Reports have surfaced of individuals posing as water officials, knocking on doors and claiming your tap water might be unsafe. They offer unsolicited in-home water testing, which often leads to high-pressure sales tactics for costly and unnecessary water treatment equipment or services.

Incidents of this nature have been increasingly reported across Northern California, including in Elk Grove, Fairfield and Sacramento, where residents were pushed to purchase expensive water treatment systems following unsolicited testing claims.

Be assured: your water is safe. Drinking water served by Citrus Heights Water District, Sacramento Suburban Water District, Orange Vale Water Company and California American Water meet some of the strictest water quality standards. Water is regularly tested and follows federal and state regulations to ensure community health and safety.

Citrus Heights Water District, Sacramento Suburban Water District, Orange Vale Water Company and California American Water do not conduct in-home water testing. All necessary testing is done either at the treatment facilities, wells or through officially scheduled programs, not through door-to-door visits.

Your water provider's employees are always clearly identifiable. They wear official uniforms with agency logos, drive marked vehicles and carry agency-issued identification cards.

Quarter Midget's Johnny Cash Classic NASCAR Youth Series Race in Rancho Cordova

SACRAMENTO REGION, CA (MPG) - Drawing youth racers, their families and spectators to the American Quarter Midget Association racetrack in Rancho Cordova, was the fourth annual Johnny Cash Classic, a NASCAR Youth Series Showcase Event on the weekend of Sept. 12 to 14.

Youth racers as young as 5-years-old up to 17-years old competed against each other within 14 respective, co-ed age groups that are also separated by chassis type. Rancho Cordova's American Quarter Midget Association races on a paved track within the Prairie City State Vehicle Recreation Area. Upon arriving at the racetrack, teams began setting up their camp equipment and pit area, assembling their vehicles and workstations.

Drivers were represented locally with drivers from Rancho Cordova's American Quarter Midget Association and Rio Linda's Capitol Quarter Midget Association, two of

California's seven quarter midget tracks.

Making the trip across state and country lines were drivers from Utah, Washington and Canada. Practice sessions were on Sept. 12 with the heat and main races on Sept. 13.

"It's really fun being out here with all my friends and racing with them,"

said Tatum Talcott, a racer from Rancho Cordova's American Quarter Midget Association who came in second place of his class, the Light 160. "It's just fun."

Some teams brought more than one vehicle to race among a range of class types based on weight and chassis configuration.

Other teams had more than one racer participating in multiple events. Some classes included red and blue Honda; junior and senior Honda; heavies and formula. More than 80 racers participated across the 14 different classes.

Derek Becker, the father of racers Cash and

Lancers Looking Toward League Play

RANCHO CORDOVA, CA (MPG) - The Cordova Lancers wrapped up their non-league schedule with a tough 47-0 loss against visiting Rio Americano on Friday, Sept. 12 inside Lancer Stadium.

Fortunately for the team, the opportunity to dwell on what went wrong will be short lived as the team is gearing up for the start of Metro League competition this week.

With league records becoming the most important statistic moving forward, there is no time to worry about past mistakes. The Lancers (1-2 overall) and head coach JP Dolliver will look to get back on track in a hurry when they host visiting West Park (1-3 overall) in their Metro League opener this Friday, Sept. 19 inside Lancer Stadium, with kickoff set for 7:15 p.m.

After finishing in fifth place within the Metro last season, Cordova is looking to make their presence known in their second year within the league after realignment.

Led by junior quarterback Trey Wallace, the Lancers will look to pound the ball in between the tackles with their hard-nosed signal caller and a stable of capable running backs.

Senior Chicago Bush and junior Zachary

McIntire figure to be relied upon to help shoulder the offensive load down the most pivotal stretch of the season as tough ball carriers.

Wallace, who is the team's leading rusher, will also be looking to throw his first passing touchdown of the year as all his scoring output has come on three rushing scores thus far.

