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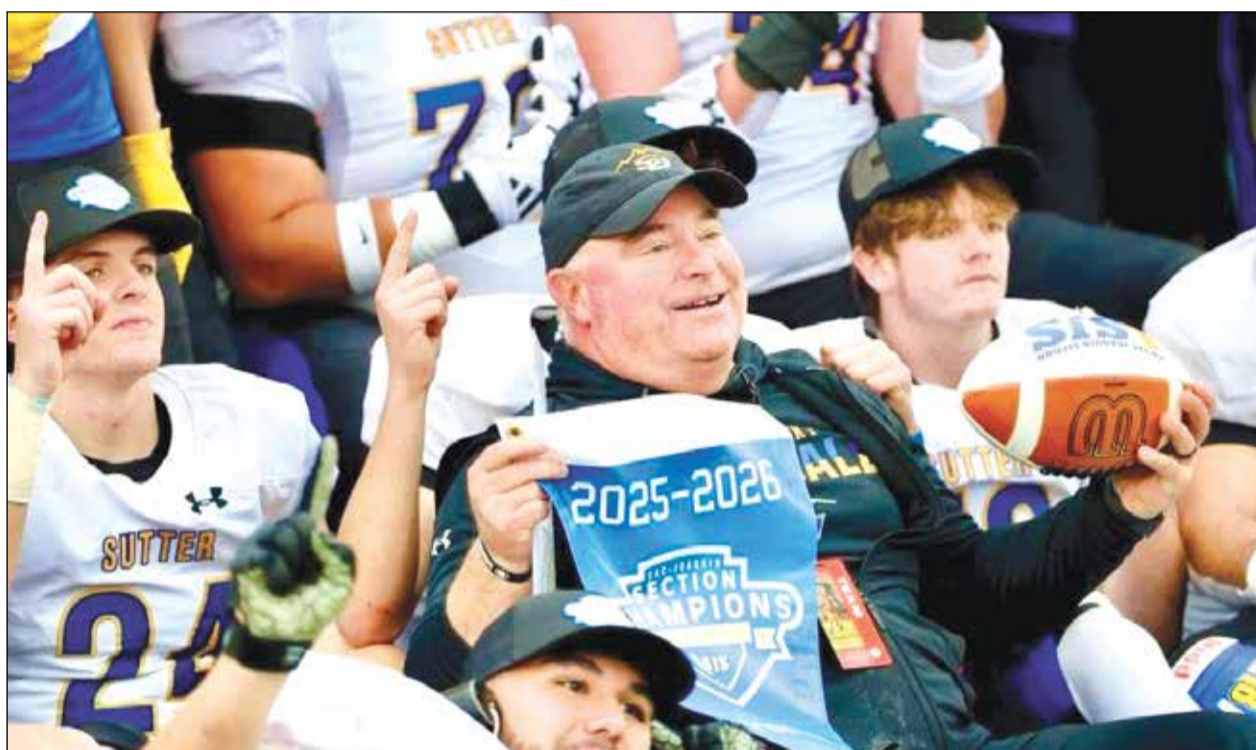

Bringgold's Challenge Turns into Monster Performance

SACRAMENTO, CA (YSBC) - The Sutter Union Huskies football team brought home their first blue banner on Friday, Nov. 28 and finished the mission with a 42-27 victory over the Casa Roble Rams in the CIF Sac-Joaquin Section Division V final.

Casa Roble beat Sutter on Oct. 31 and claimed the Golden Empire League title, but the Huskies avenged their lone loss of the season on Friday afternoon.

Sutter received the opening kick for the second-straight week and made a statement on the first drive of the game. Huskies senior quarterback Braden Scritchfield found senior running back Max Bringgold for the first of his five total touchdowns in the

Sutter County Announces Cybersecurity Incident Behind Emergency Alert Outage

SUTTER COUNTY, CA (MPG)

The Sutter County Office of Emergency Management has been notified that the ongoing outage of the county's emergency alert system, operated by its contracted vendor, CodeRED by Crisis24, is the result of a cybersecurity incident carried out by an organized cybercriminal group.

The incident was described by Crisis24 as a targeted attack that may have compromised personal information tied to CodeRED users nationwide. Potentially impacted data includes names, addresses, email addresses, phone numbers and/or associated passwords used to create user profiles. CodeRED has advised users that if the same passwords were used for any other personal or business accounts, those credentials should be changed immediately.

