Appellate Court Rejects Delta Tunnel Financing

SACRAMENTO REGION, CA (MPG) - The Delta Counties Coalition (DCC) welcomes the opinion by the Third District Court of Appeal, which upheld the lower court's ruling that the State of California lacks legal authority to issue billions of dollars in bonds to finance the proposed Delta tunnel project without explicit legislative approval.

This decision affirms what Delta communities, counties, and local agencies have raised for years: that a project of this scale, cost and consequence cannot be advanced through administrative maneuvering or broad interpretations of decades-old statutes.

The court made clear that the Department of Water Resources exceeded its authority by attempting to classify the Delta tunnel as a "modification" of the State Water Project, rather than what it plainly is - a massive new conveyance facility with far-reaching impacts.

For the counties and residents who live and work in the Delta, this ruling is an important step toward transparency, accountability, and lawful decision-making. The proposed tunnel would fundamentally alter Delta land use, threaten local water supply reliability, place additional pressure on fragile ecosystems, and expose ratepayers and communities to escalating financial risk - all without clear authorization from the Legislature or any water supply benefits for affected regions.

The court's opinion underscores a basic principle: if the State wishes to pursue a project with an estimated - and questionable - price tag of \$20 billion and decades-long consequences, it must do so openly, with full legislative scrutiny and public accountability. Delta communities should not be asked to bear the environmental, economic, and social costs of a project that has yet to demonstrate clear benefits or a lawful funding path.

While proponents have suggested the ruling does not end the project, it undeniably raises serious questions about its viability. Just last year, the Governor unsuccessfully attempted to tack legislation onto the State Budget that would have bypassed many hurdles for the tunnel, and his representatives at that time confidently told

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State Laws Reshape Rancho Cordova

RANCHO CORDOVA, CA (MPG) - Rancho Cordova city officials kicked off the new year's Jan. 5 council meeting with a briefing on state laws taking effect in 2026. City Attorney Adam Lindgren told the City Council the annual overview is meant to flag major trends and prepare staff and elected officials for compliance.

"We started doing this a while ago to highlight the list of new laws for council, staff and others to think about the things of interdepartmental interest," Lindgren said. "This item will assist the council and staff to comply with newly enacted state laws on a range of topics critical to the city."

Housing dominated the discussion, reflecting Sacramento's continued effort to address California's housing shortage by limiting cities' discretion. Lindgren said many of the new laws "create additional opportunities to fix the housing crisis in California," while also "taking away local control and giving more authority to the state to mandate housing in certain places."

Deputy City Attorney Anthony Amara outlined several new housing measures, starting with AB 507, the Office to Housing Conversion

Act, which takes effect July 1. The law allows office and other commercial buildings to be converted to affordable housing "by right," meaning cities cannot require discretionary approvals.

To maintain some influence, Lindgren said Rancho Cordova may develop a local ordinance governing adaptive reuse projects.

"Adopting a local ordinance will help in a couple ways," Lindgren said. "It will help with the discipline of looking closer at whether there are remaining objective standards that we want to shift to objective rather than subjective, and it will give us on balance more local control."

Councilmember Linda Budge pointed to a specific site that could be affected.

"A property that comes to mind immediately is the vacant lot close to Kaiser," Budge said. "This would facilitate that."

Councilmembers generally agreed the law aligns with ongoing planning efforts but emphasized the importance of public input.

"This doesn't contrast much to what we have been interested in," City Manager Micah Runner said. "We still want to make sure there is enough local conversation around what that looks like."

Another major housing law, SB 79 by Sen. Scott Wiener, establishes statewide minimum zoning standards to allow higher-density housing within a mile of major transit stops. Cities must adopt an implementing ordinance or an alternative plan that achieves the same increase in housing near transit and receive approval from the state Department of Housing and Community Development.

Enforcement is also tightening. AB 712 increases penalties for cities that violate housing laws to \$10,000 per unit, or \$50,000 per violation for smaller projects, after a 60-day notice to cure. Lindgren said the city's next step is ensuring compliance during project review.

AB 648 exempts community colleges from local zoning rules for housing built on land they own or lease within a half-mile of a campus. In Rancho Cordova, that could allow increased density near Folsom Lake College without city approval. Staff said the city may collaborate with the college to address student and faculty housing needs and engage nearby neighborhoods.

Outside of housing, the council reviewed changes affecting short-term rentals, logistics development and local governance. SB 346 allows

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cities to require platforms like Airbnb to share information to improve enforcement of transient occupancy taxes.

SB 415 clarifies rules for logistics projects near "sensitive receptors," adding exceptions that include land near airports such as Mather.

One of the most significant governance changes comes from SB 707, which modernizes the Brown Act. City councils must now allow virtual participation and translate agendas into languages spoken by at least 20% of the population.

"It's part due to accessibility, and the other second part of that is transparency," said City Clerk Stacy Leitner.

Councilmembers raised concerns about public access and privacy.

"I would want everyone to have access to that so everyone can chat back," Mayor Garrett Gatewood said.

Councilmember David M. Sander, PH.D. asked whether there are privacy protection for residents contacting the city.

Stacy responded, "We can't require identification, but chats do become public records."

Runner emphasized that further discussion and workshops are necessary to develop a formal workable policy that clearly outlines how virtual participation will function.

Lastly SB 42 by Sen. Thomas Umberg would allow cities to offer or expand public campaign financing for local candidates if approved by voters in 2026. The proposal is intended to reduce the influence of wealthy donors and special interests and lessen the advantage of incumbency, but city staff said it could also place financial and administrative pressure on local governments.

"It's probably going to be a good idea to consider very carefully support or opposition to the law," Lindgren said.

City staff plan follow-up workshops and ordinances throughout the year as Rancho Cordova adapts to the changing legal landscape. ★

Rising Heat Leads to Minimal Losses for California Processing Tomatoes

SACRAMENTO REGION, CA (MPG) - California's \$1 billion processing tomato industry is highly efficient and likely will be able to withstand higher temperatures and traffic congestion with minimal postharvest losses, according to research conducted at the University of California, Davis.

The research, published in the American Journal of Agricultural Economics, analyzed 1.4 million truckloads of tomatoes transported from thousands of farm fields to processing facilities between 2011 and 2020.

