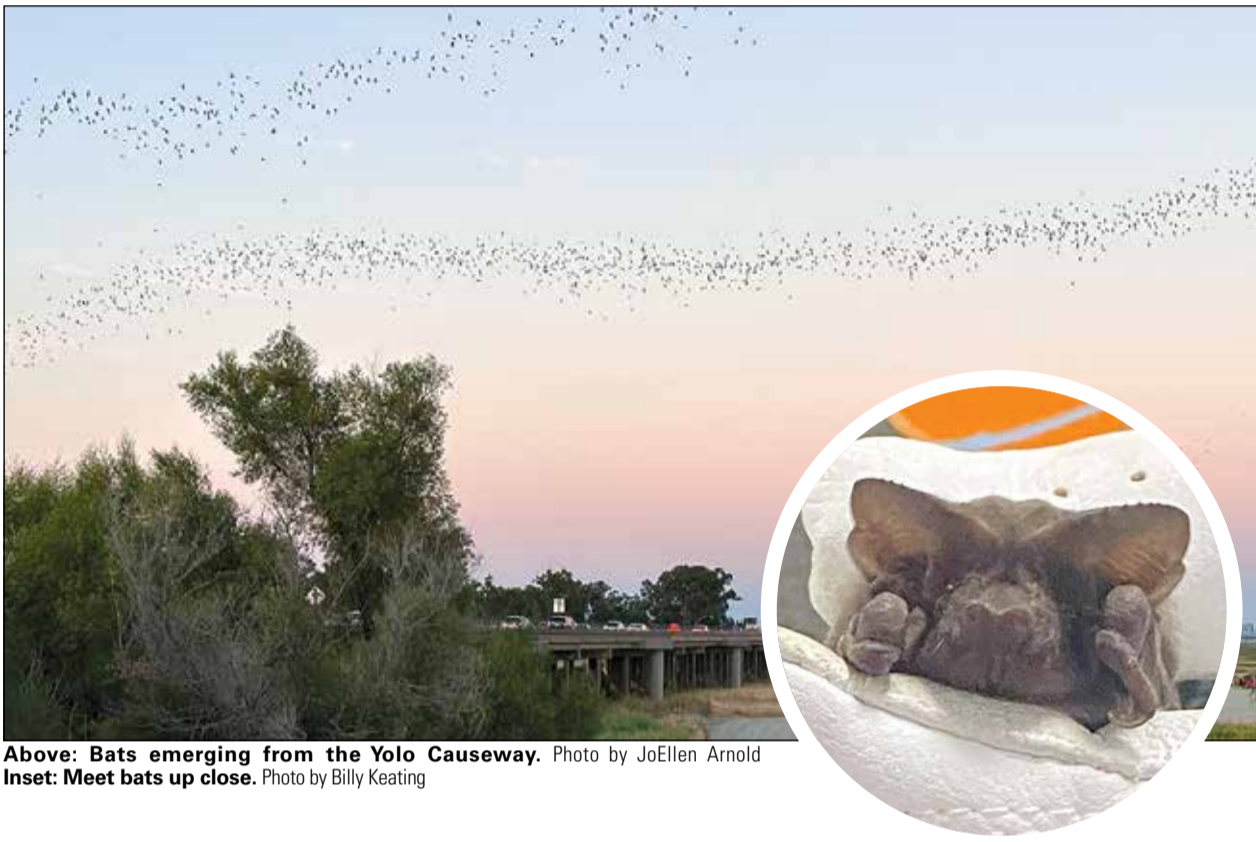
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Bats are Back at the Yolo Causeway

YOLO COUNTY, CA (MPG) - Join Yolo Basin Foundation this summer on a Bat Talk and Tour from June 23 to Sept. 26.

Learn about these amazing flying mammals that do so much to help reduce insect pests throughout the area. Live native bat species are displayed as part of the presentation. The program culminates in watching the bats as they emerge from under the freeway.

The maternity Mexican free-tailed bat colony under the Interstate 80 Yolo Causeway is growing daily as they return from wherever they spent

the winter. Although many of the bats overwinter in the bridge, most seem to leave. As the weather warms, crops grow and insect populations explode, the bats return to the Causeway.

These amazing, winged wonders are mammals that fly. Each summer, the females give birth to one pup. She nurses that pup for about five to six weeks and then it joins her as she flies throughout the Central Valley to consume crop pests and mosquitoes. There are also males that live in the Yolo Causeway bridge.

Children who are interested in bats are encouraged to join Yolo Basin Foundation for a morning of "Bats and Crafts." Children will meet live bats from the local area and then

create crafts and play bat games. This special event is aimed at young children, especially those who are too young to stay up late to watch the bats fly.

"Bats and Crafts" takes place 10 a.m., Sunday, July 20 and 10 a.m., Saturday, Aug. 16 at Yolo Bypass Wildlife Area Headquarters, 45211 Country Road 32B, Davis.

New Air Quality Alert System Launched

SACRAMENTO REGION, CA (MPG) - The Sacramento Metropolitan Air Quality Management District (Sac Metro Air District), in collaboration with the air districts of the Sacramento region, has launched a new Air Alert system for the Sacramento Region's Spare The Air program.

