SACRAMENTO REGION, CA (MPG) - Going to the river to beat the heat is a summertime tradition for many Sacramento-area residents. Whether rafting, canoeing or swimming, local waterways attract crowds looking to have a fun way to cool off.

But losing a wallet, phone or any personal belonging to the river can quickly end the fun.

For Sacramento native Karl Bly, recovering those lost items has become a

mission that is part compassion, part hobby. He takes requests from individuals searching for belongings and posts daily online in hopes of reuniting items to the owners.

"It's such a fun addiction to find things out in the river, and then it just adds so much more when you continue to search and find the owners," Bly said. "It's a whole new level of adventure."

Bly's connection to the American River goes back to 1972, when his family

SACRAMENTO REGION, CA (MPG) - Mather Community Campus (MCC) is home to hundreds of adults, families and transitional aged youth in shelter and transitional housing who are experiencing homelessness. With a variety of programs and services designed to address barriers to exiting homelessness, the participants living at Mather Community Campus are offered the resources they need to knock down each barrier they face.

One of those barriers is employment.

Job readiness is more than just finding employment opportunities and submitting applications. Job readiness means looking good, feeling confident and understanding how to navigate the complicated nature of resumes, interviews and call-backs. Job readiness means being document ready, finding transportation and setting up an email address.

Look good, feel good. Haircuts, business attire, shoes that fit and clothes that are clean, taking a shower, brushing teeth and hair; these are tangibles that housed people, even those who are job hunting, take for granted.

Do you remember applying for your first job? You had no work history, no experience except maybe those neighbor kids you babysat that summer when you were 15, you weren't sure who was hiring teenagers, you didn't have a car; it made it a little bit more difficult, didn't it?

Now imagine being an adult, perhaps in your 40s or 50s, without a permanent address, living out of a backpack. You have no consistent access to a shower, to regular grooming opportunities, you have a massive gap in your work history, no reliable transportation, no access to a computer to build a resume or search for work ... feels impossible. Frankly, how can you worry about finding a job when you don't even know if you'll be safe while sleeping that night?

The stability and safety of living in a shelter affords residents the breathing space they need to thrive; access to a bathroom and shower, three meals a day, laundry service, a door that locks. Only after folks' basic needs are met can they truly focus on the next step, which is building income.

"People feel unprepared to re-enter the workforce

City Council Invests \$20 Million to Maintain and Improve City Infrastructure

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Fall Fine Art Show Awards Announced

RANCHO CORDOVA, CA (MPG) - The Fall Fine Art Show, which runs from Oct. 20 to Jan. 23, is open to the public at Rancho Cordova City Hall.

Cordova Community Council presented prizes for both adults and youth at the show's reception on Oct. 29.

"Best of Show" was the highest honor given, won by Sid Wellman for his painting "City Dog."

"I try to do something that's kind of whimsical, that's my style," Wellman said.

Wellman has been submitting his work since the conception of Art at City Hall, as well as showing at the Mills Station Art and Culture Center.

After high school, Wellman started a custom car shop, where he painted cars and built show vehicles, boats and race cars.

"Since the '90s I've been doing fine art and doing gallery showings," Wellman said.

According to Wellman, he used to try to follow the requests of buyers in works they commissioned from him. He would do the piece and later discover that the client had a different vision in mind.

Now, Wellman said, "Instead of trying to make somebody else happy, I'll make me happy . . . That way I'm always happy. Usually."

Susan Wickersham took first place for adults with a collage, "Oia in Santorini."

"I do all kinds of mediums but I like collage," Wickersham said. "It relaxes me, tearing and glueing paper."

Wickersham left a career in medicine to pursue fine arts, and when told by an instructor that there was no money in fine arts, she became a graphic artist.

"It was fun at work," Wickersham said, "but it wasn't creatively fulfilling for me because it was somebody else's project . . . When I retired, I

thought, now I can just do my own thing."