"It's rare that we find an example where climate change is expected to have a negligible effect," said Sarah Whitnell, who led the research as a postdoctoral scholar at UC Davis and is now at University of Western Australia, Perth.

"Ultimately, the supply chain is a well-oiled machine. The losses are relatively small, and while temperature does increase them, it's not by a huge amount."

Researchers matched each truckload to California state highway traffic data and hourly temperatures, which ranged from 48 degrees to 108 degrees Fahrenheit. They compared truckloads of tomatoes from the same field and same growing season: for example, one traveling at 5 a.m. when temperatures are cooler and traffic is light with one travelling at 5 p.m. when the opposite is true.

The best-case scenario was when cool temperatures coincided with heavy traffic. The worst-case scenario was hot temperatures combined with heavy traffic. When it's hot, slow traffic speeds cause trucks to spend more time at

damaging temperatures.

"If you have this magic scenario where temperatures are cool but there is traffic, you actually have the lowest losses," Whitnell said. "This is because faster speeds cause vibrations that can increase damage in fresh produce."

Comparing best- and worst-case scenarios, the share of soft, split or squished tomatoes doubles from about 1% to 2%. This equates to modest losses, the researchers also found.

The findings show that California's processing tomato industry is highly efficient and could be a model for others, said senior author Tim Beatty, who is chair of the Department of Agricultural and Resource Economics at UC Davis.

"Most supply chains aren't nearly as efficient as the California supply chain, so what this says is if you're a very efficient supply chain, you can mitigate the losses associated with climate change," Beatty said. "It says that adaptation is possible to really reduce loss past the farm gate."

Eighty-four cents of every farm dollar is generated after the product leaves a farm, but most climate change research has focused on how growing is affected. This research looks at that second stage and was possible because of comprehensive public data and detailed transport, tonnage and quality data supplied by industry, Beatty said.

"We know very little about the effects of climate change once product leaves the farm gate," he said. "I think this paper is one of the very first to actually tackle that."

The U.S. Department of Agriculture's Agriculture and Food Research Initiative supported this research. ★

Defendant Convicted of Grooming Victim Through Xbox

Javier Arizmendi met the then 10-year-old victim while playing the video game Xbox Live. Arizmendi groomed the victim, giving him access to things on Xbox Live that cost money. Arizmendi then

began sending the victim sexual messages and made a plan to have the victim join him in Los Angeles to engage in a sexual relationship with him. Arizmendi drove to Sacramento, picked up the victim in his car and began driving back to Los Angeles. Arizmendi eventually drove the victim back home after the victim got upset when he touched the victim. Arizmendi later admitted to detectives his intentions of engaging in a sexual relationship with the victim in Los Angeles.

Arizmendi faces a maximum sentence of life in prison. Sentencing is set for Feb. 20, in Department 10 before the Honorable Ernest Sawtelle. ★

RANCHO CORDOVA, CA (MPG) - Every year, the City of Rancho Cordova's Public Works Department completes a number of construction projects in our community. These projects beautify Rancho Cordova and ensure the city has walkable, connected neighborhoods and safe routes for residents, bikers and drivers. Here's a look back at the key projects the city's Public Works team delivered in 2025, and a preview of the improvements on the way in 2026.

Completed Projects

The Anatolia Surface Treatment project upgraded roadways in the Anatolia neighborhood in partnership with Sierra Nevada Construction, improving aesthetics and creating better experiences for motorists, pedestrians and bicyclists. The work also extended the life of the pavement, ensuring the neighborhood's streets remain safe and reliable.

The Chase Drive and American River Parkway Connection project happened with support from a Maintenance and Modernization Grant from the Sacramento Area Council of Governments (SACOG) where the city added a multiuse path along the east side of Chase Drive from Coloma Road to the American River Parkway. In addition to a separated pathway, improvements also included lighting, new ADA-compliant curb ramps, crosswalks, trees and landscaping.

The ARPA Streetlights and Traffic Calming project included the installation of 44 solar powered streetlights along W La Loma Drive, La Loma Drive and Dawes Street. The streetlights were installed at intersections, mid-block crossings or speed hump locations. The project also included traffic calming improvements including monolithic bulb-outs, speed lumps, bike lanes, striping and rectangular rapid flashing beacons with the installation of a new mid-block crossing.

The Baroque Traffic Calming project improvements in the Stone Creek neighborhood on Baroque Drive included a mini roundabout, improved crosswalks, new bike lanes, lane narrowing and surface treatments to enhance safety for motorists, cyclists and pedestrians.

Along Grant Line Road, with support from a grant from the Highway Safety Improvement program from Caltrans, new LED curve-warning signs and rumble strips were installed. Improvements also included widened shoulders and a high-friction surface treatment. In coordination with this project, the Preserve residential development performed improvements at the

intersection of Raymer Road and Grant Line Road. These improvements included water and storm drain facilities, new roadway and a new traffic signal.

Sunrise Boulevard Rehabilitation Phase two and three was another key project. This rehabilitation project spanned along Sunrise Boulevard from White Rock Road to Kiefer Boulevard. Improvements included an overlay on the existing pavement, ADA-compliant curb ramps, and improved medians, curbs and landscaping. In Phase Two of this project, there were also upgrades made on Mechanical Drive and Recycle Road to improve flood protection.

The Chrysanthy Boulevard Expansion project expanded Chrysanthy Boulevard from Sunrise Boulevard to Grant Line Road—totaling three miles of new road, providing a local and regional connection to the growing communities of Rancho Cordova.

The Safe Schools/HSIP Cycle 11 project provided school crossing improvements at the following four school locations in accordance with the city's adopted Safe Routes to School Master Plan: WE Mitchell Middle School, Kinney High School, Robert J. McGarvey Elementary School and Sunrise Elementary School. These improvements included rectangular rapid flashing beacons, high visibility crosswalks, advanced yield markings and curb ramps.

Traffic safety improvements were made on Lincoln Village Drive including a new traffic circle, median islands, hardened centerlines, speed lumps and curb bulb outs.

