World's Largest Prize Pool Offered at National Pumpkin Weigh Off

WHEATLAND, CA (MPG) - Established in 1921, the National Pumpkin Weigh Off is returning for the third year to Bishop's Pumpkin Farm in Wheatland, approximately 20 miles north of Roseville. The all-day event is scheduled for Saturday, Sept. 27, with judging to begin at 11 a.m. The event now offers the world's largest prize pool - over \$63,000.

New this year, the event's largest pumpkin is guaranteed \$7,500, doubled to \$15,000 if over 2,000 lbs., and multiplied 5x to \$37,500 if it breaks the World Record. Also new this year is a \$1,000 bonus for the biggest California grown pumpkin this season and a \$2,500 bonus for a California Record breaker. In all, the top 20 pumpkins will win cash prizes. Growers from across the United States and Canada are expected to participate.

Last year's winner was Jim Sherwood of Mulino, Oregon, weighing-in at 2,453 and taking home \$22,077. Currently the World Record pumpkin is 2,749 lbs. held by Travis Gienger of Minnesota. In addition to giant pumpkins, seven additional categories will be judged and awarded cash prizes, including bushel gourd, long gourd, tomato, marrow, sunflower, watermelon and field pumpkin.

County Plans to Expand Mobile Crisis Services

MARYSVILLE, CA (MPG) - In its formal response to the 2024-2025 Grand Jury Report, the Yuba County Board of Supervisors on Sept. 9 acknowledged the need for expanded mental health crisis services and committed to a series of action plans aimed at improving mobile crisis response, law enforcement coordination and behavioral health training.

The Grand Jury's report, titled "Is Mental Illness a Crime? Law Enforcement and Behavioral Health Response in Yuba County," which was released earlier this summer, found the county lacked a fully operational mobile crisis team available 24/7 to respond to mental health emergencies outside of business hours.

The board's response, prepared by County Administrator Kevin Mallen and signed by Chair Gary Bradford, agreed with the findings and committed several specific actions.

The board stated Yuba County Behavioral Health will explore funding options to expand mobile crisis coverage beyond standard business hours. The board also pledged to improve coordination between departments, noting that Yuba County Behavioral Health will work with law enforcement agencies to develop joint response protocols. These protocols are intended to reduce reliance on law enforcement as the primary responder to mental health calls and ensure that individuals in crisis receive appropriate clinical support, officials said.

Additionally, the board committed to increasing training for law enforcement personnel. According to the response, additional Crisis Intervention Training sessions will be scheduled for sheriff's deputies and dispatch personnel in 2026, after the grand jury emphasized that without adequate mobile crisis coverage, individuals experiencing mental health emergencies may be unnecessarily detained or criminalized. The board acknowledged this concern and stated that it would prioritize behavioral health response in future budget planning. While the board did not commit to a fully staffed 24/7 mobile crisis unit, it expressed willingness to expand services contingent on available funding and staffing resources.

Marysville Stampede Cattle Drive — A New Perspective

MARYSVILLE, CA (MPG) - If you closed your eyes, it almost sounded like a campfire — the crackling snaps, the rhythmic clops, sharp whistles and distant whoops and hollers. That’s what a herd of horses and cattle sound like coming over the Twin Cities Memorial Bridge.

I’ve covered this event for several years now, and it’s always a joy to anticipate. The Marysville Stampede Cattle Drive marks the start of fall in Yuba-Sutter County, and the weather certainly didn’t disappoint. The mild heat fluctuated slightly as the sun dipped in and out from behind a heavy gray sheet of clouds, teasing the promise of a beautiful sunset.

As much as I love the tradition, it can be a challenge to keep the story fresh. For decades, the Flying U Rodeo has corralled its herd through the downtown streets of both Yuba City and Marysville, uniting the community in one of California’s oldest spectacles. The annual drive signals the arrival of rodeo season and excites newcomers and longtime fans alike. But as a journalist, I can only repeat the history so many times, and the photos — well, they’re a dime a dozen. So, what’s a journalist to do? Find a new perspective.

This year, I decided to do just that — both literally and figuratively. In the past, I’ve only seen the drive from the Yuba City side. This time, I ventured to the Marysville end, climbing the Twin Cities Memorial Bridge for the first time. Though I’ve driven over it thousands of times, I’d never walked it. From there I spotted a path leading up to the railroad overpass. Eureka!