Despite the ongoing outage, the Office of Emergency Management retains the ability to send emergency alerts through other systems and partners, including the RAVE Mobile Safety mass notification system, Wireless Emergency Alerts, and the Emergency Alert System relayed through FEMA and the California Governor's Office of Emergency Services, as well as official county social media channels, the county website and direct coordination with news media.

Sutter County first informed the public on Nov. 14 that CodeRED was experiencing a system outage. At that time, Crisis24 had not disclosed the origin, scope or whether customer data was at risk. County officials had no information indicating a breach or the extent of the disruption when the initial notification was issued.

Town Hall Highlights Progress, Reality of Flood Probabilities

MARYSVILLE, CA (MPG) - Yuba County residents gathered Wednesday, Oct. 29 for the Flood Risk Awareness & Preparedness Town Hall, a free public safety event hosted at the Five30 Event Center in Marysville and streamed on Facebook Live.

The two-and-a-half hour event featured interactive displays beginning at 5 p.m. and a moderated panel from 6-7:30 p.m. Officials from the Yuba County Office of Emergency Services, Yuba Water Agency, Yuba County Sheriff's Department and Reclamation District 784 spoke on completed levee upgrades, dam safety, emergency tools and the math behind flood probabilities.

The panel was

moderated by Rob Gregor of the Yuba County Office of Education, with panelists including Oscar Marin, Sheriff Wendell Anderson, John James, Ryan McNally

and Patrick Meagher. A key focus of the evening was progress versus realism. While speakers emphasized recent infrastructure successes, they

YUBA CITY, CA (MPG) - The annual 'Turkey Smoke Out' in Yuba City raised \$2,300 in donations for a local single parent this holiday season. Long-time host and organizer

Jim King reunited again this year with Brian Davis of BeXtra to support a deserving family in need while spreading early Christmas cheer. "I can't believe it's been 25 years already," said King. "It's always a good time out here with friends

and family and I'm glad to have Brian here as well to help." For privacy reasons, the family's name will not be disclosed. Davis also extended gratitude to King, event partners and the broader community for showing up to support the

effort. "Coming together is what it's all about, and getting to have a fun time in the process makes it even better," said Davis. Roughly 75 turkeys were smoked during the day-long event. Preparations began at 3

p.m. on Nov. 25, the afternoon prior to the smoke, when King and his team cleaned, prepped and tagged dozens of birds delivered by community members and local partners. King noted that his oversized outdoor smoker can hold up to 30 turkeys at a time, and each batch takes roughly three hours to complete. By evening on Nov. 26, every turkey

had been picked up by its owner, hot and freshly smoked. Fire pits blazed outdoors as King, Davis, and the volunteer crew took time to relax, recharge and enjoy the company of friends and family. King and his team say they're already looking forward to next year, when the tradition will once again combine service with celebration. ★

Community Loses Two Local Mainstays

YUBA-SUTTER, CA (MPG) - The Penny Candy Store in Live Oak closed permanently on Nov. 26, ending a 50-plus-year run as a local staple for nostalgic sweets and after-school treats. Owned for the past two years by Lorrie Brummett, the decision comes after years of dwindling profitability and changing consumer habits. Brummett said the choice was "agonizing," noting that while she hoped to

preserve cherished memories for local families, the economic reality simply wouldn't allow it to continue. In Yuba County, downtown Marysville's specialty goods store The Spicery is also set to close. Owners Nicholas Davoren and Evelyn Wood have cited rising import

costs and unpredictable tariff schedules as a primary obstacle along with new rapid supplier container-fill requests. Their Tiburon facility will close on Dec. 29, and their Marysville shop at 228 First St. will open on a limited schedule in December — Saturday, Dec. 13

and Saturday, Dec. 20. Operations at the Marysville location may continue briefly into early 2026 if significant product remains, staying open only until inventory is mostly sold. ★

Watercraft Screenings at New Bullards Bar Reservoir Will Continue Through 2026

Results from pilot program support continued action to help prevent the spread of golden mussels to Yuba River watershed