Sacramento region residents are strongly urged to subscribe or resubscribe to the new Air Alert to maintain access to important air quality information aimed at safeguarding their health and the environment. Prior Air Alert subscriptions will not transfer to the new system, so resubscribing is essential.

The Spare The Air program is dedicated to measurably improving the region's air quality and helping residents protect themselves from air pollution by providing air quality forecasts, real-time readings and air pollution alerts. The program also offers educational materials for schools, businesses, residents and community organizations.

The Spare The Air campaign runs from May through October each year, which is known as the summer smog season. Ground-level ozone (smog) is the primary pollutant during this time of year and is monitored throughout the Spare The Air season. During wildfire smoke episodes, Spare The Air might provide PM2.5 (particulate matter with a diameter of 2.5 micrometers or less) forecasts rather than smog, as needed.

The Air Quality Index (AQI) is a measurement that helps community members understand air pollution levels and how they might impact the natural environment and human health. The higher the Air Quality Index, the greater the level of air pollution.

When the forecasted Air Quality Index for smog is expected to reach or exceed 126, the program will issue a Spare The Air Alert.

Reaching Out for Victory Against Fentanyl

WEST SACRAMENTO, CA (MPG) - During the third annual Fighting Fentanyl event on June 14 to spread awareness about fentanyl poisoning, more than 100 attendees enjoyed food, performances, hot rods and community resources at the Victory Outreach Church parking lot in West Sacramento.

Event organizer Ricky Brazil said he organized this event to create a community for those who have lost loved ones to fentanyl, prevent fentanyl poisoning and advocate for justice against the ongoing epidemic.

Many posters displaying photos of victims poisoned by fentanyl were lined up toward the center of the event space and at least 14

vendors lined the perimeter, ranging from the West Sacramento Police

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Bill Introduced to Keep Homeownership Costs Down

WASHINGTON, D.C. (MPG) - Republican Congressman Doug LaMalfa of Richvale, with Democratic Congresswoman Doris Matsui of California and Republican Congresswoman Young Kim of California introduced the bipartisan Keeping Homeownership Costs Down Act (H.R. 3800) to help reduce housing costs by directing the Federal Emergency Management Agency (FEMA) to resume issuing exemption letters, while court-mandated Endangered Species Act (ESA) reviews take place, that keep homeowners from having to purchase expensive flood insurance if their properties are unlikely to flood.

"California families are already struggling with the rising cost of housing and requiring them to purchase expensive flood insurance when their home is unlikely to flood adds another financial burden to homeownership," LaMalfa said. "Following a court ruling in 2019, FEMA stopped issuing exemptions while it was forced to conduct additional and duplicative environmental reviews of this practice. This is ridiculous. My common sense, bipartisan

bill helps make owning a home more affordable by requiring FEMA to restart issuing flood insurance purchase exemptions right away while environmental reviews take place."

"In Northern California, we have long had to balance lifesaving flood protection measures with our critical need for additional housing," Matsui said. "The Keeping Homeownership Costs Down Act is a common-sense fix that restores a tool in building affordable houses in our region. By ensuring FEMA can continue issuing LOMR-Fs, we prevent families from being priced out of homeownership while upholding key environmental protections."

Conditional Letter of Map Revision - Fill (CLOMR-F) and Letter of Map Revision - Fill (LOMR-F) letters allow FEMA to revise flood maps for properties that have been elevated above flood zones, removing the federal requirement to purchase flood insurance.

FEMA stopped issuing these letters in six counties in 2020, expanding the pause to 32 counties in 2023, after a lawsuit required the agency to consult with the U.S. Fish and Wildlife Service and the National Marine Fisheries Service under the

Endangered Species Act on these letters.

California builds fewer than 80,000 homes per year despite needing around 180,000 annually to meet demand. Rising construction costs and mandatory flood insurance contribute to high housing prices.

Developers already go through Endangered Species Act compliance when seeking permits to build housing projects. Requiring FEMA to conduct separate Endangered Species Act reviews for Letter of Map Revision - Fill and Conditional Letter of Map Revision - Fill letters add regulatory duplication without improving environmental protections.

The Keeping Homeownership Costs Down Act directs FEMA to issue the letters, as appropriate, until the Endangered Species Act consultation process is completed, helping lower housing costs and avoid unnecessary delays.

Congressman Doug LaMalfa is chairman of the Congressional Western Caucus and a lifelong farmer representing California's First Congressional District, including Butte, Colusa, Glenn, Lassen, Modoc, Shasta, Siskiyou, Sutter, Tehama and Yuba counties. ★

Fourth Annual Indigifest Lively

WEST SACRAMENTO, CA (MPG) - River Walk Park in West Sacramento had a lively atmosphere June 14 with pop-up tents featuring culturally-artistic items for sale, food, resources and people of many backgrounds at the Three Sister's Gardens fourth annual All Nations Indigifest.

