## Breaking Ground on Two New Wells

CITRUS HEIGHTS, CA (MPG) - Citrus Heights Water District (CHWD) recently began constructing two new groundwater wells to improve water reliability for the community and reduce reliance on Folsom Lake during dry years.

The project is supported by more than \$6.6 million in external funding, including more than \$2 million in Community Project Funding championed by Congressman Ami Bera. as well as grant funding through the Regional Water Authority and the State of California.

"These new wells are more than an infrastructure upgrade; they're a smart investment in public health and economic security," said Congressman Ami Bera, M.D. "I was proud to help secure federal funding for this project and I'll continue working to support

CHWD's efforts to deliver reliable and sustainable water supply for families and businesses in Citrus Heights."

The wells will include aquifer storage and recovery technology, a forward-thinking approach that allows Citrus Heights Water District to inject water underground during wet years and pump it out when needed. This flexibility not only supports Citrus Heights Water District customers; it contributes to the health of the region's shared water supply and increases resilience across the Sacramento region.

"This is a regional win," said Brett Ewart, Board Chair of the Regional Water Authority. "By investing in aquifer storage and recovery, we're moving closer to a true regional water bank that helps balance supplies, manage costs, and strengthen our response to dry periods."

Construction of Wells number 7 and number 8 are underway. Both are part of Citrus Heights Water District's broader Groundwater Expansion and Reinvestment Program.

"These wells are part of CHWD's commitment to safe, reliable, and affordable water service," said Ray Riehle, president of the Citrus Heights Water District Board of Directors. "We should all be proud of this investment for our community and future generations. We're committed to planning ahead, applying for grants, and making smart investmentsso our customers always receive high-quality water. These wells represent our mission in action."

The Citrus Heights Water District provides safe, high-quality water to more than 70,000 customers in parts of Citrus Heights, Fair Oaks, Orangevale, Carmichael and Roseville. The water district was established in 1920. Learn more at the Citrus Heights Water District's website at chwd.org.

#### Reduce **Electricity During** Flex Alerts and **Earn Bill Credits**

SACRAMENTO REGION, CA (MPG) - With temperature rising, it's not too late to register for Power Saver Rewards, a California **Public Utilities Commission** 

Anyone enrolled can receive credit on their electric bill when they reduce energy use during a Flex Alert issued between May 1 and Oct. 31. The annual limit for Power Saver Rewards events is 60 hours (or 12 events).

A Flex Alert is a call to reduce energy use, normally issued from 4 to 9 p.m. on hot days, when electricity demand is at its highest as residents return home from work or school.

Power Saver Rewards events are triggered when the California Independent System Operator issues a Flex Alert or an Energy Emergency Alert Watch, according to PG&E (Pacific

Gas and Electric Company). If a Flex Alert or an Energy Emergency Alert Watch is issued on short notice without day-before notification, then a Power Saver Rewards event will not be called for that day.

Enrollees receive Flex Alert notifications through emails, text messages and/or mobile app push notifications.

"The best way to help during a Flex Alert is to avoid using large appliances like dishwashers, washing machines and dryers, and to set your thermostat to 78 degrees," said Wilfredo Cruz, the nonprofit Community Resource Project organization's executive director. "If possible, use fans instead of your air conditioning. These small changes can make a big impact."

"It's a win-win for all PG&E residents," Cruz said. "You're helping your community remain powered up during high-demand hours and you're receiving a credit back on your utility bill at the same time."

According to PG&E, those participating in the Power Saver Rewards Program will receive a yearly bill credit of \$1 per kilowatt-hour (kWh) of energy that is reduced during Power Saver Rewards events. Starting in 2024, incentives were lowered from \$2 per KWh to \$1 per kWh.

# Timothy 'Chip' Dale Focused on Student Success

- Over the summer, San Juan Unified School District welcomed new Deputy Superintendent of Schools and Student Support Timothy "Chip" Dale, Ed.D.

Dale brings more than two decades of experience as a teacher, principal and district-level leader, with a people-first approach and a deep belief in the potential of public education to transform lives.

"My journey in education began as a teacher," Dale said. "I was very much drawn to the idea of working with children who had been historically underserved and in one of the urban centers in our nation."

That drive came from formative experiences working with youth in Chicago, including at a juvenile detention center and in the Dearborn housing projects.