After a quick inspection, I settled myself at the center of the bridge, framed by a diamond-shaped brick port-hole — the perfect window to capture the action. As I waited, the golden hour cast a misty

glow over the Sutter Buttes, while Marysville proper basked in warm evening light. Looking toward Yuba City, the glare was

blinding at times, so I snapped on a UV filter, adjusted my ISO, and hoped for the best. Shooting into the sun is never easy.

The flashing lights of the police escort announced the herd’s arrival. A tight line of horsewomen led the way, while Reno

Rosser directed riders to close in the gaps and keep the herd contained. Perhaps it was my vantage point, but the herd seemed smaller this year — a sentiment echoed by nearby onlookers, who, encouraged by my daring perch, had joined me on the precarious trestle. Another bystander later remarked that down on the streets, the riders had surrounded the cattle so closely you could hardly see them.

After the cattle passed beneath the bridge, they were followed by a wave of excited shouting from 4-H and FFA kids, along with floats from regional businesses and schools. It was the loudest and most energized I’d ever seen these groups, their cheers and laughter adding a whole new layer of celebration to the drive.

As the procession moved on, I hurried back to my car to catch the finale at Cotton Rosser Arena. Traffic slowed me, but I arrived just in time to see Reno Rosser congratulating his team on what he called the safest cattle drive on record.

In modern times, the cattle drive is more of a novelty than a necessity. Last year it was canceled altogether, as the hotel Marysville fire left traffic routes obstructed. In 2023, a handful of cattle broke loose from the herd, sparking a brief chase through downtown Yuba City. The animals were quickly corralled, but the incident was one Reno and his team took seriously.

“We didn’t lose a single steer today — it was a job well done,” Reno said. “I had told my wife I wasn’t sure. If we lost anything, or if someone got hurt, we were going to be done. But this was truly a success.”

That sense of relief and accomplishment carried through the crowd as the sun finally broke free of the clouds, drenching the arena in a glowing pink hue — the perfect ending to a community tradition that still manages to inspire and surprise me, even after all these years. ★

Marysville City Hall Gets First Paint Job in Decades

MARYSVILLE, CA (MPG) - Marysville City Hall has received its first paint job in perhaps forever, giving the 86-year-old building a long-overdue facelift.

An interior renovation and exterior refresh had been on the city’s to-do list for at least five years, but budget and time constraints delayed progress until now.

“In order to be taken seriously in business, you have to have an attractive place to do business,” City

Council Member Stuart Gilchrist said. “I couldn’t be more thrilled to see this finally happening.”

Gilchrist, a professional interior designer and architect, donated his expertise to the project by sketching and curating the exterior color palette. He said his choices came easily, drawing inspiration from original hues in the building’s terrazzo floors and ceilings.

After reviewing several bids, the council accepted an offer they couldn’t refuse from Nor-Cal Siders who generously offered

to donate both labor and materials to the project. Their contribution saved the city approximately \$122,000 in general funds. Owner Armando Chavez said his business has been blessed with opportunities in Marysville and he simply wanted to give back.

Exterior work began Sept. 5 and has since been completed, transforming the building with a crisp white base and earthy accent tones. Interior renovations are still underway, focusing on upgrades to air conditioning and bathrooms. ★

Record-Breaking Marysville Stampede Celebrates Competition, Community and Queens

MARYSVILLE, CA (MPG) - The Marysville Stampede marked its biggest year on record in attendance as fans gathered round the arena for two days of high-stakes rodeo action and family fun. Competitors from across the region vied for cash prizes and a chance to qualify for the California Circuit Finals Rodeo, a stepping stone to the National Finals Rodeo in Las Vegas.

In addition to thrilling competition, the Stampede Committee raised approximately \$14,000 to support local women battling breast cancer, with the Sunday performance dedicated to "Tough Enough to Wear Pink Day" in honor of survivors and supporters.

The arena was alive with talent as Brushton Minton of Twiter Springs earned the title of all-around cowboy, collecting \$1,831 in tie-down and team roping. Local standout Jacek Frost of Browns Valley, currently ranked No. 10 in the world for bareback riding, thrilled the crowd with a winning 84-point ride on Flying U Rodeo's Lil Bit. James Mann of Tehachapi won the steer wrestling title in 5.7 seconds, while team roping ended in a tie between Lane Lowry of Orcutt and Lane Karney of Creston, and the duo of Spencer Mitchell of Orange Cove and Minton, all finishing at 5.9 seconds.