Together, these completed projects represent a \$55 million investment in Rancho Cordova's transportation network, enhancing safety, connectivity and quality of life for residents, businesses and visitors. Funding came from a combination of grant programs, the city's Community Enhancement & Investment Fund, local taxes, developer contributions and other sources, reflecting a coordinated effort to support the city's continued growth and infrastructure improvements.

Upcoming projects in 2026 include the Zinfandel Drive Bicycle & Pedestrian Overcrossing; Countryside Neighborhood Street Rehabilitation; Sunrise Boulevard Surface Treatment project; Mather Field Road Enhancements Phase 1 and 2; Sidewalk, Curb and Gutter Maintenance; South White Rock Neighborhood Surface Treatment project; Lincoln Village Neighborhood Street Rehabilitation project Design.

From March 5-21, the MACC will present "Moments in Focus," an open-theme local photography exhibition. Spotlight Artist Todd Damiano will be featured during the same period.

The 7th annual Student Art Show will run April 9-27, showcasing hundreds of artworks by TK-12 students who live in or attend school in Rancho Cordova. Artwork is submitted through participating teachers and schools. A reception is scheduled for April 17 from 5:30 to 7:30 p.m.

Art at City Hall returns April 27-July 24 with "Wonder and Whimsy." A reception will be held April 29 from 5 to 7 p.m.

From May 7-23, the MACC will host "Art à la Carte," an exhibit celebrating food and the farm-to-fork movement. Artists will transform wooden catering trays into artworks focused on food-related themes. Artists interested in participating may contact the MACC for a tray and prospectus details. Spotlight Artist Maddison Dunn will be

featured concurrently.

The 8th annual Rancho Cordova Arts Members Exhibit runs June 11-27 and showcases the diverse media and styles of the organization's current members.

The MACC will also host the Rancho Cordova Arts "Micro Masterpieces" fundraiser and online auction June 8-13. The fundraiser features donated 6-by-6-inch artworks and supports the purchase of essential art supplies for teachers and students throughout the region. The event began as an in-person fundraiser and later transitioned to an online format, expanding participation and increasing donations.

"The Honeycomb Project," a traveling exhibition exploring themes of community and belonging, will be on view July 16-Aug. 1. The exhibit includes 900 panels created by 500 artists across 14 states. Spotlight Artist Frank Lopez Motnyk will be featured during the same dates.

Art at City Hall continues July 27-Oct. 23 with "The Art of Essence." A reception is scheduled for July 30 from 5 to 7 p.m.

The MACC will participate in the "Sacramento Open Studios" tour Sept. 18-20, opening its space to Rancho Cordova Arts members during Weekend 2 of the regional event.

From Oct. 1-24, the MACC will present "Journey of Hope," an

exhibition addressing mental health through collaborative storytelling and visual art. The exhibit connects writers living with mental health challenges with artists who transform their stories into visual expressions, creating space for dialogue, empathy and healing.

Spotlight Artist Jim Hunter will be featured Oct. 2-18.

SACRAMENTO REGION, CA (MPG) - Mere mortals count years. For the American River, seasons pass like water under a bridge. A December torrent; an August trickle. A passage for trappers, gold miners, salmonid spawners and hungry sea lions, the eternal artery has shaped Californian geography

and history for millennia. Still riding high from recent floods, she now flows into 2026. Summer diversions are memories. Now, lonely kayakers paddle in wet suits. Joggers exhale puffs of steam. 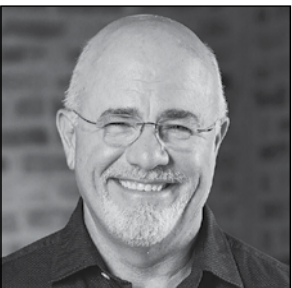

the Legislature that they would prevail on this matter in court.

This calls into question this project's other significant problems. At a minimum, this court decision requires the State to pause and reconsider whether continued pursuit of the tunnel is prudent, lawful, or aligned with California's broader goals for sustainable water

management, climate resilience and regional equity.

The Delta Counties Coalition remains committed to collaborative, science-based water solutions that protect the Delta, support local communities, and provide reliable water supplies statewide — without sacrificing the rule of law or the voices of those most directly affected. ★

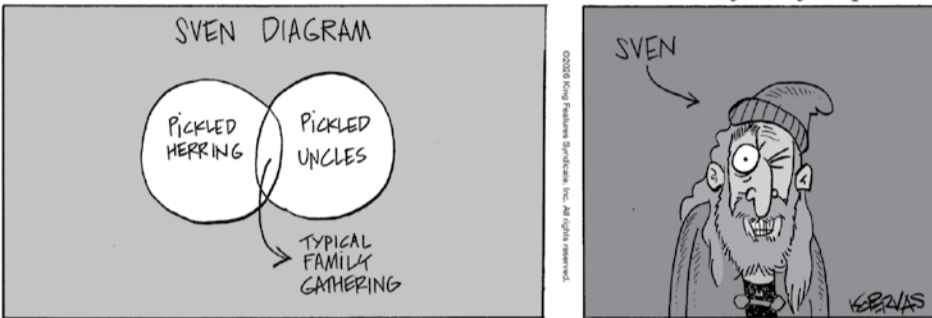

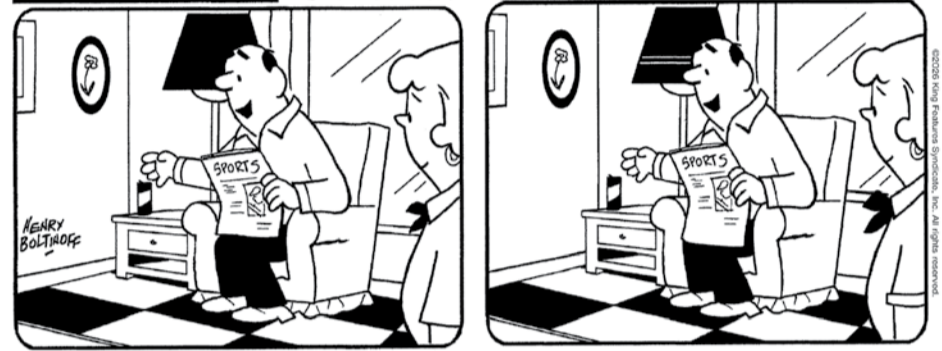

Urgent Issues Loom Over Newsom Campaign

Political California cranked up for the New Year Monday.

