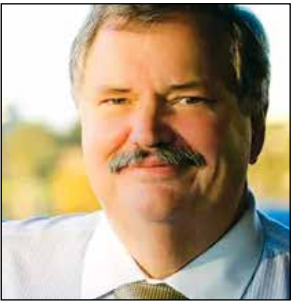

Overcoming Community Crime

ELVERTA, CA (MPG) - A lot at the corner of Rio Linda Boulevard and Delano Street in Elverta containing multiple businesses was vandalized on July 31, leaving businesses without power for hours as well as no phones or internet for a few days due to cut power lines.

According to Rio Linda residents on Facebook and Nextdoor, a Subway restaurant and the Riego Market were also vandalized in the weeks prior to the Aug. 15 incident.

A separate incident in Rio Linda on Aug. 15 resulted in at least six businesses being vandalized with the suspect, Brendan Wyatt Williams, 23, of Rio Linda, arrested inside of Rio Java Coffee House.

Williams was charged with felony burglary and vandalism for the string of burglaries in Rio Linda at the Mar

Val Plaza, which includes The Grotto, Rio Java Coffee House, Bowinkles and others. Williams was released from custody on Aug. 22 and is scheduled to appear in court on Aug. 29, after press time, according to Sacramento County Sheriff's Office records.

"The businesses around here are pretty resilient," Alisa Treadway, a groomer at Sudsy Paws, said. "It's not the worst that we've been through and we all kind of just stick together. We'll bounce back from anything."

Final County Recommended Budget Hearings to Begin

SACRAMENTO COUNTY, CA (MPG) - The Sacramento County Board of Supervisors will begin Fiscal Year (FY) 2025-26 Revised Recommended Budget hearings at 9:30 a.m. Sept. 3 in the Sacramento County Administration Building's Board Chambers, located at 700 H St., Sacramento.

If necessary, hearings will continue on Sept. 4 and Sept. 5 at the same time and location.

The hearing schedule, subject to change, includes In-Home Supportive Services Public Authority budget deliberation and approval; and potential federal and state funding impacts on future county budgets. It also includes the Fiscal Year 2025-26 revised recommended budget presentation, public comment, and board deliberation and approval of revisions to the approved recommended budget and adopted budget resolutions.

The Board of Supervisors approved the FY 2025-26 Recommended Budget on June 4. The \$8.9-billion spending plan recognized new or enhanced areas of growth in the General Fund totaling \$43 million (\$9 million funded with Net County Cost), with the addition of 52 full-time equivalent positions. The FY 2025-26 General Fund recommended reductions totaled \$18 million, which would have resulted in the deletion of 73 full-time equivalent positions.

However, the Board of Supervisors made additional revisions to the recommended budget, totaling \$11 million in restored reductions and additional growth.

The numbers in the budget change between June and September when Sacramento County receives new information, including the state budget's impact and updated fund balance and revenue totals. Because of that new information, the Revised Recommended Budget comes back to the Sacramento County Board of Supervisors for review and adoption in September.

The FY 2025-26 Revised Recommended Budget includes \$9.2 billion in total appropriations, including \$4.2 million in General Fund growth (\$2.3-million funded with Net County Cost), with the addition of 16 full-time equivalent positions.

Members of the public can attend the hearings and be heard on any item in the budget, either publicly or through written comments. The budget hearings will also be telecast live on Metro Cable 14 at metro14live.saccounty.gov and on the web at sccob.saccounty.gov/Pages/BOSPublicMeetings.aspx.

SACRAMENTO REGION, CA (MPG) - Celebrations for the 34th anniversary of Ukraine's independence on Aug. 24 culminated in a 30-mile, horn-honking convoy through Carmichael, Arden Arcade, Citrus Heights and Fair Oaks.

The Sunflower Society of

Sacramento spearheaded the parade.

Church and society members hit the road in solidarity.

Twenty vehicles bore painted sunflowers, Ukraine flags and the Stars and Stripes. Slogans blessed Ukrainian resistance to invasion and thanked American supporters. In a blaze of blue and yellow, the convoy crept from North Avenue to merge with Fair Oaks

Boulevard traffic.

Horns began honking immediately. The cacophony continued enroute, until parade vehicles returned to the church more than an hour later.

"We felt so happy to see lots of people still supporting Ukraine," said Sunflower Society of Sacramento co-organizer Olga Noshyn.

