Crime Lab Shadow Day classes will take place on July 25 from 9 a.m. to noon and 1 p.m. to 4 p.m., with lunch provided between noon and 1 p.m.

Two sessions will be offered for the Crime Lab Shadow Day with one in the morning and one in the afternoon. Registration for each session will take place 30 minutes prior to the start of the class and lunch will be provided during both sessions, according to the DA's office.

During the Crime Lab Shadow Day, students can expect to learn the

Sustainability Scholarship Winners Honored

CITRUS HEIGHTS, CA (MPG) - At the May 28 Citrus Heights City Council meeting, waste management agency Republic Services presented some highlights from 2024.

Rather than being shipped several hours away for sorting, recyclables are now being processed at a facility in North Highlands.

This local focus reduces vehicle miles and provides more direct insight into the process.

Also in 2024, Republic Services moved residential food waste to an Anaerobic Digestion Facility in Oroville, where it is used for electricity production. The residential compost program was also expanded, giving free compost to Citrus Heights

residents at various locations throughout the city.

Republic Services is contractually required to divert 40% of items away from landfills and last year hit its highest diversion rate at 50.7%, an 11.6% increase over 10 years.

In partnership with the City of Citrus Heights and the San Juan Education Foundation, Republic Services announced the

winners of the 2025 Sustainability Scholarship, which is awarded each year to Citrus Heights students graduating from the San Juan Unified School District.

The scholarship is awarded to students pursuing a degree in sustainability or to benefit the environment. Applicants competed in an essay

contest about their career goals and two winners were selected to receive \$1,000 each.

Makenzie Dawson from Mesa Verde High School plans to attend Sierra Community College where she'll pursue a science degree to become a traveling veterinarian.

Tristyn Scott from Del Campo High School will attend California State University, Monterey Bay for a marine science degree, focusing on the migration routes of great white sharks.

City Council also heard a presentation by the Sacramento-Yolo Mosquito & Vector Control District, a regional agency that aims to protect residents from mosquitos and the diseases they carry. They set traps and track transmission levels in addition to helping residents reduce mosquito breeding areas. To report an infestation or learn more, visit online.fightthebite.net.

During Public Comment, a resident thanked the Citrus Heights Police Department IMPACT Team for improving the situation in his neighborhood. Because many of the problems involved trash and noise levels, he said, it took a while to be addressed but there is now significant improvement.

The IMPACT Unit is comprised of specially-trained detectives in the areas of problem and community-oriented policing, street-level narcotic enforcement, violent offender monitoring, fugitive apprehension, general nuisance abatement and Crime Prevention through Environmental Design (CPTED), according to the Citrus Heights Police Department's website.

City Council considered a request for a Letter of Public Convenience and Necessity (PCN) to allow a Type 21 license for the sale of beer, wine and spirits at Rangoon Grocery.

The approval of alcohol sale licenses is governed by the California Department of Alcoholic Beverage Control (ABC) but a Letter of Public Convenience and Necessity must be approved by City Council when the request involves an area with an overconcentration of active alcohol licenses.

Rangoon Grocery, located at 7601 Sunrise Blvd., has been in operation since 2023 and focuses on Burmese and Asian grocery items. The license was requested to sell specialty alcoholic beverages from these cultures, such as a variety of saké, Vietnamese rice wines and draft beers, Japanese beers and whiskeys, Korean soju, Thailand Singha and Chang beer, and Chinese baijiu.

There are four active alcohol licenses in that census tract but only two of those include distilled spirits. The applicant submitted a detailed safety plan and the Citrus Heights Police Department had no objections to the license approval.

Vice-Mayor MariJane Lopez-Taff asked if the Letter of Public Convenience and Necessity would carry over to a new owner if the store is sold and staff explained that any new business at the location would have to apply for its own alcohol license and undergo the same process.

During Public Comment, several owners from other liquor stores in Citrus Heights spoke in opposition to the request, stating that allowing another store to sell alcohol would negatively impact their businesses.

Some residents expressed concerns that there is plenty of homeless activity in that area and adding another liquor store would not improve the situation.

Councilmember Tim Schaefer said that particular location changed ownership many times in the past, and if the council can give this business "a real shot at survival," it would "stabilize our business market there"

Schaefer said it was a reasonable request because the alcohol the business plans to sell is specific to the cultures served there.

Councilmember Kelsey Nelson agreed that the license would benefit "an underserved market."

Lopez-Taff said she was concerned about the homeless issues and the proximity to schools, so she would not support liquor sales at that location.

Mayor Jayna Karpinski-Costa said that issues surrounding homelessness would not be impacted and it wouldn't be fair to deny businesses because of an issue it can't control. She said the owner is responsible and the Citrus Heights Police Department doesn't have any concerns about the license. Karpinski-Costa said the sales probably would not impact other businesses because Rangoon Grocery would offer specialty items.

"I'd like to give the guy a shot. I think that there is a public necessity to have those weird beverages. You know, they kind of go with the weird food that they sell," Karpinski-Costa said

City Council voted 3-1 to approve the Letter of Public Convenience and Necessity, with Lopez-Taff dissenting and Councilmember Porsche Middleton absent.

Council then heard a report about the city's vacancies, recruitment and retention efforts, in compliance with Assembly Bill 2561, which went into effect in January and requires an annual public hearing.

The city has a total of 210.75 budgeted staff positions and in 2024, filled 41 vacancies from a vacancy rate of 15% in January, reduced to 8% by December.

The staff review looked at obstacles in recruitment and found that the process, language and format of employment applications need some improvement. So staff are working to redesign the process and make it more user-friendly. They are also working with Civic Match, a free service that expands candidate outreach to all the recently displaced federal workers.