MARYSVILLE, CA (MPG) - Yuba Water Agency will continue screening all motorized watercraft at New Bullards Bar Reservoir through 2026 in an effort to prevent the spread of invasive golden mussels to the Yuba River watershed. The decision follows positive results from the agency's 2025 pilot screening program. Since the program launched Aug. 18, Yuba Water has screened nearly 2,300 vessels for

visible signs of mussels, aquatic vegetation, mud and standing water, and talked with hundreds of boaters about their recent activity and clean, drain and dry practices. Although 19 vessels visited Bullards Bar from confirmed mussel-positive waters, screeners have not found any evidence of golden mussels in their screenings so far. Other reservoirs in our region, however, have intercepted boats that could have transported mussels, if not for screening efforts. "These screenings have provided valuable data on where boats are coming from, how well visitors are following clean, drain, dry practices and helped us assess potential risks to our reservoir," said Senior Environmental Specialist Jessica Nichols. "It's been a really effective way to engage with boaters and people have been overwhelmingly supportive of our efforts. Boaters really seem to understand the risk and want to do their part to protect our waterways."

The screenings, which take an average of about five minutes each, also provided secondary benefits, including local

seasonal jobs, enhanced security at Bullards Bar and more opportunities to educate boaters about clean, drain and dry practices and the importance of securing and/or covering tow chains to reduce wildfire risk. Yuba Water does not plan to implement a vessel tagging or banding program in 2026 due to the anticipated resources and staffing that it would require. Screenings remain free for all boaters.

First detected in the Sacramento-San Joaquin Delta in fall 2024, golden mussels have spread throughout California waterways and pose a serious ecological and economic threat, including to the Yuba River watershed. "Our most recent surveys and ongoing monitoring show Bullards Bar remains mussel-free, and we're working hard to keep it that way," Nichols said. "But we still

need everyone to be vigilant to help prevent the spread of golden mussels and remember to clean, drain and dry boats, kayaks, fishing gear...anything that comes into contact with the water...every time." 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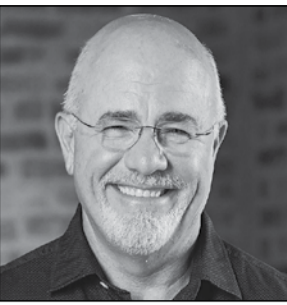
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Dave Ramsey Says She'll Be Just Fine

Let's pay off the house, and then she can start taking her income off a percentage of the remainder. She won't need much with the house payment out of the way, because she won't be sending money to the bank to pay the anymore.

back to the Gold Rush era, when hydraulic mining debris inundated large portions of the region, raised riverbeds, and spurred decades of levee construction, reinforcement and modernization.

"It's all going today, it's something that we have to contend with and a lot of our infrastructure projects take that into account," said McNally of the Yuba Water Agency.

McNally also walked attendees through what "200-year levee" actually means — a frequent public misconception. "It does not mean that it will only occur once every one hundred years," explained

McNally. "It is the percentage of probability that (a flood) could occur in any given year."

To illustrate probability versus assumption, McNally conducted a wheel-spin experiment at arrival. With fewer than 100 guests present, a "100-year flood" landed twice — underscoring that probability does not guarantee spacing or rarity in real life.

Other panel remarks highlighted long-range monitoring and communications readiness. John James noted that the Yuba Water Agency tracks weather patterns, reservoir levels and snowpack weeks in advance to prepare alert

systems and notifications ahead of potential flood events.

Beyond history and infrastructure, the second half of the presentation shifted toward personal preparedness — go bags, evacuation foresight and public engagement. Participants explored hands-on displays, assembled sample emergency kits, spoke directly with subject matter experts, reviewed flood safety videos, and discussed what residents can do now even as risk levels evolve.

Arrests Made from Car to Car Shooting

YUBA CITY, CA (MPG) - On Nov. 15 at 11:20 p.m. Yuba City Police officers responded to the 1600 block of Stabler Lane due to several callers reporting hearing shots fired. When officers arrived on scene, they located several shell casings in the roadway. Through the initial investigation, officers determined this was a car-to-car shooting and spoke to several witnesses.



The Yuba City Police Investigation Unit responded to the scene and began tracking down leads and collecting evidence. On Nov. 19 19-year-old Marcos Walters was arrested by Investigators for accessory to a crime, shooting from

a vehicle, and shooting at an occupied vehicle. He was booked in the Sutter County Jail. On Nov. 20 with the assistance of the Yuba/Sutter SWAT team, Investigators arrested 19-year-old Taeden Penn on the charge of attempted murder and he was booked into the Sutter County Jail.

