YUBA CITY, CA (MPG) - More than a dozen cultures were represented at Gray Avenue Middle School's first Cultural Festival on Thursday, Sept. 18, drawing families, students and community members to campus for an evening of food, music and performances.

The event was organized by Assistant Principals Wallace Fullerton and Yesenia Leon, both in their second year at Gray Avenue. Fullerton helped curate booths and even served German currywurst in traditional lederhosen, while Leon was credited as the "workhorse" of the festival.

## Council Debates Potential Zoning Changes in General Plan

MARYSVILLE, CA (MPG) - The Sept. 16 meeting of the Marysville City Council began with a swearing-in ceremony for Lt. Nelson Magana, Sgt. Matthew Thompson, and Officer Clayton Cardoza. Mayor Chris Branscum and the council thanked them for choosing to serve with the Marysville Police Department.

Camille Benner, director of family services for Habitat for Humanity Yuba/Sutter, presented an update about the organization's upcoming Pine Street Project. Habitat for Humanity's new initiative, the Jimmy and Rosalyn Carter Rural Rally, focuses on bringing affordable homeownership opportunities to rural communities that are "often underserved and overlooked," said Benner.

During the week of Oct. 26-31, Habitat will bring a team of volunteers to completely renovate the home located at 426 Pine St. in Marysville. Applications for the home will be accepted in November, with Habitat hoping to focus on ownership by very low-income applicants, including retired veterans, seniors, or those who have experienced homelessness. The new owners will be announced in December.

But during the renovation week for the Pine St. property, volunteers will also be taking their skills throughout that neighborhood in a "Brush with Kindness" effort, said Benner. Homes along that street will be offered exterior painting, tree trimming, debris removal, and general beautification at no cost to the residents.

Benner said Habitat is not requesting any funding from the city, but they are looking for partnership and support. The council had already identified Pine Street as a priority area for revitalization, so they were happy to support the project.

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## Monthly Sidewalk Market Set in Sutter

SUTTER, CA (MPG) - The streets of downtown Sutter are filling with vendors and visitors again as the Sidewalk Farmers Market kicked off its fall season on Sept. 4, with additional dates scheduled for Oct. 2, Nov. 6 and Dec. 4.

Organizer Sarah Donighi said the market was created to bring people together, support local businesses along California Street and provide a place for crafters and growers to share their products.

"Natural and holistic is the vibe," she said.

The market includes about 30 vendors offering handmade goods, baked goods, in-season produce and fresh flowers. Attendees can also find dinner and snack options, a few food trucks, and a mobile bookstore. Local favorite The Farmhouse Bakery has joined the

lineup with breads and sweet items.

Vendor booths are available for \$25 for a 10-by-10-foot space. Donighi said the event

relies heavily on vendor fees and is looking for sponsors to help expand programming.

"We would like to bring in entertainment, but it is

difficult to float this by vendors alone," she said.

The deadline for students to register to participate is Jan. 23, 2026. The competition date is Jan. 31, 2026, at the Sutter Theater Center for the Arts with two sessions, one for each county. The Scholastic Art & Writing Awards are the nation's longest-running and most prestigious recognition program for creative teens in grades 7-12 (ages 13+). Last year, we received more entries in each category from more schools than ever before in our history with the program.

and the Yuba City farmers market. Several California Street businesses have supported the effort, including Sutter City Auto Body, Sutter Mini Mart, Taco Time, the Farmer's Wife, Mendoza Electric and Sutter Mechanic Shop.

Donighi said she hopes the event encourages residents to explore downtown and shop locally. The location allows visitors to browse booths while also stopping in at nearby shops and restaurants.

The event has drawn a mix of regular vendors and new participants. Offerings range from handcrafted jewelry and home décor to holistic products, jams, and candles. With fresh produce and flowers, the event also resembles a traditional farmers market, providing residents with access to local fruits and vegetables.

Community members walking through the market on opening day were also able to visit food trucks serving a variety of meals. The mobile bookstore added a unique stop, giving attendees a chance to browse titles outdoors.

While the market has quickly found community support, Donighi said the long-term goal is to continue building momentum and return in the spring. After the December date, the market will pause during the winter months, with plans to resume in May or June.

"We want to create something lasting that the community looks forward to," Donighi said. "This is about bringing people together and giving them a reason to spend time in downtown Sutter."