The city's strengths include a high retention rate of 89%.

Karpinski-Costa said, "I really think our staff just enjoys the workplace and our policies and our culture that we have here."

The council received and filed the report, as no action was required.

Staff also provided an update about the newly implemented guidelines for the Neighborhood Clean-Up Program, which allows residents to set out bulky trash items for collection three times per year.

Problems in the past included some residents putting out more items than allowed or putting the piles out more than 48 hours prior to the scheduled pick up, creating blight and encouraging scavenging.

After exploring various options, new guidelines were approved last year and implemented this January. The new policy includes a \$166.30 penalty, added to the customer's bill, for not following the requirements. The new guidelines also allow for more flexibility in enforcement and customers can request extra time if needed.

City Manager Ashley Feeney updated the council about a Sacramento Municipal Utility District (SMUD) project to replace a major transformer this winter at their Sunrise Substation, just south of Sayonara Drive. It will require modifications to the median and the removal of eight palm trees, which will be done this summer.

Karpinski-Costa asked to reopen the discussion of annexing some parcels at the corner of Fair Oaks Boulevard and Madison Avenue. Staff will investigate and report at a future City Council meeting. The next Citrus Heights City Council meeting is scheduled for June 11. ★

Completion of all 26 units is scheduled for 2027.

"It's a testament to what's possible, when so many partners collaborate and share a vision to see a project succeed," Miller said.

Miller recalled a past meeting with Congressman Bera on a hot summer morning on Sayonara Drive when congressional funding for the project was first being sought.

"We've come a long way to this day," Miller said, over the sounds of heavy equipment busily working behind her from the podium.

Habitat for Humanity of Greater Sacramento will fill the 12 vacant city-owned lots with 26 new single-family homes, which are to be owned, not rented. The project fulfills an obligation for housing that the City of Citrus Heights was initially required to meet within five years.

Miller described the project as a "symbol of renewal and resilience" of the greater Sayonara Drive neighborhood.

The initial eight first-time home buyers whom Habitat for Humanity selects in this phase will create a street "full of hope, stability and pride of first-time home ownership."

Construction on the first eight homes in the Habitat for Humanity Sayonara project starts in July, after ground leveling and site improvement work on the vacant land is completed.

Habitat for Humanity of Greater Sacramento received 300 applicants for the first eight homes to be built. Selection of the eight qualified partners is now in process, Miller said.

The number of applications that Habitat for Humanity of Greater Sacramento received for the first eight homes it will build wasn't unusual, Miller said, but attests to the strong need for new affordable single-family housing in a city such as Citrus Heights that is largely built out.

Construction of the new units on Sayonara Drive by Habitat for Humanity of Greater Sacramento on the 12 vacant city-owned lots in Citrus Heights, using CalHome funding, will meet the city's obligation to replace blighted rental units that were demolished between

2008 and 2010.

"We're breathing new life into Sayonara Drive, and we're proud to be a partner in this project," said Mayor Jayna Karpinsky-Costa. "Together, we're building a safe, stable community."

City Manager Ash Feeney recognized Nichole Piva and Allison Bermudez of the city's planning department for their roles in guiding the project through the city's administrative permitting process.

The Sayonara project deeply reflects both the city's shared values and its vision for the future, Feeney said.

Bera recalled his experience as a Habitat for Humanity volunteer when he was teaching medical students who joined him on a job site. He is "looking forward to taking a break from Washington, D.C., hopefully when the weather's cooler" to volunteer his time toward the completion of some of the project homes.

The new community will include 26 homes ranging from two- to five-bedrooms, all equipped with energy-efficient heating systems, low-flow plumbing fixtures, alarm systems, solar battery storage, rooftop solar and drought-tolerant landscaping. The homes will also be EV-ready, supporting the region's goals for sustainability and affordability.

Construction will be done in three stages of eight to 10 units per stage, with each stage taking approximately a year to complete.

Qualified home buyers are required to contribute 500 hours of "sweat equity" during construction. Successful applicants who meet specific Habitat for Humanity of Greater Sacramento program criteria can qualify for a 30-year, zero-percent equivalent mortgage.

The new all-electric, duet style homes feature drought-tolerant landscaping, energy-efficient heating systems, low-flow plumbing systems, security alarm systems, solar battery storage and rooftop solar panels.

The city estimates that construction of the first eight residential homes will be finished in 2026 and that applications for the next phase of eight additional homes will then follow. Construction on the remaining 10 homes will begin in 2027. ★

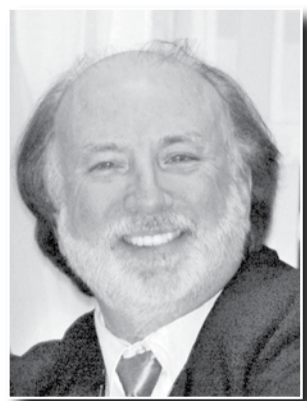
importance of evidence preservation and the chain of custody, observe bullet trajectory and presumptive blood testing, review crime scene investigations and see real drug chemistry in play, according to the DA's website.

The programs are free and representatives are provided by partnering agencies. They benefit high school students, the

criminal justice system and the community at large, according to the DA's office.

These honorees exemplify the power of volunteerism, and the role older adults play in building stronger communities.

The 2025 award recipients, representing each of the county's five districts, were formally recognized during the May 20 Board of Supervisors meeting.

Nearly 15 years ago, Gene Inderkum, from district one, started volunteering as an ambassador at Sacramento International Airport (SMF), helping travelers navigate the terminals.