"A Ukraine war veteran and

his young son were with us," Noshyn said. "They were happy so many people honked to greet us. When heroes who have sacrificed so much in this war see strangers who support them, this gives them hope."

The Sunflower Society of Sacramento and Carmichael's Ukrainian Seventh Day Adventist Church, whose members fundraise for medical

needs at Ukraine frontlines, on Aug. 23 co-hosted flag day celebrations.

In total, The Tack Shack, Sudy Paws, Pioneer Feed and Pet Supply, Elverta Market and the Rio Linda Elverta Food Closet were affected by the cut power lines on July 31.

Richard Mason, the owner and operator of Pioneer Feed and Pet Supply said he came into the store on the morning of Aug. 1, flipped on the lights and nothing happened. Mason said that the breaker boxes for the building’s power were cut and tossed in a field behind the business lot. Food Closet representatives found the breaker boxes, Mason said, and he used his general contractor skills to get the property’s power back on.

Mason said the acts of one small group led to compounding effects for the businesses involved.

Treadway said she started calling customers on the morning of Aug. 1 to inform them that the business had been vandalized, attempting to reschedule clients for a future appointment. Mason had the power back on by noon,

Treadway said, but the food closet, feed store and market had gone without power to their refrigerators for several hours, causing a minor setback in service.

Sudy Paws owner Kathy Davis, in business for 18 years, said that they “are quite lucky” and hasn’t had too many issues with vandalism or burglaries since installing iron bars at the front of her establishment several years ago.

Mason said that walking in one morning to find that his business had been vandalized was “interesting,” to say the least. There are only a few sheriff’s deputies in town and the community “needs to start stepping up to take care of these issues,” because it’s “a lot to put on law enforcement.”

Community members don’t need to physically get involved, Mason said. Taking notes, pictures and keeping neighbors informed are all ways that community members can help keep their neighborhood more tightly knit.

“It’s a community effort,” Mason said. “Not just one person.” ★

New Home Sales Rebound in July

SACRAMENTO REGION, CA (MPG) - July new home sales in the greater Sacramento region rebounded from June's low point, with 480 sales reported by North State Building Industry Association members, the association reported Aug. 12.

Sales in the seven-county area rose 53% from June and were 11% above July 2024's totals. Building Industry Association President and CEO Tim Murphy attributed the increase to substantial builder incentives, a gradual decrease in mortgage interest rates and buyers' continued interest

in moving to a new home.

"Rates have trickled down to their lowest point this year, a current average of just over 6.5%," Murphy said. "And more buyers are discovering that homebuilders can offer rate reductions and incentives that existing homeowners can't offer."

A recent survey by Lending Tree found that California is one of just three states where it's currently significantly less expensive to buy a new home than an existing home, according to Murphy. The study found that statewide, existing homes are 24.7% more expensive than new homes.

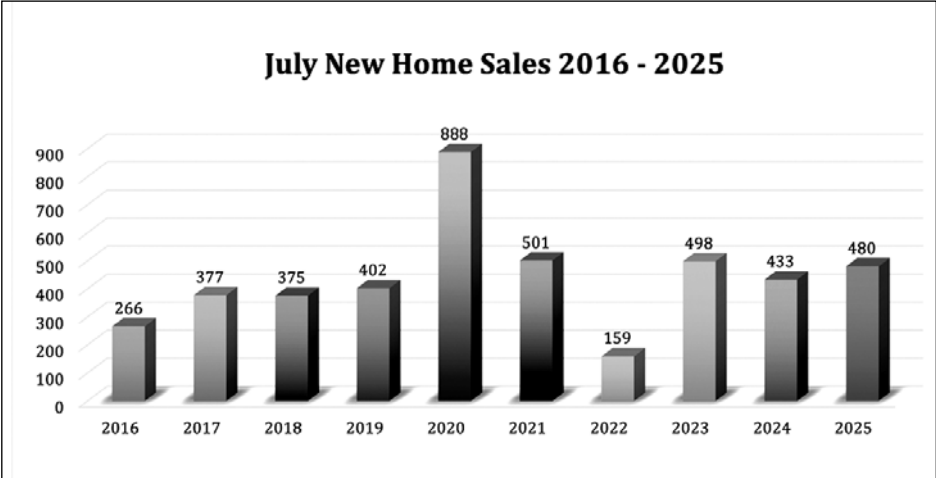
"That's just another reminder that prospective buyers should consider the options available because

a new home may be more affordable than they think," Murphy added.

