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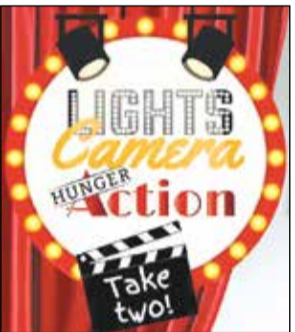
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## Next Up Music Festival Brings Fresh Energy to Plumas Street

**YUBA CITY, CA (MPG)** - The sun was still high over Plumas Street when the first chords rang out, echoing through Yuba City's Hart Plaza. Inside, festivalgoers thumbed through crates of vintage vinyl, while outside, the parking lot transformed into a buzzing

live music venue. It was exactly the kind of moment Skip Bertsch had envisioned when he moved his music café from Marysville last year — a space where the local music scene could come alive.

That vision became reality Aug. 16 during the Next Up Music Festival, hosted by David Terrases and Mikey Pennington.

"It's always been about trying to help create something special for the Yuba-Sutter area and the local music scene," Bertsch said. "Especially for all the new up-and-coming music students."

Although the crowd started slow under the late-afternoon sun, the venue filled by evening. In total, 18 bands performed

ranging in genre from heavy metal to pup-punk, alt rock and more. What's more is that approximately 90% of the music played was all original, offering a rare break from the cover-heavy sets many local fans are used to.

"I think everything went really well. We had an amazing turnout and

## West Nile Virus in Sutter County Confirmed

**Sutter-Yuba Mosquito and Vector Control District News Release**

**YUBA-SUTTER, CA (MPG)** - Sutter County Public Health has confirmed the first human case of West Nile Virus (WNV) in Sutter County this year. This is the 15th human confirmed case of West Nile Virus in California for 2025. West Nile Virus is generally active June through October.

People infected with WNV fall into three categories: No symptoms/asymptomatic (8 in 10 people), Mild to moderate fever illness with fatigue and body aches (1 in 5 people), Severe illness with neurologic symptoms such as encephalitis or meningitis (less than 1 in 150 people).

For those who develop severe West Nile Virus illness, symptoms may last several weeks, and some symptoms may be permanent. There is an increased risk of West Nile virus throughout Sutter County.

"We continue to see increased virus activity and detections in our surveillance system. The risk for human infection is elevated," said Stephen Abshier, District Manager. "Residents need to remain vigilant in protecting themselves from being bitten by mosquitoes."

Residents should inspect their yards for anything holding water. Regular landscape irrigation or unseasonable rain can provide mosquitoes with good breeding habitat. Simply draining or dumping water will prevent new mosquito breeding. The best way to prevent West Nile virus infection is to avoid mosquito bites.

Remember the three D's as noted below.

**DEET** – Use a proven insect repellent like DEET. Other recommended repellents include: picaridin, oil of lemon eucalyptus, para-menthane-diol, IR3535 or 2-undecanone. Always use repellent according to label instructions. DEET is safe for use on children when used as directed.

**DAWN AND DUSK** – Mosquitoes that transmit West Nile Virus bite in the early morning and evening. Wear proper clothing and repellent if outside during these times. Make sure that doors and windows have tight-fitting screens to keep mosquitoes out. Repair or replace screens with tears or holes.

"Be especially mindful during dawn and dusk when mosquito activity is especially high;

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## Hollywood Screenwriter Mark B. Perry Brings Old Hollywood to Marysville

**MARYSVILLE, CA (MPG)** - Inside a dimly lit speakeasy tucked away in Marysville's historic Chinatown, guests leaned in as Mark B. Perry, the Emmy and Golden Globe Award-winning writer-producer behind some of television's most beloved dramas, shared the story of a novel that had been decades in the making. Known for hit shows like *The Wonder Years*, *Picket Fences*, *Party of Five*, *Ghost Whisperer* and *Revenge*, Perry was in town to celebrate the re-release of *And Introducing Dexter Gaines*, a sweeping tale of ambition and betrayal in Old Hollywood.

"This is really the biggest event I've had for the book, and I give all the credit to Patricia for organizing it," Perry said. "We've had a nice time here, Marysville seems quite charming."