Leon added, "It was really a team effort. All the cultures that were represented at the festival, it's because we had a kid with that background and a family with that background. Many of the parents there selling food made their traditional dishes from scratch."

Booths showcased countries including Nepal, Peru, Japan, France, Germany, Mexico, Afghanistan, India, Panama and more. Families sampled food, enjoyed crafts such as piñata-making and face painting, and took part in hands-on cultural activities.

Cultural performances highlighted the evening, with entertainment ranging from Marysville's Patria Insurgentes dance troupe to a Punjabi dance by students from River Valley High School. The program also included a Tongan dance and a performance by the Gray Avenue school orchestra.

"Other than the wind, I feel like it's been pretty

# Bi-Monthly Night Market Launches in Yuba City

**YUBA CITY, CA (MPG)** - The streets of downtown Yuba City are glowing a little brighter this fall with the launch of a new bi-monthly night market. The community street festival — complete with local vendors, live music and family fun — kicked off Sept. 4 and will return on the first and third Thursdays of each month for at least the next year.

"We wanted to do more community events and now we will already have a spot to promote our future programs," said Joe Steele, an event organizer and lead behind Creative Thinkers, the nonprofit sponsoring the market. "The hardest thing about events is getting people to know about them and hopefully this will help"

Creative Thinkers, an arts-based nonprofit focused on youth education and community engagement, designed the market to be more accessible than a typical street fair. Booth spaces are available on a first-come, first-serve basis for just \$25, keeping costs low for local makers. The vendor lineup also keeps things fresh. Steele noted that while 30 vendors participated in the

inaugural Sept. 4 event, the follow-up on Sept. 18 featured 20 entirely different booths with just one repeat

Beyond shopping, the market doubles as a stage for local talent. Musicians can sign up for paid hourly performance slots across two stages by reaching out to Creative Thinkers through social media or at creativethinkers.art. Vendors can also sign up for booth space here under the dedicated "Downtown Market" tab at the top left-hand corner of the webpage.

Set along Center Street beneath the newly strung festoon lighting, the market is nestled among

popular businesses such as Fernando's California Kitchen, Sutter Buttes Brewing and Steele House Coffee. Attractions at the Sept. 18 event ranged from artisan soaps and handcrafted lotions to mini-pancake desserts, a SpongeBob-themed bounce house and even the chance to hold live falcons.

The next Yuba City Downtown Night Market is scheduled for Oct. 2, with more vendors, performers, and activities on the way. Organizers hope the event continues to grow into a staple of downtown life, where the community can gather, shop and celebrate under the lights. ★

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# Council Debates Potential Zoning Changes in General Plan

The council then revisited the city's updated General Plan 2050, which includes a Downtown Specific Plan, Zoning Code Update, Historic Design Guidelines, and Final Environmental Impact Report (EIR).

The updated General Plan, which will guide development in Marysville through 2050, was already approved in April, but due to a procedural error in posting official notice of the changes, the item had to be brought back to council to ensure legal compliance.

Contract Planner Kathy Pease said there was a benefit to bringing the item back, since it provided an opportunity to extend the Downtown Specific Plan boundary to include the properties south of 4th Street and east of A Street to the Marysville Ring Levee.

Additionally, several properties will be rezoned from General Commercial, Light Industrial, and Neighborhood Apartments to Mixed Use-Neighborhood, which will encourage commercial development as well as higher density housing opportunities. Clarifications were added to allow existing non-conforming uses in the Medical Arts District, but with specifications that new or expanded non-conforming uses would require a use permit.

Mayor Branscum questioned why Yuba Park, a city-owned property

located at East 10th Street and Yuba Street, was still zoned as Park/Open Space. He thought it was going to be rezoned to Commercial/Mixed-Use in order to streamline potential future development.

Consultant Matthew Gerken explained that there is language in the Downtown Specific Plan and the Final Environmental Impact Report that will streamline any future rezoning but leaving it as Park/Open Space for now would allow flexibility since any future use is still unknown.

Branscum said, "I thought there was a pretty clear discussion on making that property available for commercial or mixed-use immediately." While he acknowledged that there are no immediate plans for the property, he said, "You guys didn't get the message," so he wondered "what else is amiss" in the updated documents.

Councilmember Stuart Gilchrist said he recalled discussions that any rezoning of city-owned parks would be done later with community input "when we're ready to achieve that."

