Glenn Medical Center to Close

Glenn County is Losing its Only Hospital After Feds Refuse to Step In

Absent a Hail Mary, Glenn County's only hospital is set to close its doors in October.

Tucked between two national forests, the rural county is home to 28,000 people. Without a local emergency room, they'll instead have to travel at least 40 minutes to a neighboring county for critical care. One hundred and fifty health workers will lose their jobs; they're already resigning to seek work elsewhere.

The planned closure of Glenn Medical Center follows a decision by the U.S. Centers for Medicare and Medicaid Services to strip the hospital's federal "critical access" designation, a status that has provided Glenn Medical increased

reimbursement and regulatory flexibility. Without that status, the hospital's \$28 million in net annual revenue will take a hit of about 40% — a gap too large to fill any other way than closing the hospital, said Lauren Still, the hospital's chief executive.

"It's heartbreaking that we come to this. I am still kind of praying for that 11th hour miracle to come through," Still said. "But honestly, we just have to be realistic, and this is the hand we've been dealt."

Over the last several months Still and her team have been attempting to make their case with the federal health agency, even flying to Washington D.C in July in an attempt to lobby their case.

At the crux of the issue is a federal rule, newly reinterpreted, that

requires critical access hospitals to be at least 35 miles from the next closest hospital when traveling by main roads. Officials at CMS now say that the next closest hospital, Colusa Medical Center, is only 32 miles away — 3 miles short of the required distance.

Glenn Medical Center and county health officials argue that most people and ambulances take a different route, I-5 to Highway 20. That route is 35.7 miles, a distance that would qualify.

"We really felt that by getting all of our stories out there ... showing all of the different people that would be impacted by this decision, we really thought that would be enough information for them [CMS] to consider the human and

YUBA COUNTY, CA (MPG) - Blue Zones Project Yuba-Sutter, in partnership with the Yuba County Tobacco Coalition and Community Health Action Team, is launching Wellness Wins: High School Club Creative Competition to empower youth to inspire their peers to choose wellness over nicotine. Starting Sept. 15, high school clubs across Yuba County can submit creative projects, videos, posters, art, social media campaigns, skits or school-wide initiatives that showcase wellness as a powerful alternative to tobacco and vaping.

This effort comes at a critical time, as nearly nine out of 10 long-term nicotine users begin before age 18. With products like vapes and Zyn often marketed in candy and fruit flavors to attract youth, peer-to-peer education is more important than ever. The competition encourages students to channel their creativity to promote wellness strategies like walking, journaling, and connecting with friends as positive, healthy alternatives to nicotine.

“We believe young people are the most powerful advocates for change among their peers,” said Ricky Samayoa of Blue Zones Project Yuba-Sutter. “This competition gives them a platform to speak out and share their vision for a healthier future.”

practical considerations of their decision,” Still said. “Unfortunately, the only thing that matters is how they're measuring the distance on the roads.”

The feds first notified Glenn Medical in April that a recertification review found the hospital was not eligible for the critical access program. Hospital officials clung to hope that an appeal and communication with the agency would clarify the situation. But in a letter dated Aug. 13, the agency told the hospital it was standing by its original decision.

“After reviewing the hospital's additional information, CMS found that the hospital continues to not meet the distance requirement,” the letter reads.

The locations of Glenn Medical Center and its

neighbor a county over have not changed since Glenn Medical first became eligible for the critical access program in 2001. CalMatters asked the federal agency why it was seeking to revoke the hospital's designation now after more than two decades of eligibility at the same distance. The agency did not directly answer the question, but in an email simply reiterated the requirements to qualify for the program.

CMS said Glenn Medical Center could convert to another provider type in order to continue participating in the Medicare program. But Still said no other Medicare reimbursement model would pay the hospital at a financially sustainable rate. Under the critical access program, the federal government pays

hospitals 101% of their costs for inpatient and outpatient services provided to Medicare patients.

U.S. Rep. Doug LaMalfa, a Richvale Republican who represents Glenn County, said he continues to have conversations with Dr. Mehmet Oz, the administrator at CMS. He said they last spoke last week.

“We're not giving up by any stretch, we're going to pull out all the stops,” LaMalfa said. “We had a really good conversation with Dr. Oz and are looking for a way to make it work because the closure is not acceptable. It's a technical issue that we oughta find a way to work through.”

LaMalfa said he is considering introducing a bill that could update the mileage requirement or give CMS more discretion

when evaluating rural hospitals. But it's unclear that something could get done before October.

Glenn Medical Center and its staff cannot wait for much longer. The hospital announced it would keep its clinics open, but inpatient services will cease Oct. 21. Still said that's when she expects to no longer have enough staff to be able to operate.