Three Sister's Gardens is a nonprofit organization that started in the Broderick area of West Sacramento in 2018 on a small plot of land with a handful of volunteers. She said they grow produce by the community, for the community, and they will soon open their fifth farm, located in South Sacramento.

More than 10 individuals or groups took the stage through a lineup of indigenous performances, rap, spoken word and more throughout the event, which took place from 5 to 10 p.m. June 14.

Rap group The Neighborhood Kids traveled from San Diego to West Sacramento for its first time, said member Amon the MC. The Neighborhood Kids had a tent of their merchandise, featuring stickers, T-shirts, hats, albums and hoodies.

"We came all the way for Indigifest because we believe heavily in the first nation peoples and solidarity with all of our indigenous peoples and we

the event is to unite all people from all backgrounds through food, music and culture.

"This is a free event," Kaur said. "We don't charge people to attend because we don't want cost to be a barrier to this unity."

Kaur said the event is rooted in community empowerment and it's important to have such an event in the eye of the state capital.

"We're not that far from the Capitol building, where all these decisions are made for our state, especially when it comes to funding," Kaur said.

Kaur said that community members see value in the organization's mission, recognizing that they do have power.

Booths for some of the resources at Indigifest included the California Consortium for Urban Indian Health and the California Coalition for Youth in California Crisis Line.

Jamie Trunell, outreach coordinator for the youth crisis line, said she saw friendly, warm and kind people coming by who really cared about their community and humanity in general.

"I had a lot of good conversations but it was just a really wonderful way to connect as well as to sort of rally together," Trunell said. ★

River City High Joins Elite Ranks

Church's motorcycle ministry club, Riders Out of Darkness, with several members in attendance and club President Lenny KeAloha said the main purpose of their motorcycle ministry is emphasizing the importance of the human soul. KeAloha said families who are hurting need hope and a light at the end of the tunnel.

"I think coming out here and showing support, you've got other ministries that are coming together," KeAloha said. "There's one body. One God. You know? So, it brings joy in my heart to see that because we're moving it for the kingdom of God. Not for self."

Sunny Moreno, a regional president for the Sacramento and Bay Area regions for the Riders Out of Darkness for more than six years, said the biggest impact about events such as Fighting Fentanyl for him is helping people because he was addicted to drugs, going in and out of prison, and affiliated with a gang.

"You see all the pictures here; they're all youth and all they're doing is taking the wrong path," Moreno said.

The greatest accomplishment for him after gaining his sobriety and attending awareness events, Moreno said, is being able to reach young folks who feel they can't leave a life of drugs and gangs.

"Life is hard but there's always a different route that we could take," Moreno said.

Riders Out of Darkness South Sacramento President Jacob Caton said he "wasn't looking for God but God was looking" for him. Caton joined Victory Outreach Church in 2015 after being a prison gang member and being incarcerated for 20 years.

"God is searching and looking for you when you don't even know it. And at that time in my life, I really needed this and it really changed my life from where I am today," Caton said.

Caton said he attends awareness events because he is a resident and the drug epidemic is killing people in the Sacramento region or leading to incarceration.

"I feel like if I came from that background, from being a drug addict myself, that me, coming out to these events, if I could just reach one person out of 100, I did my job," Caton said.

Multiple speakers at the event included West Sacramento Mayor Martha Guerrero, Police Chief Robert Strange and Yolo County Deputy District Attorney Preston Schaub.

About two-dozen custom classic cars lined up in the parking lot and Joe Brazil, the brother of event organizer Brazil and the Specialty Automotive owner, brought his classic hot rod

representing the Whisker Biscuits, his car club.

Elijah Johnson, a Victory Outreach Church event coordinator, said musical artists from across the state performed throughout the event, while also featuring Joel Trujillo from San Antonio, Texas' Victory Outreach Church.

Representing Stop Drug Homicide, a nonprofit organization raising awareness about the criminality of drug-related deaths, was Mareka Cole, whose son, Marek, died of fentanyl poisoning.

Cole said she spoke to many people who knew very little about fentanyl or how to administer Narcan and that is why she holds demonstrations at awareness events.

"What attracts them to the booth is the number of people that we're losing in California," Cole said. "Even the little kids look at these signs. They don't understand it all, but they see it."

Cole said that Stop Drug Homicide helps pass laws and advocates to assembly members for comprehensive solutions to drug-related deaths. She is currently working on the CARE Act to prevent incarceration of individuals with mental health issues, so they can be properly rehabilitated and cared for.

"My son was autistic, so I know about mental health. And what's needed for these people is not incarceration," Cole said. "They're misunderstood."

Izaya Michael Foundation Founder Stephanie Boatright, a mother who also lost her child to fentanyl poisoning, was at the June 14 event.

Boatright said she "cannot stay quiet and must try to help the next generation of children" because she lost her son and sees death toll numbers in the hundreds every day within the United States.

"For me, it's what I do with my loss," Boatright said. "Yeah, I'm heartbroken, but at the same time, what can we do to make this world a little bit of a better place because we are literally in spiritual warfare out here."