Murphy also noted that recent studies “have indicated that many people will likely jump off the fence” if interest rates fall to 6%. And if local governments throughout the region streamlined the development process and lowered the fees that on average add more than \$100,000 to a home’s price, according to Murphy, more homes could be built at lower price points.

"The BIA will continue to pursue pragmatic reforms that keep the dream of homeownership alive in our region," Murphy said.

Roseville at 90 and Rancho Cordova at 84 again recorded the most

sales, followed by Elk Grove at 64, Sacramento at 50 and Natomas at 34. Lincoln sales were the sixth highest at 29, followed by Plumas Lake at 25, Rocklin at 22 and Folsom at 18. Galt re-entered the Top 10 with 14 sales reported.

Building Industry Association statistics covered 193 new home

communities reported by members in Amador, El Dorado, Placer, Sacramento, Sutter, Yolo and Yuba counties.

Rep. Bera Visits Metro Fire Station

Honors Local Firefighters, Highlights HERO Act

ANTELOPE, CA (MPG) - Representative Ami Bera, M.D. (CA-06) visited Metro Fire Station 26 to present ribbons to Captain Adam Huckaby and Firefighter Taylor Edwards, the first-place team from Station 26 at the inaugural California State Fair HERO Act Chili Cookoff on Aug. 21.

prevention and treatment.

California Mid-Decade Redistricting Scheme

Beware of ethically challenged and desperate politicians’ intent on using the electorate as pawns in their relentless quest for power.

Governor Gavin Newsom, Attorney General Rob Bonta and loyal party leaders are moving with haste to put a redistricting measure on a special election ballot this November. They are invoking an emergency status to warrant the hasty process with minimal time, a mere five days, allowed for the drafting of thoughtful language and deliberation to influence the electorate. Their motive is raw political ambition, not even thinly veiled, an effort to eliminate Republican seats in the State House and the U.S. House of Representatives. An element essential to candid communication in this regard is the fact that the voters of California have on two prior occasions exercised their

right to call for an Independent Redistricting Commission. The voters spoke clearly and unequivocally, calling for a thoughtfully constructed commission to be comprised of five Democrats, five Republicans and four people not affiliated with either of the two major parties. Appropriate limitations have been placed on the persons who pursue service on the commission. They are subject to a vetting and selection process, they are precluded from most forms of political activism, they are prohibited from running for office, donating to the campaigns of candidates, or working for elected officials. The foregoing is the law of the state and represents a California State Constitutional Amendment that ensures adherence to this practice, for now.

Because the state of Texas, and most other states in the US do not have such an independent commission, the Texas legislature has the right to redraw legislative maps. The Lone Star State is not bound by any manner of restriction or constitutional language; they are free to do precisely what they are doing (SCOTUS – Rucho v Common Cause 2019) regardless of how many of us may feel about it, it is lawful. This concept

of gerrymandering is not, as Governor Newsom relentlessly asserts, unprecedented. Rather, it is a plot that goes back to 1812. In fact, the very term gerrymandering was coined as a portmanteau of the word salamander and the name of Elbridge Gerry, who would become the vice-president of the United States, but in 1812 as governor of Massachusetts, signed a bill that created a partisan district in the Boston area. Obviously, by including salamander- a slimy crawling amphibian – the term was not intended to be flattering. The voters of California have recognized the unsavory element of such conduct and moved to eliminate that practice by force of law.

Our Attorney General, Mr. Bonta has publicly opined that Texas (and Florida) should have a commission and laws like we have in California; he is correct on that point. Nonetheless, he is working in concert with Governor Newsom and partisan legislative leaders in this state to usurp the twice expressed will of the people in 2008 and 2010, and the Constitutional Amendment their votes created.

The most recently drawn lines were completed by the independent

commission in 2021 after the decennial census, consistent with current law. The deliberations of the commission were in public and conducted by persons who met the explicit criteria established in law created by California voters. Those decisions were made based upon enumerated criteria, and specifically not for the purpose of benefiting either political party. In fact, the final maps were criticized by both major political parties, likely a testament to their legitimacy. In addition, the work of the commission survived legal and political challenges.