"These children were brilliant, smart, funny, full of energy and life was hard," Dale said. "They were overcoming so much and they were doing amazing things, despite the challenges society had thrown their way."

Those early moments cemented Dale's belief in education as a pathway to equity and change.

That purpose has stayed with him through roles in San Diego, Denver and most recently, Chattanooga, Tennessee. As he stepped into leadership, Dale found himself increasingly compelled to address educational challenges at a broader level.

"I left the classroom to go into administration with the thought that I could have a wider impact than just serving the children in my classroom," he said.

While his career has taken him across the country, Dale said, coming to San Juan Unified "felt like coming home."

"What drove me to San Juan

Unified really was not only the mission and vision but the people, united together to ensure every child thrives," Dale said.

Dale is also excited to return to California, where he previously spent 13 years in education.

"I love the fabric of California... You can speak any language, and we're going to value you and empower you," he said.

Dale describes his leadership style as rooted in service and collaboration, shaped by a belief in the importance of learning from those around him.

"If I can serve you, then I can build a relationship with you. If I can build a relationship with you, then I can collaborate with you. And if I can collaborate with you, it's not me; it's we. And we can do great things,"

As deputy superintendent, Dale supports both school sites and district departments, working to align instructional systems and elevate school leadership. He brings a passion for the entire ecosystem of education and leadership development.

"You're painting with different brushes," Dale said. "How do I take my experiences as a teacher, principal and district leader and use those to help?"

Relationship building is at the heart of what Dale said families and staff can expect in his first year

When he is not working alongside educators and students, Dale is focused on being a dad, exploring nature with his dog and perfecting his favorite comfort foods. Dale and his wife are raising their 14-year-old daughter, a runner who regularly challenges him to keep up.

A lover of both mountains and the coast, Dale finds peace in beautiful spaces and enjoys culinary adventures with his wife, including cooking at home and hunting for the perfect slice of pizza or, in California, a carnitas burrito.

To achieve the organization's most lofty rank, candidates must complete a project that benefits the community and incorporates skills learned during their merit training.

"I've been saving for this project for years," Evans said. "I sold popcorn and store coupon cards. My family and friends helped, and the Carmichael Kiwanis Club made a donation of \$300."

Altogether, Evan's project had a \$1,400 price tag.

"Completing it would have been hard without my mom and dad," Evan said. "They sat down with me to work on designs; they took me to stores to see building material. My sister and brother encouraged me to keep working for my goal."

"Watching Edward and Elizabeth inspired me to go this far," said the future Eagle. "Scouting teaches good skills, and how to become a good person in your life.

The John Adams Academy, Roseville, student began Scouting as a 10-year-old Cub.

"I've been going to the Nature Area since I was 10," he said. "I like their Veteran ceremonies. I also like walking around the trails and learning about plants and animals. I saw how full the tool sheds were. One was so old and rotten, the next storm might have collapsed it.

# SMUD Hosts Electric Vehicle "Ride and Drive" Event

citrus Heights, ca (MPG) - With just weeks left until federal electric vehicle (EV) tax credits worth up to \$7,500 end on Sept. 30, SMUD hosted a special "ride and drive" event at the Sunrise Mall during the weekly Farmer's Market on Aug. 9 to give the community an opportunity to test drive a variety of electric vehicles and get expert guidance on tax incentives before those savings disappear.

Federal EV tax credits offer up to \$7,500 for new vehicles and \$4,000 for used ones but only if customers buy and take delivery before Sept. 30.

The special event was held from 8 a.m. to 1 p.m. By 11 a.m., more than 103 individuals set aside their produce and purchases to register to take a test drive in one of six different EV vehicles which SMUD provided for their consideration.

"It's an exceptional turnout today and a lot of interest in EV's. We want to get the word out to the public before the federal tax credits expire on Sept. 30," said SMUD Electric Vehicle program manager John Grindrod.

as the 50th electric vehicle ride-and-drive event which SMUD has hosted, according to Grindrod. Event participants could experience the latest in electric vehicle technology, talk to electric vehicle owners about their experiences, learn about electric vehicle charging and find out about incentives and rebates that help make electric vehicles an affordable option.