"I love the airport, I love the activity there, I love being in the airport's atmosphere," said Inderkum.

Following the COVID-19 pandemic, Inderkum stepped up even further by training new volunteers. Inderkum can often be seen greeting passengers and helping those who have questions.

"I enjoy helping the people here and it's just something that makes you feel good,"

said Inderkum.

Barbara Heinrich, from district two, has been a driving force behind Sacramento County's Gifts from the Heart program for more than 20 years. Heinrich's work has touched thousands of lives over the last two decades. Heinrich packages dolls and action figures for foster kids, designing clothes and decorating boxes for each individual doll.

"I got started because a friend of mine wanted me to make Barbie clothes for her daughter. Then I started putting the boxes together and didn't have any place to give them to. My sister worked for the Child Protective Services program and

she told me about this program," Heinrich said.

Heinrich said that Gifts from the Heart is always looking for volunteers and donors, and there are several different ways to get involved.

"The people are great and there's something for everyone, really. You can deliver gifts and get to see people's faces when they receive the gifts. You can wrap," said Heinrich.

With more than two decades of service on the Carmichael Homeless Assistance Resource Team board, Barbara Farley, from district three, has shown dedication to supporting individuals experiencing homelessness.

Her work has helped establish transitional housing projects such as Charlotte House, providing much-needed shelter to those in need. Farley's advocacy continues to inspire real change in her community.

Bonnie Shewchuk, from district four, is an active member of the Kiwanis Club of Rancho Murieta, where she embodies the club's mission to "change the world, one community and one child at a time." Whether organizing local events or supporting youth programs, Shewchuk's contributions uplift the Rancho Murieta community and reflect a commitment to service.

Tony Rutचना, from district

five, brings energy and enthusiasm to his volunteer work with students at Lake Canyon Elementary and Arocho School.

"I had an unhappy childhood in elementary school, long story short. As an adult, I said you know what, no child should be unhappy and that's why I'm here," Rutचना said.

As an instructor for chess, checkers, dominoes, sports and gardening, Rutचना plays a big role in school-wide and after-school activities. Rutचना said his theme is "living the dream," something he encourages the youth to do by finding what makes them happy.

"I think at the end of the day, we should all try to give back in some kind of way. Everybody has their own niche, and once you retire or even if you're not retired and you've got a lot of time on your hands, I think giving back is a good thing. It makes you feel good about yourself; it makes others feel good," said Rutचना.

As Sacramento County celebrated Older Americans Month, the Five Over 50 Volunteer Award winners remind us that age is no barrier to meaningful contribution. These five volunteers are not only role models in Sacramento County, but they are also a reminder that when you combine your passion with helping others, you can make a lasting impact. ★

position requires Senate confirmation and the compensation is \$208,440. McClain is a Democrat.

Governor Newsom announced Martin Tejada's appointment to the Sacramento Superior Court bench on May 15.

"Martin Tejada's appointment to the bench is a testament to his commitment to justice and

his exceptional skill in navigating the complexities of the legal system," Sacramento Superior Court Presiding Judge Bunmi O. Awoniyi said.

Tejada of Yolo County has served as a commissioner at the Sacramento Superior Court since November 2022.

"Throughout his time as commissioner, he has been an invaluable asset, expertly managing some of our most challenging calendars with grace and dedication," Awoniyi added. "His extensive experience in criminal law will undoubtedly continue to be a vital asset to our court, ensuring fairness and integrity in every decision he makes."

Prior to joining the bench, Tejada worked as a defense attorney out of his own law practice from 2005 to 2022. He previously served as a deputy public defender at the Sacramento Public Defender's Office from 2001 to 2004 and as an attorney at the Law Office of James Kuppenbender from 2000 to 2001.

Tejada received a Bachelor of Arts degree in English from the University of Nevada, Las Vegas and his Juris Doctor from McGeorge School of Law. He was admitted to the state bar in 2000.

Tejada took the judicial oath on May 8, filling the vacancy created by Judge Dena Coggins's appointment to the federal court.

Newsom announced on May 7 that Mary Kennedy of Sacramento was appointed to the Committee on the Revision of the Penal Code. Kennedy was chief counsel for the California State Senate Committee on Public Safety from 2017 to 2024 and previously counsel from 1996 to 2017. Kennedy earned a Juris Doctor degree from the University of the Pacific McGeorge School of Law and a Bachelor of Arts degree in mass communications from Saint Mary's College, Notre Dame.

This position does not require Senate confirmation and there is no compensation. Kennedy is a Democrat. ★