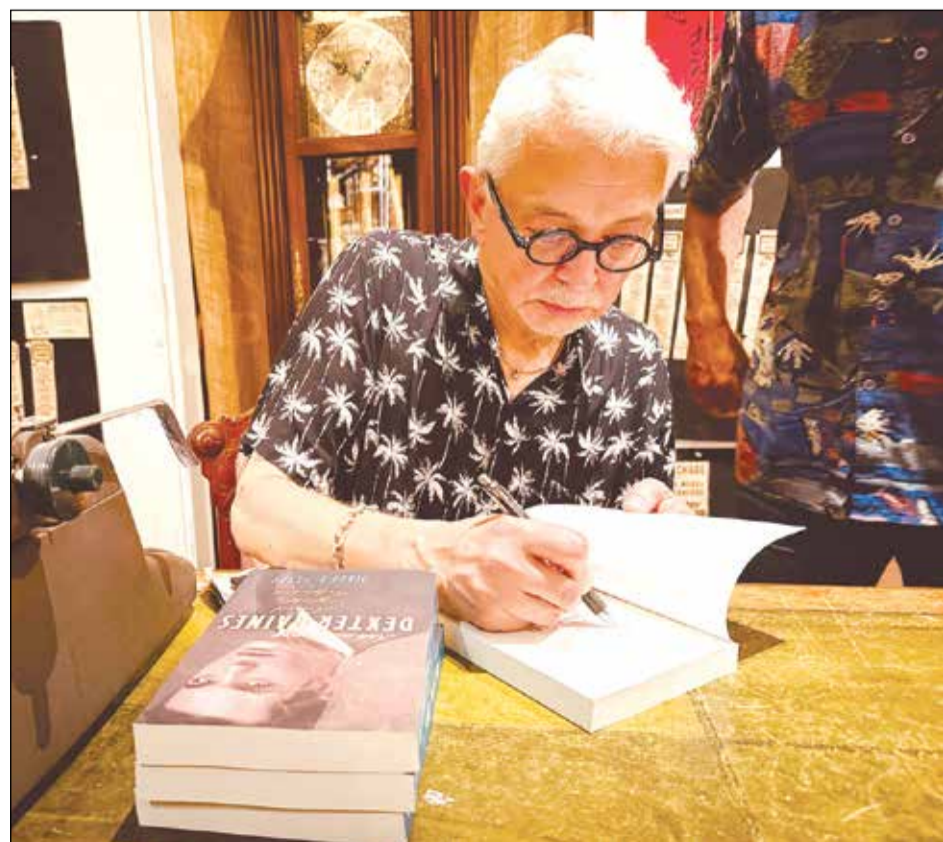
Patricia V. Davis, the woman Perry credits, is a well-established local

novelist and filmmaker perhaps best known for her literary works such as *Harlot's Sauce*, *The Diva Doctrine*, and the *Secret*

*Spice Café* trilogy. Perry's connection to Davis began in 2016 aboard the RMS *Queen Mary* in Long Beach - a haunted ship

that inspired Davis's most recent works. Already a bestselling author, Davis was there promoting her

books when she came across the "ship geek" Perry. Naturally, a conversation was struck that would evolve into years of mutual creative support.

"He's really just one of the nicest guys," said Davis. "I've truly valued our friendship and am so happy to have had the privilege of introducing him to our community."

Soon after their encounter Davis began dabbling in screenwriting while Perry continued in his novel projects. He had originally self-published a book called *City of Whores*, more than 20 years ago. Despite positive

reviews, the book quietly faded without marketing. Davis's candid feedback, however, inspired him to rewrite and relaunch.

"Patricia read what I had written, and she said, 'You mind if I give you a few thoughts?' and I welcomed them," Perry said. "She gave me like three thoughts, and I did a rewrite and contacted a publisher, and now it's been on and off the Amazon best-seller list for historical fiction."

Conversely, Davis shared with Perry her draft for *Lyvia's House*, an independent screenplay

that broke local headlines. His encouragement affirmed Davis's drive to produce the film which has since gone on to win film festival awards across the globe.

"I'm having so much fun with this screenwriting stuff, and he's enjoying the fact that now he can just sit at a desk and he doesn't have to listen to anybody and do his own thing," said Davis reflecting on their creative cross-pollination.