The number of electric vehicles in Sacramento County is continuing to grow with total registrations now up to more than 70,000 according to a recent estimate, Grindrod said. The largest percentage of personal electric vehicle owners use home chargers. Public electric-vehicle charging stations are also gaining

In Citrus Heights, a new EVgo charging station recently opened to the public in the parking lot of Sunrise Mall near Macy Center Drive and another is under construction in the MarketPlace at Birdcage, just off Birdcage Lane near Best Buy.

the Sacramento Metro Air District and Charge Across Town based in San Francisco were on hand to answer questions about the advantages of electric vehicle ownership, as well as several electric- vehicle owners who brought their own

vehicles to share their ownership experience.

Drivers could get behind the wheel of a BMW, Chevy Volt, Ford F-150 Lightning pick-up truck, Ford Mustang Mach-E, Hyundai Ionic, Tesla, or VW ID.4 for a quick spin around a designated area of the Sunrise

Mall parking lot.

SMUD has partnered with multiple auto manufacturers to acquire a sample fleet of electrical vehicles, according to Grindrod.

The test drive registration process was easy to follow and the wait to drive was short. Participants who completed a test drive received a \$10 voucher to use at any booth at the Sunrise Mall Farmers Market upon completion of their test drive and were asked to complete a survey about their driving experience.

Representatives of the Sacramento Metropolitan Air Quality Management District's Clean Cars 4 All program described incentives to help Sacramento County income-qualified residents buy an all-electric, plug-in or hybrid vehicle.

Visit SacCleanCars4All.org for more information. Participants in the Clean Cars 4 All program can get up to \$12,000 to purchase or lease an eligible plug pin (PHEV), battery electric (BEV) or fuel-cell electric vehicle or up to \$7,500 for an electric bike if they turn in an eligible vehicle.

As Sacramento County gas prices continue to fluctuate, drivers who opt to switch to electric vehicles might save up to \$1,500 annually in fuel costs, according to SMUD estimates. The utility also offers a reduced midnight-to-6 a.m. home electric-vehicle discount charging rate for its customers.

"We're here to help," Grindrod said. "If you're just starting to look or if you're ready to purchase, we can help with information on incentives and rebates, the best EV to fit your needs and charging assistance. SMUD also has a dedicated team to help its residential and business customers understand the basics of EV ownership and charging options."

# Long-term Liability Increases to \$91.5 Billion

### State Controller Announces Benefits Increases for State Retirees

**SACRAMENTO, CA (MPG)** - State Controller Malia M. Cohen published a report showing the state's net liability for retiree health and dental benefits, also known as other post-employment benefits (OPEB), increased to \$91.5 billion on Aug. 6.

The liability represents the present-day cost to provide health and dental benefits to state retirees and their dependents earned as of June 30, 2024, and is an estimate developed by actuaries in consideration of current and future economic, demographic, and health care-related assumptions that are subject to change on an annual basis.

California's net other post-employment benefits liability increased by \$6.3 billion since the prior year's valuation of \$85.2 billion. In comparison, the net OPEB liability increased by \$2.8 billion from the end of fiscal year 2021-22 to the end of fiscal year 2022-23 and decreased by \$13.1 billion from the end of fiscal year 2020-21 to the end of fiscal year 2021-22.

Health care claims experience, plan design, trend rates, demographic experience, and changes to the blended discount rate affected the total other post-employment benefits liability estimate. A significant driver behind the total OPEB liability increase includes higher than average per member healthcare claim costs and plan design

changes that increased the expected total OPEB liability by \$4.9 billion.

Changes in the health care trend rate assumptions, including adjustments to reflect the potential impact of the Inflation Reduction Act on Medicare prescription drug benefits, increased the total OPEB liability by nearly \$2.5 billion. The blended discount rate is based on the combination of the full funding discount rate of 6.00 percent and the 20-year municipal bond index which increased from 3.86 percent at the end of fiscal year 2022-23 to 3.97 percent at the end of fiscal year 2023-24. The change to the blended discount rate decreased the total OPEB liability by \$1.6 billion.

"The estimated liability for retiree health and dental benefits is a significant long-term cost facing California, which is why the state set a responsible goal to fully fund these benefits over the longterm by 2046," said Controller Cohen. "Since 2010, the state and public employees through collective bargaining have contributed to the prefunding of these benefits, which allows investment income to relieve the future financial burden that would otherwise fall to employees and taxpayers. Given the current climate of economic uncertainty and looming budget shortfalls, the state's current actions to pause prefunding contributions will save General Fund dollars. However, the most fiscally prudent plan for fully funding these promised health and dental benefits includes a return to prefunding when feasible, as well as remaining vigilant in our efforts to contain health care costs."