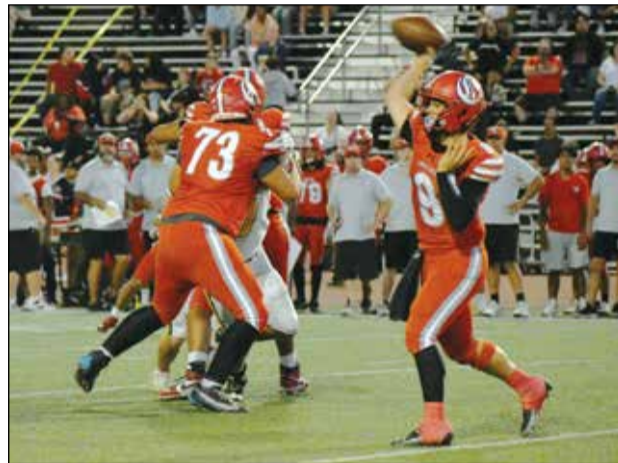
Defensively, senior defensive tackle Julian Drahn will look to add to his team, leading 3.0 sacks (at press time) as the anchor of the Lancers' defensive front. The Lancers defense will also look to build on some solid takeaway numbers, registering five turnovers forced in their first three games this year between three interceptions and two fumble recoveries as a unit.

West Park will bring their explosive passing offense into Lancer Stadium, led by senior quarterback Jaden Jackson, who is averaging 219.0 yards per game through the air thus far throwing to a multitude of receivers. The game figures to be a battle between clashing styles, with the Lancers hoping that their strong rushing attack and opportunistic defense will keep the ball away from West Park.

Memphis Becker from Utah, said that he and his wife, Laura, made the journey from Colorado after completing a race there the weekend prior. Cash and Memphis Becker are fourth-generation racers in their family, a trend common throughout many racers at the event.

"It's pretty cool to just think about what you did and what you accomplished the last race and then you go to your house or your new school and you're thinking about that," Cash Becker said.

Paisley Becher Racing, locals to Rio Linda's Capitol Quarter Midget Association, was represented by Paisley Becher, her father Ryan Becher and their family.

Ryan Becher said that his daughter first got started racing when she participated in a "Ride N Drive" event at Capitol Quarter Midget Association on Rio Linda's dirt track, now racing for approximately two years, racing three different chassis.

A "Ride N Drive" event allows participants to drive 20 laps for \$20. Becher said his daughter had so much fun that she drove a total of 40 laps and they bought a car that same day.

To get started racing quarter midgets, entry level costs can range from more than \$1,500 for a used chassis and gear to upward of \$4,000. Safety gear consists of a NASCAR Youth Series approved helmet, fire suit, neck restraints, arm restraints and gloves. After acquiring the chassis, gear and proper equipment, drivers can contact their local quarter midget association about applying for a club membership.

To join the NASCAR Youth Series membership, there are options for annual applications through the United States Auto Club, single-event applications and "Ride N Drive" applications. The applications are available at <https://usacracing.redpodium.com/2025-nascar-youth-series-membership>. Applications can range from \$10 for single event tickets per person to \$100 for annual family memberships, with an additional \$10 per person in the membership.

Beginning drivers start out in the "Rookie" program, learning the basics of track etiquette, safety and driving skills. Volunteering is a requirement when you become a member.

Brooke Hegje, a local to the Rancho Cordova track who came in second place during the heavy world formula class main races, said that she has been racing for seven years and that she first got started after watching her cousins race.

Tate Hegje, Brook Hegje's little brother, said he has been racing for six years, coming in third place of the light 160 class mains. Tate Hegje said he and his sister have participated in race events as far as Indianapolis, Indiana.

"Being here, I've made so many friendships and we've hung out with them three weeks in a row now outside of the

racetrack," Brooke Hegje said. "It just brings so many people together in some amazing community."

American Quarter Midget Association Vice President Alyssa Craine said that it's rewarding to have such a large event run efficiently, drawing people back to the racetrack for more events and growing the venue's reputation.