Councilmember Brad Hudson agreed that he thought those zoning changes would be made later when a development agreement was in place.

Vice Mayor Bruce Buttacavoli worried that changing it to Commercial/Mixed-Use now could preclude other types of development such as industrial or manufacturing:

"We have a lot more control over it if we leave it this way."

City Manager Jim Schaad said "catalyst sites" were identified as areas for future development, and many were parks and green space. He said the Environmental Impact Report is the largest hurdle for redevelopment, and with that already finalized, those properties could easily be rezoned as needed.

Mayor Branscum said he wanted to see those properties rezoned as soon as possible: "I want to see momentum in that direction."

Councilmember Hudson thanked the consultant team for their hard work on this project and made a motion to approve the General Plan updates as written.

Branscum suggested an amendment to that motion, agreeing to approve the General Plan updates now but adding a directive for staff to bring back the catalyst sites for rezoning consideration no later than November. With two competing motions, Councilmember Marjorie Rollins seconded Branscum's motion, stating, "It's always good to have additional information so we have a clear picture of what can be done in the future."

The mayor's motion passed 3-1, with Hudson dissenting and Gilchrist absent from the room during the vote.

The next meeting of the Marysville City Council is scheduled for Oct. 7. ★

### Value of California Agriculture Hit Record High Last Year

The value of California’s agricultural production hit a record high last year, according to data published last week by the California Department of Food and Agriculture. In 2024, farmers and ranchers in the Golden State produced \$61.2 billion worth of agricultural commodities, an increase of 3.6% from 2023. California led the nation in overall production value as well as in dairy and many types of fresh produce. The state’s top agricultural commodities, ranked by economic value, were dairy products followed by almonds, grapes, cattle and calves, lettuce, strawberries, pistachios, tomatoes, carrots and broilers.

### Harvest Begins for “Exceptional” California Walnut Crop

As California’s walnut harvest begins, market conditions remain strong after improving last year following multiple years when growers struggled with low crop prices. With inventory from last year’s crop nearly sold out, “the industry is well positioned to start shipping new harvest California walnuts immediately,” said Robert Verloop, executive director and CEO of the California Walnut Board and Commission. This year’s walnut crop is projected at 710,000 tons, an 18% increase from last year, even as the state’s bearing acreage declined from 370,000 last year to 365,000 this year, according to the U.S. Department of Agriculture. Favorable weather conditions helped produce a large crop of “exceptional” quality, Verloop said. “I think international markets will be

very pleased.”

### California Table Olive Growers Expect a Light Crop

California table olive growers are expected to harvest a smaller crop this year. The 2025 forecast is 44,000 tons, down 10% from last year’s crop of 48,634 tons, according to a survey conducted by the U.S. Department of Agriculture. Manzanillo olives make up the vast majority of California’s table olives, with Sevillano olives comprising less than 6% of the state’s crop. Some farmers grow other varieties in small quantities. The USDA report, which surveyed 242 growers, found that the sector struggles with many of the same challenges plaguing farmers of other crops: insufficient labor, increased input costs and weak markets.

### California Sheep Ranchers Help Solar Projects Reduce Fire Risks

Large-scale solar projects face an ongoing challenge in managing vegetation to reduce fire risks. In California, they’re getting help from a humble farm animal. “We’re the most environmentally friendly vegetation management tool out there,” Ryan Indart, a Fresno County farmer and sheep rancher, told Ag Alert® in a field report. This month, Indart’s sheep were wrapping up a busy season grazing utility-scale solar projects across the state before returning to their home ranch in Kerman. When they graze solar projects, “The sheep are sequestering carbon, reducing wildfire risk and making the soil ecology a lot more healthy,” he said. “They’re Mother Nature’s best firefighters.” ★

## Grants and Loans Fund Critical Water Projects

### Yuba Water Agency News Release

#### MARYSVILLE, CA (MPG)

- Yuba Water Agency’s board of directors has approved more than \$5.8 million through six grants and \$2.3 million in two loans to advance critical flood risk reduction and water supply reliability work in Yuba County.

Yuba Water approved \$1,350,000 for three flood risk reduction projects. A \$650,000 grant to the City of Wheatland will be used to develop a Stormwater Master Plan to study the area’s hydrology and existing infrastructure for conveying stormwater flows. The plan will also include a list of potential capital improvement projects focused on reducing flood risk and water quality impacts from urban runoff.