Beginning in January 2010,

California entered into collective bargaining agreements to prefund retiree health and dental benefits. Contributions were deposited into the California Employers' Retiree Benefit Trust to generate investment income. The trust funds cannot be used to pay the retiree health benefits until the state has fully funded the legacy liability, or until 2046, whichever

Prior to these prefunding efforts, the state paid for the benefits on a pay-as-you-go basis, covering only the minimum amount needed to fund the costs as they were due. With all bargaining units, except for those under the California State University, contributing to the trust, analysts expected to see acceleration of the funded ratio.

comes first.

However, several current bargaining agreements reached with

state public employee unions beginning in fiscal year 2025-26 suspend state and/or employee prefunding contributions toward future benefits for two years.

The California Public Employees Retirement System (CalPERS) is the state's largest purchaser of public employee health benefits, and the Controller serves as a voting member of its Pension & Health Benefits Committee. CalPERS uses its market position to contain rising health care costs for its members and retirees by providing choices for affordable health plans, negotiating for lower premiums, encouraging prevention, and stabilizing and lowering the costs of prescription drugs where feasible.

As the chief fiscal officer of California, Controller Malia M. Cohen independently oversees and manages California's financial resources with integrity and transparency to build trust. The controller is responsible for accountability and disbursement of the state's financial resources. The controller has independent auditing authority over government agencies that spend state funds. She is a member of numerous financing authorities and fiscal and financial oversight entities including the Franchise Tax Board. # President's Executive Order Opening 401(k)s to Private Markets Needed

**SACRAMENTO REGION, CA** - On Aug. 7, the California Business Roundtable indicated its support to expand access to private investments in 401(k) accounts.

The president's order directs the Department of Labor and the Securities and Exchange Commission to issue guidance to employers and U.S. retirement plan administrators on including private assets in 401(k) retirement plans. This regulatory clarity removes a key barrier that kept many California employers from offering a broader range of investment options to their workers. It will strengthen California's retirement system, which operates in a high-cost-of-living environment where working families deserve every advantage to build wealth.

"Expanding access to private markets will help Californians build wealth and successfully save for a comfortable retirement," said Rob Lapsley, president of the California Business Roundtable. "All workers, not just the wealthy, deserve to have access to wealth-building tools. This executive order democratizes the same investment opportunities for working families that have long been available to institutional investors and government pension recipients."

For too long, unclear regulations have

stopped California employers from offering alternative investments, creating a two-tier system where only wealthy investors and public pension holders could access higher-return private markets. President Trump's executive order removes that uncertainty, empowering employers to offer stronger financial tools

while reducing the litigation risk that has

plagued retirement plan sponsors.

Performance data from leading financial institutions supports President Trump's decision. Private equity has consistently outperformed public markets over the long term. Recent studies show that private equity has returned an average of 10.7% annually, compared to the public benchmark of only 6.6%. While public pension funds have raised their investments in alternatives from 10% to 25%, most working Americans still can't access these higher returns because of outdated rules.

The order also arrives as California workers face mounting challenges to their retirement security. With Baby Boomers turning 65 at record rates and Social Security projected to be unable to meet its obligations by 2033, strong 401(k) performance is more important than ever. Defined contribution plans now outnumber defined benefit plans by a ratio of eight to one, making private market access essential for achieving retirement adequacy.

California Business Roundtable urges policymakers to build on this momentum by updating other outdated rules that block financial innovation. California's economic competitiveness depends on ensuring our workforce has access to the same wealth-building opportunities available to institutional investors and this executive order represents a major step toward that goal.

### PG&E Data Center Demand Pipeline Swells to 10 Gigawatts

SACRAMENTO REGION, CA (MPG) - Pacific Gas and Electric Company (PG&E) on July 31 shared that it is proactively working to serve 10 gigawatts (GW) of new electricity demand from data center projects over the next 10 years, which is enough energy to simultaneously power approximately 7.5-million homes.

The 10 GW in PG&E's data center project pipeline reflects a significant increase from the 8.7 GW of data center demand PG&E reported in May and the 5.5 GW the company reported in February.

This milestone includes the results of PG&E's April 2025 study of data center applications from across its 70,000- square-mile service area.