Boatright said everyone on the street is someone's relative and someone's loved one who is struggling. She said people just can't walk past them as if they don't mean anything.

The nonprofit Fentanyl Awareness Coalition of Tuolumne County and Surrounding Areas (FACTS), represented by Lisa Machado and Dina Villavicencio, who both lost their children on the same day in April 2023 to fentanyl poisoning, supported other parents and organizations fighting the fentanyl epidemic.

If her daughter had access to Narcan, Machado said, the common name for naloxone medication to reverse opioid overdoses, she could still be alive today. Machado said

that a drug might not always be what it's believed to be and shared a story of when she had to administer Narcan to a man who overdosed while Machado was pumping gas.

The individual was slumped over the passenger's side of his dashboard, Machado said, and a young girl was calling out for help. Machado said she was carrying Narcan in her car and administered four doses before the man started to respond but he then became combative and took swings at Machado.

"I tell people, 'Give it to them and get back because it puts them in withdrawals and you don't know what they're going to do,'" Machado said.

Machado said Narcan doesn't fully reverse the effects of an overdose, but it does act as a buffer to keep them breathing until the first responders arrive if they are

unresponsive.

Lori Durbin, a CORE Medical Clinic counseling supervisor, had a booth at the event and said she has seen more drug-related deaths because of the expanded applications of fentanyl within a multitude of different drugs. She said everyone's priorities are different and getting personalized treatment is more effective than a system of penalties for their situation.

Brazil, Cole and Durbin were also event speakers.

Durbin said she was previously an addict and had also been incarcerated, but her life was saved because of treatment. Durbin said she has been clean for 15 years and "got blessed" with a grant to attend school. Durbin said her experience and her story "help build trust with a community that feels they have none left to give."

The Sunrise Health and

Wellness Center, a medication-assisted treatment center in Rancho Cordova, had a booth at the Fighting Fentanyl event run by Linda Amacher, a nurse, and Aviana Olivas, a medical assistant and receptionist.

"It's a really fun environment. Getting our name out there, getting all the kids' exposure to what everyone does, keeping clean," Amacher said.

Amacher said it was "nice to show kids that fun can be had without any drugs involved."

Able Calderon of Sac's Finest Boxing in South Sacramento said the fight against fentanyl is similar to a fight in boxing. He said that "every loss should push us to be better and every win isn't a bragging right." The organization focuses on at-risk youth and the boxing classes range from ages 5 to 37.

Calderon said that "it

means a lot" to be involved with the Fighting Fentanyl event because he lost his nephew to fentanyl poisoning.

"One minute I'm playing basketball with him in front of the house and the next, I'm getting a phone call," Calderon said.

Phardy Healthcare Mentoring Boot Camp was another nonprofit organization at the event with founder Pam Hardy and her son teaching life skills such as basic math and proper health. The year-round program is for children ages 6 to 17.

"I'm blessed to be a part of this, even though it's kind of rough and everybody's still healing, the wound's still open, but just to know that we're not in it all by ourselves," Calderon said. "Everybody is fighting together as a community. You can't go everywhere your kids go but your words can." ★

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Men's Soccer Announces 2025 Slate

SACRAMENTO REGION, CA (MPG) - California State University, Sacramento head men's soccer coach Michael Linenberger announced June 12 an 18-match regular season schedule for 2025, a slate that includes a trio of National Collegiate Athletic Association Tournament qualifiers and six opponents that finished inside the final top 100 in the end-of-season Rating Percentage Index (RPI) rankings.

Among the three National Collegiate Athletic Association Tournament qualifiers on this year's schedule are two Big West Conference rivals as the Hornets open this year's campaign with a road match at Stanford on Aug. 21 and has road league contests at University of California, Santa Barbara on Oct. 22 and University of California, Davis on Nov. 1.

The Stanford Cardinals were a No. 16 national seed in last year's National Collegiate Athletic Association Tournament reaching the third round and finishing No. 13 in the final United Soccer Coaches poll. Following a first-round bye, Stanford eliminated the University of California, Santa Barbara Gauchos on penalties, 6-5, following a 2-2 draw and then fell to Ohio State, 4-3, on penalties after a scoreless draw through 110 minutes.

UC Santa Barbara opened with a 1-0 victory over University of California, Los Angeles before its draw with Stanford and finished among those receiving votes in the United Soccer Coaches poll. Meanwhile, the Aggies made the National Collegiate Athletic Association Tournament for the fourth time in school history after defeating the Gauchos 2-0 in the

Big West championship match, falling to San Diego, 1-0 in first round

Stanford leads the group among the top 100 in the Rating Percentage Index, finishing the 2024 season No. 12 in the nation followed by UC Santa Barbara (No. 28), UC Davis (No. 54), San Francisco (No. 70), UC Irvine (No. 72) and Cal State Fullerton (No. 90). In addition, six more were among the top 150 in Cal State Bakersfield (No. 102), Cal Poly (No. 107), Utah Valley (No. 111), Pacific (No. 130), UC Riverside (No. 145), and San Jose State (No. 149).

For comparison, California State University, Sacramento ended the year ranked No. 139 in the final Rating Percentage Index rankings.