Though arrests in this case have been made, the investigation is still active and on-going and additional arrests are expected to be made. The motive for this shooting is still under investigation as well. ★

County Closes Year with Budget True-Up

YUBA CITY, CA (MPG) - As the fiscal dust settled on two years of operations, the Sutter County Board of Supervisors approved a resolution to reconcile its financial records with actual revenues and expenditures.

At its Nov. 18 meeting, the Board authorized year end budget adjustments totaling \$15.4 million across two fiscal years.

County Administrator Steven M. Smith explained that the county "typically would just have the prior fiscal year" reflected in the adjustments, but delays tied to the county's Workday financial software implementation required revisions for both 2023/24 and 2024/25.

The resolution increases net appropriations by \$7.4 million for 2023/24 and \$8 million for 2024/25. The latter includes a contingency allocation from the general fund to cover fire administration costs following a leadership transition. Smith said about 85 percent of the

adjustments involve behavioral health funding transfers under the Mental Health Services Act, with other changes covering software, utilities, debt service and fingerprint fees.

No new spending was proposed. Instead, the action aligns budgeted figures with actuals across departments and programs. The adjustments are part of a standard year end cleanup process to ensure the county's books accurately reflect final financial activity.

Smith also noted that some year end expenses, such as fleet or IT services, can exceed department budgets without the department heads having control. In those cases, the county makes offsetting adjustments to prevent liability from falling on individual officials.

"If there was some expenditure that wasn't appropriate, then of course we would bring that to your attention and that person would be held accountable for that," Smith said.

The resolution required a four fifths vote and was approved unanimously. ★

Will the real Sacramento Kings please stand up. Yes, Kings fans, it's been a conundrum to say the least, and in spite of a 5 and 16 record to start the season, bright spots have actually surfaced.

New Studies Gives Lowdown on California's Sky-High Living Costs

We Californians know, or should know, that while living in this state has many positive aspects, we are paying through the nose for the experience.

A flurry of recent studies drives home how deeply California residents must dig to meet costs of living that are either at or near the highest of any state.

One comes from the Legislative Analyst's Office, the Legislature's advisor on the state budget, delving into the astronomical costs of buying a home.

The LAO study found "California home prices far exceed the rest of the country." Mid-tier homes, those roughly in the middle of the price range, are more than twice as expensive as the typical mid-tier home elsewhere in the U.S. Monthly payments for such homes run about \$5,500 in California, 74% more than what they were 25 years ago.

The study also found that the annual household income needed to qualify for a mortgage on a mid-tier California home in September was about \$221,000 — more than two times the median California household income in 2024, which was \$102,000.

For a bottom-tier home, about \$136,000 in annual income is needed to qualify for a mortgage — about 33%

higher than median household income was in 2024.

The data illustrate why California has the second lowest rate of home ownership in the nation. Just 55.3% of Californians live in homes they or their families own, slightly higher than New York's ownership rate.

It's not surprising that hundreds of thousands of California residents, unable to aspire to home ownership, have decamped for more affordable states, such as Texas, where home prices are a fraction of California's.

Those who do migrate to other states find not only are houses much less expensive but fuel for their cars and utilities to light, heat and cool their homes are markedly less expensive.

The Center for Jobs & the Economy, an offshoot of the California Business Roundtable, continuously monitors energy costs in California and other states. Its latest report says gasoline, averaging \$4.64 a gallon in California, is as much as \$1.50 a gallon higher than in Texas and other states. California's electrical power rates are roughly twice as high.

Another take on California living costs comes from the Transparency Foundation, a conservative economic think tank.

It gathered a wide variety of factors and calculated living costs for an upper-middle class California family with a \$130,000 annual income. It concluded the family would pay \$29,753 more per year than the national average for housing, utilities, health care, taxes and other costs of living.

"This report should be a wake-up call to all Californians, that they are

being unfairly punished by the bad policies imposed on them by their politicians — and they are literally paying the price for it," Dave McCulloch, the foundation's chairman, said in a statement about the report.

A new poll by the Public Policy Institute of California confirms that Californians worry about living costs. Nearly a third of those polled said they, or someone in their household, have reduced food purchases to save money.

The California Farm Bureau revealed that a traditional Thanksgiving dinner for 10 people will cost a California family \$72.61, well above the national average of \$55.18.