The plan advanced by Governor Newsom and his sycophantic legislative leaders is unscrupulous by any reasonable measure. However, Attorney General Rob Bonta, whose job includes the obligation to represent the public interest, has breached his codified obligation to his constituents. Additionally, it will be his responsibility to defend this unprincipled scheme against a legal challenge. Further, his office holds the duty to draft the Title and Summary for your November ballot. Do you believe for a moment that his conduct thus far has demonstrated a scintilla of objectivity? We deserve an

attorney general who will recognize and adhere to their fundamental obligation to their constituents, to represent the public interests and support the electorally expressed demands of the public.

Governor Newsom either fails to understand the role of democracy in this Constitutional Republic, or is estranged from the truth. Once again, the people have spoken through a democratic act on this critical issue. But the governor does not care for the outcome, so he profoundly and almost pathologically rejects it, ignoring his oath of office.

If these elected officials who have taken an oath to support and defend the Constitution of the United States of America, and the State of California succeed in their blatant usurpation of democracy, the 2026 midterm election will likely result in California having only four of fifty-two House seats, approximately nine percent, while nearly forty percent of California voters voted Republican in the last election. Democracy, Governor Newsom?

Governors, attorneys general, and legislators in California have historically engaged in misleading propositions

with wholly disingenuous Title and Summary language intended to dupe the voters to an unwanted and often destructive course of action. Gerrymandering for raw political power against the clearly expressed will of the people is not consistent with the expectations of representative government or the fundamentals of a Constitutional Republic.

Make no mistake, this is not simply a creative way to silence many Californians, it is a disgraceful collaboration to reject the twice expressed democratic will of the voters of the state of California. It also represents a needless expenditure of more than two hundred million dollars in taxpayers’ money, while the state is in fiscal crisis.

As good citizens, we have an obligation to inform ourselves and vote wisely. I urge you to join the League of Women Voters and other responsible Californians and reject this partisan affront to democracy.

Kings Korner

Does anyone remember the First playoff game in Sacramento after a 16-year drought, just three years ago? I certainly do, and it’s something I’ll never forget.

Tickets were almost impossible to come by, and the electricity both in and out of the arena that night was something that Kings fans will long remember.

There was something special about that team, and one of the things that made that team so memorable was the incredible scoring power they displayed all season long.

The starting lineup of Harrison Barnes, DeAaron Fox, Keegan Murray, Kevin Huerter, and Domantas Sabonis, led the NBA in scoring for the entire season, an achievement never accomplished before in Sacramento Kings history.

I thought it might be interesting to examine what the starting five averaged that season and compare it with the potential scoring we can expect from the starting five today.

The combined total of the starting five for the Sacramento Kings for the 2022/2023 season was 83.8 points per game. The Kings led the league in scoring that season with a total of 120.7 points per game, meaning the bench contributed 36.9 points on average every game.

So, how does that stack up against the likely starting five we have going into the 2025/2026 season?

The Starting five of Keegan Murray, Dennis Schroder, Domantas Sabonis, Zach Lavine, and Demar DeRozan, scored a combined total of 86.9 points per game individually during the 2024/2025 campaign, and the team averaged 115.7 point per game.

That means the Sacramento Kings bench contributed 28.8 points every night last season.

Everyone is talking about the meteoric rise of the now world champion Oklahoma City Thunder, but what did their starting five average every game last season. Surprisingly, it was 77.6 which was just over 9 points per game less than the Sacramento Kings. What made the Thunder the hurricane that they were was torrid bench production that contributed 42.9 points per game!

GM’s all over the league are trying to emulate the Thunders success, and is it any wonder?

Trump is Wrong About Mail-in Voting

President Trump is threatening to wage war on mail-in ballots, and the GOP has to hope he thinks again before the 2026 midterms.

In a Truth Social post, Trump said he is “going to lead a movement to get rid of MAIL-IN BALLOTS,” and he’ll start off with “an EXECUTIVE ORDER to help bring HONESTY to the 2026 midterm elections.”

Trump likes the idea of in-person, same-day voting, which has much to recommend it, but mail-in and early voting are so ingrained and widespread that they aren’t going anywhere.

Most Republicans have concluded that there’s no alternative to making use of these modes of voting, and, crucially, they managed -- most of the time -- to get Trump on board in 2024. This aided the Republican get-out-the-vote operation in a close election.