A \$400,000 grant to RD 817 will cover administrative costs and accrued interest for closing out the Bear River Setback Levee Project with the U.S. Army Corps of Engineers, a process that ensures federal levee standards are met.

Completed in November 2022, the project added 2,800 feet of setback levee and 7,800 feet of reinforcements to reduce erosion during high-flow events. The California Department of Water Resources funded 90 percent of the \$11 million project, with Yuba Water contributing \$1.1 million and a line of credit during construction.

A \$300,000 loan will increase an existing line of credit to support the Marysville Ring Levee, bringing Yuba Water’s total support to \$2.8 million. The funding will be used to explore if additional work

is needed for the project to meet California’s Urban Level of Protection requirement, which is essential for continued development in the city.

“In the decades between floods, humans are prone to short-term memory – they forget about the devastation floods cause,” said Yuba Water Board Director Wayne Bishop. “That’s all the more reason to invest in these flood projects now, to safeguard our communities before the next time the water rises.”

Yuba Water approved several grants and loans totaling more than \$6.7 million to support water supply reliability projects.

A grant for just over \$4 million and a \$2 million cash-flow loan will upgrade 12 flow control structures along the Cordua Main Canal with equipment that enables real-time measurements and remote operation. The upgrades will improve water use efficiency, reduce waste and support precise water delivery. The funds from Yuba Water will cover design and engineering and 50 percent of the total construction cost, with Cordua anticipated to cover the remaining 50 percent with federal grant funding. The upgrades are expected to be completed over the next several years.

A grant for approximately \$623,000 will support planning, design, environmental permitting and construction for improvements to the Campbell Gulch Diversion, Camptonville’s primary water intake serving 85 connections. The project protects critical drinking water infrastructure and ensures the district meets current

regulatory requirements. The district has already received a \$525,000 grant from the Department of Water Resources. Reconstruction of the diversion is expected to begin next month.

Two grants were awarded to North Yuba Water District.

A \$100,000 grant will support planning work on the Forbestown Ditch, a 10-mile canal that delivers irrigation and drinking water to the communities of Challenge, Brownsville, Rackerby and Forbestown. The funding will cover the first phase of a long-term project to modernize the ditch to reduce water loss, improve reliability and lay the groundwork for future improvements. North Yuba Water District will contribute approximately \$71,000 in remaining costs.

A second grant for just over \$41,000 will cover half of the cost to replace a programmable logic controller system at North Yuba Water District’s water treatment plant, a critical part that controls plant operations. North Yuba Water District will cover the other half.

“Many of these systems and canals are over 100 years old,” said Yuba Water Resources Manager Kyle Morgado. “These upgrades will help ensure they can operate for the next 100 years.”

Additionally, Yuba Water approved a \$10,000 sponsorship for the National Pumpkin Weigh Off at Bishop’s Pumpkin Farm, a local event supporting youth through 4-H and FFA programs.

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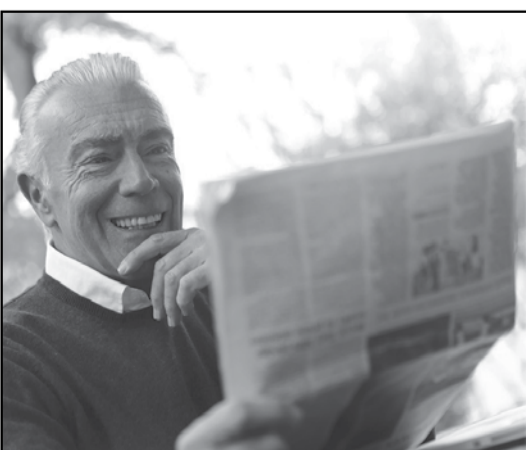

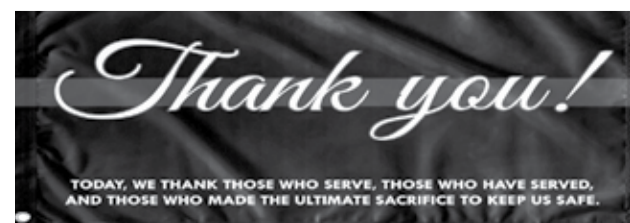

# Clean California Soars Past Major Milestone

## Beautifying Roadways and Rejuvenate Local Public Spaces

### Caltrans District 3 News Release

**SACRAMENTO, CA (MPG)** - More than 136,000 garbage trucks worth of litter has been cleared from state highways and communities in the four years of Governor Gavin Newsom's Clean California effort.