Finally, there's a new report from WalletHub, a website devoted to personal finance, implying that Californians are taking on more debt to pay their rising bills.

In this year's third quarter — July through September — the average California household added \$880 in new debt, increasing the total owed to \$259,773, second only to residents of Hawaii.

All together, Californians' personal debt increased by \$11.8 billion during the quarter.

Now it's nearly \$3.2 trillion, just a bit lower than their \$3.6 trillion in annual personal income.

A truly staggering number.

Social Security Matters Is Social Security Really a "Good Deal?"

Dear Rusty: You've said in the past that most people recoup their SS contributions within five years of starting benefits, thus Social Security "is an exceptionally good deal." Your calculation is correct but misleading; if it were not, SS would have been insolvent long ago. I will, in fact, get "my" contributions back in about five years, but my employer's contributions will take another five years, and that is money that my employer could have been paying me, so they are really "my" contributions. But even that ignores the time value of money. I did a calculation as if my contributions, along with those of my employer, were invested in an account earning 5% per year. That would provide me the equivalent of SS income for 24 years, approximately what my life expectancy was when I retired. So, it's not a bad deal, but it is hardly exceptional. It is roughly the equivalent of me investing that money throughout my career and using the total to buy an annuity.

Of course, Social Security does have the advantage of certainty, at least until it goes broke. My portfolio

would not earn a steady 5% every year, though that is at the low end of what financial managers would expect over a long period. And it does force people to save, many of whom would otherwise make no provision for retirement. **Signed: Realistic Senior**

Dear Realistic: Thanks very much for your feedback on my previous article. I think it's important to draw a distinction for SS contributions made by an employer, because that is not money the individual personally pays, but rather an obligation for employers to help fund the Social Security program. Without that federal obligation, it is doubtful that employers would, instead, provide employees with equivalent additional compensation, so the thought that these are really your contributions is not a fair assessment. Indeed, they are contributions which happen to be tied to your earnings level (to a cap), for which employers receive relief on their corporate income tax, and likely would not make if not required by law.

As you have noted, Social Security has the advantage of certainty, something which is lacking when it comes to investing the equivalent amounts in the financial markets. And, as you have hinted, there exists a substantial failure by future American retirees to save adequately for their retirement, a problem well known in most financial circles. Thus, the certainty of Social Security makes it a crucial part of everyone's retirement planning — and it will be there! Despite all the

angst attributed to the current financial issues facing the program, there is little doubt that Social Security is here to stay. The question is — what reform is needed to make the program fully solvent for generations of future Americans? The Association of Mature American Citizens (AMAC) has developed a proposal to sensibly reform Social Security and avoid the currently projected 2033 date that the SS Trust Funds are expected to be depleted (which will necessitate an across-the-board cut for everyone). We have little doubt that the reform needed will happen (it would be political suicide for Congress if it did not), and hopefully soon. The Epstein Conspiracy in Plain Sight

Regardless, populists have a different narrative at hand that is consistent with the known record. Namely, that some of the most privileged members of our society — at the very top of the financial, academic, political, media and social worlds — had no standards or ethics, and embraced Epstein as a friend and consigliere.

Epstein knew influential people, so influential people felt that they should know him. They considered him fun, and useful — for advice, for banter, for introductions, for information and for donations. The emails suggest that Epstein missed his calling as a high-level, seamy advice columnist to the rich and powerful.

Want to know more about the reputation of the woman you are having an affair with? Seeking advice on how to gain political influence in Europe? Wondering how you're handling your interactions with a potential mistress? Looking for insights about Donald Trump? Trying to survive sexual harassment allegations? Need a reference for a gastroenterologist? Well, then, ask Jeffrey Epstein.

He emailed with former Harvard president Larry Summers, the linguist Noam Chomsky, venture capitalist Boris Nikolic, Emirati businessman Sultan Ahmed bin Sulayem, Trump activist Steve Bannon, the journalist Michael Wolff, the artist Andres Serrano, the department store scion Jonathan Farkas and former White House counsel Kathryn

Ruemmler, among others. It's not as though Epstein was particularly insightful, but if he knew so many important people, he must know something, right?

As for his scrape with the law, clearly all had been forgiven and forgotten. If he was in the good graces of the social wrangler Peggy Siegal, whose job was to get bold-faced names to accept invitations, he must be OK. For some of Epstein's correspondents, it was part of his appeal that he was disreputable. Larry Summers, who leaned on Epstein for romantic advice, asked him at one point: "How is life among the lucrative and louche?"