The Hornets open the year with an exhibition noon Aug. 10 in Berkeley before officially kicking off the campaign with the season opener against the Cardinals. Utah Tech will be the first home opponent for California State

University, Sacramento at 1 p.m. Aug. 24, as the Hornets look to build off a 2024 season that saw them finish 4-2-1 on their home field.

Alternating home and away matches follow over the next two weeks as California State University, Sacramento travels to Grand Canyon (Aug. 28), hosts Santa Clara in a double header with the women's team on Aug. 31, travels to Utah Valley (Sept. 4) and comes home to host San Jose State in another double header on Sept. 7.

Back-to-back matches against West Coast Conference rivals follow with road contests at Pacific (Sept. 11) and San Francisco (Sept. 15) before the Hornets host Saint Mary's on Sept. 19 to close out non-conference play and kick off a season-long three-match homestand.

Big West play opens at home against California State University, Bakersfield (Oct. 1) and California State University, Fullerton (Oct. 4) as California

State University, Sacramento hosts five of its nine league contests in 2025. Remaining home conference matches include Cal Poly (Oct. 15), UC Irvine (Oct. 18), and UC San Diego (Oct. 25), while the Hornets will take to the road to face CSUN (Oct. 8), UC Riverside (Oct. 11), UC Santa Barbara (Oct. 22) and UC Davis (Nov. 1).

SACRAMENTO, CA (MPG) - California State University, Sacramento associate head women's tennis coach Jack Maddocks was honored by the Intercollegiate Tennis Association and named the Northwest Region Assistant Coach of the Year on June 10.

"I am so excited for Jack to be named ITA Region Assistant Coach of the Year," head coach Sophie Breault said. "He's shown great leadership, commitment and a team-first mindset every single day. This award is a well-deserved recognition of the impact he's had on our team over the past few years."

Recently wrapping up his fourth season with the Hornets, his first as associate head coach in 2025, Maddocks has helped shape a resurgence in the Sacramento State University program since coming on as an assistant in 2022. He teamed up with Breault and volunteer assistant Enrique Alcaer to return the Hornets back to the top of the Big Sky Conference.

In his four years, Maddocks has helped California State University, Sacramento rise from a five-win team in his first season to claiming the 2024 Big Sky Conference regular season title, the 10th in the history of the program and the first since 2012 and winning each of the last two Big Sky

Tournament crowns, giving the Hornets a league-best 13 titles.

As a result, California State University, Sacramento has advanced to the National Collegiate Athletic Association Tournaments in back-to-back years, the program's 14th and 15th all-time trips to the postseason, while compiling 41 wins over the last two campaigns. The program posted back-to-back 20-win seasons for the first time since 2004 and 2005.

The 21-4 overall record during spring 2025 marked the most victories for the Hornets since 2008 as California State University, Sacramento returned to the national rankings for the first time since 2015, reaching as high as No. 49 in the nation, while ending the year in the Intercollegiate Tennis Association's northwest regional rankings for the second straight season, finishing No. 10 in 2024 and No. 5 this past year.

Under Maddocks' tutelage, 10 student-athletes have gone on to collect a total of 22 All-Big Sky honors and 16 conference Player of the Week awards on the court, while claiming three Intercollegiate Tennis Association All-Academic Team honors, a total of 20 individual academic citations from the organization, and 20 Big Sky All-Academic Team awards off the court over the past three years.

Academic awards for the 2025 season will be released at a later date. ★

West Sacramento Assailant Denied Parole

County of Yolo District Attorney's Office News Release

WEST SACRAMENTO, CA (MPG) - A two-commissioner panel of the Board of Parole Hearings denied parole to 47-year-old Gregory McKay on June 11, who was sentenced to prison for 88 years-to-life in 2004.

At the time of the crime, McKay was a resident of Sacramento. The hearing commissioners were Robert Barton and Kathleen Newman. The hearing took place at Mule Creek State Prison where McKay is serving his time.

On Sept. 1, 2001, West Sacramento police officers were dispatched to a home in West Sacramento in reference to a possible assault with a deadly weapon. The victim stated he was inside the residence when a vehicle pulled into the driveway and continued past his house. The vehicle went to the end of the street, turned around and headed back toward the house at a high rate of speed.

The victim walked outside and was standing on the front lawn when three males exited the vehicle and walked toward him. He later identified the three suspects, including Gregory McKay. McKay walked toward him, and the others circled around

him. He felt as though he could not escape. McKay pulled a knife from his front right pocket and opened it. He made two swinging motions with the knife in an attempt to cut the victim in the stomach area. The victim stepped backwards to avoid being cut. McKay said, "I will slice you and stick you right here." McKay then made threats to shoot by saying "I will blast your ass." The trunk of the vehicle was open and the victim was unsure if there was a gun inside. The victim's mother, who was also outside, indicated she was going to call police and the men left the scene. The victim obtained the vehicle's license plate number. Two hours later, officers were dispatched to a brandishing of a firearm call involving a matching vehicle. The three subjects were located leaving an apartment complex with McKay driving. He showed objective signs of being under the influence of an alcoholic beverage and breathalyzer test results were .206 BAC. The victim positively identified McKay. A knife was recovered from inside the vehicle and was also identified by the victim.