The Legislature reconvened after a 114-day recess, Gov. Gavin Newsom renewed his nascent campaign for president and the dozen or so men and women who covet his job continued to seek ways to reach a so-far-uninterested electorate.

Newsom's interview Monday on MS NOW, the cable channel beloved by Democratic politicians and activist voters, implied anew that his final year as governor will be dominated by his all-but-certain bid for the White House in 2028. He spent much of it criticizing President Donald Trump for refusing aid to Los Angeles fire victims and cracking down on undocumented immigrants.

Newsom's preoccupation will color whatever he and the Legislature do about a deficit-ridden state budget and a half-dozen or so other stubborn issues that have emerged or become more acute since Newsom took office seven years ago.

In past years Newsom has been lackadaisical about delivering the annual State of the State message to the Legislature that the state constitution requires. But he'll perform the chore later this week, then unveil his response to the projections of semi-permanent, multi-billion-dollar deficits.

Gabe Petek, the Legislature's budget analyst, sees an immediate \$18 billion gap between income and outgo that could mushroom to \$35 billion if not closed. He's warned that Newsom and legislators can't count on a sluggish economy to solve their problem.

They have used a variety of gimmicks, including raids on emergency reserves, off-the-books loans and deceptive accounting gambits to stave off the day of fiscal reckoning, but the shortfall, born of overspending revenues, has continued.

"If our estimates hold, the Legislature will face a fourth consecutive year of budget problems — all during a period of overall revenue growth," Petek said in a November analysis. "As it stands — with larger forecasted deficits and many fewer tools available to address them — California's budget is undeniably less prepared for downturns."

The Legislature's leaders, pressed by a powerful progressive contingent, don't want to reduce the health care and income support services they so willingly enacted after Newsom declared, erroneously, that the state had a \$97.5 billion surplus three years ago.

Progressives and their allies in public employee unions and other left-of-center groups want to close the budget gap with new taxes and are sponsoring two ballot measures, one to extend a surtax on the highest-income taxpayers that's due to expire and a second to impose a new wealth tax on the state's billionaires.

Newsom has steadfastly rejected tax increases to deal with the deficit, unwilling, obviously, to become a pro-tax presidential candidate. But neither has he offered, so

far, anything other than gimmicks to solve the problem his wildly off-base 2022 surplus declaration created.

The state's stubborn budget deficit is just one of the issues that continue to defy resolution as Newsom's final year begins. Other issues include high levels of homelessness and poverty, a housing shortage that's just as acute as when he took office in 2019, an insurance crisis born of chronic wildfires, a woebegone bullet train project, soaring costs of living, persistent water supply uncertainties and a looming shortage of gasoline as refineries close due to hostile state regulation.

On top of everything, California's \$4 trillion economy is more or less stuck in neutral, with the nation's highest unemployment rate, no net job growth since the COVID-19 pandemic and severe employment cutbacks in signature sectors, such as film and TV production technology.

The stark existence of such issues during Newsom's final year as governor is not only a potential drag on his presidential campaign, but it colors the cast-of-thousands campaigns to elect a successor.

Will the would-be Democratic governors be willing to point out Newsom's leftover issues — especially the budget deficit — and tell voters how they would approach the challenge? Or would they merely joust over who can be the loudest?

Social Security Matters

Why Didn't My Friend's Wife Get All Her Social Security Immediately?

Dear Rusty: A friend told me about what he believes is a strange thing in the Social Security system. His wife reached her full retirement age (FRA) of 66 several years ago. She delayed filing for Social Security past her FRA and claimed on her 68th birthday in June of that year, exactly 2 years after her FRA. When she filed, she was told she would receive approximately \$300/month, which, of course, was more than she would have received at her FRA. She was told however that she would only receive \$300/month as of January 1 of the following year. Between June of the year she turned 68 and filed for SS until the end of that year, she would receive an amount less than \$300. This lower amount was the amount she would have received if she had filed in December, the year she turned 67. She said she was told that was how SS works. She would never receive the difference in benefits she lost from June through December of the year she filed. If the above is true, can you explain? **Signed: Astounded Friend**

Dear Astounded: What your friend described is, indeed, a unique methodology for how Social Security

handles benefit payments for those who choose to wait beyond their full retirement age (FRA) to claim SS benefits. To understand it, let me first describe how Social Security retirement benefits are calculated.

At full retirement age, a person is entitled to 100% of the SS benefit they have earned from a lifetime of working. That FRA benefit amount is known as the person's "Primary Insurance Amount" (PIA) and is based upon the highest earning 35 years over the individual's lifetime. From those past years, average lifetime monthly earnings are computed, known as the person's "Average Indexed Monthly Earnings" (AIME). Their AIME is subjected to a formula which yields their Primary Insurance Amount — the benefit the person is entitled to in the month they attain their full retirement age — typically about 40% of the person's average monthly lifetime earnings. However, if the person chooses to do so, they can wait beyond their FRA to claim Social Security to get a monthly benefit even higher than their PIA, by earning Delayed Retirement Credits (DRCs).

DRCs are applied to the person's PIA when they claim Social Security. For each month after FRA the person claims, they will have .667% added to their PIA. That means that for each full year of delay, that person will get an extra 8% added to their PIA. For someone (like your friend's wife) who claimed 24 months after her FRA, she would receive a benefit 16% higher than her FRA amount. However, Social Security

normally only applies DRCs in January of each year.

So, even though your friend's wife claimed her SS benefits in June, 24 months after her FRA, she would initially only get the DRCs she had accumulated through the end of the previous year — in this case, about 18 months' worth of DRCs, or an SS payment about 12% higher than her PIA (her FRA amount). She would not get her remaining earned DRCs (another 4%) until January of the following year. So, in effect, the wife's initial benefit didn't reflect all her earned DRCs until her later January benefit payment. Thus, the wife essentially lost that extra benefit money for the period between June and December of the year she claimed Social Security. In other words, she wouldn't get the full 16% amount until SS applied the additional 4% DRCs to her benefit payment the following January. And that is why your friend's wife initially received a payment a bit less than the \$300 Social Security said she was entitled to by waiting 2 years after her FRA to claim.