Epstein's social currency is one reason that he got off so easily the first time he was prosecuted — he hired the best, most connected defense attorneys, who outclassed and intimidated his prosecutors.

As for Trump, he is guilty of enjoying Epstein's company a couple of decades ago, presumably for the same reason so many others did. But he had a falling out with Epstein long ago. Trump didn't have anything to do with him at the time that so many others in these emails were socializing with Epstein, confiding in him and asking him for insight on Trump. That's a disgrace, and it's always been in plain sight. In the Epstein story, it's not so much follow the money — although that's important and still mysterious — as follow the social network.

With many of the artificial intelligence (AI) stocks charts looking like one of Elon Musk's rocket launches, it's difficult, at least for me, to buy much of anything lately. I am talking about stocks of course.

Take a look at the charts of many of AI stocks like Advanced Micro Devices (AMD), Palantir (PLTR) or Nvidia (NVDA) and note the almost vertical climb in their stock price over the last year or so.

An advisor I know, in fact many advisors I know, tell me not to worry, and that the markets will continue to rise including those vaulted AI stocks.

Sometimes I wonder what they teach these guys in advisor class. Certainly not what a stock bubble looks like when displayed in a chart.

Note to advisors: Vertical lines that look like rocket ships blasting off are bad.

Yes, they can continue to go higher still. Much higher than one might think. But those rocket ships usually flame out and crash and burn, bringing down investor money with it.

An advisor I know bought DocuSign

during the CoVid shutdown period, and watched it rise from around \$50 a share to over \$300 starting mid-2020 to about late 2021, the shutdown period.

Lots of people were using DocuSign due to being locked out of their offices. As it started to fall, the advisor said "how low could it go?" and kept holding it. I told him look to where it started its rise (about \$50.) and that's where it could end back up. He laughed and said no way was going back to \$50. He was kind of right. It didn't end up at \$50. It went below \$20. The lesson here is the gravy train of mania stocks that experience these sort of ballistic increases are, in my opinion, accidents waiting to happen.

Sure, some people make a lot of money, but some also lose their shirts when they crater.

When people ask me about the stock market now, I have to say I have my doubts that some of these stocks won't end in some horrific pull back that will shock investors.

Sure, stocks can go a lot higher than anyone expects. And that anyone is me from time to time. But I just can't chase the tiger by the tale in good faith.

People do chase these ballistic stocks in a moment of greed. They have a FOMO moment, (FEAR OF MISSING OUT) and no, I didn't make that one up. It's a real stock term.

But those vertical stock charts in some stocks, coupled with what I see as a faltering economy, may play out in a nasty sort of way, draining investor portfolios in the process.

I could be wrong. I never think I am 100% right, which is part of what I've learned in my 50 odd years of doing this stock thing.

But many times throughout history those darn rising vertical lines turn tail and vertically go the other way. And like investor icon Warren Buffett's two investing rules say:

Rule 1: Don't lose money.

Rule 2: Don't forget rule 1.

Anything can happen, and some of it may not be so good.

Caveat emptor.

Early and Late Navel Orange Varieties Spread Out Harvest

California's iconic navel orange—a signature citrus fruit for the fresh market—arrived in produce aisles right on time this year. Picking started Oct. 9 in Kern County, historically the first region to begin navel orange harvest. "Absence of a late summer heat wave and cooler October weather helped the crop reach maturity at the normal time," said Matt Watkins of Bee Sweet Citrus, a grower, packer and shipper in Fresno County. As fruit color and maturity develop, harvest will accelerate and move north to other counties. Navel oranges are harvested from fall through spring and may continue into the summer, depending on markets and fruit quality. Early and late varieties help spread out the harvest season, giving growers an opportunity to hit markets when prices are good.

Farm Tech Focuses on Robotic Weeding in Vegetables

Weeding robots have emerged as a key focus of autonomous farm technology as growers seek solutions for costly and labor-intensive tasks. One model, which was displayed at the 2025 FIRA USA agricultural technology conference last month in Woodland, is the SharpShooter system from Hayward-based Verdant Robotics. The SharpShooter is a tractor attachment that uses artificial intelligence to identify weeds and deliver precise, controlled sprays without hurting the

cash crop. "We're delivering milliliter streams of liquid onto the weed," said Chad Yagow, Verdant's director of agronomy and industry relations. "If you think about a hypodermic needle, if you press that plunger, that little stream of liquid that's coming out—that's what we're doing every time that we take a shot."

