## **Hundreds gather for ICE protest** after MHS student detained

GoFundMe and #FreeMarcelo are being shared online

Hundreds of people gathered in front of the Milford Town Hall on the afternoon of June 1 to protest after Immigration and Customs

Enforcement (ICE) detained an 18-year-old Milford High School student on the morning of Saturday, June 1, a day before Milford High School graduation.

Though his full name was not released to the press, the crowd yelled, "Free Mar-



celo," in chants throughout the protest.

Marcelo's friends report he was detained on his way to volleyball practice on Saturday morning.

Students marched from the graduation ceremony on Sunday morning to Milford Town Hall in their caps and gowns, entering the adult world with their voices being heard. The march halted across the street from Town Hall, where hundreds were already gathered, cheering on the marching graduates.

Marcelo's girlfriend, Julianys Rentas, was interviewed by WCVB NewsCenter 5, where she recapped a phone call ICE agents allowed Marcelo to make.

"He told me he had chains around his ankles, he had chains around his wrists," Rentas said. "He's in a cell with 30 other men. He's the only 18-year-old there, he's the youngest there. He is not a criminal. He's a member of this community and has never done anything wrong."

Marcelo has been a part of the Milford school system since he was six years old.

Milford Chief of Police Robert Tusino said his department was informed of the ICE activity by the school. In a brief interview with the Milford Free Press, Tusino made it clear that his officers were not involved, but conflict could have possibly been avoided if they were, he said.

"We can't stop ICE if we wanted to, they've made that very clear to us," Tusino said,

standing amongst the protestors. "I think they should make it so that the police are with ICE, so that we can act as intermediaries."

Tusino said he and his department have worked with ICE in the past to assist in executing warrants for known criminals.

"When we take these folks in, we take them to Honey Dew, let them use the bathroom at the station, I'm all about keeping it humane, I was a paramedic for 34 years," he said. "ICE will just let them sit in a van for hours. We just want to make sure our community is safe, and the relationship we've created with our residents remains uncompromised."

Massachusetts Governor Maura Healey released a statement responding to the arrest, and demanding information on where he is being held.

"I'm disturbed and outraged by reports that a Milford High School student was arrested by ICE on his way to volleyball practice yesterday [May 31]. Yet again, local officials and law enforcement have been left in

the dark with no heads up and no answers to their questions," Healey said in the statement. "I'm demanding that ICE provide immediate information about why he was arrested, where he is and how his due process is being protected. My heart goes out to the Milford community on what was supposed to be a celebratory graduation day. The Trump Administration continues to create fear in our communities, and it's making us all less safe."

A GoFundMe account bit.ly/ FreeMarcelo has been set up to help "secure experienced legal representation; cover any court and filing fees; support Marcelo's family during this uncertain time...Please help us fight for Marcelo's future and bring him home where he belongs." The hashtag #FreeMarcelo is also being used on social media.



## Milford High School students earn Innovation Award

On May 9, the One8 Foundation held their annual Applied Learning Student Showcase. All Project Lead the Way (PLTW) students from across the state were invited to share the science, technology, engineering, or math (STEM) projects they worked on throughout the year at their respective high schools. In particular, students that have been taking the PLTW Capstone course were offered the opportunity to demonstrate to the Massachusetts schools' community their work on an advanced STEM project. Over 100 capstone projects from all corners of the Commonwealth were represented at the showcase.

Milford High School seniors Maya Santos and Aloiye Okhipo were awarded the Liberty Mutual Innovation Award for their project on the thermoelectric recovery of energy from turf fields. The judges stated, "This team's capstone project exemplified the very best of Applied Learning - insightful, high-quality work, that pushed boundaries and delivered real value. Industry professionals were truly impressed by their innovation, execution, and excellence."

Milford High School seniors Maya Santos and Aloiye Okhipo were awarded the Liberty Mutual Innovation Award for their project on the thermoelectric recovery of energy from turf fields.