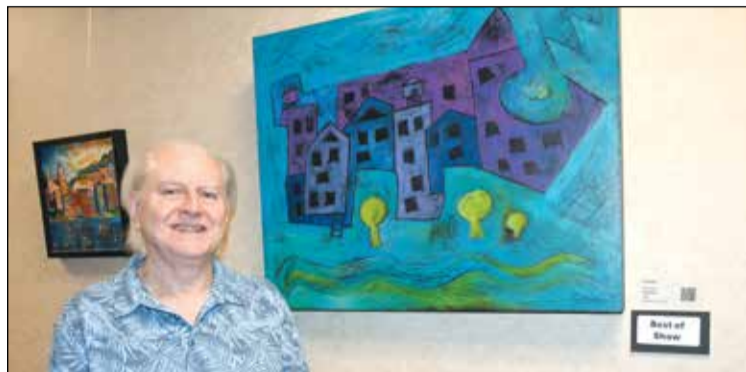
Second place was taken by Ron Hall's work, "Serenity in Bloom."

enjoy just the feeling of creating, that would be my tip."

"There are so many cameras out there now . . . There's a billion cameras or eight billion cameras in the world, probably. So how can you be unique?" Ommering said.

Ommering had a photo of a refinery of culinary oils in Woodland with an interesting arrangement of equipment. With various tools and photoshopping to modify and colorize, he came up with something that viewers seem to like.

"I have won three different competitions with that photo against all the photographers and a third place here and we're pretty pleased with that," Ommering said.

 moved to Carmichael. He was 5 years old, Bly said, when he started kayaking and snorkeling. "My dad would get our whole family out on the river," Bly said. "He would go scuba diving in the river looking for things and I would follow his air bubbles around in a canoe."

At 10, Bly found a pair of cut-off shorts with a wallet and a California Highway Patrol badge inside.

"I still remember his name, Blaine Pectol," Bly recalled.

Without social media, Bly relied on the yellow pages to track down the officer. After a few calls, Bly reached the right family.

"It was exciting for me to go through that whole process as a young kid and ultimately returning a wallet to a CHP officer made me feel I was an important part of the community," Bly said.

From then on, Bly said, he made it a point to return anything with a name attached that he found while diving. When Bly joined social media in 2010, it gave him a way to share his discoveries with friends and he gained a reputation for finding lost items in the river.

One day, friends alerted him to a lost kayak posted in a community group. The next morning, Bly said, he went out and located it in just 10 minutes. That moment became the turning point for launching the American River Lost & Found Facebook page in 2018.

The page has since grown to more than 36,000 followers, with members who actively help by sharing posts and commenting.

The most common finds, Bly said, are sunglasses with hundreds, if not thousands, each year. Phones are the most valuable frequent recovery, with 178 phones returned so far in 2025.

Bly has also retrieved unusual items, such as three prosthetic legs.

"Social media is just invaluable to get something like that returned," Bly said.

Some of Bly's finds are more whimsical. A recent request led Bly to recover a lost mermaid tail, which he successfully returned to its owner.

But other items that seem ordinary often hold deep personal meaning, a part of Bly's work that stands out to him.

He recalled returning a sticker-covered water bottle that had been lost for a year. Each sticker represented a trip that the owner and his girlfriend had taken together, starting with the one where he first told her he loved her.

"Every place they went all over the world, they put these stickers on it; it was kind of a history of their relationship," Bly said. "Little stories like that are so common. People thought their things were gone forever, things very meaningful to them and not worth much to anyone else."

Bly holds onto items that might take longer to claim but clothing left unclaimed after about a week is washed and donated.

Summer is Bly's busiest season, when he receives requests daily. In the winter, Bly explained, far fewer people are out on the

water, so there are fewer items to be lost. Most of his work is along the American River and Lake Natoma, where Bly has even had other local divers assist.

"It's just a fun hobby to go out and find things," Bly said. "And it's so much better when you can hand something back to somebody and have them in tears, 'Oh my God, I can't believe I got this back.'"

Outside of diving and kayaking, Bly manages rental properties, which gives him more free time after a more than 20-year career in various entrepreneurial ventures. In his later years, Bly joked, he has been "flexing his time," allowing him to dedicate more hours to the hobby.

For river-goers, Bly's top tip is simple: "Number one, if you're bringing something valuable in water, make sure it floats." He also recommends phone protectors, securing bags in kayaks or canoes and straps for prescription glasses.

Bly documents his days on the river with photos and videos, focusing on wholesome or funny interactions for his social media page.

But his work goes beyond returning lost items. He regularly picks up trash, helps stranded rafters and identifies safety hazards.

"Since I'm getting these messages daily during summer of where people are wiping out and losing their stuff, I also have kind of an overview of where the dangerous spots are," Bly said.