State Vet Reflects on Her Work as Animal Health Chief

California State Veterinarian Annette Jones, who is set to retire at the end of the year, reflected in a recent Ag Alert® column on her nearly 20 years as the state's chief animal health official. Though she has dealt with numerous animal disease outbreaks during her time at the California Department of Food and Agriculture, she said her career's biggest challenge was the most recent outbreak of highly pathogenic bird flu, which began in 2022 and escalated each year thereafter. "The virus exploded through dairies and poultry flocks last winter despite efforts to reduce impacts, testing the resilience of our farmers and staff like no other outbreak has," Jones said. "While the disease impacts are distressing, it is rewarding to wrap up my career with a renewed appreciation for how proactive our producers and processors can be." Looking ahead, she said she hopes "the spirit of cooperation continues as California farmers and ranchers face new threats and that we keep focusing on getting the job done with mutual respect."★

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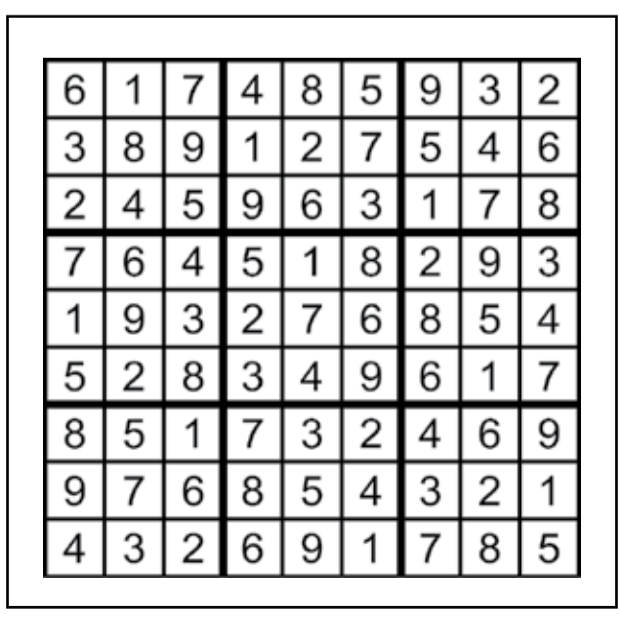


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Sutter Claims First Blue Banner

win as they connected for a 26-yard reception and a 7-0 lead.

Scratchfield completed all six of his passes for a total of 86 yards in the air with two passing touchdowns and 50 yards on the ground.

The Rams quickly responded on the ensuing drive as Casa Roble senior quarterback Aiden Lopez zipped a five-yard touchdown pass to senior wide receiver Jared Alexander to tie the game at seven.

Bringgold returned the favor to Scratchfield in the first minute of the first quarter as they faked the Casa Roble defense out and Scratchfield caught the five-yard reception in the end zone to retake a 14-7 lead.

Bringgold told Yuba Sutter Butte Colusa Sports in the win over Hilmar on Nov. 14 that Huskies head coach Ryan Reynolds challenged him before he accumulated over 140 all-purpose yards in the semifinal win against the Yellowjackets.

Reynolds expressed to YSBC that the challenge to Bringgold was not egregious and was joking with him, but just simply asked where the preseason Bringgold was, they haven't seen him in a while and would have loved to see him back.

Reynolds chuckled as he said that Bringgold took it to heart and looks forward

to it continuing.

Bringgold extended the Sutter lead to 14 with 10 minutes to go in the first half as he rushed the ball into the end zone for 15 yards. It was later noted that Bringgold was the first player to pass, rush, receive a touchdown and intercept the ball in a SJS final. Bringgold had 160 all-purpose yards against the Rams.

Bringgold told YSBC that the Huskies wanted to win because they had the opportunity to rewrite the one-point loss to Hughson in 2024. "It didn't feel good going home a loser," Bringgold said. "We were going to leave with that blue banner today, no question."

On the kickoff following the rushing touchdown by Bringgold, Sutter senior kicker Aiden Zwissig rocketed the ball sky-high to the right sideline like he had done on all previous kickoffs and as the Rams signaled a fair catch.