SMUD to Issue \$300 Million in Revenue Bonds

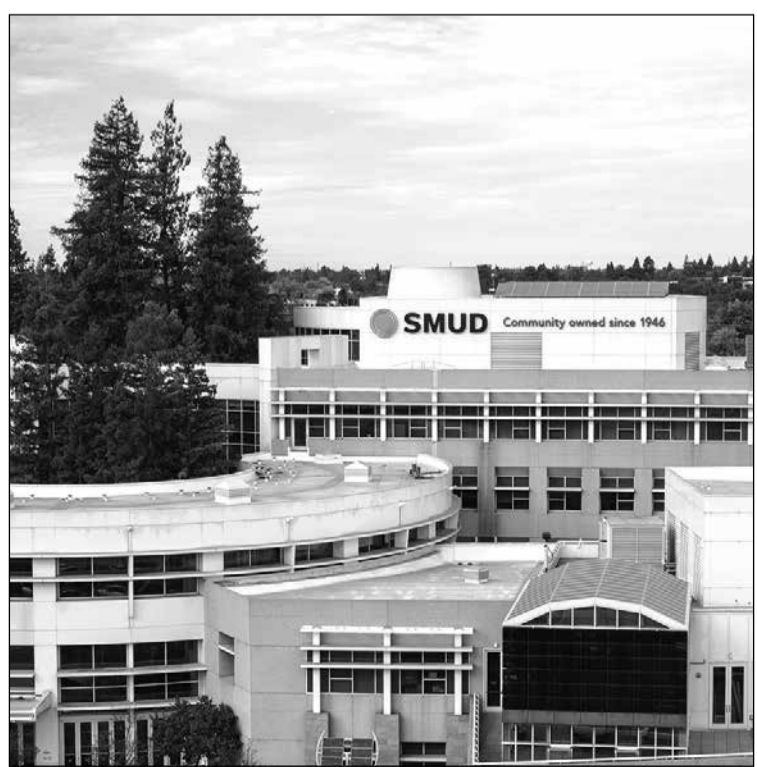

Breaking Barriers to Employment 101

SACRAMENTO COUNTY, CA (MPG) - Job hunting is stressful, even under the best of circumstances.

Imagine if you had limited access to a shower, no professional clothing choices and your transportation to and from work was intermittent, at best.

Add to that a gap in your work history, a lost social security card and no access to a computer to submit applications or access email consistently.

Sounds impossible, right?

Let's throw one more (and the hardest to overcome) wrench in the cog: the stigma of being homeless.

Unfortunately, this is a very harsh reality for many people experiencing homelessness who desperately want a job. Lack of identification and limited access to a computer make the application process nearly impossible.

At the Sacramento County's Mather Community Campus adult singles shelter, operator Next Move is breaking down barriers one program participant at a time.

With the newly-created Employment Development Program, Shelby Greenhill works tirelessly on behalf of her program participants to address the challenges of being job-ready and finding and keeping a job. It is an uphill battle, with the stigma of hiring a homeless person at the top of the list.

"In my research, I came across a 2020 study involving more than 600 employers. More than half of them mistakenly believed it was illegal to hire a homeless person for employment," said Greenhill, the program's sole manager. "Furthermore, 20 percent expressed concerns that hiring a homeless person would have a 'negative' effect on their non-homeless employees."

If you've ever had the thought, "If people would just get a job, they wouldn't be homeless," keep reading; this is for you.

Many folks experiencing homelessness are hired for swing shift or night shift work, making transportation a critical factor in maintaining stable employment.

Unfortunately, that means they might be working outside the hours public transportation operates (5 a.m. to 11 p.m.), leaving many folks without a reliable method of getting to and from work. One program participant reported she spends nearly \$400 a month on Uber/Lyft fees, representing nearly half her monthly income.

If the program had a large van(s) and staffing to drive, these clients could be transported to/from work and ensure they do not lose job opportunities due to transportation concerns, as well as

open night shift/off-hours opportunities. Even those working traditional hours need transportation to and from work every day. The program provides bus passes but many folks are walking a significant distance to the bus stop or their place of employment because they do not own a car.

Documentation is a major barrier for people experiencing homelessness, as essential items such as a photo identification (ID) and Social Security card are often required for both employment and housing. When you don't have a file cabinet, safe deposit box or even a folder to keep your vital documents, keeping track of those items is a challenge.

The Next Move employment program provides vouchers and transportation to appointments for participants to replace lost photo identification cards.

Access to technology is a critical issue, as applying for a job at nearly any business requires internet access, a phone and potentially a printer. The employment program helps participants secure a phone, has a computer lab and personal assistance searching for jobs, as well as it offers help with the application process.

Hygiene plays a crucial role in self-presentation. Imagine going on a job interview without consistent access to a shower or professional-level, clean clothing and shoes that fit. For those living in shelters, they can at least shower and do laundry leading up to an interview but what about folks still living on the street?

Even for those in shelter, accessing professional clothing that fits well and is appropriate for their job interview can feel insurmountable. Next Move is collecting professional-level clothing and shoes in all sizes, for both men and women, to build a closet for participants to shop

from leading up to an interview. Every single person deserves to search for work with dignity.

A criminal record is another significant barrier. For those program participants who can overcome all the aforementioned challenges, this one often stops them in their tracks.

Most job applications ask if someone has been convicted of a felony, some even a misdemeanor. Check no, risk the job for lying. Check yes, you probably never make it out of "the pile."

People make mistakes and bad choices. And people change. Marquies was in prison for 17 years for a crime he committed when he was 18 years old. He knows that he screwed up; he did his time, and after he was released, he chose homelessness over re-offending. Marquies is desperate for a job, pounding the proverbial pavement daily in search of a job he can be proud to work. He is bright, well-mannered, well-dressed, passionate and motivated. And it's still not enough because of his ancient past. The desperation and hopelessness show in his voice; not only does he want a job for income and stability but he also needs a job to improve his self-image.

Greenhill is working closely with Marquies and leveraging the relationships she has built with businesses that are "felon-friendly," meaning they will hire people with a conviction if the circumstances are right. Given a chance, Marquies is going to be a great employee.

The stigma of homelessness is perhaps the highest mountain that Greenhill's program participants have to climb, as they face societal prejudice and stereotypes that paint them as lazy, unclean, on drugs or thieves. Even when they are clean, educated and ready to rebuild their lives.

Kayla is a trained pharmacy technician. After relocating to California and finding herself homeless, the fees associated with getting relicensed in a new state were a huge barrier to her working in her field. Fortunately, the employment program at Mather has paid for her licensing and background check fees and provided her with ongoing vocational training to keep up her license requirements. It has also given her access to clothing and transportation options needed to get a job.