Ryder Sanford of Sulphur, Louisiana, captured the saddle bronc riding title with 79 points on Rosser Rodeo's Sky Blast. Tie-down roping went to Roan Hudson of Carbon, Texas, who edged

out the competition in 9.6 seconds. In barrel racing, Maren Powers of Sebastopol claimed first place with a run of 16.22 seconds. The bull riding crown was split between Colby Strickland of Salinas, California, aboard Sabotage, and Tyler Taylor of Stephenville, Texas, on

Code Black, both scoring 83 points. In total, the rodeo awarded \$49,132 in prize money, with Rosser Rodeo and Flying U Rodeo providing the stock.

The weekend also celebrated the crowning of the 2025 Stampede queens. Sydney Sampson was named Miss Marysville

Stampede, while Jennifer Broton earned the title of Jr. Miss Marysville Stampede. Local youth joined in the festivities through the Stampede Coloring Contest, which highlighted the creativity of young artists. Winners included Cora Valentine, age 6, and Alyssa Remund, age 10, both of Yuba City, along with 14-year-old Abba Baker of Olivehurst. From the roar of the

crowd during bull riding to the crowning of queens and the thunder of both hooves and dirtbikes - the 91st annual Marysville Stampede blended world-class rodeo action with small-town celebration.

Organizers and attendees alike noted that this year's event carried unmatched energy, reaffirming the Marysville Stampede's place as one of Northern California's most cherished traditions. ★

Council Approves Memorial Benches

MARYSVILLE, CA (MPG) - At the Sept. 2 meeting of the Marysville City Council, new Public Works Director Jeramy Chapdelaine said a proposal was submitted for memorial benches in honor of Officer Osmar Rodarte, who lost his life in the line of duty on March 26.

The memorial bench project was submitted by Willaim Curry, a member of Trail Life Troop CA-19, which is a Christian youth group for boys.

Curry said, "When Officer Rodarte died, I was deeply impacted by the sacrifice he made." Trail Life

requires a community service project, and Curry decided to honor Rodarte with three memorial benches—two at Marysville Police Department and one at Veterans Park.

Yuba County Office of Education is building one bench, and the other two will be built by Sutter Union High School. Marysville Kiwanis is handling donations, and members of Trail Life will handle the installation.

The bench design is from a company in Utah, Smith Steelworks, which agreed to sell Curry one-time limed use of the design. He selected the cobalt blue color

for the park bench and black for the police station benches to match their uniforms.

The inscription on the back of the benches will read, "In memory of Officer Osmar Rodarte. Marysville Police Department. End of watch March 26, 2025. A hero is never forgotten."

Mayor Chris Branscum said, "What a great undertaking." The council voted unanimously to approve the project, followed by a round of applause from the council and those in attendance—including Officer Rodarte's family.

The next meeting of the Marysville City Council is scheduled for Sept. 16. ★

County Plans to Expand Mobile Crisis Services

continue to explore funding options to expand mobile crisis coverage beyond standard business hours,” the response states.

The 2024/25 grand jury report also addressed several other areas of county operations, including significant issues within the county’s 10 community cemetery districts, citing deteriorating conditions, fragmented governance and incomplete or poorly stored burial records - some kept in barns or private homes. The report also noted a lack of public awareness regarding the tax-funded nature of these districts and recommended forming an ad hoc committee to improve coordination, transparency and record management.

The grand jury recommended improved communication between agencies, formal agreements for recordkeeping, public outreach and stronger recruitment efforts. In response, the board acknowledged that CCDs operate independently and are not under its jurisdiction. For most recommendations, including those related to resolutions, interagency communication, data management, public visibility and

service enhancements, the Board stated that further analysis is needed. To that end, the board, at its Sept. 9 meeting, approved the formation of an ad hoc committee composed of Bradford, Supervisor Andy Vasquez Jr. and Auditor-Controller Richard Eberle to lead reform efforts and strengthen accountability across the cemetery districts.