Clearly, though, Trump believes that mail-in voting is a Democratic plot, and he also hates contemporary voting machines.

Old-school paper ballots don’t guarantee honesty, however. In an infamous instance of voter fraud, allies of Lyndon Johnson stuffed Box 13 with enough ballots to put him over the top in the very narrow 1948 Democratic Senate primary in Texas.

Today’s voting machines, moreover, were a reaction to the Florida fiasco in 2000, when punch-card ballots had to be painstakingly examined by hand with a presidential election at stake.

The fact is that vote-by-mail has been steadily growing since the 1980s, and it needn’t favor one side or the other.

In Florida, Republicans long made it a priority to maximize mail voting.

A study by the academic Andrew Hall of pre-COVID-19 voting patterns in California, Utah and Washington found a negligible partisan effect as those states rolled out vote-by-mail systems. Overall, turnout went up only very slightly, and “the Democratic share of turnout did not increase appreciably.”

Mail-in voting didn’t change who was voting but how they did it --encouraging, as you might expect, voting by mail rather than in-person. Vote by mail did have a strong partisan tilt in the COVID-19 election of 2020, in part because Trump inveighed against it.

Last year, Republicans made a concerted effort to make up ground and succeeded. They went from 24% of the mail-in vote in the must-win swing state of Pennsylvania in 2020 to 33% in 2024, and they outpaced Democrats in mail-in balloting in Arizona.

The advantage to a party of getting people to vote early -- whether in person or by mail -- is that it takes high-propensity voters off the table. Then, a turnout operation can focus on getting lower-propensity voters to the polls. If no one votes until Election Day,

party operatives waste time and money right up to the cusp of the election, contacting people who are going to vote no matter what.

TITLE: None of this is to say that all mail-in voting is equal. So-called universal mail-in voting, or automatically sending a ballot to every registered voter and scattering live ballots around a state, is a bad practice.

The rules should be more stringent. Georgia gets this right. You have to ask for an absentee ballot and provide your driver’s license number or a copy of another form of valid ID. Ballots have to be requested at least 11 days before the election and must be returned by Election Day. The outer “oath” envelope has to be properly completed or the ballot is subject to being rejected, although the county elections office will provide the voter a chance to “cure” the envelope.

It’s also important to count early and mail-in ballots quickly, something that too many states fail to do, with California -- as usual -- the worst offender.

States should be expected to abide by whatever rules have been set prior to an election, rather than changing them on the fly, and they should ensure that voter rolls are regularly cleaned up.

Regardless, the real question about vote-by-mail isn’t whether it is staying or going, but whether Republicans, too, will take advantage of it.

Former Elementary School Teacher Sentenced

Sacramento County District Attorney’s Office News Release

SACRAMENTO, CA (MPG) - The Honorable Satnam Rattu sentenced Kim Kenneth Wilson to 215 years to life in prison.

On Feb. 25, Wilson pled to nine counts of committing lewd acts upon a child. Wilson also admitted to multiple allegations of multiple victims as well as substantial sexual conduct and aggravating factors of vulnerable victim and position of trust.

Wilson was a longtime teacher at Del Paso Heights Elementary School. He also established a media/broadcasting club for students, which had its own designated room assigned to the club.

Throughout his tenure, according to the District Attorney’s Office, Wilson took female students to the private broadcasting room alone. While in the room, he committed sex acts on the students, often photographing or recording the sex acts. While most of the sexual assaults occurred in the school broadcasting room, some of the victims were also assaulted at Wilson’s home during events he hosted.

Upon hearing about the sexual assaults, Sacramento police detectives searched Wilson’s home. Officers located a number of child-sized sex toys, including child sized artificial genitalia and a child sized torso with artificial genitalia.

Additionally, detectives

located a substantial amount of VHS tapes, DVDs and other digital storage devices containing videos depicting Wilson sexually assaulting his students. The videos depicted conduct spanning multiple years with numerous students.

The recorded content also showed Wilson forcing students to look into the camera while saying and depicting sexual acts.

Under current California law, Wilson (age 64) will become eligible for release at an Elder Parole hearing when he serves 20 years of his 215 years to life sentence. With his in-custody credits, that will be in approximately 17 years.