Mr. Robert Knapp, Milford High School Physics teacher and teacher of the PLTW En-

gineering course, shared the following about the project completed by Maya and Aloiye: "From the start of the year, Maya had focused on problems that were actively bothering her. Not only was the crumb rubber on turf fields environmentally concerning but it was an annoyance, hot, got in your shoes. She landed on how hot the turf could get. This served as a moment of inspiration as she had just been learning about geothermal heating and she tied the two ideas together. From there she identified how to capture this problem. As Maya began to turn her research into a prototype, Aloiye joined the project. They worked together to assemble a prototype device just a few days before the presentation. Maya's innovation and persistence, along with Aloiye's teamwork and flexibility, made for an outstanding, forward-looking project by two outstanding engineering students. They made Milford High School first year at the showcase a proud event for MHS and our Science educators. These two students were excellent representatives of our school."

The One8 Foundation is a philanthropic organization that combines funding with strategic expertise to support nonprofits working to create positive social change, particularly in the area of education. The One8 Foundation supports outstanding education leaders with compelling ideas that deliver social impact and change. The One8 Founda-

# ABA Centers of America – Providing compassionate autism care with no waiting list

For parents and caregivers of children and young adults on the autism spectrum, it is a journey marked by both unconditional love and diverse challenges. There are moments of pure joy and celebration of their child's achievements, times of learning and understanding of the unique perspectives they have of their surroundings, and opportunities to strengthen bonds through patience and adaptability. However, there are also moments of uncertainty, with one of the most significant hurdles being the navigation of education and healthcare for those who have autism.

Determined to find the best care for their loved ones, caregivers are often met with difficulty accessing the right therapies for the individual needs of their child. Knowing what services are available and where to get them can be overwhelming, as is figuring out what is and isn't covered by health insurance and finding a provider who can support them immediately. Unfortunately, the waiting lists for access to this specialized care are often long, sometimes stretching to many months or even years.

One excellent resource for families seeking compassionate, expert autism care is the ABA Centers of America. ABA Centers of America has a team of highly trained professionals that provide individualized treatment plans that focus on social and communications skills and independent life skills. They use Applied Behavior Analysis (ABA), an evidence-backed approach using immersive, play-based activities that are positively reinforced. What sets them apart is that there is NO WAITING LIST.

Founder Christopher Barnett, who is a parent to an autistic child, created the company to disrupt the autism care industry by demolishing the wait times traditionally experienced by those in search of a diagnosis or treatment. Individualized therapy is offered onsite at the centers, in school, or at their home depending on each child's specific needs.

"Autism therapies are usually prescribed to the clients in the form of hours needed to work on specific interventions such as social interaction deficits, certain behaviors, life skills, etc.," shares Michael Brennan, Executive Director of the organization's new center in Milford.

"Here, families can come in with a diagnosis or we can provide the diagnostic testing ourselves to ensure that the families can get an answer quickly. We then do a full assessment of what the individual's needs are and one of our Board Certified Behavior Analysts (BCBAs) will determine what interventions would work best and will develop and prescribe a tailored treatment plan. The child will be assigned a Registered Behavior Technician (RBT) who will work with them one-on-one. We find that progress happens relatively quickly due to the therapy model and that individualized care. We strongly believe in meeting each person where they are at with a positive attitude and going at their pace."

"And we know that navigating insurance plans can be daunting for a lot of caregivers, so we also help throughout the entire insurance process."

ABA Centers of America serves children as young as 18-months-old to teens and young adults, as well as several older adults. Their play-based therapy is different for each client, but can be anything from getting used to brushing their teeth to learning how to make a bed, introducing themselves to someone else and shaking their hand, building with blocks or Legos, using a trampoline or slide, reading a book, helping to cook something in the kitchen, and more.

"One thing that we work a lot on is learning how to tolerate changes or disruptions in a routine or schedule, because that is what happens in life. We believe in helping them to learn to be as independent as



possible," says Heidi Galbraith, Clinical Director.

"A day for a client may begin by learning where to put their jacket or bag each day, practicing their hygiene skills, feeding themselves at lunch and washing their face, and learning how to interact with others. They may go to a classroom and learn some cognitive skills, like shape sorting. We may play a game they don't always like, but it helps to build that tolerance to play it for a little while – and what that does is then open them up to more enjoyment in life."