Two recommendations were accepted. The Board confirmed that CCDs already have access to statewide resources and that county staff are available to assist with administrative questions. The board also committed to improving recruitment by posting announcements and information on a dedicated CCD webpage.

One recommendation, regarding the adoption of a new Sphere of Influence resolution, was rejected, as that authority lies with Local Agency Formation Commission (LAFCO) - not the Yuba County Board of Supervisors, the response states.

Overall, the Board expressed a willingness to collaborate within legal boundaries, while reaffirming the autonomy of CCDs and the importance of further study before implementing changes. ★



Napa Vineyards Helped Douse Pickett Fire

Napa Valley winegrape growers are no strangers to wildfires, which have ruined crops in the region three times in the past decade. The Pickett Fire, which started Aug. 21 in Calistoga and burned about 6,800 acres, caused an estimated \$65 million in agricultural losses, including damage to about 3% of Napa Valley’s vineyard acreage. For some growers, the losses were significant, but they said the outcome could have been far worse. The fire was contained in a corner of the valley thanks in part to a yearslong effort by the wine industry to better prepare for wildfires. During the past few years, groups representing vintners and grape growers donated money to build access roads and containment lines, and farmers coordinated with Cal Fire to map agricultural infrastructure such as reservoirs that could be used to fight wildfires. “It came into play on this fire,” said JC Greenberg, deputy chief for Cal Fire and the Napa County Fire Department. “We were ahead of the game.”

Some Forage Farmers not Subject to State Program Regulating Farm Runoff

Because farmers who grow forage and pasture in northeastern California rarely apply nitrogen fertilizers or pesticides, water-quality regulators for the region voted last month to exempt agricultural operations from a state program that regulates farm runoff. The decision by the Central Valley Regional Water Quality Control Board affects 75,000 acres in Northern California’s Pit River sub-watershed and comes after research from the University of California found that irrigated pasture and hay operations pose minimal risk to water quality. “This has been a long time coming,” said Kari Fisher, senior counsel and director of legal advocacy for the California Farm Bureau. State law requires growers who irrigate land to produce crops and pasture to enroll in the Irrigated Lands Regulatory Program, which was established to prevent agricultural runoff

from negatively impacting surface and groundwater. Pasture and forage crops account for most of the irrigated land in the Pit River subwatershed.

Tomato Yields Up as Canneries Try to Reduce Inventory

Thanks to adequate water supplies and mild conditions throughout the growing season, California farmers may end up with a lot more tomatoes than canneries need. “It’s a very excellent problem to have,” Mike Montna, president and CEO of the California Tomato Growers Association, said of what’s been described as a bountiful and quality tomato crop. The larger-than-expected crop means some of the fruit may go unpicked if the weather remains dry and harvest goes as planned. Colusa County grower Mitchell Yerxa said tomatoes aren’t the only crops seeing upticks in yield. He noted his other row crops—including vine seed, cucumbers, watermelon and sunflowers—also have benefited from the weather this year. “We’re all very pleasantly surprised at how good the yields have been,” Yerxa said.

California Farm Bureau Working Group to Address Predator Issue

A surge of livestock kills, attacks and other conflicts caused by the state’s growing predator population has prompted the state’s largest agricultural organization to form a predator working group. The California Farm Bureau group will work in conjunction with law enforcement and other advocacy groups to examine the state’s predator issue, with a current focus on wolves. It will also address conflicts caused by other predators, including mountain lions and bears. Since March, there have been more than 60 confirmed and probable cases of cattle killed by wolves in the Sierra Valley region of Plumas and Sierra counties. The apex predators remain fully protected as endangered under state and federal law, which means ranchers are prohibited from doing anything that could kill, harm or harass the species without facing criminal or civil penalties. ★

Gallagher Champions Flood Protection Fix for Marysville and South Sutter

Bipartisan bill prevents costly delays to housing and infrastructure in flood-prone areas

Assembly Republican Leader James Gallagher Office News Release

SACRAMENTO, CA (MPG) - Last week on the Assembly Floor, Assembly Republican Leader James Gallagher (R-East Nicolaus) presented SB 639, a bill by Senator Angelique Ashby (D-Sacramento) that extends the deadline for key flood protection projects in Sacramento, Sutter and Yuba counties, including the city of Marysville.

