WEST SACRAMENTO, CA (MPG) - Serving more than 700,000 Californians, California American Water broke ground on a new headquarters based in West Sacramento on Sept. 9, consolidating three of their locations into one central area. Director of Engineering Lacey Carothers at California American Water, said that the facility embodies the future of the company's employees, as well as their customers. She

said the facility will allow for better coordination of personnel and resources, including acting as a central headquarters for Hawaii American Water.

"This new facility represents our long-term commitment to the Sacramento region and the City of West Sacramento," said Kevin Tilden, president of California American Water, "It's where we have our largest group of customers and employees, and where many of our key stakeholders are based, and where we're planning

our future together."

California American Water has 37 water systems in 60 communities, throughout 11 counties and the headquarters in San Diego has been running a skeleton crew. The West Sacramento headquarters at 700 Riverpoint Drive in West Sacramento is expected to be completed next year.

West Sacramento Mayor Martha Guerrero said that she was proud of the company's transition into West Sacramento. She said that the project

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Water Providers Warn Residents about Unauthorized Solicitations

SACRAMENTO REGION, CA (MPG) - Citrus Heights Water District, Sacramento Suburban Water District, Orange Vale Water Company and California American Water are warning residents about unauthorized solicitations targeting local households.

Reports have surfaced of individuals posing as water officials, knocking on doors and claiming your tap water might be unsafe. They offer unsolicited in-home water testing, which often leads to high-pressure sales tactics for costly and unnecessary water treatment equipment or services.

Incidents of this nature have been increasingly reported across Northern California, including in Elk Grove, Fairfield and Sacramento, where residents were pushed to purchase expensive water treatment systems following unsolicited testing claims.

Be assured: your water is safe. Drinking water served by Citrus Heights Water District, Sacramento Suburban Water District, Orange Vale Water Company and California American Water meet some of the strictest water quality standards. Water is regularly tested and follows federal and state regulations to ensure community health and safety.

Citrus Heights Water District, Sacramento Suburban Water District, Orange Vale Water Company and California American Water do not conduct in-home water testing. All necessary testing is done either at the treatment facilities, wells or through officially scheduled programs, not through door-to-door visits.

Your water provider's employees are always clearly identifiable. They wear official uniforms with agency logos, drive marked vehicles and carry agency-issued identification cards.

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COVID-19 on the Rise in Yolo County

YOLO COUNTY, CA (MPG) - Yolo County Health and Human Services Agency (HHS) is urging residents to take extra precautions as COVID-19 activity increases, particularly in West Sacramento.

Wastewater testing showed high levels of SARS-CoV-2, the virus that causes COVID-19, in Sacramento and West Sacramento earlier this month. Levels in Davis and Woodland are increasing but remain at the medium level. Emergency department visits for fever with cough or sore throat are also climbing, reflecting a broader summer COVID-19 wave across California.

Yolo County's Health Officer, Dr. Aimee Sisson, recommends that everybody over age two years old wear a mask around others in indoor public spaces when wastewater levels of SARS-CoV-2 are high. When wastewater levels are medium, Dr. Sisson recommends that individuals at high risk of

severe COVID-19 (older adults, people with underlying medical conditions or people with weakened immune systems) as well as people who come into frequent contact with high-risk individuals, wear masks indoors.

"California is experiencing a summer COVID wave," said Dr. Aimee Sisson, Yolo County Health Officer. "Based on current wastewater levels of the virus that causes COVID-19, I recommend that everybody in West Sacramento wear a mask when they are around others in indoor public spaces. I also recommend that people in the rest of Yolo County wear masks when they are around others indoors if they are 65 or older, have a weakened immune system, have an underlying medical condition that puts them at a greater risk of severe COVID-19, or spend time around people who fall into these categories."

Wearing a high-quality mask such as an N95, KN95 or KF94 that fits well continues to provide strong protection. Vaccination remains one of the most effective ways

to prevent severe disease and death from COVID-19. While the Food and Drug Administration (FDA) has approved an updated vaccine for the 2025-26 season, doses are not yet available; some providers may still offer the 2024-25 vaccine. Dr. Sisson continues to recommend that everybody six months and older get vaccinated against COVID-19 annually. However, COVID vaccine eligibility and insurance coverage are currently in flux as federal entities issue updated vaccine approvals and recommendations.