Prior to the hearing's beginning, the representatives for the People and for McKay were notified that McKay recently tested positive for a controlled

substance and that along with other rule violations, McKay was offered the opportunity to stipulate to unsuitability for a period of five years. McKay exercised his right to have a hearing. After a nearly two-hour hearing, the commissioners determined that McKay still poses a continued risk to public safety should he be released from prison. The commissioners noted his 11 rule violations in the past year and the lack of positive programming. The commissioners noted that McKay's conduct in the past five years demonstrated that he was going backwards in his rehabilitative progress. The commissioners then determined that the period of denial would be seven years.

This was McKay's second parole hearing. His first was in July 2020 and the period of denial was five years. Yolo County Assistant Chief Deputy District Attorney Melinda Aiello represented the Yolo District Attorney's Office at the hearing.

"Our office is committed to representing the interests of victims' families and public safety at these parole hearings, and when it's appropriate, we argue against the release of inmates who are a danger to the public," District Attorney Jeff Reising said.

McKay will be eligible for parole again in 2032. ★

One of several unlikely big names that are being cast about, including one notable player the Kings passed up in the draft class of 2012, Damian Lillard.

Social Security Matters

Can My Husband Work Part Time and Collect Social Security?

Dear Rusty: I am writing to you on behalf of my husband. His intentions are to go part time as of January 1, 2026, working 30 hours a week and take Social Security benefits as supplemental income. How can we determine what his Social Security benefit would be with him still working part time? He will be 63 and 7 months old next January and has not yet applied for benefits. We look forward to hearing from someone very soon. **Signed: Anxious for Information**

Dear Anxious: If he claims Social Security at age 63 and 7 months, your husband's benefit will be about 78% of what it would be if he waited until age 67 to claim. And, since your husband will not yet have reached his SS full retirement age (FRA), he will be subject to Social Security's Annual Earning Test (AET), which limits how much he can earn while working and collecting early Social Security retirement benefits. The amount he can earn without paying a penalty changes yearly but, for reference, the earnings limit for 2025 is \$23,400 per year. If his work earnings exceed the annual limit, Social Security will take away some of his benefits. Using the 2025 limit as an example, if your husband's annual 2025 earnings were

\$40,000, then he would owe about \$8,300 (half of the amount he exceeded the limit by). Social Security would withhold his monthly benefits for enough months to recover what he owes for exceeding the earnings limit (how many months they withhold would be determined by his monthly SS benefit amount).

FYI, the earnings test lasts until your husband reaches his full retirement age (his FRA is age 67), but in the year he attains his FRA the penalty for exceeding the limit is less - \$1 for every \$3 over the limit - and the limit is much higher. The annual earnings test no longer applies once your husband reaches his FRA.

When your husband applies for his SS retirement benefit, Social Security will ask about his work plans and how much he expects to earn each year. Based upon that information, if he expects to exceed the annual limit they will pay his benefits for some months of the year (depending on his projected earnings) and withhold his benefits for the remaining months. They will also monitor his annual earnings as reported to the IRS and make any appropriate benefit adjustment afterwards.

If SS benefits are withheld because your husband exceeded the annual earnings limit, when he reaches his full retirement age (67), Social Security will give him time-credit for all month's that benefits were withheld. Essentially, they will advance his actual claim date by the number of months benefits were withheld, which will make his monthly benefit higher at his FRA. The higher amount he receives after reaching his FRA will help

him recover some of the money withheld as a result of exceeding the earnings limit before his FRA.

Please note that it is always best to inform Social Security up front if your husband plans to work and earn (even part time) prior to reaching his FRA. The IRS will provide the SSA with your husband's earnings information, and SSA will (if his projected earnings weren't disclosed when he applied) issue an Overpayment Notice if he earns more than allowed. He will then be required to repay SS everything owed, or have his benefits withheld until Social Security recovers what he owes.

One final point: by claiming his benefits in January 2026, your husband's monthly amount will be reduced by about 22% (from the amount he would get at his FRA of 67). Claiming early (before FRA) always results in a benefit reduction, whereas waiting longer than FRA to claim always results in a higher monthly amount (maximum benefit is reached at age 70).

Newsom Wanted to Fast-Track, the Legislature Slowed

Repeatedly Gavin Newsom has sought legislative approval of his high-priority policy proposals within the annual state budget process, even though they often have nothing to do with the budget.

The unique rules governing the budget and its accompanying "trailer bills" allow them to be enacted quickly, bypassing many parliamentary hurdles and vote thresholds that other legislation must endure.

The Legislature, controlled by Newsom's fellow Democrats, generally allows him to use the budget process, in part because legislators often employ the same shortcuts for their own priorities.

Their underlying motive for the sneaky use — or misuse — of the budget process is to avoid prolonged analysis and debate that might, if the bills' contents are fully vetted, make them more difficult to enact. The trailer bills often contain favors for interest groups that would be difficult to justify in a

more transparent process.