This surprises many who choose to wait beyond their full retirement age to claim Social Security. But, curiously, this process doesn't apply to those who wait until age 70 to claim their SS benefits. For those who wait until age 70 to claim, Social Security will immediately apply all DRCs that they have accumulated and provide them with their maximum SS benefit immediately.

digious reserves of critical minerals, and maybe fossil fuels, as well.

If it fell into our lap, it'd be an excellent addition to our territorial holdings. There's a reason that American statesmen have long coveted the island.

The problem is that it's not currently available. What are other options? A lightly armed contingent of U.S. crossing guards could probably take it over in a couple of days. The challenge, though, is political and diplomatic, not military.

A NATO ally seizing the territory of another NATO ally would obviously be a grave threat to the integrity of the alliance. Would Denmark invoke Article 5 against the United States? It has the makings of a good spoof musical, but it's not something anyone should want to experience in reality.

Although Trump has said in the past that he doesn't take military force off the table — an amazing statement in and of itself — he's also talked of buying Greenland. The Danes, though, say it's not for sale, and the Greenlanders don't want to be bought.

If Trump really pushes the issue and forces Denmark and NATO into a corner with the 82nd Airborne ready to go on an airstrip somewhere, he could probably compel a sale, but it'd be courting a diplomatic crisis and damage the reputation of the United States without enough upside.

We can almost certainly get whatever we need from Greenland without violating a friendly country's

sovereignty or straining a world-historical alliance to the breaking point. We already have a missile-defense base there. The 1951 Greenland Defense Agreement between Denmark and the U.S. allowing us to keep bases could presumably be updated and extended. Given the national security importance of rare earths to the U.S. and NATO, it should be possible to unlock Greenland's minerals.

Instead of clapping back at Trump, Danish Prime Minister Mette Frederiksen should be reaching out for a steak dinner at Mar-a-Lago and offering a deal. While public pressure gets Trump's back up, private persuasion — and a warm relationship — goes a long way. The Panamanians managed to get Trump to stop talking about taking back the Canal (for now) with prudent concessions.

For his part, Trump should realize that making everyone in a friendly nation hate him doesn't help his cause. His talk of annexing Canada last year helped Justin Trudeau's party survive a national election that it should have lost. His Greenland saber-rattling is presumably making it harder for Denmark to work with him on sensible cooperation.

If Nicolas Maduro got what he deserved, Denmark is a different matter. Even the unsentimental, results-oriented Trump foreign policy needs to distinguish between friend and foe.

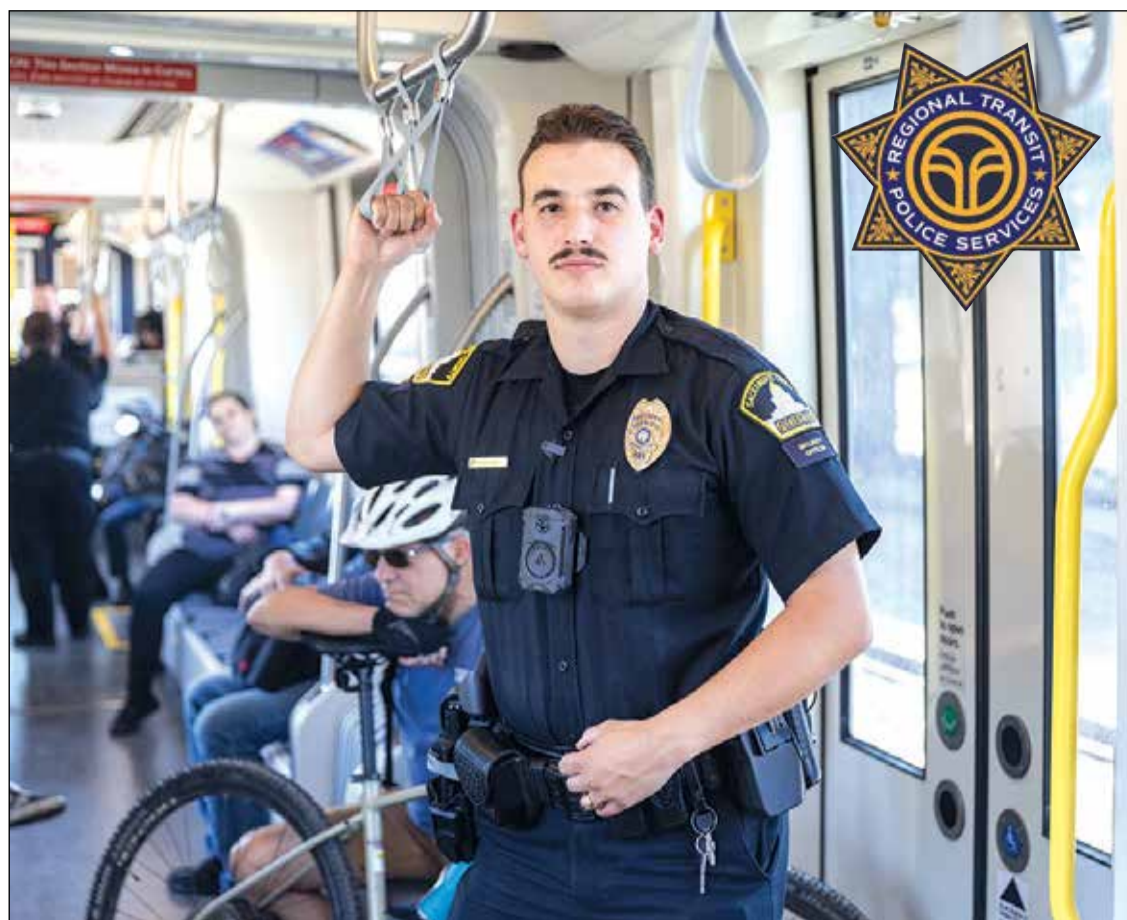

An Unseen Danger: The Deadly Toll of Road Debris

SACRAMENTO REGION, CA (MPG) - When considering one of the factors linked to tens of thousands of crashes across the United States, many of them deadly, you might expect the answer to be drunk or distracted driving. However, a recent study by the AAA Foundation of Traffic Safety found a surprising, yet equally dangerous, culprit: road debris. AAA researchers analyzed nationwide police data and other research and found road debris was likely a factor in more than 319,000 crashes between 2018 and 2023, resulting in more than 32,000 injuries and 433 deaths.