But Kayla knows that isn't the end of her challenges. She talks with passion and conviction about overcoming the stigma of "being homeless," even though in no way could anyone tell she's homeless by looking at her.

"It shows up in subtle differences as you integrate into a workplace, with coworkers. You don't have lunch to bring, you always take the bus and you only have two to three different outfits to rotate through," Kayla said. "People notice and start asking questions. And unless you're a good liar, eventually people find out you live in a homeless shelter. They immediately start judging you, treating you differently."

And constantly trying to present as "normal" is exhausting and mentally taxing.

Homelessness, particularly unsheltered homelessness, is a crisis in our society. It is a community problem that requires a community solution. People want change, both systemically and visually. While access to employment and income can't solve everything, it's a vital first step toward self-sufficiency.

The community can provide tangible assistance to these societal issues. If you have usable, clean professional clothing, donate. If you have a working vehicle you're no longer using,

donate it to someone who desperately needs it. If you own a business or manage hiring, hire people who are unhoused but stable, hard-working and reliable. If you have no means to donate or hire, advocate for those who do.

Most importantly, remember that these are real people with real history and real feelings. Committed to changing their circumstances, passionate, driven people who were just like you at one point. Life slapped them down; we can lend them a hand back up.

Greenhill and the employment program are doing an incredible and tireless job of advocating for their program participants. Cold calling businesses, collecting donations and supplies, following up with businesses that said "no" and providing practical and emotional support for people who feel hopeless. Barriers are being broken, slowly but surely.

The program has already helped 21 participants obtain jobs since Jan.13 and enrolled 20 participants in training and schooling.

Current participants are on the brink of graduation to become nurse's assistants, obtaining guard cards to become security guards, and a few are working with Northern California Construction Training to become electricians and welders!

Kayla appreciates having an advocate, someone who knows everything, knows the barriers and is shattering them one at a time. She'll have her pharmacy tech job soon enough.

Marquies, still baffled about how hard it is for him to find a job, is appreciative.

"This program is saving my life. I want to work and I know it is just a matter of time before I find my place, thanks to Shelby and their support. But this truly is saving my life." ★

At the end of every NBA season and playoffs, there are 29 disappointed franchises. That's 29 cities in America that are not celebrating. It's always been that way, and it probably always will be. Only one winner, one champion, can be crowned.

Many Sacramento Kings fans are closely watching the playoffs, where defense has taken center stage. The Boston Celtics, for example, struggled after losing star Jayson Tatum to an Achilles tear in Game 4 against the Knicks.

That same intense defense has been the dominant factor in nearly every playoff series this year, and the Indiana Pacers New York Nick series was clear evidence that defense wins the day.

Long wing players that can move and play help defense will be coveted as the off-season trades begin, and Sacramento will be right in the mix of it.

The Kings feature an upcoming Keon Ellis and Keegan Murray who fit the skill model, but the real question is can the Kings retain these players and build around them with more of the same.

Two players that have been prominently mentioned are Jrue Holiday of the Boston Celtics, and Herb Jones of the Charlotte Hornets. Holiday at age 34 may be on the other side of his prime, so look for the Kings to have more interest in Jones who at 6'7" is 3 inches taller and only 26 years old.

The Pelicans have indicated that they are in trade mode, so Herb Jones may be wearing a different Jersey in November.

The question is what Charlotte would want in return for a player on the way up, and the answer is someone of the caliber of Malik Monk. Like DeAaron Fox, Monk is a fan favorite, whether this trade would be popular among fans remains to be seen. At the end of the day, fans need to brace themselves as the likelihood of several changes remains strong.

New GM Scott Perry is playing his cards close to the vest. Although the Sacramento faithful would like some direction, Perry will start making moves when he's ready.

About the only thing that he has really indicated is that the Kings need a point guard. It's unlikely that a new GM will roll the dice on a second-year player like

Devin Carter and hope that he can break-out and be the starting point guard that can replace DeAaron Fox.

The NBA finals begin on Thursday, and fans will be treated to two teams that feature some of the best defense you are likely see. Look for low scoring physical games, with the referees swallowing the whistle more and more. The focus will be on the long wing players and the number of times they can get their hands on the ball.

Every Sacramento Kings fan is eager to know Scott Perry's plans, and I'm hoping he's considering building around Domantas Sabonis and Jonas Valanciunas. Not only do both have dominant skills they pose all kinds of problems for teams that like to drive the lane. With both Sabonis and Valanciunas, Perry has more options and can play these two side by side from time to time.

With the #5 spot already secured, the Kings need to target the point guard position and try to add one longer wing player like the aforementioned Herb Jones.

Whether trades begin in earnest now or after the finals conclude, be assured the Kings have moves in mind. That means surprises are in store, but very soon Sacramento fans are going to see the acumen of Scott Perry in full view.

It seems like a lifetime since the Kings went deep into the playoffs, but a capable GM and staff can make a difference, so this writer remains optimistic that the 2025/2026 version of the Sacramento Kings can be something to be proud of.

Grow the young players that we have. Covet them and don't waste them in meaningless trades and fill in the bland spots where the Kings have obvious needs.

Seems simple, but it is anything but. Nonetheless, it's always possible that Christmas may come early just as the Dallas Mavericks discovered in the recent NBA draft.

So, let's see if Scott Perry can catch lightning in a bottle, and Sacramento can celebrate once again.

Keep the faith Kings fans. I still believe the best is yet to come!

Social Security Matters

How do I apply for Social Security?