Last month, while unveiling a revised state budget, Newsom asked the Legislature to attach legislation that would fast-track the highly controversial project to move Sacramento River water to the California Aqueduct without it flowing through the Sacramento-San Joaquin Delta — renewing a tactic that failed two years ago.

First proposed as a "peripheral canal" more than a half-century ago, it morphed into twin tunnels and, after Newsom's election, a single tunnel. Its purpose has also evolved, from a mechanism to increase water deliveries to Southern California, to one that would, Newsom and others argue, improve the reliability of deliveries.

"For too long, attempts to modernize our critical water infrastructure have stalled in endless red tape, burdened with unnecessary delay," Newsom said. "We're done with barriers. Our state needs to complete this project as soon as possible, so that we can better store and manage water to prepare for a hotter, drier future. Let's get this built."

It would take a book — a big book — to fully explain all of the project's environmental, financial and political aspects. Briefly, however, while advocates say that isolating water conveyance from the Delta would

improve habitat for fish and other wildlife, opponents contend that less water flowing through the estuary would further degrade its water quality.

While Newsom and other supporters often depict the tunnel as a stand-alone project, it is inexorably related to other aspects of California's very complex water picture.

For instance, as it touts a tunnel that would doubtless reduce Delta flows, the state also is pressuring farmers to reduce diversions from the San Joaquin River and its tributaries, to increase flows through the Delta. Those two efforts are not officially linked, but the connection is obvious.

The long-stalled Delta Conveyance Project — the latest of several official names — has slowly approached the final pre-construction phase, which is why Newsom wanted a trailer bill to finally get a green light.

The Future of Warfare is Here

Ukraine may not have "the cards," as President Trump put it, but it does have drones. They were used to great effect over the weekend in an audacious attack within Russia that has focused the world's attention on a revolution in warfare.

A badly outmanned and outgunned country just reached far inside its adversary's territory to destroy or damage hugely expensive, nuclear-capable strategic aircraft with low-cost drones basically indistinguishable from ones available on Amazon.

It's not quite David versus Goliath, because the Russian giant is not going to be felled by the blow, but the diplomatic and psychological impact of the raid could be profound, as Ukraine seeks to demonstrate to the West its staying power.

For creativity and outsized effect with widely available devices, the Ukrainian attack is in the same league as Israel's beeper attack on Hezbollah operatives in Lebanon last year. Both operations also carry a message about new vulnerabilities -- to a compromised supply chain and to a surprise drone attack -- that should make us take notice.

We've just watched the equivalent of aviation legend Billy Mitchell's demonstration in 1921 when he had U.S. planes

sink a former German battleship, in a display of the emerging potency of air power.

Ukraine's Operation Spider Web combined Mission Impossible-style intrigue -- the drones were secreted within Russia and some of them launched from containers attached to trucks, unbeknownst to the drivers -- with clever innovation.

The attacks spanned several time zones and hit 41 Russian aircraft, according to the Ukrainians. The operation was the latest iteration of a cat-and-mouse drone war between Ukraine and Russia. The Ukraine conflict is essentially a war of attrition, yet it is anything but static, as the means of waging it change almost by the week. Offensive innovation is met with defensive countermove, triggering another change on offense.

Drones are vulnerable to electronic jamming? Then, they'll be controlled by massive spools of fiber optic cable. Drones threaten supply routes? Then, the roads will be covered with netting. And drones will be attacked by other drones. What the siren of the Stuka dive-bomber was to the Blitzkrieg -- an unmistakable herald of a new way of waging war -- the high-pitched whirr of the drone is to the Ukraine war.

Estimates are that drones now inflict about 70% of casualties on both sides, and there are literally millions of them. Russia deployed roughly 4 million drones last year, and Ukraine about 1.5 million. We have much to learn from all this. After last weekend, every commander of a U.S. base should be thinking anew about potential vulnerabilities to drone attack, and it's

not hard to imagine the Chinese utilizing drones to execute a wide-ranging strike in the Western Pacific if Beijing goes after Taiwan.

Once a leader in drone technology when its Predators were taking out targets in the War on Terror, the U.S. hasn't kept up with the adaptations happening in the Ukraine war. Inevitably, our own bureaucratic processes are our worst enemy.

As head of the U.S. National Drone Association, Nathan Ecelbarger, writes, the system for acquiring drones "remains deeply flawed, overly bureaucratic and resistant to innovation."

We'll have to focus more on defenses, too, from early detection to counter-drone capabilities. The problem with using missiles to defeat drones is the asymmetry in expense -- an SM-2 missile costs millions, whereas a Houthi drone costs thousands. And drone swarms could overcome a battery of missiles.

This is the reason why the work of next-generation defense firms like Epirus, which has developed a scalable, high-power microwave technology platform that can knock a swarm of drones from the sky, is so important.

What's happening in the Ukraine war is the norm in human conflict. It's adapt or watch your castle get reduced to rubble, your fleet get sent to the bottom of the ocean or a leg of your nuclear triad get assaulted by, essentially, a plaything of hobbyists.