"Data centers are powering more than just the digital world; they're helping power California's future and PG&E is proud to lead the way in meeting growing demand for data centers," said Mike Medeiros, vice-president, South Bay Delivery, PG&E. "This growth can help lower costs for all electric customers while creating tens of thousands of jobs and billions in local revenue."

PG&E estimates the 10
GW of anticipated data center load growth could lead to lower customer electric bills by 10% or more by spreading fixed costs across more energy usage, create 50,000 construction jobs and 115,000 associated support jobs, add 5,000 permanent tech jobs and 28,500 permanent support roles, generate \$1.25 to \$1.75 billion in increased property tax

approximately 1.5 GW are in the final engineering phase (the last step before project construction starts) and projected to begin operations between 2026 and 2030. Most of these are in San Jose, Silicon Valley and the greater San Francisco Bay Area but some are also in the Central Valley and Sacramento.

Growth in data center demand is good news for all PG&E customers.

New energy demand from data centers allows PG&E to utilize more of its existing power infrastructure. Today, PG&E's grid is 45% utilized on average. By spreading the fixed costs of operating and maintaining the grid over more units of energy, PG&E can increase the average grid utilization rate and each customer's dollar can go further.

### 'In a Nutshell' Returns to Sacramento

### Storytellers Tackle the Theme of Bullies

SACRAMENTO, CA (MPG) - "In a Nutshell," a live storytelling event that has quickly gained a loyal following in Sacramento, is back on Aug. 29 at the Sofia, 2700 Capitol Ave., bringing compelling, raw and entertaining stories to

Curated and hosted by comedian Keith Lowell Jensen, writer/storyteller Amy Bee and author Aaron Carnes, the event promises a night of diverse storytelling with a focus on the theme of "Bullies."

The event, which will run from 6 to 9 p.m., features four prominent storytellers: Brian Copeland, Kimberlli Joy, Corey Rosen and Kathleen Taylor. These performers, each with unique backgrounds and experiences, will share personal stories that explore the complex and evocative nature of bullying.

Before the event kicks off, attendees can attend a book signing with Brian Copeland in the lobby. Copeland, a multi-talented storyteller, actor and author, will promote his book "Shadows of Justice." Afterward, he will sign copies, offering fans an opportunity to engage directly with him.

In an exclusive interview, "In a Nutshell" co-creator Carnes explained how the series came to life.

"Amy and Keith are storytellers themselves and we all share a deep love for writing. We went to a storytelling show in the North Bay in 2024 and were really impressed with it. We started talking about how cool it would be to bring something like that to Sacramento," said Carnes. "In January 2025, we had our first show and the response was incredible."

Since then, "In a Nutshell" has grown in popularity, with each monthly event offering a handpicked lineup of storytellers.

"The goal is never competition," Carnes said. "Each performer gets

15 minutes and we really curate the lineup. We want diverse stories but all tied together with a theme."

As the digital world continues to dominate our lives, live storytelling has a unique power to connect us. Carnes reflected on the emotional impact of experiencing a story told in person.

"Storytelling is the oldest form of entertainment," Carnes said. "It creates a flow of energy between the audience and the storyteller that is really compelling. You're reacting together. There's something real about it, something tangible."

Event co-creator Jensen also highlighted the power of storytelling in fostering human connection.

'Growing up, I'd always hear stories in circles that would happen organically; people want to share their stories," Jensen said. "Every form of entertainment comes down to telling a story. Without any special effects, no visuals, it's still so effective, which

is why we address our audiences

This month's theme, Bullies, suggested by co-creator Bee, is both personal and evoking.

"I think everyone has a bullying

story, sometimes even being the bully," Jensen said. "Bullying is such an important topic right now. and it's one that's near and dear to a lot of us. This theme is deeply personal and it's something that resonates with so many people."

The storytellers for this month's show bring a wealth of experience and distinct voices to the stage.

Copeland is known for his diverse body of work, including his recent book and one-person plays.

"Brian (Copeland) is a fantastic storyteller," Carnes said. "He was in a radio talk in San Francisco. Both Amy (Bee) and I are from the Bay Area, so we are really excited for that."

Rosen, a major figure in the San Francisco Bay Area's "Moth" storytelling scene, will also take the stage. Rosen, a writer, actor and author of "Your Story, Well Told," is known for his skill in guiding people through the art of storytelling.