The Casa Roble player muffed the kick and the Huskies recovered the ball inside the Rams 35, but an inadvertent whistle by the referee coming up the sideline forced a rekick and Casa Roble safely recovered the high kick by Zwissig.

Sutter took a 21-7 lead at the half. The Huskies may have been in control of the first half, but you couldn't count the Rams out as any sort of momentum for

Lopez and his ability to find receivers downfield in tight windows.

Lopez cut the deficit back to single digits as he found junior wide receiver Karter Coss for a six-yard passing touchdown. Bringgold answered back for Sutter as he found the end zone from the 14-yard line for his second rushing touchdown of the game.

Casa Roble senior running back Jaylan Barcenas capitalized on a good push from his offensive line to cut the game back to one possession as he scored on a five-yard rushing touchdown with two minutes left in the third.

The Huskies punted on the next drive and that was the only punt of the game by either side. The punt rolled inside the Rams 15 and Casa Roble had the opportunity to tie or take the lead if they could score.

As Casa Roble was driving early in the fourth quarter there was a big call and stirred a lot of confusion on both sidelines. Lopez completed a pass downfield to senior wide receiver Felix Rodriguez and Rodriguez had the ball stripped by Sutter junior safety Deegan Parks where the Huskies clearly recovered the ball.

The officials threw two flags and after discussions, Bringgold had a roughing the passer on Lopez and there was a late hit on the Rams after the fumble was recovered. This was crucial as the game was within one possession and the offsetting part put the ball back at the Sutter 41 with second and 10 to go.

The Huskies eventually forced Casa Roble to turn the ball over on downs with eight minutes to go in the game. Sutter ran the ball up the throat of the Rams as Huskies junior running back Losi Asiata, Bringgold and Scratchfield chunked yards and time off the clock.

Scratchfield found Asiata on his own on the left side of the end zone for an eight-yard touchdown pass and extended the Sutter lead back to two possessions. Asiata converted a two-point conversion that gave the Huskies a 35-20

lead with five and a half minutes to go.

After Barcenas had a huge kickoff return to the Sutter 42, Lopez quickly completed a 27-yard pass down the right sideline and Barcenas cashed in on his second rushing touchdown of the day from the 15 and quickly brought the Rams back to one possession with only taking 30 seconds off the game clock.

The Huskies next possession started near midfield and Bringgold capped off his great offensive performance with a 20-yard rushing touchdown and Sutter the 42-27 lead with a minute and a half to go in the game.

Lopez completed a couple passes downfield on the final push, but it ended with Bringgold intercepting Lopez's pass and secured the D-V blue banner going home with the Huskies.

Scratchfield said the key attribute to the Sutter success against Casa Roble was to simply have fun and in them having fun, they were able to play looser and be victorious.

Asiata added that it was the "pedal to the metal" attitude and the Huskies accomplished that. Asiata ran the ball 17 times for 58 yards and caught the one reception for eight yards.

Bringgold, Asiata and Scratchfield all expressed their deep appreciation to their offensive line for putting themselves in the trenches and being the forefront of the offensive

success because without them, the offense wouldn't flow as well as it has throughout 2025.

Scratchfield said the Huskies offensive adjustments were attributed to the Rams bringing the same type of attack like Oct. 31. He added that they were ready and when they saw the same type of attack, they were able to make better decisions this time around.

Asiata expressed after the loss in the GEL championship, he wanted redemption against Casa Roble and they were able to accomplish that.

Bringgold expressed he knew Sutter was deemed the "underdog" role in the matchup at Hughes stadium.

"We had nothing to lose, everyone bet against us," Bringgold said.

Reynolds expressed that he was ecstatic about bringing the first football-blue banner back to the Huskies trophy case as this

was clearly a goal since Sutter transitioned to the SJS in the fall of 2022.

"Winning a blue banner here is tough," Reynolds said.

Reynolds added the key for moving on is staying healthy and keeping a positive mindset as they will be playing a new opponent next week. In the win, Sutter moves onto the CIF State Football Championships as they won their section title.

The Huskies haven't played in December since they lost in the CIF Division 5-AA bowl game in 2021.

Sutter was placed in the CIF Division 4-AA game as they are scheduled to play the Ferndale Wildcats.

The game will be played at California State Polytechnic University, Humboldt tonight with kickoff scheduled for 7:30 p.m.