"Just overall, getting drivers from everywhere makes our drivers better," Craine said. "So having not just the locals, enhances everybody's racing."

Grayson Craine, Alyssa Craine's son, said he's ranked in the top three of three different chassis classes, ranking in first place within one of those chassis' classes. At the Johnny Cash Classic, Grayson Craine came in first place within the junior Honda, junior animal and junior 160 classes for the main races. Grayson said he spends a lot of

time practicing and that he has his dad to thank for why he's so successful.

"I've watched these kids grow from five, six, seven, eight, ten years old, to now being able to drive full-size NASCAR cars or do bigger, better, crazier things," event announcer Ian McAdams said. "And just seeing that growth and seeing the effect that it had on so many, it's so fulfilling on a level that I can't really describe, if that makes sense."

Quarter midget racing events take place nationwide with many local drivers having competed across state lines in places such as Indiana, Talladega and Las Vegas. Many parents said they stay in contact with other families across the country, building life-long friendships. Parents also spoke about quarter midget racing's ability to provide a network for youth to socialize and make friends everywhere they go.

Chase Miller from Vancouver, Canada and his family traveled to race in Sacramento for the first time and he recognized a few familiar faces from other NASCAR Youth Series races.

Miller said he took six days from school to travel and race in California because their season in

Vancouver is limited. He finished first in the heavy 160 and unrestricted animal classes, as well as second in the heavy Honda class.

Moving from track to track, Miller said, tracks might be identical but they're never the same and that there is always something to do.

"Even after the race," Miller said, "it's not over until you finally get in the car to go home."

Multiple parents spoke about the tight-knit quarter midget racing community that has a "no-one-left-behind" mentality, where no matter which child might have an issue on the track or in the pits, there is no shortage of volunteers.

Drivers said that they focused on practicing their drive line before the race, meaning that they could carry as much momentum as possible without slowing down. Parents and pit crew members said that some of the biggest changes from track to track are suspension and gearing.

"One thing you'll find here is that everyone helps everyone," Chas Miller's father, Steve Miller, said. "So when a kid comes off the track with a mechanical problem, you know, your competitors, their dads

and moms, and everyone joins in to get that kid back on the racetrack."

Steve Miller said that it's crucial to test everything and check everything because it could be a 90-cent part that costs a driver the race.

"Going fast" was one of the more popular responses from drivers when asked what their favorite part about quarter midget racing was.

Quarter midget races can range anywhere from 10 to more than 40 miles per hour on the racetrack, with the objective being to pass as many drivers as possible and accumulate the most points. Rookie races last as low as 10 laps with heavy and senior races lasting as long as 40 laps.

"This track has done a lot for kids anywhere from age five to 17 to help build their character; they build their social skills," said Cole Farrow, the father of junior Honda racer Kyle Farrow. "They build confidence levels and they take all the stuff that they learn here from this track and they use that for the rest of their lives."

Kyle Farrow came in third place within the junior Honda and junior animal classes, as well as second place in the junior 160 class. His

grandfather, Paul Farrow, said that "in his mind, he's 20-years-old. He gets a different, kind of a focused mindset."

And Another Thing September...

One of the columns I wrote in the past was about the many Vietnam veterans who have never been welcomed home after they served our country. I have been able to give hundreds of the Vietnam veterans the lapel pen and thank them for serving their country. I received an email from one of those veterans who read the article about the lapel pins and asked if there would be an opportunity for him to receive it. Sacramento-Area New Home Sales Moving Upward



New home sales in the Sacramento region continued moving upwards in August, with 496 sales reported by members of the North State Building Industry Association. MPG file photo

SACRAMENTO REGION, CA (MPG) - New home sales in the Sacramento region continued moving upwards in August, with 496 sales reported by members of the North State Building Industry Association – the highest total since February.