"Road debris" is generally defined as any object on a roadway that does not belong in a driving environment. The most common types of debris include vehicle parts (tires, bumpers, wheels) and unsecured cargo that fell off a vehicle (furniture, BBQ grills, mattresses, etc.)

The study noted that many drivers involved in crashes made dangerous maneuvers like sudden swerving to avoid road debris. Maneuvers like these accounted for about a quarter of injuries and nearly half of all deaths.

"Many of these crashes would have been easily preventable if drivers properly secured their cargo," AAA Mountain West Group spokesperson Doug Johnson said. "Securing loads and keeping your car maintained seems

like common sense, but too often we have seen many fail to do so and resulting in tragedy."

All 50 states require drivers to secure their cargo. Penalties for unsecured loads resulting in crashes range from \$10 to \$2,500, and in some cases, jail time.

To properly secure a load tie down items with rope, netting, or straps, attach large objects directly to the vehicle or trailer, cover the load with a sturdy tarp or netting, avoid overloading the vehicle and double-check that everything is tight and secure before driving.

Keep an eye out for road debris. Eyes up and on the road, avoid distractions. Give space and room to respond. If possible, warn others. Tap your brakes to signal to drivers behind you that there is debris in the road ahead. Keep your vehicle properly maintained. Repair or replace any loose car parts.

The Optimist Club will judge the local students' speeches based on content and presentation to determine the top winners. Top finishers will receive cash awards of \$500, \$300 and \$100, with the two top

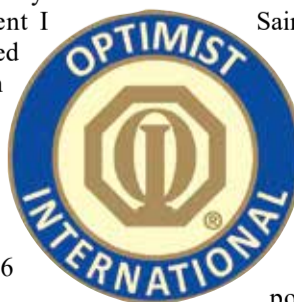
finishers moving on to the Zone level and possibly the District level, for an opportunity to win college scholarship money.

Winners of the District level will be eligible to compete in the Western Region competition in St. Louis, Missouri, held at Saint Louis University.

Regional contest winners will then compete in the World Championship, also held at Saint Louis University. Students could possibly win up to \$22,500 in scholarships.

The contest is open to students under the age of 19 as of Oct. 1, 2026.

Doug LaMalfa, a Steadfast Advocate for California's North State, Dies at 65

Rep. Doug LaMalfa, a fourth generation rice farmer and Republican who represented much of California's rural north in Congress, has died in office, setting off a scramble to replace him ahead of the November midterm election. He was 65.

His unexpected death Tuesday further shrinks the party's already razor-thin majority in Congress, which now stands at 218 following Georgia Rep. Marjorie Taylor Greene's resignation. The GOP can now only afford to lose two members on any party-line vote.

LaMalfa's passing also sets up a potentially confusing scenario for his constituents in the 1st Congressional District, one of the five that were significantly redrawn under the voter-approved Proposition 50 last year.

Under California law, Gov. Gavin Newsom must call a special election within 14 days to fill the remainder of LaMalfa's term. That election will take place using the existing congressional district map, a seat that stretches from much of the Oregon-California border through rural Shasta and Sutter counties and strongly favors Republicans.

In November, though, voters will cast ballots under the new Democratic-leaning district lines adopted by voters. That means the likely Republican victor of the special election could only serve a few months before being forced to run in a heavily Democratic-favored seat.

"Somebody's going to work really hard to be in Congress for five months before they're highly likely to lose in November," said Matt Exroad, a Republican strategist and redistricting expert.

LaMalfa died during emergency surgery at a Chico hospital, according to the Butte County Sheriff's Office, which said his family called 911 after the congressman experienced a "medical emergency" at his home.

While President Donald Trump and House Republicans could consistently count on

LaMalfa's support for conservative priorities such as last year's mega domestic policy bill, he never adopted the firebrand or antagonist persona that many of his colleagues preferred.

Instead, LaMalfa developed a reputation as a pragmatic and affable member who prioritized water access and forestry management, key interests for his largely forested, fire-prone and agricultural-heavy district. It's those issues that led him to staunchly oppose Proposition 50, Gov. Gavin Newsom's redistricting plan that proposed to lump much of the rural north with parts of the far more urban and liberal San Francisco Bay Area.

LaMalfa was known for his steadfast commitment to issues that affected his district. One tradition of his was to stake out the president after the State of the Union speech. In those precious few minutes, as the leader of the free world descended the dais and moved to exit the chamber, LaMalfa would make his legislative requests. As the Washington Post reported, after President Joe Biden's

final address, LaMalfa asked the president to force the U.S. Forest Service to speed up permits for cutting timber, telling the president, "We gotta cut some trees."

LaMalfa strongly opposed Prop. 50, framing the gerrymander as a significant loss of representation for rural Californians. At a press conference last fall, he stressed how much he loved representing the farmers, ranchers and other agricultural workers in his district, rattling off names of small towns such as Fort Goodwin and Cedarville, where he said he's knocked on countless doors and held various town halls over the years.

"I know where all those places are," LaMalfa told the handful of reporters gathered in the Butte County Farm Bureau lodge. "Do you think that's going to happen when people from Cedarville, Modoc County, are lumped in with people from Sausalito and Marin County?"

LaMalfa was already expecting the toughest race of his career in November following voters' approval of Prop. 50

and its new Democratic-leaning districts. Although the voter registration advantage was stacked against him, LaMalfa previously told CalMatters that he intended to "give it his all" no matter who its voters were.

Several Democrats had already declared challenges, including state Sen. Mike McGuire — who represents Santa Rosa, a new part of the district — and Chico State Professor Audrey Denney, who previously challenged LaMalfa in 2018 and 2020.

It's possible that LaMalfa's successor won't be known for several months, depending on when Newsom schedules the special election and whether any candidate receives 50% of the vote. If not, voters will have to cast ballots in an additional runoff election.

House Republicans would benefit from filling the vacancy as quickly as possible, given their razor-thin margin.