The Sept. 4 announcement comes after the Newsom convened a new statewide task force last week to prioritize and remove encampments and bring services and shelter to individuals experiencing homelessness along state rights-of-way in California's ten largest cities.

Emerging as one of the most successful environmental initiatives brought forward by Governor Newsom, the \$1.2 billion Clean California effort has provided a visible and lasting impact on communities throughout the state, while also supporting long-term goals aimed at climate resiliency, economic equity and public safety. Program highlights include the following.

Maintenance crews dedicated to cleaning state highways and public rights of way, 650 free dump days hosted in urban and rural communities, 639 pieces

of art installed on the highways, 72,000 community clean-up volunteers (according to a survey from Keep America Beautiful), 314 beautification projects, including the development of new parks, public art and improvements at several transit stations. Of these, 191 projects have been completed and 18,000 job opportunities created.

So far, 110 communities have pledged to become a designated Clean California Community by agreeing to complete specific criteria that demonstrate long-term commitments to zero litter, community beautification and environmental enhancement. Thirty communities have already achieved full designation status.

"Clean California has become an overwhelming success and a model our state can continue to build on. Yes, we've removed hundreds of thousands of garbage trucks worth of trash from our roads and highways, but it's more than that — we've invested in communities all across our state with public art projects and parks, creating thousands of jobs and lifting up countless neighborhoods in need," said Governor Gavin Newsom.

Caltrans District 3 completed the \$5.7 million State Route 99 Beautification and Safety Improvement Project in Sacramento. This transformative project improves and upgrades a 9-mile stretch of SR 99 between the Broadway Undercrossing

and the Stockton Boulevard Overcrossing.

Key project features include rehabilitation, illumination, and beautification of four pedestrian overcrossings, community-designed steel art panels installed on newly painted sound walls at five locations, new fencing, landscaping, slope paving and curbs to improve drainage and safety, beautiful mosaic tile art panels at on- and off-ramps, visible to pedestrians, cyclists and motorists and two large murals sponsored by Caltrans at 2nd Avenue and 21st Avenue, bringing vibrant color and community identity to the corridor.

The project was made possible thanks to partnerships with the City of Sacramento,

Vietnamese American Community of Sacramento, Oak Park Neighborhood Association, Sierra Curtis Park Neighborhood Association, Valley Hi Neighborhood Association/Mesa Grande Neighborhood Association and the Franklin Neighborhood Development Corporation.

Together, these partners turned a vision into reality in just over 19 months, delivering lasting safety improvements and a strong sense of community pride for Sacramento residents.

"This project shows the power of collaboration between Caltrans, the City of Sacramento, and neighborhood groups. By working together, we turned a gray corridor into a welcoming gateway filled with art, color, and community identity. These improvements not only enhance safety and drainage but also create spaces Sacramento residents can feel proud of every day," said Sergio Aceves, Caltrans District 3 Director.

## Burglary and Theft

### Sutter County Sheriff's Office News Release

**YUBA-SUTTER, CA (MPG)**

- Over the past several months, ET Quality RV on East Onstott Road in Yuba City has been the victim of multiple thefts involving RV power cords and other equipment. On Sept. 16, the business reported another trespass and theft of RV power cords.

Surveillance footage was reviewed by Sutter County Detectives, showing the same suspect seen in previous incidents entering the property, rummaging

through several trailers and searching for additional items to steal. In total, the suspect is believed to have stolen thousands of dollars' worth of electrical cables.

Through investigative efforts, Sutter County Sheriff's Detectives identified the suspect as 45-year-old Peter Pato, who is unsheltered. Detectives located Pato's camp in the river bottoms north of Eager Road and Live Oak Boulevard. Once contacted, Pato was found actively burning copper wire in preparation for sale.

During a search of Pato's camp, detectives recovered numerous extension cords that had been reported stolen in a prior theft case from the Church of Glad Tidings. The cords were returned to the church and detectives determined that the remaining cords stolen from ET Quality RV had been stripped and sold, prior to contact.