"*And Introducing Dexter Gaines: A Novel of Old Hollywood*" was re-released in

May 2025 and classified as historical fiction. The story follows Dan Root, a 21-year-old from Texas who reinvents himself as Dexter Gaines under the influence of a manipulative producer and his starlet wife in 1950s Hollywood. Four decades later, a devastating event draws him back, weaving a story of ambition, love, and survival across two timelines.

"I've always been fascinated by old Hollywood," said Perry. "While the book is fiction, I have certainly drawn inspiration from

my own life experiences and observations."

At the Marysville event, hosted at the What Not Shop, Perry shared stories from his career in TV and writing, took audience questions from Davis, and mingled with guests while signing books. It was a rare glimpse into the inner workings of professional show business and a unique networking opportunity for aspiring writers. For more on Mark B. 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 without a doubt put on the best local show of the year," Pennington said. "Now we're just hungry to make the event even bigger and better and have already been putting some of our ideas in motion. I'm excited to see what the festival becomes!"  
 Among the fresh additions brought in by Pennington and Terrases was Beauty is Betrayal, a metalcore-hard rock group reminiscent of Flyleaf or Evanescence. This was the band's first time performing in the area and the gig seemed to make a strong impression.  
 "The audience's energy (despite the heat) was absolutely electric, and they embraced us wholeheartedly," said Bri Cowgill, the band's lead singer. "Witnessing such a vibrant community go all in for local music was incredibly inspiring."

Cowgill's commanding vocals are matched only by her powerful story of passion and resilience. "As a child, doctors tested me for every skin disorder imaginable, but my unique blend of internal and external symptoms left them baffled," Cowgill said. "Eventually, they threw in the towel and named it after me (Brianna's Disease) — truly a one-size-fits-me disorder."  
 Her condition, similar to stiff skin syndrome, has left her in near constant pain and limited mobility. The biggest challenge during performances is breathing, as her skin and enlarged organs restrict it.  
 "Thankfully, I'm working with an amazing vocal coach who helps me control my breathing while keeping my stage presence engaging," Cowgill said. "Beyond that, I don't dwell on it much — my focus is on delivering an awesome

show for everyone."  
 And deliver she did, drawing headbangers and turning the heads of passersby. Cowgill said she especially enjoyed sets from Trachea and Light The Way and even discovered a favorite snack from local business Freeze-Ums.  
 "Trachea absolutely crushed their performance, and chatting with them was a blast — such a cool bunch of guys," Cowgill said. "Light The Way had the crowd hooked from start to finish. And Erica from Freeze-Ums is a total rockstar — huge thanks for her support and those awesome freeze-dried treats!"  
 Not all acts were newcomers. Outlaws in the Golden State returned after playing last year's Folk in the Fall festival — another event where Bertsch left a positive impression.  
 "As soon as we heard it (Next Up) was on Plumas Street and Skip was in on

it, we were in," said Jake Gibbons, the band's lead singer. "We knew it was gonna be good when we pulled up and could smell the food trucks from down the road."  
 OGS formed in the storage room of a small barn in Lincoln, California, which has since been converted into a studio. The band describes its sound as "punktry" — a mix of punk,

country, metal, screamo and genre-defying flair. The standout song of their set was "Loser Boyfriend," an original single currently being recorded for their upcoming self-titled album.  
 "We like to say we're just re-polishing the cowpunk turd," Gibbons joked. "It sounds like a bunch of wannabe punks in a barn to me."  
 He described the festival

as "top notch" and said he looks forward to returning. "It was actually quite intense sharing a bill with so many phenomenal acts," Gibbons said. "We couldn't be more stoked to be a part of this crew of talented folks."

# RV Falls Short at McClatchy

**SACRAMENTO, CA (MPG)** - In sports it's a given that a young team will experience growing pains and that is precisely what happened to the River Valley Falcons last Friday night when they fell 6-26 on the road to the McClatchy Lions in the 2025 season opener.

While the Falcons beat the Lions in their meeting last season, this time around with six underclassmen on the roster, a new coach and a new system, there is a lot to process as they look to rebuild.

Compounding the difficulty in adapting to the change, is the fact that the Falcons are already hampered by injury with their top running back Jesus Fernandez out for another week or two, while a second back, Anthony Zablotski, will not return for at least five to eight weeks.