Joy, who began telling stories on stage in June 2022, and Taylor, a writer, educator and storyteller, are new performers at the Nutshell and were recommended by previous storytellers.

For the creators of "In a Nutshell," the ultimate goal is connection.

"It's supposed to be fun and entertaining but there is a serious tone to it too about experiencing our humanity and everyone else's humanity together. Hearing peoples' stories is one of the most human thing people can do," Carnes said. "We want people to hear the world in a more sympathetic lens. We shouldn't see each other as allies or enemies. Storytelling won't fix the world but hopefully it makes us think of our shared humanity."

Jensen added, "We're just three friends who love stories. We want people to come have fun and walk away with something they'll remember. It's a shared experience that brings people together."

For those who have never attended a live storytelling event, Carnes offered a simple invitation: "It's oddly compelling. The first time I went to a storytelling show, I was blown away by how engaged I was. The 15-minute format is just enough to tell a full story but not so long that it becomes too much. You'll be surprised by how powerful and intimate the experience is."

While "In a Nutshell" has found a home at The Sofia, the team is planning to expand their reach.

In addition to the main event, "In a Nutshell" also hosts an open mic show at Old Soul at The Alley on the third Thursday of each month. This event allows new storytellers to try their hand at the craft and gain experience.

SACRAMENTO COUNTY, CA (MPG) -Sacramento County's annual Fentanyl Awareness Summit is back this year with a renewed sense of urgency and hope.

The Sacramento County Department of Health Services, in collaboration with the Sacramento County Opioid Coalition; Sierra Sacramento Valley Medical Society; California State University, Sacramento; the U.S. Attorney's Office; Sac Metro Fire and local law enforcement, hosts the Sept. 4 event.

The summit aims to bring community members together to analyze data trends; discuss prevention, treatment, harm reduction and enforcement efforts; hear from those with lived experiences; provide resources and support ongoing solutions for a safer community.

This year's event centers around a message that sets it apart from previous summits: fentanyl-related deaths are declining in Sacramento County for the second year in a row.

After years of staggering increases, new data shows another year of progress. The Sacramento County Coroner's Office reported a 32% reduction in fentanyl-related deaths from 2023 to 2024. It's a promising sign that prevention, education, treatment and enforcement efforts are making an impact.

"We know we still have a long road ahead but this decline is something to hold onto," said Lori Miller, division manager for Sacramento County's Substance Use

CITRUS HEIGHTS, CA (MPG) - On the afternoon of Aug. 5. Citrus Heights Police Department detectives served arrest warrants for two suspects in connection with the October 2024 fentanyl-related death of a 25-year-old man.

Gabriela Valenzuela, 20, and Luis Romero-Espinoza, 22, were taken into custody and are being charged with homicide resulting from the victim's fentanyl overdose, as well as felony illegal drug sales.

On Oct. 23, 2024, Citrus Heights Police Department officers responded to a call regarding an unresponsive 25-year-old male at a residence in Citrus Heights. Despite life-saving efforts by Citrus Heights Police Department officers and Sacramento Metro Fire medical personnel, the victim was pronounced deceased at the scene. Detectives responded and found evidence indicating the victim had died from a fentanyl overdose, according to police.

Following a comprehensive investigation, Citrus Heights Police Department detectives said that Valenzuela and Romero-Espinoza provided the fentanyl that caused the victim's death. Multiple search warrants were executed and investigators said they found evidence that both suspects had full knowledge of the dangers associated with fentanyl prior to its sale to the victim.

Fentanyl is a highly potent and deadly synthetic opioid, and just two milligrams, the equivalent of a few grains of salt, can be fatal. The U.S. Drug Enforcement Administration (DEA) warns that "One Pill Can Kill.'

Drug dealers who knowingly sell fentanvl-laced substances that result in death can and will be prosecuted for murder under California law. The Citrus Heights Police Department is committed to holding drug traffickers accountable and urges the public to understand the deadly consequences of fentanyl use and distribution.

If you or someone you know is struggling with substance abuse, help is available. Don't let one pill be the last.

# First Scrimmage of Fall Camp

**DAVIS, CA (MPG)** - It sounded a lot like football season at University of California, Davis Health Stadium on Sunday, Aug. 3 when No. 11 UC Davis football strapped it up and welcomed officials to Shredville for the first full scrimmage of fall camp under clear skies and the California sun.