California’s Perfect Financial Storm *It Could Lead to Another Tax Hike*

A perfect storm of economic, fiscal and political trends is battering California’s already deficit-ridden state budget, leading public employee unions and other interest groups dependent on money from Sacramento to explore hefty tax increases.

The budget has what fiscal authorities call a “structural deficit,” meaning that its revenue system, dominated by personal income taxes, cannot generate enough income to fully finance all services and programs in current law.

Estimates of the chronic shortfall range from \$10 billion a year to as much as \$30 billion. Last fall, the Legislative Analyst’s Office calculated that state spending was increasing by about 6% a year while revenue was rising by only 4%.

The current budget, enacted in June, had a \$20 billion deficit that was closed by tapping into the state’s emergency reserves, borrowing from special funds, postponing some payments and adopting some bookkeeping gimmicks. For instance, the budget eliminates payments to reduce the state’s ever-growing unfunded obligations for retiree health care which reached \$91.5 billion, up \$6.3 billion from

a year earlier, Controller Malia Cohen recently revealed.

The permanence of the deficit is one factor that’s fueling preliminary cogitating over a tax increase of some kind, which probably would have to be ratified by voters.

Another is the reduction of federal aid to states by President Donald Trump and Congress. Federal funds are more than a quarter of California’s \$321 billion state budget and the cuts mostly hit health and welfare programs, such as Medi-Cal. Many are looking to Sacramento for money to offset federal reductions.

Finally, a surtax on incomes of California’s wealthiest families, approved by voters in 2012 to deal with an earlier budget deficit, was supposed to last only a few years, but a 2016 ballot measure extended it to 2030. Its backers — public employee unions particularly — are planning to seek either another extension or permanent status.

The Franchise Tax Board says revenue from the surtax spiked to more than \$16 billion in 2021 — thanks to the odd economics of the COVID-19 pandemic — but returned to a more normal \$9-10 billion a year since.

Californians already bear one of the nation’s highest tax burdens. Wallet Hub has calculated that California’s major state and local taxes are the fourth-highest of any state with an 11% total tax burden.

So what kind of tax increase might be proposed? There aren’t a lot of options.

Another income tax hike would be unlikely since maintaining the surtax on high-income taxpayers is already virtually certain to be on the ballot, probably in 2028. Increasing the sales tax, already hovering around 10%, would hit low-income families the hardest.

That leaves corporate income taxes as the most likely target — a source that the California Budget & Policy Center, a left-leaning research nonprofit, has been touting for years. Citing federal aid reductions and cuts in federal taxes on corporations and wealthy taxpayers, the organization is trumpeting the closure of what it views as loopholes in the corporate tax system.

“Given the immense harms that will be done as a result of the recently enacted federal budget bill, state leaders must develop plans to significantly raise state revenues ... in order to balance the state budget and protect California residents that are vulnerable to serious harms from the federal cuts to health care, food assistance, and other federal policies,” the organization declares in a compilation of federal reductions.

Clearly something has to give. California cannot continue to run up budget deficits as the reduction of federal aid compounds the state’s already precarious finances.

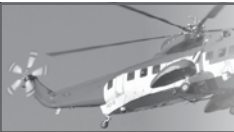

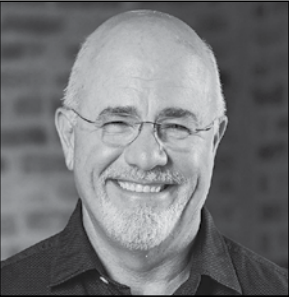

Dear Dave,

I'm a non-traditional student in my last semester of college. In May, I'll graduate with a degree in elementary education and have a job waiting for me. It will bring our household income up to a little over \$100,000. We're already living on a budget, but the problem is we'll have \$15,000 in student loan debt to repay, plus \$5,000 in credit card debt. What should we address first?

Dear Marta,

It sounds like all your hard work is about to pay off in a big way. And I've got some more good news for you. If you two keep living the way you have

been, and put the rest toward debt, you can have that student loan and credit card debt knocked out in just a year or so.

But I want you to pay close attention to what I'm about to say next. Just because you're making more money doesn't mean you should start buying a bunch of toys or pick up a car payment. Sit down together now—don't wait—and practice making a written monthly budget based on your new income. Give every dollar a name before you spend it, and don't forget to work the debt snowball, too. List your debts from smallest to largest, make minimum payments on the largest, and then attack that credit card debt with a vengeance.