Without this extension, local jurisdictions would have been forced to stop approving housing and infrastructure projects beginning in 2025. That would have happened despite major flood control

upgrades already underway. SB 639 moves the deadline to 2030 and allows communities to keep building while final safety improvements are completed.

“We have made substantial progress on flood control in our region,” said Gallagher. “We cannot allow that to go unrecognized and stop vital housing and infrastructure projects. That is why I am proud to help get this bill across the finish line.”

Projects that could have faced delays include the Marysville Ring Levee, the ARCF Natomas Basin and multiple housing developments, including the Sutter Pointe Project.

SB 639 passed the Assembly with unanimous support and now heads to the Senate for a final vote. ★

"Shrinkflation"

I read an article about what the author called "Shrinkflation." I had heard that word before but always referred to the idea of shrinkflation as "packaging inflation".

Packaging inflation, or Shrinkflation, if you want to use that word, refers to companies dealing with higher production costs by reducing the amount of whatever it is that is sold instead of increasing the price.

If you ever see, and we all have, "new" size stamped all over the label, or words such as "family size", "larger size", "party pack" or "value size", you are seeing the precursor to Shrinkflation.

What companies do is introduce these larger sizes, and charge more for them. Then, over time, they slowly reduce the amount (be it weight, volume or liquid measure), until they get back to the original size, or close to it, all the while the price remains.

The weight of the Hershey's bar in the 1950's was about four ounces. A honker of a bar. This was its standard off the candy shelf size. Today it weighs about 1.5 ounces.

To top it off, the price of the four-ounce chocolate bar was a nickel. Today's reduced version costs on average \$1.30.

Do the math, and today's bar has had a 6,610% increase since the 1950's.

Yikes!

Beside the bait and switch method of size manipulation to get you used to a higher price thinking you get more, then slowly shrinking the amount you get over time while keeping the price elevated, packaging inflation is a bit faster in accomplishing the task but just as stealthy.

Millions are spent in research to make the necessary changes to packages to avoid raising prices and instead just give less of something.

Shaping bottles with a "waistline" or conical bottoms skinnies up the volumes. Making cereal boxes the same dimension in front but reducing the width makes them appear the same size but with less.

Gum sleeves may have a "blank" spot where a piece of gum used to be. You don't see the blank until after you've bought it and opened it up.

Ice cream tubs may still look like a gallon tub but are miniature same shape versions.

Beer companies added water and sold it as "light" beer. Potato chip companies fill the bags with air so you can't tell the amount. Ice cream, butter and cream cheese companies came up with the "whipped" version which contains more air. And air is free and takes up space to boot.

Coffee is packaged in 12 ounce bags instead of the usual pound it used to be sold by.

Like I said, companies are shelling out millions to marketers to come up with new ways to save money while trying to put one past you.

Or better said, to put "less" past you.

Less product that is.

And we can't really blame them. They don't want you to get mad and stop buying their products. And they don't want to raise prices. So they just give you less. And they find ways to give you less without making it too obvious.

All of this has given me a headache. So I better go buy a bottle of aspirin.

Or buy two bottles, as a bottle of aspirin ain't what it used to be.

Literally.

From This Tragedy, More Voices Must Rise

Silencing one voice cannot end the conversation. It must awaken a chorus of many

Charlie Kirk's death on September 10 was more than a personal tragedy; it struck at the very heart of free speech in America. For years, he had become a modern symbol of debate culture, a figure willing to put himself in front of hostile audiences and say, "Let's talk."

In a time when disagreement often leads to shouting, shaming, or silencing, Kirk chose dialogue — once so common it wasn't even considered special in America, but now it seems like a lost art.

Kirk built his career not by hiding from critics but by meeting them head-on. In person, not from the safety of an online echo chamber. On college campuses across the country, he welcomed tough questions from students who often opposed everything he represented. He listened, he argued, and he stood his ground with facts, critical thinking, and a depth of knowledge rare for any citizen, especially someone his age.

It was not about demanding agreement but about proving that open dialogue matters more than uniformity of thought. He even sat with California Governor Gavin Newsom; while the two disagreed on most issues, they still managed to show millions of viewers what respectful debate

could look like.