About two years ago, Bly noticed a pipe crossing the river that was causing wipeouts. He posted about it online, and after a local news outlet published a story, the pipe was removed.

"Found out it was a decommissioned pipe. A few months later, I got a message from the lawyers saying, 'We want to let you know that we will be removing that pipe because of your activism,'" Bly said.

At times, Bly's work can take a more serious turn.

"I spend so much time on the river, I wind up helping people in one way, shape or form or another almost every time I'm out there," Bly said. "I've been in those situations many, many times."

Bly noted that he and other divers have occasionally assisted in recovery efforts for drowning victims.

"We've actually attached buoys to drowning victims in the river so the Sac Metro Fire Department can come in, pull up the buoy to the rope and continue recovery," Bly said. "Since we know the river so well and know where all these little spots are, knowledge and skill come in handy sometimes when it's needed."

Despite the dangers, Bly keeps his page positive. Bly said his efforts have had a "radiating effect," inspiring others to hand him lost items or join in the search, creating a sense of comradery along the American River.

Risk Away Today

Did you know every 40 seconds someone has a stroke in the USA? That's like some 795,000 strokes each year? It's deadly and leaves many victims with significant health challenges. So, let's start with what IS a stroke. A stroke happens when something prevents your brain from getting enough blood flow. A blocked blood vessel or bleeding in the brain can cause strokes. And boy was I surprised when I learned the long list of symptoms. I thought I had a pretty good idea, but I was wrong. How about this list? Aphasia (trouble speaking in complete sentences), Blurry Vision or double vision, Confusion or Agitation, Coma, Dizziness or Vertigo, Loss of coordination or clumsiness, Memory Loss, Mood swings or personality changes, Nausea or vomiting, Neck stiffness, Passing out or fainting, Seizures, Slurred or garbled speaking, Sudden loss of your senses (including vision, hearing, smell, taste and touch), Weakness or paralysis on one side of the face or body. Whew! That should get your attention.

Now to recognize signs of a stroke. Remember to BE FAST!!! "B" is for Balance. Ask the person to stand. Look for trouble staying on their feet. "E" is for Eyes. Ask if they see double or if things are blurry or decrease in vision. "F" is for Face. Ask the person to smile. Look for a droop on one or both sides of the face. "A" is for Arm. Ask the person to raise their arms. Look for one arm to droop forward. "S" is for Speech. Listen for slurred speech or trouble choosing words. "T" is for Time. CALL 911 IMMEDIATELY!!! Look at the time so you can tell medical personnel when symptoms started.

I got all this good information from a site at the Cleveland Clinic which is great. Now I needed some facts on how to reduce stroke risk. So I asked Dr. Jeremy Liff on POPPTALK to give us some practical tips. He's a Board-certified neurologist specializing in stroke and brain aneurysms. Here's his top ten.

- 1. BLOOD PRESSURE.** Keep your blood pressure treated less than 140/80.
- 2. NOT NEW BUT IMPORTANT.** Stop smoking or vaping.
- 3. BLOOD SUGAR.** Keep your diabetes controlled. Screen for diabetes. Test your insulin sensitivity.
- 4. EAT HEALTHY.** Some examples are healthy fats and protein. It's the Mediterranean diet.
- 5. SUGAR.** Avoid sugar, seed/vegetable oils, and corn syrup.
- 6. AVOID ULTRAPROCESSED FOOD.** Something that can sit on a shelf for 100 years without changing isn't really food.
- 7. EXERCISE.** Start slow if you don't do anything currently. Walk, jog, elliptical (low impact), and light weights.
- 8. HEALTHY HEART.** 25% of strokes are a direct result of a heart disease creating a blood clot.
- 9. REDUCE STRESS.** Yoga, meditation, athletics, and healthy hobbies.
- 10. THIS ONE WILL GET YOU THINKING.** Spend 24 hours with your left arm tied to your side. Picture that for the rest of your life, then check out steps 1-9 again! Check out www.JeremyLiffMD.com for a ton more information! Stay safe and **STROKE FREE!** ★

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If Walls Could Talk

'The People vs. The Golden State Killer' Reveals Lead Prosecutor's Official Account of 40-Year Cold Case

- For the first time, the story of a cold case that lasted more than 40 years plaguing the Sacramento area and various communities throughout California was officially recounted by the then lead prosecutor in "The People vs. The Golden State Killer" (Third State Books, Nov. 11, 2025). The book was written by Thien Ho, Sacramento County's current district attorney.