Tim Murphy, the BIA's President and CEO, attributed the strong showing to a combination of slightly lower interest rates and the valuable incentives being offered by many builders.

"Mortgage interest rates continue to slowly move downward and are now at their lowest point since last October," Murphy said. "As Robert Dietz, the chief economist of the National Association of Home Builders, told our members last week, as prospective buyers see rates get close to 6%, we're likely to see a significant increase in sales. As rates have inched below 6.5%, we may be seeing that trend already getting underway."

"In addition, many builders are continuing to offer a range of incentives designed to make buying a home more affordable, and those deals are clearly making a difference as well," Murphy said.

August's sales totals were well above the historical monthly average of 409

sales during the month and up 3% from July. However, due to July being a five-week month, basic sales were up nearly 30% from the prior month on a weekly basis. Sales were down 18% from August 2024, but because that also was a five-week month, weekly sales year-over-year were almost even.

Rancho Cordova led all area submarkets with 91 sales, followed by Roseville with 87, Elk Grove with 74, Sacramento with 64, and Natomas with 40. Rounding out the top 10 were Plumas Lake (31), Lincoln (30), El Dorado Hills (29), Granite Bay (9) and Galt (8). For more statistical information, see charts below.

BIA statistics covered 198 new home communities reported by members in Amador, El Dorado, Nevada, Placer, Sacramento, Sutter, Yolo and Yuba counties.

From This Tragedy, More Voices Must Rise

Silencing one voice cannot end the conversation. It must awaken a chorus of many

Charlie Kirk's death on September 10 was more than a personal tragedy; it struck at the very heart of free speech in America. For years, he had become a modern symbol of debate culture, a figure willing to put himself in front of hostile audiences and say, "Let's talk."

In a time when disagreement often leads to shouting, shaming, or silencing, Kirk chose dialogue — once so common it wasn't even considered special in America, but now it seems like a lost art.

Kirk built his career not by hiding from critics but by meeting them head-on. In person, not from the safety of an online echo chamber. On college campuses across the country, he welcomed tough questions from students who often opposed everything he represented. He listened, he argued, and he stood his ground with facts, critical thinking, and a depth of knowledge rare for any citizen, especially someone his age.

It was not about demanding agreement but about proving that open dialogue matters more than uniformity of thought. He even sat with California Governor Gavin Newsom; while the two disagreed on most issues, they still managed to show millions of viewers what respectful debate

could look like.

That choice to engage with opponents was no small act. In today's culture, it is easier to cancel, shame, or attack than to have a real conversation. Too many people treat disagreement as something to shut down and silence. Kirk refused to play that game. He believed the only way to sharpen your own argument was to test it against the strongest case from the other side. In that way, he upheld the older American tradition of free speech, where ideas meet head-on and the best argument stands.

His assassination is therefore not only the silencing of one

man, but also an assault on the heart and soul of America. When violence is used to end debate, free speech itself becomes the casualty. We cannot accept a future where the price of speaking out is fear for your life.

There is also a broader warning in this tragedy. Political violence doesn't stop with one person. Once it becomes acceptable to kill or threaten a voice because you disagree with it, the door opens to silence anyone.

Today it was Charlie Kirk. Tomorrow it could be an elected official, a professor, a journalist, a union organizer, or a student. Free speech is not a partisan value. It is the foundation of

democracy, and without it, every other right grows weaker.

Charlie Kirk forced people to think, respond, and defend their beliefs. He showed that disagreement doesn't have to lead to dehumanization. He showed that you can argue passionately and still see the humanity in the person you're debating.

Perhaps even more troubling than the cancer consuming the art of civil discourse is that Charlie Kirk's underlying message was essentially one of love and respect for our country, our fellow citizens, our values, our history, and our future generations.

There is a poignant video clip

circulating online of George Carlin, the sardonic comedian and social critic, who framed assassination this way:

"It's interesting to notice who it is we assassinate. You know who it is — it's always people who told us to live together in harmony and try to love one another. Jesus. Gandhi. Lincoln. John Kennedy. Bobby Kennedy. Martin Luther King. Medgar Evers. Malcolm X. John Lennon. They all said try to live together peacefully . . ."