Still, there were some



positives to take away from the McClatchy game as Coach Mikey Badalucio explained, "We had 300 yards of offense and three of our four sacks on defense were made by the young guys."

Junior receiver Kavari Drummonds was another bright spot, and the favorite target of quarterback Dominic Younker, hauling in six passes for 104 yards including a 45-yarder for River Valley's only touchdown.

Employing the next man up mentality with Fernandez out and Zablotski suffering an injury after gaining 64 yards, Cameron Smith shouldered the load,

carrying 11 times for 65 yards.

For the River Valley defense, Noah Lopez made a team-high seven tackles, while sophomores Peyton Kitrell and Derek Young, freshman Jamarion Cohen and senior Joshua Kellas recorded a sack apiece.

Nonetheless, Badalucio knows that there is still much room for improvement saying, "We need to stop making mistakes and/or getting flagged for penalties in the red zone and we also can't give up big plays on third and fourth and long. Our defense made some adjustments in the second half, but McClatchy runs the spread offense and not having Jesus, our fastest linebacker, killed us."

With a game now under their belts the Falcons (0-1) are back on the road this Friday when they travel to Woodland to take on Pioneer (1-0), a team that beat Davis 42-12 in its first game of the year. ★



## Central Valley Farmer Harvests a Promising Fig Crop

California fig lovers are in for a treat this summer. Cooler temperatures in the Central Valley have created favorable conditions for producing fresh figs. "It's been a wonderful growing season," Steve Schafer, who grows figs and other crops in Madera County, told Ag Alert® this month in a field report. In extreme heat, figs can be "ready to pick in the morning and start getting soft by afternoon," he said. But this summer, milder weather has led to a "great quality" crop with a longer shelf life, said Schafer, who sells his figs as fresh whole fruit. The higher-quality crop has allowed Schafer to reject fewer pieces of blemished fruit than last year. The farmer reported a strong market for the delicate fruit. While prices for fresh figs can fluctuate from week to week, he said, "demand is good."

## Golden Mussels Complicate Effort to Meet 'Huge' Recreational Fishing Demand

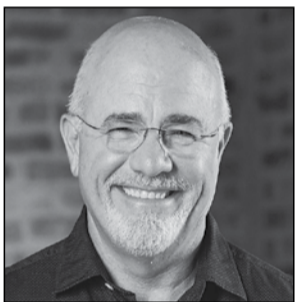
Tehama County fish farmer Katie Harris uses this time of year to rebuild her fish inventory ahead of stocking season in October, when she will supply lakes and other recreational fishing programs with trout. "The demand for recreational fishing has been huge," Harris told Ag Alert® this month in a field report, adding she has had "a hard time keeping up with demand." That's partly due to longstanding challenges such as water rights and costs. But Harris and other California fish farmers also face a newer threat in the emergence of golden mussels, which can devastate fish farms and infrastructure. "Anywhere water moves, this invasive species can move with it," Harris said. She added she has taken proactive biosecurity measures to protect her farm. ★

## Agricultural Education Program Reaches More Than 1 Million California Students

In 2024, more than 1 million students and 34,000 teachers benefited from the California Farm Bureau's innovative agricultural education program, which is run by the California Foundation for Agriculture in the Classroom. Launched in 1981, the program promotes agricultural literacy and awareness. "Our whole mission is to support teachers and students in incorporating agriculture into their classroom because agriculture affects our daily lives," said Amanda Fletcher, the foundation's executive director. "It's the food we eat; it's the clothes we wear. It affects everything that we do." Agriculture in the Classroom strives to keep growing, Fletcher said, especially in urban and disadvantaged schools that may have fewer opportunities to learn about food and farming.