Joseph DeAngelo, better known by monikers such as the East Area Rapist, Visalia Ransacker, the Original Nightstalker and the Golden State Killer, wreaked havoc throughout six counties in California, committing more than 120 burglaries, more than 50 rapes and 13 murders. DeAngelo's first victims murdered in Rancho Cordova were a couple, Brian and Katie Maggiore.

"Nothing compares to (DeAngelo's case) for me personally of any case I've worked on and it's just because of the scope and the volume and the challenges that came with prosecuting a cold case that was 40 years old," Ho said.

During the time of DeAngelo's investigation, capture and conviction, Ho was the assistant chief deputy district attorney and lead prosecutor of the team that successfully achieved a conviction of the notorious killer.

"There's one thing to arrest somebody but there's another thing to build a case and present it in a court of law," Ho recently told Messenger Publishing Group. "And building a case is like building a house; you have to build a foundation first."

When presenting a case for trial, Ho said, he first questions how he wants to tell the story and creates an A layer, B layer and C layer that cohesively converge throughout its duration.

The A layer was the overarching case, Ho said, going through the investigation, capture and prosecution of the Golden State Killer. The B layer was Ho's personal story, a Vietnamese refugee who studied at McGeorge School of Law, taught there and rose through the judicial ranks, elected to district attorney in Sacramento

in 2022. The C layer was conveying the voice of the survivors, a tremendous responsibility that Ho said he felt out of respect.

"There were literally three-million pages of documents that had to be reviewed, organized and turned over," Ho said "And so part of the challenge of any case is telling the story but before you can do that, you have to understand it and the challenge here is that this is a cold case, where the crimes happen 30 to 40 years prior."

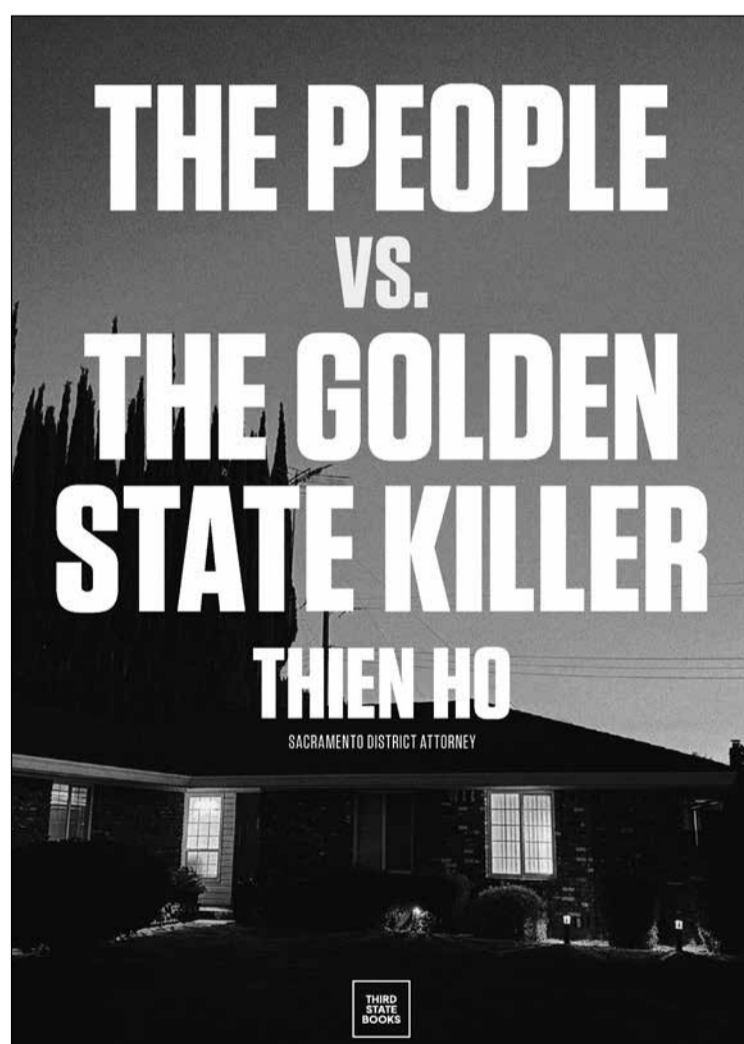
Facing lost witnesses, discarded evidence and faded memories, Ho said, rebuilding the case was a meticulous process that was taken one case at a time. He said that DeAngelo's pursuit was aided by investigative genetic genealogy (IGG), a process that builds a genetic family tree to profile suspects. Nearly 1,000 cases have been solved so far because of investigative genetic genealogy, according to Ho.