Chances are you can get the credit card debt tak-

en care of in two or three months. Then, roll the money from that payment over, and apply it and any other cash you can scrape up toward the student loan debt.

With just a little more work, you folks are going to find yourselves in a really great place soon!

Republic FC Stadium Groundbreaking Ceremony

SACRAMENTO, CA (MPG) - Wilton Rancheria and Sacramento Republic FC marked the beginning of construction on Republic FC Stadium at the Railyards with a groundbreaking ceremony on Aug. 18.

The ceremony celebrated the tribe's return to its ancestral lands along the banks of the Sacramento and American rivers, 67 years after its federal recognition was stripped from the nation by the California Rancheria Act. Now that Wilton Rancheria and Republic FC have acquired the land in The Railyards, site preparation will begin in the coming days and fans can take the first step in locking in their place for the club's inaugural season in its new home.

“The Rancheria Act tried to erase us but, on its anniversary, we are breaking ground on a future that ensures our sovereignty, our name, and our story will endure,” said Wilton Rancheria Chairman Jesus Tarango. “This is not our groundbreaking; this is our homecoming.”

Said Managing Partner Kevin Nagle, “Our path has not been easy. But just like our city, just like our tribal partners, we’ve kept moving forward. And now, together, we are breaking ground on the future. In 2027, when the first ball is kicked here in The Railyards, it will be more than the start of a match. It will be the next chapter in an ongoing story of resilience.”

For a first look at the stadium design developments and to learn more about placing a deposit for the 2027 season, fans can visit RepublicStadium.com. A flythrough video will show off the stadium’s unique elements, including a Supporters’ Plaza, the rooftop club with views back to the city’s skyline, the park-like eastern concourse, open-air public-market and beer-garden inspired culinary options, entry plazas and a close look at the West tower that will feature a variety of new premium seating options.

Starting at just \$9.16, four deposit levels are available to give fans priority access to season tickets for the inaugural season at the new stadium. From a safe-standing supporters section (\$9.16), general seating in the East and Southern neighborhoods (\$25) to all new premium seats (\$50) and private luxury suites (\$500) with ultimate comfort and unmatched views, there are options for every budget and every type of fan. Only one deposit is required to secure your seat selection priority for the new stadium.

Each deposit will include

a donation to help the club construct more free-to-play mini-soccer courts around the region. Since 2019, the club has built 12 new safe spaces throughout the community and donations will support the next court opening later this year and the many more to follow.

The groundbreaking comes after years of collaboration and commitment between Wilton Rancheria, Republic FC and the broader Sacramento community. Pre-construction work is already underway, including grading and utility preparation. In

Kings Tickets Available Shuler Retires After 25 Years

SACRAMENTO, CA (MPG) - The Sacramento Kings begin the 2025-26 season on the road against the Phoenix Suns at 7 p.m. Oct. 22. The Kings return home for opening night at Golden 1 Center presented by Kaiser Permanente to take on the Utah Jazz at 7 p.m. Oct. 24, followed by a matchup against the Los Angeles Lakers in Sacramento at 6 p.m. Oct. 26.

Sacramento heads back on the road to play their first back-to-back of the season, facing off against the Oklahoma City Thunder (Oct. 28) and Chicago Bulls (Oct. 29).

The Kings conclude the season’s first extended road trip with games in Milwaukee (Nov. 1) and Denver (Nov. 3). The team returns to Sacramento for a five-game homestand that includes their first meeting with the Golden State Warriors (Nov. 5) and their first Emirates NBA Cup 2025 game versus the defending NBA champion Oklahoma City Thunder (Nov. 7).

The Kings finish the homestand with contests against Minnesota (Nov. 9), Denver (Nov. 11) and Atlanta (Nov. 12) with the game against the Nuggets as their first nationally-televised game of the season, airing on NBC.

The Kings embark on a five-game road trip that tips off with their second Emirates NBA Cup game, taking on the Timberwolves at 5 p.m. Nov. 14. Sacramento heads to San Antonio (Nov. 16), Oklahoma City (Nov. 19), Memphis (Nov. 20) and Denver (Nov. 22).