The RBTs are always with the child during sessions, helping to queue activities, offering choices of games, and positively reinforcing everything they are doing, and they track everything so they can document progress made. Along the way, the BCBAs are observing and collecting information to help maximize the potential of every individual, making adjustments to the treatment plan as needed. "Parent input is also very important because there may be events coming up for them

## Milford Town Park Celebration planned for Saturday, June 21

All Milford residents are invited to attend the Milford Town Park Celebration on Saturday, June 21 from noon to 4 p.m. to explore and experience the completed renovations, new sport courts, and new Fitness Court® Studio. The Milford Cultural Council and Milford Parks Department are organizing this family friendly event to not only showcase the park renovations, but to bring the community together to enjoy an afternoon of Fitness Court demonstrations, new sport court tryouts, live music, food, and art activities. A short ceremony and ribbon-cutting featuring local officials and partners, as well as the rededication of the basketball courts to honor the legacy of John S. Milford Parks and Recreation Administrator Jim Asam says, "We know residents have been waiting a long time for the renovations to be finished, so we are looking forward to hosting this celebration that will allow everyone to check out the improvements to Town Park. Sporting equipment will be available so residents can try out all the new sport courts and Fitness Court."

In addition to the fitness demonstrations and activities, the Town Park Celebration will include live music, food vendors, art activities, and community pop-ups. PanNeubean Steel, a

Milford-based steelpan band, will open the event in the Town Park bandstand. Matt York will be singing the songs of Willie Nelson at 2 p.m., and he will be followed by Milford High School's Joe B. Band.

Food options will include Simmer & Spice, Tako Laco, New City Creamery ice cream from The Rail Trail Flatbread Company of Milford, as well as hand-crafted lemonades from Citrus Got Real. In addition, Shaw's of Milford will be giving away nutritious snacks near the Fitness Court, and the Milford Cultural Council will be distributing healthy snacks courtesy of other local grocery stores.

# Steps to take before — and after — a divorce

Going through a divorce is emotionally painful and can disrupt one's life in many ways but does it also have to be financially devastating?

Not necessarily. You can help yourself greatly by making a series of moves. Here are some to consider:

Before the divorce is final ... • Determine how you'll cover the

cost of the divorce. To meet the costs of a divorce, which can be tens of thousands dollars,

you may need to tap in to your income stream and savings accounts, or even explore alternative options, such as borrowing from your retirement plan, if it's allowed by a divorce court judge.

- Create a budget. You may want to build a temporary budget. Your divorce attorney can advise you on how long your separation period may last in a contested case.
- Start building separate bank and brokerage accounts. Consult with your divorce attorney on ways to establish independent bank and brokerage accounts without harming your spouse.
- Understand your retirement benefits. Know the value of your and your spouse's 401(k) or similar plans, IRAs, pensions, stock options and other employer benefits. Also, you might need to negotiate the splitting of retirement benefits through a qualified domestic relations order (QDRO). A tax professional and a financial advisor

can help you understand how different QDRO proposals can affect your retirement goals.

After the divorce is final ...

- Finish building your separate financial accounts. You may want to close any joint accounts or credit cards, change online access to financial accounts, remove your name from bills for which you are no longer responsible and complete any agreed-upon asset transfers, such as dividing retirement
- Create a new budget. You can now create a longer-term budget, incorporating any spouse or child support you receive as income. You may also need to adjust your spending to reflect items in the divorce agreement, such as expenses now covered by your former spouse and court-ordered responsibilities for paying college education expenses for dependent children and possibly the attorneys' fees for a former spouse.
- Review your protection plans. You may need to review your life, homeowners and auto insurance policies. And if you were covered under your spouse's health insurance plan, you may want to apply for COBRA to stay on that plan up to 36 months or switch to your own employer's plan, if available. If you don't have access to an employer's health insurance, you may want to explore a marketplace plan from the Affordable Care Act or contact a health insurance broker.
- Review your estate plans. To reflect your new marital status, you may need to work with your legal professional to change some of your estateplanning documents, such as a will, living trust, advanced health care directive or power of attorney. Also, review the beneficiary designations on life insurance policies, IRAs, annuities and investment accounts, as these designations can likely supersede instructions on your will or trust.

where they will need additional social therapy or other things going on that we can work into the schedule as needed," shares

Open communication between ABA Centers of America and the caregivers is key. Caregivers are kept informed of everything their child is doing and learning. There is also parent training at least once a week where they are educated on ways to reinforce therapies throughout the day, provided strategies for things like mitigating overstimulation or challenging behaviors, shared best practices for safeguarding their homes, and more.