“We had to start talking to staff and telling staff that, “Hey, we don't have a future here. There's no viable path forward for us without that critical access designation,” Still said. “At that point, we started getting staff resignations.”

With the announced closure, most Glenn County residents will have to seek emergency services either at the hospital in Colusa County or further away at Butte County's Enloe

Medical Center, a larger Level II trauma center in Chico.

“We are actively reviewing available resources to ensure our readiness to absorb anticipated increased patient volumes at the Enloe Health Emergency Department,” wrote Enloe Health in an unsigned statement.

Glenn County's two ambulances will also have to travel further and be outside the county for longer periods of time, leaving residents with even more limited emergency resources.

The announced closure is a stark reminder of the precarious state of California's rural hospitals. Even with increased Medicare reimbursement, Glenn Medical Center's annual financial statements show that the hospital consistently operated in the red.

Two years ago, the state bailed out 17 rural and

community hospitals – Glenn Medical was not one of them – by loaning them close to \$300 million altogether. That loan program was largely prompted by the closure of Madera Community Hospital, which also left an entire county without emergency services. After bankruptcy proceedings, Madera Community is now owned and operated by American Advanced Management, a for-profit company that has made a business out of rescuing distressed and shuttered hospitals. The company also owns Glenn Medical Center.

“It's devastating for our group from a personal perspective because we really do pride ourselves in being somebody who comes in and re-opens hospitals,” Still said. “When we go into a community, we make that promise to the community that we're not going to bail on them.” ★

Yuba Water Agency Approves up to \$80 Million Loan for South Yuba County Wastewater Project

MARYSVILLE, CA (MPG) - Yuba Water Agency's board of directors approved on Sept. 2 a loan of up to \$80 million for the City of Wheatland and Olivehurst Public Utility District's joint Regional Wastewater Transmission and Treatment Facilities Project, a transformative effort to modernize and regionalize wastewater service in South Yuba County.

"This project is critical to protecting our groundwater and surface water while ensuring safe, affordable wastewater treatment for communities in the south part of the county," said Gary Bradford, Yuba Water board director and county supervisor for Wheatland, Plumas Lake and the surrounding areas. "It's an incredible opportunity to be able to support a project that I think will be truly transformational and support the region's future economic growth."

The first phase of the project, estimated at \$155 million, will enable wastewater from the City of Wheatland to be treated by Olivehurst Public Utility District's existing treatment plant and fund some modernization of Olivehurst Public Utility District's facilities. A future, second phase, estimated to cost approximately \$40 million, will extend wastewater and water lines along 40 Mile Road.

Without this project, Wheatland's existing wastewater treatment plant, built in the 1960s and nearing the end of its working life, is expected to fail within three years. Wheatland estimates that constructing a new, stand-alone treatment facility would cost more than \$250 million and add approximately \$1,000 a month to Wheatland utility bills, an unaffordable burden on Wheatland's approximately 1,300 ratepayers. The regional approach keeps costs manageable, with Wheatland rates only expected to increase by a few dollars per month, instead. Meanwhile, Olivehurst Public Utility District will be making better use of the capacity at their facility, and they do not expect to have rates for their customers increase as a

result.

"Wheatland residents have faced the very real prospect of catastrophic rate increases if we were forced to replace our treatment plant on our own," said Wheatland City Manager Bill Zenoni. "This regional project and our partnership with OPUD, Yuba County and Yuba Water provide a sustainable and affordable path forward and reliable service for years to come."

Combined with a recently approved \$75 million grant from the State Water Resources Control Board, \$13.5 million in direct contributions from Wheatland and Olivehurst Public Utility District and other anticipated funding, the Yuba Water loan approval allows the project to move forward to the construction bidding phase, with a goal to break ground on construction later this year or in early 2026. Final loan terms will be developed and finalized later this year, once all other funding opportunities have been realized.

In addition to protecting water quality and reducing long-term costs for residents, the regional system will ensure regulatory compliance and provide the infrastructure necessary to support an estimated 9,000 jobs and development expected in South Yuba County. The project also creates the potential for Beale Air Force Base to connect to the regional system in the future.

Although Yuba Water is not a municipal water or wastewater provider, the agency is Yuba County's Groundwater Sustainability Agency and has the expertise and resources to support this complex project, which will protect groundwater and surface water by eliminating discharges into the Bear River during high flows.

During today's meeting, Yuba Water's board also authorized staff to research the potential for Wheatland, Olivehurst Public Utility District and Yuba County to form a new regional wastewater authority in the future, which could be formed through a joint powers agreement.