The Kings in Sacramento have two 7 p.m. games against the Minnesota Timberwolves on Nov. 24 and the Phoenix Suns on Nov. 26 for their third Emirates NBA Cup contest. Sacramento ends November with an Emirates NBA Cup game in Utah, playing the Jazz at 6:30 p.m. Nov. 28 and finishing the month with a 6 p.m. home outing versus Memphis.

The Kings take a three-game road trip, playing the Rockets in Houston at 5 p.m. Dec. 3, the Heat in Miami at 5 p.m. Dec. 6 and a nationally televised game against the Indiana Pacers on Dec. 8 (Peacock).

The Kings have a two-game set against the Trail Blazers, squaring off in Portland at 7 p.m. Dec. 18 and in Sacramento at 7 p.m. Dec. 20. Sacramento finishes a four-game homestand with games versus Houston (Dec. 21), Detroit (Dec. 23) and Dallas (Dec. 27).

Road games in Los Angeles are with the Lakers at 6:30 p.m. Dec. 28 and the Clippers at 8 p.m. Dec. 30 in a

nationally-televised game on NBC.

The Kings have 10 games in Sacramento in January, beginning with a New Year’s Day clash against the Boston Celtics at 7 p.m. Sacramento travels to Phoenix (Jan. 2) for the second night of a back-to-back with the Suns before returning home to play the Milwaukee Bucks (Jan. 4) and the Dallas Mavericks (Jan. 6, NBC). The Kings make their first appearance at Chase Center on Jan. 9, playing the Warriors at 7 p.m.

Sacramento has a seven-game homestand with games against Houston (Jan. 11), the Lakers (Jan. 12, Peacock), New York (Jan. 14), Washington (Jan. 16), Portland (Jan. 18), Miami (Jan. 20) and Toronto (Jan. 21). The Kings then play six games away in nine days, beginning with games against Cleveland (Jan. 23) and Detroit (Jan. 25). Sacramento travels to New York (Jan. 27) before a back-to-back against Philadelphia (Jan. 29) and Boston (Jan. 30) and finishing in Washington on Feb. 1.

The Kings follow with three home games: the Memphis Grizzlies (Feb. 4), their first game on Prime Video against the Clippers at 7 p.m. Feb. 6 and a home matchup against Cleveland (Feb. 7). They play in New Orleans (Feb. 9) and Utah (Feb. 11). The Kings have a home outing against Orlando at 7 p.m. Feb. 19 and then an away game with San Antonio at 5 p.m. Feb. 21 in Austin for the start of a five-game trip. The Kings travel to Memphis (Feb. 23), Houston (Feb. 25) and Dallas (Feb. 26) and ends the trip in Los Angeles against the Lakers (March 1).

Sacramento has nine home games in March: a five-game homestand that starts against the Phoenix Suns at 8 p.m. March 3, airing on NBC; New Orleans (March 5), Chicago (March 8), Indiana (March 10) and Charlotte (March 11). Sacramento travels to L.A. to play the Clippers at 7:30 p.m. March 14, airing on ESPN. The Kings at home squares off against the Utah Jazz (March 15), San Antonio Spurs (March 17), Philadelphia 76ers (March 19) and Brooklyn Nets (March 22).

The Kings head east, taking on Charlotte (March 24), Orlando (March 26), Atlanta (March 28) and Brooklyn (March 29). The five-game road trip ends in Toronto on April 1. The Kings at home play New Orleans (April 3) and the Clippers (April 5). The Kings play the Golden State Warriors twice, first in San Francisco on April 7 and then at 7 p.m. April 10 at Golden 1 Center. Sacramento finishes the regular season on the road on April 12 in Portland.

“As he steps away from the field,” Mico said, “Jno leaves behind a legacy built not just on victories but on character, mentorship and integrity. I was blessed to have him as a mentor, and most of all, a friend. I wish him a fulfilling and well-deserved retirement.”

Shuler’s assistant coaching accolades included 20 3C2A Playoff Appearances in 2001 through 2012, 2014 through 2017, 2019 and 2022 through 2024; four conference championships in 2003, 2005, 2006 and 2012; 2012 3C2A State Championship; and 2022 ABCA (American Baseball Coaches Association) National Assistant Coach of the Year.

“Jno is truly one of a kind,” Pregliasco said. “His passion and support for our student-athletes made him more than a coach to those that worked with him or played for him. There is no doubt his athletes, coaches and staff are all better for knowing him.” ★