Wastewater in Yolo County is monitored for several different viruses by Wastewater SCAN at the City of Davis Wastewater Treatment Plant, the Woodland Water Pollution Control Facility and the Sacramento Regional Wastewater Treatment Plant. Check local wastewater data at www.WasteWaterScan.org.

Restored Locomotive on Display in Historic Roundhouse

SACRAMENTO REGION, CA (MPG) - In partnership with Friends of No. 9, the California State Railroad Museum is excited to announce the beautifully restored No. 9 steam locomotive and companion exhibit are now on display inside the museum's historic Roundhouse. No. 9 is the only surviving locomotive of the Mount Tamalpais Scenic Railway, a tourist railroad in the late 19th and early 20th centuries that enabled tourists to leave the city and enjoy the scenic beauty of Mount Tamalpais and, later, Muir Woods.

In addition to seeing No. 9 up close, museum visitors can learn more about the history of the Mount Tamalpais Scenic Railway and the prized locomotive by watching a special 8-minute video that is part of the exhibit.

The Mount Tamalpais Scenic Railway, built in 1896, was known as the "Crookedest Railroad in the World" based on its 8.2-mile route with 281

curves climbed from Mill Valley (70 ft) to the summit (2,353 ft). At the top, visitors enjoyed sweeping views of San Francisco and the Pacific as they danced and dined at the Tavern of Tamalpais. Despite its popularity, rising automobile travel, mounting debt and a 1929 wildfire ended operations by 1930.

The Heisler locomotive No. 9 dates to 1921 when it was purchased by the Mount Tamalpais and Muir Woods Railway of Mill Valley to operate on the rails of the scenic tourist railway. In 1924, the locomotive was sold and spent the next two and a half decades working for lumber companies in Siskiyou and Humboldt counties.

In 1953, the Pacific Lumber Company bought the locomotive for display next to its new museum in Scotia, California. The locomotive was later put up for auction in 2018 when a group of dedicated rail fans joined together to raise funds to secure No. 9 and begin restoration. The dedicated group was steadfast in their focus to return No. 9 to its Mt. Tamalpais roots and viewed it as the "last piece

of a lost era."

Carefully researched, the meticulous restoration work began in 2019 and will be completed in 2025. The historic locomotive remains an important piece of logging, tourist and rail history.

"The restoration of the No. 9 represents the very best impulses of the preservation community," said Dr. Ty Smith, Director of the California State Railroad Museum. "Although the locomotive won't steam passengers up Mt. Tamalpais, it serves as a window into a remarkable episode in California History. We're grateful to be able to share in telling this important story."

The prized No. 9 steam locomotive and companion exhibit will remain on display in the museum's Roundhouse until January 2026. Open daily from 10 a.m. to 5 p.m., regular admission to the California State Railroad Museum is \$12 for adults, \$6 for youth (ages 6 to 17), and are free for children five and under.

was a "wonderful development opportunity" and that the city's Home Run Program would supply the industry's future workforce.

President and CEO of the Sacramento Metropolitan Chamber of Commerce Robert Heidt said that the chamber is excited that West Sacramento was chosen as the location for California American Water's new headquarters.

"I think the mayor having that initiative and program we're working on, the next generation workforce, anytime that we can inspire them and get them into an industry at a level where they can start to understand the ins and outs, is only going to hopefully inspire them to see that as a career trajectory for them," Heidt said.

Project partners for the

California American Water project include Buzz Oates Construction, the City of West Sacramento, Johnson Plumbing and Bosley Electric. The facility's estimated size is projected to be around 40,000 square feet.

Buzz Oates CEO Larry Albaugh said that the construction site, located at 700 Riverpoint Drive in West Sacramento, had decades-old footing on a site poised for a different construction project, leading to the footing being demolished and removed. It takes a significant commitment to see projects through from start to finish, Albaugh said, and that they might not always become what was originally planned.

"This is a project for us that's been about 18 years in the making," Albaugh said. "So it takes some time and some stay-with-it-ness

to make something like this happen, so it takes an entire team."

Albaugh thanked the mayor for the City of West Sacramento's input, praising the city and chamber staff for being such great partners to work with on the project.

Tilden said that most of the California American Water's customers and employees are located in the Sacramento Region and that the new headquarters will better serve both of those populations. He said the company is looking to take advantage of cheap leasing and low purchase prices while those opportunities are available.