Pato was arrested and booked on numerous charges such as burglary and theft with priors, possession of narcotics and possession of drug paraphernalia. ★

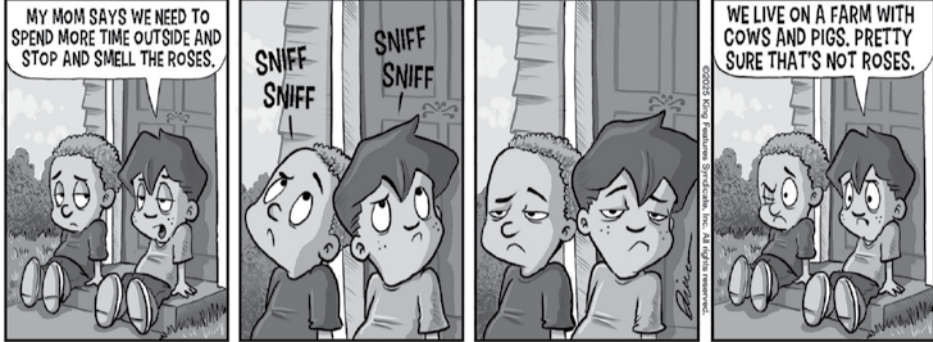

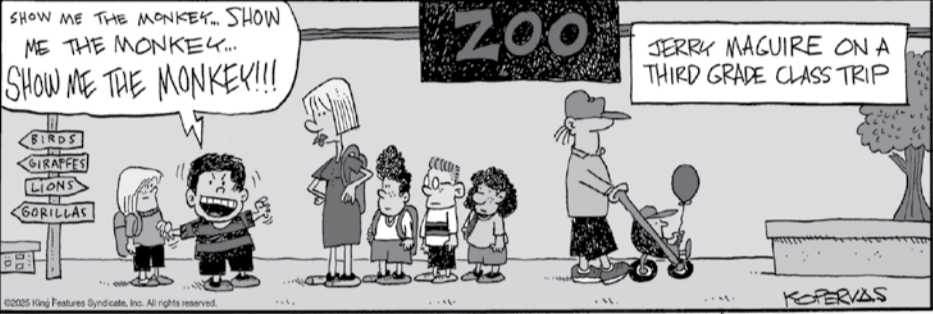

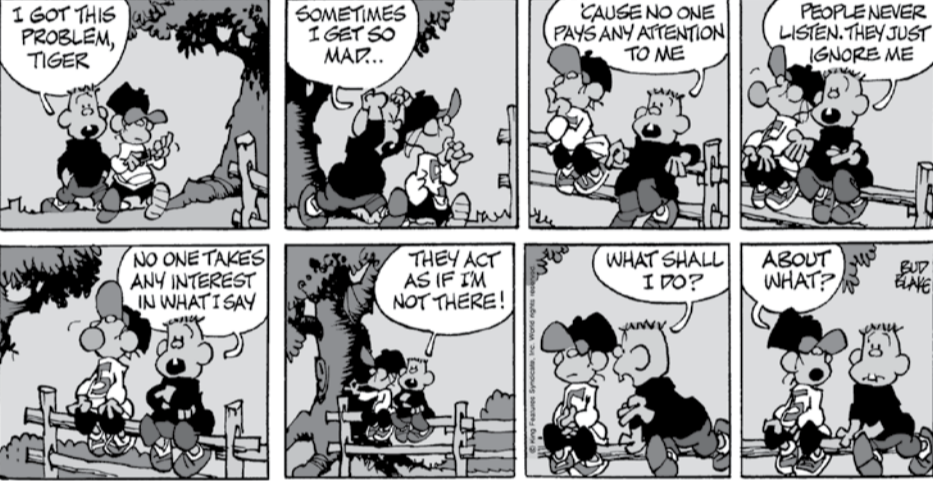

On River Valley's second drive, they attempted to punt, but the Honkers blocked the kick and the Falcons retained possession of the ball. On the next play from scrimmage, River Valley fumbled the ball for the first of three turnovers in the game.

Yuba City had the ball deep in the Falcons territory and Honkers senior

Walker and Kellas connected again for the two-point conversion that trimmed the Honkers lead to 20-14 with nine and a half minutes to go in the game.

Yuba City took control of the game after that as they ran the ball straight into the Falcons as Corum scored his final two

touchdowns of the game.

River Valley head coach Mikey Badalucio said they had the opportunity in the fourth quarter, but turnovers got in the way of victory.

He expressed that he told his team postgame that they are a young group and they competed great in the game and make their school proud.