"The first thing we look at after a day like this is did we get through it healthy and I'm pretty sure we did that," said head coach Tim Plough. "We did a good job today of taking care of each other while still having a physical practice. I was happy with all three phases of the game, including the communication and the lack of penalties. We were very clean today, which is good.

"We ran the ball well and converted on first downs all day long, driving consistently all day. And on defense, I thought that we tackled well and showed that we can put pressure on the

quarterback. It was also good to see the defense not give up a lot of explosive plays," Plough said. "I also thought Hunter [Ridley] had a great day, hitting a bunch of kicks for us. That's the great thing about having a kicker like Hunter; he can come in there and bang one through for us anywhere. Overall, I thought we had a really good day."

Ridley, a preseason All-American, nailed each of his kicks from different hash marks and distances throughout the practice, making sure the offense came away with points each opportunity he had. While under center the quarterback play of Grant Harper, Caden Pinnick and Treynor Cleeland have shown that the Aggie offense should be in position to not miss a beat despite the need to replace that spot.

Up front, the physicality on both sides of the ball has been on display during camp, as the additions on the defensive side of the ball have made great strides. Offensively, the Aggies return all five starters on the line and on the defensive side the additions of transfer All-American Jacob Psyk and All-Ivy Leaguer Derrell Smith-Porter have made it so the battles in the trenches have been a must-watch throughout camp.

UC Davis opens 2025 on Aug. 23 in Montgomery, Alabama, when they face No. 12 Mercer in the 2025 FCS Kickoff Classic. That game is set to kick off at 4 p.m. Pacific Time and will be aired on ESPN. The Aggies open UC Davis Health Stadium on

Sept. 20 when Southern Utah visits Davis for a 7 p.m. kick.



### Collins' Summer Success Continues

SACRAMENTO REGION, CA (MPG) - Seasons often can be made or broken in the dog days of summer. As the temperature rises, the competition around the league continues to sharpen. Teams look to the summer stretch to create some space in the table and demonstrate

their skills.

This year, Sacramento's mid-season swing started off in an impeccable manner: four clean sheets and a trip to the knockout rounds of United Soccer League's (USL) Jägermeister Cup.

In his first season with Sacramento, Neill Collins has embraced the challenges of a new conference and new competitions. While the early season for any first-year coach can be rough and tumble, the stifling heat of Sacramento's summer has seen the results every club wants.

On July 4 in Las Vegas, Collins saw a 2-0 win, AJ Edwards' first goal and Blake Willey's first assist. On July 12 versus El Paso, Collins saw a 3-0 win, became the youngest (and fourth overall) head coach to reach 100 wins in the USL Championship and a goal and assist from Benitez/Herrera and second assist in as many weeks for Willey. On July 19 versus Lexington, Collins saw a 0-0 draw and the 10th Clean Sheet across all comps. On July 26 versus Spokane Velocity (USL Cup), Collins saw a 1-0 win, finished first in group; a Benitez header goal in

10th minute and Mazzola with the third clean sheet of the tournament.

But Sacramento's July achievements should come as no surprise to anyone who has followed Collins' coaching career. In fact, in his most successful seasons, the Scottish manager has used the summer months as a springboard for end-of-season success.

From 2020 to 2022, the three years that Collins' Tampa Bay Rowdies reached the Eastern Conference Final, his teams claimed 18 wins in July and August and netted an impressive 49 goals. Each season, the Rowdies went on an undefeated streak of at least five games, highlighted by a six-game win streak in 2022.

In 2021, August kicked off a stretch of 12 games without a loss (11 wins, 1 draw), during which Tampa Bay held opponents scoreless for a league record 891 minutes. The Rowdies later claimed the Players' Shield with 71 points and reached the league final for the second year in a row, earning Collins the honor of USL Championship Coach of the Year.

In Collins' tenure in Sacramento, the signature element of success has been team defense. Republic FC has a league-low of 12 goals conceded this season, with seven total clean sheets ranking second in the USL. The relentless pursuit of its opponents starts with the corps of strikers willing to work for the entire squad.

work for the entire squad. The attacking unit ranks among league leaders in possessions won, passes and fouls won in the final third. The midfield unit is crucial in maintaining possession leading up to the attack and ranks among league leaders in completing passes in the opponent's half. Sacramento's formidable backline has won the most duels and second-most aerial duels in the USL this year.