Dear Rusty: I just turned 65 years old in February 2025. I need to sign up for Social Security but don't even know where to start. **Signed: Seeking Assistance**

Dear Seeking: It is fairly easy to sign up for your Social Security benefits, by either calling the Social Security Administration at 1.800.772.1213 or your local SS office, to make a telephone appointment to apply, or by completing your application for Social Security benefits online at www.ssa.gov/apply. However, to apply for benefits online you will need to first create your personal "my Social Security" account at www.ssa.gov/myaccount. Once you have your personal account set up, you can apply directly from that account and also see an estimate of your SS benefits at different ages.

You may already be aware that age 65 is not your Social Security full retirement age, or "FRA." Your FRA is when you

get 100% of the benefit you've earned from a lifetime of working. By taking benefits at age 65, your monthly amount will be reduced (to about 87% of your FRA amount; a permanent reduction). Born in 1960, your FRA is age 67, which means you will be taking your SS benefit about two years early and also means that – if you are still working – you will be subject to Social Security's Annual Earnings Test (AET). The AET limits how much you can earn before some of your benefits are taken away. For 2025, the annual earnings limit is \$23,400 and, if that is exceeded, SS will take back \$1 in benefits for every \$2 you are over the limit (they take benefits back by withholding future payments long enough to recover what you owe).

So, you can apply for your Social Security benefits, as indicated above, either online or by calling SS for an appointment. Just be aware that by applying at age 65 your benefit will be permanently reduced, and you will be subject to Social Security's earnings limit (the earnings limit lasts until you reach your FRA, after which you can earn as much as you like without penalty).

Also, because you are 65, if you wish to enroll in Medicare, please be aware that you don't need to take your Social Security

benefits to enroll in Medicare. You can enroll in Medicare (only) by calling Social Security as explained above or enrolling in Medicare online. Here is a link which explains how to enroll in only Medicare: <https://www.ssa.gov/medicare/sign-up>.

Why Did the California Senate Shunt a Cost-Cutting Housing Bill?

Last month, RAND, a prominent think tank based in Santa Monica, published an exhaustive study on housing costs that devastatingly proves how California has been undermining its official goal of increasing production.

After examining more than 100 multifamily projects in three states, RAND concluded that building them in California is 2.8 times as expensive as in Texas and 1.5 times higher than in Colorado, "with much of the difference driven by state and local policies that contribute to long permitting and construction timelines, and higher local development fees."

Even more shockingly, RAND found that projects for low-income families cost 1.5 times as much to build as market-rate housing in California and four times the average cost in Texas.

Last week, the California Senate appeared to double down on making housing

development more difficult and costly, shunting a bill aimed at making it easier to build housing for lower-income families by exempting some projects from the California Environmental Quality Act.

Senate Bill 607, carried by state Sen. Scott Wiener, a San Francisco Democrat, was gutted in the Senate Appropriations Committee, apparently because Senate leaders such as President Pro Tem Mike McGuire caved into fierce opposition from environmental groups and labor unions, which celebrated the move. The committee announced that SB 607's contents were being stripped out and replaced by vague language declaring intentions to negotiate further, leaving the fate of the proposal unclear.

Those who either oppose housing projects on environmental grounds or demand concessions, such as requiring them to use union construction labor, have often used — or misused — CEQA as a tool. Over the last half-decade, the Legislature and Gov. Gavin Newsom have nibbled at CEQA's provisions, but when SB 607 was introduced, environmental and labor groups drew an opposition line in the sand.

After the bill was bowdlerized last week, the coalition praised McGuire

and other Senate leaders "for recognizing that the language of SB 607 would have created significant unintended consequences on communities and new legal uncertainties."

Just days earlier, Newsom had urged the Legislature to pass SB 607 and a similar measure, Assembly Bill 609, as much-needed reforms to increase housing development.

"It's time to get serious about this issue, period, full stop," Newsom said. "If you care about your kids you care about getting this done. This is the biggest opportunity to do something big and bold and the only impediment is us."

The SB 607 blockage may indicate that Newsom is losing clout with the Legislature as he nears lame duck status. However, he could revive the bill as part of the forthcoming negotiations over the state budget, as a statement by Wiener and McGuire suggested.

The RAND study reveals why the state is falling behind.

Putin is Playing Trump

It was never going to be easy for President Trump to bring an end to the Ukraine war, but it's even harder when he's operating under an erroneous theory of the conflict.

The man who instigated the war and who is the chief obstacle to peace is Vladimir Putin. Yet, this enemy of the West, murderer of dissidents and serial perpetrator of wars of territorial aggrandizement has never been subjected to the same U.S. pressure campaign as Ukrainian President Volodymyr Zelenskyy, whose fundamental offense is to be leading a country that his larger neighbor wants to subjugate.

After a much-anticipated phone call with Putin on Monday, Trump sounded optimistic and said Ukraine and Russia would keep negotiating, although there was no indication of anything new.

After the browbeating he took in the Oval Office a few months ago and a pause in U.S. intelligence assistance, Zelenskyy got the message. He's done everything possible to portray himself as the reasonable one who's interested in pursuing a deal.

A U.S.-proposed general ceasefire? Zelenskyy has said he's willing to accept it. Russia's idea for direct talks in Istanbul? Zelenskyy

said he'd go himself.

He signed a critical minerals deal with the U.S. Putin, in contrast, has been at the receiving end of an all-carrots approach, and has reacted accordingly.

One of Trump's advantages on the world stage is that he can make use of the "mad man theory," the idea that he's so unpredictable and potentially extreme that it's best not to displease him. Against type, Trump has been less the madman with Putin than the therapist who speaks in dulcet tones, is understanding to a fault and is determinedly nonjudgmental.