## Wolf Resurgence Continues to Impact California Ranchers and Rural Communities

The migration of gray wolves into the Sierra Valley in Northern California has disrupted rural communities and led to significant losses for cattle ranchers. "We started having wolf attacks on cattle on the north end of our Sierra Valley," Sierra County Sheriff Mike Fisher said during an interview in a recent episode of the Voice of California Agriculture podcast, which is produced by the California Farm Bureau. Fisher spoke with host Gary Sack about challenges such as confirming how many cattle kills were caused by wolves, as well as the economic and emotional stress ranchers have faced. Because of the growing population of wolves, "I suspect that we are going to see some of the ranchers in this valley next year not return," the sheriff said. ★

But I want you to pay close attention to what I'm about to say next. Just because you're making more money doesn't mean you should start buying a bunch of toys or pick up a car payment. Sit down together now—don't wait—and practice making a written monthly budget based on your new income. Give every dollar a name before you spend it, and don't forget to work the debt snowball, too. List your debts from smallest to largest, make minimum payments on the largest, and then attack that credit card debt with a vengeance.

Chances are you can get the credit card debt tak-

en care of in two or three months. Then, roll the money from that payment over, and apply it and any other cash you can scrape up toward the student loan debt.

With just a little more work, you folks are going to find yourselves in a really great place soon!

## This Month In Your Garden

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September is close and that means fall is right around the corner. We will start getting some cooling temperatures and the days get shorter so even if we have some heat, it's shorter periods of it. There are definitely things to be done in the garden. Watering and weeding are still needing done. Later in September is a good time to start your winter vegetable garden. Usually towards the end of the month is best after it is starting to cool down so that the winter vegetables don't bolt. If you are using the same beds as the summer vegetables, you'll need to start pulling out the summer vegetables. Start with the plants that are obviously showing signs of slowing production and go from there – tomatoes are usually what we have to give up last. Where ever the new winter garden is to go, the soil needs to be worked up and readied. The winter veggies will begin to be available soon. They will do better if they are planted in cooler weather than we have been experiencing this summer. We get requests for winter vegetables in the heat of August, but we usually wait until middle of September to offer them. If it's too warm, they bolt, so we watch the forecasts.

September is an important month for fertilizing trees and shrubs. They store nutrients within the trunks and limbs to carry them through the winter, and help them leaf out, bloom and set fruit in the coming spring season. This has to be done while there are still healthy green and working leaves on them. There is no specific time for the leaves to start showing the fall color change, but we all know it is in fall. Keep an eye on them and don't miss the opportunity to get the fertilizing done. It will benefit your shrubs and trees. As usual, there are exceptions – any plant that has already set buds for spring bloom, such as rhododendrons and camellias should not be fertilized now, do them soon after they finish their bloom cycle. The reason being, is that they will likely

respond to the fertilizer and start putting on new growth which can push the buds off the plant. Just wait until they have finished their bloom cycle to fertilize them. That is when they normally start putting on new growth and the fertilizer is very beneficial for that process.

Fall is the best time for planting trees, shrubs, grass. It is a good time to dig up some perennials and divide them to enlarge a bed, create a new bed, or share them with other gardeners. This is routine for many garden clubs at this time of the year. Think about any trees or shrubs that you might want to plant this fall. Fall is the best time for planting trees and shrubs. They will slowly develop roots during the winter, giving them an advantage over the same thing planted next spring. A fall planted tree will develop roots through the fall and winter and leaf out next spring ready to grow and be well established to grow through the summer without any stress. September and October are the best months for tree planting, so start thinking about the trees you would consider. Pick out your tree or plant, take it home in the container, put it in a place that can't be missed and water it well daily, until you are able to get it planted. Once planted, they should be kept moist. Most newly planted trees need 15 to 20 gallons of water a week during September and 10 gallons per week or so during October unless it gets warm. Water should be given 2-3 times a week depending on the weather.

Enjoy the nice fall weather when it comes. Fall, to me, is the best time of the year.

# Lindhurst Offensive Execution Struggles Late in Loss to Bear River

**OLIVEHURST, CA (YSBC)** - The Lindhurst Blazers football team came into the 2025 season looking to make a statement and they did on Friday, Aug. 22 in a 21-18 loss to the Bear River Bruins.

Bear River defeated Lindhurst by more than 30 points to open 2024 and the Bruins opened the 2025 season with a quick score in the first few minutes of the game.

Bear River received the opening kick and the first play from scrimmage, they ran the ball 40-plus yards down the right side and quickly got on the scoreboard when Bruins senior wide receiver Corbin Dagang caught a 12-yard touchdown pass for an early 7-0 lead.

As the first week of football began Friday, turnovers are expected as teams are still working kinks out, there were double-digit turnovers in Olivehurst on Friday.