Rounding out the relentless roster, the Quails have a pair of elite goalkeepers with 10 clean sheets in league and USL cup play.

Despite a commanding start to the summer, the second half of the season awaits Collins and Republic FC. The squad faced second-place San Antonio FC for a top-table matchup this past weekend, after press time, in a test of two top Western Conference clubs. In the team's previous game this season, Sacramento shut out the Texas squad in a defensive showdown.

# Kurtz Named Player and Rookie of the Month

WEST SACRAMENTO, CA (MPG) - A's first baseman Nick Kurtz has been named the American League Player and Rookie of the Month for July.

This is the third consecutive month that an A's player has won American League Rookie of the Month and the second straight month Kurtz has won the award. Shortstop Jacob Wilson won Rookie of the Month for May. This marks the 12th time that a player has won both

awards in the same calendar month.

In July, Kurtz hit .395 with a 1.433 OPS, 13 doubles, 11 home runs, 27 RBI, and 25 extra-base hits. For the month, he led the American League in average, on-base-percentage (.480), slugging (.953), OPS, doubles, RBI (runs batted in), extra-base hits and total bases (82).

Additionally, Kurtz was tied for first in home runs, tied for second in runs scored (24), and ranked second in hits (34). On July 25 at Houston, Kurtz


went 6-for-6 with six runs scored, a double and four home runs, becoming the 20th player and first rookie in Major League history with a four-homer game.

Kurtz becomes the 10th

Kurtz becomes the 10th player to win both Player of the Month and Rookie of the Month in the same calendar month, joining Ryan Braun (July 2007), Buster Posey (July 2010), Mike Trout (July 2012), Yasiel Puig (June 2013), Jose Abreu (April and July 2014), Gary Sanchez (August 2016), Aaron Judge (June and September 2017), Aristedes Aquino (August 2019) and Wyatt Langford (September

In June, Kurtz hit .264 with a .926 OPS, seven home runs, 17 RBI, seven walks and 10 extra-base hits. For the year, Kurtz is hitting .304 with a 1.030 OPS, 23 home runs and 61 RBI. Kurtz leads all rookies in home runs, RBI and OPS (min. 100 PA). Since his Major League debut on April 23, Kurtz's OPS ranks second in the majors, behind Aaron Judge (1.138) and ahead of Shohei Ohtani (1.004).

Prior to the 2025 season, the last A's player to win a monthly award was Mason Miller who was named Reliever of the Month for March/April 2024. Before this season, the last A's player to win Rookie of the Month was Zack Gelof in August 2023. ★

### Median Project Removes Palm Trees on Sunrise Boulevard

CITRUS HEIGHTS, CA (MPG) - An independent contractor working on behalf of the Sacramento Municipal Utility District (SMUD) removed eight palm trees from the traffic median along Sunrise Boulevard to support an upcoming transformer replacement project that is planned this fall, according to the utility.

Although eight palm trees were taken down from Sayonara Drive toward Greenback Lane, more than 12 remain in the median leading from PetSmart toward Citrus Town Center at Greenback Lane.

The Sunrise MarketPlace Business Improvement District has installed dozens of palm trees along Sunrise Boulevard which feature distinctive Sunrise MarketPlace signage, lighting and banners.

Work began on Aug. 4 and continues through the end of the month on Sunrise Boulevard, just south of Sayonara Drive. Hours of work will typically be from 8:30 to 3:30 p.m.

SMUD intends to reconstruct the median on Sunrise Boulevard just south of Sayonara Drive to include a new left-turn pocket, which will serve the Sunrise Vista mobile home park residents on the west side of the street at 6525 Sunrise Blvd.

On the east side of Sunrise Boulevard, just opposite the mobile home park from the new left-turn pocket, a fenced private road provides direct access to a SMUD substation where the transformer replacement project will take place.

SMUD's transformer project is sched-

uled to start sometime this late fall/early winter. Large trucks and equipment which will need access to the SMUD substation yard during the installation of new transformers will turn in and out from this road onto Sunrise Boulevard.

The only way that the utility claims it

could accommodate the oversized loads expected during the construction project was to remove and modify the median, according to a company spokesman.

According to SMUD, the left turn lane onto Sayonara Drive which is governed by a traffic signal will remain unchanged.

A specialized Caltrans design will allow SMUD trucks to drive over the reconstructed median curbs during future deliveries, while still allowing standard vehicle traffic to safely turn left.