The closest comparison is when former Republican Rep. Devin Nunes resigned in 2022 to lead a new Trump-backed media outlet. Newsom called a special election for early

April, with a run-off election that coincided with that year's regularly scheduled statewide primary. Republican Connie Conway ultimately won the seat and served for six months before bowing out and foregoing reelection after the district was redrawn.

It's not yet clear whether Newsom will schedule the special election for LaMalfa's seat to coincide with the statewide general election primary on June 2. A special primary election would need to be set nine weeks prior, with the top two candidates proceeding to the run-off unless one candidate amasses more than 50% of the vote.

Newsom spokesperson Izzy Gardon said he has not yet chosen a date.

"I would assume the governor will try to delay as long as he can," said Rob Stutzman, a California Republican political consultant.

California Republicans face their greatest chance of victory if they can clear the field and avoid a run-off election by uniting behind a single candidate who can attract more than 50% of the vote.

The top two names circulating as likely successors are Assembly member James Gallagher, the former Republican leader who is term limited and can't run for re-election, and former Sen. Brian Dahle, who termed out last year. Neither immediately responded to texts and calls asking whether they will consider running.

"I'm in shock. My mentor, a man who was like a big brother to me, is suddenly gone," Gallagher said in a statement Tuesday. "Doug LaMalfa was a one of a kind, humble and dedicated public servant. I'm lost and can't imagine life, public service or politics without Doug."

"We mourn the loss of Congressman LaMalfa whose unwavering dedication and tireless service made a lasting difference for North State residents," Dahle wrote on social media.

None of LaMalfa's Democratic challengers immediately said whether they would run in a special election. ★

Newsom Forecasts a Rosier California Budget

Gov. Gavin Newsom's office on Friday precast a "modest shortfall" of \$2.9 billion for the upcoming fiscal year, down sharply from previous estimates in a nearly \$349 billion budget proposal that relies heavily on continued windfalls from tech and AI stocks.

The governor's 2026-27 budget proposal projects \$9 billion more in revenue than anticipated, banking on the AI-driven economy to last. It's significantly rosier than the grim outlook for the nonpartisan Legislative Analyst's Office, which in November projected an \$18 billion deficit.

"A downturn in the market is one of the top risks," said state Department of Finance Director Joe Stephanshaw.

Newsom's spending proposal is nearly \$30 billion more than this year's budget, includes \$248.3 billion in the general fund, the primary account for state operations, up by \$18 billion.

The spike in spending is partly driven by the need to implement federal cuts to the Medi-Cal program and constitutional requirements to deposit portions of higher-than-expected revenue into education and state reserves.

The budget calls for the University of California to get \$350 million more in 2026-27 and the California State University system to get \$365 million more, largely to fulfill Newsom's 2022 promise to increase the universities' spending by 5% annually for five years.

Newsom's budget doesn't include any cuts to K-12 schools, and preserves some of his initiatives related to school meals, community schools, after-school and summer programs and transitional kindergarten. Per-pupil spending would jump slightly to \$27,400. It also includes a \$509 million increase in special education funding, and a 2.41% cost-of-living increase. Newsom's proposal is the opening salvo

in months of budget negotiations that begin in earnest in June.

The projected deficit could balloon to \$22 billion in fiscal year 2027-28, a problem the governor will address in an updated fiscal forecast in May, Stephanshaw said.

Other state departments will see less funding under Newsom's spending plan, though Stephanshaw emphasized that there were no major cuts in the proposal. Newsom wants to spend \$1.3 billion less on housing and homelessness next year, slashing the department's budget by more

than half. Stephanshaw said some one-time dollars for housing and homelessness have run out and the state is not proposing to renew them.

Newsom's sunnier forecast could delay calls for long-term financial fixes such as new taxes.

Nodding to "long-term structural challenge," Newsom wants to deposit \$3 billion into the state's rainy day fund Budget Stabilization Account, as well as \$8.6 billion into two other reserve accounts. He's also proposed spending \$11.8 billion over the next four years,

including \$3 billion this upcoming year, to pay down the state's pension liabilities.

"There are encouraging signs in the California economy," Newsom said in a written statement accompanying the budget. "Yet history teaches us that prosperity, if taken for granted, can vanish as quickly as it arrives. California's responsibility is to act with steady hands and anticipate future instability."

Newsom did not attend Friday's budget presentation, after he painted a rosy picture of California's fiscal future during his State of the State address Thursday. Flashing top-line numbers, the Democratic governor touted billions of dollars more in revenue, proposed new investments in education and pledged more toward the state's reserves and pension debt.

He avoided revealing the budget deficit and did not say whether closing the gap would require painful spending cuts to core services like childcare, food assistance and Medi-Cal, the state's health care coverage for low-income residents, especially as federal funding diminishes.

Newsom teased multiple new proposals, such as fully funding the state's universal transitional kindergarten program and providing universal before and after-school programs at elementary schools.

The TK program will cost \$1.9 billion annually, according to his budget proposal.

Newsom also proposed spending \$1 billion to add high-needs community schools and redirecting \$1 billion in Proposition 1 mental health funds annually for housing and homelessness.

County government officials were dismayed the budget doesn't include more robust funding to backfill federal cuts in Republicans' mega domestic policy bill passed last year.

"If the state doesn't step up, communities across California will crumble," said Graham Knaus, CEO of the California State Association of Counties, in a statement Friday. ★

Stingy Defense Helps Women's Basketball

SACRAMENTO, CA (MPG) - Senior Benthe Versteeg and junior Keanna Salave'a each finished with double-doubles on the day and the Sacramento State defense limited visiting Weber State to just 13 second-half points on Jan. 3 as the Hornets won their first Big Sky Conference game of the year, 60-39, at Hornet Pavilion.

The victory snapped a three-game skid for the Hornets, who moved to 7-8 overall and 1-1 in league play. The 39 points allowed are tied for the fewest surrendered this year and the fewest given up to a Division I opponent since defeating San Jose State, 66-39, on Dec. 15 of last season.

Led by 15 points from Sydney White, the Wildcats fell to 6-9 overall and 0-2 in league play, limited to just 29 percent shooting overall for the game and just 20 percent (6-for-30) in the second half.