California American Water's West Sacramento headquarters is expected to be complete by fall 2026. More updates and information can be found at <https://amwater.com/caaw/News-Community/News>. ★

of West Sacramento and I am proud to host this year's cleanup along the waterfront where I played as a kid and enjoyed as an adult," said county Supervisor Villegas. "Coast and Creek Cleanup Day highlights the power of community partnerships from the California Coastal Commission to our local volunteers, all working together to protect and preserve our waterways. I encourage residents to join us in making a difference close to home."

Sacramento-Area New Home Sales Moving Upward

North State Building Industry Association News Release

SACRAMENTO REGION, CA (MPG) - New home sales in the Sacramento region continued moving upwards in August, with 496 sales reported by members of the North State Building Industry Association – the highest total since February.

Tim Murphy, the BIA's President and CEO, attributed the strong showing to a combination of slightly lower interest rates and the valuable

incentives being offered by many builders.

"Mortgage interest rates continue to slowly move downward and are now at their lowest point since last October," Murphy said. "As Robert Dietz, the chief economist of the National Association of Home Builders, told our members last week, as prospective buyers see rates get close to 6%, we're likely to see a significant increase in sales. As rates have inched below 6.5%, we may be seeing that trend already getting underway."

"In addition, many builders are continuing to offer a range of incentives designed to make buying a home more affordable, and those deals are clearly making a difference as well," Murphy said.

August's sales totals were well above the historical monthly average of 409 sales during the month and up 3% from July. However, due to July being a five-week month, basic sales were up nearly 30% from the prior month on a weekly basis. Sales were down 18% from August 2024, but because that also was a

five-week month, weekly sales year-over-year were almost even.

Rancho Cordova led all area submarkets with 91 sales, followed by Roseville with 87, Elk Grove with 74, Sacramento with 64, and Natomas with 40. Rounding out the top 10 were Plumas Lake (31), Lincoln (30), El Dorado Hills (29), Granite Bay (9) and Galt (8). For more statistical information, see charts below.

BIA statistics covered 198 new home communities reported by members in Amador, El Dorado, Nevada,

Placer, Sacramento, Sutter, Yolo and Yuba counties.

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From This Tragedy, More Voices Must Rise

Silencing one voice cannot end the conversation. It must awaken a chorus of many

Charlie Kirk's death on September 10 was more than a personal tragedy; it struck at the very heart of free speech in America. For years, he had become a modern symbol of debate culture, a figure willing to put himself in front of hostile audiences and say, "Let's talk."

In a time when disagreement often leads to shouting, shaming, or silencing, Kirk chose dialogue — once so common it wasn't even considered special in America, but now it seems like a lost art.

Kirk built his career not by hiding from critics but by meeting them head-on. In person, not from the safety of an online echo chamber. On college campuses across the country, he welcomed tough questions from students who often opposed everything he represented. He listened, he argued, and he stood his ground with facts, critical thinking, and a depth of knowledge rare for any citizen, especially someone his age.

It was not about demanding agreement but about proving that open dialogue matters more than uniformity of thought. He even sat with California Governor Gavin Newsom; while the two disagreed on most issues, they still managed to show millions of viewers what respectful debate

could look like.

That choice to engage with opponents was no small act. In today's culture, it is easier to cancel, shame, or attack than to have a real conversation. Too many people treat disagreement as something to shut down and silence. Kirk refused to play that game. He believed the only way to sharpen your own argument was to test it against the strongest case from the other side. In that way, he upheld the older American tradition of free speech, where ideas meet head-on and the best argument stands.

His assassination is therefore not only the silencing of one

man, but also an assault on the heart and soul of America. When violence is used to end debate, free speech itself becomes the casualty. We cannot accept a future where the price of speaking out is fear for your life.

There is also a broader warning in this tragedy. Political violence doesn't stop with one person. Once it becomes acceptable to kill or threaten a voice because you disagree with it, the door opens to silence anyone.

Today it was Charlie Kirk. Tomorrow it could be an elected official, a professor, a journalist, a union organizer, or a student. Free speech is not a partisan value. It is the foundation of

democracy, and without it, every other right grows weaker.