That choice to engage with opponents was no small act. In today's culture, it is easier to cancel, shame, or attack than to have a real conversation. Too many people treat disagreement as something to shut down and silence. Kirk refused to play that game. He believed the only way to sharpen your own argument was to test it against the strongest case from the other side. In that way, he upheld the older American tradition of free speech, where ideas meet head-on and the best argument stands.

His assassination is therefore not only the silencing of one

man, but also an assault on the heart and soul of America. When violence is used to end debate, free speech itself becomes the casualty. We cannot accept a future where the price of speaking out is fear for your life.

There is also a broader warning in this tragedy. Political violence doesn't stop with one person. Once it becomes acceptable to kill or threaten a voice because you disagree with it, the door opens to silence anyone.

Today it was Charlie Kirk. Tomorrow it could be an elected official, a professor, a journalist, a union organizer, or a student. Free speech is not a partisan value. It is the foundation of

democracy, and without it, every other right grows weaker.

Charlie Kirk forced people to think, respond, and defend their beliefs. He showed that disagreement doesn't have to lead to dehumanization. He showed that you can argue passionately and still see the humanity in the person you're debating.

Perhaps even more troubling than the cancer consuming the art of civil discourse is that Charlie Kirk's underlying message was essentially one of love and respect for our country, our fellow citizens, our values, our history, and our future generations.

There is a poignant video clip

circulating online of George Carlin, the sardonic comedian and social critic, who framed assassination this way:

"It's interesting to notice who it is we assassinate. You know who it is — it's always people who told us to live together in harmony and try to love one another. Jesus. Gandhi. Lincoln. John Kennedy. Bobby Kennedy. Martin Luther King. Medgar Evers. Malcolm X. John Lennon. They all said try to live together peacefully . . ."

Sadly, we've experienced too many of these tragic moments in American life. Kirk's assassination is yet another.

But like other moments in history, this tragedy can be a turning point. The best way to honor Kirk's legacy is to refuse silence. We must keep speaking, listening, and debating, even when it is uncomfortable. Fear cannot be allowed to dictate our voices. The future of free speech, and the restoration of respect and love for this nation and for our fellow countrymen, depends on it.

Charlie Kirk has become more known, and his sound clips have been heard more in the last few days than in his entire ministry/career. Kirk has been propelled by the assassin to a status in American culture that will never be forgotten. Instead of silencing Kirk he magnified Kirk's voice and message a hundred or more times. Kirk is now being remembered around the world.

Charlie Kirk used his voice. Every American is entitled to this freedom. His voice cost him his life.

Abraham Lincoln gave his life

reuniting our country and abolishing slavery. A cowardly assassin took Lincoln's life as he leisurely watched a play at Ford's Theatre in Washington, D.C. John F. Kennedy used his voice to excite the American people and to bring about a positive attitude in the country but was gunned down by an assassin from a hidden window in downtown Dallas, Texas. Martin Luther King, Jr. was a man with a great voice who stirred the hearts of millions of Americans and brought about liberating change for black Americans. An assassin who disagreed with King cowardly hid and took King's life with a bullet. Malcom X and Bobby Kennedy were orators for positive change in America but someone who disagreed with their views killed them.

The greatest voice of hope, love, change and forgiveness, who ever lived, was Jesus Christ. A cowardly crowd yelled for him to be executed.

These mentioned voices were not silenced by hideous crowds or hidden gunmen. Each of their voices have rung loudly and clearly. Their legacies have only grown bolder and stronger.

It is sad that Charlie Kirk's assassin did not go down to the rally, stand up like a man and challenge Kirk in a debate. He could have told Kirk what he thought about him and given Kirk a chance to respond. But no, he was a weak, spineless man filled with more hate than probably anyone in America at that given moment. It's one thing to have a hateful, negative thought, but it's another to allow hate to act itself out in such a way.

Violence is never the answer. Let's keep America free. Free to speak, free to debate, free to practice and express our religion. Let's have peaceful and strong conversation, not assassination. ★

accountability. We cannot allow violence to take root as a tool of political expression in America.

"In moments like these, we must rise above partisanship and reaffirm a simple truth: violence against anyone — Republican or Democrat, liberal or conservative — has no place in our society. No person or political party is immune to this disturbing and growing trend. Above all else, we are Americans.