Bear River extended their lead to 14 after senior safety Seamus McKeown scooped a Lindhurst fumble and took it back 55-yards to the end zone with five minutes left in the first.

The Bruins had the early momentum no doubt, but after Bear River missed a 42-yard field goal, the Blazers controlled the rest of the first half.

Lindhurst junior running back Ismael Sanabria was a brute with running the ball on Friday. Sanabria rushed the ball 14 times for 77 yards and it always took multiple defenders to bring him down.

Sanabria put the Blazers on the scoreboard for the first time this year when he scored on a 12-yard

rushing touchdown.

Lindhurst sophomore running back Chan Hicks added a two-point conversion to cut the deficit to six. Hicks ran the ball 11 times for 70 yards in the loss.

Bear River answered back quickly with their proficient pass game as junior wide receiver Ty Cleek hauled in a 12-yard touchdown pass from junior quarterback Jayden Brock.

That was the last of the last time the Bruins would score a point for the remainder of the game. The Blazers quickly capped off a quick two-minute drill as they converted a 59-yard drive to trail 21-16 at the half.

Lindhurst senior

quarterback Nieko Reyes tossed a 28-yard pass to Hicks and the drive was capped off by a 16-yard rushing touchdown by senior running back Alex Covarrubias. Covarrubias had 59 rushing yards in the defeat.

Blazers head coach Troy Spangler expressed to Yuba Sutter Butte Colusa Sports that he was proud of his team for fighting back with a 14-point deficit in the first quarter.

Spangler added that the defense responded great in the second quarter.

Lindhurst opened the second half with a 10-minute drive that ended deep in Bear River territory with a turnover on downs.

As the Bruins were

pinned back deep in their territory, the Blazers defense brought the heat as they forced a punt. As Bear River attempted to punt, a high snap went over the punter and rolled out of the back of the end zone for a safety.

Lindhurst had a great opportunity to take the momentum, but the ensuing punt went over the head of the returner and instead of having great field position, the Blazers started on their own seven.

Spangler told YSBC that was a big missed opportunity being backed up deep in their own territory.

Lindhurst struggled to move the ball in the second half and Spangler told YSBC that they simply just

didn't execute offensively.

The Blazers had three offensive possessions in the fourth and turned the ball over on downs each time. Defensively, Lindhurst forced a fumble on the Bear River 31 and Blazers junior Angel Gonzalez recovered it and Lindhurst had their best chance to take the lead for the rest of the game.

Despite the offense being unsuccessful at moving the ball, they still had one shot within the final minute of

the game and had the ball near midfield.

The Bear River defense held their own and knocked down the final pass attempt from Reyes to Riccy Phienemanh near the Bruins 30-yard line as the clock hit triple zeroes.

Although Lindhurst took the loss, they made a positive statement and accomplished that goal.

They get the next opportunity to get a win as they travel to play Oroville on Friday, Aug. 29 at 7 p.m. ★

## West Nile Virus in Sutter County Confirmed

and drain all standing water," said Bi-County Public Health Officer, Dr. Phuong Luu. "West Nile Virus is transmitted to humans and animals by the bite of an infected mosquito. Mosquitoes become

infected when they feed on infected birds."

**DRAIN** – Mosquitoes lay their eggs on standing water. Eliminate or drain all sources of standing water on your property, including flowerpots, car tires, rain gutters, and pet

bowls. For standing water that cannot be drained such as fountains, ponds, etc., consider adding "Mosquito Dunks" or mosquito fish, which feed on mosquito larvae.

In response to recent findings and increased

virus activity, District staff will continue to trap mosquitoes for testing, continue our disease surveillance program, and treat areas of high West Nile Virus activity with truck mounted foggers to reduce the adult

mosquito population. Spray areas can be viewed at the District's website at <https://sutter-yubamvcd.org/>. A surveillance map can be found there as well, which shows the location of West Nile Virus positive dead birds, mosquito

collections, and sentinel chickens.