Yuba City Responds to Grand Jury Findings with Mixed Agreement

YUBA CITY, CA (MPG) - In its formal response to the 2024-2025 Sutter County Grand Jury report, the Yuba City Council on Sept. 2 acknowledged several findings related to traffic safety and municipal oversight but declined to implement key recommendations, citing jurisdictional limitations and resource constraints.

The grand jury's report, released earlier this summer, examined public safety concerns near schools, signage visibility and procedural transparency across multiple agencies. While not solely focused on Yuba City, the report included findings relevant to city-managed infrastructure and services. Under California Penal Code, the city was required to respond within 90 days.

The official reply, which council approved on the consent calendar, included a mix of agreement, partial concurrence and rejection. Among the most notable points of contention was the grand jury's recommendation to implement automated traffic incident reporting systems in school zones.

City officials declined, stating that such incidents are typically managed by the California Highway Patrol, not by Yuba City Police. The response, written by Public Works Director Josh Wolffe, emphasized that Yuba City lacks both jurisdiction and the budget to install and maintain a separate reporting system.

"The recommendation is outside the scope of our operational authority," the response letter states. "Traffic incidents near schools fall under CHP jurisdiction, and any automated system would require interagency coordination and funding not currently available."

Yuba City also rejected the grand jury's recommendation that the Sutter County Board of Supervisors and Yuba City Council adhere to and update relevant local traffic codes to include standardized traffic signage for all schools, including upgrading low-visibility signs to solar-powered warning signs placed for oncoming traffic by Jan. 1, 2026.

"This recommendation will not be implemented as it is not warranted," the response, signed by all five members of the City Council, states. "The city does not create local traffic codes for standardized school signage or other locations. The city designs improvement projects based on the most current version of the California Manual on Uniform Traffic Control Devices. The CA MUTCD is the State's standard for traffic signs, road markings, and traffic signals. It is developed by the California Department of Transportation (Caltrans) and is based on the national MUTCD but tailored for California's specific needs." ★

Further, the city said it could not commit

to upgrading all standard school signs to solar-powered warning signs by Jan. 1 because the cost of materials is nearly \$3,000 per sign (not including design and installation) and the city does not currently have a Capital Improvement Project programmed to fund such improvements.

"The city can commit to continual pursuit of grants which would provide funding for safety improvements (as warranted) at area schools, and creating upgrades as funding becomes available," the letter states. "Further, the city has multiple grant-funded projects which will create safety improvements in 2025."

Another recommendation the city rejected involved vegetation management and signage visibility near stop signs. While the grand jury flagged overgrown foliage and obscured signage as safety hazards, Yuba City clarified that many of the affected areas fall under county or Caltrans control. The city agreed with the intent of the recommendation but asserted that it cannot enforce or maintain infrastructure outside its legal boundaries.

Still, the city expressed support for other grand jury recommendations, including certified training for school crossing guards. Officials confirmed that Yuba City will work with the school district to ensure initial and annual training is provided, aligning with the grand jury's call for standardized safety protocols.

In parallel with its formal response, Yuba City continues to support community health initiatives through the Blue Zones Project Yuba-Sutter. The city has partnered with Blue Zones to promote walkability, healthy eating, and social connection. Regular "Walking Moai" events are now held at locations such as Regency Park, Feather River Parkway, and the Yuba Sutter Mall, encouraging residents to "move naturally" in line with Blue Zones principles. Cooking demonstrations at local venues like Grocery Outlet and Olivehurst Food Center teach residents how to prepare plant-forward meals using whole grains, beans, fruits, and vegetables.

During the meeting, Councilmember Toni Cole reported that the Blue Zone recently released its third-year progress report.

"As it specifically pertains to Yuba City, they were able to get several new school approvals for Blue Zones," Cole said. "They hosted over 730 students, parents, and staff in different workshops. All their food policy certification goals have been achieved among other really great things. It's a great organization to be a part of for our city in terms of health and sustainability." ★

Officials said these efforts reflect a broader commitment to public well-being, even as the city navigates the limits of its authority in responding to oversight recommendations. ★

Suspicious Person Arrest

Once on scene, deputies contacted 45-year-old Michael Hesse of San Francisco. During the encounter, deputies observed what appeared to be a concealed weapon under Hesse's shirt. A pat-down search revealed a

fixed-blade dirk or dagger and a pellet gun.

Further search of Hesse's belongings uncovered several pairs of gloves, a face mask, a wig, a hammer, multiple flashlights and identification not belonging to him. A records check revealed several prior theft and forgery convictions for Hesse.