Sadly, we've experienced too many of these tragic moments in American life. Kirk's assassination is yet another.

But like other moments in history, this tragedy can be a turning point. The best way to honor Kirk's legacy is to refuse silence. We must keep speaking, listening, and debating, even when it is uncomfortable. Fear cannot be allowed to dictate our voices. The future of free speech, and the restoration of respect and love for this nation and for our fellow countrymen, depends on it.

Social Security Matters

I'd Like to Retire Early, But Don't Want My Social Security Reduced

Dear Rusty: I will be 65 this year and my husband is 72 (he retired in 2019 at age 66). I would like to retire and enjoy some time with him before he gets too much older. I do not want to have my benefits cut by retiring earlier, but I don't see a way to be able to do that. My benefit will be \$1343 on my full retirement age (FRA). If I took half his retirement when he retired, it would be less than mine. If I take early retirement and he passes away before me, would I get his full benefit as his survivor, or will it be cut? We are trying to figure it out. His current benefit (before Medicare Part B) is \$2978. It's very confusing. **Signed: Confused and Wondering**

Dear Confused: Whenever any Social Security benefit is claimed earlier than full retirement age (FRA), the monthly amount is permanently reduced. If you were to retire at age 65, your Social Security benefit would be

reduced by about 13% - in other words, if your FRA (age 67) amount is \$1343, at 65 you would get about \$1164. And at age 66 you would get about \$1253 per month.

Whether you would be entitled to a "spousal boost" from your husband depends on how your FRA amount compares to 50% of his FRA entitlement. If your FRA amount is less than 50% of his FRA amount, then you would get a "spousal boost," but the amount of that boost would also be reduced if you claim before your FRA. (Note: from the numbers you provided, you may be entitled to a spousal boost and, if so, it would be applied by Social Security when you claim).

Also, FYI, if you take SS before your FRA and are still working, Social Security has an annual earnings test which limits how much you can earn while collecting early benefits. If you earn more than \$23,400 in 2025, you will likely not get all of your monthly SS payments (SS will take away some monthly benefits if you exceed the earnings limit). Of course, if you retire from working, this will not be a problem, because earnings before you claim SS won't count toward the limit.

When you claim your SS retirement benefit now will not affect your

survivor benefit from your husband later. If your husband passes first, your benefit as a surviving spouse would be based on the amount your husband was receiving at his death. But if you were to claim your widow's benefit prior to your FRA, your survivor benefit would also be reduced (the amount of reduction depends on how much before your FRA you claim your survivor benefit). If you claim your widow's benefit at or after your FRA, you will get 100% of the amount your husband was receiving at his death (instead of your own smaller amount). It will only be reduced if you claim before your full retirement age.

The Ignorance of Senator Tim Kaine

Tim Kaine needs to report to a remedial civics class as soon as possible. The Virginia senator and former vice presidential candidate expressed outrage at a congressional hearing that a Trump nominee said that our rights come from God, not government.

Kaine suspected incipient theocracy, warning that the Iranian regime persecutes religious minorities on exactly this basis. "They do it," he explained, "because they believe that they understand what natural rights are from their creator."

In searching for an example more relevant to the American experience, Kaine might cast his mind back to a fellow Virginian -- a tall, sandy-haired, Charlottesville-area gentleman with an interest in architecture, a taste for fine wine and a knack for writing. Ring any bells?

Thomas Jefferson had three things inscribed on his tombstone: drafter of the Virginia statute for religious freedom, founder of the University of Virginia and author of the Declaration Independence. Kaine could lodge all the same complaints he made about the offending nominee, Riley Barnes, against the Declaration of Independence that shockingly maintains that all persons are "endowed by their Creator with certain unalien-

able Rights," and calls this proposition -- with arrogant certitude -- a "self-evident" truth.