Tens of thousands of suspects were identified over the cold case's four decades before DNA evidence eventually tied DeAngelo to the string of crimes that captivated six counties throughout California. Leaving bodily fluids and other DNA at multiple crime scenes during his criminal career, Ho said that DeAngelo's crimes were consistent, his actions served as a signature, tying him to the nearly 200 crimes he was convicted of through his genetic family tree.

Ho outlined the obstacles to be overcome during the COVID-19 pandemic, including the creation of a courtroom at the Sacramento State Ballroom to accommodate roughly 200 people while social distancing, a term that Ho said was foreign to most up until spring 2020.

"Those victims deserved to be there," Ho said. "So we looked around at the Golden One Center here in Sacramento where we looked at the Memorial Auditorium. We even looked at an airport hangar."

A makeshift courtroom during a pandemic was unprecedented, Ho said, and the ballroom's back entrance had to facilitate an armored vehicle, in addition to 200 individuals. He said it was a challenge to protect the victims' health as well as his own and that

of his family, while continuing to move the case along in court. Ho said that a traditional courtroom fits about 40 people without social distancing, so a larger venue was sought to accommodate courtroom victims capacity while social distancing.

"If you know your why, you will find your way," Ho said. "We knew our why, we were doing this for the victims, we were doing it to bring them justice. That was our why."

Ho said that the prosecution team created a profile on DeAngelo from his birth in Bath, New York to his post-arrest as a camera was placed inside DeAngelo's cell without his knowledge. DeAngelo's cell footage showed him obsessively pacing around, Ho said, but he was rolled into the courtroom via a wheelchair to seem frail and weak. Ho said that the prosecution saw right through DeAngelo's feeble act because his timing was

too deliberate. He said it seemed as if DeAngelo was attempting to create a narrative of mental instability.

"DeAngelo was meticulous. He compartmentalized his life with surgical precision. He was not impulsive, he planned, he stalked, he adapted. That is how he avoided capture for so long," Ho said. "It was chilling to realize that someone could commit such evil while maintaining the appearance of normalcy. But evil does not always look like a monster. Sometimes, it looks like your neighbor."

With modern technology, Ho said, the likelihood of serial killers living "normal" lives is not as high as when DeAngelo's criminal career was at its peak. Ho said there's too much forensic and electronic evidence to connect the dots of a case plus the plethora of security cameras and cellphone cameras in this modern age.

DeAngelo's God complex, the

feeling of unstoppable control, revealed how weak he truly was in his own life, hunting his victims like prey, Ho said. DeAngelo's actions displayed his manipulative compulsion throughout his crimes.

"He was playing God. When he tied him up and he put a bed-sheet over them and glasses on top of them, he was being God over them," Ho said. "He held their lives in the palm of his hands when he was committing his sexual assault."

Ho writes about sleepless nights in anticipation of new developments in the DeAngelo case. Asked about the crimes' dark nature and how it affected him, Ho said that the darkness remains a part of him but does not consume him as much.

"Maybe it doesn't creep over your consciousness as much or often but it's always there," Ho said. "It's never completely gone. It becomes a part of you in some way."

"The People vs. The Golden State Killer" is set to be released on Nov. 11 in the Nonfiction/True Crime section. Ho said he woke up at 5 a.m. to write the book two hours every day for seven months. Ho started with a 30-page outline. The book's cover depicts the Rancho Cordova neighborhood in which the first couple murdered by the Golden State Killer took place.

after they've been out for years. They aren't confident in their skills or presentation," said Shelby Greenhill, employment developer for Next Move Homeless Services. "Once here, once they are secure and safe in shelter, we can work with them to get ready, to feel confident. This helps take the pressure off them doing it all by themselves."

your first job interview? Job readiness puts potential applicants through mock interviews, not only helping to calm their nerves but equipping them with the responses and confidence needed to impress potential employers.