Hesse was taken into custody without incident and booked into the Sutter County Jail on burglary and identity theft-related charges, as well as charges for being a convicted felon in possession of the above-mentioned weapons. ★

Summer Strawberry Plantings Hit New Record in California

Increased demand for strawberries in the fall and winter has driven summer plantings, which have reached a record high of 11,503 acres this year, according to the California Strawberry Commission. This year's summer acreage represents about a quarter of the state's total strawberry acreage, which stands at 42,885, the commission said. This is an increase of 1.3% from last year. Second-year acres—strawberry plants kept alive for more than one growing season—have increased nearly every year since 2021 due to the rising cost of planting new berries. Since 2018, second-year acres have increased sixfold.

Engineered Wheat Could Cut Costs for Farmers

Farmers could soon benefit from wheat engineered to stimulate the production of its own fertilizer, turning nitrogen from the air into a usable form and reducing the need for synthetic fertilizer. With about 500 million acres of U.S. farmland planted with cereal crops each year, researchers who made the breakthrough in wheat estimated it could generate significant savings for farmers. "Imagine, if you could save 10% of the amount of fertilizer being used on that land," said Eduardo Blumwald, professor of plant sciences at the University of California, Davis. "I'm calculating conservatively: That should be a savings of more than a billion dollars every year." In 2023, American farmers spent roughly \$36 billion on fertilizers, according to the U.S. Department of Agriculture.

New Initiative Aims to Help California Farmers Confront Challenges

The University of California Agriculture and Natural Resources has been awarded \$15 million from the state of California to establish an innovation network—UC ANR Innovate—that aims to help farmers solve problems related to water scarcity, labor shortages and other challenges. "This award allows us to do something California has never done before: build a single, state-wide engine for agricultural innovation," said Gabriel Youtsey, chief innovation officer at UC ANR. Youtsey added that the initiative will ensure "that every farmer—from small specialty growers to large scale producers—benefits from the tools needed to stay competitive." The program will help farmers by expanding access to emerging tools and by providing tailored support and upskilling opportunities for employees.

Mountain Lion Attacks Take Toll on Lake County Livestock

California farmers and ranchers continue to suffer losses due to apex predators, with mountain lion attacks in Lake County affecting some ranchers. "The mountain lion seems to be the biggest issue here right now, and they are killing a good number of animals in one night," Lake County Supervisor Helen Owen said in a recent episode of the Voice of California Agriculture podcast, which is produced by the California Farm Bureau. Owen said the county lost 16 sheep and 25 goats. "It's just really heart wrenching," she said. "The emotional factor is just horrible." ★

Years ago we used to buy Christmas trees still wrapped in mesh. We called it buying a pig in a poke (sight unseen).

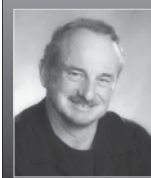
Now, we've done the same thing in picking and buying our little vacation place in California.