Luckily for the Sage of Monticello, he didn't have to get confirmed as ambassador to France by a Senate foreign relations committee including Tim Kaine (as it happened, the U.S. Senate didn't exist yet). Kaine might consider that, in taking his oath of office, he actually pledged to defend a constitutional system that is founded on the idea that our rights exist prior to government.

As Jefferson noted later, the sentiments of the Declaration were commonplace in 18th century America. Jefferson's nemesis, Alexander Hamilton, stated that "the sacred rights of mankind" are "written, as with a sun beam, in the whole volume of human nature, by the hand of the divinity itself; and can never be erased or obscured by mortal power." John Adams, James Wilson and John Dickinson, among other Founding figures, said exactly the same thing.

Whereas Tim Kaine hears someone say our rights come from God and thinks of the writings and thought of, say, the Ayatollah Khomeini, the philosophical basis of the idea is found in the work of John Locke, one of the greatest Enlightenment thinkers. Locke grounded his liberalism in an understanding of mankind as possessing inherent God-given rights and dignity.

The power of this idea is that in a conflict between our rights and laws impinging on them, the laws must give way. Kaine's view that rights come from the gov-

ernment implies that the state gets to decide whether or not and to what extent we have rights. The American project, though, is based on the belief that it is the duty of government to respect preexisting rights, and if a government tramples on them, it has failed and is illegitimate.

The abolitionists used this view to great effect in the 19th century. Even though the government had decided that it was permissible for one class of people to enslave another, the abolitionists believed that this was an offense against God. Enslaved people had a natural right to liberty that couldn't be erased.

So, Kaine must have a beef with the likes of William Lloyd Garrison, Frederick Douglass and Abraham Lincoln. He presumably would have gone ballistic over Garrison's conviction that the "right to enjoy liberty is inalienable. To invade it is to usurp the prerogative of Jehovah." Rather than a warrant for theocracy, the Garrison view supported the extension of rights. As he put it, "wherever there is a human being, I see God-given rights inherent in that being, whatever may be the sex or complexion."

Kaine's outburst shows how progressives have an allergy to God in any context other than a personal one, and how it isn't just schoolchildren who are ignorant about our history and system of government. Is it too much to ask that a U.S. senator know a little bit about our heritage?

Californians Don't Know Full Impact of \$20 Fast Food Wage

As the California Legislature churns toward the end of its 2025 session this week, processing the remnants of thousands of bills introduced during the year, several measures encompass the Capitol's most enduring conflict: Labor unions vs. employers over working conditions.

Unions seek higher wages and benefits, citing the welfare and financial needs of workers and their families. Employers counter that the cost of providing what unions want adversely affects their competitiveness in other states and nations and forces them to raise prices, reduce employment or even leave California to remain solvent.

In the main, unions fare better than employers in California's political arena — not surprising given that union-friendly Democrats from the governor down dominate the Capitol.

One of the most intense union-employer battles arose in 2022 over legislation that would have raised the minimum wage for fast food workers to \$22 an hour. It also declared that fast food franchises are merely subsidiaries of their parent chains, rather than independently owned businesses.

Fast food companies and franchisees saw it as a double whammy that not only

would increase their costs but it would undermine the franchise system itself. The industry also disliked the bill's creation of an appointed council with the power to regulate fast food working conditions, especially wages.

The measure passed both legislative houses with party-line votes, and Gov. Gavin Newsom signed it. The industry responded with a campaign to put the issue on the ballot, pledging that affected corporations would spend any amount of money to overturn the law due to its effects on the franchise system.

Which faction would win such a battle will never be known, however, because a year after the bill was signed and after lengthy negotiations, a compromise was worked out and quickly enacted. It raised the minimum wage to an initial \$20 an hour and left the oversight council intact, albeit with some changes. More importantly to the industry, it did not interfere with the franchise system.