"My thoughts and prayers are with Mr. Kirk's family, loved ones, and all those impacted by this heinous act of violence." ★

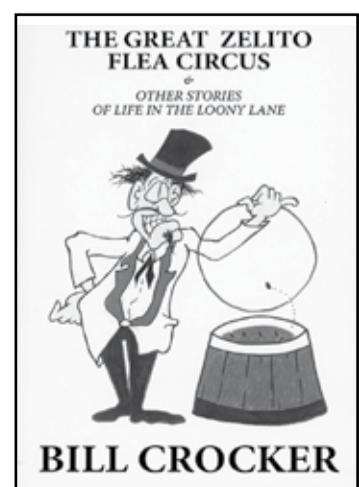
Voting Affliction

Sutter Wins Statement Game Over Bradshaw Christian

SACRAMENTO, CA (YSBC) - The Sutter Union Huskies football made an impactful statement to the rest of the CIF Sac-Joaquin Section on Friday, Sept. 12 as they knocked off the Bradshaw Christian Pride in a 42-21 victory.

If you like physical toughness, this game displayed enough for a million lifetimes as both squads beat one another up throughout the game.

Sutter dominated and controlled the first quarter as junior running back Losi Asiata put on a rushing clinic after he found the end zone twice with rushes of 30 and three yards for the scores.

Asiata finished with 211 yards on the ground off 17 carries, had four rushing touchdowns and had four, had eight rushes for 10 plus yards, including four for 20 or more.

Asiata expressed to Yuba Sutter Butte Colusa Sports that he simply doesn't want to get tackled, so he is going to do whatever it takes to keep driving the ball and staying off the ground.

"There's just something in my mentality that tells me to never get tackled and it drives me," Asiata said.

Sutter led 14-0 after the first and Bradshaw Christian answered back in the second quarter as Pride senior running back Devin Hatcher found the end zone for the first of his two trips in the end zone during the second quarter.

Hatcher and Asiata both had great rushing nights in the game and you felt the hairs stand up on your arms as they could break away from tackles at any point.

Bradshaw Christian recovered the ensuing inside kick near the Sutter 35 and Hatcher found the end zone for his second trip in the matter of a few plays.

The short-yard touchdown Hatcher scored on was set up by a 28-yard reception that was hauled in by Pride senior wide receiver Carson Fitzpatrick.

Sutter fired back as Asiata punched his way into the end zone for the third time of the half with two minutes remaining. BC had no urgency to move the ball with

The Pride tied the game at 21 after they converted a six-minute plus drive and senior wide receiver Bishop Porter rushed the ball three yards in for the score.

On the next Huskies drive, Sutter senior quarterback Braden Scritchfield threw his first interception at the varsity level and had accumulated more than 100 total pass attempts in that time.

Scritchfield told YSBC that the monkey was finally off his back and he can stop worrying about throwing an interception now.

He joked and added it won't become a habit. Scritchfield said that the win over BC was huge because they are a great team that has had a lot of success over the years and the Huskies didn't forget the game in 2024 where the Pride had a game-ending 98-yard drive to win a nail biter over Sutter.

Scritchfield completed five passes for 85 yards, a touchdown pass and he rushed the ball 10 times for 55 yards in the win.

BC senior linebacker Samuel Danilyuk intercepted the Scritchfield pass with five and a half minutes to go in the third and Huskies head coach Ryan Reynolds expressed to YSBC that's when the momentum shifted in the game.

Sutter's defense shut down Hatcher and the Pride offense and took over the last 16 minutes of the game where they forced three consecutive turnover-on-downs and cashed in three straight offensive drives for the win.

Defensively for the Huskies, junior linebacker Andrew Barker was all over the field on defense and special teams making tackles and was one of the multiple Sutter defenders making their mark on the night.

"He's (Barker) still learning the system as he came to us over the summer and he looked comfortable tonight," Reynolds said.

Barker led the Huskies with 14 total tackles in the win, including five tackles for a loss and a sack. Sutter had multiple two-way athletes make a splash in the game that included junior defensive end/tight end Troy Bowens and senior running back/linebacker Justice White.

Defensively, White and Bowens had 13 tackles each while they both found the end zone on the offensive side of the ball. White found the end zone on a three-yard rushing touchdown that extended the Huskies lead half way through the fourth.

After a third consecutive defensive stop, Scritchfield found Bowens for an 18-yard touchdown pass that put the game out of reach