What Mather Community Campus and its operator Next Move Homeless Services provides to its clients is truly intangible. Help. Access. Accountability. Resources. The campus not only houses the Employment Program but the Job Readiness Fair pulls together a variety of resources and Community Based Organizations (CBOs) to equip job seekers with everything they need to start their job hunt.

The stigma of being homeless is one of the highest barriers to people finding employment. Not having reliable transportation or the funds to bring or buy lunch, being self-conscious because your clothes don't fit or might not be newly laundered. But having connections to unshowered-friendly employers helps to ease the transition back into the workforce.

You cannot get a job without an ID, a social security card and address. Next Move helps clients get critical documents like birth certificates, I.D.s and social security cards and open bank accounts.

The clothing closet is one of the most used resources of the job readiness fair – providing professional clothing, shoes, coats, belts and more.

Beyond access to the computer lab on campus, staff provide guidance and suggestions on how to build a resume and how to leverage past work history to build out the skills and experience needed for job applications.

"There are so many resources here," said Charlotte, who has been a resident of Mather Community Campus for seven months. "They're helping me repair my credit. I realized I got too comfortable but I am ready to improve my life. I have a background in healthcare. They helped me build a resume and apply for jobs at Board and Care homes."

Having access to a computer allows job applicants to easily search for open positions, apply and set up email addresses to maintain consistent communication channels with hiring agencies.

The first Job Readiness Fair hosted by Next Move at Mather Community Campus included vendors from the Sacramento County Personnel Department, Sacramento Libraries, Goodwill Industries, Francis House Center, CA Health Collaborative, Sacramento Employment and Training Agency (SETA), Folsom Cordova Adult School, Credit Help and more. Besides the clothing closet, Next Move offered toiletry kits, lunch coolers and interview kits to go.

For many, access to job training is cost prohibitive. But through partnerships with Community Based Organizations and local businesses, Mather Community Campus residents can get the critical training they need to get job ready.

Charolette said, "Having a job isn't just about income. It is about confidence and a sense of self-worth. It is about contributing to the community and building a future you can be proud of. This job readiness fair is a godsend." ★

Rancho Cordova.

The deferred maintenance funding is made possible as a result of the city's Community Enhancement and Investment Fund (CEIF), two half cent sales tax measures approved by voters in 2014 and 2020. This investment in infrastructure is part of the broader Community Enhancement and Investment Fund Legacy Projects initiative, which invests in projects that have lasting impact — from public amenities like the Rancho Cordova Youth Center, the girls softball complex and a future library, to economic development and infrastructure improvements that strengthen quality of life throughout the city

"While more than half of roads in the city are new or in very good condition," Mayor Pulipati continued. "Improving roads in fair condition now will help avoid significantly higher costs in the future and ensure taxpayer dollars go further."

Work is anticipated to begin in 2026, with the Public Works Department overseeing project design and construction schedules. Residents will see phased improvements across key corridors and neighborhoods over the coming years.