Pretty much whatever Putin does, Trump says someone else would do the same in his circumstances. Putin could nuke Warsaw, and Trump might observe, "Well, it's a shame and I hope he doesn't do it again."

Trump almost never strikes a pleading tone, but when Putin launched a large-scale strike on Kyiv last month, Trump posted on Truth Social, "Vladimir, STOP!"

The play for the Kremlin is obvious here. It wants to keep inching ahead with territorial gains, and if it continues to string along negotiations, has to hope that Trump tires of the whole thing and cuts off U.S. aid to Ukraine. That would reward Putin's intransigence with an important diplomatic victory -- a split between the U.S. and Europe -- and a chance to make major advances against an increasingly hard-pressed Ukraine.

Trump at times seems to realize this, and has referred to Putin "tapping me along." But the master at

establishing leverage in negotiations has failed to do so over Putin. In part, this is because the president has absorbed his MAGA base's view that Putin isn't really the problem -- the Russian leader was baited into war by globalists who took insufficient account of Russia's interests and feelings.

Whatever one thinks of the policy of NATO expansion, Ukraine didn't invade Russia, and Putin's opposition to Ukraine's existence as its own independently governed nation is at the root of the war.

So long as Putin believes that he's winning and holds "all of the cards," there's no reason for him to become more pliable. Trump and other administration officials have floated further economic measures against Russia, but these would probably be of limited utility. If the administration stipulated that if Putin doesn't drop his maximalist demands -- basically for a Ukraine that can't defend itself -- it will back Ukraine to the hilt, that might change his calculations.

Russia's gains have come at a hideous cost -- nearly a million Russian casualties since the start of the war. If Ukraine isn't going to buckle and the U.S. isn't going to abandon her, then the Russians could reach a point of exhaustion.

Short of that, Putin has every reason to think he can persevere when the world's superpower has little sympathy for the victim of his unprovoked aggression.

UC Davis Master of Management Program Provides Opportunities for Graduate Aggies

DAVIS, CA (MPG) - Not every college athlete turns pro, so UC Davis prioritizes preparing student-athletes for life after sports. A new collaboration with the UC Davis Graduate School of Management (GSM) helps to create a new pathway that extends student-athletes' collegiate careers while preparing them for post-competition success.

Out of that collaboration came the Master of Management (MM), a one-year program that evolved over time as UC Davis looked to refine an ever-changing post-collegiate landscape. While the athletic department was looking for a way to offer undergraduate Aggies a chance to continue their time at Davis, the Master of Management degree also offered an avenue to easily bring in graduate student-athletes from other top programs in the country, including the likes of Harvard and Dartmouth.

"When we started the program, we saw our market as people graduating from UC Davis where job opportunities were not immediately apparent so a master in management would provide an introduction to management and new opportunities in the job world," said Michael and Joelle Hurlston Dean and Professor of Marketing H. Rao Unnava.

"But over time I had conversations with (Director of Athletics) Rocko (DeLuca) and with UC Davis being a place where the scholarly part of 'student-athlete' is focused on an opportunity to provide for student-athletes looking to continue their education presented itself."

This past season, 21 Aggie student-athletes took part in the first-year Master of Management program, including football, baseball, men's golf, lacrosse, men's track and field, volleyball and women's tennis. And of that list of 21, there were eight who transferred in from other institutions to continue their education at Davis. In addition, two other football players and a men's basketball player enrolled in the Graduate School of Management's two-year Full-Time MBA program.

"It's a real easy recruiting pitch when you're telling a young man he could get his masters paid for at a university like UC Davis," said football head coach Tim Plough. "The pitch is that you can help us win a championship and we can help you further your career beyond football. Having a master's degree from UC Davis is a life-changing occurrence and playing football at UC Davis allows you to compete for a championship."

On the gridiron, several graduate Aggies who took the program played a pivotal role in the team's historic 11-win season that saw UC Davis football finish No. 5 in the nation following a deep Football Championship Series playoff run.

Graduate transfer David Meyer was a multiple All-American who led the team in total tackles and interceptions, and he even sealed an Aggie win early in the season with a pick-six.

The Master of Management program also allowed quarterback Miles Hastings to play one more season in the blue & gold, putting together a season for the ages. Hastings, who

was a Walter Payton Award finalist and multiple All-American, became the first Aggie to throw for over 4,000 yards in a season while also chucking 38 touchdown passes to lead a historic Aggie offense.

The STEM-designated graduate business program pushes students to absorb concepts quickly then immediately put them into action, and where it truly shines is equipping students with a strong foundation in the functional areas of business, such as accounting, economics, finance, marketing and strategy.

It's a tight-knit program that is supportive and helps the student-athletes balance their roles in the program along with their time and dedication needed to be a Division I student-athlete.

Solia Valentine, a graduate member of UC Davis women's tennis, is one example of a student-athlete who was looking to further their professional aspirations while continuing to compete at a high level. Valentine came to the Aggies after getting her undergraduate degree at UCLA in computer science and jumped at what the master of management offered.

"I had a computer science undergraduate degree, and I am interested in potentially doing product management, so I thought the program would help strengthen the managerial skills needed to excel as a product manager," said Valentine. "At the same time, I felt that this was a once in a lifetime opportunity to build the foundational skillset for my career while playing college tennis."

Valentine earned All-Big West honorable mention this season, collecting 20 wins between singles and doubles helping the Aggies snag a win at the Big West Championships with a singles victory at No. 2 over UC San Diego.

Graduate Alex Agnew (lacrosse) also was able to return to the field thanks to the Master of Management program. Battling back from injury, Agnew enrolled in Graduate School of Management program and was able to finish out her career properly. Agnew set record for career assists this year, and shared the field with her freshman sister Tory as the Aggies battled to the Big 12 tournament.