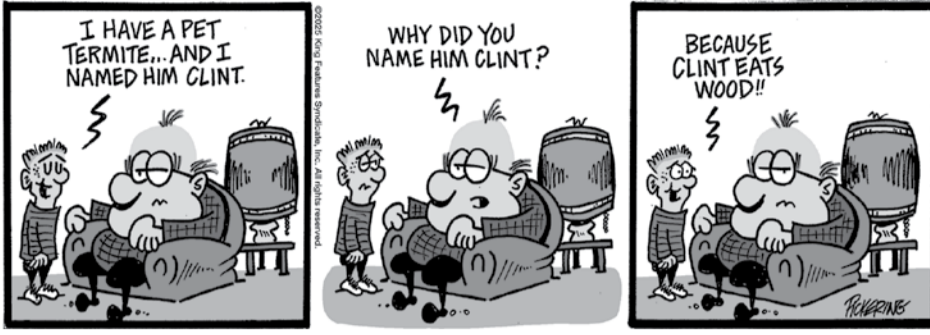

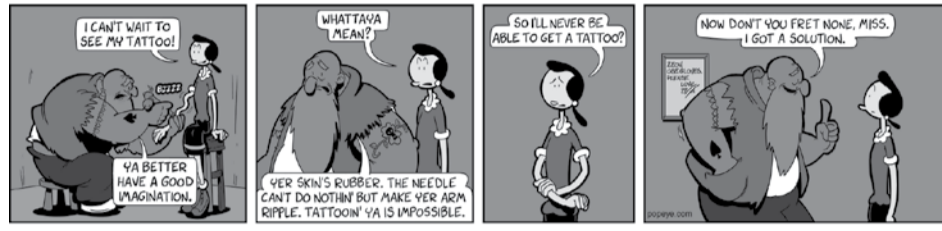

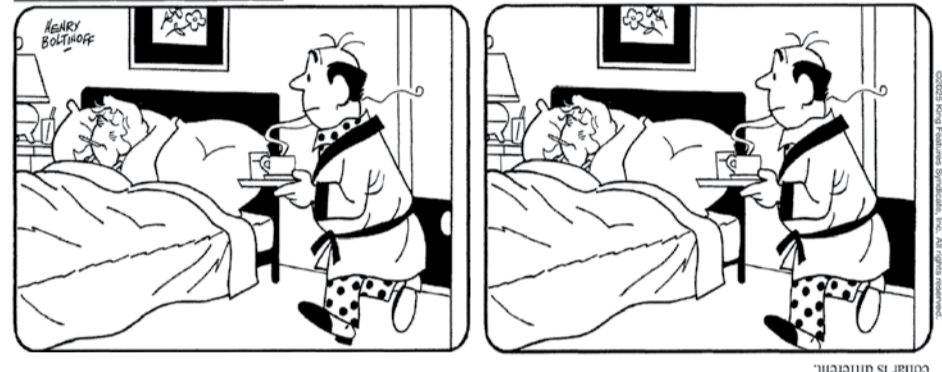

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# Unique Sutter Health Investment Collaboratively Advances Senior Nutrition in Yolo, Yuba and Sutter Counties



## Meals on Wheels Yolo County News Release

**NORTHERN CALIFORNIA (MPG)** - A recent \$150,000 investment by Sutter Health to both Meals on Wheels Yolo County (MOW Yolo) and Meals on Wheels Yuba and Sutter Counties (MOW Yuba/Sutter) is fortifying the future of senior nutrition in a multi-county region by simultaneously increasing the number of older adults nourished and the organizations' sustained fiscal prowess to continue to serve them.

"Eat Well, Age Well: Yolo + Yuba/Sutter Seniors" supports previous capacity investments by Sutter Health and other public and private sources to spark Meals on Wheels Yolo's extraordinary 300% growth in nutrition provision to Yolo County seniors since early 2022. The initiative furthers Meals on Wheels Yolo's foray into both medically tailored meals and the provision of meals to other nonprofit senior nutrition providers as an important revenue stream. Concurrently, Meals on Wheels Yuba/Sutter, administered by Agency on Aging Area 4, gains an opportunity to connect at least three-and-a-half-dozen seniors in those counties currently waitlisted for nutrition due to funding deficits with dependable, healthy meals.