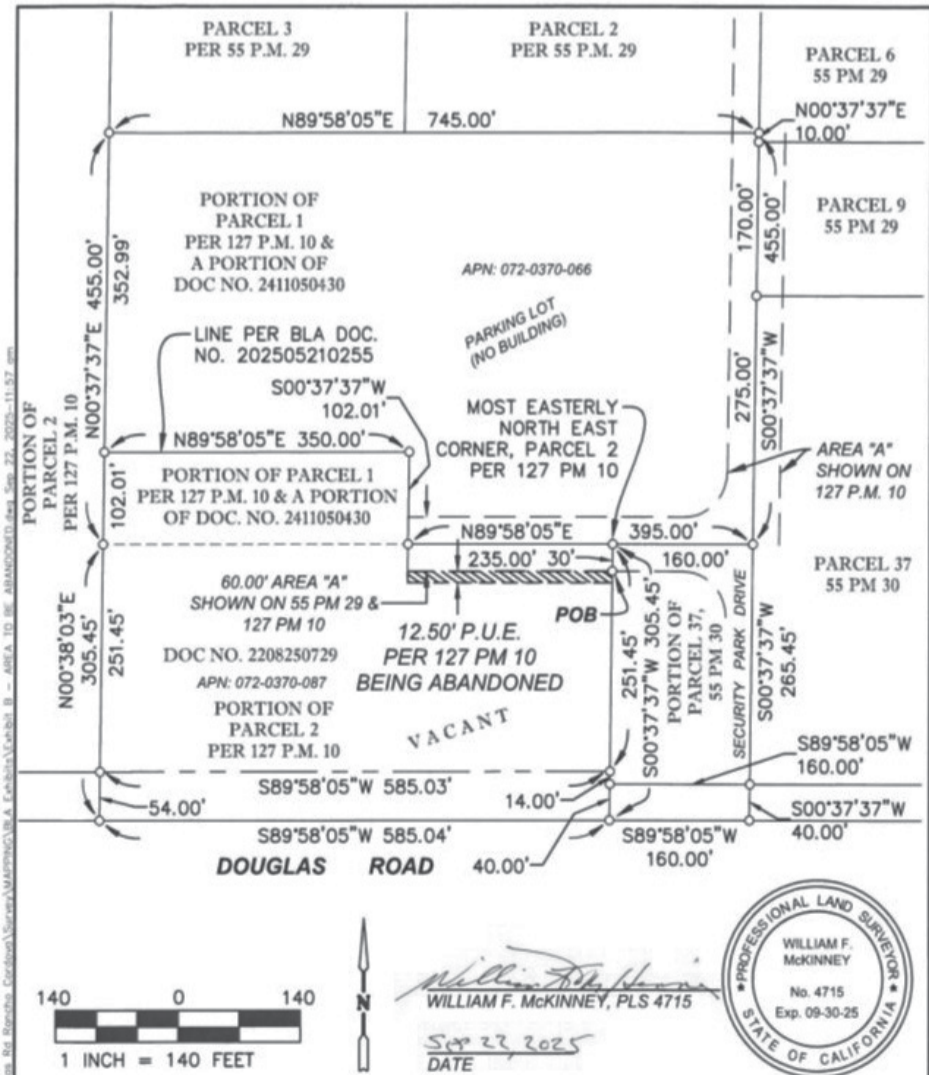

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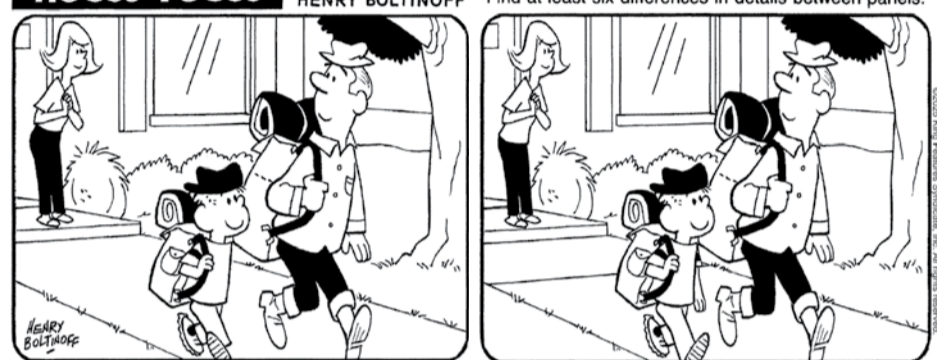

“It was kind of a mixed bag,” he said. “We had a lot of growth in a lot of ways. I thought the coaching from top to bottom was really good, and there was an excitement that you could see all

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Snoopy Has Landed in Sacramento

Aerospace Museum of California Unveils Freeway Sign, Traveling Snoopy Exhibit

NORTH HIGHLANDS, CA (MPG) - Snoopy Flying Ace traveled to the Aerospace Museum of California as the organization opened its "Snoopy and the Red Baron" exhibit to the public on Oct. 18 and announced the pending placement of a sign for Interstate 80 to promote the museum.

The traveling exhibit is on display in the museum until Dec. 31, complimenting the array of artifacts from World War I and memorabilia on display in partnership with the Charles M. Schulz Museum and Research Center in Santa Rosa. Schulz was the creator of the character, Snoopy, in addition to the Peanuts characters and some of the comic strips or artifacts at the exhibit were signed by him.

Tom Jones, the president and CEO of the aerospace museum, said during the VIP opening ceremony on Oct. 17 that Snoopy and the Red Baron was one of Schulz's most popular personas of Snoopy and that Sacramento is quite fortunate to have this exhibit during Snoopy's 75th anniversary.

"Who doesn't love Snoopy? And then the kids see Snoopy and all of his different adventures that he goes on and his different personas that he assumes," Jones said. "I just think it's a fabulous way for kids to connect not only to Snoopy, but with aviation and aerospace."