Versteeg and Salave'a each posted their second double-doubles of the year, while Salave'a accomplished the feat for

the second time in the team's last three games. The last time the Hornets finished with a pair of double-doubles was against Eastern Washington in last year's Big Sky Tournament when Versteeg and Jaydia Martin accomplished the feat.

Versteeg finished with a season-high 18 points to go with 10 rebounds for her 12th career double-double, adding five assists and a career-high six steals. The 18 points surpassed her previous high of 14 against Nevada, while the six steals were just one shy of the school single-game top five.

Salave'a finished with 13 points and 13 rebounds — both Sacramento State career highs — while the 13 rebounds were the most by a Hornet this year. Six of her 13

boards came on the offensive end while adding a pair of assists, two steals, and a block. Saturday marked her fourth double-digit performance in her last five games.

Junior guard Natalie Picton also finished in double figures, adding 12 points to go with three rebounds and a pair of steals.

Sacramento State which never trailed in the game, threw the first punch out of the gates, opening the contest with a 13-2 run, including the last nine straight while holding Weber State scoreless for four minutes.

The Wildcats answered by scoring seven of the final nine points of the first quarter, but still found themselves down eight after one.

After trading baskets to start the second

and trailing by as many as 10 points twice, Weber State got as close as four points with just under three to play in the quarter before Jaety Mandaquit drained a three-pointer and Salave'a scored inside to give the Hornets some breathing room and an eight-point advantage at the break.

The Hornets then owned the second half, doubling up the Wildcats in the final 20 minutes while holding Weber State to just three field goals in the third and fourth quarters.

Sacramento State scored the first seven points of the third period to rebuild the lead back to 15, then led by as many as 16 in the early part of the fourth before pulling away. The Hornets finished the game on a 12-3 run en route to the victory.

Aside from a 38-31 advantage on the glass, Sacramento State turned the Wildcats over 24 times, turning those into 25 points to the good, while outscoring Weber State in the paint, 34-18.

The Hornets have only one game next week, hosting travel partner Portland State at 1 p.m. Jan. 10 to close out a three-game homestand. ★



Jace Rodriguez Named to FCS ADA Academic All Star Team

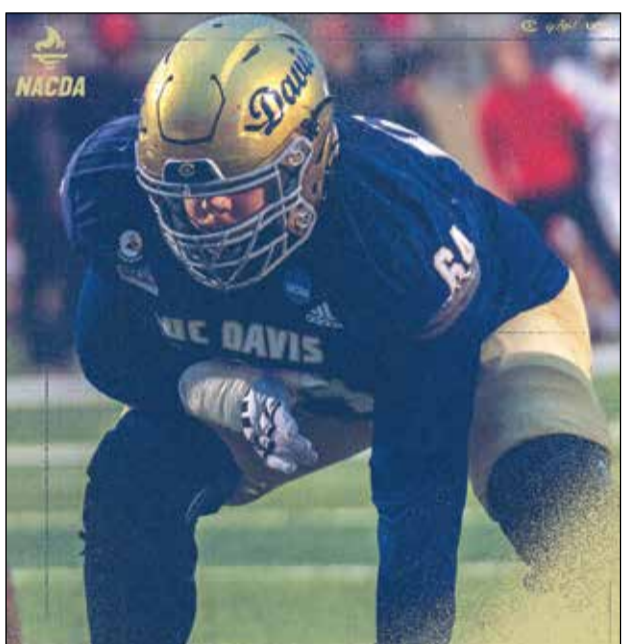

Collins Named Lancers Head Basketball Coach

RANCHO CORDOVA, CA (MPG) - Coming out of Christmas break, the Cordova Lancers announced the hiring of new head varsity basketball coach Chris Collins.

Collins, who currently serves as an assistant coach at American River College and has been the Director of YBA Elite, one of the region's top Amateur Athletic Union (AAU) programs since 2014, is being tasked with the challenge of rebuilding the Lancers' varsity program. After former Cordova head coach Kevin Bridgforth stepped down in the middle of December, the players and program needed a strong replacement with a plan in mind and appear to have found that in Collins.

"I welcome the challenge," Collins said. "When you're a coach, you have to be objective, and you have to be realistic. You're dealing with young men so there's going to be emotions and things tied into that, but I'm going to be honest. I'm a competitor. As a coach, you must have a competitive edge and have that 'want-to-win.' I always say, the goal is to win but the purpose is to develop. The purpose is to develop these young men on and off the court."

Collins presented Cordova Athletic Director JP Dolliver with a three-year plan that he believes will allow the program to contend for a California Interscholastic Federation (CIF) Section title, which included the plan to create a youth AAU feeder program tied directly to Cordova athletics that will develop young players as they come up and eventually play at Cordova. In the short term, he wants to give this current Lancers team the tools to improve day-by-day and game-by-game until the offseason. From the spring onward, Collins wants to see his players engaged in other sports or to be playing basketball year-round as he continues to build the foundation of what he wants Lancer's basketball to become.

In his first game as head coach on Tuesday, Jan. 6, the Lancers lost at home to visiting West Park 74-20 in what was the Metro League opener for both teams. Two days later, however on Thursday, Jan. 8, the Lancers bounced back with a 75-63 victory at Kennedy, improving their record to 3-8 overall, including 1-1 within the Metro League at press time and giving the team a much-needed boost of confidence. Against the Cougars, the Lancers saw four players score in double figures including seniors Echun Portis (18), Ezra Tobin (15), and Damajae Moses (10). Additionally, sophomore Jeremiah Gorman added 11 points in the winning effort.

While the development of the program is ongoing and will continue in earnest this offseason, Collins has short-term goals he wants to reach before the season ends.

"When I look at the remainder of the season, I look at it and say, are we getting progressively better? You have to look at what you have and take the small wins. You have to take the scoreboard out of it and say, did we get more rebounds? Did we get less turnovers than the last game? Did we get more steals than we did the last game? Did we score progressively more than the last game? Those are small wins, and the hope is you get a lot of those small wins and one day it will equal the win on the scoreboard."

The Lancers return to the court this Monday, Jan. 19 when they face American Canyon in a non-league contest. ★