"We try to put ourselves into the caregivers' shoes and understand how we can best ease specific stressors as we are doing this work with their child, for ex-

ample, we have been providing dinner for the kids on Mondays, which goes along with our socialization efforts, and helps the parents or caregivers not have to rush around as much," Brennan shares.





# 'Complete turnaround' for MHS Girls Track

#### Talented freshman class helps drive Scarlet Hawks

From sprints to throws to jumps to relays, the Milford girls' track and field team is, literally, leaps and bounds ahead of where it was a season ago.

"It's a complete turnaround from last year," said Head Coach Dan Gordon. "We have had such growth in all of the event groups. Across the board, this is a better team in every phase."

The Scarlet Hawks' improvement has been largely led by its underclassmen, including several standout freshmen. With only about 30 athletes on the team in total, Gordon has had to put his younger athletes right into the mix, and they have responded.

"We have a lot of talent and a lot of freshmen who came in ready to compete at a high level," he said.

There are older athletes who are playing a big role for MHS this spring, and none bigger than Julianys Rentas, who qualified for states in both the low hurdles and the long jump.

"She is a special athlete; for

the past two years, she has been our best athlete," Gordon said. "She is a joy to coach, and she will do any event."

The team captain, Rentas started competing in long

jump more consistently this spring and has already established herself as one of the top 400-meter hurdlers in the state. Her leadership has also been crucial with so many younger athletes.

Kiera Murphy is one of the top 800-meter runners in the state, despite being a freshman.

Iyanna Correa, another freshman, qualified for states in both the high jump and as a member of the 4x100 relay team. The rest of that quartet includes freshman

"If you look at our top performers, we have about six girls who are responsible for the majority of the points we have scored," Gordon said. "It's incredible to see all those points come from so few people and from such new competitors. They are competing against girls who are seniors in high school. It's been great to see."

Milford's depth has shown through in the sprints and middle distance events, where Gordon describes his team as a "heavy hitter."

"They work well together, they came up through the middle school program, so they have been seeing varsity track from afar," he said. "It's been fun to watch them."

# Records falling for Milford Boys' Track & Field

## Veteran group leads Scarlet Hawks this spring

It wasn't long ago when the Milford High boys' 4x100 relay team was trying to post a sub-48 second time in the event. This year, they are trying to run sub-43 seconds, a huge improvement for such a short race. The Scarlet Hawks have broken school records in both relays, the 100-meter dash, the high hurdles, and at least two other records were in serious jeopardy heading into the state meet.

"This is a talented team, they have completely rewritten the record book," said Head Coach Dan Gordon, noting that the 4x100 record broken this year was set back in 1994, well before any of the athletes on this year's team were born.

MHS won the Hockomock League meet in the 4x400 event and finished second in the

Team captain Shawn Pierce is the MVP for Milford this year. He set a school record in the dash this year and has also been a key cog in the sprint relay.

"He is the energy of this team, you just can't help but want to be around Shawn,' Gordon said. "He's just such an awesome kid."

In the 400, John Arruda has been a standout and blossomed into an elite talent, his coach said. Joining him in the middle distance race are Taylor Feliciano and Sami Ettahari. Feliciano is a consistent runner, Gordon said, and Ettahari is a freshman who has, in his coach's words, "blown us away" with his ability to compete.

"If he gets the baton and we are not winning, you know by the home stretch, he is going to make it a good race," Gordon said. "He is someone we are really excited about."

Arruda, Feliciano, Ettahari, and Pierce make up Milford's 4x400 relay team. The 4x100 team includes Jarrett Brown, who also qualified for states in the triple jump.

Aloiye Okhipo qualified for states in the 200-meter dash and the hurdles after capturing a league title in the latter event. He was the number two hurdler in the state heading into the

meet and a threat to win it all.

In the throwing events, Liam Sweeney improved by more than 20 feet in the javelin to earn a spot at states. Alex Kerr and Aidan Eastman qualified

in the discus, and Sean Mairs earned a spot in the 400-meter run. Distance runner Jayden Madden showed significant improvement this year, with Gordon calling it a "resurgence."