"This partnership was a clear choice for Sutter Health because it aligns with our community health investment priorities and brings innovative, collaborative solutions to our communities," said Angelika Corchado, Director

of Community Health for Sutter Health's Greater Sacramento Division. "Yolo, Yuba and Sutter Counties have growing senior populations, and many older adults face barriers to much needed resources, especially in rural communities. Supporting programs like Meals on Wheels helps increase access to nutritious meals, which is a powerful way to prevent chronic diseases, and in this way treats food as medicine. We're proud to support these efforts to improve the health and well-being of older adults in our region."

Actions already underway made possible by Sutter Health's community health investment include the purchase of institutional frozen storage equipment and the initial lease of space to house it on behalf of Meals on Wheels Yuba/Sutter. Upon delivery and installation in October, Meals on Wheels Yolo will begin 12 months of consistent production and delivery of medically tailored and standard frozen meals to MOW Yuba/Sutter, sufficient to remove a minimum of 42 seniors in those counties from nutrition wait lists and provide each of them with five meals per week. While Meals on Wheels Yolo operates an institutional meal production facility in Winters, the Meals on Wheels-Sutter Health Senior Nutrition Center, Meals on Wheels Yuba/Sutter relies upon outsourced restaurants for the meals the organization provides to seniors.

Plans are in motion to mark the launch of meal deliveries to

these homebound seniors in Yuba and Sutter Counties with an early fall celebration. Participation by Sutter Health team members, representatives of both Meals on Wheels Yuba/Sutter and Meals on Wheels Yolo, and local dignitaries and supporters are intended.

"At a time when diminished funding has resulted in a reduction in our ability to provide nutrition to every senior who needs it, this investment by Sutter Health offers hope and healthy meals to more local older adults," said Brittany Lathrop, Program Manager/Developer for MOW Yuba/Sutter. "Not only are we able to do more immediately, but the uplift in our frozen storage capacity portends the potential for a deeper, cost-efficient partnership with MOW Yolo over time to sustain and expand the increased availability of nutrition to seniors in our communities."

To address funding shortfalls as one-time pandemic-era public funding faded last year, Meals on Wheels Yolo focused upon reimbursement revenue relationships with other nonprofits in the region to supplement private philanthropy and threatened Older Americans Act federal funding to sustain services to all 1,100+ seniors currently nourished by the organization countywide.

"No senior welcomed to MOW Yolo services over the past three years thanks to American Rescue Plan pandemic dollars, or any other public or private source, has

been stripped of nutrition access to date due to a lack of funding," said Joy Cohan, Executive Director, Meals on Wheels Yolo. "Preserving the once-in-a-lifetime impact of those investments is MOW Yolo's highest priority, followed closely by the continued pursuit of ongoing funding sufficient to meet the full nutrition and socialization needs of the more than 8,000 Yolo County seniors living in poverty."

In addition to providing meals each week to local seniors via both home-delivery and "Café Yolo" congregate dining programs throughout the county, Meals on Wheels Yolo funds that mission-driven work in part via reimbursements to produce meals each weekday for three other nonprofits. These contracted organizations include Dignity Health for Yolo Adult Day Health Center in Woodland, Yolo Cares for Galileo Place Adult Day Center in Davis and Joshua's House Hospice for unhoused individuals in Sacramento and Chico State Enterprises/Passages Area on Aging for senior nutrition programs in both the City of Chico and Colusa County.

"It's an honor to add Agency on Aging Area 4's MOW Yuba/Sutter program to this esteemed list of meal partners, thanks to Sutter Health's confidence in both organizations to fund this innovative partnership," said Cohan. "To the extent that this partnership can be sustained and expanded over time to ensure that more seniors in Yolo, Yuba and Sutter Counties are able to

age in place healthily and safely, we are grateful and inspired to be involved."

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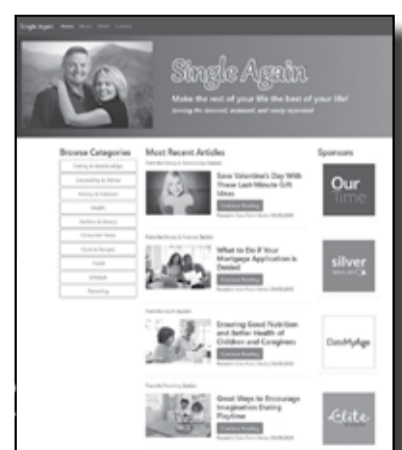