The new wage went into effect in April 2024, and since then the industry and the unions have sparred over its impact not only on wages but on overall employment and fast food prices.

The factions are marking the second anniversary of the 2023 compromise by issuing reports that could not be more different.

Labor acted first with the September 5 release of an analysis by UC-Berkeley's Center on Wage and Employment Dynamics. It's a research organization whose reports uniformly support the union side of issues.

Researchers Michael Reich and Denis Sosinskiy declared that the \$20 wage did not

reduce fast food employment, didn't change the number of hours worked and "only led to minimal menu price increases (about 8 cents on a \$4 burger)." They said their study included price data from more than 2,000 restaurants in California and other states.

Five days later the Virginia-based Employment Policies Institute — which was created by Berman and Company, a lobbyist for restaurant, hotel beverage, tobacco and fossil fuel interests — issued its study based on data from the federal Bureau of Labor Statistics.

It concluded that California's fast-food industry has lost 19,102 jobs since Newsom signed the law in September 2023, including 15,988 since the law went into effect last year, more than double the rate of loss seen in fast food outlets nationally. It did not delve into fast food prices.

The two competing studies from less-than-objective sources leave us still wondering what the true impact might have been. It's a knowledge gap that should be filled by someone or something with impeccable credentials because other business sectors might be the next targets.

In fact, there's already a battle in Los Angeles over the \$30 wage for workers at hotels and other hospitality businesses imposed by the city council.

As a recipient of CDBG funding, the City has developed a draft 2026 AAP, which describes how the City will utilize program funds for eligible activities during the 2026 CDBG program year. The 2026 CDBG program year will run from January 1, 2026 to December 31, 2026. The AAP can be amended as needed to reallocate funds to housing and community development activities.

The draft 2026 AAP will be made available to the public for at least 30 days before adoption by the City Council. The documents will be released on **October 3, 2025** for public review and comment, and will be available at City Hall and the City's Community Development website at <https://www.cityofranhocordova.org/departments/community-development/housing/community-development-block-grant>

RANCHO CORDOVA, CA (MPG) - The Mills Station Arts and Culture Center (MACC) is hosting an Open Studios event as part of the Verge Center for the Arts "Sac Open Studios."

The first two days of the Sacramento and Yolo County event were on Sept. 13 and 14. The MACC has its preview party from 7 to 9 p.m. Sept. 19 and is open from 10 a.m. to 5 p.m. on Sept. 20 and 21. Come to the MACC and talk to the artists in person.

Sac Open Studios is a self-guided tour of home studios of more than 200 artists in Sacramento and Yolo counties. This 20th anniversary of the event is expected to attract about 30,000 attendees

over the two weekends.