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Sacramento's Souper History

New Campbell's Canning Exhibit is 'Mmm, Mmm, Good!'

SACRAMENTO, CA (MPG) - On May 23, the line outside the Sacramento History Museum appeared more like a family reunion than a grand opening. The Campbell's Soup Company Plant exhibit, which spans its full history from 1947 to 2013, will be on display through Sept. 1.

Several generations of Sacramento's Campbell Soup Company Plant workers attended to see their story reflected in the new exhibit, "Sacramento In a Can."

Roy Puthuff and Jim Meeter were among the 175 coworkers at the exhibit's opening who exchanged hugs and hearty handshakes.

Puthuff was a facilities manager for 31 years. Meeter began sweeping floors in 1967 and moved up to warehouse manager until leaving in 2013.

"You get to see people you haven't seen in a while," Meeter said. "It brings back old memories. We had tournaments like golfing, fishing and barbecues. I miss it."

The Sacramento Campbell Soup Company Plant was a family affair for Cindy and Bill Fuentes. Cindy Fuentes handled the filler, soup lids and quality inspection. Bill Fuentes was trained to do whatever was needed, including maintenance, shipping and pest control. Both had parents and siblings working alongside them for more than 30 years.

When the Sacramento History Museum doors opened May 23, the boisterous energy spilled into the rooms. Former employees hugged family and friends and looked at displays and videos.

The crowd's excitement had Richard Acala

beaming. Acala, who kicked-started the exhibit, worked at Campbell's for 20 years (his last job was in the Prego Department).

Acala explained how he got the idea for an exhibit.

"I posted things on Facebook and got a lot of responses from the employees," Acala said. "I thought we should honor our employees. After the plant closed in 2013 and then was knocked down, everyone felt lost."

A year and a half ago, Acala said, he reached out to Delta Pick Mello, Sacramento History Museum executive director and CEO. Pick Mello immediately contacted Mary Ellen Burns, a local historian and author, to do the research and write the stories, according to Acala.

Acala got to work, too. "Former employees had meetings, I sent out fliers and we asked for help," Acala said. "I contacted Campbell's Corporate, who donated and matched my contribution. We made it happen."

Employees donated their personal Campbell's memorabilia, of which Acala said, "Every item is very sentimental and will be returned."

Pick Mello explained the area's canning history.

"It was essential to Sacramento's growth in the 1900s. We talk about being a railroad town and capital city, but our incredible farmland makes us vital to the agricultural world as well. Post-WWII, Campbell's found Sacramento to be a great locale."

Neighborhoods sprouted around the plant and small businesses developed at Franklin Boulevard.

"You find out almost everyone from that area is somehow related to others in the canning business,"

Pick Mello said. "They had a seasonal or summer job or their grandparents worked in canning."

Employees and children also benefited from the Campbell's culture. Siblings Larry Bobiles and Amelia Bobiles were original "Campbell's Kids," Larry Bobiles said.

"Our mom worked the day shift and dad was on graveyard shift, and that's how they raised us," Larry Bobiles said.

Amelia Bobiles reminisced about the family events hosted by the plant: "We attended Christmas parties at the Memorial Auditorium. It was a big show with Santa and each kid got a gift."

As fun as the company could be, the Bobiles children were expected to aim higher.

"My parents woke us up one morning and told us to put on our 'crummy clothes' and took us out picking in the Woodland tomato fields," Amelia

Bobiles said. "We came home and our dad asked us, 'Do you want to pick tomatoes the rest of your life or go to college?'"

They chose college and Campbell's helped with that, too. Amelia Bobiles earned a Campbell's scholarship, paying for all four years at University of California, Davis in 1969.

"I have to say, if it weren't for that scholarship, then going to UC Davis and meeting my husband..." Amelia Bobiles said. "I owe Campbell's Soup my entire life!"

Like the Bobiles' Filipino parents, many immigrants worked at the Sacramento Campbell Soup Company Plant. The plant had signs in multiple languages, including Portuguese, Italian and Japanese.

Jim Lang, who began working at Sacramento Campbell Soup Company Plant when it opened, was sitting with his former coworker and friend, Mitts Yamamoto, who will be 100 years old in February. They both continue to stay in touch and meet for dinner.

Lang commented about the exhibit: "They did a beautiful job. Campbell's

hired so many people; they really helped Sacramento."

During the May 23 exhibit opening, Acala chatted with old friends over a buffet that included cups of tomato soup and small grilled cheese sandwiches, classic Campbell's comfort food that many Sacramento children and adults relished.

"It is amazing when somebody looks at something and says, 'Oh, that's my family; that's my story. I remember that,'" Pick Mello said. "To see them come to see their story in

a museum is just a joy to me."

The exhibit is on two floors at the Sacramento History Museum, 101 I St. Museum hours are from 10 a.m. to 5 p.m. daily.

Admission prices are free for Sacramento History Museum members and children up to age 5; \$6 for youth ages 6 to 17; and \$12 for anyone 18 and over.