Charlie Kirk forced people to think, respond, and defend their beliefs. He showed that disagreement doesn't have to lead to dehumanization. He showed that you can argue passionately and still see the humanity in the person you're debating.

Perhaps even more troubling than the cancer consuming the art of civil discourse is that Charlie Kirk's underlying message was essentially one of love and respect for our country, our fellow citizens, our values, our history, and our future generations.

There is a poignant video clip

circulating online of George Carlin, the sardonic comedian and social critic, who framed assassination this way:

"It's interesting to notice who it is we assassinate. You know who it is — it's always people who told us to live together in harmony and try to love one another. Jesus. Gandhi. Lincoln. John Kennedy. Bobby Kennedy. Martin Luther King. Medgar Evers. Malcolm X. John Lennon. They all said try to live together peacefully . . ."

Sadly, we've experienced too many of these tragic moments in American life. Kirk's assassination is yet another.

But like other moments in history, this tragedy can be a turning point. The best way to honor Kirk's legacy is to refuse silence. We must keep speaking, listening, and debating, even when it is uncomfortable. Fear cannot be allowed to dictate our voices. The future of free speech, and the restoration of respect and love for this nation and for our fellow countrymen, depends on it.

Malcom X and Bobby Kennedy were orators for positive change in America but someone who disagreed with their views killed them.

The greatest voice of hope, love, change and forgiveness, who ever lived, was Jesus Christ. A cowardly crowd yelled for him to be executed.

These mentioned voices were not silenced by hideous crowds or hidden gunmen. Each of their voices have rung loudly and clearly. Their legacies have only grown bolder and stronger.

It is sad that Charlie Kirk's assassin did not go down to the rally, stand up like a man and challenge Kirk in a debate. He could have told Kirk what he thought about him and given Kirk a chance to respond. But no, he was a weak, spineless man filled with more hate than probably anyone in America at that given moment. It's one thing to have a hateful, negative thought, but it's another to allow hate to act itself out in such a way.

Violence is never the answer. Let's keep America free. Free to speak, free to debate, free to practice and express our religion. Let's have peaceful and strong conversation, not assassination. ★

SACRAMENTO, CA (MPG) - USL (United Soccer League) Championship announced that Republic FC midfielder Rodrigo (RoRo) Lopez was nominated for USL Championship Player of the Month for August. Voting closed online at USLChampionship.com on Sept. 9. A fan vote comprises 51% of the poll and the remainder was conducted by the USL Technical Committee and National Media Panel.

Lopez finished August tied for the league lead with five goal contributions (two goals, three assists), adding his name to the score-sheet in each of his four appearances in August. On Aug. 2, he helped Sacramento claim its first road win over San Antonio FC with an assist on Cristian Perano's stoppage time goal. The following week, Lopez netted his 40th career regular season goal with the game-winner over Monterey Bay FC.

Lopez hit another career milestone against NorCal rival Oakland Roots on Aug. 16 with a goal and an assist, making him just the fourth player in league history to record at least 40 goals and 50 assists in the regular season. Lopez closed out the month with his fifth assist of the season on Aug. 30 as he set up Khorri Bennett's first goal in the team's 2-0 win over New Mexico United. ★

This is Lopez's first Player of the Month nomination since he claimed the award in August 2022. He is the third Republic FC player to be up for it this season, joining teammates Russell Cicerone and Danny Vitiello, who was voted July's top player.

There were three other August Player of the Month nominees, including the Louisville City FC's Jansen Wilson. Wilson recorded four goals and one assist across five contests as Louisville City went undefeated in the month, averaging a goal every 107.8 minutes while posting a shot conversion rate of 30.8% and a shooting accuracy rate of 66.7%.

Also nominated was Hartford Athletic's Kyle Edwards, who recorded three goals and one assist across five appearances, including a goal and assist in Hartford Athletic's first victory against Rhode Island FC, and averaged a goal every 63.3 minutes while posting a shooting accuracy rate of 71.4%.

The other nominee was El Paso Locomotive FC's Gabriel Torres, who recorded two goals and two assists in five appearances as El Paso Locomotive compiled an undefeated month, ranking third in the league with 14 chances created while posting a 57.1 shooting accuracy rate on nine shots overall.

On Sept. 11, the USL Championship announced that Louisville City FC midfielder Wilson was voted the USL Championship Player of the Month. ★