The Master in Management also provides value in a world of Name, Image, and Likeness (NIL), giving UC Davis a competitive advantage in the recruiting world of transfer portals and ever-moving athletic goals.

"We compete with the conference we are in, and we compete with other schools on our level of funding," said Unnava. "So this program acts as leg up on others who might have access to more money for incoming student-athletes, we are giving them an opportunity to be successful after playing. We can attract high-quality athletes who see this program as a compelling option for them because of how it will affect them in the long term not just in the moment."

Together, UC Davis Athletics and the UC Davis Graduate School of Management have created an avenue of success for Aggie student-athletes to better prepare themselves for life after athletics. And in return UC Davis has positioned itself to better compete on the highest levels of competition while maintaining a dedicated commitment to academics and the futures of Aggie student-athletes. ★

Meet Your Juke Box Heroes

Foreigner Returns with a Hit-Packed Night of Unforgettable Anthems

SACRAMENTO, CA (MPG) - When Foreigner rolls into Wheatland on June 21 as part of their farewell tour, fans at the Hard Rock Live Sacramento are in for more than just a night of classic rock hits. They'll also witness a powerful blend of nostalgia and new voices as Lincoln High School's choir joins the legendary band on stage for their iconic ballad, "I Want to Know What Love Is."

For keyboardist Michael Bluestein, who has been with the band since 2008, the farewell tour is a culmination of a musical journey that spans decades, continents and generations.

"It's definitely a night of hits," Bluestein said. "Generally, we find that people know every song we play. It's very exciting, a lot of energy. We look forward to seeing everybody and we hope they bring their energy because we feed off that too."

Since forming in the mid-1970s, Foreigner has built a catalog of enduring rock anthems such as "Juke Box Hero," "Cold as Ice" and "Hot Blooded." Their farewell tour marks a milestone and celebrates a nearly 50-year legacy that Bluestein describes as "the soundtrack of my childhood and teenage years."

Originally trained in classical and jazz piano, Bluestein's career has taken him through a wide spectrum of musical genres, from touring with Enrique Iglesias to jamming in funky San Francisco jam bands. But stepping into Foreigner's lineup felt like coming home.

"When I got the offer, it was too good of an opportunity to pass up," Bluestein said. "These are songs I grew up with. I had a 'pinch me' moment playing 'Juke Box Hero' for the first time, it's a really dramatic part of the

set with the lighting going low and it's a very intense, kind of moody, section before the song really explodes."

Over the years, the band's extensive touring has brought them to nearly every corner of the world, from Red Rocks in Colorado to amphitheaters in Switzerland and Germany. Still, Northern California holds a special place for Bluestein, who once lived in San Francisco.

"I think the enthusiasm in NorCal is always great," Bluestein said. "We're really psyched to be back up there."

This tour is the last with long-time lead vocalist Kelly Hansen, who has fronted the band for nearly two decades. The band announced the news live on the finale of the "The Voice" on May 20 and broke the news that guitarist Luis Maldonado will step into the role of lead singer.

"Kelly will be doing the shows through like early fall so he still has a lot of shows left with us.

We're sad to see him go, he has been such an anchor and a big part of the taking this band to new heights and keeping us so consistently at such a high level, so we are so thankful to him and his contributions." Bluestein said. "Luis Maldonado, our guitarist, is stepping up as the new lead singer. He's a great guy and a phenomenal musician. We're in good hands."

Now, as the band enters its final stretch with Hansen, Bluestein reflects on the enduring power of Foreigner's music.

"These songs are just so well-crafted, so memorable. Lou Gramm's voice, the songwriting, the production, they were all magic," Bluestein said. "They've been imprinted on people's lives."

With decades of touring behind them, the members of Foreigner have found ways to keep their energy high. On show days, Bluestein meditates, others do yoga or stretching, and everyone

focuses on staying rested and balanced.

"It's about staying healthy out there. Connecting with family and friends," Bluestein said.

One of the most moving moments of each show on this tour comes when Foreigner invites a local high school choir on stage for "I Want to Know What Love Is." In Wheatland, that honor belongs to the students at Lincoln High School, led by retiring choir director Cindy Hagman.

"I just about fell off the couch when we were first asked in 2014," Hagman recalled. "This is the fourth time we've been invited and the last during my career. It's an incredible honor."

Hagman, who has led the choir for 25 years, sees this as a rare and invaluable opportunity for her students to be part of something unforgettable. Each year, a different group of students get to perform and this year 25 students are going. Hagman explained

that performers are usually all seniors but this year since the choir program was smaller so the opportunity to younger students as opened.

"It's not something everybody gets to do. For them to be on stage with a band like Foreigner, to look out over thousands of people, it's life-changing," Hagman said. "And it validates everything we do as music educators."

The partnership is part of Foreigner's ongoing campaign to support music education and raise awareness about the vital role of arts in schools. Each participating school receives a donation to support their music programs.

"The arts are always the first to be cut," Bluestein said. "This is a way to give back and help keep those programs alive. A lot of us in the band came through public school music programs, we got a chance to really explore music when we were young boys in school and it's a chance for younger generations to experience that too."

For students, the performance is about more than the music, it's about self-expression, confidence and connection.

"They're singing a message," Hagman said. "We work on what the song means so they can sing from the heart. That's when it really becomes transformative."

The impact reaches far beyond the stage. One former student who participated in the performance years ago now leads a band of his own, inspired by the experience of singing with Foreigner as a teenager.

"It changed his life," Hagman said. "And now it's doing the same for a new generation."