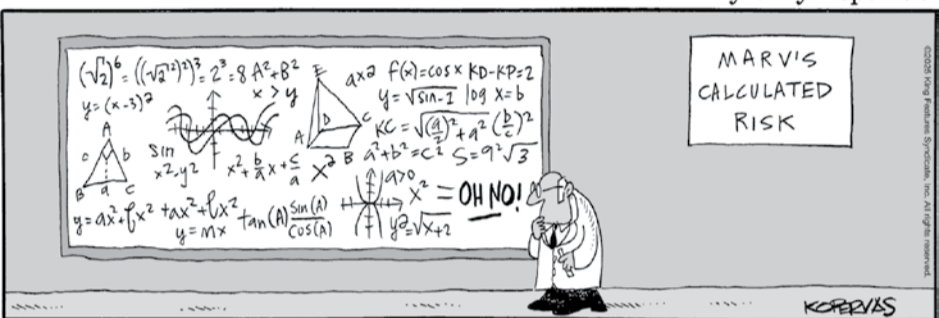

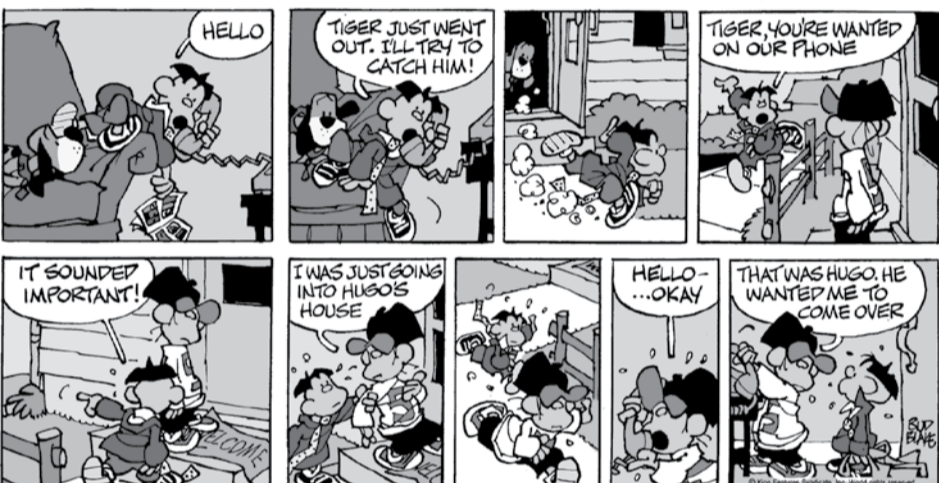

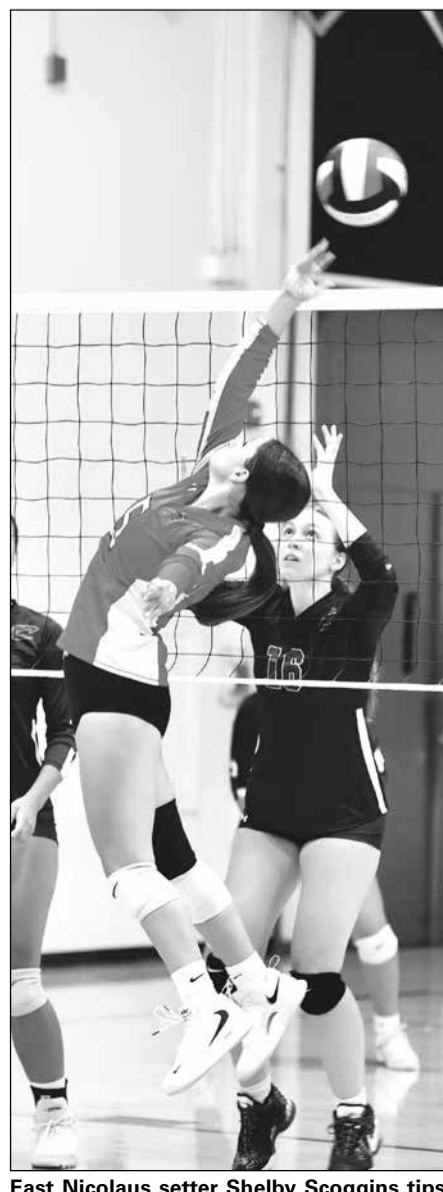

As for Marysville, which didn't win a match in contests against Durham, Sutter, Red Bluff and Colfax, the young team should be commended for playing hard throughout.

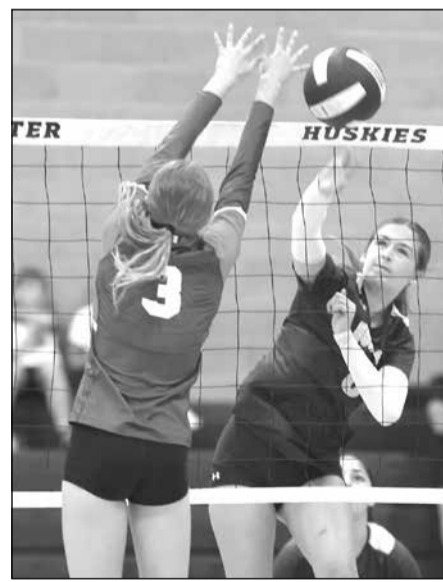
Colfax defeated Red Bluff to capture the silver bracket championship. ★



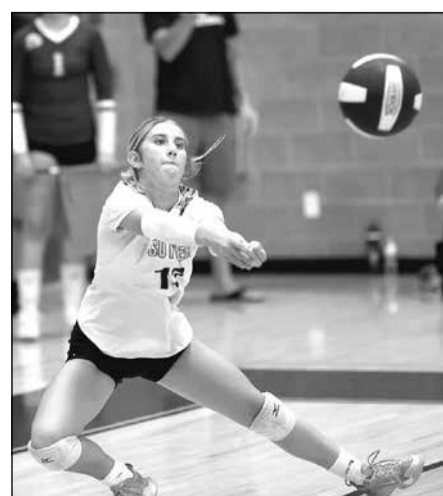
River Valley's Jada Barr elevates to kill a ball in the Falcons' win over Woodland on Sept. 6 at the Battle in the Buttes Tournament.