Out of Schulz's nearly 7,000 comic strips, Jones said that he grew up reading those comics and some of the funniest ones were enlarged to be viewed at a distance. He said that the collaboration between the two museums was meaningful and allowed the aerospace museum to tie in other artifacts from World War II, showing how far Snoopy's influence had spread.

"We've got great photo stations and all kinds of fun ways to engage with this exhibit," Jones said. "Bring your kids, bring your grandkids, you know, just come see the museum. It's a beautiful space and it's super engaging for kids from 2 to 102."

Jones said that the museum was able to incorporate artifacts from famed aviator Clay Lacy, who is actively encouraging aviators and a donor to the aerospace museum. The museum's collection also featured artifacts from other aviators, such as Bud Anderson, Vicky Benzin and others.

Lacy flew his P-51 Mustang with a giant Snoopy in the cockpit, Jones said, winning the Reno Air Races in 1970, encouraging youth to become involved with aviation. He said Anderson, as a Boy Scout in 1934, became a World War II Triple Ace nine years later because of what he had learned. Artifacts depicting Snoopy's tenure as a Beagle Scout pay tribute to Boy Scouts, Girl Scouts and military members.

The Aerospace Museum of California also celebrated the approval of a new sign to be placed on Interstate 80 by way of legislation that Jones wrote to define how museums are categorized with

Caltrans. Jones said that museums were previously categorized with locations such as the Golden One Center or Levi's Stadium, making the museum slightly beyond the scope of allowing signage on the interstate.

Jones said Assemblymember Josh Hoover asked him to write a piece of legislation, which became Assembly Bill 1320 and was unanimously approved by the state assembly. Jones said that not a word was changed from what he originally wrote.

"Governor Newsom signed it into law about two and a half years ago and then we thought, 'OK, great. We're going to get signs now,'"

Jones said. "But Caltrans had to change its manual."

Before the aerospace museum's inception, City Councilmember Roger Dickinson said that he has been involved with the organization, as he was the county supervisor for the area at the time. Dickinson helped get signs placed on Watt Avenue.

"This has been an outstanding facility with tremendous offerings and great programs for kids, particularly in STEM subjects," Dickinson said. "But as you can see by the location, it's a little hidden, so I think the significance of the freeway sign in particular is to let people know that it's here and what

direction to go to get here."

Dickinson said that the aerospace museum is a great opportunity to honor Sacramento's aviation and military history, as well as everything that goes along with it. He said it is one of those wonderful assets that the city has to help inspire young people to think about science, technology, engineering,

museum years ago because of its wheelchair accessibility.

Bernau said he is glad to see how much it has grown, including partnerships with schools or other organizations to keep children motivated. He said that a museum as high quality as the Aerospace Museum of California deserves a sign on the freeway.

"There's so many things competing with people's time today," Bernau said. "And so to have that sign for going up and down the freeway, and it's like, 'Oh, what's that? I've never been there before. I didn't even know that existed.' So that's a big deal to have that."

The Aerospace Museum of California is located at 3200 Freedom Park Drive in McClellan Park and was founded in 1986. The organization is a nonprofit organization and features a 40,000 square-foot exhibit hall with 40 aircraft and rockets, as well as a four-acre outdoor air park. The museum is also a Smithsonian Affiliate and a member of the North American Reciprocal Museum Association.

The "Snoopy and the Red Baron" exhibit at the museum will feature special weekly pop-up activities for visitors of all ages that bring Snoopy and the other Peanuts characters to life, according to the museum.

arts and math (STEAM), such as the California Railroad Museum or the Crocker Art Museum.

Being exposed to the different facets of life through opportunities such as the aerospace museum, philharmonic or the symphony are experiences that help shape a person's development, Dickinson said.

Sherrie Everhart, the owner of Hart 2 Hart wineries, made a sizable donation to the Aerospace Museum of California, providing funding for high quality display cases. Jones said that he was friends and members with Sherrie's husband Jim Everhart, a member of the Sacramento County Sheriff's Air Squadron. Jones said that Jim Everhart unfortunately died suddenly a few years ago.

El Dorado Hills resident Jerry Bernau said that he was friends with Jim Everhart and attended the VIP opening ceremony in honor of his friend. Bernau said he has a handicapped son who enjoyed visiting places such as the aerospace