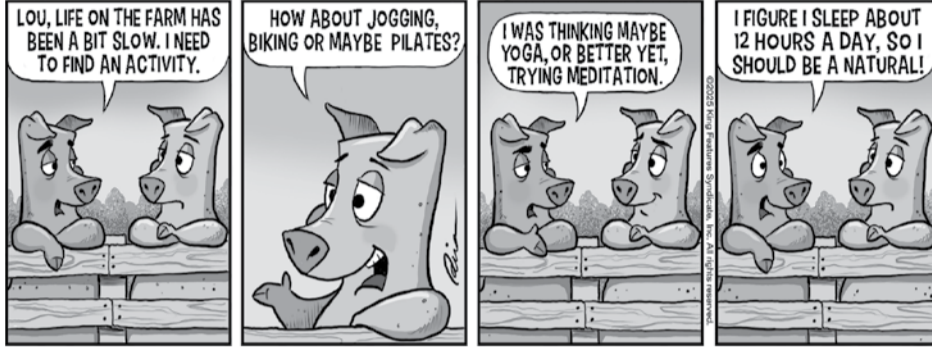

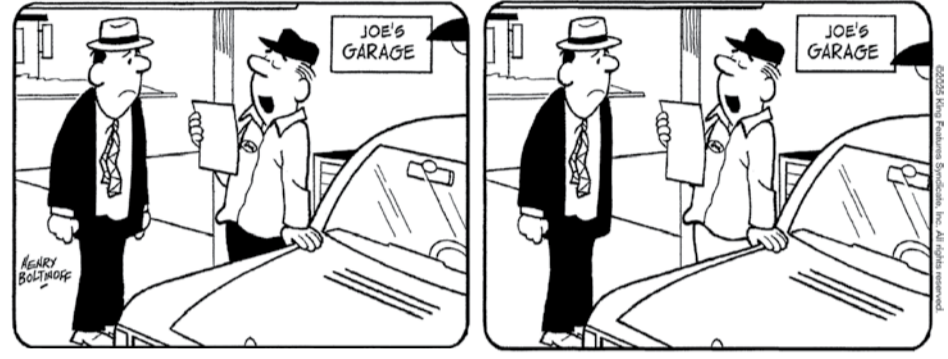

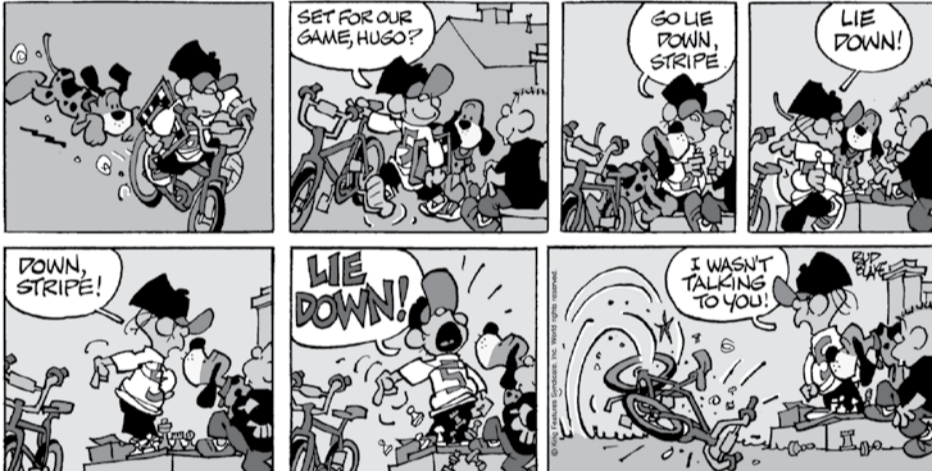

SACRAMENTO, CA (MPG) - USL (United Soccer League) Championship announced that Republic FC midfielder Rodrigo (RoRo) Lopez was nominated for USL Championship Player of the Month for August. Voting closed online at USLChampionship.com on Sept. 9. A fan vote comprises 51% of the poll and the remainder was conducted by the USL Technical Committee and National Media Panel.

Lopez finished August tied for the league lead with five goal contributions (two goals, three assists), adding his name to the score-sheet in each of his four appearances in August. There were three other August Player of the Month nominees, including the Louisville City FC's Jansen Wilson. Wilson recorded four goals and one assist across five contests as Louisville City went undefeated in the month, averaging a goal every 107.8 minutes while posting a shot conversion rate of 30.8% and a shooting accuracy rate of 66.7%.

Also nominated was Hartford Athletic's Kyle Edwards, who recorded three goals and one assist across five appearances, including a goal and assist in Hartford Athletic's first victory against Rhode Island FC, and averaged a goal every 63.3 minutes while posting a shooting accuracy rate of 71.4%.

The other nominee was El Paso Locomotive FC's Gabriel Torres, who recorded two goals and two assists in five appearances as El Paso Locomotive compiled an undefeated month, ranking third in the league with 14 chances created while posting a 57.1 shooting accuracy rate on nine shots overall.

On Sept. 11, the USL Championship announced that Louisville City FC midfielder Wilson was voted the USL Championship Player of the Month. ★
